EIGHTH ANNUAL INDOOR CHAMPIONSHIP ATHLETIC MEETING.

The 1929 Indoor Meeting was held on March 2 at the 102d Engineers Armory in New York City. It is the general feeling that the Intercollegiate Games have arrived at a very high order of excellence. Last year the splendid program and management of the games evidently left its impress upon the public, because the meet this year again drew a capacity crowd. The advance sale was the largest in history and in spite of most unfortunate weather conditions the armory was filled, and this year without any special events as feature attractions. The meet began promptly and was finished at 10:45 and was uniformly exciting and interesting.

New York University won its first championship, with a total of 25 points. Less than three points separated the next three place winners. Georgetown was second with 22 $\frac{1}{4}$, Pennsylvania third with 21 $\frac{1}{4}$, and Cornell fourth with 19 $\frac{1}{2}$. At last year's meet New York University was fifth with 13 points and few of the dopesters were willing to concede them the championship before hand. They brought a well balanced team that scored in five events. The outstanding performer for the new champion was Sol Furth, who won the broad jump and was second in the hurdles. Philip Edwards, the New York University outstanding star and member of the Canadian Olympic team, 880 Outdoor champion, ran the last relay on the winning two-mile relay and finished second in the one-mile run. The later event was one of the most uncertain and astonishing races of recent years. The event was generally conceded to Edwards. At one time or another five men took the lead in this race. The winner, Joseph J. Hickey, emerged into the lead early, in the last lap and with a terrific sprint beat his teammate to the finish by 3 yards in the excellent time of 4 minutes and 20 seconds. The two-mile relay team won handily with a lead of 9 yards.

Three records were broken. Frederic H. Sturdy of Yale, with a splendid vault of 13 feet 7 $\frac{3}{4}$ inches, broke Sabin Carr's record of last year by 3 inches. The vault of Bernard E. Berlinger of the University of Pennsylvania, who took second place, was just an inch higher than the previous record. The Freshman medley relay team of Pennsylvania lowered the previous record, made also by a Pennsylvania team in 1922, by 26-10 seconds, establishing a new record of 7 minutes 42.6 seconds. In the 70 yards high hurdle John S. Collier of Brown in the first heat equalled the Indoor record held by Charles H. Moore of Penn State, made in 1925, by winning his heat in 8.6 seconds. Curiously enough, the record of Moore was also made in a heat.

The meet saw two excellent all-round performers, Bernard E. Berlinger, who was second in the pole vault, fourth in the shot, tied for third in the broad jump and tied for fourth in the high jump. Leo Sexton of Georgetown was first in the 35 lb. weight, third in the shot put and tied for fourth in the high jump. The scores by these individuals were largely responsible for placing their teams in third and second positions, respectively.

Each year sees a number of novelties or improvements in equipment. This year for the first time was tried out a device for exhibiting the number of the laps remaining to go in a race. The device was made by the office of the Association and was highly successful. A flood light was placed this year over the pole vault cross-bar and the bar was painted black and white. The vaulters reported that the lighting was excellent. The runway in the broad jump was for a considerable distance painted white so that the black take-off mark stood out more distinctly. An experiment was made with raising flags of the first three place winners coincident with the announcement of the point winners. The flags were too small, but it would seem that with larger flags and a better method of display the feature would be very effective.

THE CROSS-COUNTRY CHAMPIONSHIPS, 1928.

The Twentieth Annual Varsity and Ninth Annual Freshman Cross-Country Runs of the Association were held over the new courses in Van Cortlandt Park, New York, on November 26, 1928. Cold weather and sunshine were very acceptable to the great crowd of spectators, but the low temperature slowed down both events somewhat.

After many years of experiment, what appear to be permanent courses have been laid out for the Varsity, Freshman and 2½ miles schoolboy races. These courses have the decided advantage of being on the periphery of the playing fields and so laid out that substantial permanent posts have been installed with signs at every turn adequately explaining the course. The Park Department has cooperated to the fullest extent and the course presents an attractive appearance.

In the Varsity race a great duel had been anticipated, but the result was not entirely as expected. William J. Cox of Penn State, defending champion for two years; James L. Reid of Harvard, Francis C. Lindsay and Harry L. Richardson of Maine, Joseph Hagen of Columbia and Nathan H. Lerner of New York University were common choices for the first three places. The finish was the most spectacular since the battle between Tibbetts of Harvard and Loucks of Syracuse in 1925. For the first four miles Cox maintained the lead, though both Reid and Lindsay occasionally raced to the front. At the big hill on the second lap Cox felt the pace and dropped back nearly seventy yards and his hope of victory was gone. With Lindsay in the lead the relative positions were unchanged up to about 300 yards from home when Reid broke into a sprint, passed Lindsay and fought his way to the tape. Lindsay could not respond and finished some twelve yards behind, but at least 125 yards ahead of Cox. Richardson and Hagen, who had been well up with the leaders through the race, were fourth and fifth thirty yards apart. The failure of Cox to win still leaves John Paul Jones of Cornell the sole triple winner of the championships.

Penn State for the third time in succession was the winner of the team trophy with a total score of 45 points. Maine in second place had 96 points. The next three teams were fairly close, Cornell having 102, New York University 119 and Syracuse 130. The winners had a very well balanced team which took 3rd, 7th, 10th, 11th and 14th places.

The Freshman race, which was run before the Varsity, was somewhat lacking in thrill. Three Pennsylvania men who were leading easily one hundred yards from home jogged over the last fifty yards hand in hand. These three men, Daniel E. Dean, William J. McKniff and Roland C. Ritchie, divided points and the medals. Lawrence Belanger of Syracuse was fourth, 25 yards behind, with Carl A. Coan of Pennsylvania a like distance behind him. Everett A. Gunning of Maine was the last medal winner, 30 yards behind. In spite of Pennsylvania finishing four men in the first five the result was very much in doubt until a final check of the score, which showed that the fifth Pennsylvania man was No. 50 and the

total score 61, while Syracuse, with 4th, 10th, 15th, 16th and 20th, was next with 65 points. Penn State was third with 83, Cornell fourth with 91 and New York University fifth with 95. Dartmouth in sixth place had a total of 202 points. The winners set the pace throughout and were rarely challenged. After the first half-dozen finished the contestants came in struggling groups, so that the matter of scoring was difficult. In spite of unusual coldness every contestant to start in either race finished.

ARTICLES OF ALLIANCE

BETWEEN THE

INTERCOLLEGIATE A.A.A.A.

AND THE

AMATEUR ATHLETIC UNION

I. At all meetings of the Amateur Athletic Union the I. C. A. A. A. shall be entitled to representation by not more than four delegates, having collectively one vote.

II. From among these delegates one shall be chosen to be a member of the Board of Governors of the A. A. U., who shall have voice, vote and privilege equal to the other members of said Board upon matters coming before it.

III. All members of the A. A. U. clubs entering Intercollegiate games shall be governed by the rules of the I. C. A. A. A. A.; but members of associate colleges entering the A. A. U. games shall be governed by the rules of the A. A. U.

IV. These Articles of Alliance shall be terminable by either party upon thirty days' written notice to the other.
