

### ENGLAND INTERNATIONAL XC CHAMP USA & CLAUGUS BOTH SECOND

Cambridge, England, March 18: (From "Athletics Weekly")....
Joyce Smith has become the first British woman to win the
International CC title, an honor previously monopolized by
Doris Brown. Unhappily, the American was unable to defend
her title as she was instructed by the AAU to compete indoors
against the USSR last weekend, (she placed third in the mile
in 4:40.1), and I hear she was in tears when she waved the
American team off at the airport. With Joyce receiving good
support from Rita Ridley (3rd), Sheila Carey (7th) and Ann
Yeoman (11th), England retained the team title.

The early leader was prolific record-setter Paola Pigni, one of at least three competitors with marathon experience, (the Americans Beth Bonner and Carolyn Walker were the others). Unfortunately, the eagerly awaited appearance of Australia's Adrienne Beames did not materialize - so we are none the wiser as to just how good she may be. As the Italian faded from contention the race developed into a three-way

battle involving Joyce Smith, Rita Ridley and the 16 year old American, Eileen Claugus. The two English girls tried to shake off their rival but the 5'3, 100 pound schoolgirl from Sacramento clung tenanciously to them and towards the end she got the better of Rita. Joyce, meanwhile, came off the final stretch of plough ahead, ("I was very tired in the stomach and had dropped my arms") and kept Eileen at bay to the finish, winning by two seconds.

Eileen Claugus is one of the most remarkable young athletes I have ever seen, and she could be set for a wonderous career - although, like many another prodigy, there is always the danger that she will leave the sport before her full potential has been realized. A member of the famed Will's Spikettes club (named after coach Will Stephens) she has been in athletics about four years and can point to such sprakling track times, achieved at the age of 15, of 4:23.9 for 1500m and 4:44.5 for the mile. I asked her how far she covers per week in training. "Around 12 miles", she replied. "Only 12 miles a week?" I queried: "No, 12 miles a day!" Most of this

#### COACH HARMON BROWN: USA-USSR INDOOR

The US women's track and field forces pulled the biggest upset of this year or perhaps any other year when they reversed the predicted 52-45 score on a veteran Russian squad at the first ever US-USSR Indoor International dual meet at Richmond. Virginia. on March 17.

From the outset, the meet appeared to favor the Soviet's superior depth and experience in the longer races for there were four competitions scheduled at 600 yards or longer. Things seemed even more gloomy for the US forces with the non-availability of middle-distance queen Cheryl Toussaint for the 880 and two mile relay, and the illness of Terry Crawford. The Russians seemed so sure of their depth that they scratched Berkeley 800 winner Sabaite from the 880 to only anchor the two mile relay.

In the days preceeding the meet, the American ladies got acquainted and sharpened up with workouts at local Kennedy HS and indoors at William and Mary University. They also enjoyed a brief trip to historic Williamsburg. The unofficial team uniform became "elephant" T-shirts and jeans from the

local department stores.

Meanwhile, the Russians arrived after having given outstanding performances at the European Championships the preceding weekend. However, many had flown back to Russia after that meeting and hardly had time to take a breath before leaving for Richmond. They were caught up in the usual round of sightseeing tours of Williamsburg, Richmond and Washington and had little time for rest or training.

The 'youth movement' in US distance running was apparent when the team assembled. For 16 year olds Wendy Koenig, Debbie Heald and Carol Hudson it was their first experience in international competition. At 15, Sue Parks was a 'veteran' of the 1971 Russian outdoor meet - but as a high jumper! Kaethy Gibbons (17) had toured Europe in 1971 and Doris Brown and Francie Johnson were experienced internationalists.

With their strong events scheduled early in the meet, the American ladies jumped out to a 23-10 lead after three events as Davis and Watson were 1-2 in the sprint, Johnson and Lacey O'Neal 1-2 in the hurdles and Martha Watson won the long jump with her last effort and Willye White was a close third. And that, with the exception of the 600, was supposed to be the end of the US victories for the night.

However, with the momentum building up from these three events, the young distance runners were not to be outdone. 880 runners Carol Hudson and Wendy Koenig were advised to control the race from the front and make the Russians try to pass if they could. Koenig jumped to the front at the start and led the pack through a pedestrian 69 second quarter. As the split was called, Koenig was shocked into action and quickly lifted the pace with the others in close pursuit. Us-

ing her speed to advantage she negotiated the second 440 in 62, holding off the challenge of Raisa Ruus. Hudson, usually a strong finisher, could not respond to the topsy-turvey pace and finished third.

600 runners Kathy Hammond and Jarvis Scott were concerned about the closing strength of 9th ranked Natalia Chistyakova and Berkeley 400 winner Nadezhda Kolesnikova, both strong 400-800 combination runners. As expected, speedster Hammond jumped to an early lead with Scott only a step behind. The two Americans held these spots through the 440 with Hammond clocking 57.0 and Scott 57.4. Coming off the last turn, Kolesnikova began to close as Scott tied up. Hammond went thru the tape strongly at 1:20.5 for a noew world record, while Kolesnikova nipped Scott by a stride, 1:21.0 to 1:21.1.

The exciting mile, described in last month's issue of WTFW, was the high point of the meet and for the rest of the evening the meet was anticlimactic since the Russians could not overcome the scoring gap regardless of their performances. The two mile relay quartette of Sue Parks, Carol Hudson, Doris Brown and Kathy Gibbons succumbed to the relentless pressure of the more experienced Russians and lost a close contest 8:41.6 to 8:42.0. Our unofficial splits were Parks 2:13, Hudson 2:11. Brown 2:09 and Gibbons 2:09.

High jumpers Jayne Frederick and Alice Pfaff, both from Lyle Knudson's stable, cleared an excellent 5'9 to finish in a tie for third. They appear to give the US the best depth it has ever had in this event and on their present training schedule they may be expected to come close to the six foot mark before the season is over.

The victory was a great morale booster for America's women track forces, since they have so often succumbed in international matches, especially when facing the Russians. It must be acknowledged that the Russians may have been "flat" after peaking for the European Championships the week before, but in most cases their performances were equal to or better than their previous bests. They were simply topped by superb American efforts.

For the athletes and the staff, it was a relaxed and enjoyable competition, and several of the athletes attributed their top marks to the relaxed and congenial team relationship. The staff, (Dr. Grant Dungee, Dr. Harmon Brown and Barbara Palm), made every effort to avoid or minimize such "up-tight, turn-off" regulations as hair styles, clothing, curfew, chaperones, etc., which have caused dissention in the past. Problems were anticipated or solved before the crisis stage so that each athlete could concentrate on being prepared to "do her thing" competitively. The accumulated experience of the coaches, (35 years of coaching and 5 international matches), gave them an edge over their men's team counter%arts, so that preparation for the technical meeting and the competition went smoothly. Logic would dictate that one experienced coach be on the staff of every international team.

The match showed that the US has the ability to be a world power in women's track - if we can keep all of this talent in training and competition until they reach their full, mature potential, and if our throwers can begin to match the improvement seen in our runners and jumpers.

The famous Bobby Goff Relays, held each year in Texas, had an entry list of 32 high schools and 17 junior high schools with 595 girls competing.....Stella Palamarchuk of Ambler OC won the 5 kilometer road race walk at Cornwells Heights, Pa, in a pouring, cold rain in 5:28:58.....Kathie Lawson, one of the three USA athletes to tour Australia last month, ended up in a Perth hospital with an infected gall bladder....Granby HS in Massachusetts, has 41 athletes on their track team - and 12 of them are girls....Lipke TC coach Joe Smetana is now on

active duty with the Army - at Ft. Dix, NJ.

prodigious training load is carried out on grass and she had never ever run over ploughland before coming to Cambridge! A young girl in a hurry, her goal is to make the Olympic team at 1500m this year.

Most of Eileen's teammates were equally youthful. For example, Debbie Roth (who ran 4:39.2 for 1500m and 4:59.8 for the mile at age 13!) is also 16, while Tena Anex (5:08.3 mile last year) is a year younger. Tena finished one place ahead of one of Britain's brightest young talents, Mary Stewart (just turned 16) who helped Scotland win the bronze medals. The Scotish team was led in by Margaret Coomber, whose 5th position was her best yet and she's run in every International. Biggest surprise of the race next to Eileen Claugus was the 4th place by Belgium's Van Santberghe - an improvement of 50 places on last year!

#### FROM PEG WARNER'S DIARY - USA CHAPERON

Monday, March 13:-Nine hour flight to London Heathrow Airport arrived about 6:15 AM.

Tuesday, March 14:-1% hour trip by bus to Cambridge, stayed at University Arms Hotel which was the meet headquarters. A very nice park area next to the hotel where everyone took an afternoon run at 3:00.

Wednesday, March 14:-Team took early morning run at eight and began the effort of adjusting to the time change. In the afternoon, we took our first look at the course - which included a wooden fence and a ploughed field but no hills to speak of. The girls worked on going through the fence and over the field - or was it over the fence and through the field? No other teams had yet arrived.

Thursday, March 16:-Made attempt to have fence removed!

Friday, March 17:-Usual team workout at the course site and an IAAF meeting in the afternoon for the officials. Distance changed starting in 1973 to 5000 meters and race will be held in Belgium. Unanimous vote to remove fence from course.

Saturday, March 18:-Race Day! Team meeting at 1:15 and the team motto became "For God, country and Doris!". Upon arriving at the course we were surprised to see how many spectators were on hand. During the preliminary races, the spectators would run from place to place to get a better view sort of like golf fans do. The race was televised with five TV cameras. As the team marched to the presentation of nations, led by a boy scout, some of the spectators were shouting "Go America". More than 5000 spectators were on hand. 40 runners took off, representing eight nations. It would have been nice if Eileen had been first and if the team had been first, but we did very well and surprised a lot of people.

Sunday, March 19:-Left Cambridge at nine o'clock and just made it to the 9:20 for London and we took a tour of London upon arrival.

Monday, March 20:-Up at 7:30, bus terminal by 9:00 and once again just made it in time to go through custums and hop on the 747 which flew us to New York - when we landed and were in the airport, President Nixon dropped down in his helicopter and held a news conference about 50 yards from us. We couldn't check our baggage until he left! We were all too chicken to go shake hands with him. It was nice to get home, but we will have many memories of England, bright and sunny England.



#### LET'S HEAR IT FOR DR. PICKARD

London, England:-Girl athletes make better lovers and are much sexier than less active women, a British sex expert said.
"Athletes are physical creatures," explained Dr. Christine

"Athletes are physical creatures," explained Dr. Christine Pickard, a consultant on birth control and sex problems. "Their bodies are important to them. The physical sensations, touch, the ripple of muscles play a central role in their lives."

How about those huge women whose activities in sports arenas make puny men tremble?

"From the fuss surrounding the Olympic sex tests for women, one might gain the impression that women's sports clubs are harboring myriads of males masquerading as females in order to take unfair advantage on the field", Dr. Pickard complained.

"Women athletes, except for the very rare exceptions, are real women."

Generally, said Dr. Pickard, girl athletes "are much more interested in sex and physically more responsive than their less active sisters."

"In other words, they are more sexy."

Dr. Pickard, a keen swimmer and tennis player, advised men: "Don't let girl athletes' developed muscles put you off. That merely means she hasn't let herself go to seed as so many women have. And muscles are surely much better than either scrawn or flab. Quite a good proportion of these ladies are pretty, too."

Peter Browne, European 800m finalist, was among several British men athletes who agreed with the doctor.

"My wife, Jean, is an athlete and without delving too deeply I certainly have no complaints."

Dr. Pickard told men to be careful:

"If you want the passive type - be warned - you'd better look elsewhere!"
