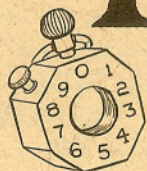

He won, caught the eye of Herb McKenley, and although he stayed out of school and worked on his dad's banana farm the next year he put in a lot of serious training. The rest is becoming history... Cal's 3:19.6 mile relay team has a scholarship average of 3,366 on the 4.0 scale. Stu Gould is Phi Beta Kappa (4,000), Jerry Siebert is expected to be (3,629), Jack Yerman had 3,187 and Bob Karlsrud 2,647... Stanford's Ernie Gunliffe took 51 units in the last three quarters, had nine units of B, the rest A... an early USA-USSR dope sheet gives it 125 to 111... Don Stewart, two time NCAA high jump champ from SMU, is a fine footballer. He played none in 1957, was injured and got in only one game in 1958, yet was drafted 10th by the world champ Baltimore Colts. Don is a pass receiver and punter (once got off a 95 yarder)...

The CCC (Central Collegiate Conference) track meet was formed in 1926 because the Big 10 had just closed its doors to all outside competitors in its annual meet. Knute Rockne of Notre Dame, Con Jennings of Marquette, and Ralph Young of Michigan state were the founding fathers, meeting over a few beers on the outskirts of Milwaukee during the height of the prohibition era. Held at Marquette, with three exceptions, the meet got its biggest initial boost from the presence of Marquette sprint ace Ralph Metcalfe... BYU distance runner Matti Raty of Finland pronounces it Mah-tay Rah-too... of 76 javelin throwers over 74 meters (242'10"), 18 are Finns, 13 Americans, 12 Russians, 8 Germans, 6 Poles, 5 Swedens, and three Hungarians...

Bobby Morrow is as busy at church services and banquets as he is on the track. Here is a typical schedule. On May 9 he ran in the Fresno relays and the next day preached for a Fresno church and in the evening spoke before youth rally. On May 16 he spoke at a Pepperdine College high school career day in Los Angeles (the day after the Coliseum Relays). That night he attended an Abilene Christian alumni dinner in his honor. On May 17 he preached before a Los Angeles Church of Christ in the morning and a Burbank church in the evening. May 18 it was a Hobbs, N.M., all-sports banquet; May 22 a high school commencement address at Clyde, Tex., and May 26, more of the same at Aspermont, Tex...

Jim Graham joins Jerry Welbourn as the second veteranarian to clear 15 feet... Glenn Cunningham has a few Kangaroos on his ranch... Wes Santee started the Kansas Relays invitational mile but gave such a quick gun that a few were left standing... the 1958 Penn Relays chief timers jotted down 3606 separate times... in the 1920s it was customary to run the 440 hurdles without lanes... Alex Henderson, out all during May with pneumonia, collapsed after the Compton mile, is still hospitalized in Phoenix undergoing a checkup... before the Mt. San Antonio Relays sprinter Kent Herkenrath of San Jose stepped in a hole, sprained an ankle, was carried to the dressing room, received an ultra sonic treatment, had the leg taped, and ran well... Rafer Johnson came up with a sore back in the June 13 meet, may miss the national decathlon... on April 23, Bob Richards and Phil Mulkey put on a two man track meet at Memphis: HJ, Mulkey 6'2", Richards 5'8"; PV, Richards 14'8", Mulkey 13'8"; BJ, Mulkey 22'7", Richards 20'8"; Shot, Mulkey 56'6", Richards 52' (12 lb.); DT, Mulkey and Richards 135'5"; javelin, Richards 170", Mulkey did not throw... nine year old Jim Owen of St. Dominic School for Boys in Memphis has done 4'9½" in the high jump, 7'7" in the standing broad jump, 15'1" in the running long jump, and 31'3" in the HSJ...

John Lawlor's first 208'8½" was on sloping ground but he got a legitimate collegiate record with the same distance in the IC4A... when asked to say a few words at the NEAAU meet Lawlor turned red, refused the mike, and inched away... U. of Conn. coach Lloyd Duff has foam rubber scraps in his high jump pit and competitors are delighted with their bouncy, injury free landings... the 440 at the New England intercollegiates was run around two turns with two poles, the second pole being in mid-track and staggered accordingly. The two fastest qualifiers won the pole positions. Two separate scrambles took place until after the first turn when all were allowed to cut for the inside pole...

Kansas hurdler Bill Tillman has a bad left arm, a half-inch short and roughly half the thickness of his right. He broke it in high school football, had it re-set four times and in a cast 11 months. "It used to bother me a lot on the starts but now the only thing that bothers me is a long gun. If I am held in there very long the arm will quiver and make me want to jump out. I can't get hard arm action over the first hurdle like you need, either." Speaking of the Penn Relays, Ron Delany said: "The individual events never meant half so much to me as competing in those relays. There's one thing about the Villanova team. There are no stars. If anybody thinks he is Jumbo knocks the idea out of him right away."

13. OTTO GRIGALKABest Performance: 56'5 $\frac{1}{4}$ "

Achievement Points: 47

Since 1950 Otto Grigalka of the USSR has been the most consistent of the Russian shot putters and in fact was only overshadowed by Skobla among leading Europeans. Though the past 10 years has been a lean period for European putters Grigalka's long standing consistency gives him 47 achievement points here. In 1950 and 1954 he placed in the first three in the European Games and in 1952 was the leading European in the Olympic Games, gaining fourth spot. Though now giving way to the younger rising stars the 33 year old veteran can still regularly surpass 50'.

14. WILBUR THOMPSON

Best Performance: 56'2"

Achievement Points: 46

Wilbur "Moose" Thompson won the first Olympic shot put gold medal after the war. At the age of 27 the ex staff-sergeant reached 56'2" for a personal best and Olympic record. This was Thompson's greatest moment in every way because he never won another major competition, placing only 3rd in the AAU finals of 1948 and 1949. After 1948 Moose never reached the heights again though in a brief come-back in 1952 he did place 5th in the Olympic trials. Some may say that Thompson was lucky to win at Wembley because of Fonville's injury but on the day he was the best and that in the long run is what counts most. Having spent his best years in the service of Uncle Sam no more fitting reward could come to Thompson than his Olympic title.

15. DAVE OWENBest Performance: 59'5 $\frac{3}{4}$ "

Achievement Points: 45

Dave Owen of Michigan worked hard to reach the top rank in his collegiate career. He reached 57' $\frac{1}{4}$ " in 1956 and placed third in the NCAA. The following year saw his promise fulfilled when he won the NCAA, placed second in the AAU and had a personal best of 59'5 $\frac{3}{4}$ ". Sixty feet looked a mere formality for this big, fast putter but he did not compete at all through 1958. Owen can be said to have had only two years of real competition and thus it is not easy to rank him among all-time greats but these days even 59' is fast becoming routine among world-class performers and Owens has only reached this target twice.

16. BERNIE MAYERBest Performance: 56'7 $\frac{3}{4}$ "

Achievement Points: 44

Bernie Mayer, a New York teacher, ranked among the best in the years immediately following World War II. Not being a collegiate athlete in these years, Mayer was unable to give enough time to training and so improvement was a slow process. Honors came his way in the form of championship wins not at all, but he did gain second place in the AAU in 1948 and 1953 and third spot in 1952. This record shows the span of Mayer's career, ending in 1955, the highlight of which was in the Olympic trials of 1952 when he hit 56'7 $\frac{3}{4}$ " for the best put of his life only to lose to Jim Fuchs by 4". A trip to Helsinki would have been a fitting reward for his many years of endeavors but the great thing was that Mayer should come so close when written off as a veteran.

Arthur Rowe, the Yorkshire blacksmith, has in a short space of time reached the top of the European list and looks to be the necessary replacement for the veteran Skobla. Eleven times over 57' in 1958, Rowe has also the ability to pull out the big throw when it is most needed as demonstrated by his victories in the Empire and European Championships. All Art's points have been scored in one season and at the age of 21 he is one to watch for the future. The one drawback for the Englishman is that he may not receive the necessary hard competition at home to nourish the definite potential into accomplished fact.

18. (tie) DON VICKBest Performance: 58'8 $\frac{1}{2}$ "

Achievement Points: 41

A world-record breaker at high school, Don Vick promised at one time to be a threat to the best. He first beat 57' in 1955 but has shown little improvement since. Don has a best mark of 58'8 $\frac{1}{2}$ " set in 1957 but 60' has eluded him to date and he has not competed throughout 1958. The nearest Don has come to honors was 3rd in the 1955 NCAA and 3rd in the 1957 AAU. Vick also missed the boat to Melbourne by a mere 10" or so. Don, then, has never quite made the grade in the tough American school where the pressure is on in every top competition. Better performances in the meets that matter would have given Vick a much higher rating together with consistent putting over 57'.
