



National Collegiate Championships

Philadelphia, June 16-17, 1961

It took 40 years for the National Collegiate track and field championships to be held in the East. There are at least 15,000 persons who are hopeful they will return soon after what qualified observers described as the finest meet ever seen on University of Pennsylvania's Franklin Field.

If one athlete had to be singled out above all the rest, it would be Villanova's Frank Budd, who captured both sprints and wasn't even close to being beaten over the 100 and 220 yard distances in five races over the two-day period.

Team laurels were earned by the well-balanced Southern California squad, again on top after two years of University of Kansas domination. In sweeping to victory for the 21st time in 40 championships, coach Jess Mortensen's protégés didn't pick up a single point in the flat races.

The Trojans' Dallas Long in the shotput and Luther Hayes in the hop, step and jump, retained their 1960 crowns and established new National Collegiate Championship records. Long completely dominated the shotput with all six tosses being farther than the second man, twice breaking his own meet record, winding up with a Herculean effort of 63-3½. Hayes' mark of 51-2¼ is the new standard for the triple jump.

In all, seven meet records went tumbling. Although the East was deprived of its first sub-four-minute mile, Oregon's Dyrol Burleson breezed to a brilliant 4:00.5 victory and a meet record after a slow first half-mile had apparently killed any chance for "Burley" to break the four-minute barrier.

Jim Brewer, of USC, first high school vaulter to achieve 15 feet, wound up in a three way deadlock for first place at 15-4 with Oklahoma State's new world champion, George Davies, and Dick Gear of San Jose State.

For the record, Nebraska's John Bentley reporting on the 1959 Championships in the NCAA Guide, wrote: "It is doubtful if the National Collegiate field has ever provided a greater field of vaulters. Fifteen of 20 cleared the third height of 14 feet."

On the grasstex runways at Franklin Field, not only did 16 of 21 vaulters clear the opening height of 14-4, but eight went over the bar at 15 feet—including for the first time ever three from one school (San Jose State's Gear, Jeff Chase, and Dick Kimmell). Previously no more than six men had ever cleared 15 feet in a single meet.

There's no doubt that Budd dominated the sprints and Burleson proved his right to the title "greatest middle distance runner in NCAA history," but the runner who captured the fancy of the crowd was Western Michigan's John Bork.


In the early 880 heats, Bork came from behind to whip Yale's Jim Stack and Harvard's Fred Howard before succumbing to Michigan's Ergas Leps in a fast (1:49.2) semi-final. Never on Franklin Field had Easterners seen a better 880-yard performance than Bork gave in the final. He made his bid around the first turn on the final lap, roared from eighth to first in 20 yards and by the middle of the back stretch, enjoyed at least a 15-yard advantage over his conqueror, Leps. Bork won by 15 yards going away at the tape in 1:48.3.

Explosive Jerry Tarr proved somewhat of a surprise with his decisive victory in the high hurdles. The Oregon football end made a shambles of the opposition in the heats and semi-finals and completely dominated the final.

The 440-yard intermediate hurdles, replacing the Olympic distance of 400 meters that had been run previously, found Occidental's Dixon Farmer the complete master. He led Southern California's Bob Staten to the tape by about six yards in the final to hang up a record.

As expected, new records were set in both the three-mile run and the 3000-meter steeplechase. Australians were responsible for both.

Pat Clohessy of Houston ran a smart race to win over San Jose State's Charlie Clark and Jerry Ashmore of Western Michigan with a splendid effort of 13:47.7. The steeplechase went to Abilene Christian's John Lawler, victor at the Penn

THE EAST

Even the New York Yankees, in their most dominating days, have nothing on Jumbo Jim Elliott's Villanova Wildcats.

Everyone agrees the Cats will be head and shoulders over the field in their own league this year. So good, in fact, they're touted here as a good bet to win college track's World Series—the National Collegiate Championship in Eugene, Ore. next June.

This is not just wishful thinking by wistful Easterners, who haven't crowned a national champion since 1957—Villanova. It just adds up that way. Take a team that finished third in last year's meet, subtract a couple of relay runners, add two sure-fire scorers up from the freshman team and the result is a title contender if you ever saw one.

Big man in the East is Frank Budd, he of the world record 9.2 in the National AAU championships. There are some revolutionaries who are predicting a 6 flat indoor 60 and a 9.1 century for the man who's so fast he outruns his shadow.

In case Frank gets lonely, there's teammate Paul Drayton, and what college anytime, anywhere could boast a pair of sprinters like that?

Don't get the idea this is a two-man team. Shotputter Billy Joe, IC4A champion, is back and he, too, has a partner—Jerry Donini, a possible place scorer. Then there's Pat Traynor, second in the steeplechase last year, and the two sophomore hot shots—Rolando Cruz and Vic Zwolak. Cruz is the classy Puerto Rican pole vaulter who's in the 15-foot bracket and could be a gold medal winner. Zwolak is a distance runner of high regard, who's a threat in the long jaunts.

Apparently there's no end to the wealth of Villanova talent, so it will do no good for rival Eastern schools to wait 'til next year. Sure, Budd and Drayton will be gone, but there's plenty more where they came from. The current Wildcat freshman roster has Tom Sullivan, the 4:03.5 schoolboy miler from Chicago, and Donald Webster, a 46.8 quartemiler. There's no getting way from it—the signs spell D-Y-N-A-S-T-Y.

If you're looking for an upset hope, in the IC4A, at least, take a glance at Yale, with distancer Bobby Mack and a group of talented hurdlers and high jumpers. Or Penn State with all those European half milers and distance runners, particularly England's Gerry Norman. Or Manhattan, with no outstanding star, but scorers in almost every event.

If the Wildcats have a lock on all the Eastern crockery as a team, the individual talent is at least spread thin.


At NYU they sing the praises of sophomore shot putter Gary Gubner, the East's first collegiate 60-footer, and Jimmy Wedderburn, senior quartemiler from Barbados, British West Indies, who appears ready to jump head first into the national picture.

Manhattan has a newcomer in Tyrone Pannell, "another Charley Pratt," according to coach George Eastment. Ty can do everything—high jump, hurdle, sprint, broad jump, but it's in the high jump and hurdles that he figures to score best.

Fordham could have the standout middle distance performer in Frank Tomeo, a lad compared favorably with Tom Courtney, the Ram's Olympic champion.

An interesting performer could be Cornell's Misati Machooka, from the town of Kisii in Kenya, Africa. Penn State's Chuck Werner watched Machooka run away with the IC4A freshman cross-country run last year and quickly remarked, "the greatest runner I've ever seen."

If Messers. Machooka, Mack, Zwolak and Norman don't steal all the distance

Among major independents, Notre Dame is counting on freshman Jerry O'Connor, Frank Carver and John Mulrooney. Mike Giacinto and Tom Dempsey are top veterans.



THE SOUTHWEST

Until two years ago, the Southwest Conference championship track club was rather an exclusive one with only three members—Texas, Texas A&M and Rice. Baylor joined by winning in 1960.

Now SMU, retaining much of last year's strength and with a host of capable sophomores, could dethrone Texas and vault past runner-up Baylor into top spot.

The heavy influx of foreign trackmen definitely will keep SMU as well as the state's leading independent teams, Abilene Christian College and Houston, in the national picture. Lamar Tech will also be helped.

Two Englishmen, Brian Bolton (1:52.8, 4:12.1) and Clive Phillips (9:28.1), will be joined by SWC vault champion Dexter Elkins (15 $\frac{3}{4}$), quarter-mile runner-up Paul Holley (48.2) and newcomers Jimmy Langham (20.8 and 48.7) and distance runners Jim Rorabaugh and Mickey Wade as SMU makes its stoutest bid.

ACC has Olympian Earl Young returning along with Australians John Lawler and Denis Moore. Young ran the fastest collegiate 440 last year, 46.2; was runner-up in the National Collegiate Championships; clocked a 21.1t and anchored his team to a collegiate record equaling 3:07.6 in the mile relay and a new world record of 1:22.6 for the 880 relay.

Lawler, as a sophomore, won the National Collegiate steeplechase and clocked a 4:05.9 mile. Moore turned the two-mile in 8:56.0 and three-mile in 13:56.2. Up from ACC's freshman team are promising half-miler and miler Bobby Hargrave (1:54.4 and 4:12.2) and pole vaulter-hurdler Billy Pemelton.

Three Aussies again will enable Houston to offer a formidable distance challenge to anyone with Pat Clohessy, who posted last season's fastest three-mile mark (13:47.7); Barrie Almond (4:07.9) and Al Lawrence, 1960 National Collegiate 5,000-meter champion.

Lamar Tech hopes to arise with an English trio of Ian Stewart (4:11.4 and 9:07.2), Simon McNamee and Peter Linford as well as high jumper Colin Ridgway (6-10) of Australia.


Clyde Littlefield tucked away his 25th SWC championship and retired with Froggy Lovvorn grabbing the reins Littlefield had held since 1921 at Texas. Lovvorn must build around SWC hurdles champion Ray Cunningham (13.7 and 22.5) and talented sophomores Bob Sewell (14.3 and 23.9), Johnny Cram (9.8 and 21.1), Loy Gunter (4:18.7) and Larry Rhodes (1:55.7).

Thin Bill Kemp, who chased Texas' departed Ralph Alspaugh to wind-aided 9.2 and 20.0 times, heads Baylor's returning cast which includes Roy Smalley (47.9) and Glynn Fields (48.4) in the 440, SWC high jump co-champion Eddie Curtis and broad jumper Tommy Minter.

Recruits from its most powerful freshman unit in a decade makes A&M a threat. Danny Roberts set new frosh records of 53-9 and 156-10 $\frac{1}{2}$, R. E. Merritt (440 in 48.4) and Pat Mitchell and Robert Martin will join Curt Roberts and Ed Williams in the sprints. Top returnee is Thad Crooks (4:13 and 1:52).

Bobby Bernard, Drake Relays high hurdles champion; Eddie Curtis, high jump title co-holder as a sophomore; and frosh miler Nolan Brawley (4:18) are TCU's stoutest performers. Rice can count on pole vaulter Fred Hansen (15-0) and javelin aces Ed Red (221-6) and Dave Edwards (217-0). Texas Tech offers hurdlers Bob Swafford and Bake Turner and miler Ronny Sessums.

Other top performers in the state will be sprinters John Dale Lewis (9.5), and Mike Stell and broad jumper Bill Miller of McMurry; distance ace Hyke Van der Wal and broad jumper Dudley Haas of East Texas State; hurdler Gary Petross and distance men Frank Santiago and David Noble of Howard Payne.

THE PACIFIC COAST

Oregon, runner-up to Southern California in 1961, may turn out to be a very ungracious host at the National Collegiate Championships this June.

USC suffered heavily from graduation, losing 47 of its 65 points scored in the Championships, while Oregon lost only five points. This may sound like the Trojans are in trouble but they should have another good team in 1962.

The Trojans' leading contenders for national honors are Dallas Long, National Collegiate and AAU shot put champion, Rex Cawley, a fine 440 and 440 hurdles prospect, hurdler Bob Pierce and discus thrower Jim Wade, who threw 190-6 $\frac{1}{2}$ in 1960 but slumped badly last season.

Oregon fans have good reason to feel optimistic with such athletes as Dyrol Burleson, Harry Jerome and Jerry Tarr returning. Burleson won the National Collegiate and AAU miles a season ago, Jerome was second in the National Collegiate 100 and Tarr won the high hurdles at the Championships. Sig Ohleemann adds depth to an already loaded middle distance crew. Newcomer Archie San Romani, who ran 1:50.6, 4:06.8 and 9:03.9 last season as a transfer student, will help.

Don't get the idea, however, that it will be all USC and Oregon on the Pacific Coast. Oregon State, Occidental and San Jose State also rank as contenders for national honors. Coach Sam Bell has one of the best balanced teams in the nation at Oregon State. Returning are Dale Story (4:07, 8:46.9), Norm Monroe (46.4) and Dan Likens, second in the National Collegiate javelin. Returning to the team is another javelin star, Gary Stenlund, who placed second in the 1960 National Collegiate Championships, but sat out last year.

Occidental, under new coach Jim Bush, lost heavily through graduation but has returning national 440 hurdles champion Dixon Farmer and Steve Haas, who ran 9.5, 21.0t and 47.1 last year. San Jose State has 9.3 man Dennis Johnson along with 15-2 vaulter Jeff Chase, Willie Williams (9.5, 21.1t) and Dan Studney, javelin.


