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Ryun Slices Snell's 880 Mark

Terre Haute, Ind., June 10-11--Jim Ryun stunned more than a few by annexing the 880 standard owned by Peter Snell, with a 1:44.9 clocking on the first day of the fourth USTFF Championships. His effort, on the Grasstex track of Indiana State, came about two hours after three heats had pared the field to nine. In the first heat John Tillman (Ohio U) at 1:49.5 pulled Lowell Paul (Kansas) and Dennis Carr (Southern Cal) to clockings of 1:49.5 and 1:49.8, while in the second trial Tom Von Ruden (Oklahoma State), Ryun (Kansas Frosh) and John Dunkelberg (umat) 1:50.8. Heats: I-1. Tillman 1:49.5; 2. Paul 1:49.5; 3. Carr (So Cal) 1:49.8. II-1. Von Ruden 1:51.0; 2. Ryun 1:51.0; 3. Dunkelberg 1:51.1.

In the final, Tillman, Von Ruden and Gary Wilson of the Knoxville TC were off fast and reached the 220 in that order followed by Ryun (26.2) and Scott. Tillman led them through the first quarter with a 52.9 as Ryun (53.3) had moved to third behind Von Ruden. Upon entering the final backstretch, Ryun burst into the lead and by the 660 post (1:19.4) had built up a commanding lead while teammate Paul advanced to fourth.

Tillman faded rapidly in the home straight far behind the flying Kansan and was passed first by Von Ruden and then by Paul and Christmas. Moving faster than anyone (except Ryun), Paul almost caught Von Ruden for second while lowering his best to 1:48.0. Von Ruden joined teammates Jim Metcalf and John Perry as a sub-1:48.0 half-miler as he was second in 1:47.9. The first five placers recorded personal bests while Carr and Scott faded during the last lap, apparently unable to recover quickly from their heats.

Ryun's 220 splits were 26.2, 27.1, 26.1 and 25.5 compared with Snell's (24.8, 26.2, 25.9, 28.2) during his record run. When asked about the slow early pace, Ryun replied, "I liked it". The record was witnessed by a "crowd" estimated at 1000.

In Saturday's mile (second section), Ryun was understandably content to follow the fast pace of BYU's Bob Delaney for 1100 yards before stepping out to win as he pleased from Notre Dame's Ed Dean and Kent State's Sam Bair in 4:02.8. In the preceding "slow" section, Texas' Richard Romo needed a strong finishing drive to move past Big 10 champ Craig Boydston of Northwestern, 4:03.6 to 4:04.1, both life-time bests.

Mike Douglas of BYU, intermediate hurdle favorite, and Tony Pickett of Houston went out hard but after the 330 mark, Douglas faded, leaving Pickett all by himself. But Colgate's Dick Johnston came on strong in the stretch to edge Pickett. Both were caught in a Federation record of 50.8, while David Adkins of Alabama finished strongly to nab third over Douglas. Bob Steele of Michigan State, who did 50.7 in the Big 10, did not run.

Texas A&M's Gil Smith won the 220 in 20.8 over Kent State's Orin Richburg (given 20.7, unofficially at 20.9) while Bernie Rivers was unable to place. Oscar Moore and John Lawson traded wins in the long runs: Moore 28:41.6 to 29:04.8; Lawson 13:47.2 to 13:59.0. Al Rockwell of BYU impressed with his shaved head, goatee and 14.0 victory over Arizona's Dale Frederick and Tennessee's Pat Pomphrey. Injured Paul Kerry of Southern Cal maintained his underdog role for the NCAA meet with a sixth place 14.6.

Four heats advanced two men each to the 440 final, and the fourth saw the elimination of SMU's highly regarded Jim Bankhead in 47.4. Dwight Middleton from USC had a yard too much for the favorite Dave Crook (Nebraska) while Tom Waverley (Lamar Tech) and soph Mike Mondane (Iowa) lowered their best times to 46.5. Crook was disqualified but no reason was given. The 100 saw Jim Freeman of Murray State in Kentucky outpower Rene Matison with 9.4 into a headwind of about 5 mph. Arizona's John Tushaus continued his hot streak, launching the javelin on a 272'1½" throw. Jumping into the wind, Clarence Robinson upped his seasonal triple leap best to 51'8".

Running under the auspices of the Jayhawk TC, Kansas won the team title handily with 77 points over New Mexico (55) and Brigham Young (50). First-year coach Bob Timmons chalked up his first national outdoor title after copping the NCAA indoor meet.

Kemp Races 46.9 After Injury

Chicago, June 10-11--The short but powerful strides of Jim Kemp carried the Kentucky State senior to a fine 46.9 effort and a repeat win in the fourth annual NCAA college division meet on historic Stag Field. The muscular Kemp eased through a pair of 47.2 efforts on Friday. In Saturday's final, the field was wisely recalled after Kemp's blocks slipped and the Kentucky Stater dropped heavily to his knees. After a few minutes rest, Kemp moved into the lead after the furlong and won easily. The Birmingham, Ala., native limped noticeably after the open quarter, but came back 100 minutes later to anchor a 3:10.7 winning effort in the mile relay. Kentucky State also won a heat on Friday in 3:11.0.

Freshman Clyde Glosson and Olympic bronze medalist Ed Roberts traded sprint wins, Glosson taking the 100 in 9.6 and Roberts returning the favor in 20.7. Glosson posted a 20.9 in a Fri-

day semi-final.

San Diego State defended its title by scoring 67 points. Long Beach State was second with 56. Rick Herrmann and NCAA university champ Larry Godfrey led San Diego by winning the 880 and intermediate hurdles, respectively. Herrmann took the half in 1:49.4 while Godfrey skimmed over the barriers for a 52.1. Dale Drennan, a 9:25 two-miler, took the 3000-meter steeplechase in 9:10.8.

Smith Dips Under 220 Turn Mark

Sacramento, Calif., June 11--A defective cartridge in Tom Moore's starting gun barely disturbed the balmy air and almost no sound or flash was visible in the twilight, but it was enough to start the long lean legs of Tommie Smith into fluid strides, faster and faster, longer and longer, until exactly twenty seconds later they had circled half of the hard dirt track. Tommie Smith had snatched another world record for his ambitious collection.

Before the official announcement of the new world record of 20-flat for 220-yards (and, incidentally, for 200-meters), Tommie Smith and his great sprint coach Bud Winter spent an agonizing 15 minutes while a huddle of officials at this Pacific Association AAU meet debated the authenticity of Smith's mark. Of the three official timers, one said he saw a little smoke, one saw nothing and one claimed he saw a little flash. Of the two alternate timers, one saw nothing and the other saw smoke. Two of those three watches read 20.0 and one was a fast 20.1. Starter Moore said, "I thought about calling it back when I heard the bad shell go off, but I looked up and I could see there'd been a little smoke and it looked like they all got a good start, so I let it go."

After the announcement, Smith was sent around the track in a joyous victory lap, grinning and waving occasionally to the enthusiastic crowd while coach Winter accepted congratulations and said this race should prove Smith's greatness. "A lot of people," he said, "were skeptical about that 19.5."

Smith started in lane three, next to Lee Evans (San Jose CC) in lane four. Farther out were Forrest Beatty and state JC champ

Bob Griffin, both of whom pulled up after the quiet starting gun, then resumed running. Quarter-miler Evans looked very fast, gaining some on Smith to mid-curve and beating the others soundly in 21.0 (with one watch at 20.8), but Smith zoomed away from him by four yards on the curve and another four yards in the stretch.

Smith regarded his superhuman run as almost routine. Of the track, which was supposed to be slow, he said, "The track wasn't too bad. It seemed like it had a lot of rocks on it, though." Of the mechanics of running it, he said, "It wasn't my best start," and, "After I came off the turn, I thought about my form." Of his opposition, he said, "I didn't know where the rest of the field was." In general, he said, "My 19.5 on the straightaway was a tougher race."

Smith was not the only record breaker. Gyula Zsivotzky, Hungary's lean world record holder, spun smoothly to an American all-comer's record in the hammer at 235'10" with four throws over 232-feet. Lee Evans broke his national JC mark with a powerful 46.1 440. Dennis Phillips set the second JC record with a 16'8" pole vault and had an even better vault while missing at 17-feet.

Darrell Horn smashed two meet records for a fine double. He long jumped 26'½" and triple jumped 51'5½". Other meet marks, in addition to those by Smith, Evans and Phillips, were broken by Tom Wyatt (51.4 for the 440 hurdles) and Roger Duran (15:56.6 for the two-mile walk).

James Hines narrowly defeated Griffin in a 9.7 hundred then won a separate section of the 220 in 20.9. Ed Johnson won the high jump at 6'10" after preps Clarence Johnson (San Antonio, Tex) and Tom Clyburn (San Francisco, Calif) had cleared 6'9½". Ralph Gamez won the high school two-mile in 9:03.8. Bob Price ran his last 880 in 1:59.5 to hold off Alex Whittle in a 4:06.5 mile. A strong discus field failed to produce any fireworks in the face of a "dead" wind as Ludvik Danek won by almost nine-feet at 196'1". Mike Lehner continued his comeback with an 8:55.0 steeplechase.

In the hammer, Zsivotzky showed early promise with warm-up throws over the 230-foot arc. Hal Connolly fouled throws of about 223-feet and 221-feet. Ed Burke sacrificed distance to work on a new, smoother technique. George Frenn, out of a cast less than two weeks and still limping, threw over 200-feet five times including two fouls, one of 207-feet.

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Mile, 5000 Fast, Competitive

San Diego, Calif., June 11--Another hot mile and a highly competitive 5000-meters of quality thrilled 10,231 appreciative fans at the second San Diego Invitational. Nearly all the runners, losers as well as victors, came away happy and prospects for more good running at these distances are looking up.

Jim Ryun was busy in Terre Haute but he scarcely was missed as the mile produced this result:

1. Jim Grelle. 3:55.4, equalling his life-time best set last summer in Vancouver, BC, on June 15. Grelle mentioned, "This was a much easier race than Compton, I feel I'll be ready to run 3:53 under good conditions in the AAU. But if the weather is not too bad I may go in the three-mile."

2. Neill Duggan, Hancock Junior College, 3:56.1. This is another new junior college record, a full three seconds better than Duggan's time in the Compton mile just a week before and only two-

fifths off the British national record.

3. Dave Bailey, East York Track Club, 3:59.1. A personal and Canadian record for Bill Crothers' little known teammate. Bailey is just rounding into condition and should be capable of knocking another two or three seconds off the time.

4. Tim Danielson, recent graduate of Chula Vista High School, 3:59.4. Second only to Ryun on the all-time prep list and a 6.8 second improvement for the two-time California schoolboy champion. When announcer Duane Esper dramatically emphasized the "three" in his time the crowd drowned out the rest of the announcement and gave its home town hero that rare thing in track—a standing ovation. Full of run, the 5'9", 140 pounder made plans to double in the mile and two-mile in the Golden West Invitational and to run in the national AAU.

5. Ron Larrieu, veteran distance runner, 4:03.6. A personal record for the man who won the state mile 9 years prior to Danielson, and the 15th year in a row he has achieved at least one all-time best. The run indicated the Olympian is rounding into form and could be a factor in the national distances.

6. Rick Riley, Ferris High of Spokane, 4:04.7. Rick was disappointed as he had hoped to do what Danielson did, but it was a life-time best and moved him to fifth on the all-time schoolboy list behind Ryun (3:55.3), Danielson, Gerry Lindgren (4:01.5) and Tom Sullivan (4:03.5). Rick will essay the six-mile in New York.

Mike Eck of the Striders started but did not finish the race which saw Grelle equal his personal low and all others better theirs. Eck played rabbit and played it well running 58.1 and 1:59.2. Grelle tagged along in second with splits of 28.8, 58.4, 1:28.7 and 1:59.5 and remained in second when Eck retired and Duggan took over. The rapidly improving English veteran clocked 3:00.1 at the 1320 and wasn't passed by Grelle until the middle of the backstretch. Jim, who was timed in 2:30.1 and 3:00.2, led with a 220 to go in 3:28.8. He poured on a final furlong of 26.6 and had the race under control all the way. Duggan finished strongly as did Bailey and Danielson, whose splits were 58.8, 1:59.8, and 3:01.1.

The 5000 pitted three Americans with a trio of overseas stars. The US was represented by Tracy Smith, an improving youngster not yet used to this kind of competition; Billy Mills, a national hero but one who did not train for five months during the winter and early spring and who had not run a race since 1965; and George Young, our best steeplechaser whose 5000 record is a modest 14:10.8n. Our chances were not promising against Ron Clarke, the always in condition multi-recordman; Tony Cook, a clubmate of Clarke's and a 13:20 three-miler; and Gaston Roelants, steeplechase record holder and second fastest 10,000-meter runner. Still, the Aussies had a long plane trip to shake off and Roelants, pointing toward the European Championships, wasn't yet in top form although he had an 8:39.4 steeplechase to his credit.

It was a tactical race all the way and the field was bunched for all but the last lap. Clarke, as usual, did most of the work but all except Young did lead at one time or another. The pace, while not hot was warm enough as Clarke reached the mile in 4:22.1 and Mills led at two-miles in 8:52.2. Tension was high and a wild finish appeared likely as the six headed for the gun almost together.

Then came the big surprise. Young, almost unnoticed as he remained toward the rear of the sextet, moved wide on the second from last turn and was in front when the gun fired. He went into a prolonged sprint and Clarke went with him as the others began to string out. Soon it was a two man affair, with Young charging hard and Clarke hanging on. Only two-tenths separated them at three-miles, where George returned 13:17.0, and heading into the finish Ron picked up a few feet. But he couldn't quite close the gap. The result:

1. George Young 13:40.2 (13:17.0 for three-miles). Third best by an American and only 2.2 seconds off the national record of Bob Schul and Gerry Lindgren. On the strength of his 56.9 final quarter he appears ready for faster times and will run the 3-mile in the AAU. George was pleasantly surprised as he was concerned about his conditioning and lacked confidence.

2. Ron Clarke 13:40.6 (13:17.2). Closer than the fifth second timing indicates, Clarke also was pleased. He had not arrived until 11 p.m. last night and had been sleepless for 40 hours. "I didn't know what to expect and hoped for 13:45. I felt tired all the way. But now I know I'm in good condition and should do well in Europe."

3. Tracy Smith 13:42.2 (13:19.0). Another personal best, lowering the 13:45.6 clocked at Compton, and within one second of the pre-race prediction by Mihaly Igloi, his coach. Tracy continued to run aggressively and said he had "hoped Clarke would pull more of his fast surges. They're fun".

4. Billy Mills 13:44.8 (13:19.8). Another happy warrior. With only 10 weeks training he ran within 3.4 seconds of his best

and once again lived up to his pre-meet prediction, which was 13:45. "If I can train straight through for the Russians I'll be in pretty good condition." He'll run only the six miles in New York.

5. Gaston Roelants 13:46.2 (13:21.4). The veteran Belgian ran with a tightly bandaged thigh.

6. Tony Cook 13:49.6 (13:23.0). His best ever and promising of much better under more rested conditions.

Several other competitors looked ready in the last big open meet before the June 25-26 nationals. Tom Farrell was one of these as he took on a strong field, bided his time, and spurted home with a quick stepping finish reminiscent of the Farrell of old. His time was a modest 1:48.2 but he looked good for much faster. George Germann ran his best race since last summer for 1:48.3 as both defeated Bill Crothers (1:48.6) who only now is beginning his serious training.

Ron Whitney scored an important win in the medium hurdles as he met, and defeated, Geoff Vanderstock for the first time this year. Whitney finished hard, as usual, for 50.7 as Jim Miller, gradually lengthening the distance he can hang on, ran 51.1 and Vanderstock did 51.4. In the highs the super smooth Willie Davenport raced neck-and-neck with Earl McCullough until near the end when he pulled away for a 4-to-5 foot win although both were given 13.7.

UCLA entered its 440 relay team to get experience on grass-text and despite rough handling of the baton did another 40.0. Only Bob Frey will be missing from the team next year and there will be ample replacement in Harold Busby who won both sprints, running 9.6 and 20.6t, the latter equalling the national freshman mark.

John Pennel continued his frustrating chase of a mark better than 17'1". He won at 17'¾", the sixth time this year and the eighth in his life he has done 17' to 17'1", but did not come close at 17'6¼". Randy Matson snapped one out 66'11½" and another 66'6½" while Parry O'Brien beat Dave Davis on his last put and prep Dave Murphy improved to 57'10¼". Another final effort winner was Ralph Boston. Jumping with an injured knee, he overcame Gayle Hopkins on a run-way the jumpers dislike heartily. The triple jumpers, using a different runup, were so unhappy they quit after the third round.

Underwood Leads Dorsey

Berkeley, Calif., June 3-4--Outstanding winning marks in every event, and good depth in many of them, were recorded as Phil Underwood led Dorsey High School of Los Angeles to an easy victory in the 1966 California State High School meet.

Underwood won the 100 by two yards in 9.6 as the second and third place finishers were given the same time. He returned to win the 220 on a straightaway in 21.2 against a 7 mph wind after having run 20.5 in a heat Friday. He anchored his 880 relay team (pending co-holders of the national record of 1:25.9) to a third place finish only to have them disqualified. Despite this disappointment and Don Parrish's seventh place finish in the 180 lows after hitting the last hurdle while leading the race, Dorsey defeated Muir of Pasadena by

a score of 22 to 15.

The high jump field had eight competitors who had cleared 6'8 $\frac{1}{4}$ " or better. Don Pierce of Pittsburgh, who cleared 7'0" earlier this year, failed to make 6'6" in the trials. In the finals, Tom Clyburn, a junior from Balboa in San Francisco who had never jumped higher than 6'7 $\frac{1}{4}$ ", soared 6'8" on his first try and 6'10" on his second attempt to tie LA Lincoln's Doug Huff and defeat Compton's Bill Morris.

Doyle Steel from San Diego, who had set a national long jump record of 25'5 $\frac{1}{4}$ " last week, fouled his first three attempts in the finals, but qualified for the last three rounds with a leap of 24'2". He then had to sail 25'3 $\frac{1}{4}$ " on his last attempt to defeat LA Loyola's Henry Harris, whose 24'7 $\frac{1}{4}$ " was leading.

Ralph Gamez of Berkeley ran away from a field of 26 other runners to become the fifth fastest prep of all time at 9:01.6. The nation's leading prep vaulter, Muir's Paul Heglar, was upset by Foot-hill of Sacramento's Wayne Meyers, 15'3 $\frac{1}{4}$ " to 14'8".
