Jones Dashes 9.5, 21.0 Into Headwinds

Stanford, Calif., May 20-21--UCLA looked more and more a NCAA winner as it powered to a runaway win in the Pacific Athletic Conference (AAWU). The Bruins exhibited quantity as well as quality as they won half the 18 events and scored in all but two in the nation's toughest conference. When it was all over UCLA had racked up 80 points to 44 for Southern California and 37 for Oregon, the NCAA co-champs.

Gerry Lindgren accounted for the top performance of the day as he led from start to finish three-miles in 13:12.8. He said the wind, which was against the sprinters and high hurdlers, bothered him and he didn't feel as good as he did last week when he clipped off 12:53.0 in worse conditions. In second with a fine 13:20.6 was Geoff Pyne of UCLA, the highly promising New Zealander who is just now beginning to show the class he had Down Under. Third in 13:26.2 was Ken Moore of Oregon, who on Friday indicated he was the country's best collegiate steeplechaser by covering the 3000-meters in 8:49.4 despite faulty water jump technique and one fall.

Three others became NCAA steeplechase contenders. Bruce Mortenson of Oregon, the defending champion, finished strong to grab second in 8:59.8, beating a surprising Clyde Hunt of Oregon State, whose best two-mile time was 9:17.8, and a tiring Bob Price of Cal.

UCLA picked up 38 of its points in the sprints, winning both relays, finishing in the first three places in the 220, and one-three in the 100 and 440. Tom Jones, supposedly the number two sprinter, behind injured Norm Jackson, won the 100 in 9.5 against a 4 5 mph wind, the 220 in 21.0 against 8 mph, led off the 440 relay, and contributed a 46.9 leg in the mile event. Bob Frey ran his best 440, 46.4, was third in the 220, and helped the 440 baton team.

A key UCLA winner was Roger Johnson, who started the season slowly. He knocked nine-tenths off his week-old seasonal best to capture the intermediates in 51.0. Other Bruin winners were Marc Savage in the pole vault at 16'1", Dick Selby with 240'4" in the javelin, and Doug Olmstead, 49'4½" in the triple jump. The winners failed to place only in the mile, where Bob Day's sore heel tendon wasn't risked, and the long jump, their one really weak event.

Southern California wouldn't have pressed UCLA even with healthy performances from Dwight Middleton, Bill Fosdick and Mahoney Samuels. But the Trojans did get four solid wins. The once erratic Dennis Carr looked good again as he moved through a hot 51.4 quarter to win the half in 1:47.8, a personal best by a tenth. Dave Buck followed him home in 1:48.9, with UCLA's Dennis Breckow right behind in an improved performance. A strong last lap won the mile for Bruce Bess, his 4:02.4 being a second ahead of Oregon's Wade Bell, who shocked when he failed to qualify in the half, his best event. Off fast in the highs, Earl McCullough hung on to defeat big, charging Ron Copeland as both ran 14.0 against a 10 mph breeze. And Gary Carlsen came from behind to defeat Bob Stoecker in the discus, 184'8½" to 183'5".

Other winners were Neal "Super Duck" Steinhauer of Oregon in the shot (63'8½"), steady Bob Keppel of Washington State with 6'9" in the high jump, and little Tony Albin of Oregon State in the long jump (24'7½").

Bianco Moves to 6th Best Ever: 64'7 1-2"

Provo, Utah, May 20-21--BYU senior shot putter Mike Bianco, who didn't hit 60-feet this season until the last weekend in April, improved his life-time best of 62'8" set last week by almost two feet with a healthy put of 64'7½" to highlight action at the Western Athletic Conference finals at the site of next year's NCAA championships meet--before a significant gathering of 13,000 spectators. Bianco moves into sixth on both the all-time world and American lists, behind Randy Matson, Dallas Long, Neal Steinhauer, Bill Nieder and Gary Gubner.

New Mexico came on strong at the conclusion of the meet to overtake Brigham Young, which had led most of the meet, 83 to 75. Trailing were Arizona State 38, Arizona 36, Utah 13 and Wyoming 10.

Much of BYU's strength came surprisingly in the sprints, where the school outscored New Mexico. BYU's Dave Reeves upset New Mexico's Rene Matison (third in 9.6 behind Wyoming's Jerry Saffell) in a 9.6 100, but Rene turned in the tables with a tenth of a second win in the 220, in 21.1. BYU won the 440 relay in 40.7.

New Mexico's Clarence Robinson turned in his best double of the season of 25'1½" and 51'6" to easily beat the opposition. Arizona's new American javelin record holder, John Tushaus, won his 12th meet in 13 entries this season with his third best winning performance of 251'8½". Arizona soph Dale Frederick zipped to a 14.0 win in the highs from favored Al Rockwell of BYU (14.1). Arizona State's Ron Freeman dashed to a three-tenths win in the 440 in 46.9. BYU's Mike Douglas continues to impress with his easy 51.1 victory.

Brigham Young's 4500-foot altitude limited performances in the mile through the two-mile, as New Mexico's John Baker and George Scott, both accustomed to altitude, won in 4:09.5 and 9:11.8. The 880 was taken by New Mexico's Clark Mitchell in 1:50.7, one-tenth ahead of teammate Pat Cox.

Bloomington, Ind., May 20-21--Unseasonable sunshine helped to produce some good marks in the midwest as Michigan State added the outdoor Big 10 crown to its hothouse victory last winter, on the new grass track which will serve as the site of the NCAA championships. Three meet standards were lowered, and the 440 intermediates were contested for the first time, producing perhaps the best mark of the day.

Jon Reimer of Iowa, who ran 36.1 for the season's equal fastest time last year, trailed Michigan State's Bob Steele by a yard when he hit the ninth hurdle very hard and almost fell. Steele's winning time was 50.7 while Reimer labored home in 52.0. Steele's previous best was 52.5.

Another Michigan Stater, soph John Spain, ran away from the 880 field for a 1:48.0 revision of the 1:50.1 record held jointly by George Kerr and Bill Frazier. The week before Spain lowered his best considerably to 1:49.1.

The hometown crowd did its cheering of the day when Indiana sophomore Bob White ran a record lowering 13.9 in the hurdle semis, a yard ahead of Michigan State's Gene Washington. In the final, however, Washington reversed the order with a windy 13.8. The final record went to Jack Harvey of Michigan in the shot put at 57'2 $\frac{1}{2}$ ".

In the sprints, Iowa unleashed balding senior Denny Kohl, the meets only double victor. In the 220, Kohl used an 8.0 mph breeze to fashion a 20.6 around a turn ahead of three greenclad Spartans, Washington, Jim Garrett and Daswell Campbell. Iowa's sophomore 47.1 sprinter, Mike Mondane, moved up to the 660 for a 1:17.7 win. With the meet already put out of reach, Michigan State added the final touch with a surprise victory in the mile relay (3:10.9) over Minnesota and an Iowa quartet weakened by the absence of the shaken Reimer.

Smith Turns 6.0, 9.3, 10.1m, 20.3t, 9.1r

San Jose, Calif., May 21--World records were the aim of Tommie Smith and the hope of a crowd of several thousand who overflowed the shockingly poor spectator facilities at a San Jose State all-

comers meet.

The fleet Spartan labored mightily on a track lovingly groomed. But he missed out all the way around as a mere tenth of a second separated him from no less than three world and four collegiate records. His work wasn't entirely in vain, however, as he accounted for personal bests in the 100-yards, 100-meters and 220 yards turn, and moved to first place on the all-time three event sprint list.

Smith opened with a warm-up leg in the 440 relay, clocking 9.1 for 110 yards with a flying start as his team ran 40.7. Then he tackled the yard and metric centuries. Tommie false started once and wobbled a bit on the legal start. But he gathered steam quickly, clocked an unofficial (but with three watches) 6.0 for 60 yards, and breasted tapes at 100 yards in 9.3 and 100 meters in 10.1. The wind, which was gusty all day, was measured at 2.10 mph. In the 200m-220y try Smith ran the curve well then blasted home 10 yards ahead of Wayne Hermen. Timers huddled over their watches and came up with 20.3 for both events. In the 220 three of five watches read 20.2 but two of them were alternates. The wind was 3.07 mph.

Hermen was given 9.5 for 100 yards and a highly suspect 10.2 for 100 meters. Only one watch was used and the little dashman was about four yards behind Smith at the end.

Good field marks were turned in by Dave Maggard, whose 62'9 $\frac{3}{4}$ " was a seasonal best, and Jeff Chase, who pole vaulted 16'1". Noteworthy was the horizontal jump double turned in by Denny Rodgers who was disciplined off the Los Altos High School team. He jumped 24'5" and 48'7 $\frac{1}{2}$ ". Pat Moran of San Jose and Darrell Horn of the Athens Club won the jumps at 24'9" and 50'7 $\frac{3}{4}$ ". Athenian John Bakkensen flipped the discus 184'11".

Anderson's 9.2 Fastest 100 of Year

Beaumont, Tex., May 21--Southern University completely dominated the rain-marred Gulf Federation meet by winning 11 of the 20 mens' events and scoring heavily in others. Heavy rains just prior to the afternoon prelims made the Lamar Tech oval soggy and slow. Conditions in the evening segment of the meet at Beaumont HS were not much better.

The weather certainly didn't hinder Southern's sprint corps as George Anderson sped to an amazing 9.2 on the slow track. Anderson was out of the blocks very fast and had an early three yard lead only to lose most of it to quick-closing teammate Grundy Harris who timed 9.3. Douglas Broadus of Prairie View at 9.4 and Dale Bernauer, a Rice freshman, at 9.5 were right behind as all four clocked life-time bests. Harris came back in the 220 to nip Anderson, 20.9 to 21.0. Theron Lewis passed up the 440 and won the open 220 in 21.1. Without Lewis, the 440 went to Rice's talented frosh Conley Brown who held off Southern's Robert Johnson at the tape with both clocking 47.1. Ted Nelson, former Southwest Conference 440 champ from Texas A&M and now with the Houston Striders, was third in 47.2.

Willie Davenport, who took second in the open 100, easily won the highs in 13.9 ahead of teammate Harvey Nairn, the surprise winner in the intermediate hurdle event ahead of Houston's Tony Pickett, 53.4 to 53.6.

Terry Sweeney of Houston won the three-mile in 14:30.6, but all eyes were on Homer Martinez, the Falfurrias HS miler, who stepped up to the longer event and took third in 14:49.6. Leonard Hilton, the Texas 4A mile champ from Houston was fourth in the mile with a 4:19.5.

Southern easily won both relays in 40.3 and a slow 3:12.8 as half-miler Darrow Dotson led off the longer race.

It should be noted that most races were marred by a flashless starters' gun, but this fact shouldn't detract anything from the first class sprinting performances in the meet.

On the field, Southern's Robert Lee cleared 6'11 $\frac{1}{2}$ ", his best ever as he made every height on first attempts. He took three leaps at 7'1" and was above the bar by two inches on his third attempt only

Williams Blasts Back Into Sprint Picture

Toledo, O., May 21--Bowling Green's Henry Williams ranks with such Mid-American Conference sprinters of the past as Olympians Ira Murchison and Les Carney. But today he won the 20th annual MAC championships for Western Michigan.

Roaring from third to first place on the strength of a 46.4 anchor leg, Williams broke the yarn in the mile relay as B-G nosed out Miami and Western Michigan. Had Miami won the event, the 10 points would have enabled the Redskins to score a stunning upset and prevent Western Michigan from annexing its ninth straight league title. During a brilliant two-day meet on Toledo University's all-weather track, seven conference marks fell and another was tied as the Broncos squeaked out 69 points to 68 for Miami. Bowling Green tallied 47, Toledo 26, Kent State 25, Ohio U 17 and Marshall 3.

Western Michigan had been doped to win by more than 20 points. But Miami, under new coach Stan Imhulse, produced a magnificent effort while the Broncos fell down badly in the hurdle events. Also, Coach George Dales withheld from the three-mile his best man, Roger Plont, as a disciplinary measure for missing the team bus, though Plont had arrived before the meet began.

Williams, on a cool and heavily overcast but windless day, took the 100 in 9.4, snipping a tenth off the meet mark set first by Murchison in 1958. Later, Williams, who said, "I can't run the curves well," nailed the 220 in 21.2 prior to his relay heroics.

Miami, Kent State and Bowling Green all took four first places, while the Broncos won only the 440-yard relay (with four sophomores) and the 440-yard hurdles. Meet record breakers included: 440 hurdles, Chuck LeMon of Western Michigan in 52.6 as the first four men all broke the old mark of 53.7; mile, sophomore Sammy Bair of Kent State in 4:04.6 as he ran well under the record for the Big 10 as well; pole vault, 15'1 $\frac{1}{4}$ " by Dennis Steele of Kent State; three-mile, 13:52.0, a lifetime best by lank Jack Bachelor of Miami who thus erased Olympic champion Bob Schul's meet mark; mile relay, 3:11.5 by the Bowling Green team; and the 440 relay, 41.0 by Western Michigan.

Jim Isaacson of Miami staged a big upset in winning the 880. He had been able to practice only three days since the Drake Relays because of leg trouble. But Western Michigan's Ralph Stephenson, who set the meet record of 1:49.4, toured the first lap in 54.0. Both he and Ohio's John Tillman, who has done a reported 1:49, flattened out while Isaacson surged on to clock 1:50.5.

Steen Talks About Danabol

If he-men keep kicking sand in your face and stealing your sweetheart at the beach, and if you're tired of being a 97-pound weakling--take a little shot of methandrostenolone (heck, pronounce it yourself). And if it's a hairy ape you'd like to be, take a solid belt. At least, that's the word from Dave Steen, the articulate young giant who throws the shot farther than anyone else in Canada.

Steen, before we proceed, doesn't recommend the drug, but he says it's revolutionizing the world of sport and should, once and for all, be exposed. Before having to spell it again, however, let's start using the brand name which is familiar to athletes: Danabol. It's a synthetic hormone, a tissue-building agent which can be obtained only with a doctor's prescription. Main use for the drug, apparently, is to build up ailing elderly patients. Somewhere, though, somebody young discovered that here was a potion that performed miracles.

"The weightlifters started using it first," says Steen, "and now it's being used by top athletes in track and field all over the world. But they don't talk about it. They don't want other people to know they use it."

Randy Matson tossed the shot a fantastic 70'7" last April 1965. "A month before the Olympics, Matson was throwing about 62'6". Then he threw it 66'3" in the Olympics." The reason was Danabol.

Harold Connolly of the US has been the world's hammer throw champion. He admits using Danabol and suggested it to Steen.

"We're pretty good friends," says Steen, "and he told me I should use it to prepare for the British Empire Games. I'm kind of afraid of it, though, because I've checked with doctors and they tell me they have no idea what the after-effects might be. Then other athletes tell me they've talked to doctors who say it's harmless."

Just what does methandrostenolone... er, Danabol do? Well, Toronto's George Puce, a discus thrower, started to use it and, according to Steen, Puce built his strength up so much in one month that he was able to lift 460 pounds in weights--70 more than his previous best.

"Everybody I know who has used it has exploded in strength

Steeplechase

The standard steeplechasing distance is 3000-meters, which is approximately 239 yards less than two-miles. The race comprises 28 hurdles and seven water jumps. All the obstacles are three feet in height. Unlike those used in conventional hurdle races, the steeplechase barriers are solid and weigh between 176 $\frac{1}{2}$ and 220 $\frac{1}{2}$ pounds. The width of the top of the hurdle is five inches. The water jump is 12 feet in length and width, the water being two feet six inches deep immediately in front of the hurdle. The trough slopes to ground level at the further end.
