PHOENIX INVITATIONAL NOTES

Our annual Phoenix Invitational Track & Field Meet is over with over one thousand participants representing forty clubs from the western U.S. As age group chairman for the Arizona Association I would to express my appreciation to the coaches and contestants, whose preparation and good attitudes are key factors in the success of a meet of this size.

I had the opportunity to observe the actions of other athletes and spectators and, in my opinion, (with one exeption) this was the finest group of track clubs we have had at the Phoenix Invitational. The exception centered around one team who apparently felt our volunteer officials (is there any other kind) had singled them out for the purpose of cheating them.

These attitudes carried over in the attitudes of their athletes who, I am sure, left the meet feeling they were cheated. The verbal abuse at the official's decisions was uncalled for, but their display of actions in front of spectators and athletes (theirs and others) is unforgiveable. It was apparent they were an embarassment to the association they represent.

In my opinion the only way to criticize the efforts of others is to: (1) present a protest in the proper prescribed manner and (2) do better than they...and we've been to your meet!

AAU NATIONAL X-COUNTRY MEET FOR BOYS?

Congratulations on Albuquerque being awarded the 1973 Girls AAU Cross Country Nationals. The reason for this letter is to explore the possibility of somehow running a Boys' Championship during the same time time period and possibly at the same location or nearby.

The boys' program lacks any type of real culmination at the end of the season. It is true that the Road Runners of America hold championships during the season, but they usually fall during the middle of the season on a regular weekend when it is hard for many people in our area to get away. In addition, these races, as far as I know, are for individual rather than team championships and we would like to see a team championship since cross country is a team sport.

If there is any chance that any of the fine coaches in the Albuquerque area would take the bull by the horns and run a Boys' Team Championship, we think you would be doing a great service for boys' program. (If you can't get recognition or sanction of this race as an official championship, you could call it the Albuquerque Boys' National Invitational).

We would like to know the feelings and responses of other coaches.

From the Editors

What makes for a good track meet? It is not the number of "records" broken, nor the calibre and number of athletes. We have seen novice meets that were exciting and Olympic competition which was dull. Good track meets depend, in our opinion, on the amount of satisfaction which most (if not all) of the contestants derive from competing.

For track to be valuable to the competitor, he or she must feel that they are an integral part of the competition and the preparation (training) for it. This is especially important for young athletes and doubly important for the non-winners.

It is apparent to many actively involved in AAU and school programs that these forms of junior and age group competition tend to be tedious for the "stars" and discouraging for the "non-stars". Moreover, these programs are tending to become more expensive and filled with needless pressures and political hassles.

We believe that lower pressure, developmental type competition is more satisfying - and therefore more valuable - to the majority of athletes. As a matter of fact, this type of competition is sponsored by recreation departments, service clubs and elementary schools. However, it is seldom well planned and usually not coordinated with other programs in the area.

Leadership in coordinating and encouraging greater development of these lower level competitive programs should come, we believe, from those unhappy with various aspects of local AAU and school programs. Don't wait for the remote (and often imcompetent) national leadership to do it. The impetus must come from parents, coaches, officials and even athletes right in your own local neighborhood. Good luck!

Boys in the 14-15 age range seldom receive the proper recognition for their performances. the fact that they paticipate at various levels of competition - from 9th grade junior high or high school (depending on the school district in which they reside) to regular AAU meets - makes the research and compilation of their marks no easy task.

JACK SHEPARD, high school editor of TFN and statistician for CBS Sports Spectacular among other credentials, has researched and made available to STARTING LINE the material pertaining to the article below. The assumption is that the majority of high school freshman and sophomores will fall in the 14-15 category, although some are or might be 16 years old. A mention is made when the athlete's birthdate is known. We welcome your comments. Note:

The indoor season proved to be very satisfying for some young 2-milers. Among the boys mentioned above, we find Mitch Kingery with a 9:14.8 and Serna at 9:15.8.

Worthy of mention are three freshman from Indiana, with excellent prospect in the distance runs: RUDY CHAPPA (Hammond), 9:42.5, FRANCIS TOMASIC (Bloomington),9:56.4 and 4:40.9, and BRAD CLARETTO (Terre Haute)9:59.6/4:41.5.

Although this column is supposed to deal only with boys 15 and under (the 16-17 will will come later), it might still be fitting to end it by aknowledging the fantastic triple jumping performance of DON DUVAL, a high school junior from Denver, Colorado. With a flight of 51-8½ Don became the best 16 year-old in that event.

This year while conducting a Cross-Country series for the Union County Park Commission I happened to notice this little kid that was showing up every week. This year I only had two divisions, 14-15 and 13-Under. I sort of felt sorry for this little kid as he was only six, but he seemed to enjoy going up against the "big guys".

The first time I really got to know him was during the meet I ran at Echo Lake Park in Mountainside, New Jersey. As the race started, everyone got off well except for this little guy in the back of the pack. Due to the constant rain we had been having, he slipped and went down. What drew my attention to this was that as he was getting up I heard "Oh, s...!" With this he got up and was right back in the race. Right then he struck me as a hard-nosed competitor - just the right amount of toughness you like to see in a runner.

STARTING LINE SIX-MINUTE-RUN POSTAL CONTEST

Teams from the metropolitan New York City area won three of the four divisions in the school postal contest, which concluded on May 15. A total of forty school teams participated in the elementary and intermediate school divisions for boys and girls.

Notre Dame Grammar School of New Hyde Park, New York turned in an amazing team total in the Boys Elementary (6th Grade & Under) Division. Led by rapidly developing RICHARD MOORE, the Notre Damers averaged more than a mile per boy on the hyper-fast Scotch Plains (New Jersey) High School track on April 29. Besides Richard, who is in the sixth grade, the team consisted of two fifth graders (VINCENT ROM and TERRY BRAUER), plus fourth graders KEVIN and ANDY POWDERLY. Their combined performance and ANDY POWDERLY. Their combined performance would have been good enough to place them third in the Intermediate Division and Moore's total was the best individual total posted in any division.

Even closer was the competition in the Boys Intermediate (8th Grade & Under) contest. Augusta Raa Middle School of Tallahassee, Florida were tied in total distance by Dexter Junior High of Whittier, California. Since the Florida school had the younger overall team (led by 13 year-old HERB WILLS) they are judged to be the winner over the very well balanced Dexter squad.

North Middle School from Lynbrook, New York won the Girls Intermediate race uncontested, since they were the only legal entry (two other schools used ninth grade girls, who were ineligible for this contest). The winners were led by MAUREEN DUNN, sixth grade, who turned in the best individual distance of any girl.

Girls Elementary entries were led by Wheeler Avenue School of Valley Stream, New York. Led by GERI CONLIN (fourth grade), the Long Island quintet narrowly beat out a team Long Island quintet narrowly beat out a team from Linthicum (Md) Elementary School, whose entire team was composed of fifth grade students or below. The Maryland group (led by third grader AMY CHILDS), was thus second in both girls and boys elementary divisions.

Participating schools conducted their own competition, which varied from strictly intra-mural (one school only) to the all-city competition conducted by Syracuse, New York, which included ten elemen-tary schools. More than twenty schools in the mid-west indicated their attempts were flooded out by the capricious spring weather.

Due to the interest shown, Starting Line will conduct another Six-Minute-Run Postal Contest, beginning in September. Watch for the announce-ment in a future issue. ELEMENTARY BOYS DIVISION (Sixth Grade & Below):

Joey O'Connor attends the first grade at St. Francis Grammar School, where he is coached by Mr. Bill Weingart. (Mr. Weingart has turned out many young runners who have gone on to St. Joseph's High School in Metuchen and developed into outstanding athletes.) Joey was born on January 19, 1966. Like many good runners he too got his start because of strange circumstances.

While in kindergarten he got tired of waiting for his older brother Brian to take him home after school. Brian has been very active in the St. Francis track program and after practice it was his job to take his brother home. Rather than stand around, Joey decided to start running to help pass the time away.

He usually runs 2 to 4 miles a day through the streets of Metuchen, with an occasional trip to a nearby track for some pace work. Because of his age and size coach Weingart has to be careful as to the streets Joey runs on and across. When the older runners go on a long one the coach has his hands full in trying to hold the youngster back.

On January 14, 1973 Joey ran a 6:29.9 mile in the NJAAU Age Group Track Meet at St. Jo-seph's all weather track. We didn't know it at the time, but his performance bettered the listed world best for 6 year-olds. Within a month after his 7th birthday he had run several 3:02 and 3:03 half-miles, as well as a 4:49 1320.

To date Joey has not won a medal or trophy, but no one can top him when it comes to desire and effort. Whenever I call for the seeded section for the 13 and under races, Joey always pops up. As an example of his competitiveness, in the 3:02 half mile he lost a shoe at the 220 mark, but never slowed down as he finished out the race.

It is because of younger runners like him that I feel we can add an 11 and under division without having any problems. I wonder, however, if he will resent not being able to run with the 12 and 13 year olds.

In the eight annual renewal, most marvelous were the performances of runners in the 10-11 division and the versatility of the GILLILAND family of Albuquerque. 



HOUSE CALL

by DR. GABE MIRKIN

QUESTION: Our 15 year-old daughter was hampered in cross country running, last fall, by abdominal pains. She could handle the first mile quite well but was usually plagued by extreme pain in one side or the other, or just over-all abdominal trouble.

We have been searching for an answer to her problem. Have you any observations on her condition, and any ideas that she might try.

DR. MIRKIN: Abdominal pain reoccurring with hard exercise has perplexed many a competitive athlete. The pain, usually in the right upper quadrant, can occur anywhere in the abdomen or back. It usually comes with hard and fast running requiring deep and rapid breathing.

Several different body mechanisms are responsible for the pain. This article will deal with some of the causes and effects of this problem and what can be done about it.

HEPATIC FLEXURE DISTENTION

Most exercise-induced right upper quadrant pain is probably due to swelling of the last part of the intestinal tract, called the transverse colon.

Gas is formed throughout the entire intestinal tract and is pushed by muscular contraction, which is markedly increased by hard exercise, towards the colon. As gas rises to the highest point, it gathers in the right upper part of the transverse colon, called the hepatic flexure.

As the gas is prohibited from passing further by stool in the colon, it rises to the highest point, cannot pass further, and causes pain by distending the walls of the colon.

Therapy should be aimed at softening the stool so that the gas will be able to pass along the colon. A diet rich in starch yields hard stool, while a diet rich in fruit and vegetables yields the opposite.

A runner, who gets frequent right-side pain, should eat more fruits and vegetables and limit his intake of bread, potatoes, spaghetti, etc..

If the pain occurs in a race, bend forward as far as you can while still running and squeeze the site of the pain with your hands. This will push the gas along and ease somewhat the pain.

WEAK DIAPHRAGMATIC MUSCLES:

Diaphragmatic pain can come from the accumulation of breakdown products from muscular exercises. The diaphragm, like any other muscle, must be trained to get rid of these breakdown products.

Accordingly, racing hard and fast should be done at least once every two weeks.

One can also take some of the work off the diaphragm by increasing the intra-abdominal pressure through better muscle control. Sit ups done with the knees bent are strongly recommended. The knees are bent in order to put more of the work load on the upper abdominal muscles.

DISTENDED LIVER CAPSULE:

When the heart beats rapidly, excess blood is stored in the liver and distends it. This, in turn, stretches the capsule surrounding the liver.

As the liver can stretch and the capsule cannot, the runner will feel pain. The treatment during a race is the same as pain caused by a distended colon.

PRE-RACE MEAL:

The breakdown products of ingested protein metabolism, called organic acids, can only be eliminated by the kidney. Large amounts of organic acids, from exercise and ingested protein, can cause abdominal pain. Accordingly, one should never eat significant amounts of protein for 24 hours before a race. Steak and hamburgers are very poor pre-race meals.

The night before a race a competitor should eat a diet rich of carbohydrate (spaghetti, macaroni, bread, potato..). The day of the race very little should be eaten and it should certainly not be protein.

MILK OR WHEAT INTOLERANCE:

A significant number of people get abdominal cramping with either milk or wheat. This is due to the absence of an enzyme in their intestinal tract; this enzyme is needed to break down these foods. A pe son, given to abdominal pain, should experiment first by not taking milk for 48 hours before a race, and then by omitting all wheat products.

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RECOMMENDATIONS:

- * Do sit ups with your knees bent. Work up to at least 150 per day every second day.
 - * Run hard and fast at least every two weeks.
- * Diet: Switch to a diet primarily of fruit and vegetables and limiting carbohydrates. Three days before an important race, switch back to a diet rich in carbohydrates and cut back on the protein. The day of the race eat nothing or a small amount of dry cereal. Do not eat wheat or drink milk.
- * If the pain persists, in spite of the recommendations at the end of this article, and you are concerned about it, you should see your physician.

He will use his judgement in ordering the following tests:

<u>BLOOD</u> - Complete blood count, liver function tests, including bilirubin and SGOT, cholestrol, trigly-cerides, BUN, sickle cell prep, esmotic fragility and stool for ove and parasites.

(Many of the commercial laboratories that use a computer now, will do almost all of the tests for less than \$35.00).

 $\frac{X-RAY}{der}$ - Upper Gastrointestinal series, Gall bladder series, and bariumenema.

More exotic tests will be considered only if the individual's situation warrants it.

Dr. Mirkin is in the process of compiling material for a book dealing with track injuries.

He would like to hear from any runner who has had a chronic problem and how he feels he solved it. He would also appreciate receiving from coaches and parents any questions or answers they may have, drawn from their experience with such problems.

This book is certainely much needed in age group track and other sports.


