## New Jersey Notes

We are still in the infancy of our campaign here, though a few fine marks have been recorded.

I saw the finest high school discus toss I ever witnessed, at the Newark Board of Education meet, but it was doubly jinxed. To begin with, Art Swarts fouled by about an inch on the throw. Then as the platter was booming past the 175-foot mark, some 8 or 9 feet in the air, it hit a tree branch and fell 179'1" from the circle. It easily lost 10-15 feet this way, and maybe more. At the Union County meet, May 9, Swarts bombed a 190-plus foul throw, two days after his 181'5".

Ed Bennett is having some minor arm trouble, but it didn't seem to bother him. All throws were over 195' and most over 200'. This boy's headed for West Point after a year of prep school here in New Jersey.

Swarts has some discus competition in Len Worther of Lawrenceville, a swimming All-American, who has thrown the big discus 154'2".

Brian Hondru took over No. 1 ranking in the East with his defeat of Matt Nazaruk at Penn in the shot. Hondru has yet to hit his peak, I feel, and may not do so until the state meet if he follows his 1962 pattern.

The 440 at Englewood should be a lulu. Tim Johnson of Rindge Tech is out of school due to impending paternity, but Peck (48.0 in a relay), As-hurst, and possibly Harley Morris of Haddon Heights and George Patterson of Checkir should make this another sub-48 race. Morris is going to Texas Southern. He should be a real addition to that powerhouse. I'm sure Haddon Heights would have won the big one at Penn had they entered it. Morris, I believe, would have been too much for the other anchor men.

Paul Wilson pulled a muscle at the Union County meet.

## Ricky Urbina

Ricardo Urbina (Msgr. Mc-Clancy Memorial HS, East Elmhurst, NY) stands second on the all-time list indoors with his 1:54.7 880, and he is tied for third on the 1000-yard list. He is a winning runner, holding the National Indoor 1000 title, the CHSAA indoor 880 championship, and 9 consecutive victories in big races.

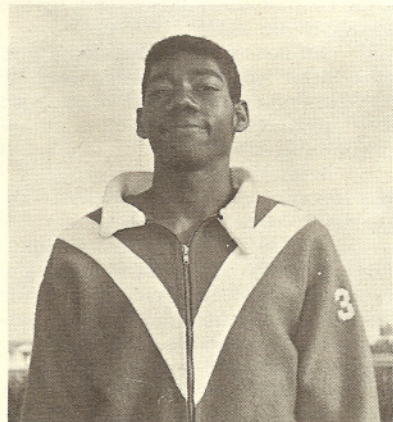
Only 17 (Jan. 31), he is a comparative newcomer. He ran only 2:08 as a sophomore and 1:57.6 last year. His fastest outdoor time is 1:57, but when pushed he can run much faster. His first two races this outdoor season were a 3:10.5 1320 and a 2:17.2 1000 yards.

Born in New York, Ricky is 5'11½" tall and weighs 150. He plans to major in biology at Georgetown and become a doctor. He hopes to run in the 1968 Olympics. His goal for this season is "to at least approach, if not capture, the national outdoor record in the half-mile".

His coach is Harry Howell.

## Eddie Davis

Eddie Davis (below) is barely 15 years old and a freshman at Hueneme HS, Oxnard, Calif. While still 14, this season, he ran an 880 in 1:59.4. On April 18, as a 15-year-old, he ran 1:57.6 for a new freshman record.

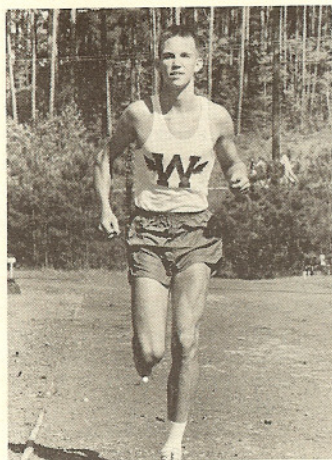

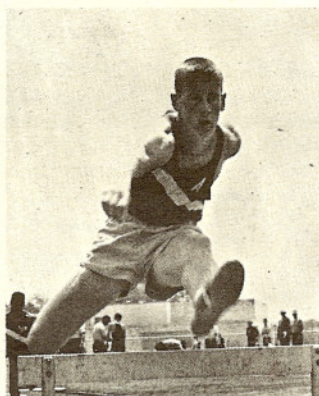

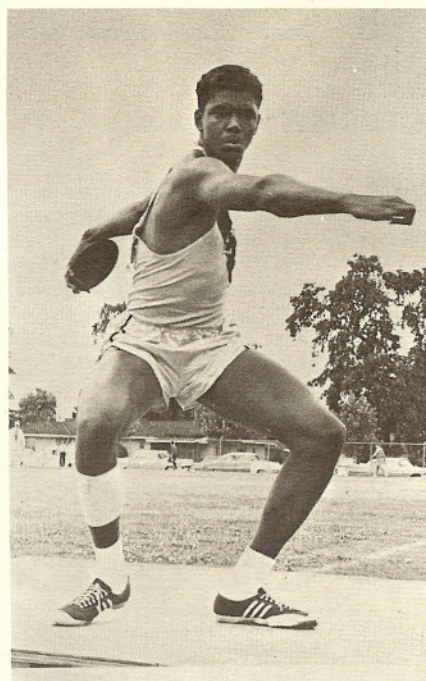

Last spring at the Boise JC Inv., Mac set 4 records; SP- 55'6", dis- 160'11", HH- 14.3, LH- 19.6.

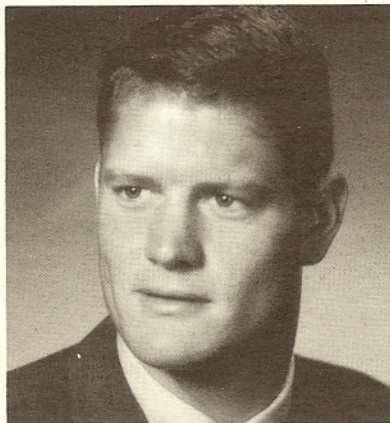

# All Time Greats: Milt Campbell

Milt Campbell (Plainfield, NJ) was a coach's dream and nightmare at the same time. He did everything wrong and was as awkward as a cow, but who can argue with success? He ran the 100 in 9.6, 100 meters in 10.5, the 220 in 20.7, 39" high hurdles in 14 flat, 42" highs in 14.1 (metric once and yardage twice), 180 lows in 19.0 and 220 lows in 23.7, along with going 6'4 $\frac{1}{4}$ " in the high jump.

Coach Harold Bruguiere rightfully declared him a decathlon prospect. Many of Milt's marks are unrecorded. It's said he had 15.2 while an 8th-grader, 14.9 and 23.8 as a freshman (220 lows), but brother Tom beat him with 14.9 at the state, Milt taking the lows in 24.4.

Campbell was runner-up in the 1952 Olympic decathlon with 6975 while a high school junior, but was ineligible as a senior because of being 19. He did 7059 or 7054 (AAU and Don Potts disagree) in the national AAU. Bob Mathias' best in high school was 6456. Completely verified are 14.5 on June 9th of 1951, 14.2 August 9th of '52 (a junior record tied by Herm Johnson, also Plainfield, seven years later), 24.4 for 220 lows in 1950 which improved 1/10th in '51. His 220 lows were down to 23.7 in June of '52, and he did 10.7 for 100 meters while his highs (42") dropped to 14.2 in the 1952 British Games at London.

In the 1952 national AAU, he had 14.4 metric in defeat by Jack Davis and Craig Dixon, 14-flatters, in trial heat, 14.4 again in semis behind Davis' 14.0 and Billy Anderson's 14.3. He was ranked second in the world in the decathlon, behind Mathias.

Taking on everybody at every opportunity, he ran 10.8 in the national AAU heat and semis and again in the final. In high school meets he had 14.1 during the season, 14-flat at the state, 19-flat in the County. His 23.7 was at Rahway on June 14th. During the national decathlon, he started his second day with another 14.4, and his 7059 is age-18 international record. His trip to England had 10.8 on June 2 in International meet, 14.5 metric the day before. He'd tried to make the Olympic team in the highs but was fifth in 14.5. His first decathlon found Mathias taking him with 7825 to 7059, but Milt ranked 7th of history in the process, and was far better than Mathias' initial efforts. He beat Mathias in three events and tied a fourth, though his all-out 400 at the end of the first day had him sick all night.



As a senior, Campbell ranked 1st in the world at decathlon, 3d in the highs. He ran 9.6 at Honolulu, 20.7 in New Jersey, 14.1 metric in the Hawaiian AAU and 14.1 in his state's AAU as well as in national AAU, though hitting three hurdles chasing Davis' 13.9. He ran 14.3 at Honolulu (behind Mathias, of all people), and again (metric) in national AAU decathlon. His decathlon score made him all-time number four behind Mathias, Glen Morris and Bob Richards. He missed Richards by four points. Still playing with the lows, he ran 24.0 behind Davis' 23.7 in the national AAU, had a 24.2 heat before that. In Jamaica for a 4-day meet, he had two 14.4 runs, the second a photo finish loss to Harrison Dillard.

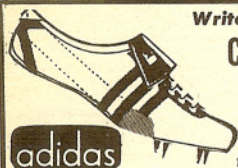
He was All-America in both football and swimming, as well as track.

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
