New York Police Athletic League race walker, Eileen Smith, was the winner in an open 5km Track Walk in Long Branch, New Jersey on March 20th. her winning mark of 29:46 was almost a minute ahead of teammate, Mary McDermott at 30:37.

Two weeks later at Asbury Park, New Jersey, Smith repeated her winning ways in capturing the Captain Ron Zinn Memorial 10 Mile Walk clocking 1:36:05. Again, Mary McDermott finished second (1:43:49), with Julie Falciola of the Shore AC placing third (2:34:54). But the big story in this competition was the fact that Mrs. Falciola PUSHED HER BABY CARRIAGE FOR THE FIRST LAP, OR 1.4 MILES, WHEN NO BABY SITTER WAS AVAILABLE.

## KATHY McMILLAN SOARS ! ...21-7½

A North Carolina high school triangular meet was the site, and Hoke County HS long jumper was the star as she leaped her way to the top of the US long jump list soaring 21-7½ and exceed Martha Watson's American record by ¼ inch. McMillan is really no newcomer to these distances, she has a previous best of 21-7 last season which she accomplished in Prague, Czechoslovakia. But, the 17 year-old high school senior will have to wait for the AAU decision as to whether the mark will be considered for an American record. If it is, in fact, ratified, it will surpass Watson's mark which she set in 1974 in an international competition in Stockholm, Sweden.

## JANE FREDERICK SCORES 4732 IN PENTATHLON

At a recent pentathlon meeting in Santa Barbara, California, Jane Frederick exceeded her American record for the event with an excellent 4,732 points. The score equals the world best achieved last year by East Germany's Burlinde Pollak. The world record (held by Pollak) is 4,932.

Unfortunately, the officiality of the mark will come under some close scrutiny because it seems there was not a wind gauge in operation on the first day of competition. And this could disallow the mark as an official American record. But, hopefully, Jane's best is yet to come in the near future.

Frederick's individual marks (that were available at press time) were: 100mH: 13.1w, LJ: 19-11, 200m: 24.1, HJ: 5-9, SP: not available. Behind Frederick in the final results were some of the finest pentathletes in the world. Second place went to Canada's Diane Jones, the Pan Am Gold medalist with a score of 4,328, third was Modupe Oshikoya of the LATC and Nigeria scoring 4,290 and fourth went to Salem TC's Dana Collins, who was also over the '4 grand' mark with a 4,098.

## WATSON SELECTED TIMES 'WOMAN OF THE YEAR'

29 year old American Long Jump record-holder Martha Watson, has been named as one of the Los Angeles Times 'Women of the Year'. Ten women of distinguished accomplishment in varied fields have been awarded this honor for the year of 1976. Martha joins among others, Cathy Rigby and 232 other recipients of the Times award, which was inaugurated in 1950. In addition to Martha this year, others selected for the honor were actress Lily Tomlin and movie star Dorothy McGuire.

## EUROPEAN INDOOR CHAMPIONSHIPS

Munich, Germany, February 21-22: With the obvious absence of the powerful East German squad (only four competed), the Soviet Union, Bulgaria and others got a chance to exercise some superiority at the European Indoor Championships. A host of impressive marks were nevertheless recorded, with West Germany's Rita Wilden gaining the 'headlines' with her gold medal-winning 400m performance of 52.26. The time is a new world record for the distance (ELECTRICALLY TIMED), the best hand-timed performance was set this season by East German Doris Maletski (one of the DDR group who elected to stay home). An unfortunate incident occurred in the 800m and is explained thusly by Britisher Cliff Temple: "Bulgarian Nikolina Shtereva (who set a world best of 2:01.1 a month earlier) blatantly pushed a West German athlete on the first bend. Such things are part of indoor running and many worse fouls have gone virtually unnoticed, but the spectators were livid and roundly whistled Shtereva throughout the race, which she won in 2:02.2, and also, regrettably, at the victory ceremony. Although this treatment may make the Bulgarian think twice before pushing anyone again, it did seem a little harsh to pick specifically on her. She kept a remarkably brave face in the hostility and one was almost in a paradoxical situation of feeling sorry for someone who was being victimized for breaking the rules!"

Temple continues, "To the credit of the crowd (around 7,000 on Sunday) they were prepared to acknowledge any good performance, although a West German victory almost made the Olympichalle vibrate, and there was plenty of track success for them to applaud. Brigitte Kraus (WG) was inspired to run 10 seconds faster than ever before, overtaking the fluent Rumanian, Natalia Marasescu (nee Andrei), on the last lap. A sad sight here was the lackluster form of Olympic champion Ludmilla Bragina, who after a spell in front early (400 in 63.9) which revived memories of her three world records in three races just a few hundred meters away at the Olympic Stadium in 1972, faded to seventh in 4:23.9."

The women's high jump presented an interesting confrontation between world record-holder Rosi Ackermann and Olympic champion Ulrike Meyfarth. Ackermann ended up the victor however, as she straddled 6-3½ on her first try as Meyfarth failed on three attempts finishing second at 6-2¼. A total of nine girls went over the 6-0 barrier! ## SOVIETS HUMBLE YANKS INDOORS

Leningrad, Russia, March 6: The Soviet Union handed our American girls another defeat in the indoor series held annually between the two countries, this time 75-53. Only Sharon Dabney(400m), Wendy Knudson(600m) and Jan Merrill (1500m) were able to salvage victories as the solid USSR squad piled up the points with 1-2 sweeps in many events. As was the case over much of the world scene this season, very few countries were operating at their full capacities. Both the Soviets and US teams were evidence of this here in Leningrad. The young American team, many of which were experiencing their first international competition, fared well enough however, and there were some encouraging performances.

Jan Merrill, running in her typical 'forced pace' style, collected two creditable times in the 1500/3000 clocking 4:16.0 and 9:13.9. Wendy Knudson's very fine 1:29.38 over 600 meters is further evidence that she is approaching the finest conditioning of her career and will be a definite factor in the bid for an Olympic spot.

Two of the meets highlights were staged by the Soviet squad. The shot put competition, unfortunately for Ann



Turbyne, marked the return of former world record-holder Nadyeshda Chishova to the shot put 'wars'. Her effort of 67-5½ would indicate that she has fully recovered. In addition, Irena Bondartchuk ran strongly over the 3000 meter distance to post a new European indoor record with a 9:05.0 clocking. Other results:

## VALERO WINS WORLD CROSS COUNTRY

(Ed.Note: In the March issue we had only received an abbreviated version of the results from the World Cross Country Championships in Wales. The following is a more complete summary.)

Chepstow, Wales, February 28: An unheralded Spaniard has arisen as the worlds newest cross country star as she piled up a 20-second victory over a very strong international field. CARMEN VALERO covered the rugged 4.8 kilometer course in 16:19.4 to easily defeat the field which included the Soviet distance ace Tatyana Kazankina. The USSR squad carried too much depth however, as they relieved the defending champion American team of the team trophy with a score of 33 points. The United States could manage only a third place finish in the team standings, with Lynn Bjorklund (7th) their highest finisher individually. The results:

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# MARILYN CARLSON

As a ten year old, Marilyn Carlson knew exactly what she wanted to be when she grew up, a basketball player. A decade later, she now reigns as a star player for an obscure midwestern university, Central Missouri State at Warrensburg.

It hasn't been Marilyn's ability on the hardwood courts which has earned her national recognition. Instead, it has been her graceful ability to outrun and outdistance her competitors on the oval cinder or asphalt surfaces across America.

A real honest-to-goodness farm girl from Cleveland, Missouri Marilyn is the youngest child in a family of four. When confronted with the notion her parents saved the best for last, she just smiles and points out how it was her two sisters who provided the inspiration of wanting to become involved in athletics. Both played basketball in high school.

A natural athlete, she brings impressive credentials to whatever sports she chooses to participate in.

During her four high school years, Marilyn made the all-conference first team in basketball each year. She led Cass-Midway High School team to an overall record of 60 wins and only four defeats. In her last two years, she averaged 30 points per outing while holding almost every school record.

College has provided stiffer competition but hasn't stifled Marilyn's improvement in basketball. The pert 5'11" junior has become a team player in every sense of the word. Not always the leading scorer, her hustle makes Marilyn the delight of home crowds and the target of opposing coaches.

She excites and inspires crowds in much the same manner as Russian gymnast Olga Korbut, with great ability and a beautiful smile.

Dr. Mildred Barnes, chairman of the women's basketball committee for both the Pan American Games and the Summer Olympics, has been Marilyn's coach for the past three years.

"She is a great athlete as well as a fine human being possessing all the characteristics of a winner. Out of all of her success, she remains a selfless individual," said Dr. Barnes.

With all the success basketball has brought to Marilyn, it is still track that remains her first love. With a sly grin she claims her running ability came as a result of chasing cows on her parents farm as a youth.

"I like track best because it is an individual sport. If I'm successful, I feel like I've accomplished more. In basketball you have the rest of the team to rely on, in track it's you against the world," she states.

Before coming to college, most of her accomplishments were attained in AAU competition as high school programs in track for girls was not well established at that time.

Besides participating in the Junior Olympics held in Spokane, Wash. and placing fifth in hurdles in national competition, Marilyn captured other honors as well.

"The only thing which sticks in my mind is Marilyn being named AAU Outstanding Athlete in District Eight," said John Dean, her high school coach.

If anyone was in a place to really know Marilyn well it would be Mr. Dean. As basketball coach for Cass-Midway the four years while Marilyn was there and her coach in track for her junior and senior years, Dean played an important role in her development as an outstanding individual as well as an excellent athlete.

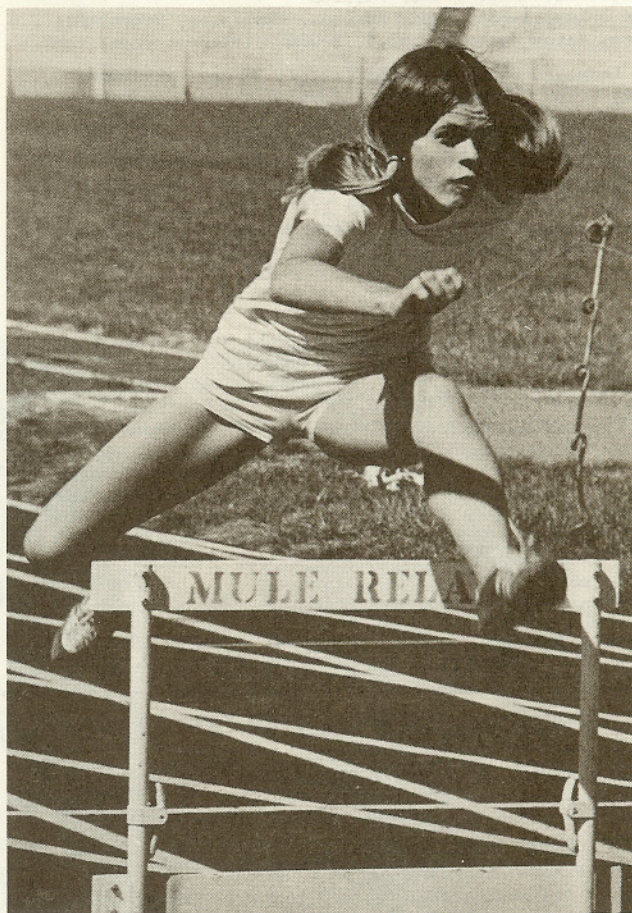
"Beyond all the honors she has received as far as I'm concerned, was her development as a complete person. Her honors in high school such as student body president, homecoming and courtwarming queen, National Honor Society president, honor roll student, as well as many others, exemplify the esteem in which her peers held her. Marilyn was the epitome of the All-American girl," Dean said.

Entering college in 1973, the honors kept coming. For the first time in the history of CMSU, they could boast of a two event All-American performer, Marilyn.

She earned the honor in Denton, Texas in the summer of 1974 by placing in the 100 meter hurdles and the half mile run. This year she has qualified for the Pan-American Trials by placing fifth in the AIAW half mile covering the distance in 2:09.5.

Marilyn picked up another All-American honor while in New York last summer competing in nationals by placing in the half mile, her specialty.

While in that competition, she showed a special courage and determination.



"Just as I was coming off the starting line, another girl in the next lane jabbed me in the stomach. I wasn't sure I could go on, but I know I had to. It wasn't funny at the time, but I can look back on the happening and laugh at it now," said Marilyn.

She currently holds four school records including the 880 with a time of 2:09.1, the 440 with a :57.1 mark, the 100 meter hurdles at :14.3 and the 400 meter hurdles clocking in at :62.8. She is currently a national contender in the half mile run with a top time of 2:08.6.

Marilyn feels her greatest personal reward has been placing in nationals. The feeling of accomplishment tops all awards and publicity for Marilyn Carlson.

"They're all nice, but they're secondary to the enjoyment I receive from my running," Marilyn said. "When I'm running, I'm a happier person. The one summer I didn't run at all was the most unhappy time of my life. It's nice to have the publicity and everything else, but I don't have to have it."

She indicates the whole idea can be a big ego trip especially with the publicity, but Marilyn tries to think it doesn't effect her that way.

One person Marilyn feels had a big influence on her life other than her father was Mr. Layn Phillips, her first coach.

"He took alot of his own personal time to get me interested and started in running about the time I was in the eight grade. At first, I started running just to please him, but I realized the pleasure I attained from running through his help," said Marilyn.

Unfortunately, Mr. Phillips lost his life in an automobile accident February 9, 1972. This event had a tremendous effect on her life. Even today, Marilyn says if there is one thing she could do over in her life, it would be just to go back and tell Mr. Phillips "thanks" for taking an interest.



Life isn't just track and basketball for this pretty lady, as she carries a demanding double major of math and physical education.

"I like math a little better than P.E. just because I enjoy working the problems", Marilyn states. "Yet right now I would have to say I make time for school. Athletics is the mainstream of my life while school is just there."

During the track season, the CMS coed averages around six miles per day in preparation for upcoming meets.

Right now her mind has to be making the Olympic Trials scheduled for Eugene, Oregon in late May.

"I've been trying to put it in the back of my mind until our basketball season was over. Yet I can't help thinking about the possibility. I'd really like to make it to the Trials, but I don't know right now," she said.

One of the biggest thrills that has come to Marilyn as a result of her talents is the amount of travel she is able to do. Meets have taken her through Oregon, Colorado, Texas, New York, Ohio, Kansas, Washington, and even into Canada.

"The greatest part is seeing the country and meeting different people, it's really exciting," Marilyn said.

Going with her to the Trials if she can make it will be another runner of some notoriety. Nationally ranked marathon runner, Bob Busby also of CMSU, has assumed the role of Marilyn's personal coach.

"Last summer I tried running without a coach, I would find myself getting down sometimes. I think I need a coach like Bob just so I will push myself harder. He has been mapping out my workouts for me and I really appreciate it. I need someone with me because I'm kind of insecure," she said.

Without a coach in her first year at CMSU, Marilyn gave serious thought to quitting.

"I was working out with the men's team and it seemed to me that no one really cared. Talk about depressed. Coach Larry Fisher wrote my workouts for me and I went by them. Ever since then, I've needed a coach," she stated.

CMSU track coach, Dr. James Pilkington feels Marilyn is so diversified in her talents that she may have difficulty in reaching her most effective height in international competition.

"She is so devoted to track and field, yet I don't see how she has reached her potential because of her participation in other sports. The potential is there," says Pilkington.

He went on to say that he regrets the fact he has not been able to devote more time to the development of Marilyn but is pleased with her initiative to improve herself.

In addition to her coaches, Marilyn indicates her parents are a contributing factor in her life. Every once in a while they make the 50-mile trip from Cleveland to Warrensburg to see their daughter perform on the collegiate level.

"They gave me a lot of motivation in high school and I really appreciated it, but it is not as important to me now. You see, I used to have trouble justifying performing to myself. It seemed I always had to please someone else, whether it was my coaches or my dad. Now I run for myself," Marilyn said.

When preparing for a race, Marilyn tries to outline her strategy before competition begins and during the actual running. She tries to visualize the rhythm of the race without losing concentration.

"At no time can I afford to lose my concentration, if I do, I might as well not run," she said.

Busby gives her key words to think about during the course of the race. The words are to be used at strategic locations along the track. At certain points she thinks of words such as, "drive," "push," "lift," and "accelerate." The words help determine her concentration.

"After it's all over, I just try to forget about the pain. The pain comes both physically and mentally. Above all, you can't fear it," she points out.

Running in practice is a different matter from running in competitive events.

"I usually try to think about the good things happening in my life while in practice. When running in competition, I think about the things I have to do with

my body to get a maximum performance," she said.

As to what keeps her running, Marilyn feels it is basically an inner satisfaction or an intrinsic need that motivates her.

Most athletes go through rituals before an event to "psyche" themselves up, and there naturally has to be a difference between basketball and track.

"In basketball I can prepare mentally for the game on the same day of the game. As far as pressure goes, I have to handle it differently in track, preparing about a week in advance. I have to put the tension out and concentrate on my race plan. In basketball, I'm not as tense," Marilyn said.

Not really sure how much longer track will be a major part in the life of Marilyn Carlson, she says the future realistically depends upon the upcoming track season.

Also in the future, "I think ten years from now, I'll probably be married and hopefully coaching a track team. I'd like to live in the country away from the city life, but not on a farm," she indicates.

Classifying herself as a non-women's libber, Marilyn relaxes in what little spare time she has by swimming, reading or watching T.V.

"When I feel myself getting down about something, I pick up my saxophone and play it for a while. Basically, I like all kinds of music but I mainly listen to the music that fits the mood I'm in."

"I just do the best I can in whatever I'm doing and hope it will be good enough. I'd like to be remembered as a person who never let down and who always put forth the best effort in whatever I do. In a way, this is my philosophy on life."

Apparently she has made a good impression on people from her past association with them. John Dean comments, "Why she was able to and continues to obtain these accomplishments is to me, obvious. I have never known a person so dedicated, self-sacrificing and able to work so hard to accomplish the goals which she sets for herself as Marilyn is."

At the same time, she remains a humble and caring person. She blames no one else for any failures she might have, an attribute few of us possess.

The American squad then ran stride for stride with the Canadian team and both were timed in a new Olympic record of 47.0. Canada however, had to settle for the silver, while the US team won the gold. ## JUDY POLLOCK: An Interview

JUDY POLLOCK... 35 years old, mother of two, housewife, part-time Physical Education teacher, part-time farmer with her schoolteacher husband at their 10-acre Victorian home, burst upon the track scene once again in 1976 with a delightfully nostalgic reverie of Australia's past glory in women's athletics. Judy is a relict of the last days of Betty Cuthbert and the heyday of hurdler Pam Kilborn, among others. At the opposite end of the scale to Debbie Wells, who is only 14, Judy merits selection in this year's Olympic team by her recent performances.

In 1964 at Tokyo, Judy won her Olympic bronze behind Betty Cuthbert and Ann Packer in the 400 metres with a time of 53.4sec. In 1966 she won the Kingston Commonwealth Games title over 400m with a 53 flat run (52.9 in a heat previously!), took a silver behind Canada's Abby Hoffman in the 880 (2.04.3 to 2.04.5) and also finished 4th in the 220 yards in 24.1sec.

When she set her world record of 2.02.0 in Stockholm in 1967, Judy became a prime favourite for the Mexico City two-lap title. However son Nathan took care of that one, with no regrets from Judy. In 1972 she made a painful comeback, won selection but could not compete due to a recurrent foot injury.

Now, once again, Judy is back, giving inspiration and hope to many a veteran who still has that competitive urge. The following interview took place at the Sydney Sports Ground on Saturday, March 6th, just after Judy had beaten Sydney's Angela Cook quite easily over 800 metres.

\* \* \* by MIKE AGOSTINI

MA: JUDY, WHAT MOTIVATES A 35-YEAR-OLD HOUSEWIFE AND MOTHER TO RUN AGAIN SERIOUSLY?

JP: If I could honestly find the answer I'd tell you, Mike. Something's motivating me but I haven't put my finger on the exact thing. I enjoy running, I know that much; I enjoy the challenge of it- but you're quite right, there is something behind it that's set me out again on this task at 35 years of age.

HAVE YOU GIVEN UP RUNNING AT ANY STAGE?

Yes, I haven't done any since Munich. But I haven't given up keeping myself fit. I've been playing basketball four times a week and I teach Phys Ed, and sometimes I run cross-country with the kids, but nothing to the degree that I'm doing now, or rather used to do.

ARE YOU TRAINING AS HARD NOW AS YOU DID FOUR OR SIX YEARS AGO?

I am right now but I haven't done the background work this time. I've had no winter build-up. I can assure you there's no one more stunned than me! I can only suppose that my training over the years has kept me in fairly good shape. INITIALLY YOU SAID QUITE FREQUENTLY THAT MONTREAL WAS NOT THE GOAL. IS IT THE GOAL NOW?

No, it's still not, because I couldn't bear to go through what I went through before Munich and the disappointment then. I was definitely trying for Munich and that was all that was in my mind. But it's not my foremost goal at the moment.

ARE YOU AWARE HOW 2.01.1 COMPARES WITH THE REST OF THE WORLD?

Yes- I know it's not in the top ten! IT'S 16th, EXACTLY 16th IN THE LAST TWELVE MONTHS. Well, to me the work that I've done to give me that time is really terrific. I'm thrilled to bits with that. HOW MUCH FASTER DO YOU THINK YOU CAN DO?

I'm hoping I can scrape under 2.00. Henri (Schubert) says that Charlene and I should both get under 2.00 at the Nationals. I don't know if he's right but based on the work that I've done, I feel I could do it. It must come at some stage.

ARE YOU TRAINING WITH CHARLENE?

At least once a week but that's all because I live 50 miles from Melbourne now and it's a long trip for training.

ARE YOU WORKING AS WELL?

Yes, teaching part-time -- Phys Ed 2½ days a week. And we've got a little farm with cows, horses, sheep, hens and ducks so there's alot of work to do at home as well.

MARVELLOUS LIFE! WHAT DOES YOUR HUSBAND THINK OF ALL THIS? He's delighted, and in fact is encouraging me more this time than ever before. He knows I enjoy it and says that if I don't do it this year I might not be able to next year,

and you've only got one life so you might as well make the most of it.

COULD THE MOTIVATION BE THE FACT THAT IN EITHER '68 OR '72 YOU COULD HAVE WON AN OLYMPIC GOLD, WHEREAS IN '76 JUST MAKING THE TEAM OR AN OLYMPIC FINAL WOULD BE THE EQUIVALENT OF AN OLYMPIC GOLD?

It could be, but deep down I don't think that's it. I'm a frustrated athlete, yes, but that's not the whole answer. Ask me after Montreal--or maybe even before Montreal. After April 10th and I'll say, "Oh no, no way!" But that could be very true because in '68 when I was having Nathan, everyone had said, "This is her," but it wasn't to be. And in '72 I again had a chance and missed out.

THE ANSWER TO THIS QUESTION IS OBVIOUS, BUT WOULD YOU PREFER A GOLD OR NATHAN?

What do you think?! With my little boy right here! (hugging Nathan).

OBVIOUS, AS I SAID! THEREFORE YOU HAVE NO REGRETS AT HAVING MISSED OUT BUT YOU STILL THINK YOU CAN DO MORE THAN YOU'VE ACTUALLY DONE.

Yes, I think that must be the reason why I'm back at it again.

AFTER MONTREAL WILL YOU KEEP ON COMPETING?

One hurdle at a time. When I get over that--if and when I'm over there--then I'll see. You must realize that although I enjoy it, it's very demanding on my husband and my family, and there comes a time--it happened after Munich--when I say I can't put them to this pressure any more, I must get back to the household and domestic chores. That's why I put a stop to it after Munich. NO DOUBT YOU HAVE MET MAEVE KYLE SOME TIME OVER THE YEARS. SHE CONTINUED RUNNING INTERNATIONALLY UP TO THE AGE OF 43 OR 44.

I think she's still going and due to compete in the World Veteran Championships next year.

ARE YOU GAME FOR THAT?

Why not?!

HOW MANY KIDS HAVE YOU GOT?

Two--Nathan 7 and Brooke (a girl) 5.

ARE THEY INTERESTED IN ATHLETICS AT THIS STAGE?

No, they love swimming at the moment. continued on page 15

It now seems that this permission will not be forthcoming.....Many of Canada's finest athletes will be training in the California area during the months of April and May in preparation for the Montreal Games..... Joan Wenzel is still under suspension for taking a cold pill in Mexico (Pan Am Games), but she is training hard just the same. She ran a 1000m time trial during the Ontario championships, and presented awards to the winners of the women's 1500m at the Star Games.....Olympic 80m hurdle champion at Mexico City in 1968, Maureen Caird-Jones complained of stomach cramps in Munich and failed to get past her heat. Contact Mr. Gagich for further information..... Kathy Schmidt, American record-holder in the javelin, explains how she got started on the event: "My father was a whaler in

Vermont - and I was a good harpoonist. The high school coach came out one day and said I had potential!..... The Oregon TC will sponsor a women's 10,000 meter Invitational on May 22nd, in Eugene, for further info call Janet Heinonen at (503) 344-0498.....Former 400m world record-holder Collette Besson of France is making a strong comeback of late and even clocked a 4:30.6 over 1500m in Orleans, France, February 8th.....Lisa Hopkins was named 'Outstanding Woman Athlete' in the Texas Southern Relays in Houston recently. She won the college 100 meter dash in 11.3 and returned to win the invitational 100 in 11.5.....Sweden's former 800m indoor champion in 1967, Elizebeth Oestberg, who was also 3rd over 800m in the University Games in Tokyo during that same year, will be turning 35 just in time to compete in the masters 'World Championships' in her hometown of Goteborg, Sweden. Oestberg ran with the Long Beach Comets in the 1971 Cross Country season and hopes to visit California again in 1977. 'Liz' also mentions that on a good day she can still run 56.0 for 400m and 2:10 in the 800!..... ## FOREIGN NEWS

### AUSTRALIAN REPORT by Mike Hurst

Debbie Wells, the 14-year-old sprint sensation from the tiny New South Wales country township of Emmaville, is the name on everybody's lips in the Australian sporting world today. With her unprecedented sprint double victory in the NSW Open championships (Feb 21-22), she fulfilled all predictions made of her.

The 5-10, 133 pound Emmaville Express, as she has been tagged by the press, clocked 11.4 and 23.4 (into a 2mps headwind) to beat 21-year-old Suzette Sames for both titles. A week later she journeyed north to Brisbane to race the Queensland trio, Denise Robertson, Barbara Wilson and Sue Jowett, all members of the recent world record-breaking 4x200m relay team. At Brisbane's Mt. Gravatt track (Feb. 29) in the 100m, Robertson won in 11.1, flashing through the finish tape to nip Wilson, also timed in 11.1, with Jowett third in 11.2 and Wells fourth in 11.3, the first race she had lost in two years. The Queenslanders were elated over their 'shut-out' of the NSW wondergirl, who has received more publicity downunder than the rest of our athletes combined, this summer.

But the brilliant youngster didn't fall apart under the pressure, she came back with a vengeance in the 200m, 30 minutes later. Drawn badly in the outside lane, Debbie ran like a scared rabbit and led the field at

195m, but eased slightly and Robertson powered through seven lanes inside Wells in the equally difficult pole lane to win by half a stride in 22.7, Wells clocking an amazing 22.8. Not bad for a sub-junior. This time was .7s better than the Olympic qualifying standard of 23.5 and is the second fastest (behind Robertson's 22.6, 22.7 and 22.5) in Australia this season. It will now place Wells in the front line for Olympic selection. She will be 15 on May 29th. Not to go unnoticed in that same race, Jowett and Wilson clocked a pair of very respectable 23.3's.

The following week, Wells was once again matched up against Denise Robertson and this time the 23-year-old national champion won clearly in a new national record of 22.5 with Wells second in 22.9. These 200m times have all had legal wind readings, but the 100m time of 11.1 was aided by a 3mps tailwind on the Tratan track.

An indication of Debbie Wells' improvement this summer can be gauged by her last four successive 200m race times of 23.9, 23.4, 22.8 and 22.9. Third place in Robertson's record-breaking race (March 7th) was taken by Barbra Wilson at 23.3.

Munich sprint Olympian, Raelene Boyle has yet to go under the 23 second mark this season but her cause has not been helped by her move to Perth in West Australia where she is far from strong competition.

Boyle's former Victorian teammate, CHARLENE RENDINA smashed the existing Commonwealth 800m record recently with a time of 1:59.0 at Olympic Park, Melbourne in winning the Victorian title (Feb. 29th). (Editor's Note: Rendina's mark is the 7th best on the all-time world 800m list and is the number one mark in the world thusfar in 1976). Rendina, sixth in the Munich 400m, has a strong opposition from 35-year-old mother of two, JUDY POLLACK who, after making her third comeback, clocked a world age record of 2:01.1 in running second! This incredible performance, which takes about five seconds off the previous known world age best set in 1973 by Holland's Tilly van de Made, makes her a solid choice in Australia's Olympic selections.

March 14, Sydney, Australia: In a pre-national women's meet Barbra Wilson won the 60m dash in a blanket finish from Robertson, Boyle, Wells, Jowett and Sames. All six were timed in 7.3. In the 150m dash Denise Robertson edged Wilson for the win as both runners clocked 16.8 equalling Wilma Rudolph's existing world best. Raelene Boyle defeated Debbie Wells for third in 16.9.

Backing up for a moment to the February 28th meeting in Brisbane; the great competition in which Robertson overtook Wells in the final steps, there existed yet another 14-year-old phenom, Leanne Evans. Evans finished 5th in the race clocking 23.7!

In addition to national 400m record holder Judy Canty, and Marian Fisher (58.7), Australia has just added its third sub-60 second 400 meter hurdler in the name of Lynne Young who clocked 59.9 in Perth on March 13th.

#### OLYMPIC PARK, MELBOURNE, AUSTRALIA, March 18-22:

Eleven women have been selected in Australia's track and field squad of 25 (so far) to compete in the Montreal Olympics in July. There were some shock choices and some shocking omissions from the small, but talented women's team. Only two competitors loom as potential gold medalists. They are Charlene Rendina in the 800m and Raelene Boyle in the 200m sprint. Charlene won the national title here in a smart time of 2:00.1, after Judy Pollack led through the opening lap in a hurried 55.6. The 35 year-old mother of two, Pollack has made her third comeback to win inclusion for her third Olympics. She clocked 2:02.1 to grab second placing behind Rendina, a finalist in the Munich Games 400m.

A fortnight earlier Charlene had clocked a Commonwealth record of 1:59.0 to beat Pollack in the Victorian State title race.

Raelene Boyle stormed back into medal contention with a great sprint double win, following a heart-breaking month out with hamstring injuries. She was able to sprint only the week before the nationals, but got away to a

brilliant start in the 100m final to win in a Victorian record 11.2.

Queensland's defending title-holder, Denise Robertson was second in 11.3 and 14 year-old Debbie Wells was third in 11.4 beating Queensland's Barbra Wilson, a meter back.

The sprints were run against moderate wind, so Boyle's time was excellent. She backed up the next day to win the 200m in 23.0 from Robertson and Wells, both of whom clocked 23.2.

So Debbie Wells, the lanky 14 year-old Emmaville Express, virtue of her two thirds, has become the youngest athlete ever to represent Australia internationally.

This follows her brilliant form since Christmas which has seen her run 100m in 11.1 (windy) and several 11.3's legally, along with 200's in 22.8, 22.9, 23.2 and 23.4 all legal.

This summer has seen great sprinting in depth 'Down Under' and Australia would have been a certain medalist in both relays had the selectors picked the right combinations. But they erred grievously in leaving out fourth-placed nationals sprinter Barbra Wilson. She had clocked 11.1 (windy) and 11.3 legal and would have made the logical starter for the 4x100m relay following her 7.2 windy, and 7.3 (into 3 mps) for 60m this year.

Instead Gaye Dell, who won a selection in the hurdles, and who has a best time of 11.4 (aided) and 11.6 legal, will probably make up the fourth member of the short dash foursome.

The 400m saw Raelene Boyle's training partner from Perth, pretty Beth Nail, upset by beating Victoria's national record-holder (51.7) Judy Canty in 52.2. Nail earlier clocked 52.0 in the heats, a two second improvement since Christmas.

The 1500m was a jog for Judy Pollack, who won in the absence of title-holder Angela Cook, out with a knee injury. Cook failed to win Olympic selection although she was the only qualifier over the metric distance with her 4:13.2 run in New Zealand during January. Instead the selectors chose Terri Wangman, who also missed the nationals, exclusively as a relay runner. She will run in the 1600m relay with Nail, Canty and Rendina. Incredibly, the selectors failed to nominate our potentially fastest quarter runners, Boyle and Robertson, who had both wanted to run this relay in Montreal. Robertson has a 52.4 this season and Boyle clocked a relay leg of 51.0 in Munich!

Other selections are Verna Burnard (South Australia) for the 400m and possibly the 4x400m relay. Her best time of 52.7 is unlikely to impress in Montreal, however. Chris Hunt was named in the javelin on the basis of only one Olympic qualifying throw of just over 57m/187-0.

#### STEWART ZIPS 9:07.6 INDOORS from Alan Lindop

Cosford, England, March: Although primarily 'Juniors Day', the best performance recorded at the AAA/WAAA Under 20's Championships indoors at Cosford last Saturday was Mary Stewart's debut over 3000m. In the absence of Christine Haskett, Mary had to make her own pace if she wanted a fast time. Heather Edwards led after the first lap but from then on it was Mary against the clock. She passed the 400m in 69.0, 800(50-60m up) in 2:22.4, 1500 in 4:33.2, 200m in 6:06.6 and 2400m in 7:21.4. By 2800m she had lapped the entire field and looking as fresh as when she started, Mary finished in 9:07.6, knocking 20.2 seconds off Ann Ford's UK best indoors. The time ranksher third behind Joyce Smith (8:55.6) and Ann Ford (9:07.0) on a combined UK indoor/outdoor list, and was only 2.6 seconds outside the European indoor best set by Irina Bondarchuk in the recent USSR vs USA match. The world best stands at 9:02.4 by Francie Lutz (nee Larrieu) of the USA, and shouldn't be difficult to reach for Mary when next year's indoor season starts.

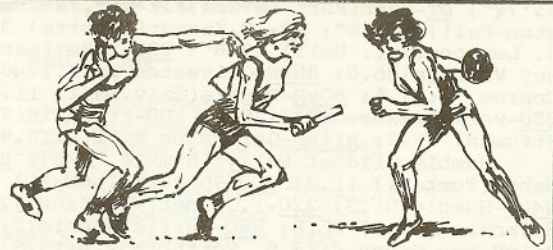

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
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
