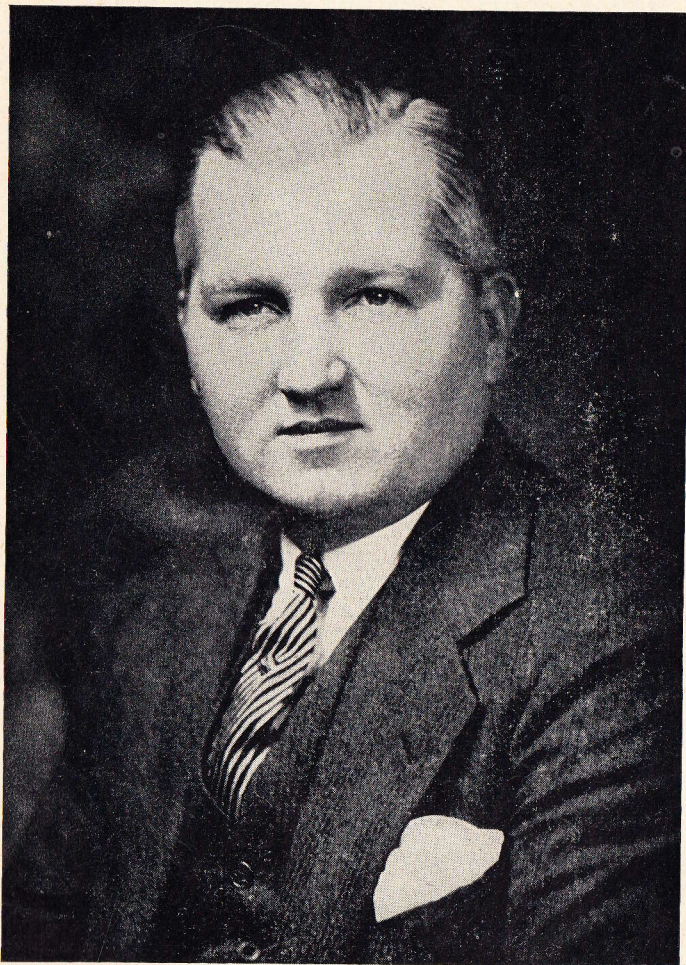

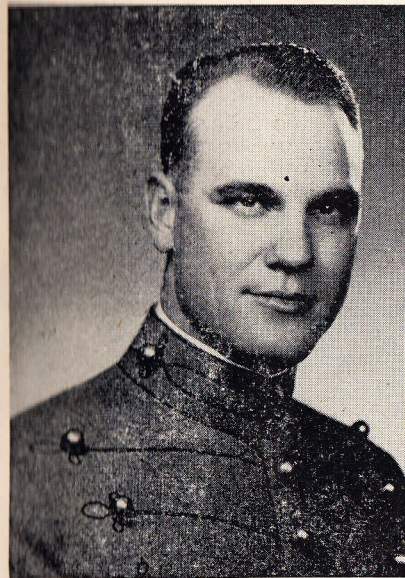

Tucker Awarded Sullivan Trophy



CADET Y. ARNOLD TUCKER

Cadet Y. Arnold Tucker, quarterback of Army's great football team, was the 1946 winner of the James E. Sullivan Memorial Trophy, the award presented annually by the Amateur Athletic Union of the U.S. to the amateur athlete who, by performance, example and good influence did most during the year to advance the cause of good sportsmanship.

The selection of Tucker made it two years in a row that a football player—and an Army football player—has won this trophy, which is generally considered the highest honor that can be attained by an amateur athlete. Felix A. (Doc) Blanchard, whose choice set the precedent, was named for 1945.

The 22-year old West Point first-classman from Miami, Fla. with 597 points, narrowly edged out Bill Smith, record-smashing freestyle swimmer from Honolulu and Johnny Lujack, Notre Dame quarterback, in the closest electoral contest in the trophy's seventeen year history.

Less publicized than Blanchard and Glenn Davis, his illustrious backfield mates, Tucker was an equally important cog in Earl Blaik's mighty

West Point gridiron machine, which completed a three year string of twenty-eight games without defeat.

His shrewd direction, deft ball-handling and accurate passing were major factors in the explosive effectiveness of Army's T-formation attack. In addition he was an outstanding defensive halfback.

It was touch-and-go between Tucker and Lujack, his Notre Dame counterpart, for the quarterback berth on the various All-America teams, several selectors straddling the issue by bracketing them. Blaik and many less partial observers agreed that Tucker outshone Lujack when they opposed each other in last fall's Army-Notre Dame game.

Tucker plays basketball and has competed in track besides his football activities. He is captain of Army's 1947 basketball team. He has publicly announced his intention of accepting his commission and staying in the Army after his graduation from West Point, despite many attractive offers to play professional football.

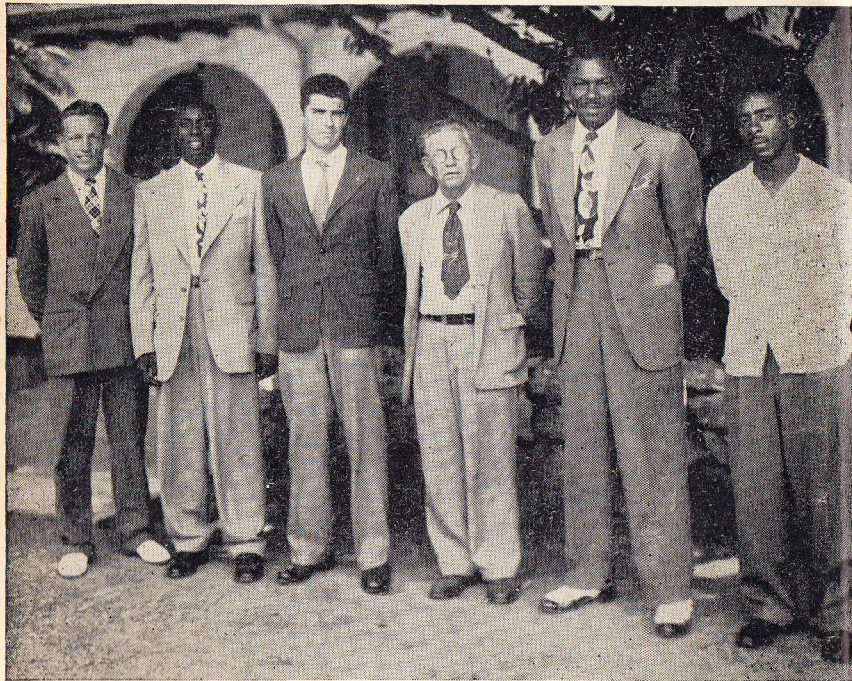
Candidates for the award were originally submitted by the forty-one district associations in the A.A.U., who considered in making their choice acts of sportsmanship, qualities of leadership, excellence of performance, strength of character, force of personality and high ideals of amateurism.

The Sullivan Committee studied the original list carefully then pared it down to the ten athletes they considered most worthy. The names of these ten, together with a summary of reasons for each selection, then were submitted to the tribunal, whose membership of 500 includes the nation's leading sports authorities, for a final vote.

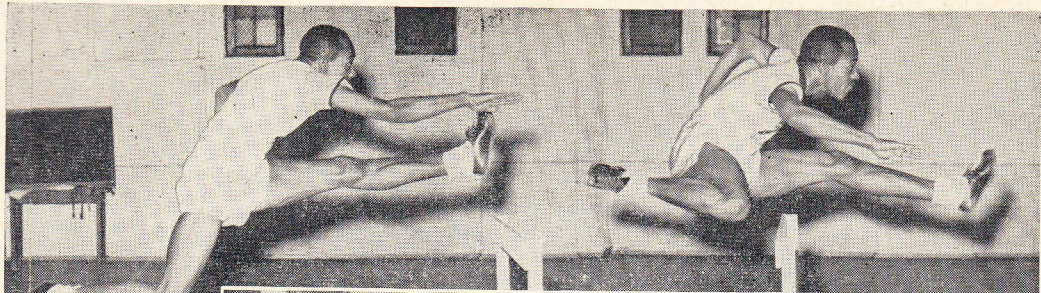

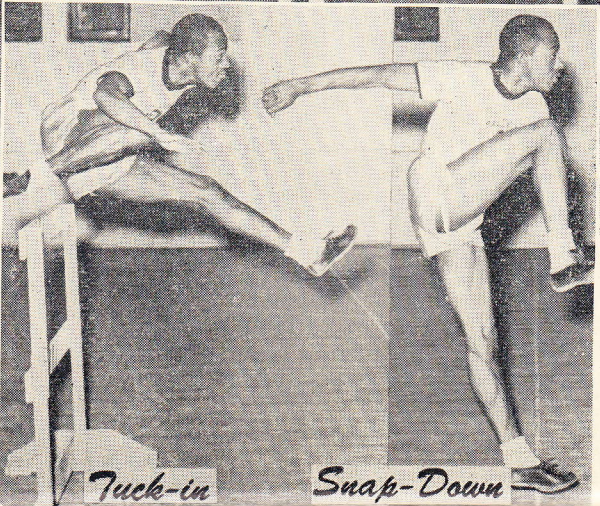

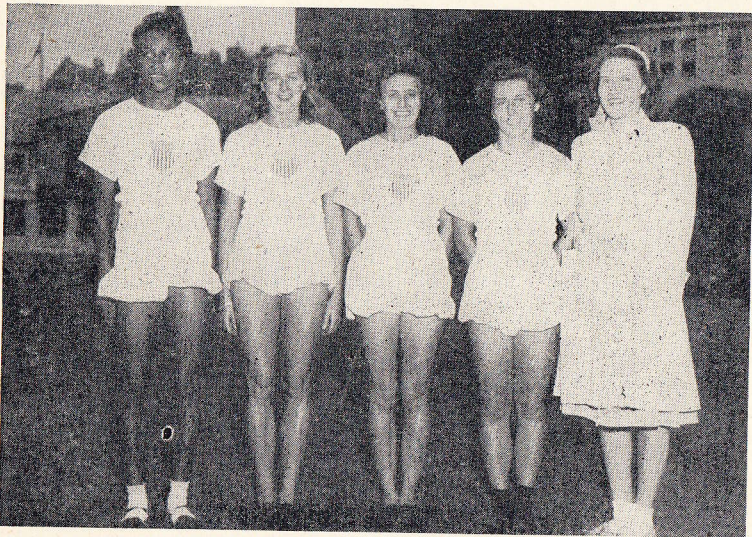

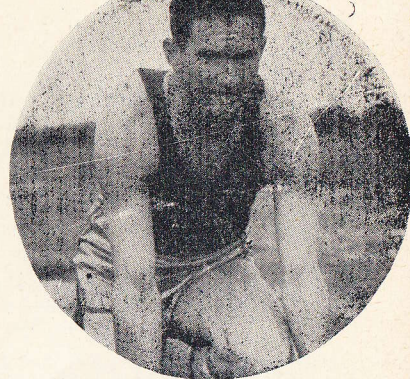

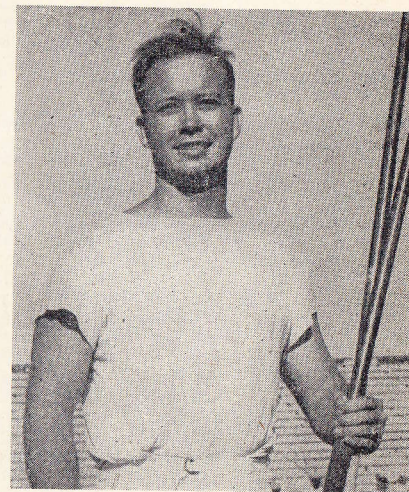
