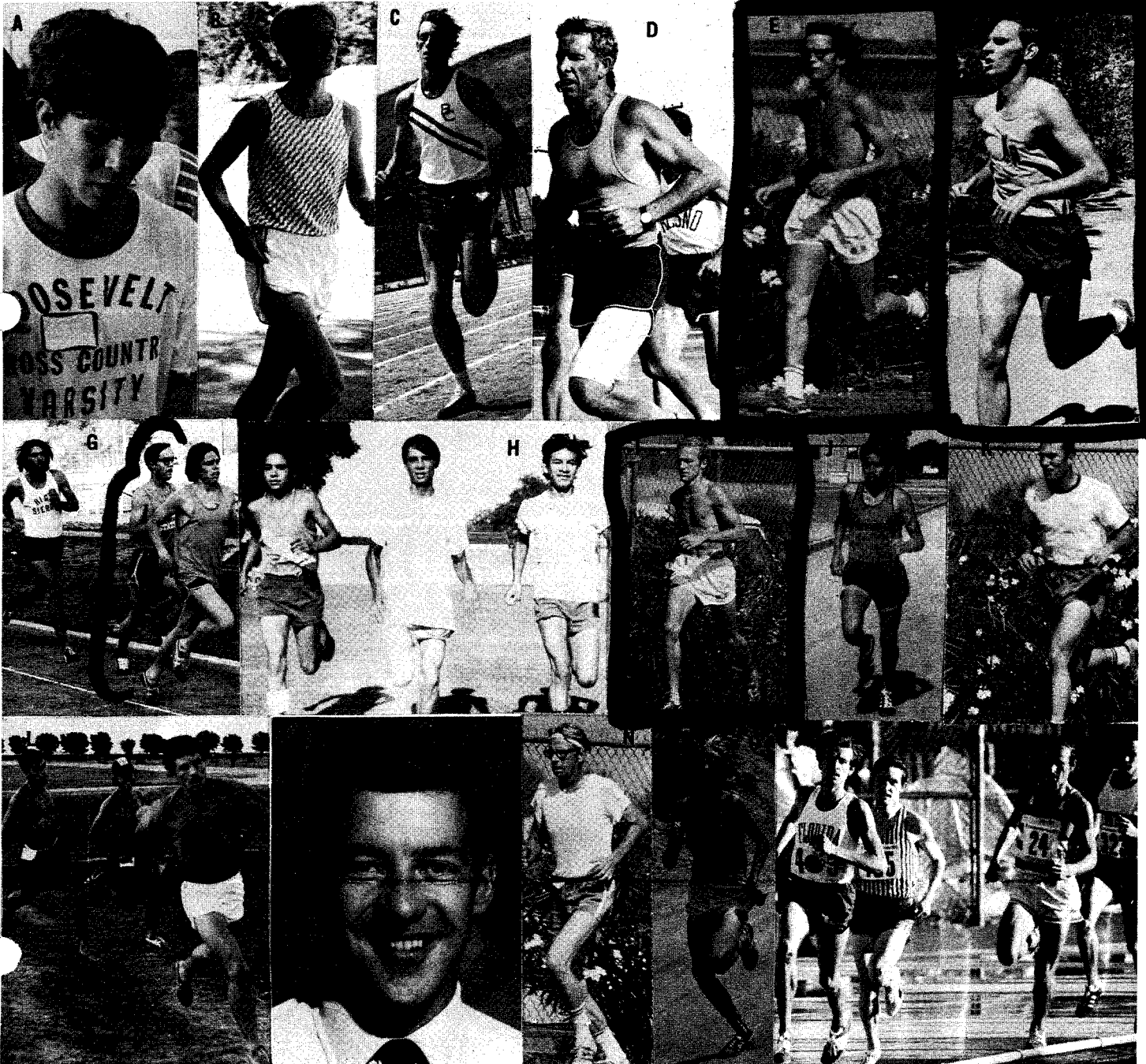

MEET VALLEY ATHLETE

HARRY HARDER: Reedley, Ca., High Sierra Track Club Seniors. Born April 13, 1917 - Reedley, California. 5'10", 145 pounds. BEST TIMES: Mile - 6:01(72); 2 mile - 12:45.5(71); 3 mile - 19:09(72); Reedley 4.0 mile Kings River Run - 27:40(72); 4.1 mile Reedley Fiesta Road Race - 27:04(71); 6 mile - 41:43(72); 6 mile Father's Day Run - 40:42(72); 6 mile Selma Run - 39:15(72); 10 Kilo Hume Lake Run - 47:29(71); 7 mile Burris Park Run - 43:13(72); One Hour Run - 8 mi 941 yds(72); Visalia 10 Mile Run - 70:10(72); 13 mile Madera Mini-Marathon - 1:31:12 (71).

TRAINING: works out once a day, six days per week, 12 months a year; puts in 42 miles per week. Began running in April, 1969 and since then has logged 4,331 miles (as of 9-10-72). Self-coached.

DESCRIPTION: "Mostly long, slow -- jogging speed for everyone else. On week-ends I try to run cross country type training. Workouts during the week are usually at night after dinner, running how I feel, around the track. I try to vary the length of the work-outs, long and short, running longer distances at the beginning of the week and tapering off before a meet. If I don't seem to loosen up I cut the workout short and try to walk more at work the next day to loosen up."

If you don't know who Harry Harder is you haven't been to a road race in the Valley in the past couple of years. Harry has managed to turn up for them all over the past two years. A meet director can always count on at least one entrant -- Harry Harder. Harry is 55 years old and one would think that he would be tired of running by now, but the truth is he has just been running for three short years and is a real inspiration to other young senior runners. Why did he start running? He sums it up best: "I am a diabetic, and running is a good exercise. It makes my medication go farther, and I have more breath support for singing." That's why he started, but Harry found, as many others have, that you get much more out of running than you could imagine. "I started running, or jogging, because I needed something, some form of exercise. Coach Ostrand of Reedley High School was instrumental in getting me started in competition running at the Reedley Fiesta that year. He then gave me the opportunity to continue this type of running at the AAU Avacado Lake Run in December of that year. Bob Lehman,

Reedley College, made available the AAU Kings River Run at Reedley College. By then I was 'hooked'.

"The members of the High Sierra Track Club have also been very helpful and have taken an interest in my wellbeing. Wayne, Jerry, Dave, Skip, Fernie, and all the others; Rich for running up that long hill at Tahoe, the other members of the 'B' team at Tahoe. Of course then there are the Seniors who are an inspiration to me, and I hope to others also. Sid, Len, Don, Læ Scott and Lee Thomas, Dewey, Ron Gene, Bob Stout, Russ, Bob Fries, are always ready with a "good job" which is appreciated, although I am sometimes too pooped to acknowledge. How could I miss Don, my buddy, and the other fellows from Pacific and State who come up to me and ask how I'm doing. This running has acquainted me with a good group of people, for which I am thankful.

"Then there are my number one supporters: my wife, Rachel, and the rest of the family. Without their support, it would be a real battle.

"I wish there were some way to convey to the readers of Valley Track and Field that if they are not running or jogging, or their dads aren't, there is no better time for them to start."

Harry's goals for this year were to do well at the U.S. Masters in San Diego and to run on a team around Lake Tahoe. He accomplished both. A long-range goal is to complete a marathon. His favorite race distance is 6 miles. He tries to stay in shape all year rather than peak for special meets at certain times of the year. Harry describes his competition strategy: "sprint for the first 10 yards, then hang on!"

Harry's presence and cheerful attitude have helped to make Valley road races the colorful, warm competitions they are. He speaks of what he has gotten out of running, but he has also given as much, if not more, back to the sport and his fellow runners.

Next time you see Harry at a race ask him where he carries his caramels during a run.

THE FIRST FORTY MILES WAS A SNAP BUT OH THOSE LAST 5,000 FEET
or
OVER THE TOP WITH TEA, RAISINS, AND GRANOLA

If Wayne "Granola" Van Dellen ever starts to talk to you about a run up Mt. Whitney, or some such molehill, run fast, don't walk, to your nearest neighborhood track. If not, you may find yourself running past mountain goats and above low-flying eagles somewhere amidst the 14,000 foot peaks of the Sierra Nevada. One thing, though, the vultures can't go that high.

A suggestion to reinstate the Mt. Whitney run was the apparently innocent beginning. This run, a mere 20 miles and 6,000 ft. climb, was last held in 1961. The revival of this event will hopefully take place next August 18, the centennial of the first ascent. Somehow, checking out the course turned into a 60 mile trans-Sierra jog.

This trek did not take place, however, without some plan changes, a re-figuring of the distance, some soul-searching, a great dinner at Wayne's (the condemned men enjoyed a hearty meal), and a seven-hour drive. Wayne, John Brennand, and myself, an ersatz Ironman, arrived at Whitney Portal, a mere 8,300 ft. We had some trouble convincing the Forest Service that we were really planning to go all the way to Mineral King in one day, but finally we were set with permit, worn out Tigers, half the Valley's raisin crop, and a sack of Granola.

We signed out at 6:00 a.m. Sunday and three hours later were looking west from Trail Crest, 13,700 ft. And what did we see? Mountain after mountain after mountain after, well, no time to enjoy the sights, fantastic as they are; down the hill we go. First we headed north to Wallace Creek, then west to the Kern River, finally south to Rattlesnake Canyon. Suddenly we were 30 miles past Whitney and down to 6,500 ft. The pretty part was behind, now it was the moment of truth. Rattlesnake Canyon, so named, I'm sure, because once a snake got to the bottom he could never make it back up. If it could handle the climb and the altitude, then the switchbacks would break its back!

Up we go, and up and up, my stubs are having trouble keeping up with long-legged John and Wayne, my mind wanders, did we take a wrong turn? Are we on some undiscovered peak? Can you get to Everest from California? But no, finally there are only two miles of bare rock and we are over 11,500 ft. Franklin Pass. Now it's downhill all the way. We were above the storm clouds and paused to enjoy a fantastic sunset. Then we stormed down the trail until darkness slowed us. Finally, 16 hours after starting, we arrived at the car. Wayne's wife served us hot soup while mine asked if we saw the bear that just headed up the trail.

Surprisingly, none of us suffered anything worse than some sore muscles. No blisters, no sprains. We did have to tape the soles of John's shoes now and then, and it was cool enough to wear jackets a good part of the time.

If you want to try something like this I'd suggest some careful planning and lots of thought. Darkness was almost our undoing and only two weeks later several people were trapped in the same area by early snows. But call Wayne about Whitney. Meanwhile, I've got this idea for a great run

MEET VALLEY COACH

Don Green of Central Union High School in Fresno. Central Union High doesn't have a record of championship cross country teams and even discontinued the sport several years ago. Coach Don Green is one who would like to change that. Since coming to Central Union High School five years ago he has re-instituted cross country and his teams are quickly growing in both quantity and quality.

Don was born in Mt. Vernaon, Indiana; attended Basse High School in Evansville, Indiana, Indiana University, Fresno State, and the University of Hawaii. He began coaching at Central in 1968. In North Sequoia League track Central has continued to improve since Coach Green took over. In 1968 they placed 5th, in 1969 3rd, 1970 2nd, and 1971 2nd. In 1972 they won the C Class Valley Track and Field Championships.

This year's team is already shaping up to be one of the best yet with Mario Garza in the 440 and 880, Harvey Fajardo 440, Larry Lopez triple jump, Stan Glenn shot put, Steve Lehman discus, Vince Garza mile and Andy Alejo highs. Some of the athletes who have achieved outstanding performances under Coach Green's guidance are three horizontal jumpers: Erinie Lopez who earned high School All American status in the triple jump, Tony Rotella who earned a berth at the U.S. Olympic Training Camp in the triple jump and long jumper Ed Swillis who went on to place 4th in the State J.C. Meet for Reedley College.

Don's contributions to track and field include much more than coaching. He's served as Area Meet Director for the Junior West Coast Relays, NSL League representative for cross country, Meet Director for North Area cross country meet 1971, Meet Director for 1972 NSL track meet, Meet Director for the 1972 NYL cross country meet, as well as assisting with the summer Bunion Derbies. In-between track activities he finds time to spend with his family (two children, Robert and Sharon who attend Bullard HS) and enjoy his hobbies of bicycling and jogging; and then if he's still got some time he spends it doing some extra coaching with the local Babe Ruth baseball team.

The greatest thrill for Coach Green has been, "Guiding and observing the athletic development of runners and field men from their freshman years until graduation." As for special coaching methods or philosophy

"I have found most success in influencing each athlete to set weekly accomplishment goals for himself and I have informal, individual discussions with each competitor weekly after mid-season to check on the progress he is making. Also, a detailed record of progress is kept for each one. I have learned and believe that awareness of personal improvement is the single greatest motivator for the track and field athlete."

CROSS COUNTRY

With the Valley cross country picture starting to come into focus it's still difficult to predict the top individuals and even more difficult to make any sure decisions regarding the favored teams. Looking at last years Valley Championship results doesn't help much since eight of the top ten have graduated. Rather than make predictions on the Valley cross country scene, and to avoid sticking out our neck, we'll merely throw out some thoughts and let you do the predicting.

Starting at the northern end of the Valley we're confronted with the Sac-San Joaquin Section C.I.F. defending championship team and most of those Merced High runners are back (only two were seniors), including 8:53.5 two-miler Dave Taylor. Madera, after their first meet and victory over Roosevelt and McLane, looks like a team to be reconed with. Lewis Raviscioni should lead them through many fine races.

In the Fresno Area things look to be a little different from last year. Two strong teams of last season, McLane and Clovis, appear to be going through a building year, however watch out for McLanes junior star Randy Wright when he gets going; and Chic Fero's frosh-soph contingent. Roosevelt, led by Lynn Eichhorn and Fresno, led by Ned Baird should be much stronger teams than last season. Both Bullard and Hoover could supply the team power in the Fresno area. Bullard will be paced by league champions Jim Huebner (4:23.9) and Mike Jurkovich (9:29). Hoover has 34 runners going through the paces with coach Dave Cords. Mark Hull, Robert Borec and Louis Grieco will be battling it out for the top spot. Watch the Hoover Junior Varsity team.

The future looks bright for the Fresno college cross country picture. Fresno City College has number one man, Greg Hall, back from last years fine team. Harry Nicholas transferring in from Nebraska should give Greg some competition. Add to those two Jim Hartig from Clovis and you've got a pretty talented nucleus to build around. Fresno Pacific will be strong even though they lost the top five runners from last year's squad. Two Bakersfield College transfers, Mike Lennemann and Lupe Solis have filled in nicely with returnees Don Gregory and Rick Jensen. Fresno State University will field somewhat of a young team, but one not lacking in experience. Returning from last season are

number one man, Kevin Dougherty and Bunion Derby champion, Mike Russler. Kevin and Mike will receive strong support from JC transfers Mike Brooks (9:27 two miler from FCC) and Dave Garcia (No Cal Champ from Delta).

Traveling down the Valley brings one to traditional cross country powerhouses, Reedley and Lemoore, but 1972 should be a building year for both. The strength from the area will certainly be Redwood and possibly cross town rival Mt. Whitney. Redwood will, of course, have track standouts Juan Garcia and Bryan Patterson; and Coach John Pitman promises to have some other well conditioned back-up men. Mt. Whitney will be led by 7th place Valley cross country individual, Zenas Moreno and Valley 440 champ Scott Wingo.

The central area college teams could offer the biggest surprises. COS will be represented by returnees Carlos Bravo and Dale Campbell, plus former Hanford standout Juan Garza and a Redwood graduate, Adolf Nava. West Hills should have the best team in their history and could win the league. Leading the Falcons will be Dos Palos teammates Art DeLaCruz and Alex Basurto, both finished in the top twenty in the Valley Meet last year.

Moving farther south Wasco will once again be battling it out with Arvin for the league title. Sophomore sensation, Sam Garcia, who placed 4th in last season's Fros-Soph Valley Meet will be a great aid to Wasco. Watch Monache, being coached by distance runner, Rick Vafeates.

Down in the Bakersfield area the picture looks like this: Hinz from West, Bray from North, and Hendricks of Highland will be battling it out for top honors. Team wise Highland with Hendricks, Elieff and Saba will be after North with Bray, Spears, and Farley. Weinmann will head up East's team, Rios will set the pace for the Valley Champion West High Vikings. Bakersfield college lost a lot of talent from last years team but got a pleasant surprise when Eddie Granillo decided to run out his eligibility at BC. Danny Vilolovus and Phil Foster should be on Eddies heels.

All-in-all it looks like a great season for cross country. Some of the powers aren't as strong and new powers are emerging - and that's what makes it exciting.
