The Big Meet: Cal vs. Stanford

Edwards Stadium, Berkeley May 2, 1992

Brent Bums (Acalanes High School, Lafayette), a senior won three events in leading the California men's team to a 115 to 47 victory over Stanford in the Big Meet. It was California's 21st victory over Stanford. Burns won the pole vault (17-4 1/4 meet record), the 110-meter high hurdles (14.42), and the 100 meters (10.52w). It was Burns 23rd birthday. He was selected as Pacific-10 Conference men's track athlete of the week. Burns leads the Pacific-10 pole vault list at 18-1 1/4.

"It's definitely a great way to end my career as a Golden Bear," said Burns to Dan Reines (The Daily Californian).

"The fans have certainly been good to me here. It's nice to give them something for their support. It's nice to give them something to cheer about.

"I haven't been training for the 100--I didn't really know where the finish line was. I just kept running. If it had been any closer, I would have been in trouble, because I wouldn't know where to lean."

Ramon Jimenez-Gaona (California/San Jose State), a citizen of Paraguay, won the shot put (59-3) and the discus (198-4). He is the Pac-10 leader at 202-3. Senior captain Peter Schaffer (California/Acalanes High School, Lafayette) set a personal record of 185-7, the fifth best throw in the Pac-10, to place second.

"It's a great day," Schaffer said to Joe Roderick (Contra Costa Times). "Two Acalanes guys. Team captains. It's just been a great day. I couldn't be happier."

"Any time you go against Stanford, the adrenaline is pumping," Schaeffer said. "This was the last meet of my career at Edwards, and placing second against great competition with a six-foot PR, I'm ecstatic."

David Popejoy (Stanford/Bellamine High School, San Jose) defeated Demian Luper (California/Justin Siena High School, Napa) in the hammer throw--192-7 to 190-7. Popejoy leads the Pac-10 at 208-3 and Luper is fifth at 197-2.

California running back Russell White, a leading Heisman Trophy candidate next season, triple jumped 46-9 1/2 for a third-place finish. This came hours after scoring the only touchdown in the Bears' final scrimmage of spring practice. White was one of the nation's top prep jumpers as a senior at Crespi Hign School in Van Nuys in 1988 with a 50-2 1/4 to his credit. He also high jumped 6-8 1/2 as a 14-year-old in 1985 at Lawrence Junior High in Chatsworth, which still stands as a national age-group record.

Chryste Gaines (Stanford/South Oak Cliff High School, Dallas, Texas), a senior and the 1992 NCAA indoor 55-meter champ, won the 100 (11.59) and the 200 (23.42) in leading the Stanford women to a 83-67 victory. Gaines is second in the Pac-10 100 at 11.17 and the 200 at 23.42. The victory gave Stanford a 7-6 lead in the series.

"I'm not happy with a split, no," said Cal associate director of track and field Tony Sandoval to Reines. "We just didn't have enough today. It was a good meet, but Stanford definitely came to compete."

Laura Baker (California/Reno High School, Reno, Nevada) won the 800 in 2:07.92, the fourth best mark in the Pac-10.

"Laura's so talented," said the Cal director of track and field Erv Hunt to Reines. "She's a real tough athlete. Real tough."

The Stanford 4 x 100 relay team of Jackie Edwards (Queens College, Nassau, Bahamas), Rhonda Oliver (John Tyler High School, Tyler, Texas), Alison Callicoatte (D'Hanis High School, San Antonio, Texas), and Gaines ran 45.56, the third best mark in the Pac-10.

Edwards won the long jump (21-1 1/4) and set a new meet, school, and Bahamian national record in the triple jump (43-0 1/2). The old meet record of 43-0 1/4 was set by American record holder Sheila Hudson (California). The old school record of 41-10 1/2 was set by

Edwards last year. Edwards triple jump mark is the second best in the Pac-10.

"That was a real surprise, because I haven't done much triple jumping the last month and a half," said Edwards to Keith Peters (Peninsula Times Tribune).

After breaking the world record, it broke down those barriers that said men can't jump 30 feet. I'm getting better each year. After last season, I said why should I stop getting better?

"My hamstring has been getting tight since the fourth round. I considered not jumping, but my goal coming here was the world record. I'm happy with 29-2 1/2, but I was looking for 29-8. I look forward to going

30 feet and beyond, and it's evident today that I can do it.

*This is the first meet I've been ready to jump since Tokyo, mentally and physically. I'm on course. Every year I get a little better. I came back faster and stronger this year. I watched the tape of the Tokyo jump hundreds of times. Instead of that one perfect jump in Tokyo, I want to be able to do it all the time.

"It won't take a phenomenal jump to go 29 feet now. The expectations are higher now. My goal is to shock some minds, and I'm not going to be intimidated by barriers put up."

"I came back from the worlds with the idea that Carl (Lewis) was coming after me and that's a scary idea," said Powell to Jim Bainbridge (Oakland Tribune). "My goal has to be to keep improving. Today was a good indicator but I'm looking to really shock some minds with something Beamonesque, something like 31-5."

Andre Cason (Green Run High School, Virginia Beach, Virginia 1987) defeated Leroy Burrell (Peen Wood High School, Lansdowne, Pennsylvania 1985) in the 100 meters--9.88 to 9.96--with a 3.05 aiding wind.

"It did surprise me a lot," Cason said to Crumpacker. "This is only one race of many. I was quite surprised, wind-aided or not. Everybody is going to be ready at the (U.S. Olympic) Trials. I'm ready, but not 100 percent. There's still a lot of work to do."

"I felt like I had the ability to accelerate at any time," Cason said to Bainbridge. "I bowed my back a little bit at 70 meters but told myself to relax and got back up on my toes at 85 meters. I don't mean to boast, but I backed it off at 95. Why? Because the only races that matter to me this year are the Olympic Trials and the Olympics.

Really, I was surprised at the time. It's a good time, but it would have been faster with better technique. I got too caught up in the moment to really run a complete race, strong start to finish."

Dean Starkey (Logan High School, Union City 1984) set a new meet record in the pole vault of 19-4 3/4. The old meet record of 19-0 1/4 was set by Mike Tully in 1988 and tied by Scott Huffman in 1990.

"After the adrenaline from the 19-4 jump, I didn't have anything left," Starkey said to Bainbridge. "I was too tired to make a legitimate try at the American record. I was just glad to get over 19 feet because it had been so long since I'd done it (12 months) and I couldn't even do it in practice this week."

Tony Dees (Pascagoula High School, Mississippi) set a new meet record in the 110-meter high hurdles at 13.08 (wind +0.40 mps), the fastest time in the world this year. The old meet record of 13.14 was set by Rog-

er Kingdom, the 1984 Olympic champion, in 1985. Dees' personal best of 13.05 was set last year.

Gail Devers (Sweetwater High School, National City) won the 100-meter hurdles in 12.75 (wind +0.98), the fastest in the world this year. Her personal best is 12.48. Jackie Joyner-Kersee set the meet record of 12.70 in 1988.

Jud Logan (Hoover High School, North Canton, Ohio 1977), the American record-holder in the hammer throw at 268-8, defeated California assistant coach Ken Flax (Redwood High School, Larkspur 1981)--261-5 to 260-11. It was the first time in United States history that two American hammer throwers surpassed 260 feet in the same competition.

"It's not often in America that you throw 260 and don't win," Flax said to Bainbridge. "I just ran into Jud on a day when he had his best series ever."

"It was a good day for me," said Flax to Dan Reines (Daily Californian). "I had thoughts going in that I might not even compete because I have an injured leg (the lingering result of a car accident). To go from possible not competing to throwing to throwing almost 261 feet, well I'll take it."

Sheila Hudson (Rio Linda High School 1985) set a new meet record in the women's triple jump of 45-11 3/4. The old meet record of 45-3 was set by Hudson in 1988. She set

the American record of 46-0 3/4 at the NCAA in Durham on June 2, 1990. It was the second longest jump by an American of all-time.

Payton Jordan, the former Stanford coach who won the 100 meters for runners 70 and older, announced his retirement from competitive running. He set a agegroup world record of 13,48.

"It just feels like the right time to stop," Jordan said to Bainbridge. "I left Stanford after my 40th year and this is my 35th year of senior competition. It's a nice round number."

The USC-UCLA Meet didn't have the glamor of other years because of the off-year talent wise for both teams along with the postponement because of the riots. However, things went on last Saturday with fairly predictable results. The Bruin men were easy 123-39 winners, while the Women of Troy were easy 80-30 winners over the Lady Bruins. With Angela Burnham out for "medical reasons," this was the weakest female Bruin team on the track I have ever seen. There were two excellent marks established by the Trojans Quincy Watts 44.43 and UCLA's Dawn Dumble 56-6, both meet records.

At the Big West Meet, Fresno State bid its farewell to the Conference with championships in both the men and women's divisions by scores of 227-151 over UC Irvine and 171-127 over unpredictable UNLV.

Most of the High Schools were having their League finals.

The SoCal Community College Championships had no major surprises as Long Beach CC's men used their diverse team depth to outscore potent Riverside 177-137. On the distaff side, the ladies from Mt. SAC were comfortable 123-80 winners over a San Diego Mesa team which seems to get stronger every vear.

The SCIAC Championships produced some very unrealistic results with Claremont-Mudd destroying Pomona-Pitzer 249-106 in the men's division and P-P doing likewise 171-81 in the women's meet. The results were unrealistic because many of the top athletes from Oxy and Pomona-Pitzer opted for the Oxy Invitational held the same day. I can't understand the scheduling snafu, but I can speculate that the choice of meets was based on NCAA qualifying marks. The Olympic caliber oval at Oxy would produce much better times than the dirt track at Cal Tech which has weeds growing out of it.

The Cal State Northridge Invitational with some local teams prepping for their conference meets was the only other show in town.

△ May 18

The Riverside CC men demonstrated just how potent their front line strength was as

they scored 132 points (only 5 less than their SoCal total), coming from behind to defeat Long Beach CC 132-119. The women's meet was very tight with Mt. SAC holding on to score a 65-55 win over El Camino.

There were no real surprises in the men's division at the CCAA Championships where Cal Poly SLO was a comfortable 191-139 winner over Cal State L.A., however the Cal State L.A. women pulled off a major surprise as they edged perennial titlist Cal Poly SLO 202-197.

The preps were conducting their CIF preliminary meets with all contending teams advancing their top athletes. Marion Jones gave fans a preview of coming attractions with an 11.22-22.67 double. The latter being a national prep record.

△ May 25

There was some good news for SoCal track fans over the weekend in some major collegiate meets. At the PAC-10 Championships at Eugene, the UCLA men pulled a major upset by defeating runner-up and defending champion Oregon 123-103 with USC third at 80 points. The hero for the Bruins was sprinter Tony Miller who shocked the field with sprint times of 10.18 and 20.51 enroute to a sprint double. It appeared, with the nationals out of reach, the whole Bruin team peaked for this one. The women's competition saw the Trojans 3rd and Bruins 6th with 87 & 57 points respectively. Inger Miller lead the Women of Troy with a fine 11.09-22.43-44.39R sprint triple good for a 2nd and two firsts.

At the NAIA Championships held in Canada, Coach Terry Franson's men tracksters did it again -- 93-76 over Central St. (Ohio). As expected, the Ezinwa Brothers and the traditional A-P field event strength were the keys.

△ May 25

At the Southern Section CIF Championships held at Cerritos, all of the boys divisions turned out close with teams from Long Beach Wilson, Nogales, Momingside, and Harvard-Westlake taking home the gold. The girls division had dominating victories by Long Beach Poly, Thousand Oaks, Morningside and Pius X. There were no clear favorites

for the state meet to emerge from the boys teams, however, Morningside and Long Beach Poly appear to be strong contenders for the girls title with Thousand Oaks having an outside chance if they can score some relay points to go with Marion Jones cinch sprint double.

The L.A. City CIF Section had it's final qualifying with the Birmingham boys and the Dorsey girls looking like potential champs.

△ June 1

At the L.A. City CIF Championships it was no contest as the Birmingham Braves were easy 70-46 winners over Locke in the boy's section while the Dorsey girls were way out ahead of runner-up Gardena 74-37.

The Southern Section State Meet qualifying didn't make the state picture any clearer for the boys with a number of teams having point potential around 20. However the L.B. Poly Jackrabbit girls appear to be ahead of Momingside with Thousand Oaks close behind, as the top 3 contenders.

At the NCAA Division II Nationals Cal State L.A. had an excellent showing scoring 57 1/2 points in the men's competition good for 3rd and 65 points in the women's division which brought them 2nd place behind Alabama A&M which appeared to have the entire 3rd world sprint corps competing for them. The Golden Eagles' Brian Bridgewater was the star of the meet posting times of 10.15 and 20.15 in a sweep of the sprints.

The Occidental women's team lead by Michelle Dent had it best showing ever at the Division III Nationals with a 40 point total, only 7 points out of 2nd place.

₼ June 8

It was USC, not UCLA, which made the noise at this year's NCAA Championships. Coach Jim Bush's men's tracksters were 3rd with 41 points behind Arkansas' winning total of 60. Quincy Watts with a sizzling 44 flat in the 400 and Mark Crear at 1.349 brought home Gold for Troy. For UCLA, which appeared to have peaked for the PAC-10 Meet, Marty Beck with a microscopic 2nd in the 400 hurdles at 49.80 and Dave Bunevacz with a solid 2nd in the javelin at 242-11 lead the

Bruin charge it's somewhat unusual for a school like UCLA, which traditionally recruits freshmen, to have two Community College transfers at the top. Both Beck and Bunevacz served their apprenticeship at nearby Glendale College.

At the CIF/Reebok California State High School Championship, the boys from Bakersfield pulled out a wild 25-24 win over Momingside when the meet went down to the 1600 relay. Momingside needing a six point spread to win state, won the event, but Bakersfield was able to take 3rd and keep the spread at 4 points, thanks in part to a strong St. Mary's team dropping the stick.

In the girl's competition, the young ladies from Long Beach Poly simply outran their counterparts from Momingside in each head to head competition to win 39-28. Individually, Marion Jones stole the show again with a National Prep Record 11.14 in the 100m and

22.87 in the 200m, good for 2 train-length wins. The controversy here came about when Thousand Oaks Coach Art Green pulled the Lancers 1600 Relay team just before their qualifying heat. The given reason was that they wanted to save Marion and teammate Heather Hanger for upcoming big meets. However, speculators in the stands felt that Marion and personal coach Elliott Mason were unhappy that Marion's teammates had "allegedly" botched the hand-offs in the 400 relay so that the Lancers DQed for the finals. I have to side with the speculators on this one. In a meet which had the potential to be won with less than 30 points, combined with the fact that you have the surest 20 points in the stadium, Hanger and the 1600 team each had 4 point potentials. You don't throw in the towel unless you're angry at someone. Even if you didn't have the potential to win the meet, you must consider the other relay team

members. This may be their only chance to ever compete in a state meet which may well be the highest level of competition they will ever attain. The decision to scratch the team, in my opinion, goes beyond any question of points and personal agenda to one of school spirit and morality. I would be interested in hearing the opinions of any readers, in the form of a letter to the editor, on this issue.

Finally, in a sad decision, U.C. Irvine had indicated it will drop men's track for budget reasons. This is a major blow to the track program in SoCal as Coach Vince O'Boyle has consistently run a quality program which had been a source of numerous scholarships for SoCal Tracksters. The Classic duals between UCI & Fresno State will be long remembered. I can only hope that state funding will be somehow increased to allow the program to continue.

UCI Athletics Drops 3 Men's Sports

UC Irvine, impacted by the budget crisis in the state and the University of California system, announced that it will drop baseball, men's track and field, and men's cross country effective at the end of this academic year, June 30, 1992.

The cuts come in the face of a projected \$319,000 deficit in this year's athletics' budget and an anticipated minimum 10-percent reduction for all non-degree granting programs at UCI in 1992-93.

Due to the magnitude of the financial crisis with the state budget, the University system budget and the economy in general, we regrettably had to drop these three men's sports and make further significant cuts in administrative expenses and operating costs, UCI Athletic Director Tom Ford said.

"The major factors in our decision were the University mandate to balance the budget and the fact that we do not have adequate resources to fund the current level of sponsored sports," Ford added.

"The criteria used in cutting these sports were NCAA and Big West Conference requirements, the cost effectiveness of each sport and gender equity considerations," he said. "These cuts were extremely painful to me and the University. We did so with a great deal of reluctance."

Baseball has been in existence at UCI since 1970. The 23-year record of the program stands at 643 wins and 565 losses for a 532 winning percentage. UCI won NGAA Division II baseball titles in 1973 and 1974 before the University became Division I, July 1, 1977. The Anteaters' top Big West Conference finish was second in 1987.

Men's cross country began in the fall of 1971 and track and field in the spring of '72. UCI won NCAA Division II cross country team titles in 1975 and 1978. Since joining the Big West Conterence (formerly PCAA) in 1977, the Anteaters have captured the league championship nine times and finished as runner-up on five occasions.

In track and field, UCI won the NCAA Division II title in 1976 and placed second in 1977. The Anteaters have won two conference track championships and own nine runner-up finishes in Big West Competition.

Ford also announced that UCI will add women's crew, at a net cost of \$8,000 to the athletics budget, to meet the needs and interest of the student population. That addition will give UCI 14 NCAA sports (seven men, seven women) and three non-NCAA sports: men's crew, women's crew and coed sailing.

The 14 NGAA sports will be, on the men's side, basketball, golf, soccer, swimming, tennis, volleyball and water polo. UGI's women's sports offerings will be basketball, cross country, soccer, swimming, tennis, track and field and volleyball.

"This streamlining of the program exemplifies our commitment to remain in NCAA Division I," Ford said. "The remaining sports offerings provide for an equal number of male and female participants that gives us an opportunity to be successful with seven men's and seven women's NCAA sports. We are also working to make sure that we comply with the minimum financial-aid requirements that go into effect in 1994-95

to remain in the NCAA Division classification.

Chancellor Jack Peitason also noted that the reduction of sports could lead to a more competitive situation for UCI.

"it is very unfortunate that we have had to make this decision because of the budget crisis facing the University. We can only hope to make the situation as positive as possible. First, we will be in a position to provide more focused support for the teams that will continue to compete for UCI. We believe we can be a competitive Division I school in a number of sports, and today's actions gives these sports a greater potential for success. Second, UCI will achieve equity in the number of men's and women's teams fielded,* Peltason said.

"I am particularly appreciative of those boosters in the community who have supported the baseball and track programs, and we look forward to their continued association with UCI and UCI Athletics," Peltason added.

Ford revealed a new four-tiered sports model that UCI will implement in 1992-93: Tier I will include men's basketball, women's basketball, women's tennis, women's cross country, men's water polo and women's volleyball. Tier II will have men's golf, men's swimming, women's swimming, and women's tennis. Tier III will include men's soccer, women's soccer, men's volleyball and women's track and field. Tier IV will have men's crew, women's crew, and coed sailing.

Each tier will have various levels of department funding, ranging from the most in Tier I to the least in Tier IV.



1992 CIF / Reebok Galifornia High School State Meet

The always super-exciting California State Track Meet, this year's the Seventy-Fourth. A growd of 10,320 came to Saturday's Meet, with the scheduling of Finals' action a bit earlier than in the past seeming to work out fine. Southern Section Associate Commissioner Dean Crowley, Meet Manager Earl Engman, and staff deserve another hearty "thank you" from all participants, coaches, and those with an interest in the sport for another "job well-done." Marion Jones is always at her best for these meets, with some exciting team contests along the way, but you need to read on for that.

Qualifying for the Finals in this Meet on Friday is done with four heats in all running events except for the 1600 and 3200. The winner from each heat and the next five fastest times from all of the heats combined move on to the nine athlete finals. In the 1600 the first three from each of two heats and the next three fastest times beyond those places moved on to the Finals. The 3200 was a Saturday only, "one race," finals event. Nine athletes from field event qualifying are forwarded into Saturday's Finals.

Boys

100 Meters

This sprint event would be a great one. The state had a large group of talented athletes who seemed very close on paper. The Sac Joaquin section was particularly strong, with junior Anthony Volson (Merced) 10.47w-10.54 and soph Ali Evans (Vallejo) 10.59-10.43w, and 10.60w not get-

ting out of the Section Finals on to state. Riley Washington (Southwest, San Diego) was 4th in State in 1991, with a 10.55 from his '92 Section Finals. Amazing frosh duo from West Bakersfield, Marques Holliwell (10.62) and Bryan Howard (10.66), were for real, with Holliwell taking Volson and Washington in the Arcadia 100, with the duo all within .01 (and Washington sick the week of that meet). Shon Lewis (Wilcox, Santa Clara) was 10.64, Dione Tyler (Millikan, Long Beach) improving to 10.67 in his Section Finals, and Frank Madu (McAteer, San Francisco) 10.66 a tough veteran.

State Prelim action went pretty true to form, with soph Ali Evans winning heat 1 narrowly over Football star, Shon Lewis 10.61-10.63 (wind +1.44), with Sac Joaquin power continuing through the other heats. Anthony Volson took race 2 at 10.56 (+1.19 wind), with Brian Lewis winning Heat 4 at 10.59 (wind +1.32). Heat 3 was interesting, with Gentry Bradley, always thought of a much better 200m runner, racing down quick starting Riley Washington 10.51-10.55 (+1.66). Surprise of the Heats was Paul Turner (University City, San Diego), as his 10.64 brought him close to Lewis near the end of their race. Unfortunately, fine frosh Marques Holliwell (West Bakersfield) was the 10th time and non-finalist at 10.70, with a great Championship race assured with nine athletes with bests of between 10.51 and 10.69 in the Trials.

The Finals of the 100, as interestingly as these great match-ups sometimes go, was a total blow-out, with one very capable athlete putting it all together here and leaving a super group in his wake. The wind was +1.97 meters per second behind the athletes as they toed the line at 5:00 on Saturday evening. Soph Ali Evans was the

only one noticeably behind the group out of the blocks. At the twenty meter mark when athletes came to the upright position after their low acceleration from the blocks, Riley Washington was starting to already edge away from the field. With some varying rates of acceleration and deceleration among those in the event one expected someone to move on the flying San Diegan, but it just never happened. Washington pow-

ered into the tape a full two meters ahead of the fast-firfishing Gentry Bradley, with even those very conservative hand-timers in the stands amazed at the times their stopwatches read, with all sure that they had watched something very impressive with Washington's margin of victory. The results were simply the best 100 meters ever run in a State Finals event, with Washington not marginally lowering Henry Thomas's 10.44 from the 1984 one-day State Meet, but reducing it massively, to 10.30, among the top fifteen prep times ever run, and the equal number

two Californian prep clocking ever with Quincy Watts' 10.30 at altitude from 1987 and just behind Henry Thomas's all-time best of 10.25 from 1985. It is hoped that the University of Nebraska- bound footballer will have time for track in College. The pack behind Washington was quick, with Bradley (10.46), and the Sac-Joaquin underclass duo of Volson (10.50) and Evans (10.52) finishing next.

200 Meters

The longer dash event would be another strong one, with Gentry Bradley (Pius X, Downey) taking over the national lead for a time with a 21,19 in the Southern Section Divisional affair. Anthony Volson (Merced) was 21.18w in the Section Meet and 21.33 wind legal earlier. With Mt. Pleasant (San Jose) having dropped the baton in the 4x100 in Section action (after a 41.15 earlier in the year), defending State 400m champion Richard Dupree (46.72 there) would be dangerous here (21.32w-21.56). State 400 leader Derek Sheppard (46.68) was solid at 21.24w, with Ali Evans (Vallejo) around again at 21.48 (21.37w), and Shon Lewis (Wilcox, Santa Clara) 21.58. Better known earlier in his career as a Long Jumper, Scott Hammond (Lincoln, San Diego) had improved to 21.42 (21.31w), with fellow San Diegan Riley Washington (Southwest) 21.59 in winning that Section. There were a lot of fast people!

The fine sprinting of this weekend continued over 200 meters, but it was mixed in with a little tragedy. Anthony Volson continued to show the Sac Joaquin power, taking Heat 1 in 21.48 (wind +1.29), with Riley Washington, smarting from a Prelims 100 defeat by rival Gentry Bradley, blasting the entire event in Heat 2 to record the equal #4 clocking in the nation at 21.08. Richard Dupree (Mt. Pleasant, San Jose), who runs with a short, economical looking stride, appeared to be far from all-out in taking heat 3 at 21.33w (+2.29) after racing past early leader Brian Lewis off the turn. Heat 4 was where tragedy individually and team-wise struck. Soph Ali Evans could not hold in the blocks, and moved so obviously early off the line that the starters, who seemed very generous to athletes in marginal jump situations this weekend, really had no choice but to disqualify the young athlete favored to place high here and help the Vallejo team scoring. James Redd (Fontana) moved to a Heat 4 win Evans' absence in 21.50 (+1.74). Again, with everyone together and pushing all-out in the Finais the half-lap event would be another special one.

A surprisingly short time (only 30 minutes) after the 100 many of the same group lined up for what would be a great 200. After the 200 qualifying the night previous and his effort over 100 meters, all eyes were on Riley Washington in Lane 5, with his reaction to the gun interestingly the slowest in

the field. Gentry Bradley has always been a bit better at the 200 than the 100, with his efforts around the turn when he is all-out really a neat piece of work to watch. With 3.05 meters per second of wind behind the group, over the allowable for record purposes, the

A trio definitely emerged ahead of the pack during qualifying. James Redd (Fontana) accelerated past early Heat 1 leader, impressive junior Jimmie Johnson (Mission San Jose, Fremont), down the stretch in a 47.99 win. Richard Dupree raced as controlled a 47.68 as ever has been seen in taking Heat 2 over Edward Turner (Morningside, Inglewood) 48.00 in Heat 2, with Dupree's piston-like short and controlled stride seeming to put no limits on his eventual potential. Richard can be world-class if he sticks with the sport. With team and individual honor on the line in the Finals, Redd, Dupree and Shepard appeared capable of well under 47.0.

Interestingly, Richard Dupree was not present at the starting line for the 400 finals, with rumors of motel shenanigans Friday evening requiring Coach Steve Nelson to scratch his star from Saturday's meet. With the air kind of let out of the event, Derek Shepard took things out, and was the early leader through 100 meters. Jack Beloney, talented junior from Oak Grove in the Central Coast Section, really charged the backstretch, leading through the 200 meter point at 22.7. Shepard was a meter back there, but really went to work the third 100 meters around the south turn. Charging through the 300 at 34.6. at Arcadia, with Milton Hughes (Stagg, Stockton) SAT'ing that weekend, but coming back with a 1:51.06 at Mt. SAC the next weekend. Brian Wilkinson (Merced) had raced 4:11.17 to win the 1600 at Arcadia against all the State's best, and had a 1:51.19 800 best in trading wins all spring long with Hughes. Mike Katri (Fortuna), State Division IV Cross Country Champion, had dallied in the 1600 early in the season, but came back to the two lap event and was down to 1:51.22 in the North Coast. Each of the above runners offers interesting contrasts. Woodward is a large and very powerful runner. Bryan ran Cross Country this Fall, and had relayed as fast as 47.0 this spring, but his ace card was overall strength. Hughes is a tall, loping running who had run 47.08 in the Open 400m event, and seems to float weightless over the ground. Wilkinson is an average-sized junior with a great blend of speed and endurance, with great potential shown since his ninth grade year when he ran 1:57.5 for 800 meters. Katri offers a good blend of cross country runners endurance and above average speed. There was back-up to the above group with thirteen entered in the State Meet with bests of under 1:54.0! Event novices Adam Hemdon (Bishop O'Dowd, Oakland) 1:52.65 and John Lockard (Logan, Union City) had raced 1:53.03 behind North Coaster Katri, with Alfhonso Mitchell (Monterey) the event darkhorse off a 1:53.01 best and comfortable Central Coast wins.

The Merced crew took one look at the schedule with Wilkinson's 800-1600 double and wanted no part of it. We all remember Coley Candaele staggering in at the finish of the State Finals 800 a couple of years back after winning the 1600. All the above mentioned favored trio were heat winners on Friday. Woodward had to put out the least, with the Long Beach Poly star getting out in front and keeping it slow through a 56.4 opening 400 (1:26.0 600m), then holding the pack back over the final 150 meters during a 1:56.58 Heat 1 win. Woodward's slow pacing set up his win, but no one in that heat moved onto the Finals. Heat 2 had Mike Katri following very impressive Monterey junior Alfhonso Mitchell through a 54.7 400 before moving by down the backstretch and maintaining a five meter margin through the tape in a 1:53.70 win. Milton Hughes was his usual awesome self

in Heat 3, bounding out through 26.0-54.7-1:21.8 half lap splits, having a 20 meter lead through the 600, then seeming to jog in to his 1:52.85 heat winning time. Talented Duarte junior, Nathan Woods, battled with soph Vondre Armour (Bakersfield) through the 600 in Heat 4, with Woods winning at 1:53.33 and Adam Herndon (O'Dowd, Oakland) next at 1:53.95. It took 1:54.47 after Woodward's automatic winning 1:56 was taken out to make the nine person final. This one would be worthy of all of our attention in Saturday's finals.

The Finals in this event let no one down. It was a classic race. It was fast, but there was an element of tactics with so many good competitors involved. Bryan Woodward was the leader as the event cut for the pole after going around the first turn in lanes. Junior Nathan Woods adopted a familiar position off the Long Beach Poly star's shoulder as they came through the 200 at 25.3. Armour moved to third off Woods' shoulder as they

headed into the homestretch, with Milton Hughes running on the pole, comfortably loping behind the leading trio. The 400 went by at 53.0. As the race headed into the backstretch it was Mike Katri who made the first decisive move of the event, charging by and into the lead. No one seemed really ready to respond, with Hughes' position in the event at that point a negative factor. The Stockton star has never really had to run in one of these events where he had to deal with a talented pack, rather dominating local fields off a quick start or racing against local rival Brian

Wilkinson under uncrowded conditions. Hughes had no place to go down the backstretch. Past the 600 mark at 1:21.2 Katri had a couple meter lead. Just past that point Hughes motored around those ahead of him and went in chase. During a furious homestretch sprint Katri maintained a one meter margin into the tape, with the crosscountry star emerging victorious over the 47.0 400 meter runner Hughes, 1:49.56-1:49.64. Woodward was third at 1:50.22. We should hear from that first trio in a big way during their college careers. Rumors had Katri at Humboldt State or Oregon, Hughes at Arkansas, and Woodward at Georgetown, all great choices.

in the Southern Section State Qualifier, racing 60.0 for the final 400 in a

strong again, with T.J. Reyes (Lakewood) 4:10.29, last year's State runner-up Todd Tressler (San Marcos,

The 1600 meter heats were pretty tough, as advertised. Daniel Das Neves showed surprising staying power in Heat 1, maintaining the lead through 3:16.6 at the 1200 mark, then keeping ahead of sub-1:54 800m runners Brian Wilkinson, Todd Tressler, and Goss Lindsey during the final 150 meter sprint to win at 4:16.07. The mentioned foursome were the qualifiers out of the first Heat. TJ Reyes pushed heat two after a 66.5 opening 400, racing the second lap in 63.6, with Jeff Wilson taking over at 3:13.7 for the 1200. Jeff kept ahead of surprising Foothill (Bakersfeild) junior Terry Hickey, Reyes, Ryan Wilson, and Brian Keim to win that race at 4:15.92, with five qualifiers from that event. Great race coming up in the Fi-

Boy, there were a lot of great races in this Meet, with this one fulfilling most everyone's expectations. Interest seemed to center around how the tough distance runner, Das Neves, could hold up to the finishes of Wilkinson, Lindsey, and Tressler, all of whom were sub-1:54 800m runners, and Jeff Wilson, who had intensity to finish with anyone. The talented group started the event casually, with the pacing duties handed to Terry Hickey, with the pack 63.7 through the 400. Things continued to dwaddle during a 32.9 third 200 (4:23 1600m pace), with Jeff Wilson taking over the lead at the 800 at 2:08.9 (4th 200 32.3), and upping the ante. Wilson accelerated to 31.4 for the fifth half lap (1000 meters 2:40.3), with all but Brian Keim still part of the pack. Goss Lindsey took the lead down the homestretch as the group headed for the gun, with a big last lap assured. Goss was ahead through 3:11.7, with Das Neves closest. During a big last lap sprint the Brazilian edged ahead, and surprisingly accelerated once again better than anyone in the field over the final 150 meters, winning by ten meters over Lindsey at 4:09.54. Daniel was under 58.0 for the final 400, with a 2:00.0 last two laps! Hopefully the charge of Luis de Oliviera, famous a few years back for his guidance of Mary Decker and Joaquim Cruz, will grace a local college with his talents for the next four years. His two consecutive state meet wins in real pressure cooker situations show the class and preparation of the fine Helix star. Angel Martinez (San Gabriel) is the nation's most talented distance runner. He has not won them all, and has had some problems with eligibility, and if you talk to Coach Michelle Bucchichio a love for full-court basketball the day of track meets. Anyway, it seemed to be coming together near the end of his senior year, as he pulled away from a very good pack to win the Southern Section qualifier at 8:56.99 with a 4:24.8 final 1600 and 2:06 final 800. Daniel Das Neves (Helix, La Mesa) was 9:10.87 and 8:20.59 (3000m) during the season, with the 1600 heats on Friday and tough 1600 Final on Saturday prior to the race here Saturday evening. The Southern Section's Margarito Casillas (Hoover, Glendale) 9:05.79 and Fernando Mendoza (Channel Islands, Oxnard) 9:08.78 were the only other ones who seemed talented enough to stay with Angel for a while, with tall Cruz Gallegos (Centennial, Corona), strong in Cross Country, shocking with improvement late in the season that had him run 4:14.70 and 9:11.74 for the two distance events. Jorge Rivera (Delano) was 9;17.67 at the end of a Central Section double, with junior Nazario Romero (San Pasqual, Escondido) 9:15.51, and Jason Balkman (Lynbrook, San Jose) a future great off his 9:22,15 as a frosh athlete.

Angel Martinez was interested in a fast time here, but had never run the event yet this season with a fast first 1600. Fine Delano junior Jorge Rivera led the pack through the first lap in a quick 63.3, with Martinez taking the lead through the 800 at 2:12.2. Angel and tall Cruz Gallegos rolled through 3:18.4 and 4:25.1 lap posts, with the duo having a thirty meter lead over the pack at the end of four circuits. Rolling through laps of 69.1-70.0 and 70.9 Martinez finally shook Gallegos to lead by 40 meters at the gun. Showing real spirit while racing all by himself over the final lap, local distance fans had their last look at the special San Gabrielan, as he raced 61.4 for that last 400 and an 8:56.34 win. Angel ran 8:56 as a soph, and with a decision to concentrate on 1500-mile events for the rest of the summer, ending his

Chris Redmond (Vallejo), sixth in last year's State Meet, took over the state lead with a 37.44 Sac Joaquin win, with Demond Smith (Hawthorne), runner-up last year in this meet, 37.49 in Southern Section action. Greg Muniz (Woodbridge, Irvine) was 37.72 in Section action, with Keith Moton (Loyola, L.A.) 37.75, and soph Ken Haslip (Muir, Pasadena) the event's future with a smooth step pattern at 37.83. Rashid Gayle (Roseville) had a number of good races with a 37.94 from the Sac Joaquin Section.

Chris Redmond's patience was tried in Heat 1, where Marcus Stokes (Thacher, Oiai) went out very hard, and held on to qualify in second at 38.46, with the Vallejo favorite showing a steady and controlled step pattern that had him run 38.02 for the win. Demond Smith, coming on so very gradually during the entire outdoor season, looked so ready this weekend, with an impressive 37.97 Heat 2 win. Vallejo had the fastest Section Finals time (41.50), with surprising Bishop Amat (La Puente) 41.60 to take a good Southern Section group. Bakersfield has flat out gotten more out of its team members than perhaps any California prep team in history, racing their 41.61 Section Finals win without a sprinter who could consistently run under 11.0 for 100 meters on the flat. Foothill (Santa Ana) steadily improved to 3:15.10. Sac Joaquin teams were Vallejo 3:14.92 and Valley (Sacramento) 3:15.4. Dorsey (L.A.) was an easy L.A. City winner with the bodies to roll much faster than their 3:18.86 win there. The real key here may be Mt. Pleasant (San Jose) 3:18.32, with tremendously talented Richard Dupree (46.72 and defending State Open 400 meters) probably able to pull at least 10 meters on any anchor runner in the

The end of a State Prelims evening can be kind of interesting. Many teams and individuals who have been used to having their way in local action have had one or a few bad breaks along the way and by this time of night you can often throw the form sheets out the window. Vallejo closed with a big-time anchor of 47.3 in Heat 1 top place a qualifying second to Valencia (Placentia) 3:17.85-3:18.08. Foothill (Santa Ana) was 49.7-48.7 (Ethan Taub)-50.6 and 47.9 (Aaron Taub) in a 3:16.49 Heat 2 win, with Bakersfield next at 3:16.92 and 3:15.4 team Valley of Sacramento

way back. St. Mary's (Berkeley) threw out the big challenge in Heat 3, winning by 50 meters while blasting a 3:12.83 off of 47.8-48.5-48.3 and 48.3 splits. Defending State Champions Morningside looked solid in Heat 4, with Edward Turner racing 46.9 on leg 2 for the 3:16.65 winners.

One has so much fun at the State Championships, with the Meet rolling along fairly quickly. It is surprising to look up after what seems like no more than a dozen events total and it is all about to end with the 1600m relay. It seems too short, but this usually provides an exciting close to the meet and season. It had been crash and burn time for a few teams, as usual, with a surprising Bakersfield team, off Jeff Buckey's high weight placings and maybe something here, a possible winner. Remember, the Drillers had a 41.61 400m relay team not finish in their heat, so it had been by no means a perfect weekend for them either. Anyway, the fireworks started early here. Mike Kennedy of the L.A. Times and Track & Field News usually forgets his stopwatch, so we try to assign him easy tasks when it comes to relay splitting when he does show up ready to go. St. Mary's kind of seemed like a sure thing with little chance of Mr. Kennedy blowing the splits. A 48.3 opener and 49.4 second leg put St. Mary's out in front at the second exchange, but the heavily favored team shockingly dropped the baton at that point! Defending Champions, Morningside, off efforts of 49.6 from Levester Williams and 47.9 from Travion Harris took the lead at that point, with the St. Mary's third runner totalling 53.9 with the five seconds spent chasing the baton added on. Jesse Swayze was 50.6 on the third leg for Morningside, with Foothill (Santa Ana), off 50.8 legs from Nate Kuchera, 49.6 from Tad Heath, and 48.4 from Ethan Taub closing down. High Jump

The State had two 7-footers from the North, surprisingly consistent Todd Kelly 7-0 1/4, a junior at Big Valley (Beber), and Kevin Williams (Yuba City) 7-0. Camarillo sophomore pogostick Jeremy Fischer had jumped 6-11 1/2, with Brian Davidson (California, San Ramon) winning the Sunkist indoor way back in February at 6-11. Griffin Childers (Woodland) was 6-10 1/4, with Eli Gladden (San Lorenzo Valley, Felton) improving to 6-10 in the Central Coast Finals. Alarick Greenberry (Cabrillo, Lompoc) is consistent with a 6-10 best, with Lavelle Beloney (Del Mar, San Jose) 6-10 also. 1991 State placer, at fifth, Calvin Haynes (Corcoran-a transfer from Tulare Western) had a 6-9 1/2 best this year.

It took a fine 6-7 to make the field of ten finals, with 7- footer Kevin Williams (Yuba City) the only significant casualty, going only 6-2 in the qualifying competition. Ten were allowed into the Finals, under Section 4 Article 4 of the High School rules, which states that if there is a tie, which there was here on clearances, misses, and attempts between Eli Gladden and Jeff Nadeau at 6-7, and there is room available in the Finals competition, both should move on instead of being involved in a jump-off.

On Saturday everyone entered the competition at 6-4, with all over on their first attempt except for soph Jeremy Fischer, who cleared on his second attempt. Jeff Nadeau, Eli Gladden, Tony Carruthers, and Del Mitchell cleared 6-6 on their second trial, with Brian Davidson, never really having put it together outdoors after a 6-11 indoor effort at Sunkist, taking three attempts to get over that 6-6 barrier.

The rest of the field, Alarick Greenberry, Todd Kelly, Calvin Haynes, Griffin Childers, and Fischer, all cleared on their first trial. Girls

100 Meters

California had a very special group of lady dashers in 1992, headlined by "all-world" Marion Jones. As the season came to a close one had to give the junior at Thousand Oaks, Jones, at least a good chance at the Olympic team. Her prep races were typically over in the 100 meters in the first stride or two, as Marion displayed a new, lightining quick start this season. The 200 was fun until she ran out of people outside of her on the stagger, and, oh yeah, there were 4x400 legs where she often had five or six athletes spread out ahead of her to chase down. There had to be very little tension to her open prep sprint races. Can you imagine Marion actually thinking that she might have a close race at this level? This is not said to demean her competition, but to state a reality. Still, with this lack of nervous tension to her efforts Jones still managed to race a National Junior Record 200 meters, 22.67 (legal aiding wind +1.75 mps), in Sectional Prelim action on May 15th, with an 11.22w 100 there and 11.38 legal best going into the State Meet. One senses that there will be some better times when she gets into competition with those who challenge

her at the Open level.

There was a fine group of prep sprinters to go along with Marion. Long Beach Poly had the finest duo of frosh sprinters ever at one U.S. high school in Andrea Anderson (11.77) and Aminah Haddad (11.81), with the duo picking right up from the junior high level where Anderson was the nation's best at her age-level and Haddad was not far behind. Haddad ran the fastest 100 meters ever by an American thirteen year old this season, interestingly some two full tenths quicker than our star, Marion, did at the same age level. National Scholastic Indoor 55m fourth placer Lesa Parker (Bishop O'Dowd, Oakland) was 11.89 (11.86w) and a second at Arcadia against the above mentioned crew. Angela Sullivan (Serra, San Diego) showed great potential in 1991 and seemed to be rounding into shape late this year with a 12.04 best, with Tanisha Johns (Burbank, Sacramento) an 11.84w in her Section Finals Meet. Bisa Grant (Bishop O'Dowd, Oakland) was 12.03 (11.88w) with the Morningside duo of Sanoma Nickson (11.95w) and Tai-Ne Gibson (11.95) hoping to place and stir up the scoring in the Long Beach Poly-Bishop O'Dowd-Morningside contest. There were a lot of good people in this event!

They came to cook right off the bat in qualifying, with Jones blazing away from the field in Heat 1 after the second stride and blasting to a ten meter victory at 11.24 (+1.50 mps wind). To local fans Marion's efforts still amaze, with only two preps in U.S. history ever having run faster than Jones did today. Tai-Ne Gibson upped the Morningside team ante in Heat 2, blasting 11.78 with a strong final 70 meters with teammate Sanoma Nickson running 11.96 for second. Frosh Andrea Anderson (Poly, Long Beach) was frightening in Heat 3, spotting one of the nation's best, Lesa Parker (Bishop O'Dowd) a meter and a half at the start, then blowing by over the final 70 meters to win by that same margin at 11.71w (+3.30 mps). The other half of the Poly frosh team, Aminah Haddad rode a good breeze (+3.12 mps) in Heat 4 to an 11.79w three meter win that had last year's third placer, Angela Sullivan, not make the final at 12.06. It took 12.01 to be among the top nine who would run on Saturday, with the top group of preps that would be gathered this year anywhere in the nation toeing the line in Saturday's Finals.

Marion Jones is a classy, showy act, with the 10,000+ spectators gathered here each the year the largest crowd she has had to play to thus far in her career. Having set the current National Federation Record of 11.17 in this Meet last year, she did not let the fans down this year. Part of the difference in Marion this year is a rocket start that separates the powerful sixteen

year old from the rest of the field in the first five meters. Against a super group she was gone once again early, with continued acceleration that seemed as good as at any time this year to those who had seen her run more than a few times. The readings on hand-held stopwatches were in the outer- stratosphere, so all awaited the official clocking. Marion's six meter win officially clocked at out at 11.14, lowering her prep best by .03 and leaving the all-time prep best of 11.13 by Chandra Cheeseborough for the Olympic Trials. Interestingly, the old record came when Chandra was second at the 1976 Olympic Trials. Those in Marion's wake ran super. Thirteen year old Aminah Haddad lowered her National age-best to 11.73 in second, with teammate Andrea Anderson next at 11.79. Tai-Ne Gibson was fourth at 11.83, with Lesa Parker fifth at 11.89 in as deep a prep race as you will ever find.

200 Meters

Marion Jones can really stretch it out here, with the TO star always at her best before the big crowd that shows up for Saturday's State Finals. Anything is possible! Again, a solid crew backed Marion up. Lesa Parker (Bishop O'Dowd) was second at Arcadia, running 24.17, with the Long Beach Poly frosh duo of Aminah Haddad (24.04w-24.16) and Andrea Anderson (24.11) showing their class late in the season against good Southern Section competition. Morningside's Santishia Arnold (24.13w-24.49) and Tai-Ne Gibson (24.47) are talented veterans, fourth and fifth, respectively, in last year's Meet here, with the placings here involving O'Dowd, Poly, and Morningside again such an important part of the team struggle. Tanisha Johns (Burbank, Sacto) (24.45w-24.76), Texas transfer Maigha Strickland (Merced) (24.50w-24.75), and again, talented Angela Sullivan (Serra, San Diego) (24.56) provide great back-up to the talented front-runners.

In the 200 qualifying Marion Jones continued to juice things up during the weekend with a 22.71 (wind +1.72) in Heat #1 the second fastest prep run ever (behind her 22.67 National Record). Frosh Andrea Anderson was the Heat 2 winner at 24.36w (+2.09), with teammate Animah Haddad taking

Heat 3 at 24.10w (+2.36). In Heat 4, Lesa Parker edged by early leader Santishia Arnold 24.32-24.43 down the stretch with a legal +1.05 mps wind behind them. Almost everyone in the finals race was an important part of the team struggle. Tike Jackson (Bakersfield) ended up as the unfortunate tenth time, and a non-qualifier at a quick 24.821

The State Meet schedule is too tight. I wonder how many meets during the championship qualifying schedule include medal award presentation ceremonies over the public address system on the main field? Exactly thirty minutes after the 100, which included time for Marion Jones to sign her National Record forms and wait that event's turn on the victory stand, the six from the 100 finals who were also in the 200 had to go directly to the blocks for the start of that second event. There was no time for correct warm-down or re-warm up, a very dangerous situation with this group of athletes who are all Division I scholarship quality athletes. Marion Jones looked less snappy around the turn than she had in her recent 200's, possibly from the above described situation. Racing through the 100 meter starting line at 11.7 the Thousand Oaks junior cruised to an 11 meter triumph at 23.83. Aminah Haddad was second again, with her 23.97 interestingly faster than Marion had run at age 13, with a 24.05 best at the same age for the current star. Lesa Parker split up the Long Beach Poly frosh duo here, with a 24.08 for third, with Andrea Anderson fourth at 24.15.

Dring had her aches and pains during the season, with 56.34 open and 55.1 relay efforts in Section Finals action. But there were others. Arcadia's eleventh grader, Asha Jayasinghe, took up the event the last month of the season, and after steady improvement surprised Tammara McLin (Eisenhower, Rialto) 55.63-55.66 in the Southern Section 4A Finals. McLin returned the favor in the State Qualifier, racing 55.24. Jaronda White (Morningside, Inglewood) improved to 55.73 in Southern Section action, with frosh Sylvia Pieslak (Menlo- Atherton, Atherton) 55.99 continuing to improve after a fine age- group career. Malika Freeman was 56.03 for the much-improved Skyline of Oakland program, with Rene Walker (Dorsey, L.A.) 56.07, Latasha Gilliam (Pittsburg), who moved to North Carolina and then back, 56.08, and yet another O'Dowd athlete, Maya Greene 56.20.

The first Heat had a tough cast, with 1991 4th placer Tammera McLin moving strongly over the third 100 meters in edging past '91 runner up Allison Dring, with frosh Sylvia Pieslak also moving past last year's second placer near the end, with the trio recording 55.37-56.26-56.55 qualifying marks. Maya Greene took the second heat out hard, with Janice Nichols moving the second turn hard, then cruising in with an impressive 55.72 win, Soph Latasha Gilliam edged away from Asha Jayasinghe down the homestretch of the third prelim race to win 55.71-55.91. Rene Walker was the final Heat winner at 56.62 over Malika Freeman (56.76).

In the finals, last year's Champion, Janice Nichols, and runner-up, Allison Dring, were out quickest for the first 100. It was soph Latasha Gilliam who had the lead through the 200 at 25.8, with Nichols next at 25.9. Janice went to work on the south turn over the third 100 meters, coming into the straightaway with a two meter lead over Tammera McLin at 39.6. During a strong homestretch run Nichols charged strongly to a four meter win, 54.46-55.06 over the surprising Gilliam.

The nation's best would mix it up here. Nikki Shaw (Fillmore) was runner-up last year at 4:49.01 and had run 4:50.40 during Southern Section action, with Shelley Taylor (Edison, Huntington Beach) 4:51.98 in winning at Arcadia. Milena Glusac (Fallbrook) continued very special doubles in San Diego, with a 4:52.6 1600m best. Fine Agoura frosh Amy Skieresz was the other state athlete under 5:00 at 4:57.77 with 2:14.4 800m frosh Barbara Boisvert (Orange Lutheran) 4:35 for 1500 meters

The first of two heats in the Prelims was uneventful except for a serious fall involving Tiendres Towden of Skyline in Oakland and fine Aptos soph Lisa Couch some 300 meters into the race. Both courageously got up and finsihed the event. Marjorie Hsu (San Marino) ran down Amy Skierez in the homestretch of that first qualifier during a 71.0 final 400 to win 5:03.28-5:03.65. It was ruled by meet management that the interfered with Couch would be given a spot in the Finals event, something she might very have earned had she not fallen down. Nikki Shaw led four across the finish line within .08 in Heat 2 at 5:07.08, with Nika Horn (Santa Rosa), Shelley Taylor, and Barbara Boisvert filling the next spots. Milena Glusac gave up the 1600 to concentrate on the eight lap, 3200 meter, race.

The Finals would be an interesting two athlete race up front. Shelley had enough of the casual pace after two laps, picking up the tempo to 34.9 (4:39.2 pace) from the previous half lap's 38.4 (5:06.2 pace), then adding a 34.7 (69.6 third lap) to hold a twenty meter lead over frosh Barbara Boisvert, with Shaw another meter back, through the 1200 at 3:40.6. Shelly did not slow down a bit, racing 33.6 for the first 200 of the final lap, and finishing with 34.3 for a super 4:48.52 clocking. Shaw ended up at 4:53.40, with a bad arch said to hold her back in recent preparations. Amy Skieresz finished out a super frosh

3200 Meters

Milena Glusac (Fallbrook) was a big Arcadia winner in 10:31.05, with the no one really close on the watch or in person for most of the season. That all changed in the Southern Section State qualifier where Carrie Garritson (Sunny Hills, Fullerton) put together her best race ever, racing two 5:14 miles on the way to an unpressed 10:28.95 win over Maribella Aparicio (Fillmore) 10:39.94. Stacy Auer (Thousand Oaks) 10:52.86 was the next best statewide prior to this weekend.

Milena Glusac had dropped the 1600 meter event to concentrate on the 3200. Milena is capable of continuing strongly after a wicked start which takes its toll on the spirit and physical capabilities of her competition. In this event she charged out in 73.7 and 2:29.1, a tempo that no one, not even Garritson, would try to stay close to, with the North San Diego County star having a 20 meter lead after two laps. Maribella Aparicio, who had run 10:39.94 in the Southern Section Qualifier behind Garritson, bided her time in the pack through two laps, moving out during the third lap and catching Garritson during that circuit. Meanwhile, Glusac continued to fly up front, coming by the 1200 at 3:47.9 and 1600 at 5:08.3 with a forty meter lead over Maribella and Carrie. While Glusac continued to lead with laps after the 1600 of 81.5, 82.2, and 81.3, Aparicio edged closer to establishing some contact with our leader. Maribella moved to within fifteen meters with a lap and a half to go, with Glusac putting on a decided move at that point.

When rested for one event, as she was here and at Arcadia, Glusac was untested by this year's local distance crop, with the junior hopefully able to stretch conditioning into July at the TAC Junior Nationals where good competition will be assured.

100 Meter Low Hurdles

Kam Warner (West Bakersfield) recorded a mid-season 13.94, and

seemed rock-steady and consistent, with a number of clockings right or close to 14.00. She comfortably handled the best wherever she competed, and was the comfortable favorite here. Yvonne Scott (Johnson, Sacramento) steadily improved during the year to 13.91w in the Sac Joaquin Finals, with Tanya Lazar-Lea (Vallejo, school change from McAteer in San Francisco) 14.00w close behind. Erin Blunt (San Pasqual, Escondido), who tripped over the eighth hurdle in this meet last year while running at the front, had a 14.26 1992 best. Central Coast Section frosh star, Jennifer Odom (Independence, San Jose) 14.12 showed great potential. Elinor Tolson was fourth in 1992, with a 14.23 1992 best with steady Shonna Bernard (Nogales, La Puente) 14.29.

In Friday's qualifying action here, Kam Warner (Heat 1) moved strongly ahead of the pack, racing 13.99w (+2.28) with Elinor Tolson second at 14.32w. In Heat 2 13.91w Sac Joaquin star Yvonne Scott would meet a test from the Southerners, with Sanoma Nickson (Morningside) taking the lead at the start and Erin Blunt finishing strong (14.05-14.06 wind +1.24) to push Scott to third at 14.20. Tanva Lazar-Lea looked solid in Heat 3, attacking the hurdles in a 14.09 (+1.81) three meter heat win. In Heat 4, Jennifer Odom showed she had matured quickly over the last half of the season, coming on strong over the last half of the race to win in a fine 13.96w (+2.13) over veteran Twila Sims (13.98w).

The event really came together for the year in the Finals. With 1.51 meters per second of wind behind them for the 4:35 p.m. start of the event, Twila Sims was great out of the blocks. Tanya Lazar-Lea had as equally a bad start, with the rest of the field fairly even. Sims flew down the track, not to be headed in this race, with one looking for a big move from year-long event leader Kam Warner, but it just never came. Erin Blunt was best over the last couple of flights, moving to second, a meter behind Sims at the finish. The times were bests for almost everyone. Sims was 13.83, a legal drop of over two tenths, with Blunt 13.94, impressive frosh Odom 13.97, and Warner 13.98 in fourth.

300 Meter Low Hurdles

This would be a great event with seasonal best times sure to drop as the state's best came together here in June. Twila Sims, 41.71 two years ago as a soph and second to surprising Felice Lipscomb (Santa Monica) in that State Finals, suffered through a junior (1991) year of injury. Twila came back strong in 1992, winning easily over the state's best, and defending State Champion, Erin Blunt (San Pasqual, Escondido), at Arcadia in 42.86. Twila has developed the best prep girls reaction to hurdles in this event that this writer has ever seen, alternating or taking the hurdle with whatever foot comes up at the barrier with great ease. One sensed that Twila could run significantly faster than her seasonal best here. Erin Blunt is a heck of a competitor, a solid scorer on the nationally-ranked San Pasqual Cross Country teams, with the UCLA-bound senior not willing to easily give up her state title. Elinor Tolson (Fountain Valley) was third in 1991, with a 43.71 92 best, with Tanya Lazar-Lea (Vallejo) fifth in 91, 43,76 in 1992, sixth placer Julie Jenkins (San Ramon, Danville) 45.58 this year, and Shonna Bernard (Nogales, La Puente) 44.31 in 1992. Lavinia Henlon (Upland) was 43.44 this

year and a threat to place high.

In qualifying on Friday, Twila Sims raced to an unpressed fifteen meter Heat 1 win at 43.68. Tanva Lazar-Lea ran Elinor Tolson down on the homestretch in Heat 2 to win at 43.78, with Erin Blunt the same margin in her Heat 3 43.87 victory. Jessica Veale (Poway) took the step-hesitant Lavinia Henlon in Heat 4 45.70-45.99.

After the 100 meter hurdles, where many dropped their times significantly, some great times were looked for here. Twila Sims was quick here two years ago, with Erin Blunt the ability to run in the sub 42-second area. Sims ran another solid race on Saturday, leading the entire way. Her consistency is showed in her "step-downs," with 6.8-4.5-4.7-4.9-5.1-5.1-5.1-5.3-1.5 into the finish at 42.75. Just as in her loss to Sims at Arcadia earlier in the season. Erin Blunt closed down the final stretch, coming to within two meters at the finish in 42.96, with Tanya Lazar-Lea third at 43.95. Both Sims and Blunt are athletes in this event who are far from out of steam at the 300 meter point, with some solid 400 meter hurdling at the collegiate level seemingly assured. Finals:

400 Meter Relay

This event would have been a real doozie, but Long Beach Poly dropped the stick in the League Finals and one of the nation's better ever sprint squads did not have a chance to carry their season through to the state meet. At 11.73-11.77 and 12.06 for its first three 100 meter dashers the Jackrabbits were better than tough, with a time of under 45.50 before the season was over a definite possibility. Defending State Champion Morningside (Inglewood) had edged Poly at Mt. SAC 45.83-45.88 at Mt. SAC with the duo recording times among the top dozen ever run by prep teams. With Poly gone Morningside could play it safe all along the way and protect their team points. The Monarchs had the best time by over a second going into the State Meet. A Muir team depleted continually during the year with injuries was 47.03 going into the State affair, with Marion Jones screaming on the anchor of a 47.31 Thousand Oaks

Surprisingly in Heat 1 in the Prelims, a team projected as a Finals placer, Torrance, did not show. In the absence of the 47.95 team, Morningside cruised to the biggest winning margin in State Meet Prelim history, nearly twenty meters in their 46.80 win. Dorsey took Heat 2 at 48.46, with Marion Jones rocketing a 10.1 closing 100 meters with a flying start. It turned out that Thousand Oaks' 48.56 did not qualify for the Finals, and with a later "no-show" for the Lancer team in the 4x400 event meaning Marion could concentrate on the individual sprint events in Saturday's Finals. With Tike Jackson racing a strong backstretch leg and Janice Nichols finishing strong, Bakersfield edged Muir in Heat 3 47.93-48.06, with Morse (San Diego) having Monica Henderson fly the last leg in winning Heat 4 in 47.83.

The Morningside group could afford to play it conservative, with the veteran foursome of Felicia Williams, Sanoma Nickson, Tai-Ne Gibson, and Santishia Arnold deserving a great deal of credit for keeping a cool head the entire season, winning here by fifteen meters at 46.34 over Skyline (Oakland) 47.75 and Bakersfield 47.82.

Five California squads listed timewise among the top dozen in the country were not in the State Finals race for one reason or another.

1600 Meter Relay

Long Beach Poly was not done in this event like the 400, where their baton "boo-boo" had halted their season back at the League meet. Morningside (Inglewood) had traveled to the Texas Relays in early April and was narrowly defeated by Madison of Dallas 3:44.38-3:45.86. Morningside was doing it in 1992 without 400m star La-Shawn Stringer. With the Morningside crew beat up from the Texas Relays weekend and travel and all, Long Beach Poly had won at Arcadia in 3:49.52. The duo met at the Southern Section Qualifying Meet, with Poly frosh Andrea Anderson racing a 54.3 anchor to run Morningside down 3:47.42-3:47.68. Bishop O'Dowd, 3:49.92 at Arcadia, has a great group of athletes, with a 3:47.29 in the Section Finals that assured them a spot in the thick of the battle. Logan (Union City) 3:50.15 was second behind O'Dowd in the North Coast.

Some of the State's top girls teams are so deep that they can afford to interchange their team members and qualify for the State Finals with less than the number one squad they can put on the track. Long Beach Poly was second in Heat 1 here at 3:53.09 with some of the first string watching, with Allison Dring pulling Mt. Carmel into qualifying position (3:53.44) with a 54.8 anchor behind Muir's 3:53.00 in that same race. Bishop O'Dowd

seemed to beholding something in reserve in its 3:51.72 Heat 2 win. Erin Blunt (56.2) and Christina Stark (56.8) raced strong middle legs for the runner-up San Pasqual squad (3:53.07). James Logan was 3:53.58 to win Heat 3 off four consistent legs (between 57.6 and 59.0). Morningside took the final qualifying race at 3:50.31, with Jaronda White 56.6 on leg 2 and Santishia Arnold anchoring in 56.7.

The Finals here would be a great race, with Long Beach Poly and Morningside going at it once again, with a great group from Bishop O'Dowd along to make it interesting. Mava Green brought O'Dowd in with a lead at the exchange at 58.4, with Poly 58.5 from Aminah Haddad and Morningside back a bit off Tai-Ne Gibson's 59.2. Jaronda White moved Morningside into the lead with a quick 55.3 second leg, with Jo-Launa Gilford (Poly) 56.5 and Miesha Marzell (O'Dowod) 57.1. James Logan, the North Coast Section power, was right in the thick of the race, with four teams within ten meters at the last exchange. Felicia Williams gave Morningside a slight lead with a 56.7 third leg, with Channel Anderson 56.5 for Poly and Bisa Grant 56.7 for O'Dowd. Andrea Anderson (LB Poly) is one amazing frosh athlete, showing poise and confidence while measuring Morningside veteran Santishia Arnold for 300 meters of the anchor leg. As she had the week previous in the Section qualifier, the Poly frosh made her move as the race headed into the final stretch, edging up and by Arnold to break the tape a 3:45.91 winner during her 54.5 leg. Arnold was 55.1 (Morningside 3:46.30), with Aisha Sims 55.5 (O'Dowd 3:47.84), James Logan was fourth in 3:49.05 in a spectacular race. There are only a couple of teams in the entire nation with entire teams at the level of the first four squads in this race. Allison Dring was 56.1 on the anchor of fifth place Mt. Carmel's 3:53.57, with Erin Blunt 56.2 for San Pasqual's 3-54 31 sixth place cras

Jenkins was sixth here last year and was the only returning finalist. Danielle Boswell (Bullard, Fresno) had matured in her soph year, with a 5-11 best and a number of solid big-meet competitions. Amy Cheli (Los Altos) and Tanya Lazar-lea (Vallejo) had 5-9 bests, with Kristy Kierluff (Esperanza, Anaheim) the South's best at 5-8 1/2. Aisha Sims (Bishop O'Dowd, Oakland) was the obligatory event threat from her school with 5-8 at the North Coast.

Qualifying in the Girls High Jump was not too eventful, with 5-4 on one's first attempt necessary to move on to the ten girl final. 5-8 competitor Aisha Sims was unable to clear 5-4 on this date, but O'Dowd teammate Jamilla Churchill was a qualifier at 5-4 to continue the weekend in which there seemed the presence of the Oakland private school in almost every event.

The finals here would have a bit of a surprise twist. Through 5-4 in the event only Reishehea Candidate fell by the wayside, with Jamilia Churchill, Darci Morrison, Tracye Lawyer, and Tanya Lazar-Lea all tying for sixth after making 5-4 on their first attempt and going no higher. Kristy Kierulff and Julie Jenkins were over 5-6 on their first attempt, with Danielle Boswell over on her second jump. Erin Duffey was over 5-6 on her second attempt for fourth place, with Tina Bowman fifth when she cleared that height on her final trial. Now the real jumping would start. Interestingly, while Duffey and Bowman had their three trials at 5-7, Kierulff, Jenkins, and Boswell passed. At 5-8, the Esperanza frosh Kierulff and Bullard soph Boswell cleared on their first attempt, with Jenkins taking two trials to be successful. Jenkins required two efforts to make 5-9, with the daring other young duo passing that level. At 5-10 Kierulff continued her "amazing adventure," clearing on her first trial,

while Jenkins missed three times and Boswell got over on her third attempt. Kierulff ahead on misses, passed 5-11 while Boswell missed three times, with the Esperanza frosh attempting 6-0

Long Jump


In the post-Juliana Yendork era we came back to reality in distances in the horizontal jump events. Kam Warner (West Bakersfield) jumped a thennation leading 19-6 1/2 to handle all the state's best at Arcadia, with great all-arounder, Heather Sterlin

(Mission Viejo), 19-6 in mid-April. Sheena Ferguson (Washington, San Francisco) was best out of the Section meets at 19-2, with a 19-5 seasonal best Nicole Haynes (Bishop Montgomery, Torrance) was third in 1991 with an 18-3 1/2 92 best, with Jessica Renton (Downey, Modesto) 5th last year and 18-2 1/2w/18-1 this year. Another fine all-arounder, Cheaza Figueroa (Quartz Hill), was the Southern Section Meet winner at 18-9 3/4.

The wind assisted a number of athletes to very fine performances in Friday's qualifying. It took 18-2 3/4w to make the Finals. Christine Burton (Helix, La Mesa) got the show going with a wind-aided 18-9 1/4 in the first round of flight two, with a big 19-0 1/4w third effort in qualifying. She held the lead until Nicole Haynes rode a big 4.5 meter per second gust to a 19-3 1/ 4w qualifier during her flight. The final group of four really busted loose, with Heather Sterlin 19-9w on her only fair (and final) jump of the Prelims, with Cheaza Ferguson a big 19-4 1/2w mark, Kam Warner a 19-3 1/2w opener, and Sheena Ferguson two scratches and a 20-3 3/4w final effort to lead Friday's action. Strangely enough, there were only a total of four fair jumps out of the twelve taken by the talented last flight of four, usually an indicator that heavy winds are raising havoc with step patterns.

This turned out to be a heck of a competition! Sheena Ferguson had hurt herself in Friday's qualifying, and was only 15-5 1/4 and two fouls in Saturday's early jumping. Kam Warner led through the first round at 19-5 1/4 (+2.0), with Nicole Haynes improving to 19-6 1/2w (+3.5) during the second round, and Heather Sterlin throwing out a challenge to all with a big 19-8 1/2 (+1.5) during that series of jumps. Sterlin suffered a serious back injury two years back and had been about a year off of wearing a back brace for a number of months, with the talented all-around star a fine jumper, hurdler, and long sprinter. Warner and Haynes continued out over 19 feet, with Warner 19-5 1/4, 19-3 1/2w, 19-7 1/4, 19-7 3/4w, and 19-2 1/4w, with Haynes 19-2 3/4 and 19-5w on her fourth and fifth jumps. Warner put it all together on her final effort with 1.5 meters per second of wind behind her, a 20-6 1/4 national leader and nearly ten inch margin of victory in the competition. Finals:

American River College, Sacramento, May 9--Seven meet records were set in the 13th annual meet on a hot evening. It featured one of the strongest fields in recent memory including state leaders in six events and defending meet champions in 16.

Anthony Volson (Merced) defeated sophomore Ali Evans (Vallejo) in the 100 meters10.54 to 10.59, the two fastest times in the state this season. Volson's time is the third fastest in the nation. Riley Washington (Southwest, San Diego) was the previous leader at 10.62. It was a new meet record. The old record of 10.62 was set by Steve Jones (Burbank, Sacramento) in 1985. The wind was +1.97.

Volson also beat Evans in the 200 meters-21.33 to 21.48. The wind was 0.00. Volson takes over the state and national lead from Gentry Bradley (Pius X, Downey) at 21.46, and DeMarcus Lindsey (Murphy, Mobile, Alabama) at 21.37.

Volson won the outstanding track athlete award.

Milton Hughes (Stagg, Stockton) set a new meet record of 47.32 in the 400 meters. The old record of 48.14 was set by Willie Clark (Wheatland) in 1990. Clark now plays football

for Notre Dame.

Junior Brian Wilkinson (Merced) set a new meet record of 1:51.19 in the 800 meters. The old record of 1:52.0 was set by Nick Sparks (Bella Vista, Fair Oaks) in 1984. Milton Hughes, who ranks second in the state and third in the nation at 1:51.06, placed third in 1:54.72. Hughes had won the 400 meters just 25 minutes earlier.

Wilkinson, the state leader and second in the nation in the 1600 meters at 4:11.17, won in 4:20.9, but was disqualified for impeding David Monk of Fairfield. Wilkinson ran wide in lane one and Monk took advantage of the gap to move on the inside. Wilkinson tried to prevent Monk from going by on the inside. Wilkinson told me before the race that he was just planning a tactical race, since he wanted to save something for the 800 meters duel with Hughes.

Chris Redmond (Vallejo), the state leader in the 110 high hurdles at 14.1, did not run.

The Highlands (North Highlands) boys' 400 meter relay team defeated Vallejo--41.47 to 41.66. It was the second fastest time in the state this year. Mt. Pleasant (San Jose) leads at 41.15.

"This one isn't it," coach Mike Gipson (Highlands) said to Loftus. "Three weeks from now when we're down in Modesto (Sac-Joaquin Sectin) is when it counts."

Vallejo set a new meet record in the boys' 1600 meter relay of 3:15.2. The old record of 3:19.1 was set by Fairfield in 1989. Ali Evans anchored Vallejo in 47.0. Valley, with the state long jump leader Robert Purdue anchoring in 48.9, placed second in 3:15.4, and Burbank was third in 3:15.7. These were the first, second, and fourth fastest times in the state. St. Mary's (Berkeley) ran 3:15.6 on their unusual triangular-shaped track in a dual meet against Bishop O'Dowd (Oakland) on Thursday. They held the state lead for just over 24 hours.

"I know it's possible for me to do anything," Evans said to Jim Loftus (Sacramento Bee). "I had to go get him (Robert Purdue). My coach said if there's anyone out in front of you, go get him."

"I wasn't pumping enough on the comers," Purdue said to Mike Wise (Sacramento Union). "I heard him (Ali Evans) coming and I wanted to turn it over, but it was too late."

"We were hoping for 3:17, or 3:16, so, yes, this is nice," Valley coach Rod Hunt said to Mike Wise.

Griffin Childers (Woodland), who has the second best outdoor state high jump at 6-10

1/4, and Kevin Williams (Yuba City), the state high jump leader at 7-0, set a meet record of 6-10. The old meet record of 6-9 was set by Brett Miller (Fairfield) in 1989. Childers won on fewer misses and was named the meet's outstanding field athlete.

"It's (7-feet) still a barrier," Childers said to Mike Wise. "I felt like I could clear it today, though."

"I just wanted to jump high," said Childer to Gary Traynham (Woodland Democrat Sports Editor).

"I haven't been jumping very high of late," Childers said. "I wasn't going much over 6-6. I felt tonight I had a little power."

"It (presence of Williams) pushes us a lot," Childers said.

"Now he has the mental edge," Williams said to Traynham. "I'm so hungry I'm going to clear 7-6 to beat him."

"There's a frustration at seven feet," he said. "I've done it once, but I know I can do it again. Every time I want seven feet. If I don't get seven feet, I want to tear people apart."

Clarence Phelps (Christian Brothers, Sacramento) and Tye Harvey (Sonora) set a new meet record of 16-0 in the pole vault with the help of some new poles. The old record of 15-6 3/4 was set by P. J. Chadwick (Woodland) and Matt McCauley (Nevada Union, Grass Valley) in 1991. Phelps won the competition. The previous state leader was Corey Johnson (El Dorado, Placerville) at 15-9. He placed fourth at 14-6.

"I ordered (the new poles) for today," Phelps said to Löftus. "I thought it would be good enough. I got my 16 feet, but..."

"Almost," said Phelps to Mike Wise. "I almost cleared 16-6. I just am too strong and fast for these poles."

Robert Purdue (Valley, Sacramento), the state leader in the long jump at 24-3 3/4, fouled twice and scratched on his third attempt after bruising his heel in the 400 relay.

"It only hurts when I walk on it," Purdue said to Mike Wise. "I'll be all right for sections, though."

Yvonne Scott (Johnson, Sacramento) ran the 100 meter low hurdles in 14.37.

Suzy Powell (Downey, Modesto), the state discus leader at 157-3, threw the platter 147-10.

Track and Field and the Order of Things......

The year is 1993 and it's Friday night football at your local high school. The national anthem is played, and as everyone sits down the game begins in the 3rd quarter. "What's going on?" everyone asks. Confusion reigns for most of the game in the stands as the spectators wonder what happened. After the third quarter comes the first, then the second, then half-time, then the 4th quarter. During the school year other strange things continue to happen in all sports. The wrestling coach starts his matches at 150 lbs, goes up one weight, then down one, until all the individual matches are wrestled. In golf, the coach starts on the 12th hole and goes backward until the 18 holes are completed.

If these things sound strange, then maybe you can imagine the confusion that some of the spectators and athletes go through many times when they compete in dual meets. In the State of California, our sections have no common order of events for track meets. Different leagues may have different order of events within a section, and so athletes and spectators will often be confused as to what is happening during a dual meet. Maybe it is time for a common dual meet order of events within California and its various sections.

I raised this question at the State Track meeting of the CALIFORNIA COACHES ALLIANCE and received an overwhelming positive response. Just from talking with coaches, it seems that perhaps 75% of the leagues within California follow the state meet order of events. While some coaches may not like that order, it matches the NCAA order and would give the spectator, athlete, and coach a continuity throughout the year. A great many coaches feel that it would be a positive

move for the sport and the athletes. As a result of this feedback, the COACHES ALLI-ANCE would like to take a statewide survey on the order of events used in your leagues within your section. Please send as much information regarding the order of events in various leagues within your section to: Dennis McClanahan, 13014 Nightfall Terrace, San Diego, 92128 OR TO Doug Speck, 563 Willowgrove, Glendora, 91740. (We have provided the form for our questions below.) As the months go by, we will continue to publish the information that we receive. Hopefully we will get a good response from coaches.

Based on the initial feedback that we received, we would venture to say that about 75% of the leagues in the state run the state meet order. Maybe the sport would be helped if we were all running the same things. At the very least, it would provide a consistency throughout the state in our sport.

State Meet Results

Every high school in California will receive a free copy of the July 1992 issue of California Track News with the results of the CIF/Reebok State Track Meet. One of the areas that the CALIFORNIA TRACK AND CROSS COUNTRY COACHES ALLIANCE hopes to improve is the area of communication within the state. In the future, we hope to send out State Meet (track and cross country) issues statewide.

New Renewal Process for Yearly Dues

Starting with the 92-93 school year, we will be hooked into the billing database of CTN which will allow us to send you your yearly renewal form a month prior to expiration. Your renewal form and dues check will be sent to the ALLIANCE address in Fresno, rather than San Diego. This change will streamline the renewal process and help prevent long delays

in receiving your magazine. Additionally, when we receive your check, you will be receiving a postcard confirming your AL-LIANCE membership.

New School Membership Now Available

One of our changes for the 1992-1993 ALLIANCE year will be the availability of a school membership, as well as the individual membership. The cost of school membership is \$50 per year. All members of your cross country and track staff will belong the ALLIANCE and will be eligible for clinic discounts. In addition, California Track News will send 2 issues to your school: 1) head coach, and 2) assistant coach or library copy. 4-year suspension for hurdler Harris

New York, June 13--Danny Harris, the 1984 Olympic silver medalist in the 400-meter hurdles and the man who ended Edwin Moses' 122-meet winning streak in 1987, has agreed to accept a four-year suspension for cocaine use, his coach said Saturday.

Bob Kersee, who has been coaching Harris for about a year, said the 28-year-old hurdler from Torrance had decided to accept the ban rather than appeal the suspension.

Harris was scheduled to appear before a three-member hearing panel of The Athletics Congress, the national governing body for track and field, in Los Angeles, on Saturday.

Instead, Kersee said, Harris "would check himself into a drug substance program someplace in California," the site and date to be determined within the next week.

Kersee said Harris tested positive for cocaine after finishing third in the 500 meters at the U.S. Indoor Championships at Madison Square Garden in New York on Feb. 29.

The suspension means that Harris, who was ranked second in the world last year, will miss the Barcelona Olympics and the 1993 and 1995 World Championships.

Harris' problems were reported last month, but TAC would not confirm them. A TAC spokesman was not available for comment Saturday.

"I understand he has had a cocaine problem on and off since 1989," Kersee said.

Kersee said that Harris probably would undergo 30 to 60 days of "in-house treatment" in hopes of "finding out why he was caught up in this situation."

"He wants to concentrate on getting his life in order now," Kersee said. "And if all goes well, he will ask for (early) reinstatement. If he cleans up his act, maybe TAC will consider reinstating him."

Wind Gauges

Many of the big meet managers and section officials, sponsoring competitions up through State Qualifying affairs, are cheating

athletes with their failure to assign an official to read a wind gauge and record those marks on result sheets at Meets in the sprint, hurdle, long and triple jump events. The national list compilers in the sport, Californians Jack Shepard and Mike Kennedy of Track & Field News, who assist a myriad of others with their information, assign marks to the "windaided" category from meets where there is no such official device used until specific information can be gathered. Many official organizations, community or four year colleges, have wind gauges that could be borrowed for big invitational or section qualifying and finals meets. While no one will argue with the great amount of work that goes into putting a big track meet on, the recording of this information could be the difference in whether a local athlete is given a Division I scholarship in the sport, a \$50,000-100,000 education based upon their athletic ability. I assure you that no athlete will be given such a scholarship by a College Coach on information that is not very closely reviewed, including the wind readings in affected events. A good example of responsible officiating was in this year's State Meet, where Eugene Dreher (Antelope Valley, Lancaster), the leader in Friday's prelims, had his leading effort the only non-wind aided jump out of twelve taken by athletes in his flight of four jumpers in qualifying. His 23-10 1/2 wind-legal, with a reading of 2.00 meters per second or lower, was among the top twenty jumps in the entire nation by a highschooler this year, certainly bringing this fine athlete to the attention of coaches across the nation. With no wind gauge present the gusty Friday evening conditions at Cerritos would have relegated Dreher's effort as just another on a long list of jumps that were considered "wind-aided," with a yearly prep list only carrying very few of such marks illegal for record purposes.

■ Golden West Invitational/ National Scholastic Outdoor Championships

Are you aware that there are two meets the same day in California, an hour plane ride apart, that are trying to attract the best athletes from across the nation the week after the California State Meet? The Golden West Invitational in Sacramento, celebrated its thirty-third annual meet on June 13th at American River College with another fine competition involving the nation's best twelfth grade athletes. That same weekend, Friday, June

12th and Saturday June 13th, the National Scholastic Outdoor Championships, under the direction of the Birmingham High School (Van Nuys) Dad's Club, attempted a national prep championship open to all grades in the Los Angeles area. (Story and results of both events will be included in the August issue.) The number of weekends available to postseason championship meets is limited, with the California State Meet typically the first weekend in June, the Golden West/National Scholastic the second weekend, Keebler Prep International Invitational the third weekend, and TAC/USA Junior Nationals the last weekend in June. Both Meets in California, north and south, were successes. Each Meet has some real exciting sidelights, with the Golden West featuring a San Francisco Bay area excursion for the athletes, and the National Scholastic Meet headquartered in the Sheraton Universal Hotel, right next to Universal Studios, with that spectacular attraction a natural tie-in for participants.

Athletes obviously have to make a choice as to which competition to attend, with twelfth graders obviously in an interesting "tug of war." It would seem to be a good thing for the sport if the Meet Directors of these two affairs could get their heads together and cooperate over the participation of the athletes. No track meet is sitting on an extravagant amount of money, and it would seem that any cooperation involving participants would be great for all concerned. The Saturday Golden West affair, featuring its end of week Bay area trip for participants, could be followed by a trip south for late Sunday participation in the National Scholastic Meet. A day stayover in the Los Angeles area could feature a Universal Studios tour, with it rating as one of the nation's top attractions for people of any

The Central Section came together for its Section Meet this year at the Southern Site at Bakersfield College. As always, it was an

Interesting affair with a number of fine performances. The spectacular young sprinters at West Bakersfield HS, Marques Hollewell and Bryan Howard, starred again, with the same schools Kam Warner and the powerful crew from Bakersfield HS all Amazing frosh male over the place. sprinters, Marques Hollewell and Bryan Howard of West Bakersfield, had raced 10.62 and 10.63 legal 100 meter events the previous weekend. Here they were on the last two spots of a West Bakersfield 4x100 relay team that used visual passes during a 41.71 runner up effort to the winning Bakersfield HS team, whose 41.61 is as close to maximum potential as any California prep team ever, with the Drillers featuring silk smooth passing on a squad that does not feature a truly outstanding sprinter. Hollewell showed up for the 100 with a taped thigh, giving teammate Howard 2 meters through the first 40 before charging to a 10.70-10.72 win (wind +.25 mps). This is as fine a duo of ninth grade sprinters as have ever been at a California High School, with Hollewell the first ninth grader to win a Central Section sprint title since the famed Leamon King of Delano in the early 1950's.

Kam Warner is the Girls' side of the West Bakersfield act this spring, with the senior all over the track and the field. In the 100 Meter Lows she won by 10 meters in 13.99 and then stepping over to the Long Jump where she won there at 18-10.

Bakersfield is a tough act to follow. The white and blue clad Drillers are all over the place, with a ton of fine athletes. The school's Dial Corporation National Prep Athlete of the Year, Jeff Buckey took the Shot Put (60-9) and Discus (201-7). The Girls dash events up through the 400 are covered by Arizona-State bound stars, Tike Jackson and Janice Nichols, for Bakersfield. Nichols showed up with a taped thigh from a knot in her hamstring this day. In the 4x100 the Drillers won easily at 48.03, with Tike Jackson covering the 100 in 12.23. Nichols looked tentative in the 400, racing 56.79, with the duo meeting over 200, Nichols winning 24.56-24.86 over her teammate. Soph easily Vondre took the 800 in 1:53.68, then starred in the 4x400 in a strange way. After 49.2 and 51.0 opening legs that put the Bakersfield team into the lead, the third exchange to anchor runner Armour was dropped. Charging back into the lead by the 200 mark, Vondre's 50.9 anchor on the 3:20.55 winner would have been about two and a half seconds faster without the bobble. Soph Triple Jumper Ebony Henderson added a triple jump win at 38-11 3/4.

Lisa Stephaney (Hoover, Fresno) peaked superbly in the weights, putting out to 44-6 and throwing the discus 143-6. Kristie Johnson (Central, Fresno), a top agegrouper in the past, emerged on the prep level here, racing a totally solo 2:13.53 800m win. Danielle Boswell (Bullard, Fresno) took the High Jump in 5-8. State Triple Jump leader (40-4), Kayla Montgomery (Clovis West, Fresno) had an interesting evening in which she showed special charac-

ter, falling in the 100 Hurdles and appearing to seriously pull a thigh muscle. Later she returned to limp to a qualifying spot in the Triple Jump, with two weeks to rest for the State affair.

Jorge Rivera (Delano), who raced 4:18.5 in the area meet for 1600 meters, set up the finals run with 60.2-2:06.3 and 3:13.3 lap splits, then was passed by the three state qualifiers, with Polo Duarte (Madera) 4:15.77 nipping Foothill (Bakersfield) junior Terry Hickey (4:15.89). Over 3200 meters

Rivera was determined to get to Cerritos and the State Meet, charging through the 1600 at 4:38.5, then pulling away from Ricardo Brewer (North Bakersfield) over the final lap in a 9:17.67 win.

In the Girls 1600 meter Sarah Dawson (Hoover, Fresno) ran down North Bakersfield's Lori Miller in the last half lap in a Meet Record 5:03.72-5:03.85 win. Hanford junior Jon Giannola exhibited a very disciplined step pattern in the 300 Inermediates, coming back from 5 meters at the 150 meter point to win at 38.74. State Qualifying Meet Friday, May 29th - Cerritos College

The huge Southern Section had a series of exciting qualifying competitions for the State Meet, with the usual number of great athletes left at home after the first five athletes were skimmed off to send to the June state affair. Anytime Marion Jones (1000 Oaks) steps on the track it's exciting, with a number of other great competitors and match-ups during the meets.

Marion Jones really cranked it up in the Section 3A Prelims on Saturday, May 15th on the new facility at Trabuco Hills H.S. in Mission Viejo, blasting a new National Record 22.67 200m with a legal aiding wind of +1.75 meters per second. That day she also raced 11.22w for the 100. Eyes were therefore glued to the powerful TO athlete whenever she raced. In the divisional meet she blasted 11.38 (wind +2.00) and 22.70 (-1.38), with an 11.39 (wind -1.59) and 22.78 (+0.94) in the State Qualifying affair. She was every bit as impressive in the Relays, charging from way back to second in the State qualifier 400m event, with her blazing anchor assisting her team to a fine 47.31. with mid 54 second legs doing the same thing during her third leg of the 1600m, as the Lancers qualified at 3:54.33 for State.

The area has many great female sprinters, with the Long Beach Poly frosh sprint duo of Andrea Anderson (11.86-24.11) and Aminah Haddad (11.98-24.16) tough, with Anderson surprisingly running down the Morningside anchor in the 1600m relay event in the State Qualifier during a 54.3 leg with the Jackrabbits racing 3:47.42. On the Boys' side, sprinter Gentry Bradley (Plus X, Downey) was the star, with good middle and long distance racing. Bradley was second to Dione Tyler (Millikan, Long Beach) in the State Qualifying 100 10.67-10.70, but cranked a 21.19 200 in the previous week's divisional affair for the national lead. Girls distance events were strong also, with Nikki Shaw (Fillmore) racing 4:50.40 against teammate Maribella Aparicio in her Divisional 1A Race, then taking Shelley Taylor in the State Qualifier at 4:55.67. Carrie Garritson (Sunny Hills, Fullerton) raced her finest high school race ever in the State Qualifier 3200, running 5:14.0 and 5:14.2 1600m segments to win easily over Aparicio 10:28.20-10:39.94.
