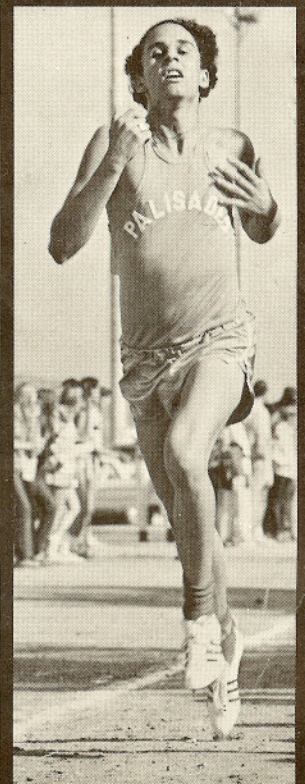

Issues & Answers

BOARD OF ADVISERS: C. Harmon Brown M.D./Hal and Olga Connolly

DR. HARMON BROWN is the National Age-Group Girls Track and Field Chairman for the AAU. He has conducted extensive research on the effect of training on young athletes and has directed a number of track and field coaching clinics.

As a member of STARTING LINE'S Advisory Board, he will answer questions specifically related to philosophical and practical aspects of age-group track.

QUESTIONS:

What, in your opinion, are the greatest needs in developing better track and field programs for the youth of the U.S.?

Dr. Brown Track and field should be the most natural activity for young people, as everyone loves to run, jump, and throw. If track and field for the young is to be improved in the U.S., there must be a concerted effort along several fronts to popularize the sport and do a real "selling job" on the merits of track as an all-around developer of fitness, and as an outlet for youngsters with varied types and levels of ability. Pressure should be brought to bear on the schools to increase their track activities and to include more running and endurance activities in the curriculum. The AAU and others interested in track need to do a better nationwide promoting job to obtain funds for the training of coaches and the support of local track clubs, and the organization of competitive programs, in a manner similar to the organization of Little League baseball, Canadian Legion ice hockey, etc. A program of clinics, training camps, local league organization and promotion would provide the base for a sound, long range program for track and field for American youth.

How can STARTING LINE best serve the interests of young boys and girls involved in track & field?

Dr. Brown 1- Point out that track and field can be fun! This needs to be emphasized to the coaches and parents as much as to the young athlete.

2- Inform youngsters of what is going on around the rest of the country, in the way of meets, league organization, innovations in types of events, and how other boys and girls train.

3- Tell how various areas have had problems in getting their organizations started, and how these problems have been met and solved, especially in ways to raise money.

4- Keep up with rule changes.

5- Give tips on meet conduct and organization, and provide ideas of how to fabricate equipment inexpensively

6- Provide meet results and tabulations, but de-emphasize records, especially for the very young. Too many young children get pushed too hard too soon by ambitious parents and coaches who are trying to set records. A conscious philosophy of emphasizing the enjoyable and recreational aspects of track and the great feeling of being in good physical condition are needed.

We are very pleased to present our first issue of STARTING LINE, in the conviction that a publication such as ours can make a significant contribution to Track & Field and related Sports.

STARTING LINE's primary purpose is to encourage the participation of young boys and girls in track and field activities.

In order to assist in bringing this about, we intend to disseminate useful and pertinent information and help promote the development of quality programs for young athletes. We could not fail to recognize the tremendous yearning for a publication that would satisfy these needs and fulfill those purposes.

STARTING LINE, as a matter of policy, will attempt to meet the following objectives:

1. To serve as a media for the exchange of ideas and information between athletes, coaches, parents and officials,
2. To be a center for the coordination of research and information pertaining to concepts and methods of training and developing young athletes,
3. To serve as a nucleus for news and feature material relating to individuals and organizations.

STARTING LINE will not be a mere duplication of the numerous track and field publications already in existence, nor does it intend to set itself in direct competition with other periodicals. This magazine is solely concerned with track and field activities for the elementary, junior high and high school age athlete. In that sense STARTING LINE is a unique endeavor.

In our first year of operation we will publish ten issues with a minimum of sixteen pages per issue. Expansion of our coverage will be directly proportionate to the increase in our circulation. HIGH SCHOOL

One special area of concern to the editors has been the manner in which we should approach the boys of the 14-17 age group.

The problems we encountered were two-fold: (1) the lack of continuity in the coverage between the pre-high school and high school age athletes, and (2) how to bridge the gap between interscholastic competition and age-group/all-comers programs for high school age athletes, which have greatly expanded in recent years.

In an attempt to resolve this dilemma, we have included in our magazine a special section on California High Schools. This self contained section is in the nature of a pilot project. We invite readers from other states, who are in need of more comprehensive and in-depth coverage of high school track and field and cross-country in their area, to help us develop this section so as to serve their needs.

1970 Review: PART ONE: The Sprints and Hurdles

14-17 Division

It seems strange to think of 18 year olds as has beens, but as far as this column is concerned, that will be exactly the situation. We will cover only those athletes 17 and younger.

Gone from the girls' division this year are internationalists Francie Larrieu, Cheryl Toussaint, Brenda Simpson, Maria Stearns, Vicki Betts, and Jan Glotzer as well as internationalist-to-be Beth Bonner.

Heading the list of returnees is super talented Mavis Laing. The fabulous Phoenician won national titles in the girls' 220 and women's 440 with bests of 23.7y, 23.2m and 52.9y. She followed this up with a successful European tour.

Another outstanding sprinter is diminutive Williamae Ferguson of the West Coast Jets (Covina, Cal). She ran wind-aided 10.6 and 23.6 in winning the girls' 100 over Pam Greene of Denver and placing second in both the women's and girls' 220. Speaking of Pam, the two time internationalist zipped to 10.6 and 23.7w clockings and will be back for her final year in the girls' division. Two others who could make big breakthroughs this season are 15 year old Alfreda Daniels of the Detroit Striders (10.7) and Donna Beckstrom of the Southern California Missiles (10.8, 24.2w, 57.0).

The two best quartermilers in this age group come from opposite ends of the country. They are 17 year old Esther Stroy of Sports International (Washington, D.C.) and 16 year old Mabel Ferguson, Williamae's sister. Esther, who ran in the Olympics as a 15 year old phenom, should be over the injuries which restricted her last year. She has bests of 23.8w and 53.5m. Mabel placed second in the girls' nationals and had a best of 54.8.

A big surprise in the hurdles was Bobbette Krug of La Jolla, Cal. who was unranked as a 12-13 hurdler in 1969 but was AAU champion and national record holder in the girls' 80 yard barriers (10.3) in 1970.

12-13 Division

National records fell in six events as the 12-13's were led by Cordella Ingram of LaMott TC, Pa. who took nearly 1½ seconds off the 440 mark with a 56.7 clocking at UCLA.

No one girl dominated the sprints. Karen McDaniel of the Pioneer TC (Washington, D.C.) had an unblemished record and zipped to a 10.7 100 in the U.S. Youth Games, but she was injured and didn't get to compete against the cream of the crop at UCLA. La Mirada's Carol Burkland recorded the year's best 220 (24.9) plus having an 11.1. Pat Benson won the 100 at UCLA in 11.2, recorded a 25.0 and tied the national record in the 50 at 6.0. Cordella Ingram took the 220 at UCLA in 25.0. The duo of Denise Julian and Creola Miller from Ravenswood, Cal. both have run 6.1 and 11.2. Marsha Talley of Texas whipped off 6.1, 11.4 and 25.6 clockings. When she was hot, Bakersfield's Juanita Kelley ran 6.1, 11.3 and 25.9.

Following Ingram on the 440 list was Patty Cape, who hit 58.3 before turning 14. Carol Burkland and Denise Johnson of the PAL both ran 59.5. Betsy Hager, United San Juan, Cal. heads the list of returnees in this division. Others are Duke City Dashers (N.M.) Linda Streckler (59.7) and Joyce Wolak and Signe Carlson of La Mirada, both at 60.0.

Bobbette Krug was the class of the hurdlers until she turned 14. She ran 7.0 several times and had a wind-

aided 6.8. From that point on Carol Burkland took over, winning the state and national titles in 7.1. Twelve year old Sue Kelley of Chicago Heights ran a questionable 6.8, a legit 7.0 and lost only to Burkland. Sue's teammates Vicki Ward and Denise Cable ran 7.0 and 7.1 respectively behind the 6.8. Discus record breaker Terri Sabol of La Mirada also ran a 7.1.

10-11 Division

The highlight of the 1970 season came on July 3 when Tanya Bryant of Sports International took 59.7 seconds to tour UCLA's red tartan track. Solely on the basis of this one feat, Tanya must be considered athlete of the year in the 10-11 division.

The fastest time in the 100 was recorded by another D.C. girl, Clenitha Ray of the Travelers TC who zipped to a national record equaling 11.8 in a heat at UCLA. In the finals she was beaten by Bakersfield's consistent Sherry Hughes who recorded 12.0 as well as 6.4 and 26.8 during the year. Bakersfield's stable of sprinters also included Joyce Lee, who set a short lived national record of 62.0 in the 440 to go with 6.4 and 12.1 in the short sprints, and 10 year old Terri Frye, who ran 12.0 and 27.8 and will be back to do damage to the record book this year. Mickey's Missiles of San Diego were strong in the sprints with Shelley Earl powered to times of 27.1 and 63.4, picking up where Regina Johnson (6.4 and 12.2) left off.

Pam Hammond of Sacramento ripped off a 63.4 quarter and good sprint clockings and Sue White, who was nearly overlooked as Tanya Bryant's teammate, ran 62.2 and is third on the all time 10-11 440 list. Her talents lie on the longer side of the quarter. All-arounder Sonia Fountain of Oxnard, Cal. sprinted 6.5 and 12.0.

9- Under Division

The 1970 season produced many speedy mighty mites but none outshone little Jackie DeVose of the Detroit Striders. Jackie set national records in the 220 and 440 at 29.3 and 67.0 and missed the 100 mark by only a tenth with a 12.4. She ran a 7.1 50 and produced a 1:52.8 660 in her only attempt at the distance.

Other top sprinters were Bakersfield's Thea Parrish (6.8, 30.9) and Kayvon Hughes (13.3, 29.0w), Mickey's Missiles' Cynthia Tyler (29.0w, 29.9, 69.4), Marla Roberts of the Wasco (Cal.) Wildcats (6.7, 13.3), and Tanna Meadows of Duke City (29.8w). The girl to watch this year will be Debbie Kainz of Ontario-Montclair, Cal. who sped to 13.6 and 30.4w clockings as an eight year old.

BOYS AGE GROUP

EDITOR: Max Zucker

If you have been looking in newspaper clippings or magazine sections for some news of track & field activities for boys at the age group level, chances are that you looked in vain. We, at STARTING LINE have felt for some time that we should do something about it; and we have.

For obvious reasons, the great majority of our readers have yet to be acquainted with the age group T&F scene. This column, therefore, will serve to introduce, as comprehensively as possible, a summary of boys activities in age-group competition. Due to the vastness of the subject, we will split our coverage in three parts: 1) the Sprints, 2) the Middle and Long Distances, and 3) the Jumps and Field events.

1970 Review: PART ONE: The Sprints

9 & UNDER - Each track season introduces us to new names. Last season was no different. The outstanding performers of the 1970 season were: GEORGE GAFFNEY of Le-moore, Cal., with times of 6.6 and 12.4 in the 50 and 100 respectively; ALAN AIKEN from Baldwin Hills, Cal., 6.7, 12.7 as well as a 29.5 in the 220 yds. dash, which puts him in 3rd place on the STARTING LINE's nat. list; DENNIS DAVIS (Menlo Park, Cal) with 6.7 and 13.0 in the short sprints and 31.3 in the 220; CURTIS THOMAS from Port Arthur Lincoln, Texas, racing to 6.8, 50 and 12.9 in the 100. From Portland, Oregon, we hear from CLARK CHRISTIANSON with 13.0 in the 100, 30.7 in the 220 and 71.0 in the 440yds; speedster O.J. WADDELL, with a 13.2 in the 100 and a fast 29.1, 220 (2nd best on S.L.'s national list).

A big surprise, was MOBIE OLIVER from Compton, Cal., running a startling 29.0 in the 220, at the So. Pac. Jr. Olympics, ranking him no. 1 on S.L.'s national list.

Is the 440 a run or a dash? You will be the judge. WILLIE BAILEY from Bakersf. Cal sprinted the distance in 66.9 - a new Jr. Olympic Rec. - (S.L.'s official age 9 best still belongs to Wasco, Cal ace KEVIN KNOX with 67.2 last year). Other names in the news: ROBERT SCOTT (Delano, Cal) 67.7; TIM MABRY (Fresno, Cal) 68.9; AARON STRIEGEL (New Albany, Indiana) 70.2 and from Alberquerque, N.M., STEVE WILKINS, with a fine 70.3. That's all the space.

10 and 11 - Undeniably, the big news belongs to 11 years old ARMANDO RIOS from New York City. Running for the Atom T.C., he dashed to an incredible 10.6 in the 100 at the U.S. Youth Games in N.Y.; his time is one second faster than the nearest boy on the national list. Just before this meet, he gave notice of what was to come. In the local Jr. Olympics, he won, with total ease, the 100 in 11.1 and the 440 in 59.8 (an age 11 super Best).

Just turning 11 and a real threat this year is MELVIN HOLLAND from Menlo Park, Cal. Last season he ran the 50 in 6.2, the 100 in 11.8, and the 220 in 27.2 (A.A.U. Rec.). Other excellent performances came from: DWAYNE EVANS, from Phoenix, Ariz, with 6.2, 11.6, and 27.5; GREGORY DAVIS (Menlo Park, Cal) in 6.4, 12.0, and 28.5. No 1 in the 50 yds dash was RONNIE CRANSHAW (S. Texas) in 5.8 (Jr. Olympic Rec.). Following him were KENNY HALL, JOHNY WILLIAMS and S. MOSHER all with 6.3. Outstanding in the 440 were GEORGE MCKNIGHT (Meadville, Pa) with 62.0 - a new Jr. Olymp. Rec. - at least for the moment -, RICKY MERRELL from Florida with 63.3 and from Kansas, ROBERT PETERSON, with 64.1. A special mention about two ten year olds whiz kids is in order. KEVIN KNOX (Wasco, Cal) improved his own age 10 best in the 440 with a swift 64.0, and DAVID HARGUS, the pride of San Diego, Cal, ran the same distance in 66.4; they are even better at longer distances. Believe it...

RACE WALKING

Race-Walking Editor JIM HANLEY is an All-American and world class walker, as well as being the So. Calif. Race-Walking chairman. His articles have appeared in many publications. Jim is also a H.S. teacher in Canoga Park, Cal.

The purpose of this column is to build interest in the walking events, so as to increase participation and therefore improve the quality of walking programs in America.

The Race-Walk is probably the most misunderstood event in track & field. Let me clarify this situation a bit.

My advice is to just watch for those three things: 1) the step should be first heel and then toe, 2) there should always be contact with the ground, and 3) your leg must be straightened after every step (avoid creeping or shuffling). Remember: keep CONSTANT contact -

Race-Walking has improved tremendously; in fact every American Race-Walking record has been bettered the past two years. Too few realize that the U.S. actually dominates the world in sprint walking lists and has won major international competitions at the longer distances.

Walkers are not born - they are made. Race-Walking, like Distance running requires a substantial sum of training. The world's best walkers are about 35 years of age, and they started training in that discipline in their twenties. Imagine what would happen if school-age athletes could have similar experience behind them when their bodies have physically matured in their late teens or early twenties. Need I say more...

12 and 13 - Last year the following boys made the headlines: ROBERT KOKKA and HIME BUNTING, both from the Central Cal area, ran the 100 yds dash in 10.3 in Jr. Olympic competition, which is only one tenth off recognized stars such as ENNIS JONES ('64), KEN CURL ('66) and DAN WBSTER (in '68). In the 220 yds dash, D. LUCAS (Colorado) ran to a A.A.U. Rec. breaking 23.9 and JASON JOHNSON from Bakersfield recorded a 24.0 for a new Jr. O. Rec. DARRYL EVERETT from N.Y.C. had the best time of the year in the 440 with 53.8 along with a 10.5, 100.

Going down the list, MILLARD HAMPTON, (Menlo Park, Cal) - 10.5, 24.1, and 57.5; LELVIN CROWE, (W. Covina, Cal) - 10.9, 24.3, and 55.0; ELVIS PEACOCK, (Florida) - 10.8 and 24.3; VICTOR THOMPCKINS, (Richmond, Fla) 24.7 and 54.8; on and on...

The 14 to 17 boys will be covered in depth at the conclusion of the High School track season.

On November 21, 1970, ten year old KEVIN KNOX ran an amazing mile-two mile double at the Wasco, California Distance Derby. The Wasco Wildkat ace recorded times of 5:08.9 and 11:01.1, both bettering the known age bests for those distances.

Kevin's split times in the two mile show his knowledge of pace: 75.9, 82.4, 83.3, 85.2 (5:26.8 at the mile), 84.6, 86.0, 85.5, and 78.2 (5:34.3 final mile).

The meet certainly deserves that qualification if we are to consider the tremendous success of the event. 839 entrants (!) ran in the large program; it was the largest non-school field in the history of the Van Cortlandt Park cross country course. Trophies were given to every finisher!

The top performers in the meet were the Assumma twins, Frank and Charles, who came all the way from California representing the Rialto Road Runners. They placed first and second in the 8 & 9 Division and their time was faster than the winning 10-11 mark.

The best girl was Robin Campbell of Washington D.C.'s Sports International, who had the fastest girl's time of the day. Only 11 years old, her time was also better than the boys of the same age-group. She ran a beautiful race in beating highly regarded Julie Shea of Raleigh, North Carolina, with a devastating kick.

The meet director was Barry Geisler Sr. and was assisted by Kurt Steiner and Dr. Gabe Mirkin.

Pennsylvania - from JOHN HARWICK -

The Eighth Annual John F. Kennedy Memorial 3 Mile Run drew over 100 runners to Pittsburgh's Schenley Park last November 15. The race was first run in Waynesburg in 1963, though it wasn't until 1968 that a boys 13 and under race was added and not until 1970 that a similar girls race was included. This is the first sports event to honor the late president's support of fitness.

After being run for two years in Olean, N.Y., the generosity of the Knights of Columbus has given the JFK Run a permanent home in Pittsburgh.

Brooklyn Tech High School, the defending New York public school cross-country, indoor and outdoor track champions, may have the only active high school alumni support group in the United States. In December of 1967 the Brooklyn Tech Alumni Spiked Shoe Club was established, with the intention of forming a continuous chain from high school through college studies to the business world, while maintaining a continuity of interest toward the current Tech track team.

The club, under the guidance of president Steven E. Sutton, publishes a quarterly newsletter, holds socio-athletic functions, and conducts an annual Varsity Awards Dinner in cooperation with coach Ed Zarowin. In addition, a "College Contact Program" and "Tutorial Program" for Tech tracksters is sponsored by the alumni. The College Contact Program, by making athletes aware of the college opportunities available to them and assisting them in making the proper contacts in order to get in to the college of their choice is a typical example of how the Tech Spiked Shoe Club is helping the undergrads.

THE MIDWEST

Nebraska - from TOM HALLSTROM -

An example of what can be done is provided by the Midwestern Association Junior Olympic program under the direction of Don Watchorn and Tom Hallstrom. Last year, the Midwestern JO Finals at Burke Stadium in Omaha had approximately 1200 boys and girls competing on the 8 lane all-weather track in a meet which set 6 national JO records.

Even more impressive was the fact that 16 qualifying meets were held with a total participation of 5,740 athletes each of which paid a \$1.00 entry fee. The fees collected were used not only to pay the meet expenses but also provide a multi-color program (with lots of individual pictures) and to pay for T-shirts and travel expenses for qualifiers to the Regional JO meet.

The final meet program listed every qualifier in every event, a total of 2,176 slots. And the whole program is summarized in an annual report at the end of the year.

Those who need some hints in organizing their local Junior Olympic programs would do well to contact Tom Hallstrom, 3902 Davenport, Omaha, Nebraska 68131.

Joe Smetanka, coach and organizer of the Lipke Track Club in Detroit, figures that the girls on his relatively new team have traveled 30,000 miles to 36 cities in 10 states and Canada in the three years of their operation. In addition, the club hosts one of the few cross-country meets which draws both big AAU and novice fields.

THE SOUTH

Florida - from JIMMY CARNES -

Gainesville, Florida can claim one of the top Junior Champ programs in the country. Last summer the Gainesville Junior Chamber sponsored not only track meets for boys and girls of all ages, but also organized four clinics per week. The clinics included movies, demonstrations by University of Florida athletes, and instruction by Dave Kaplan and George Rone, local high school coaches.

On the average, the weekly track meets attracted over 200 athletes. STARTING LINE will keep its readers informed of developments in this rapidly expanding track area.

THE CLUB / A PROFILE

The COLORADO GOLD A new girls team, the COLORADO GOLD, was initiated during last summer after reorganization of the Colorado Pacers.

The head coach is LYLE KNUDSON, a mathematics teacher at Broomfield H.S., and he is assisted by JOHN BOYD, DWIGHT AUSTIN, DOUG DIENELT, GORDON FOX and DEL HESSEL.

The club has an abundance of fine distance runners: BARBARA LAWSON (2:12, 880), DONNA TEN EYCK (2:12, 880), PAM YOUNG (2:25.3 as an 11 year old), MARLENE CLARK (2:36.8 - 10 yr. old), and SHELLY COOPER (11) are among the better distance runners nationally at their respective age-group. The depth in the distances is further demonstrated by young talents such as KIM CLARK, LYNN SUTTON, SUE EDWARDS, LORI COVINGTON and SALLY & JOAN TEN EYCK.

In the sprints, some excellent prospects in JILL WEELAND, 12.1 in 100 and 29.6, 220 at age 11, DEBBIE PATTON - 11.0 and 25.3, and CINDY STUHMILLAN.

In the jumps, GINGER NIELSEN (12) 15'9½" in L.J., WENDY KOENIG (15), 18'2 and 5'4½" in H.J. and JAYNE FREDERICKS, 18'6 and 5'5, will be right on top this coming season.

A fast improving trio in the weights: KELLY CURRAN (11) - 29'11½" with the 6 lbs., NANCY COLLINGSWORTH (13) 35'5 (6 lbs.) and JOAN STRATTON in the discus with 131'.

The COLORADO GOLD - a young club that's growing fast.

SAN JOSE YEARLINGS It was in the spring of 1968 that Gary Gallego, who was a member of the San Jose City College track team that year, began to conceive the idea of creating a track club for boys. A youngster who was always helping him out in his practice on the field first made him aware that there were no boys teams in the San Jose area. He decided then that he would create his own club. The boy - Vance Eberly, now a sensational age-group athlete. The club - the San Jose Yearlings. From that one runner the club has now a membership of over 50 athletes.

The club's basic philosophy can be summarized in four points: (a) any boy or girl willing to work and interested in joining the club, will be welcomed to the team, (b) as a member of the club, an athlete is expected to try to do his very best, whether he or she be winning or losing, (c) although there are membership fees, no one will be denied the right to join the club for lack of money, (d) the goal is to teach the young the wonderful sport of track and field.

In three years, the San Jose Yearlings have compiled a remarkable record of team and individual performances. There are too many fine individuals on the team for a complete profile; let us list a few of the outstanding ones: VANCE EBERLY (11) the first Yearling ever has been the winner of three Pacific AAU and California State cross-country championships and has times on the track of 68.0, 440; 2:27.5, 880; 5:10.5 in the mile and 11:05 for two miles; a great walker: 1:54.6, 440 and 8:50.2 in the mile walk. DION GIBLEN (10) 2:50.4; 3'11", HJ; 9:55 in the mile walk. SEAN GIBLEN (11) 5:36, 4'5" and 9:16 mile walk. MARTY WRIGHT (12) as an 11 year old 65.8, 2:32.1, 5:27.0, and 33'4½" in triple jump. CHRIS GIBLEN (12) the club's best race walker with an 8:31 for one mile and has covered 6 miles and 73 yards in the one hour walk. BETH SCLAR (14) excellent walker, with a 9:26.1 in the one mile walk at age 13.

The San Jose Yearlings are hoping to enlarge the club by adding new coaches and raising their present membership to 100-180 boys and girls. Quoting Gary Gallego, "I would like to set out and prove that it is more practical as well as more fun to have a team that is composed of both boys and girls rather than two separate organizations."

After the conclusion of the high school season, STARTING LINE will continue providing information on teen-age athletes. Many top marks are recorded during the summer months in A.A.U. and other age-group competitions such as all-comers meets, district, regional and national Junior Olympics, Jaycee meets, and so on; we will furnish you with significant results from these events.

The high school section of STARTING LINE may eventually be expanded in size and scope, or it might even develop into a separate publication, depending on your response.

We welcome your comments and suggestions in our endeavor to provide the type of information you would like to see in print.

CROSS COUNTRY RESULTS

SOUTHERN SECTION

LARRY GREER of Lakewood was the individual winner and Burbank copped the team title in the Southern Section AAAA Division of the California Interscholastic Federation (CIF) cross country championships held Nov. 28 on the flat 2.1 miles course at Cal State in Long Beach.

GREER, a 9:06.4 two miler, hung close to the pace for the first mile, ran his next half-mile very hard and then coasted home in 9:29.5. RICH WALKER of Arroyo, El Monte (9:39), finished second and SCOTT SCHWEITZER of Burbank (9:40) followed in third position. It was the first defeat of the year for WALKER.

Despite the fact that Burbank's top runner, REX BOWLBY ran with a sprained ankle and finished 35th, the Bulldogs still accomplished to log a 54-65 victory. Runners responsible for Burbank's victory included: MARK KUSHNER, 6th in 9:53; CRAIG WHATCOTT, 11th in 9:59; ED BIRREER, 16th in 10:03 and BOB GARDENA, in 18th place in 10:04. The highest finishing Junior was MARK GENET of Santa Anna, 5th in 9:48, while BARRIE WILLIAMS, of N. Torrance, 14th in 10:00, was the fastest sophomore in the race.

North Torrance, which finished third in the team race, should prove to be very tough in the next two years as four of its top five runners are sophomores.

Sophomore TERRY WILLIAMS of Lompoc pulled the biggest surprise of the day in winning the AAA Division race in 9:39.5 as he and his Brave teammates scored a 45-97 victory over second place Palos Verdes. Lompoc was a solid favorite to win the team title but LARRY HILDENBRAND, a second place finisher last year and a 4:18.3 miler, not WILLIAMS, was expected to be the leader of the Braves. HILDENBRAND broke on top early but he faded after the mile mark and finished fifth. Juniors GORDON INNES of Upland (9:41) and ED GRACE of Aviation, Manhattan Beach (9:43) finished second and third while MARK DULANEY of Palos Verdes (9:45), a 9:04.2 two miler, finished fifth. INNES, the top qualifier a week ago in 9:28, slipped and fell in the early stages of the finals but still recovered to give WILLIAMS a tough race. In addition to HILDENBRAND's "poor" finish the Braves' No. 3 runner sophomore ALVIN GILMORE, who has been just behind WILLIAMS all year, finished 48th. Last year GILMORE ran 4:29.2 to become the fastest black 14 year old miler in the world.

In winning the team title, the Braves also managed to clock

the fastest team time (49:35.5) for any division. It was the second straight team title for Lompoc.

Last year, San Marino and La Canada finished first and third respectively in the A Division finals. This year with an expansion to four divisions, the same pair moved up to the tougher AA Division. The titans still remained on top, 49-77, but the Spartans moved into the runner-up position. It was the fifth title in the last seven year for San Marino. Since six of the seven San Marino runners are underclassmen, it seems likely they will retain their title next year.

Individual AA Division winner was DAVID CALDERA of Rowland, in 9:45.5. He was followed by sophomore IVAN PORTO of San Marino in 9:53; RICK PIERCY of Victor Valley in 9:57 and CESAR TALAVERA of Salesian, L.A. in 9:58. PORTO, a native Brazilian, who ran a 4:28 mile last year, finished very strong and might have caught CALDERA, had he not given up such a large early lead.

CHRIS HOFFMAN of St. Bernard, Playa del Rey, led his Viking teammates to the A Division title with a 9:42.6 first place finish. HOFFMAN remained undefeated for the year, finishing with about a 50yds lead to second place finisher, DENIS CUFF of Webb School, Claremont, a 4:19.4 miler last year. The next three placers were all juniors: ROGER HENDERSON of Santa Paula (9:50); TOM KOPPES of St. John Bosco, Bellflower (9:55) and TOM RAZZETO of St. Bernard. Last year, HOFFMAN won the A Division and St. Bernard had finished second behind San Marino.

LOS ANGELES CITY

JOSE AMAYA of Wilson scored an unexpectedly easy victory over BRENT TUBB of Cleveland in the L.A. City cross country finals held December 12 on the hilly two mile course at Pierce college. A year ago, AMAYA was leading in the latter stages of the race with TUBB closing in quickly, when an unidentified man accidentally knocked AMAYA to the ground. He was able to recover for third in 9:59 but TUBB raced home the winner in 9:52.

However this year was a different story as AMAYA who had reduced the course record, first to 9:43 in the N. League finals then to 9:41 in the City prelims won easily over TUBB. Brent, in the finals, ran as though he had been reading Amaya's press clippings; he jumped to a quick 12 yard lead as the runners ascended the top of the hill, and by the time he reached the bottom he had increased his lead to approximately 50 yards. But the rapid pace began to tell and AMAYA quickly closed the gap and soon overtook the Cleveland harrier. From that moment Tubb lost interest in the race, and he coasted in the finish line a well beaten eight. AMAYA's winning time was an impressive 9:35, a new course record.

A surprising result, at Pierce, was the team victory of Fairfax. Without placing a runner in the top ten, the Lions defeated Granada Hills 71-75. STEVE ACUFF, fifth in 10:11; DAVE ASKREN, sixth in 10:11, and JOHN LOOMIS, ninth in 10:16, all of Granada Hills, finished in front of JUAN MALDINADO, 12th in 10:20, the first Fairfax finisher. It was the first title for Fairfax.

Technique & Training

Frank Lagotic / Bill Peck

Your son has been training with the track team and is preparing for his first competition on Saturday. What should he eat for breakfast? What foods should he avoid? Can he drink milk without ill effect?

One of the girls in your track club complains of pain in her hamstring muscle after her heat in the 50 yard dash. Should she run in the finals? Is the pain an indicator of a pull, strain, or cramp?

You have organized an age group track club for boys and girls. After the first few practices a number of runners complain of side aches. Can they continue running without harm? What causes the pain? Are there any exercises that can relieve the ache?

Along with the growing popularity of age group track there have been growing pains. The questions posed above are typical of the questions that coaches, parents, and the athletes themselves ask. Up to this time there has been a noticeable lack of published information specifically related to age group track and field. Some information has been passed by word of mouth, but has failed to reach the majority of those who could most benefit from it.

STARTING LINE attempts to correct this problem in that it presents all facets of the age group track picture - results, news, coming events, technical information etc. The purpose of this column is to present the technical aspect in an understandable form for all those interested in age group track and field.

The column will survey three major technical areas; training, technique, and philosophy of coaching. The training aspect will cover topics such as the following: methods of training, nutrition for age group athletes, physiological changes brought about through training, and general information to aid the coach, parent, and athlete to better understand the how and why of all facets of training.

Technique involves the methods of teaching beginners, improving intermediates, and refining the veteran competitor so that he or she may run faster, jump better, or throw further. This will include the discussion of principles of physics as well as information related to body mechanics.

Coaching philosophy will deal with various approaches used in coaching young athletes, the opinions of medical experts and psychologists concerning competition for young boys and girls, making practices interesting and beneficial, and any aspect not specifically covered under technique and training.

USOC GIRLS COACHING CLINICS

A number of clinics for outstanding girls field event athletes and their coaches were sponsored in 1970 by the United States Olympic Committee. One such clinic was held at Millbrae, California under the able direction of Dr. Harmon Brown on December 27-29.

About 25 girls, 12 years and older, and an equal number of coaches and phys. ed. teachers were in attendance at the five sessions, which were organized primarily to aid the development of U.S. female jumpers and throwers. Instructors included such specialists as John Dobroth, Jim Santos, Werner Schwantje, Ed Parker, and others.

Lectures and practical learn-by-doing sessions dealt with weight training, the "flop" style of high jumping, rhythm drills, teaching beginners, "elastic communication" etc. Other such clinics were held at Champaign, Illinois and Seattle, Wash. More are contemplated.

In writing and editing any article of this type a major problem is finding published material particularly oriented to very young athletes. A great deal of scientific information has been published on athletes in general, the older, fully matured athlete. However, many investigators are somewhat reluctant to undertake scientific studies as they relate to children because the results are often inconclusive and open to criticism.

The scientific investigator has a problem in examining the factors affecting boys and girls and in determining what causes a particular change. Does a boy or girl run faster or jump further this year as opposed to last year because of 1) training, 2) experience, or 3) maturation? The improvement is considered to be a combination of these three influences, but the problem arises when considering the maturation factor. The investigator has no control over how fast, slow or for that matter when or how a youngster matures. The other factors of experience and training can to a certain extent be controlled.

When reading scientific articles on training it is important to remember that the growing body of a child does not necessarily react or respond as would a matured human body. It is of paramount importance to suit the training program, technique, and coaching philosophy to the individual, particularly in the case of the age group athlete. Do not try to mold the athlete to PERFECTLY fit the published program. The system should make the major adjustments, the athlete minor ones.

ELASTIC COMMUNICATION

Mal Andrews, well known jumping event coach, currently at California State College, Hayward, has developed a method of muscle conditioning which he calls "Elastic Communication". Flexibility, "body discovery", psychological development, and prevention of muscle injuries are the goals of this method which combines meditation with leisurely, but purposeful stretching of the various muscle groups.

The technique sharply contrasts with the normal violent and hurried stretching exercises which many jumpers and hurdlers employ in warming up for workout or competition. Elastic communication/meditation emphasizes very slow muscle stretching to and beyond the point of discomfort by deliberate stages. At the same time the athlete "tunes in" mentally on the muscle group being slowly but forcefully extended as the pain appears and then disappears while the involved body parts are held steady. The same muscles are then extended slightly further and the process is repeated until the particular muscles are adequately stretched.

The concept is comparatively simple in practice in that any known stretching may be used. It is the gentle force applied and the corresponding mental concentration which distinguishes this method from others.

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
