

ACROSS THE STATE

During the month of April, a host of mammoth schoolboy invitational meets as well as giant relay carnivals throughout the state saw the emergence of many stellar performances in Pennsylvania track & field. A sophomore strongman, Ron Semkin of Baldwin High School in Western Penna. became the first Shot Putter to exceed the 60 foot mark in that event. His best throw of 60.91/2 gives him a clear cut lead by over two feet. His nearest competitor, Jim Nelson of Bradford, who is a junior, has gotten off a best of 58.3. Semkin also has other tosses of 58.71/2 and 57.3. Mark Mondschein, the sensational Haverford pole vaulter, upped his personal best to 14.71/2, one half inch better than he did last year as a junior. However, the fact that his 14.71/2 mark was made in a driving rain at The Penn Relay high school invitational pole vault event, 4/24/70, gives one the impression that Mark is a shoe-in to become the first to clear the magical 15' barrier. On the all-time Pa. list, he ranks 2nd behind Tom Blair of Wissahickon who cleared 14.8 % in 1968. Mark is also a good high hurdler sporting a best of 15.0. His brother Brian, who is only a sophomore at Haverford is following in Mark's footsteps. To date he has cleared 12.0 in the pole vault and has run a 20.9 in the low hurdles. The Mondschein brothers teamed up in the pole vault relay event at the Lower Merion Relays on 4/18 to win the event for Haverford. Keep an eye on Bruce Hulse. also a senior at Haverford, who placed fifth in the Class A 880 run at State last year. Switching to a new event. the 120 HH, he has turned in a 14.7 already this year, and seems to be making rapid improvement each week.

In one of the many exciting early season dual meets, Oil City vs. Warren, which is always a great Northwestern Pa. rivalry, Oil City emerged victorious by a slim margin of 10 points, 80 to 70. On Oil City High School's beautiful eight lane all-weather track layout, Warren's thunderbolt sprinter, Dan Swanson reeled off one of the State's fastest furlong clocking, a 21.95, a great effort. His time in the 220 was retrograded or rounded off to 22.0 which puts him in a tie for second statewide with Randy Barnes of Abington. Swanson also posted a 10.1 in the shorter dash defeating favored Rick Weaver of Oil City by a margin of three yards. Rick Weaver came back later with a tremendous 49.5 effort in the open quarter defeating Warren's ace quarter-miler and javelin thrower, Ed O'Neil by three yards which was one of the most exciting races of the day. O'Neil clocked 49.9 his personal best and a school record, and Dave Anderson of Warren picked up the 3rd slot in 51.0. O'Neil, who is presently leading the state in the javelin event, threw 198.91/2 against Oil City, but has a best this season of 210.0.

In another hotly contested rivalry, between two Class A suburban Harrisburg sister schools; Central Dauphin vs. Central Dauphin East, two CD triple jumpers both bettered the school mark in the bounding event with underdog Jim Heilig gaining the nod over teammate Leroy Hughes 45.3 to 44.1. Hughes won the Long Jump with 21.8½. Dan Kuhn, also from CD, has thrown the javelin 197.10 this year, and is shooting for over 200 in the near future.


Unionville High School has produced the second 9.7 century sprinter this season in senior, Ron Miller. On April 22nd, in a duel meet, with two watches on him, he covered his 100 in 9.7 on both official 1st place watches. Last season, Miller was caught in a best time of 9.9 which was recorded at the State B championships.

WHY NOT A TRUE STATE MEET?

The first organized track and field meets were the Olympian games of ancient Athens. The Romans kept these games alive until 934 A.D. Since those times men were always curious as to who was the fastest or strongest of men and the spirit of competing in foot racing, rock throwing and jumping never has wained. The first track meet in the United States was in 1871, with the International Olympic games established in 1896.

The P.I.A.A. Track and Field Meet is the Scholastic Olympiad for many schoolboys whose schools are participating members in the P.I.A.A. Not involved in this competition are other athletes from the Philadelphia Public School Championship meet, the Pittsburgh Parochial Championships, and the Philadelphia Parochial Championships. No one could disagree that each division has produced excellent track and field performers, so why not get these young men together in one meet to determine an undisputed State Champ? To facilitate the process of elimination we could proceed by holding our respective meets but only the 1st and 2nd place winners from each of the four meets would meet at Franklin Field or any other site. After debits were cleared the remaining monies could be donated to charity. The outcome of such a meet would determine a more prestigious state champion and further enhance and improve the competitive spirit of the sport.

We at Pennsylvania Track and Field Review are anxious to hear your comments.



Pa. Track and Field Review wishes to congratulate Mr. Eulace Peacock, who was selected as the Honorary Referee at the 76th annual Penn-Relay Carnival. Peacock was one of our country's greatest sprinters in the 30's, running for Temple University from 1935-1937. His coach was the late Ben Ogden. Peacock set a world indoor record in the 60 yd. dash, long jump, and 100 meter dash. He has done 26-3 in the long jump. In 1937, Peacock was a winner in two events at the Penn Relays. He won the long jump (24-1) and the 100 yd. dash (9.8). He also won the long jump in 1935 with a leap of 25-1/4. Today, Eulace Peacock is President of the All-Star Trading Company, a meat packing concern in New York.





POLE VAULT...Dennis Red, Mechanicsburg High School Senior, is becoming a consistent 13-0 performer. Dennis cleared 13'3½" two weeks ago to win the Shippensburg Invitational. His most recent victory was scored at the Dickinson Invitational when he unpended last year's Dist. 3 winner Cliff Brown of Middletown with a 13'5" vault, best in the district so far this year. Dennis' effort was good for a meet record which smashed the 12'9" performance set by Brown the previous year. Though Cliff has been having trouble in the pole vault, we should not overlook the fact that this young man is a potential 14-0 vaulter. Brown should be tough when the District 3 meet is held in Lancaster, May 16. Larry Jenkins, Reading High School (Reading, Pa.) has done 12'11½".

100 YARD DASH ... Jimmy Scott, P.I.A.A. 100 yard dash champion (9.7) is out with a pulled hamstring muscle. Carlisle coach Stan Morgan, is resting Jim trying to get him ready before the district meet. Pat Petre (9.8) also of Carlisle injured his right leg in the 100 yard dash trails (Dickinson Invitational) and was inactive for the rest of the day. With both Scott and Petre sidelined, the 100 yard dash title was won by John Harris' (Big 33er) Chuck Venie. Venie was clocked in a respectable 9.9. Carlisle's Benn Carney was second.

MILE RUN ... Chambersburg's Tim Cook has run a 4:22.8, best in the district to date. This betters the 4:26 clocking by Conrad Weiser's Bob Yienst, and a 4:27.6 clocking by Exerter's Jim Ludwig.

880 YARD DASH ... Kane High owns the district's best time with a 1:59.8. Other runners closing in on that mark are: Muhlenberg's Art Evans, (2:00); Hershey's Don Curry, (2:00); and Exerter's John Sofranco, (2:00.9).

DISCUS ... Led by Palmyra's Ken Michielson with a 148-8 heave. Lee Stone (Big Springs) has thrown 147-10 and Scott Wagner also from Palmyra, 144-71/2.

MILE RELAY ... Helped by Freshman runner Bill Coles, William Penn of Harrisburg has run a 3:30.8 tops in the district. Coles was aided by Bill Stanford, John Williams and George Crummel.

TWO-MILE RELAY ... William Penn of Harrisburg again. Hoping to better the 7:56.5 that got them a second place medal at the P.I.A.A. state finals at University Park, the Tiger's from Penn are down to a 8:16.1. Returning are three runners from last year's team: George Crummel, John Williams, and Fred Jones. Coach Norm Mitchell is trying to stabalize the group by adding John Brown to the quintet. Brown has developed into a strong half-miler and should help the team considerably.

LONG JUMP ... Greg Gates (Scotland) has soared 23-0 in practice twice and has a 22-1½ (Shippensburg Invitational) and a 21-10 (Dickinson Invitational) to his credit. Both marks were good enough to establish meet records. Leroy Hughes (star running back for the Central Dauphin Rams) has set a new Ram record with is leap of 21-8.

TRIPLE JUMP ... Jim Heilig, Central Dauphin has the best jump in this area. Jim bounded and leaped to a 45-3 jump. Doug Dennison (McCasky High, Lancaster, Pa.) has done 44-3 and Hughes (Central Dauphin) 44-1.

HIGH JUMP ... The skyways in this area are shared by two jumpers, both of whom have a 6-3 jump to their credit. Lee Latham (Steelton-Highspire) and Bill Hines of Reading High School could push each other to a 6-6 height. Latham, a junior, has his sights set on a 6-9 jump!

HURDLES ... Tom Stackfield, 17, 6-6, athlete from Carlisle continues to dominate both the 120 yard high hurdles and the 180 yard lows. Tom, a dual winner in the two events at the Shippensburg and Dickinson Invitationals has a 15.1 (120 yard highs) and a 20.5 (180 yard lows) which make him one of the best timber-runners in the area. Cedar Cliff's Ted Hummel ran a 20.1 (180 yard lows) to set a new school record for that event. The Highland Park lad shows a lot of promise in the lowsticks and will be shooting for the first place medal at districts.

PENN HILLS WINS C-M RELAYS TITLE

Canonsburg, Pa. (April 18, 1970)...With four firsts and two second place finishes in the relays, Penn Hills High School easily won the team title in the 13th annual Canon-McMillan Relays with a total of 90 points. Baldwin was second with 58, Upper St. Clair third with 47 and Canon-McMillan finished fourth with 37. It was the fourth straight Canon-McMillan Relays title for Coach Gleen Davis' Indians.

Outstanding performances were turned in by Jeff Rideout, who anchored Penn Hills' victorious 440, 880 and Mile relay teams; Mei Brown of Canon-McMillan, who won both the high jump and long jump, and Ed Marstellar of Baldwin, who won the 440 in :50.4 and ran second in the 220.

Don Creehan of South Hills Catholic won the half-mile in the record time of 1:56.4, clipping 3 seconds off the old mark, and anchored South's 440 yard relay team to a fourth place finish.

The only other meet record came from the Niles McKinley (Ohio) Four Mile relay team of Tim Benedict, Rick Squiric, Dan Hofan and Les Nagy, breaking the old standard by almost 10 seconds with a 18:07.2 clocking. Penn Hills' George Taylor made a valiant effort to overtake Nagy, but his Niles' team mates had built too much of a lead and Nagy coasted to victory.

In the Medley relay, Taylor and Baldwin's Gary Gittings battled for two laps of the anchor mile until Gittings surprisingly kicked with a lap to go and lead Baldwin to a 7:48.5 victory. Penn Hills was second in 7:54.1. Jim Montgomery of Baldwin vaulted 13'4", but missed all three attempts at 13'7½." Montgomery had won earlier at 12'10".

FOOTNOTES: George Taylor of Penn Hills last week set a school record of 9:35.3 in the Two-Mile run in Penn Hills' 90½ - 54½ dual meet victory over Butler. Taylor went .2 under the old standard James Banner, the University of Pittsburgh Track Coach and founder of the Canon-McMillan Relays, announced Saturday that middle-distance star Les Nagy of Niles McKinley (Ohio), will enroll at Pitt next fall. Nagy has a best two-mile time of 9:20.0 and has already done a 4:13.7 mile this season This coming Saturday (April 25), Penn Hills is host to the W.P.I.A.L. Relays. The Indians have claimed the last titles



What makes these feats so amazing is that Swope doesn't use the conventional spin method employed by perhaps 99% of all high school discus throwers. There is no telling just how far the Bangor ace will go if he ever decides to use the spin.

As a soph in 1968 Swope hit 147-6 and copped the District title. Last year he again won the District title and earlier captured the League championship with a record-breaking mark of 160-11 3/4 in the trials. He then took a fifth in the PIAA Class B event (155-8). In 1970 Swope has added the Bangor High shot put record to his collection with a 50-7 toss. He has been a double winner in the two weight events every time out this spring.

The Bangor strongboy, who has unusual speed for a lad his size (10.6 in the 100), plans on a college careet. He's already had a track offer from Ohio State, which is, no doubt, also interested in his football ability (Swope is an interior lineman).

ACROSS THE STATE (continued)

At Norristown High School, Coach Robert Shoudt took over at the helm this season, and already has put together one of the states finest mile relay units -- all sophomores, who have clocked 3.24.2. The quartet consists of Mike Spearman, Mike Creciun, Stan Settle, and Vance Mcghee. During the winter season (indoor), Norristown had a perfect record of 9 and 0 and at the present time are undefeated during the outdoor season with a 9 and 0 record in duel meets.

Also, in the Philadelphia Area, Abington High School, the team which had the fastest state mile relay time last season (3.16.6), is leading in the event once again this year. They have clockings of 3.20.0 and 3.22.2, both recorded at the Penn Relays. Anchorman Bill Neely whipped up a swift 47.9 (flying start) on his anchor leg in the Suburban Philadelphia Mile Relay. Randy Barnes who led off with 48.8, is also another speed merchant for the Abington Ghosts, with times of 10.0 and 22.0 this year. Their best field man is Tom Lacey 56.1 in the shot and 160.9 1/4 in the discus.

Bartram High School of Philadelphia has perhaps the fastest sprinter in Philadelphia Proper in little Ron Shaw. In the mile relay race for Philadelphia Public Schools, he ran the leadoff leg and gave Bartram a five yard lead over the field of nine Philadelphia public schools. Bartram and Germantown battled on even terms for the greater part of the race until Bartram anchorman, Carl Wilson attempting to pass Germantown High School anchorman, Kerry Streets on the first turn, only to lose the baton. He gamely picked up the baton and continued running, but finished some 40 yards back in placing second with a 3.32.0. Germantown's time was 3.26.2.

Bristol's Gene White continued along at his record setting pace in April, reaching 24.6, 48.9%, and 6.9 in the jumping events. He also got off a fantastic wind-aided 50.0½ TJ which is the best windy mark for preps in the United States this year.

William Tennent High School of Warminster, Pa. has two half-milers under 1.57 secs. James Heidelberger with a 1.56.2 and Bruce Andrews 1.56.9 ranking 1st and 3rd statewide. Coatesville's trio of hurdlers are unbeatable this year thus far. All three are under 15 secs. Andy Smith 14.8, Ty Boggs, 14.9; and Larry Lewis, 15.0. Add Jim Joe in the lows, this quartet took first place in the 480 low shuttle hurdle event at The Lower Merion Relays with an excellent time of 54.9.

Bob Hillman of North Allegheny pulled off a phenomenal triple in three grueling events, in less than a span of only 1½ hours, at The West Penn Championships last

week. He showed his "ironman" abilities by winning the quarter in 51.7, the mile in 4.34.0, and placed second in the 880 in a respectable 2.01.8.

McKeesport's Herb Gibson put on quite a show for the fans at the triangular meet with Wilkinsburg and Hempfield on April 23rd. Gibson won the mile in 4.31.3, the 880 in a rapid 1.56.6, and anchored the winning mile relay team home in 50.9.

Bradford's two mile relay team should be a good one this year. In the Indiana Invitational Meet April 11, they clicked off an 8.23.5 with Dan Cutherson capable of doing 2.05; Paul Stiles, 2.06; Steve Whitaker 2.01; and Brian Hart, 2.02. Last year in the Class A PIAA State 440, Hart placed third in a time of 50.0 behind Abington's Neely, and Chambersburg's Van Barbour. These three-quarter milers are all in school this year, however, Barbour has been removed from the Chambersburg team for disciplinary reasons.

In outstanding duel meet competition in the western part of the state, Baldwin knocked off Mt. Lebanon by a close score of 73½ to 71½ and Penn Hills came back to hand Mt. Lebanon another setback, 83 to 62.

Harrisburg John Harris' Chuck Vennie, all state Big 33 football halfback, has been noted for his slow starts in the sprints this season. None the less, this fleet dashman has beaten two of Carlisle's Famed 9.8 and 9.9 sprinters by a comfortable margin on each and every meeting of the three. Vennie has three 9.9's to his credit, one of which is wind-aided.

It's been reported that a Berk's County Junior High School ninth grader named Jim Dutt has run a 10.1 in the 100 this year, a 10.2 and 22.8 as an eighth-grader last year. We are hoping to obtain more information on Dutt, which we will pass on to our readers.

Ty Higgins of Lower Moreland, powerful weight man and defending B State Champion in discus and shot will be hart to beat. Leading state in discus with 175.0 and a toss of 54.11 in the shot.

For the benefit of any coaches who may not have heard, the following changes will be in effect for the PIAA State Meet at Penn State this year:

- 1. The 220 yard dash will be run on the curve.
- 2. The flying start has been authorized for the 880 yard relay.
- The staggered start will be used for the mile and two mile runs.

MY LOOK AT TRACK

LEHIGH VALLEY REPORT

Bethlehem Liberty's All-State football star, Tommy Donchez, is starting to get sharp in the sprints. He's done the 100 in 10.3 and the 220 in a good 22 flat which ties the school mark set by Hal Peters in 1962. Donchez, District XI all-time 180 lows record holder (19.2), burned the 100 in 10 flat as a junior last year. He's 6-2, 195 and will attend Penn State on a grid scholarship.

Easton's Mickey Collins, only a junior, leads the distance runners with good 2:01.7 and 4:28.8 clockings. His only loss this spring came at the hands of Pottsville's Jim Messina, a 2:01 half-miler. Coach Ray Herman says Collins will probably go in the 880 and mile at the Districts rather than the 2-mile run where he's already done a 9:42.2.

A very unusual thing occured in the Easton-Wilson Boro dual at Wilson's track on Saturday, April 25 — the wierdest happening I have ever experienced at a track meet. All five of the boys entered in the 100 yard dash were disqualified by official starter, Joe Mamana, who reported that they had twice jumped the gun. Four of the five were eliminated after two attempted starts. The remaining sprinter (a Wilson boy) then shocked everyone by also jumping the gun for a second time. Mamana, himself, says that in his 40-year record of officiating track meets, he has never seen the above incident happen. Many of the fans (not to mention the opposing coaches and athletes) present were more than a little disturbed at Mamana's action taken.

Back to the stats scene. Another Liberty High star, junior Mike Hartenstine, turned in a record performance when he put the shot 53'1" for a new school mark. Hartenstine shows unusual track ability in that he also high jumps 6'1.

EIGHT JUMPERS OVER SIX FEET - District XI may well be one of the best areas in Pennsylvania when it comes to the high jump. At this writing 8 boys have cleared the six-foot mark with Palmerton's Bruce Kocher still the leader at 6'4.

SWIMMER TURNED TRACK STAR - Emmaus' 14 year old frosh swim star, Charlie Norelli who captured the PIAA 50-yard free style title, has best dash times of 23.5 and 53.3. That makes him one of the fastest frosh sprinters in Lehigh Valley annals.

McCaskey's Gordon Kraft and Wilkes-Barre G.A.R. Memorial's Vince Wojnar. Kraft reports that in 1969 Larry Martin of McCaskey triple-jumped 47'2½'' while in 1935 ex-Olympic great Barney Ewell leaped 23'9½'' in the long jump. Wojnar reports that Lonnie Dalton's 1967 high jump of 6'8¾'' should be changed to 6'8¼. Seems there was a clerical error made in this event during the PIAA state meet. It was brought to the attention of the officials but no change has ever been made in the record books.

WILL THE LNL EVER WAKE UP??

For several years the Lehigh-Northampton League has held its annual meet at Nazareth High which has pretty good track and field facilities. One exception would be the pole vault box which is only six inches (official rules require a box 8 inches deep) in depth. For statistical purposes all measured vaults at Nazareth's track should thus be reduced 2 inches. The LNL, however, shows its lack of track knowledge by refusing to go along with this accepted method which has been used by "Track and Field News" for many years.

In last year's meet Parkland's Bob Plarr "broke" the meet record when he vaulted 13'2 7/8" according to meet officials. This writer brought to the attention of officials and sportswriters the fact that Nazareth High's vault box was 2 inches shy of accepted standards. They refused to listen and the papers carrying the meet's results showed that Plarr vaulted 13'2 7/8". I content that the mark not only should have been reduced to 13'7/8" but further reduced to 13'3/4" in abiding with the rules which state that the pole vault measurement be lowered to the nearest 1/4 inch.

It appears that the Lehigh-Northampton League will never really develop its track program to its fullest extent until some of the "out-of-date", stubborn officials are kicked out of the circuit.
