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Speed in the Tigers' Lair: i.e., 1:23.5

Houston, Tex., March 17-18--Texas Southern and Southern continued to trade sprint relay wins, this time at the 16th annual Texas Southern Relays. Each team won seven finals in the cool, 50 degree weather which caused most runners to go just fast enough to win. But in the case of Southern, it was swift enough to post the number one sprint medley time of the year, 3:18.7, to 3:19.0 for Texas Southern. The Texas Southern Tigers came back with the nation's best 880 relay time of 1:23.5. Ralph Boston, Bob Beamon and Bill Miller were supposed to compete in a special long jump, but only Miller could attend and his first jump of 25'2" was the best of the night. Otis Burrell was out with an ankle injury, so John Hartfield won the high jump at 6'10", mediocre for him. He missed twice at that height before clearing, then went directly to 7'1" and missed thrice.

In the sprint medley, Southern sprinters Oliver Ford and Grundy Harris gave the Jaguars a lead they did not relinquish. Anthony Gates stayed ahead of Jim Hines, 46.4 to 46.4, then Robert Johnson saw his lead diminish to zero on the final turn as George Hunt ran 1:50.0 but Johnson's 1:50.5 held on for a two yard win for Southern.

The 880 relay was another great race as TSU picked up their 1:23.5 in an afternoon heat, two seconds ahead of Arkansas AM&N, with Southern winning the other heat in 1:24.9. In the final, Southern's Henderson Cook, Harris and Ford would not let the TSU trio of Lee Smith, Clyde Duncan or Bobby Evans gain more than half of the original stagger, but when Jim Hines got the baton, well behind Gates, he showed why he is one of the world's best sprinters. He gained with every powerful stride and nipped Gates at the tape by a step. The time was 1:23.7 to 1:23.8. Unfortunately a passing zone violation by the Tigers gave a hollow victory to Southern, which had a questionable pass itself that wasn't called by TSU officials.

Texas Southern, with smooth handoffs and little need for speed, ran a 40.2 prelim in the 440 relay, ahead of Prairie View A&M (40.8). Southern had to run 41.1 to take Arkansas AM&N (41.2) but another passing zone infraction ruled out a speedy final. Last week Southern ran a 40.0 while Texas Southern has a 39.9. The TSU foursome of Bristol, Evans, Smith and Hines won the final just as easily in 40.3 over Arkansas AM&N (40.7).

Southern was uncontested in the mile relay and won jogging in 3:10.0 over Prairie View's 3:12.0. Arkansas AM&N, which beat Southern the week before, 3:07.5 to 3:07.8, was third in 3:12.8. In a 3:11.3 prelim win, Prairie View A&M's promising freshman Thurman Boggess appeared to be just striding, but his coach caught him in 45.2 for a third leg carry.

Texas Southern handily won the longer relays in 7:34.2 and 10:07.2. A distance man to watch may be freshman Willie Rios of Oklahoma Baptist, who ran a 3:01.5 1320 leg in the distance medley.

Ryun Unreels 4:05.1, 1:48.1 Double

Los Angeles, Calif., March 25--After a slower-than-expected 4:05.1 mile, Kansas' Jim Ryun raced through a 1:48.1 880 ("That's more like it.") in his outdoor debut against UCLA. His double was not enough to stop the defending NCAA champions from scoring an impressive 88-55 team victory.

Ryun burst out of a three-man UCLA box on the final lap and floated away to win the mile by some 25 yards. Ryun's 880 was the world's fastest this year. Trailing was UCLA's Arnd Kruger of West Germany in 1:50.7, originally reported as 1:48.9.

Steinhauer Unfurls 68'11 1-4", 186'0" Bests

Sacramento, Calif., March 25--Neal Steinhauer of Oregon muscled his way into second place on the all-time world shot put list with a 68'11 1/4" heave at the Sacramento Invitational. With the effort, Steinhauer moved into the lead for the young outdoor season, threw more than a foot beyond his personal best of 67'10" and added a mighty 22 1/2" to his previous open-air mark.

Neal's 68'11 1/4" came on the first throw of a strong series. The second toss thudded down at 67'6", he fouled a 68'11" third effort, then finished with 65'10 1/2", 66'0" and 67'5". He jumped ahead of Dallas Long (67'10") among all-time performers and gained ground on world record holder Randy Matson (70'7"). Matson has four puts--all but one outdoors--which rank ahead of Steinhauer's new best.

The Oregon ace, called "the hardest worker I've ever coached" by Bill Bowerman, also came up with a career discus record of 186'0". Only Matson, on six occasions, has had a better one-day double. According to the Portuguese scoring table, Steinhauer's performance is worth 1984 points, Matson's best, 2033.

Former Oregon runner Ken Moore fared well in a difficult distance double. He won the three-mile in 13:55.8 after finishing second to Oregon's Cedric Wedemire in the steeplechase, 9:08.0 to 9:11.2. Three Oregon milers crossed the line in 4:06.1, but Arne Kvalheim was declared the winner over Wade Bell and Roscoe Divine.

Seagren, Caruthers, McCullough Hot

Santa Barbara, Calif., March 25--Earl McCullough, Ed Caruthers and Bob Seagren recorded the top marks, and Southern California captured 11 of the 17 open events to easily win the university team title in the 29th edition of the Easter Relays. One collegiate and 18 meet records were broken in four divisions on a clear, windless day at La Playa stadium as 7000 spectators looked on.

Southern Cal's McCullough earned athlete of the meet honors

by virtue of a sizzling 13.7 high hurdles triumph and lead-off legs on the victorious Trojan 440 and 880 relay combines. In between, he managed a 23'3/4" long jump for third. After an eased up 14.1 preliminary win, McCullouch led all the way in the finals of the highs for a five-tenths win over Arizona's 1966 NCAA runner-up, Dale Frederick.

Arizona's Caruthers out-dued Otis Burrell to win the high jump by 2 1/2" with the second highest outdoor height by an American of 7'2 1/2". Only John Thomas' 1960 mark of 7'3 3/4" surpasses this. Caruthers had a close attempt at 7'4".

Seagren shattered Marc Savage's collegiate pole vault mark of 16'9" by clearing 17'3 1/4" although the height was first announced as 17'4". When officials re-checked the take-off area for certification of the record, it was discovered the standards had settled down 3/4" during competition and the meet referee ruled the 3/4" be subtracted from all vaults. So, Stanford's Jim Eshelman, who thought he had become the seventh 17-footer, and Seagren's teammate Paul Wilson had their second and third place marks reduced to 16'11 1/4". Seagren, who achieved the sixth highest vault outdoors in history and then had a narrow miss at a world record 17'7", said of Eshelman, "I feel sorry for Jim. He finally cracked the 17-foot barrier and he doesn't get credit for it. It was a tough break."

Southern Cal's sprint relay teams of McCullouch, Lennox Miller, O.J. Simpson and Fred Kuller clocked 40.0 and 1:23.6 for the 440- and 880-yard baton events. In the most dramatic event of the day, the 880 relay, the Trojans nipped San Jose State by one-tenth of a second. McCullouch's 21.5 lead-off leg staked the Trojans to a slim lead over San Jose State's Bob Griffin. Miller lengthened it with a 20.8 before encountering difficulty on the pass to Simpson, who still managed a 21.0. John Bambury also passed poorly to Lee Evans to put San Jose back in fourth. Evans moved into second with a 21.3 but had to pass to Tommie Smith in the fourth lane. Kuller received the baton nine yards ahead of the long-striding Smith and needed every bit of it to win. Although he posted a 20.3, Kuller was nearly flagged down by the high stepping Smith, who turned in the fastest ever 220-yard relay split with a 19.5 anchor leg (previous best was 19.7) to come within one-tenth of a victory. San Jose State did not contest the 440 event when Griffin turned up lame, leaving it all to the Trojans.

Smith came back in the mile relay to anchor San Jose to an easy 3:09.0 win in handing Southern Cal its only relay defeat of the day. Evans' 46.2 third leg broke the race wide open and Smith coasted home in 47.1.

Simpson was the open 100 winner in 9.5 over teammate Kuller (9.6), but the fastest 100 time was produced by LACC's Ronnie Ray Smith, who won the JC title in a non-excessive wind-aided 9.4.

In the two-mile relay, a Southern Cal team of sophomores, Carl Trentadue (1:53.2), Richard Joyce (1:51.0) and Craig Grant (1:53.0) teamed with senior Dave Buck (1:51.5) to clock a good early season 7:28.6. The Trojans also took the distance medley in 10:04.6.

Southern Cal's Gary Carlsen came up with an impressive 192'7" to capture the discus over Dave Weill, who could only manage 180'8". And the Trojans' new javelinist, by way of Great Britain, John FitzSimons, took his specialty at 247'6".

It was a strong, all-round display of power on the part of Southern California that led the Trojans to a smashing 89 to 39 victory over second place Stanford.

Rice's Brown Takes Important 440 in 46.6

Corpus Christi, Tex., March 25--Abilene Christian, with only two firsts, barely edged the Rice Owls, 66 1/2 to 65 1/2, at the fifth Corpus Christi Relays. Baylor (40), Texas (40), Texas A&M (38) and SMU (24) were well back. The most exciting event was the final mile relay, as ACC needed to finish within one position of Rice to win the title--and that's just how it ended. Rice won the thriller, 3:10.9 to 3:11.0, as Rice's Conley Brown made up more than five yards on Ronnie Crawford with a 46.4 anchor. Brown also won a publicized duel in the 440 with a 46.6 over SMU's Jim Bankhead (47.1) and Crawford (47.3) and led off Rice's 41.2 winning 440 relay unit. Rice got its other wins from John Moss (1:51.1), Jimmy Wilkerson (14.1) and Ricki Jacobs (237'7 1/2", a life-time best).

Abilene Christian's Bruce Johnson of Canada and Al Van Troba led throughout the mile, with Johnson just outstripping Van Troba, 4:06.2 and 4:06.7, with Baylor's Dale McDonald and SMU's LeRoy Storbeck surprising with sizeable improvements with 4:06.9 and 4:07.3 clockings. Only second place Van Troba failed to achieve a personal best among the first five finishers.

Randy Matson, still out of the shot with a sore hand, had a final warm-up toss in the discus that hit 200-feet but had to be content with a 192'4" win on his first toss, some 30-feet ahead of the rest of the field.

Biggest crowd pleasers were the high school 880 and mile. The 880 was a Mutt and Jeff affair as Houston's Spring Branch Memorial senior Dave Morton at 6'2" and Corpus Christi Ray's diminutive Ray Alaniz at 5'5" passed the first quarter in 53.3. Alaniz would not let Morton stride away from him and ran wide the entire second lap before Dave could pull away down the stretch for a 1:50.4 to 1:50.9 win. In the mile, the equally small Bob Gonzales of Falfurrias had the crowd on its feet the entire race as he clipped off 59.8 and 2:02.6 readings before having to give up the fast pace. His final time was 4:11.3, the winner by 10 seconds.

Another sophomore, Larry Kelly, turned in a 1:48.0 anchor half-mile as Tennessee won the sprint medley with a swift 3:18.9 clocking. Fordham needed the season's best two-mile relay time (7:24.6) to turn back Tennessee (7:26.2). Oscar Moore's 4:06.9 anchor leg paced Southern Illinois to the distance medley title in 9:50.0, and he took two-mile honors in 8:49.6.

On the field, Florida's rapidly improving John Morton lifted his personal discus best to 187'8" while outdistancing Art Swarts of South Carolina (185'1"). George Moschis, 5'9" Tennessee javelinist from Greece, hurled the spear 244'3". Maryland's Richard Dull

International Representation

An international team must consist only of native born or naturalized subjects of the country concerned, except in the case of citizens of a colony, who can represent the Mother Country if the colony is not a member of the IAAF.

An athlete cannot represent more than one country except in cases of (a) incorporation of one country in another; (b) creation of a new country ratified by treaty; (c) where membership of the IAAF is acquired by the governing body of any colony where such membership did not previously exist; (d) wherein the case of a female athlete nationality is altered by marriage.

Native born citizens or subjects of a dominion or colony are eligible to represent the Mother Country if the dominion or colony has no National Olympic Committee.

Armin Hary

Tests showed that there was a time lag of only .03 seconds between the sound of the gun and Hary's initial movement, compared with .12-.15 seconds taken by most sprinters. His fast start led to much controversy but left no doubt with his 1960 Olympic 100 win. He recorded the first officially accepted 10.0 second 100.
