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

RECORDS

We've all heard it said that, "Records are made to be broken." And, to some degree, that is true. Records do provide goals, since they not only represent the best, but also show what can be done.

We all have personal records (PR's) that serve as individual goals for improvement and motivation. It feels good to set a new record, and it also allows us to up our goals. That's progress, and the record-keeping helps.

I was reminded of the value of record keeping by Mike Powell's recent history-making long jump. His comments afterward credited former record holder Bob Beaman's 29-2 1/2 as a motivating factor. We can all recognize the efforts of those who have gone before us paving the way with marks that not only inspire, but also motivate and challenge us.

Speaking of Mike Powell, how many of you know where he went to college? Hint number one: he attended two universities. Hint number two: both are in Southern California. Hint number three: one is a PAC-10 school, the other a Big West school.

Powell attended the University of California at Irvine and UCLA although his collegiate career was most notable for never scoring at the NCAA meet. In 1984, though, as a junior at UCI, he did finish second at TAC and sixth in the Olympic Trials. He took a year off between UCI and UCLA, during

which he raised his PR to 26-9 and his first world ranking -- 10th. Re-entering college in 1986 at UCLA, he again had difficulty with the collegiate track scene and dropped out of the U.S. rankings altogether.

Powell didn't start on top; he worked his way up over the years, a piece at a time. He believed he could do it because someone else had done it before. Now he is on top and his 29-4 1/2 will provide the inspiration, motivation and challenge for someone else.

Of course we can't all be world record holders. But we can set goals that are higher than we've done before; and because others have done it we can know that it is possible. Maybe, with enough desire and hard work, we can do it too. And, just maybe, we can do it better.

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

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

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

Maybe, just maybe, Kenny Harrison's victory in the IAAF World Track and Field Championships will earn him some recognition back home.

Not that he's worried about it, but still, signing a few autographs in a mall or at a restaurant might be fun for a change.

In Europe, Harrison is a celebrity. He's mobbed.

"If I signed an autograph for every fan that wanted one, it would be in the thousands," he said

Americans, however, wouldn't know him from George Harrison.

In his hometown of Emeryville, CA Kenny Harrison walks the streets unnoticed.

"In the three years I've lived in the East Bay (of the San Francisco Bay area), I've never been interviewed by a local newspaper," he said from the San Francisco Airport before he left with the rest of the U.S. team for Tokyo's World Championships.

That likely will change following his victory in the men's triple jump with a mark of 58-4.

He led from the second jump, edging Soviet Leonid Voloshin, who was second in 58-3 and teammate Mike Conley, third at 57-9 3/4.

Among European and Japanese fans, though, Harrison was revered. Perhaps now, he'll finally getting his due among the mainstream sporting press in the U.S.

In the airport on the way to the meet, Harrison described his expectations.

"I'll jump past 58-10, my personal record," Harrison said. "If I do that, I'm looking at a world record."

Harrison wasn't being cocky by predicting a world record, rather he knew he was capable of jumping further than he ever had. In doing so, a world record would likely fall.

Harrison hasn't lost in three years. In 1990, he exceeded 58 feet five times. He's a two-time national champion, and last year the Wisconsin native achieved the No. 1 world ranking for the first time.

With his success last season, the 26-yearold dedicated himself to training through 1991 to prepare specifically for the 1992 Barcelona Olympics, coming up for air occasionally to win meets in Hiroshima, Jena and Berlin, in addition to the national and world championships. That's not to say he didn't emphasize the world championships, but his difficult training regimen is geared toward a banner 1992.

While holed up at Edwards Stadium on the University of California campus, Harrison trained with former Cal jumper Ken Williams and coached himself, concentrating largely on strength conditioning.

"The Olympics, that's my meet," said Williams, who admitted that "I was a bit disappointed I could not do my personal best" at the worlds.

He had two fouls that appeared to be better jumps than his winning mark. The world record of 58-11 1/2, by former UCLA star Willie Banks in 1985, seems well within Harrison's capabilities.

As far as recognition is concerned, Harrison sometimes is actually surrounded by local autograph-seekers in public.

However, it's always when he's around Mitch Richmond, his buddy since their college days at Kansas State. And the mob seems to congregate around the Golden State Warriors basketball star rather than the track and field standout.

"Actually, someone did recognize me recently," he said. "I was at Kip's in Berkeley when this guy comes up to me waving this *Track & Field News* in his hand saying, 'This is you, isn't it?' It blew me away."

The good-natured Harrison joked about the lack of recognition. It doesn't bother him.

Being the best is a personal, not a materialistic, desire.

While reporters expressed skepticism at Harrison's world-record expectations for Tokyo, the 5-foot-10, 165-pound Harrison did not feel strange about describing them.

"I always work on my speed and my strength," he said. "But now, I'm better and stronger than ever. If I'm doing everything right, the record will take care of itself."

The record didn't fall in Tokyo, but it seems apparent that Harrison is on the verge of dominating the triple jump if he remains healthy. If or when that happens, the attention is certain to follow.

Yes, he was christened "Kerry," but he's been called "Kenny" since he was a little boy.

Kenny Harrison -- world ranked No. 1 in the triple jump for 1990 -- has had a slow, steady club up the ladder since finishing second in the 1983 Golden West Invitational with a jump of 52-4 1/2. In 1984, as a Kansas State freshman, he improved to 54-1 3/4 and was the National Junior champion. In 1986, he won the NCAA triple jump and finished sixth in the long jump and fourth in the TAC triple jump. He posted PRs of 26-9 3/4 in the long jump and 56-0 in the triple jump and earned U.S. rankings of fourth in the triple jump and sixth in the long jump.

After a quiet 1987, Harrison found 1988 a mixed blessing. He raised his PR to 56-3 1/4 and posted a windy 57-7 1/2 in the Olympic Trials, but that left him in sixth place, just three inches shy of a trip to Seoul.

In 1989, he moved into the world rankings for the first time, finishing fourth. He improved his PR by more than a foot with jumps of 57-3 in Tokyo on May 14 and 57-3 3/4 on May 20 in Sao Paulo, Brazil.

All this was prologue to 1990. After an undefeated early season that saw him win both the TAC indoor and outdoor titles, Harrison nailed another major improvement with a tri-pop of 58-10, which moved him to second on the all-time list behind Willie Banks' 58-11 1/2. He then jumped 57-5 or better in his next six meets, absorbing his only loss of the year at the Weltklasse by two inches to Michael Conley, 57-7 1/2 to 57-5 1/2. Not surprisingly, his second world ranking saw him take the No. 1 spot. It wasn't even close.

We commented last year on the stability (stagnation?) of the middle and long distance lists. In the 800, Louie Quintana of Arroyo Grande is the first new name in the Top 25 since 1984—in 24th place. There have been no changes in the first 10 since '84 and only two in the last 12 years.

Similarly, there has been only one change in the Top 25, and none in the Top 10, since 1986 in both the 1600 and 3200.

A final note: The numbers after athletes' names refer to the number of state championships won. The year(s) of the championship (s) are not necessarily the same as the year of the best mark.

MEET SPOTLIGHT

Notes on the Backs of Programs From a Scandinavian Grand Prix Track Tour

TRACK IN SCANDINAVIA is different, for sure

In the United States, a 10,000-meter race will empty seats faster than a bomb threat. The Bislett Games in Oslo had THREE 10K's-and the customers loved it. (In Scandinavia, they go to the concession stands during the sprints.)

They do something else different, too.
They fill the stadiums for track meets. Of the three GP meets we saw--Helsinki, Stockholm, and Oslo--only Helsinki had any empty seats and Helsinki has a 49,000-seat stadium (temporarily cut to about 35,000 by remodeling) which was probably two-thirds full.

The sponsoring Dagens Nyheter newspaper sold out the 20,000 seats in Stockholm's ancient (1912) Olympic Stadium a week in advance. And in Oslo. . .

Bislett Stadium has a seating capacity of somewhere between 12 and 15,000. Something like 25,000 tickets were sold--and used.

What a ticket at Bislett entitles you to is a seat in a given row in a given section, unless it's for standing room, in which case it entitles you to stand anywhere in a given section.

Meet management proceeds to sell approximately three tickets for every two seating spaces and two tickets for every standing space.

Enter the "crammers"-- large citizens who stand on the track and motion at regular intervals for the sardines, uh, make that spectators, to squeeze together. Or as the English-speaking "crammer" in our section said cheerfully (and continuously), "Get to know your neighbor better!" Even if your neighbor is your wife (mine was), you don't want to get to know her THAT well. At least in public.

As mentioned earlier, distance races were the feature events in the three meets. Not only did nobody walk out on the men's 10K at Oslo, the crowd kept up a continual roar.

Well they should have. The race went through 5K at a record pace (13:27.9), slowed down in the third quarter and then wound up in a trophy dash with the winner, Morocco's Khalid Skah, running the last 200 in 26.1 for a

total time of 27:23,29-in a "tactical" 10K.

Not at Oslo was Algerian (and former Riverside CC ace) Noureddine Morcelli, the star of the early summer circuit. At Helsinki, Morcelli had run a 1500 PR of 3:31.00. In a well-publicized record attempt, he ran "only" 3:31.01 at Stockholm; he was disappointed enough to hurl the winner's bouquet to the track when his time was announced.

He wasn't disheartened enough not to ask the Oslo promoters for a reported \$65,000 appearance fee. The Norwegians passed on that but the Bislett Dream Mile, even without Morcelli, produced the fastest mass finish in history with 12th place at 3:54.13.

It should be noted that most of the distance races were serious record attempts of one kind or another. Rabbits are routinely used. In one race, meet management didn't even bother to issue the designated pace-setter a number; they listed him in the program as "Hare." (IAAF rules? What IAAF rules?)

A couple of Californians were earning their summer keep as bunnies. TAC indoor 800 champ Ray Brown, who trains at Stanford, has been running the first 1000 meters of 1500 and mile races.

Matt Giusto, out of San Mateo High School (and Arizona), has an even more esoteric specialty. He takes over from the first pacemaker at the 2000 mark of 5K's and leads for the next kilometer.

It's an honorable occupation in Europe and reportedly pays well. Reputedly, there are bonuses if the rabbit hits a designated time target with additional bonuses if a world record is achieved. There weren't any at these meets but we saw world junior records for 5,000 at each of the three.

There were plenty of other Californians around, of course. Well known ones like Steve Scott and like Johnny Gray, who had a big 800 win over TAC champ Mark Everett at Oslo.

Also lesser known ones like Patty Blunk of San Diego and Buffy Rabbitt of UCI, who turned up in a 1500 B race at Oslo, Juliana Yendork, who just missed her national high school record in the triple at Stockholm, and Doug Fraley, Fresno State's ex-NCAA champ, who vaulted in all three meets.

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Doug didn't clear 18 feet in any of them (he did do 18-4 1/2 in London the next week) although he narrowly missed 18-0 1/2 in Stockholm and 18-2 1/2 in Oslo. He did better as a coach, helping training partner Greg Duplantis to a win at Stockholm and rousing his agent, Tom Jennings, to cry, "We're paying you to beat him, not coach him!" (Fraley vaults for Jennings' Pacific Coast Club; Duplantis doesn't.).

Mike Powell was there, too, winning the long jump impressively at Helsinki and Stockholm. He wasn't at Oslo; no men's long jump. European meet promoters don't feel obligated to put on a complete program.

The result: Helsinki's program was over in three hours. Stockholm's lasted four but the first hour and a half consisted of B and junior events.

Oslo ran a US-type program of 6 1/2 hours but the Grand Prix events were crammed into the last three hours. (The first half of the meet included things like the women's 10K B race and—I am not making this up—the Norwegian youth snowball throwing championships.)

Like most European meets, these were well-run. Announcing was multilingual with periodic English reports; rotating electric scoreboards were provided for each field event. Helsinki and Stockholm also had Olympic-type giant scoreboards; when Oslo didn't, it was a jarring omission.

Another surprise was the fact that pole vault and high jump runways overlapped in all three locations, causing delays in both events, which invariably started early and finished late. The cross-traffic also appeared to contribute to sub-standard vertical jump marks.

But they must be doing something right. Look at the crowds.

Now about that fjord trip on the expense account....

BERT BONANNO

In an era when major American track and field meets are dropping out of sight, Bert Bonanno has found a way to keep his smack dab in the public eye.

The formula is simple: Have a meet that's dynamic, yet consistent. And make sure the athletes and sponsors are treated well enough to want to come back.

In 1977, Bonanno, now athletic director and assistant dean at San Jose City College, created the Bruce Jenner Classic and it was an instant hit. The meet's early years coincided with the golden age of the sport's popularity in this country and three world-records in the 110-meter high hurdles by Renaldo Nehemiah were its crowning achievements.

As the interest in track and field wanes nationally, however, the Jenner Classic has continued to strive. It's an event that, for at least one day, brings the sport to the front page of the local sports sections.

A standing-room-only crowd of 13,500 at SJCC and 1 million viewers on TBS watched

For example, an event such as the shot put is an afterthought at most meets, not a drawing card. Bonanno, however, took advantage of the wealth of world-class shot-putters in the San Jose area and gave them top billing.

He scheduled the event for the heart of the meet and had no other events scheduled at the same time. Therefore, the crowd was able to focus on it and discover that the shot put can have as much drama and excitement as the 100 meters.

"The shot putters know they'll be taken care of at the Jenner," he said.

This year, he made celebrities of the multievent athletes that don't often experience the spotlight in an invitational meet. Dave Johnson won a mini-decathlon and Jackie Joyner-Kersee took a mini-heptathlon title.

"When you see the press jump on something like that, you know you've hit on something that people like," he said.

Though Bonanno grew with the meet, he was not ignorant of the task at hand when he

Through his rapport with local companies, Bonanno was able to land Symantec as the major sponsor for the 1991 Jenner meet. Symantec, a major producer of personal computer software based in nearby Cupertino, had never had a previous business relationship with track and field before.

"We sit down with our sponsors after the meet and ask basic questions, such as, "Were you happy with your investment?" Bonanno said. "It's important for the sponsors to walk away with a good feeling."

Not to mention the athletes.

In the meet's formative years, Don Quarrie, the Jamaican Olympic gold medalist in the 200 at Montreal, sent Bonanno a "thank you" card after participating in the Jenner Classic. As much as the outstanding performances, that remains as one of Bonanno's personal meet highlights.

Through the positive words in the track community by respected athletes such as Quarrie, the Jenner meet has become perhaps the finest invitational in the country and one of only two Grand Prix meets held in the

While major indoor and outdoor meets in the state and across the nation have died off in the past few years, the Jenner continues to strive. They're are several reasons for a meet to fail.

"Perhaps they made too many promises to athletes that they couldn't keep," Bonanno said. "The dates may have been wrong. Maybe the sponsorship fell through.

"The key is being able to adjust to problems, not only after a meet, but during it. Don't get stubborn or you'll compound it. There's not one answer to the failure of a meet, it's a complex combination of facts that cause it. You have to ask yourself, 'Why didn't they watch it?"

He described a lack of a knowledgeable press as one problem the sport has had to overcome.

"There's a whole new gamut of sportswriters out there that don't have a feel for what's

But it's more than performance that brings the interest--it's innovation.

"You have to look what's going to draw fans," Bonanno said. "It's very important to be dynamic and creative. You have to show people that this is where you want to be on a Saturday afternoon."

began. He assisted Bud Winter at San Jose State for three years, was the national team coach of Mexico in the mid-1960's and led Peru during the 1972 Olympics.

He was a guest lecturer at the University of Vancouver, B.C., and one of his topics was "Promotion of Sports in the U.S." In 1965, he began working independently as a TV network liaison with various events and established strong ties with major advertisers that has continued to help him today.


going on in the sport," he said. "And consequently, track and field is relegated to the back page. Unless, there's a world record, there's no coverage.

"Someone's made a decision, as far as the press is concerned, that track is not important. We need to deal with that and change the focus from the negativity."

Few Bay Area newspapers have a track and field beat writer, but that hasn't slowed down the Bruce Jenner Classic.

Bonanno has not only continued the production of a fine meet, but has provided a model for meet directors around the country to follow.

But perhaps more importantly, Bonanno has shown the rest of the world that Americans don't loathe track and field—they're ready to embrace it.

August 8. Weltklasse Meet, Zurich, Switzerland--For 11 months, something wasn't quite right in the world of United States relay racing.

A blazing anchor leg by Carl Lewis helped change that Wednesday as the United States brought the 400-meter relay world record home in 37.67 seconds.

But, arguably, the star of the meet was Zambia's Samuel Matete, with a near record in the 400 hurdles.

Lewis, Leroy Burrell, Mike Marsh (Hawthorne High School 1985) and Dennis Mitchell were fired up in the relay by France's European champion team. The French shared the record with virtually the same United States lineup since a meet in Monaco last Saturday.

"All America, no French," chanted Lewis, who's blistering anchor leg sealed the mark. No split times were available.

The Americans, longstanding standardbearers in the 400-relay, were relegated to second-best last September, when the French team of Max Moriniere, Daniel San-

gouma, Jean-Charles Touabal, and Bruno Marie-Rose clocked 37.79. At Monaco, France dropped out after a bad baton change when the Santa Monica Track Club foursome of Marsh, Burrell, Floyd Heard, and Lewis tied their mark.

The French gave it a gallant try in Zurich Wednesday, finishing second in 38.39.

In the 400 hurdles, Matete powered past United States champion Danny Harris (Perris High School 1983) in the final stretch to win in 47.10—the second-fastest time ever behind Edwin Moses' 8-year-old world record of 47.02.

"When I saw Harris slowing down, I knew I would get him," said the 23-year-old Matete. "I'm not really surprised because I've been running well, but I didn't think I would get close to the record.

"Now I'm confident I can run under 47.02." Harris, who won last year in 47.86, was runner-up at 47.64.

Harris' lifetime best of 47.48 was run in 1987.

Matete's victory was his second in five days over Harris, who dominated the event last season-except for the Grand Prix final, where Matete snapped his 14-race unbeaten streak.

Moses, a now-retired two-time Olympic champion, set the world mark August 31, 1983 at Koblenz, Germany.

■ Steroids Pose Hazards for Teens:

The public commonly associates steroid use with big-time athletics. But the drugs may be even more of a menace to teenagers. Here is why:

The synthetic hormones can stunt a young person's growth by prematurely closing the ends of the long bones in the skeleton. That means that a 5-foot-7-inch, 15-year-old high school freshman who uses steroids "might get bigger but won't get any taller," a Baltimore physician says.

Nationally, nearly 7 percent of all boys try steroids before the end of high school, according to a 1988 study by Professors Charles Yesalis and William Buckley of Penn State University. The estimate comes from a poll of 3,400 seniors in 46 public and private schools across the United States.


Abusers of steroids do it to improve appearance or to excel at sports, Yesalis says. "Parents, teachers and coaches (make boys believe) that to be an ideal male you need to have these muscles. They say: You can't play games to have fun; you play games to win."

Such attitudes put many high school athletes at high risk of becoming abusers of steroids, Mike Gimbel, director of the Baltimore County Office of Substance Abuse, says. "For these athletes, the pressure to perform is incredible," he says. "It was inevitable that it would seep down to the high school level."

■ Mike Powell Sets World Long Jump Record:

August 31. Tokyo--Mike Powell (Edgewood High School, West Covina 1981) set a new world record in the long jump of 29-4 1/2 at the World Track and Field Championships. The old record of 29-2 1/2 was set by Bob Beamon at Mexico in 1968. It was the longest standing world record.

Beamon's record was set at 7,375-foot altitude with an aiding wind of 2.0 meters per second. Whereas, Powell's was made at sea level with an aiding win of 0.3 meters per second.

"The lowered air resistance at high altitudes produces better marks in the long jump." (Track & Field News' Little Blue Book).

In high school Powell was a high jumper and basketball player. He placed second in the 1981 State Meet high jump at 7-0. Maurice Crumby (Balboa, San Francisco) won the event at 7-0 on fewer misses.

Powell was born in Philadelphia on November 10, 1963. Thus, he was only four-yearsold when Beamon set his record.

International Sports Exchange "City to Surf Run" - Sydney, Australia

The 1991 Summer Cross Country and distance running trip for International Sports Exchange was the August 11th, Sydney, Australia "City to Surf" race. This event, one of the world's biggest road races, with 38,585 participants this year, was surrounded by ten days of touring by an ISE group from five different states. Veteran Australia traveler Jim Cervany, former San Diego State Cross Country and Track & Field Coach, led the group through some great tourist action and a successful racing experience in the 14 kilometer event that goes from the downtown Sydney area, through some beautiful suburbs, and finishes at the pretty Bondi Beach area.

Australia is a great place to vacation! August is supposed to be the middle of winter, but the August 5-14 trip featured super weather in the Sydney area, with daytime tempera-

tures from 65 to 75 degrees. It was great for running and the touring the group did. There was enough action to keep everyone on the move and motivated.

There is some real history to the Sydney area, back to the days of the early first convict settlers in what is called the "Rocks" area near the Harbor. The Sydney Opera House is famous worldwide, with the architecture and view of the harbor area prettier in person than in any postcard. A great Aquarium is located right next to the Opera House. The Sydney tower, over 1000 feet high, gives a great view of the entire city and suburb area. Paddy's Market was a swap meet equal to any you will find in the States. The group had a chance to view the shearing of sheep and pick up lessons on how to toss a boomerang at the Gledswood Homestead. Everyone had a chance to hold and have their picture taken with a Koala Bear and with baby Kangaroos at the Featherdale Wildlife Park. Great shopping is featured at the beautiful Darling Harbor area in the city. Many in the group brought back some of the famous Australian opal jewelery. The people of Australia are very friendly, with the King's English spoken by all.

The group stayed at the nice Metro Motor Inn in Ryde, some 20 minutes by the great public train system outside of Sydney. It was neat to stay out in a suburb area, where the group could get a feel for the people and the country--both were great! The trains into Sydney came within four blocks of the Hotel, with a round-trip ticket into the city just over \$2 round-trip. All types of food were available, with "fish and chips" having a special appeal, but a McDonald's staked out by those on the trip who wanted a taste of home every so often.

Oh veah, the race! The event is a real "allcomers" run, with entrants from former World Marathon Record Holder Rob DeCastella to 85 year old women, who walk the event of a little over 8 miles in something over four hours. Leading ISE participant was Jerrold Benally, a member of the fine Chinle High School program (in Arizona) and group from the school headed by Coach Lon Mason on the trip. Jerrold placed 184th (out of over 38,000!) with a time of 48:28. First female athlete was Erin Blunt, the national class prep hurdler, who is also a top runner on the State Champion San Pasqual HS of Escondido Cross Country squad, with Erin covering the course here in 64:12 for 3354th place (ahead of 35,000 others)! Coach Will Wester of San Pasqual led a group of San Diego area athletes on the trip. A couple of the injured crew for ISE walked the event, still finishing ahead of 10,000 in picking up their nice medal that all finishers were given as they crossed the line.

For the record, up front, Australian Steve Moneghetti took the race at 40:03, pretty wicked pacing for over eight miles with some ups and downs. Steve was given \$50,000 cash for breaking the course record on a morning perfect for racing.

The annual trip for International Sports Exchange marks a perfect end to summer cross country preparation, with the chance to combine a sport that a teenage athlete loves with travel to such a great place truly a "once in a lifetime" experience. Rating the State's Prep Track & Field Teams

Once again some time was taken to look at the State's Prep Track and Field Programs from a slightly different angle. With the State Meet scoring through six places it is difficult to get a feel for the depth of teams. The scoring system used in the following ratings has taken the top fifty marks achieved in each regularly contested state event, assigned 50 points for the best mark statewide, 49 for the second best, and so on down to one point awarded for the 50th best mark in an event. While it is by no means a perfect system it is done in the spirit of fun, and is another way to look at the fine programs in the State.

MEN

There were some real surprises, as usual. On the Men's side, a program long respected, Coach Mike Klepper's Morse High group from San Diego, emerged the winners by a narrow margin over always strong Hawthorne. Morse (342) featured perhaps the top gathering of horizontal jumpers ever at one California High School, with Terrence Sweet (23-4 3/4 & 48-8), Cary Taylor (23-2 1/2 & 48-8 1/4), Gary Taylor (23-0 1/2 & 47-5 1/4), and Teddy Lawrence (23-0 & 10.81 100m). 42.45 and 3:20.52 Relay groups helped show the overall strength of the program. Morse was 4th in 1990. The Hawthorne Cougars of Coach Kye Courtney were led to their second place total of 334 by junior hurdler Damond Smith (14.37 and 37.65), 41.66 and 3:19.0 relay squads, and a couple of pretty good horizontal jumpers in Donne Pfifer (23-8 1/2 & 47-3 1/2) and Derek Scurry (23-6 1/2 & 47-6 3/4). Third place Sac Joaquin Section power Vallejo (318) had Ali Evans (10.93 100m, 21.94 200m), Larry Evans (10.94 100m, 48.74 400m), Chris Redmond (14.39 HH and 37.75 IH), Dennis Williams (14.85 HH), 41.7 and 3:14.7 relay groups, and LaChales Coleman (48-2 1/2 TJ). Compton (316) had sprinters Ricky Carrigan (10.29-20.91-48.13) and Edward Hervey (21.47-47.13) leading 41.12 and

3:18.96 relay teams. Fifth place Thousand Oaks had the most scorers in the team competition, with sprinters Jack Bellamy, Bryan Krill, distance runner Eric Spayde, hurdleric Caso, and relay squads scoring 283 points. Consistent powers Esperanza (Anaheim) (5th 90) was 6th with 279.33, Locke (L.A.) (6th last year) was 7th with 275.83, and last year's champions, Washington (L.A.) was 8th at 266.5. Very strong over-all program Rubidoux (Riverside) was 9th with 236.5. San Dimas, by far the smallest school (with just over 1100 students) in recent years to rank so high, finished out the top ten with 233.56.

Winning totals continue to fall, with Hawthorne scoring a record 588.5 in 1989, Washington winning the 50-deep scoring in 1990 at 378.5.

With rankings of 11th, 3rd, 3rd, and 1st for John Muir of Pasadena over the last four years in this scoring, the Mustangs have never been far out of any recent championship team battles. 1991 was not a different story, as Muir totalled 495.5 to win for the second year in a row, with scoring from fifteen different individuals or relay groups in the competition. Sprinters Deannea Knowles (12.09-24.51-58.1) and Taminika Terry (12.30-24.57), hurdlers Shireen Brookhart (14.63), Akua Sutherland (14.64), and Ch'a Mosley (14.80 & 45.47), relay groups that raced 46.77 and 3:55.74, and jumpers Amber Roberts (5-6 HJ & 36-6 1/2 TJ) and Akua Sutherland (here also) (17-7 3/4 LJ & 38-1 1/2 TJ). Bakersfield, last year's winners with 520, was fourth this go-round at 408.5, with athletes scoring in nine different events. Mt. Carmel (San Diego), 6th last year, moved up one this time to fifth at 357. Marion Jones and Alycia Burnham led Rio Mesa to 326 for sixth. Bay Area powers James Logan (Union City) 300 and Bishop O'Dowd (Oakland) 285.5 were next, with Long Beach Poly (282) and Mission Viejo rounding out the top ten at 278.

A positive sample will result in loss of eligibility to be a member of the 1992 U.S. Olympic Track and Field Team as well as the opportunity to compete in the 1992 Olympic Games. Some prescription and over-the-counter medications contain banned substances.
