EDITORIAL

Previews?

You can feel it in the air; just between the heat of summer and the cool of winter. This feeling is partly due to the start of another academic calendar. Along with the September peal of the school bells comes the anxious expectation of, once again, a brand new cross country season.

Cross country is the kind of thing that you really have to have done, personally, in order to fully appreciate and savor the drama of each new season. There is an excitement and optimism in new beginnings. Cross country coming at the beginning of the school year, is full of eager anticipation. Most coaches are looking for early pre-season previews and rankings to wet their appetite for things to come.

Pre-season polls don't really mean much. It's the end of the season poll, determined in the championship meets that is what counts. However, those polls get us excited and provide an opportunity for some much needed harrier publicity.

What's it look like on the impending California prep cross country scene? There are a lot of good returning runners out there to consider, but it's the newcomers who really make pre-season predictions tricky. One thing you can usually count on is that successful programs breed successful programs. California high school cross country will be no exception to this principle.

On the boy's side, long-time hill and dale developer Jack Farrell will, no doubt, be climbing the Woodward Park victory dais in Fresno at season's close. Look for Jack to climb those steps twice: once for the Thousand Oaks boys and, again, for

the Thousand Oaks girls. Another longtime successful program that will figure at the top (boys) is the Sacramento Jesuit team headed coached by Walt Lange. Southern California's Joe Kelley coached Peninsula team will also be at the top of the girls heap.

Just as tricky as pre-season team favorite picks is trying to outguess who the individual leaders will be. Top boys look to be Brett Strahan out of Newhall, Mike Stember from Sacramento, Eleazar Hernandez from Camarillo, Antonio Arce from Palmdale and Jess Fischer from Thousand Oaks. For top girls, look for Emily Allison of San Jose, Julia Stamps from Santa Rosa, Molly Mehlberg from Palos Verdes and Annie Ebiner of Glendora. Don't overlook the return of Agoura High's Amy Skieresz.

The only thing about pre-season picks that you can count on, is that you can't count on pre-season picks. That's one of the exciting things about the sport. Who will the winners be? That's why we have championship events. See you at Balboa Park, Mt. SAC, Woodward Park, Belmont, Rocklin, etc., etc., etc. I can tell you then who number one is.



For the first time this year, we've added a girl's pole vault list. (A special thanks here to Ed Seese, who provided Northern California girl's marks). I understand that the event was strictly an exhibition at this year's State Meet, but, as far as I'm concerned, Melissa Price is the first state girl's PV champion and her winning mark the state meet record.

The various CIF sections treated the event with varying degrees of serious-

ness. The Central Section added it to the sectional meet program (as a nonscoring event) and held qualifications at its regular area qualifying meets. It's hardly coincidence that the section produced not only the first state champion, but also the American record holder.

By the time you read this, the California Interscholastic Federation will have decided what it's going to do with this event. What it should do is add it to the program as a scoring event. The arguments that there aren't enough competitors or that the level of competition is too low won't hold water. Based on our experience with other new events and the history of girl's track in general, we can say, "Add it as a scoring event and watch it take off." (Ed Seese thinks it's possible for a woman with 12-flat 100 speed to vault 17 feet. That may be a while down the road, but I'll predict this within 10 years--A national high school record of 13-6 to 14 feet and the event on the Olympic program.)

ase to a distance runner is the foundation on which all facets of distance running training are built. You cannot build a house to your specifications until you lay a proper foundation, nor can you reach your racing goals until you establish a proper base.

Exposing the circulatory system to an accelerated heart rate for periods of 45 minutes to 2 hours forces blood into latent capillary beds causing an increase in the blood flow to the muscles. The more capillaries that can be developed around each muscle fiber the greater the capacity for oxygen delivery. The more oxygen that reaches the working muscles, the greater the capacity for producing aerobic energy.

Time must also take place as well as effort. The more hours, days, months and years that the body is exposed to an ic. It is a specific pace, tailor-made for each individual and to that individual's level of fitness.

The mainstay of a distance runner's training is base running, which constitutes approximatelyh 75% of all mileage runs. Base miles are run at 70-75% of the individual runner's VO2 Max pace or at 80-85% of an individual's maximum heart rate.

A good way to estimate VO2 Max pace is by running as far as possible around a 400 meter track in 10 minutes. If a person can run 3000 meters in 10 minutes their VO2 Max pace is 300 meters per minute and converts to a 5:20 mile. Base pace for this person would be between 210 and 225 meters per minute or 7:09 to 7:20 per mile.

Running at a specific pace will cause an individual's heart to reach a rate that is specific to that person's level of fitness. The use of a heart monitor is the most accurate way to train. A good way to determine an individual's maximum heart rate is to warm up and run 2 hard 800s separated by 1.5 minutes of rest. The heart rate at the end of the second 800M represents that person's MHR.

high intensity training as it falls into a person's training sceheme.

Base running must be kept up during all phases of a workout scheme and always constitutes the major portion of mileage run. When mileage goes up base mileage goes up. When mileage goes down, base mileage goes down, but the percentage of base mileage stays the same. Base mileage is not defined as Long, Slow mileage but rather steady state running at a specific submaximal pace. Running some of the base mileage in hills is highly recommended, as going up and down hills recruits some of the fast twitch fibers. Steady state running at a pace that is 70-75% of VO2 Max pace with a few 30-90 second surges will also keep the fast twitch fibers activated. One should never ignore fast twitch fiber stimulation when doing extended periods of aerobic work.

Everyone should plan extended periods of time where they only do base pace running. This is necessary to develop capillaries for better blood supply to the working muscles.

High school and collegiate runners have set competitive schedules so these athletes do their base expansion during the summer months and during December, January and February, prior to track season.

For these athletes, summertime is a perfect time for a gradual build-up of mileage. During the winter months, high school and collegiate distance runners should strive for their highest mileage of the year, as the weather is cooler and there is usually more time for running.

Those who are not bound to a school schedule can plan their strictly base running around important races. Periods of 6 to 12 weeks are recommended for the best results. If your major races are during the winter months, do your base training during the fall, etc. An occasional 5K race during your base period is OK and may help keep your interest

accelerated steady state heart rate the better the delivery of oxygen and the better the endurance of the individual, up to a set point. Each person eventually reaches a point at which steady state running will produce only a minute increase in endurance.

The intensity of the base running is an individual thing and is related to each person's level of fitness. Contrary to some definitions, base running is specif-

Running at 80-85% of MHR is a good pace for establishing base. EXAMPLE: MHR = 196, 80% is equal to 156, 85% is equal to 167. Running at an effort that causes the heart to beat 155 to 160 beats per minute would be the best pace to develop a good base.

Since base running is done a sub maximal pace the working muscles and joints that are involved in running are strengthened, helping prepare them for

BERKELEY HIGH SCHOOL REQUIRES ID'S FOR STUDENTS AND STAFF

BERKELEY, August 15--James Henderson, the principal of Berkeley High School, sent the following letter to the Berkeley High School Community:

Providing a safe campus for every individual must be our highest priority at Berkeley High School. To accomplish this important objective it is necessary to make some fundamental changes in the day-to-day operations of our school. Beginning with the new school year, during school hours, the BHS campus will be open only to BHS students and staff and identified visitors.

The Staff Senate, Department Chairpersons and the School Safety Committee have provided leadership for some basic changes to be implemented in September. These changes listed below are extremely important to making BHS safe for everyone:

- Students will be required to have their ID card with them at all times and show it when requested.
- 2. All staff will be required to wear a visible ID card at all times.
- 3. All students out of class must be in possession of a pass periods 2-7. During periods 1-8 all students in the hallways must have a pass.

- Teachers in teams, will spend their supervision period in an assigned hallway providing safety for students and staff.
- 5. All gates to the campus will be closed between the hours of 8:50 a.m. to 11:25 a.m. and 12:10 p.m. to 3:30 p.m. The South Milvia gate will be attended all day until 3:30 for people entering and leaving campus. All gates will be open for lunch.
- Campus monitors will be wearing yellow security jackets for easy identification.
- 7. All visitors must report to the principal's office and obtain a visitor's pass.

(Prep Editor: These changes are certainly a sign of the times. Berkeley, the home of free speech, has been forced to get tough in order to fight crime. I never thought, when I started teaching in the Berkeley schools in 1968, that one day I would be required to wear an ID card and become a policeman. Although I regret that these changes are necessary, I still support them. I would be interested to hear from other coaches about the policies at their high schools. Does anyone else have to wear ID cards? Incidentally, a few years ago I had three students throw stones at me on campus, even though they didn't even know me.)

■ BENEFACTOR AIDS KICKERS--COMPUTER CHIP COMPANY WILL PAY TRACK TEAM'S WAY TO JUNIOR OLYMPICS

SAN JOSE, July 27--The members of the West Side Kickers Track Club figured their season was over. After qualifying six members of the team for the National Junior Olympics Championships this week, they didn't have the funds to attend the meet. But instead of sitting at home wondering how they would have fared, the Oakland-based team will be on the track in Gainesville, Fla., competing against the best America has to offer thanks to a generous donation from a San Jose computer chip manufacturer.

"I'd already started preparing for football season," said Hasani White. "I stopped working out (for track), but now I've got to catch up."

White, 16, will be entered in the long jump, triple jump and high jump. After the Kickers' plight was broadcast on radio station KCBS Friday, Cypress Semiconductor of San Jose stepped in to provide the round-trip airfare to Florida at a cost of about \$3,000. Other groups, including BASS Tickets and members of the Santa Rita Employees Assoication, have also donated to help pay for the Kickers' lodging, said head coach Bernard White.

Cypress CEO T.J. Rodgers ran the 100-yard dash in 10.6 when he was a high school student in Oshkosh, Wisconsin. He said it took him even less time to figure out what to do once he heard the story on his car radio.

"The decision making process took about two seconds," Rodgers said. "After I heard the story on the radio, I came into the office Monday and told my staff to get them whatever they need to get them there."

Rodgers said he was impressed with the amount of time the Kickers parents and athletes spend on raising money so they can go on trips such as the one to Florida. But after qualifying at the regional meet in San Jose two weeks ago, there just wasn't enough time to raise that amount of money.

"This one was just an accident," he said of the donation. "If I wasn't listening to the radio at that time...

Powell's best legal jump was 27-4.

Francisco 83) placed sixth in the discus

at 193-3. Katy McCandless (Castilleja, Palo Alto 88) placed sixth in the 3,000 meters in 8:59.64 on July 24. McCandless also placed fourth in the 5,000 meters in 15:35.81 on July 29. WINNIPEG, August 1 (Reuter)-Organisers of a bid to bring the PanAmerican Games to Winnipeg in 1999
were elated Monday after the central Canadian city was selected to host the
Games for the second time.

"This will just be bringing the Games home," said Winnipeg Mayor Susan Thompson.

The city, which hosted the 1967 Pan-Am Games, beat Santo Domingo, Dominican Republic, and Bogota, Colombia, in the competition to host the 1999 Games.

The next Pan-Am Games will be held in Mar de Plata, Argentina in 1995. The Pan-Am Games will involve over 6,000 athletes from 42 nations of North, South and Central America and the Caribbean.

"All Canadians can be proud that Winnipeg will host the Pan- American Games," Prime Minister Jean Chretien said in a statement.

■ BEST-EVER USA PERFORMANCE AT WORLD JUNIOR MEET

INDIANAPOLIS, Indiana, August 1--American athletes took 17 medals (five

gold, eight silver, four bronze) at the International Amateur Athletic Federation World Junior Championships in Lisbon, Portugal, July 20-24. No U.S. team had produced such a medal harvest at the four previous world junior meets, for athletes under 20 years of age. Russia had a total of eight medals, matching the U.S. with five golds and picking up a silver and a pair of bronze medals. Second to the U.S. in total medals was Kenya, with 10 (3-4-3).

■ LOCAL TRACK ATHLETES STAND OUT AT JUNIOR OLYMPICS

GAINESVILLE, Fla., August 1-Local athletes representing the Acorn Track Club and 3M Track Club stood out among a field of more than 6,000 athletes at the U.S. Track & Field Junior Olympics during the weekend.

Acorn runners took five top three finishes at the meet and 3M, only able to send two of 18 athletes that qualified to the meet, because of financial constraints, took three top three finishes. Natasha Neal of 3M placed second in the nation in the youth girls 100 hurdles with a time of 14.1. Neal, 14, also finished second in the 200 hurdles with a time of 26.7. Both times are 3M club records.

Kymberlee Towns also won a silver medal for 3M. Towns placed second in the midget girls shot put with a heave of 35-foot-1. She finished 10th in the discus.

The Acorn Girls 17-18 relays continued to shine. The quartet of Angela Harris (Skyline, Oakland), Aisha Wallace (Skyline), Malika Freeman (Skyline 1993) and Reyna Goodwin (Skyline) won the 4x100 relay when Harris overtook the anchor runner of the Texas Wildcats in the final leg. Their winning time was 46.39. Acorn also won the 4x400 relay with Kaselah Crockett (Skyline) running for Goodwin. The time of 3:40.46 was the fastest time recorded this year in the 17-18 age group.

Individually, Harris won the 400 hurdles, just missing the national record of 58.77 with a time of 58.79. Freeman placed third in the 400 with a time of 56.24 and Crockett finished eighth with a time of 57.50.

The Acorn Youth relay (Tamilla Brown, Anita McCallum, Tasha Williamson, and Aisha Margain) placed third in the 4x100 with a time of 48.39. The foursome placed fifth in the 4x400 with a time of 3:59.43. Margain added a fourth placed finish in the youth 400 with a time of 56.19. (Oakland Tribune, August 2)

■ HERCULIS GRAND PRIX

MONTE CARLO, Tuesday, August 2-The Herculis Grand Prix track and field meeting gives Europe's leading athletes the chance to reach top gear and earn some cash before the European Championships start on Sunday.

Mike Marsh (Hawthorne 1985) placed sixth in the 200 meters in 20.64 (0.0). Dean Starkey (Maine West HS, Des Plaines, IL 1985/James Logan HS, Union City 1984) placed ninth in the pole vault at 18-4 1/2. Regina Jacobs (Argyll Episcopal Academy, North Hollywood 1981) placed third in the 1,500 meters in 4:02.15. It is the American leading time and the fastest since 1988.

■ JOYNER-KERSEE WALKS OUT OF GRAND PRIX

MONTE CARLO, August 2--Jackie Joyner-Kersee, arguably the best female athlete in the world, pulled out of a top Grand Prix meeting on Tuesday in an apparent squabble over appearance money. Although no official reason was given for her late withdrawal and that of men's 400 meters Olympic champion Quincy Watts (Taft, Woodland Hills), neither athlete appeared to be suffering from any injury when they arrived in Monte Carlo on Monday.

Joyner-Kersee, the world and Olympic heptathlon champion and Watts are both coached by Joyner-Kersee's husband Bobby Kersee, and both were understood to have left Monaco on Tuesday afternoon. Although there was no official comment, it was widely believed the pair quit after organizers refused their demands for increased appearance fees.

TOM MCGUIRK (IRELAND/CALIFORNIA 94/ST. IGNATIUS HS, SAN FRANCISCO)

HELSINKI, Finland, August 7--Tom McGuirk (Ireland/California 94/St. Ignatius HS, San Francisco) placed sixth in heat two of the 400 meter hurdles in 50.84. There were five heats. The first two in each heat and six fastest qualify for semi-finals. McGuirk did not qualify. The slowest qualifying time was 50.28.

■ JUNIOR OLYMPICS A SUCCESS

INDIANAPOLIS, August 8--Twentyone records fell at the U.S. Junior Olympic Track and Field Championships at
the University of Florida's Percy Beard
Track in Gainesville, July 26-31. More
than 6,000 athletes between eight and
18 years old entered USATF's premier
youth meet, which offers competition in
five age divisions.

"This thing gets bigger every year, said Gator coach John Webb, who served as meet director. "In the 1970s and 1980s you basically bought yourself a medal at this meet. Not that many kids could afford to travel to a national meet. Now, you have a lot more sponsors --- even parks and recreation departments are getting in on it --- for youth track clubs. This is a real track meet now.

Sharing Webb's optimism is Lance Phegley of Starting Line magazine. "Some of what you see in... the newspapers about the demise of track and field is much ado about nothing," Phegley told Buddy Collings of the Gainesville Sun. "Age group track is definitely growing. Look at the numbers from this meet." On hand for the NJO's were former long jump world record holder Bob Beamon, who served as grand marshal, plus special guests Robin Campbell and Cliff Wiley. Campbell and Wiley are among the many Junior Olympians who have used the NJO meet as a springboard to the Olympic Games. USATF consultant Marty Weiss estimates nearly 70 per cent of each U.S. Olympic track and field team is made of Junior Olympic alumni. "Myself, Quincy Watts (Taft, Woodland Hills 1988), Jackie Joyner-Kersee, Gail Devers (Sweetwater, National City 1984) --- all of these athletes have come through the Junior Olympics," Campbell told the Sun.

"This is the most amazing thing I ever saw...the biggest track meet I've ever seen," said former University of Florida assistant coach Dick Jones on the fifth day of the U.S. Junior Olympic Championships. "Yesterday (Thursday, July)," the 79-year-old Jones told the *Gaines-ville Sun*, "was the biggest crowd that's ever been in this place."

The crowd swelled to even greater proportions on Saturday, July 30. A total of 9,265 fans were on hand, breaking the Percy Beard attendance record and, claim meet officials, topping the record for the largest crowd at a track meet in the state of Florida.

Among the spectators was Roger Mosley, a former scholastic hurdler who is best known for his playing the helicopter pilot 'T.C.' on the television series "Magnum P.I." Mosley is a coach for the Pasadena (Calif.) Running Roses club. His daughter Ch'a (pronounced chee'ah), is a Junior Olympic product who is now on scholarship at Georgia Tech. Mosley, a self-described playground rat as a kid, took a turn announcing the meet from the press box.

■ REEBOK REGAINS FOOTING BY EXPANDING PRODUCT OFFERINGS

By Marilyn Much Investor's Business Daily

After watching its growth slow to a crawl over the past two years, Reebok International Ltd. has regained some financial footing as it benefits from a move into new footwear and apparel markets and renewed vigor overseas. Stoughton, Mass.-based Reebok is the No. 2 maker of athletic footwear with a 19% share of the total world market, according to Sporting Goods Intelligence, an industry newsletter.

Reebok's other lines include casual footwear, such as Rockport, and Reebok apparel.

Getting Fit Again

But it has been in the fitness market where Reebok had made its mark over the years. Throughout the 1980s, Reebok profited handsomely from its strong position in athletic footwear.But all that changed in the 1990s when, amid growing competition, industry fundamentals

changed. Sales of athletic footwear peaked and consumers traded in their sneakers for casual outdoor shoes like hiking boots. Reebok Chairman and Chief Executive Paul Fireman began steering the company along a new course, expanding into outdoor and rugged casual footwear, shedding lack-luster businesses in apparel and beefing up its presence overseas.

Now the strategy is starting to pay off. (Prep Editor: The preceding article appeared in Investor's Business Daily on August 8, 1994.)

■ GIRLS PARTICIPATION IN PREP SPORTS INCREASING -- TRACK IS THE SECOND HIGHEST PARTICIPATION SPORT FOR GIRLS

KANSAS CITY, Mo., August 9-- The increasing number of girls in high school athletics has boosted overall participation to the third-highest level in 24 years, the National Federation of State High School Associations said Tuesday. The group reported that participation in high school athletics increased for the fifth straight year in 1993-94. The federation has conducted the survey since 1971. The survey is based on figures from state high school associations across the country. It found there were 5,614,980 athletic participants during the last school year, the highest since the baby boom figure of 6.5 million in 1977-78. The 1993-94 figure is up by 201,102 from the previous year --127,266 in girls' sports, 62,141 in boys' sports and 11,695 in coed sports. The survey said there were 2,124,755 participants in girls' athletics, more than 41,000 ahead of the record set in 1977-78.

Bruce Howard, a federation spokesman, said that athletic participation by girls is up in part due to an increase in opportunities.

"Participation has, perhaps, plateaued for boys. For girls, in fast-pitch softball

and soccer, for example, more and more schools are starting those sports," Howard said. "So, you have a continual increase in chances for girls to participate." Basketball remained the most popular sport among girls with 412,576 participants. Fast-pitch softball registered the biggest gain with an additional 1,086 schools and 31,480 participants nationally. Girls soccer continued a rise in popularity, with participation increasing by more than 17,000 in the past year. Participation has increased from 23,475 in 1975 to 166,173 last year.

The top 10 girls' participation sports in 1993-94 were basketball 412,576; outdoor track and field, 345,700; volleyball, 327,616; fast-pitch softball, 257,118; soccer, 166,173; tennis, 136,239; cross country, 124,700; swimming and diving, 102,652; field hockey, 53,747, and slow-pitch softball, 41,118.

Football continued to be the most popular sport for high school boys and it registered the biggest gain -- 17,727 -- in the number of participants.

The federation said interest in boys' soccer parallels the growth in the girls' competition. Participation was up by 13,443 over the previous year to 255,538. Participation in the sport has almost doubled since 1979 when there were 132,073 participants and has pushed it ahead of tennis, cross country and wrestling in popularity.

The top 10 boys' participation sports in 1993 were football, 928,134; basketball, 530,068; baseball, 438,846; outdoor track and field, 419,758; soccer, 255,538; wrestling, 233,433; cross country, 162,188; tennis, 135,702; gold, 131,207, and swimming and diving 81,328. There were sizable increases in the number of schools offering each of the top 10 sports except tennis.

"While schools have budget problems and some sports have been cut, schools are finding ways to keep programs afloat. The numbers are continuing to increase," Howard said. In the listing of athletic participants by state, Texas was tops with 567,470. California followed with 489,617; New York,

296,438; Ohio, 277,526; Michigan, 261,573; Illinois, 253,408; Pennsylvania, 220,552; New Jersey, 180,613; Wisconsin, 159,951, and Florida, 157,325.

HENGELO, Netherlands, August 9-Drug sales to tourists OK'D: A judge
ruled Monday that a coffee shop in the
border town of Hengelo may sell marijuana and hashish to foreigners, striking
down a local law banning drug sales to
tourists. The Happy Days Coffee Shop
in Hengelo on the German border was
shut down in June for violation the 1992
municipal law. But a court ruled Monday
that the policy excluding foreigners was
discriminatory. Hengelo is the site of an
international track meet each June.

■ "CARL IS A WUSS," POWELL (EDGEWOOD, WEST COVINA 1981) SAID.AT PAN-AFRICA-USA

DURHAM, North Carolina, August 12 (Reuter) - World record holder Mike Powell (Edgewood, West Covina) pulled out a victory in the men's long jump on his last attempt as he battled hamstring and heel injuries. Powell's winning effort, which he described "as the ugliest jump in track and field history," was a mere 8.02 meters (26 feet, 3 3/4 inches), far from his world record of 8.95 meters (29 feet, 4 1/2 inches). But under the circumstances the American was more than happy with the victory. His injuries would have stopped many athletes from competing, he noted, and chastised Olympic champion Carl Lewis for not attending the meeting, which matches athletes from the United State and the African continent.

"Carl is a wuss," Powell said of Lewis, who declined to accept the financial offer organizers made him. " Carl should be out there jumping with me. He's the defending Olympic champion, but he won't compete against the best in the world. That's weak."

GAIL DEVERS (SWEETWATER, NATIONAL CITY 1984)

DURHAM, North Carolina, August 12 (AP)--Gail Devers (Sweetwater, National City 1984), the 1992 Olympic gold medalist in the 100 meters and American record holder in the 100-meter hurdles will miss the remainder of the 1994 track and field season with a left hamstring injury. Devers was slated to run in the Pan Africa-USA Track and Field Meet in Durham.

"It didn't get well until a couple of weeks ago, just after her last training bouts," Devers' coach Bob Kersee said. "She is not up to par where I wanted her, so I just decided to back her off for the rest of the season and have her concentrate on getting totally healthy and being prepared for 1995."

According to Kersee, Devers was struggling with the hamstring during the indoor season. She aggravated it at the national championship at Knoxville, TN., in June. Although Devers has recovered, Kersee suggested rest.

"I just didn't want her to try to come back too fast and aggravate it again and push herself further back next year," he said. "I just determined last week not to run her anymore."

Kersee predicted that Devers will come back stronger than ever --but only after more rehabilitation and work with a physical therapist. She'll also have to overcome the lack of competition.

"She knows once that decision is being made by me, it's nothing she can do about it but live with it, bottle that and save it for next year," he said.

USA-PAN AFRICAN

DURHAM, N.C., August 13--Mark Crear (Rowland, Rowland Heights 87) won the 110 hurdles in 13.20 (1.5), the

American leading mark and a personal record. His previous best was 13,26 in 1993. It equals the 12th best performer alltime in the world and eighth best in the U.S. The U.S. 4x400 relay team of Calvin Davis 45.4. Quincy Watts (Taft HS, Woodland Hills 1988) 44.8, Octavius Terry 46.4, and Jason Rouser (Nike LA) 45.1, won in 3:01.70.

■ U.S. CAN GET BACK ON THE FAST TRACK

DURHAM, N.C., August 14--Mike Powell (Edgewood, West Covina 1981) added some unexpected sizzle to the Pan African-USA track and field meet when he castigated Carl Lewis, his rival and arch-enemy, for avoiding him in the long jump. In the middle of an upbeat news conference after his dramatic victory Friday in the long jump, Powell, who astonished the world in 1991 by jumping 29 feet 4.50 inches to break Bob Beamon's 23- year-old record, chastised Lewis for ducking out of the two-day dual meet.

One reporter asked Powell whether his victory would have been sweeter had Lewis been present. Powell, noting that he was competing with a bruised heel and pulled hamstring, lit into Lewis.

"Carl should be out there jumping with me," Powell said. "I came out here, I could barely run, messed up heel, but I jumped anyway. Carl says his back is sore or 'It's too cold today so I won't jump.' That's not a champion. If you're going to be a champion, you got to jump when you're hurt. He's the defending Olympic champion and he won't even compete against the best in the world. That's weak."

Powell, by the way, has signed a sixfigure contract with USA Track and Field to compete in five of its indoor-outdoor meets, though he said he would have shown up anyway.

"Carl is the icon of our sport," Powell said. "We need him out there for matchups. He's running against Linford Christie and Leroy Burrell, but he won't come to the long jump pit. Because of my breaking Bob Beamon's record and everything, we have the most romantic duel - it's the most looked-at matchup. But he pulled out."

Powell did pretty well as a solo act. He seemed on his last leg after each of his first two jumps and passed on his third and fifth attempts. But when it counted, Powell uncorked "the ugliest jump of my life" on his final attempt and won with a leap of 26- 3.75.

In one fluid motion Powell floated from pit to the track, knelt and kissed the track as cameras zoomed in. Moments later he tossed pieces of his uniform to screaming young fans draped over the wall. I'm not sure the pit would have been large enough for Lewis and Powell. But track and field certainly is.

Friday was a great day of track and field, but only 5,500 watched it. The meet's marketing manager pulled out near the end and Leroy Walker, president of the U.S. Olympic Committee and co-founder of the meet, changed the days from Saturday and Sunday to Friday and Saturday to accommodate ath-continued next page...

letes who are competing in Zurich, beginning Wednesday. Beyond all these specific logistical problems, everyone has a personal laundry list of what generally ails track and field. Some say the failure to have more meets on television heads the list. But merely putting a meet on television won't solve the sport's failure to promote itself.

With basketball, football and baseball consuming so many young potential athletes, track, which has been a fully professional sport in the United States for nearly 12 years, has to do a better job of letting would-be athletes know that the sport is no longer a bastion of amateurism. Not only can you get paid, but running is a viable route to education, global travel and a good living.

"People don't realize that we are professionals," Powell said. People are still asking me, 'What do you do for a living?' I say, 'I'm a professional athlete and I make seven figures a year."

"I think part of the problem is that a lot of people in decision-making positions have a purist track and field mentality: You go out there and run for love of your country. That's good, that's what we do when the Olympics come around. But when you get that Olympic medal it's not going to keep rain off your head--you can't eat it. You've got to make some money."

Track and field is not dead in the United States, and it's not dying. It's simply too controlled. Track athletes are regulated by USA Track and Field, which governs every level of the sport from elite to seniors to high schools and group competition. It's like the National Basketball Association trying to keep its hands on everything from peewee basketball to the Dream Team.

What has been lost, subsequently, is the creative instinct for marketing a sport that represents one of the purest forms of sports competition: Who runs fastest, who jumps highest, who throws farthest? The magnet of sports is polarity: offense-defense; good guy- bad guy; obstacle presented-obstacle overcome.

Walker-chuckled when he heard how

Powell had challenged Lewis. He understood that Powell's words were meant as a challenge.

"You need to have a rivalry," he said.
"You have to have two clearly evident, opposing forces."

meters. "I think I am back in shape and want to show consistency in the next races so that I can be ranked No. 1 at the end of the season in both the 200 and 400 meters."

Americans finished one-two-three in the 400 meters with Derek Mills the winner at 44.93, followed by Quincy Watts (Taft, Woodland Hills 1988) at 45.03 and Steve Lewis (American, Fremont 1987) at 45.12. Johnny Gray (Crenshaw, Los Angeles 1978) placed sixth in the 800 meters in 1:48.36.

The rain -- torrential at times -- and wind ended any prospect of a world record at a meeting normally blessed with a warm, still night.

Colin Jackson, who planned to attack the 12.91 he set when winning the world 110m hurdles title a year ago, ran 13.19. But he had the satisfaction of his 13th straight victory of the season, ahead of Mark Crear's (Rowland, Rowland Heights 1987) 13.29.

Mike Powell (Edgewood, West Covina 1981) won the long jump at 27-4. Mozambique's world champion Maria Mutola, who ran in the 1992 Kinney Western Regional Cross Country Championship in Fresno as a high school senior at Springfield, Oregon, ran the fastest women's 800 meters of the year, but her world record bid was thwarted by rain. Mutola ran a brave last 300 meters alone to clock 1:55.19. Although Dutch pacemaker Ester Goossens took Mutola through the first lap in 55.11, just outside the scheduled world record pace, the 21-year-old Mutola was unable to keep up the pace in the cool, wet conditions and finished outside the world record of 1:53.28.

Ironically, the heavens opened as the main events started at the richest meeting in the sport. Winners of specific events at this season's Golden Four series of meetings in Oslo, Zurich, Brussels and Berlin have a chance to share a jackpot of 20 one-kilo bars of gold. Officials used a special drying machine to take up water from the track which has a new surface this year. The wet weather was a blow to organizers who have paid

out more money than ever for the sport's top names this year.

ANN TRASON (PACIFIC GROVE HS) TOP ULTRAMARATHON RUNNER TRIUMPHS

LEADVILLE, Colorado, August 20-Ann Trason of Kensington, the world's top female ultramarathon runner, broke her own record to win the Leadville Trail 100, which is a 100-mile foot race run at elevations above 10,000 feet in the Colorado Rockies. All of the race is run above 9,300 feet and goes over the 12,600-foot-high Hope Pass -- twice, since it is an out-and-back race.

Trason, 33, finished in 18 hours, 6 minutes, and 24 seconds, smashing the record of 20:38 she set in 1990. Trason placed second overall.

In the men's division, Juan Herrera, a 25-year-old Tarahumara Indian farmer from Chihuahua in the Copper Canyon area of Mexico, won in 17:33:42, breaking the old event record of 17:55 set in 1990.

second Commonwealth Games competitor in two days to be disqualified over
drugs on Saturday. The day after bantamweight boxer Godson Sawah of Ghana was stripped of his bronze medal for
using the weight-losing diuretic furosemide, Foster, who finished sixth in the
110 hurdles, was sent home for using
the banned stimulant ephedrine.

A Commonwealth Games Federation (CGF) statement said Foster's sixth place finish would be nullified. Details of the positive test would be passed on to track's world governing body, the IAAF, who could further punish the hurdler.

Foster has lived in the United States since he was 13.

While it was shame for Foster, it was glory for another Jamaican hurdler, Michelle Freeman (Florida 1992), who won the women's 100 hurdles in 13 12

Games Federation officials said Foster had failed to offer any satisfactory explanation for the presence of ephedrine in his urine sample. The stimulant is commonly found in cold cures and other over- the-counter medications, but there was no suggestion that Foster, who had already left Victoria, had taken the drug unwittingly. After an initial analysis of Foster's urine sample taken after Monday's heats had tested positive, the B test was conducted in the presence of a neutral observer on behalf of the Jamaican Olympic Committee.

The findings were considered by the CGF court which disqualified Foster from the 110 meters hurdle final. The athlete was represented at Saturday's hearing by four Jamaican team officials--general manager Lloyd Gooden, athletics team manager Brian Smith and team doctors Keith Williams and Paul Austin. The court will pass on its findings to the International Amateur Athletic Federation (IAAF), which can suspend Foster from athletics for a minimum of three months.

Foster "steadfastly denied" taking any banned substance when he was questioned by team officials, federation medical adviser George Haigh said. He said he hadn't taken anything except vitamin and mineral preparations," Haigh said.

BERLIN, August 30, (AP)--Hurdler Colin Jackson and long jumper Mike Powell (Edgewood High School, West Covina) split a jackpot of about 44 pounds of gold Tuesday by winning their events at the ISTAF track and field meet.

Jackson ran the fastest 110-meter hurdles of the season, while Powell won the long jump by soaring 26-feet, 11 inches to claim the richest prize in track and field. Jackson, the world champion and the world record holder from Britain, was clocked in 13.02 seconds, the fastest in the world this year after the 13.04 that he ran at the European Championships in Helsinki earlier this month. He was challenged all the way by Mark Crear (John A. Rowland High School, Rowland Heights), but had enough power to finish half a step ahead of the American, who clocked 13.07.

"The gold was not that important, I wanted to have a good race," Jackson said

Mark McCoy, the Olympic champion formerly of Canada who now competes for Austria, finished third in 13.29.

The meet was the last Grand Prix event before next week's final in Paris and saw another best performance of the year when American Michael Johnson ran the 400 meters in 44.04 seconds.

The hurdles race attracted most of the attention and Jackson's victory enhanced his status.

"Colin is the best hurdler in history," McKov said.

Crear ran his third personal best in a row. "I wanted to win. Colin has been undefeated all year and I wanted him to taste second place."

"I have respect for him," said Crear, whose personal best coming into the season was 13.26.

"The year has had its ups and downs, but now I can go home and rest," he said.

The ISTAF meet was the last leg of the Golden Four, the track meets in Oslo, Zurich, Brussels and Berlin, which combine to offer the biggest prize in track and field, worth about \$285,000. Winners of their events at all four meets qualify for the jackpot. Only Jackson and Powell were still in the running coming into the Berlin meet.

Roger is into at least three different areas really "big-time." Typical track season focus can involve awaiting results from an Open athlete competing on the European circuit, arranging travel plans so his prep level athletes who competed for the U.S. Junior National team at the International dual and World Championship level can reioin the West Valley crew at the Junior Olympic National Championships in Florida, and arranging travel for rest of the West Valley entourage of fifty to travel to Gainesville for the JO's, complete with a sidelight excursion to Disney World. And you think you had it tough!!

If there's a track meet, Roger is there. Typically, a late June weekend included the two-day Junior Olympic Regional, which is a real dawn-to-past-dusk all-weekend affair. Yours truly wandered in partway through the second afternoon

and was just about overloaded with just that part of the weekend. When the length of the meet was mentioned, Mr. Lipkis just slyly smiled, with one taking the hint that this was just another weekend that was par for the course this time of year.

At the Junior Olympic National Championships in Gainesville, Florida in late July, many comments were heard from participants and officials from other area of the nation that it was so great, for a change, to see some of the better Southern California high-schoolers involved at the JO Championship level. Young Men division Champions included Bryan Howard, Pat Johnson, Mike Russell, and West Valley Eagle relay groups from Mr. Lipkis's team.

American Airlines National Scholastic Outdoor Championships

June 18-19. Raleigh, North Carolina (North Carolina State University).

Californians were a very strong presence at this Meet, which for the previous three years was held in the Los Angeles area at Birmingham H.S. (Van Nuys) and UCLA. With the spring weather-hindered track & field season in many parts of the nation, people who live where winter snow is followed by spring rains are still hungry for the sport come June, with the turnout for the Meet this year the best ever with over 550 athletes from 43 states. The facilities at North Carolina State University are outstanding, with Coach Rollie Gieger and the school willing to do all that they can to make the meet first rate. It was a very fine meet for the first year in a new venue. The Meet was spread out over two days, with the distance events spread out and enough qualifying on the first evening to make the second day's show a good one for spectators.

Californians interestingly were bigtime factors in all the Boys' flat races and relays, with some other very, very impressive performances by male and female athletes during the Meet. Roger Lipkis's West Valley Eagles age-group club has edged up into the prep ranks, with a fine group wearing the blue and white uniforms during some fine efforts here.

San Diego's Mebrathom Keflezighi would have his toughest distance competition of the year in the person of Seneca Lassiter of Virginia, who had whipped Keflezighi soundly in the Na-

tional Scholastic Indoor Meet in Syracuse in mid-March, winning by two seconds over the final quarter mile at the mile distance. "Meb" hoped for a reverse of fortunes here. Showing up Saturday in good spirits, Keflezighi asked if he could enter the 3000m that evening. The Californian rolled through the first 1600 at 4:30.8 leaving the field behind, with 68.6-68.7 and 65.8 laps and a 31.5 200 to finish the event (7 1/2 laps) at

8:25.07, a win by twenty-five yards.
Just a warm-up! On Sunday the Meet
was off to a cranking start, with 1994 nation-leading efforts in both 400 hurdles
and the Girls' Mile before the Boy four
lappers stepped out on the track. Keflezighi let no one down and had made up
his mind how he was going to win, taking
the pace out through the 880 at 58.2-

2:00.9. Lassiter, who had relayed 1:50.9 for 800 meters at the Penn Relays and took the East's best by 2 1/2 seconds there over 1500 meters, remained just within contact, at the end of a short 3 meter rope through two laps. The San Diegan kept the pressure on during a 63.5 third lap (3:04.4 1320). During a furious last lap Lassiter, despite better leg speed, could not mount a big finishing sprint against the Foot Locker National Championship runnerup, with Keflezighi charging a 61.2 final 440 to win at 4:05.58-4:07.13. The winning mile was the fastest prep fourlapper run since 1987! Lassiter was rewarded with one of the top eleventh grade times ever! It was one of those events that lives up to all the billing!!! Keflezighi was named male Athlete of the Meet for his efforts.

California excitement far from stopped there! Michael Granville does not like to lose, and was in a great 400 field here, headlined by Desmond Johnson (Louisianan who has won the last two Arcadia/Foot Locker Meets and has a 46.20 best). It was Jamaican eleventh grader Jerome Young (a CT prep) on the outside in Lane 6, who shocked with a three meter field as the strong group came into the homestretch. Johnson and Granville are both champions of the first order! Johnson mounted a desperate last fifteen meter sprint, with Granville lunging the final few meters and ending up on his face at the finish line as the duo closed on the leader. Young held on to win 46.31-46.32-Granville 46.34 in one of the finest prep one lap races you will ever see.

Sprinters Bryan Howard and Pat Johnson, part of the West Valley Eagle crew, along with Granville and others, starred in the sprints. Meeting old rival Jermaine Stafford (New York), who blasted both the Californians with a big

final 20-meter move at the April Arcadia/ Foot Locker Meet, Bryan (10.31 -- one of the top twenty prep times ever run and 20.95) and Pat (10.37 and 20.83) dominated Saturday's qualifying. Sunday's Finals had Bryan take the 100 (10.36) over Pat (10.41) and Stafford (10.52). The 200 was kind of a strange story, when after Howard scratched with slight knee pain, both the starter and re-call starter's guns misfired after a recall, and a 20.93w Johnson win was nullified with a re-run ordered thirty minutes after the last event. The West Valley crew (Howard-Tyree Washington-Mike Russell-Johnson) took the 4x100 event at 40.55, the fastest prep group time of the year. In the 4x400 event Washington busted things open with a 47.2 lead-off, handing to Johnson. Pat, used to running the anchor, forgot to cut in out of lane four after the first turn, racing 47.3 out of that lane all the way around (about ten and a half meters extra to the 400m eveent). with Mike Russell 46.9 and Granville 46.1 finishing off the 3:07.67 win. Johnson then took the 200 re-run at 21.29 to complete guite a weekend of running!

Vondre Armour kept the California action solid in the 800 meter, hot off a Golden West triumph. Three other sub 1:51 athletes would make it interesting! Charging out at 25.4 the Arizona-State bound Armour had 4:09 1600m runner from Virginia, Robbie Pearce, closest through a 52.9 first lap. After a 1:20.9 600 Armour held off the pack with a fine 1:49.68 win.

Jeremy Fischer took another High Jump title at 7-0.5.

Some of the California Girls did super jobs also! Gina Heads pr'd big-time in the Shot Put, winning at 47-05.25, then placing 2nd in the Discus (133-5), and taking the Hammer Throw at 100-08. Lisa Domico amazed with a Triple Jump effort that shot all the way past the 38-foot barrier to 39-1.25 from her previous best of 37-9! Joanna Hayes showed that she is among the nation's best hurdlers with a 14.24 for third in the 100 me-

ter event and 2nd in the 400m barrier event at 61.34.

Tyree Washington took the Section 2 400 at 47.65 and had a 23-05.25 in Long Jump qualifying for the Finals in the Long Jump, where he was eleventh (21-00.5). Mike Russell was 5th in the Section 1 race at 47.67. Wade Tift was 2nd in the SP at 58-10.5, with teammate Steve Gonzalez finishing his season with a 166-0 in the Discus for 7th.

U.S. Junior National Championships

June 24-25. Florida State University, Tallahassee, FL.

A super crew from California and across the country turned out for the 1994 Junior National Championships at Florida State University in late June. The Meet is open to athletes who will not turn 20 during this year of competition (those born 1975 or later for 1994) who meet a certain time standard. Great fields showed up for this qualifier for the World Junior Championships in Lisbon, Portugal, in mid-July. Californians were very, very prominent, with an impressive ten wins by California natives or athletes representing California Universities. It was a great weekend for the sport under what turned out to some quite challenging circumstances on Friday with quite a bit of rain (though it was eighty degrees out with the rain falling!). Saturday was described by locals as the best weather

in years for a June Sunday, with 75 degrees and cloudy conditions that were perfect!

Speedsters and hurdlers from the Golden State were very significant factors in most of those events here. Friday evening's 100 meter finals were run in eighty degree rain, with the Women's race in a very driving storm. Philadelphian Deworski Odom was right at home in the Men's event, taking it at 10.51, with Southern Californians Bryan Howard third at 10.60 and Pat Johnson fourth at 10.61. The next day over 200 meters, under better conditions, Bryan was 2nd to NCAA third placer Tony Wheeler (Clemson-20.67) with a fine 20.80, with Johnson next at 21.07. Both the Californians were placed on the World Junior Championship squad, with both competing for the U.S. 400 meter relay baton

squad, and Bryan in the 200.

The Women's 100 meter event was run in a driving rain, with Aminah Haddad and LaKeisha Backus probably wondering what the heck they were doing at the starting line under such conditions! Floridan Sabrina Herring-Kelly took the run

at 11.55, with the thoroughly drenched Haddad 5th and Backus 7th. The next day over 200 meters Backus was 2nd to Aspen Burkett 23.54-23.62, with Haddad 4th at 23.86. Backus was named to the U.S. team over the 200 meter distance. Haddad can take solace in the

fact that she was two years younger than any of the 100 or 200 meter finalists with her 1978 birthdate. East St. Louis's Cicely Scott of UCLA was second to Monique Hennagan over 400 meters 52.19-53.15 to qualify for the individual event and 4x400 relay team.

Prep Coke Edmon shocked with a perfect 400 meter hurdle race, placing a very impressive third at 51.81 at a distance he certainly had not run many times. Only Charles White (51.5-1976) and Rich Greybehl (51.6-1974) have ever run faster among Golden State preps! Very hot competition headlined the Women's 100 meter barrier event, with Latasha Colander, winner of April's Arcadia/Foot Locker event racing 13.36 (#4 AT HS), with Bay area rivals Bisa Grant (13.83-3rd) and super frosh Daveetta Shepherd (13.86-4th) competing very strongly. Angela Harris, hoping to make the U.S. Junior team, came so, so close, racing a fine 58.93, but only placing third behind super eighth grader Char Foster (57.98 a world age 14 record), and Yvonne Harrison (Odessa JC, Texas), who ran easily her best race of the year at 58.88. Harris will go on to UNLV and should be a super collegiate long sprinter and one lap hurdler for the Lady Rebels. Joanna Hayes was seventh in the short hurdles.

Ninth grader Julia Stamps continued the famed start to her prep career, here over 3000 meters against a top group. Sarna Renfro, national prep mile (4:46.98) and 3200m (10:19.5) leader, Rosy Gardner, 4:48.80 (mi) and 10:25.78 (3200m at altitude), and a flock of fast Collegians would test the California State 3200m champ. All had in mind that they had to run a World Junior Championship standard 9:35.0 for the seven and a half-lap event to compete in that Championship meet, with the first two from this race selected for the U.S. team. After a 5:07 opening 1600m, a 79 second lap put the group behind qualifying pace, with the alert

Gardner pushing the sixth lap at 75 seconds, with Renfro and Stamps the only

ones close behind. Building up with a 72 second seventh lap, the contest came down to as exciting a last 250 meters as one will see in a quality distance race. Gardner, with a long, "up on her toes" powerful stride. and the long, powerful striding Rentro, were joined by the short and economically striding Stamps for the

last half lap sprint. Amazingly the fifteen year old Californian edged by both around the final turn, holding off the PAC-10 bound twosome (Renfro to Stanford - Gardner to Oregon), with Stamps the winner at 9:28.50. Renfro 9:28.95. and Gardner 9:31.99 in third. Very sadly only two could make the team with all three so deserving. Gardner was very gracious in defeat, with Rosy a sure bigtime star at Oregon along with Milena Glusac and crew. Stamps set a national frosh record with her time!!

Frosh Miesha Marzell (Georgetown via Bishop O'Dowd of Oakland) helped put the finishing touches on a sterling frosh season with a 4:23.97 1500m win that handled some pretty hot prep athletes. Marzell's 4:23.97 barely made the World Jr Standard of 4:24.0. State 800 Meter Champion Kristie Johnson took a big step up here, with Jawauna McMullen dragging the pack out at 59 seconds for the first lap in the final, with Johnston in last at under 62 seconds. Kristie showed real toughness in racing a lifetime best of 2:08.93 for fourth place behind McMullen's 2:05.95.

Field eventers represented California nicely! Suzy Powell continued her magical twelfth grade discus season. looking ahead to the World Juniors and a high placing after taking the event here by over twenty feet at 172-11. UCLA frosh Amy Acuff took the High Jump in probably close to the worse weather conditions a field ever had to face. clearing 5-8 in a driving Friday rain. Jeremy Fischer also finished out his prep career with a big win, taking the High Jump at 7-2 1/2 (better Saturday conditions!). Fischer evened a score with Eric Bishop of Georgia, the only prep to defeat Jeremy this year--in the National Scholastic Indoor Meet (it took a 7-4 1/2 leap to do it!). Scott Slover impressively took the Pole Vault at 16-4 3/4 in some rainy Friday weather.

Californians swept the two team positions in the Decathlon, with Russ Bomben (6863) and super Azusa Pacific frosh (via Arizona), Tage Peterson (6851), with the duo overcoming some pretty horrendous conditions. Kerry O'Bric was the youngest in the Women's Heptathlon field, with her 4374 great experience for the three more years she has of "Junior-age" eligibility.

Stanford red-shirt frosh via South Dakota, Greg Jimmerson, took the 10,000 on Friday at 30:33.24, then the 5000 the next evening at 14:39.06. Ray Butman, two years out of high-school, from the Alta Loma area, took the Steeplechase at 9:13.23, and showed some real potential in the event. Mark Hauser, University of Wisconsin bound, raced one of the year's fastest prep 1500's with a 3:52.28 for fourth place.

Justin Marruio of Ternecula added a win in the Men's 10,000 Meter racewalk at 46:40.31, with the auto trip to Florida (ves the family drove!) complete with a tow-job in the middle of the New Mexico desert.

The 1995 Junior Nationals will be in the Los Angeles area in late June, with the meet the qualifier for the PanAmerican Junior Championships in the sport. Information on the 1995 Meet will be placed in California Track News when it is available this coming winter.

1994 USA Track & **Field National Junior Olympics**

July 26-31. University of Florida (Gainesville).

The huge mid-summer US Track & Field Junior Olympic Championship Meet had Junior National team members Char Foster and Milton Campbell as the stars, with fellow Lisbon World Junior Championship competitors, Bryan Howard and Deworski Odom, continuing their torrid sprint rivalry. Over 5,000

young people up to the age of eighteen took part in the week-long extravaganza that showed all involved that track at this level is very very alive! There were a ton of competitive and exciting events. with big crowds of followers that stayed during the lengthy days of competition. This year's host association of USA T&F. Florida, under the leadership of Meet Director Jeff Wentworth, and USA T&F Youth Athletics Chair Kim Haines. ran another flawless affair due to a ton of the best volunteers and officials you will ever find! The 1995 Junior Olympic National Championships will be held in San Jose.

Clearwater, Florida, eighth grader and U.S. Junior National 400 Meter hurdle champion (57.90), Char Foster, had an exciting final (7/31) day of competition, in which she took down three national age-group divisional records at her Youth Girls (13-14) level. An early morning 200m hurdles race had her pull ahead of San Francisco Bay area star Natashia Neal (26.89) over the final hurdle on the way to a 26.63 record, with a strong 53.43 400m win significantly taking down the 53.82 Age-14 national standard of Denean Howard, in addition to the Age-Group meeet standard. The true test came a couple of hours later when Foster's heavy legs attacked the 100 meter hurdles, an event in which she lowered her pending 14.15 national group record with a 14.12 run which the pesky Neal was close with a 14.21. Foster caught a time when the pesky "into the face" winds died down in her 100 meter barrier event, with most of the dash events run into meter or two per second winds that cost athletes a couple of tenths. Neal's two hurdle efforts in pushing Foster were the second best ever run by an athlete in this age-group.

Georgian Milton Campbell, fresh from anchoring the U.S. World Junior Champion 4x400m relay team in Lisbon, raced to 46.45 (heat) and 46.38 (finals) 400m clockings to take down Marlin Cannon's 46.58 Young Men's Age-Group record.

Bryan Howard, eighth in the World Junior 200m, comfortably handled World Silver medalist over 100 meters, Deworski Odom, in a 10.45-10.50 Young Men's 100m final. Odom returned to edge Ohian Darrick Trimble 14.02-14.03 in an exciting Highs contest. Other very impressive performances on the male side of the meet were fifteen year old Obea Moore's 46.96 400m win and Pat Johnson's 21.21 200m Young Men's triumph. Obea's L.A. Jet crew unfortunately dropped the stick during the 4x400 event, with Obea anchoring in 45.8 for the squad that ended in fourth.

The female side of the meet had a number of stars. The Young Women's division featured a series of fine performances. Georgian Kelly Perryman took the sprints over a top group (100m-11.82 (wind -1.4 mps) 200m-23.84), Jamaican Suziann Reid raced 53.95 (heat) and 54.02 (final) 400 efforts, with Tameika Grizzle cruising a 2:07.73 800 win. Texan Kim Smallwood was 13.98 (wind +.5) in the 100m H to edge Californian Joanna Hayes (14.02), with Hayes a great meet with a 59.12 400h that also was second, with Oakland's Angela Harris (58.79) over the one lap hurdles. In the field. Knoxville's Lynn Houston surprised with a 5-10 1/2 (1.79) High Jump. with U.S. Junior National Champion, Angela Henry, setting a Young Women's Long-Jump record with her 20-10 1/2 (6.36) effort. Angela Williams, an eighth grader at Magnolia JHS in Chino, California, will add to Southern California's great stock of prep sprinters next year with an 11.88 (100 wind -1.9) and 24.18 (200m wind -1.4) Youth Girls sprint double. Missouri's Jennifer Gardner was equally as impressive at that level with a 2:12.03 800m win. New York's Desiree McQueen showed poise in running down Californian Daveetta Shepherd in the Intermediate Girls 100m (33") Hurdles 14.09-14.25 (into a big -2.5 mps wind) when the Golden Stater hit the eighth hurdle.

There are many facets to this competition that defy descriptions of wins and losses and good times. The range of races, from the tiny 10 and under Bantams through the physically impressive teenagers, provides some fun contrasts. Many of the Finals are set up to go in order from the youngest to the oldest divisions, with the very competitive Bantam and Midget divisions often eliciting more of a response than the older athletes racing national and world class times.

Each division does have athletes that stood out along the way. San Diego elementary school student, Monique Henderson, blazed 26.09 (200m) and 57.32 (400m) Midget Girl wins, with Wrightwood (Ca) resident Megan McGowan taking the 3000m there in 10:27.43, then being outkicked by Fresno's Kristen Kinder at 4:50.21 for 1500m. Ohian Kelly Plummer was a four-foot 49-09 (15.16) Youth Girls Shot Put winner. St. Bernard High's Malika Edmonson was an impressive Intermediate 400m winner at 54.98, with Florida's Brandy Dames surprisingly breaking the Age Group record with a 61.50 400m hurdles win. Texas prep sophomore Alicia Broussard took Illinois' Deana Simmons 40-06.75 to 40-01.5 in the Intermediate Triple Jump. Nebraskan April Cockrow was an impressive weight doubler, with a 43-08.5 (13.32) SP and 143-03 (43.68) DT efforts.

On the male side, Texan Jonas Lusk took down the Youth (13-14) 200m hurdles record with a 24.97, with Bakersfield's (Ca) Van Mounts a big weight doubler at at that level with 57-11 1/2 (SP) and 168-11 3/4 (DT) wins. Intermediate Boys sprint star was Gainesville (FI) area eleventh grader Bobby Williams, who raced 21.49 (200m) into a 3.0 meter per second headwind. New Jersey's Arif Welcher took the 800 there at 1:54.25, with 7-2 1/4 (HJ) New Mexico prep soph Kevin Dotson a 6-9 1/4 winner here. Intermediate athletes, Floridans Sheddrick Gorley and Donald Heaven

started a big weight event rivalry, with Gorley taking the SP at 57-00 and Heaven the DT 166-00 to 164-03 RESULTS

Dan O'Brien/VISA National Invitational High School Decathlon

Championships July 9-10, Klamath Falls, OR, By Steve Matthies Klamath Falls Herald and News

With a solid second-day perfor-mance, James Cook of Kennebunk, Maine, captured the first Dan O'Brien/ VISA National Invitational High School Decathlon Championships title.

Cook scored 7,038 to become the first national high school decathlon champion in a heated battle against Nathan Boyd of Chelan, WA.

Boyd finished second with 6,934 points

"I had a great hurdles race," Cook said after the first event of the second day as the senior from Kennebunk started himself off toward the title with a 3,473-point in the final five events in the two-day, 10-event com-

"The discus, pole vault and javelin were just average," he added. "I didn't do a whole lot of work the last three weeks, so was a little out of shape."

Cook was in good enough shape, though, to beat Boyd in the 1500meter race that ended the meet.

Boyd needed to beat Cook by 15 sec onds in the 1,500 if he was going to wrest the crown from Cook, who completed his second decathlon in three

Cook had been the highest placing high school athlete in the Junior Olympic National Decathlon June 24-25 at Tallahassee, FL.

"I just wanted to stay with him," Cook said of Boyd. "I did enough to win and that's all I was thinking about."

Boyd knew what he had to do to win

"I knew that to beat Cook by 15 seconds would be tough, so I wanted to break 7,000 points instead," Boyd said, "and I came up about nine seconds short of doing that."

Actually, the meet might have been decided in the pole vault. Boyd won the pole vault at 14-5 1/4 inches, but did not outscore Cook by as many points as both athletes had anticipated. Cook was third in the event.

Boyd's only event victory came in the

pole vault in a decathlon that saw eight different athletes win at least one event. Cook was one of the double winners, along with Gabe Garrett of Olympia, WA. Cook won the shot put and discus, while Garrett won the 100meter and 400-meter dashes, the latter one of the two national high school decathlon records to fall during the

Garrett scorched the parched Mazama High School track in 47.92 seconds to wipe out one of the oldest records on the books, a 49.1 set by Aubrey Lewis in 1954. Garrett was seventh

Cantrell Gaddis of Leeds, AL, also broke a national high school decathlon record when he won the 110-meter hurdles in 14.38 seconds in the meet that was fully-automated timed.

The old record was 14.3 hand-held by a 1956 Olympic gold medal winner Milt Campbell and set in 1953.

Gaddis' time would convert to about a 14.14 hand-held time.

"I knew if I was to have a chance to win (the championship), or stay in the top three, I would have to have a good hurdles time," Gaddis said. "I was try-ing to break 14 seconds.

(The national record) feels pretty good. Not many people set those. It wasn't a big goal of mine, but was one of my goals while I was here."

Collin Kinsey of Wellsville, OH, was third in the meet with 6,673 points, while first-day leader Aaron Fox of Flagstaff, AZ, was fourth in 6,533

While two national high school decath-Ion records fell, another was tied.

Bobby Williams and Great Bend, KS, cleared 6-11 inches to win the high jump and equal the record of Steve Hensen of McPherson, KS.

"I didn't know what any of the records were," Williams said. "When I started to jump, I just wanted to jump

"Then, I heard (the public address announcer) say 'Steve Henson' and I said to myself: 'Hey, I know this guy. He's from Kansas.' I remember watching him (high) jump.

Hensen now plays in the National Bas-ketball Association for the Milwaukee

Other individual event winners were Fox in the long jump, Kinsey in the javelin and Keller in the 1500-meter run.

Keller ran a gutsy 1500 to win in 4:35.79 in the final event of the competition in uncharacteristically high temperatures for Klamath Falls, in the 90's, combined with unusually high humidity (about 40 percent), altitude (4,300 feet) and smoke from two forest fires within 25 miles of Mazama Stadium.


