The trip to the Coast and the holding of the Fifty-Sixth Track and Field meeting at Berkeley, California, was one of the highlights in the history of the Association. The President appointed for the trip West, and the care of the men while in California, committees composed of: John T. McGovern, Cornell; John M. Cates, Yale; J. Douglas Colman, Cornell; H. Jamison Swarts, Pennsylvania, and Thomas A. Fernley, Princeton, who were instrumental in making the trip exceedingly pleasant and successful. The detailed report of the trip is found in Bulletin 19 issued by the Association.

The Executive Committee appointed as delegate to the A.A.U. Convention held November 20, 21 and 22, 1932, at New York City, Mr. Gustavus T. Kirby, Chairman; Mr. A. Jocelyn H. Magrath, N.Y.U., Mr. A. C. Gilbert, Yale, and Mr. John T. McGovern, Cornell, and the following alternates: Mr. Rupert B. Thomas, Jr., Princeton, Mr. Frederic S. Murray, Stanford, Mr. James A. Taylor, Columbia, and Mr. Richard C. Floyd, Harvard.

The Special Business Meeting of the Association held January 15, 1933, on the recommendation of the Executive Committee reaffirmed the resolution of the previous convention maintaining the use of distances measured in yards and miles for the present Indoor Meet.

The Executive Committee has made available slow motion pictures of outstanding track and field performers at the 1932 Outdoor Meeting which it believes are valuable for training. There are two reels, a Track and a Field reel, either of which may be had for \$15, or both for \$30, or the same may be rented for \$5 a showing.

The invention of the Kirby Camera Timer by Mr. Gustavus T. Kirby, used for the first time at the Track and Field Meeting of 1932, has made a noteworthy contribution to the field of accurate timing and photographing of the finishes of races.

The Executive Committee recommended action on the applications for membership as follows:

That the applications of Michigan State Normal College be refused for the sole reason that men who are candidates for teachers' certificates only may compete; Rhode Island State College be accepted; Villanova College be laid on the table without prejudice, pending the further report of a committee, and that Cincinnati be dropped.

The report of the treasurer showed: Balance, Mar. 3, 1932, \$3,879.51; receipts, \$18,584.97; expenditures, \$18,730.68; balance, Mar. 5, 1932, \$943.66. In savings banks, \$7,500, and \$6,018.05 in sinking funds.

TWELFTH ANNUAL INDOOR CHAMPIONSHIP ATHLETIC MEETING

Held at 258th Field Artillery Armory, Jerome Avenue and Kingsbridge Road, New York, March 4, 1933. I.C.A.A.A. board track used, one-sixth mile, 110-foot straightaway.

A marked innovation and one that immediately proved its value was the taking of slow motion pictures and the timing of the races by the Kirby Camera Timer. This was to prove its value in the 70-yard hurdles, where four men finished within 8 inches of each other and all six finished within a foot and a half of the winner, which in the experience of a great many of the older officials, was the closest race ever seen in this country. The judges postponed their final decision until they could have an opportunity to see the pictures and announced only a temporary decision. The necessity for having sufficient light over the finish line to take these pictures from the gallery proved to be an unexpected advantage for the spectators. The finish of every race was so brightly illuminated that it was readily possible for all spectators to see the finish clearly. This was the first track event in which official motion pictures were taken indoors.

Four out of the twelve records were replaced: 70-yard dash, Richard Bell, M.I.T., 7 seconds; Joseph P. McCluskey, Fordham, two-mile run, 9 minutes 16.2 seconds; University of Pennsylvania, mile relay, 3 minutes 17 seconds; pole vault, Wirt L. Thompson and Keith S. Brown, both of Yale, tied for first place with 13 feet 9 $\frac{3}{4}$ inches.

Twenty-seven colleges entered 522 competitors, with a total of 251 individual starters and 268 actual starts.

CROSS-COUNTRY CHAMPIONSHIPS OF 1932.

The Twenty-Fourth Annual 'Varsity and Thirteenth Annual Freshman Cross-Country Runs were contested over the Van Cortlandt Park (New York) course on November 14, 1932. Owing to general conditions the entry list was one of the smallest in recent years. There were several teams which did not compete, notably Pennsylvania, whose leader, Daniel E. Dean, was 1931 champion. Despite this, the competition was excellent and the mild day drew at least as large a crowd as the record one of 1931. Manhattan, with two well-balanced teams, won both races. This feat has been accomplished only once before, when in 1927 Penn State won both events. The times of the first ten were as follows:
