### The Placebo Olympics

"Placebo: A harmless, unmedicated preparation given to a patient merely to humor him, or used as a control; something done or said to win the favor of another." (Webster)

One of the placebos our government is offering our athletes for backing the Presidential boycott of the Olympic Games is to stage a "Counter Olympics" in which we are "guaranteed competition of world class similar to that of the Olympic Games themselves."

To the average citizen that, along with other statements concerning giving our athletes competition which would tax us to the utmost, has the US populace convinced our dedicated athletes will not miss the Olympics. How wrong can a person be? Hitler said it many years ago, "Tell the big lie and people will believe it". Let's take a look at what it will be like at Olympic Games time in July of 1980.

First of all, everyone will concede that the Eastern bloc of nations will go to Moscow as if nothing had happened. MOST of Western Europe will also go. Twelve Western European nations have female track athletes who were in the top 30 on the World List for 1979. Tell me who is not going to go to Moscow. West Germany? They will be there. Italy? France? The Scandinavians? Aside from the 12 Western Europe countries who have top athletes, the rest of the world provides only 11 countries with performers in the top 30 World List for 1979. Of those 11, you can bet your last dinar that Cuba will be in Moscow. With Trudeau back as Prime Minister, Canada will go to Moscow. Of the rest, South Africa is not a member of the IOC so they will not go to Moscow. My bet is the others will go - Argentina, Jamaica, Guyana, Israel, Australia, China and Brazil. Who is left to take part in those "Substitute Olympics"?

Let us assume, for sake of argument, that ONLY the nations of Eastern Europe go to Moscow and everyone else in the world comes to Our Games. Taking the 1979 World List as a base (the top 30 performers in each event), Eastern Europe has 245 of the places out of a total of 367 positions in the 12 Olympic events. That's 67% of the top performers in the world. Western Europe has 18% and the rest of the world only 15%. What about the Top Ten for 1979? Eastern Europe now has 88 positions out of 120 or 77%. Western Europe has 13% and the rest of the world only 10%. Narrowing it down to the Number One athlete in the world in each event for 1979, it gets even worse. East Germany had the world best in the 200. 400, high jump, long jump, shot, discus, javelin and was tied in the 100. Bulgaria had the top marks in the 800 and 1500, Poland in the 100 hurdles and Russia in the pentathlon. The USA tied for top honors in the 100. Maybe if we counted the 400 hurdles and the 3000 the odds would shift toward us. No way. In the 3000, the Soviets had 14 of the 30 best marks and nine out of the top ten. In the 400 hurdles, Russia had four of the top ten and East Germany another four. Either Russia or East Germany alone had more athletes in the top ten than all the rest of the world combined! And we are supposed to get "World Class" competition! From whom?

Mr. President, here is a chart showing the top athletes in the world for 1979. Please tell us where we are going to get that "world class" competition. (In the following charts, numbers listed are athletes in the top 30 for 1979; numbers in parenthesis are athletes listed in the top ten for 1979):

# Ride 'em Cowgirls

Two reasons for the vast improvement in women's track and field at the University of Wyoming are Laura Ferguson and Pat Miller. Plugging along with just an ordinary program, the Cowgirls moved into national prominence when these two recruits showed up.

First to arrive on the scene was Laura Ferguson, now a junior. A home-stater, Laura graduated from Laramie High School where she was the 1977 State champion in the 80 and 110 yard hurdles and anchored the State championship sprint relay. 1979 saw her get her first taste of recognition when she ran 1:34.8 for 600 meters for the 7th best time in the US. However, only a few Americans ran that distance last year and so her glory was really not that valuable.

Come 1980, however, and Laura has blossomed. She was fifth in the 600 yards at the AIAW Indoor Championships, the first Wyoming Cowgirl to ever score in that calibre of competition. Her time of 1:22.92, while good, was not as fast as her best of the season, 1:21.96, the third fastest by an American for 1980, less than fourtenths off the nation's best mark of 1:21.6 set by Wisconsin's Pam Moore.

Wyoming coach Roger Smith says. "Laura Ferguson is proof positive that Wyoming runners are slow maturers. There is not a school in the United States that would have recruited her out of high school, or even given a second look following her freshman year at Wyoming. Now she's the third best 600 runner in the States this year. She is just now starting to come around. The potential for Laura to be an outstanding runner is there. Right now, she doesn't take credit for her own success. She still wants to give someone else the credit. She is just finding out that she is good although her times are better than the places she will finish because of her lack of experience with top-level competition."

As for Pat Miller, this 5'7, 135 pound business major sophomore comes to Wyoming as a transfer student from Dodge City CC in Kansas. Pat attended high school in Lawrence, Kansas, and was a three year letter winner in track competing in the long jump, sprints and relays. She was an All American high schooler in track and field.

Miller set the NJCAA record in the long jump at 19'8 and was the 1978-1979

national champion. As a sophomore at Wyoming this season, she was third in the long jump at the AIAW Championships in Columbia and has a best leap of 20'5, the fifth best of the 1980 indoor season. Pat has also turned in good sprint marks of 6.89 for 60 yards and 36.4 for 300 yards. At the Lobo Invitational in Albuquerque, New Mexico, earlier this year, she was voted the Outstanding Field Event athlete of the meet, and topped that by being selected as the outstanding performer at the Wyoming Invitational.

Of Pat Miller, Coach Smith says, "We're very elated with Pat's 20'5 jump. It makes us feel that she has a chance at an Olympic berth. Without a doubt, Pat has the most potential of all the US jumpers to be a 22 foot performer. She is an exceptional sprinter, but long jumping is her best event. Already this year she is averaging a foot farther than at this same point in time for 1979. She has done a lot of upper body work with the weights and this has contributed to her success. She is not afraid of hard work!".

### Dear Editor:



Doesn't it strike you as at least ironic?"







### "I thought it was out."



Some burns take 100 years to heal.



With the outdoor season yet to get seriously underway in the United States, the only real outdoor marks we have are from down under as Australian season is in full swing. At the National State secondary schools championships in Melbourne on December 9, Susan Clark boomed 11.5/23.9, presaging her 11.4 a week later at the all-school championships at Perth. She also claimed the 200 against the wind in 24.2 at the latter meet. Fifiteen-year-old Kim Thorley, long jumper, 6.33 (20'91/4") at Perth with windy jumps of 6.48 (21'31/4") and 6.40 (21'0"). Diane Holden also ran 54.8 at the Melbourne meet.

Sixteen-year-old twins Ann and Margaret Reddish had an excellent distance series in November, running 9:47.5/9:47.6 on November 11, 2:09.8/2:10.1 on the 17th, and 4:27.5/4:27.6 on the 24th. They were to miss the Perth meet and Linda Cox claimed the 1500 in 4:29.6. Other results: Perth: 100mH—Robyne Strong, 13.9; 400mH—Jennifer Low, 59.8; HJ—Vanessa Browne, 1.79 (5'10½"); DT—Sally Penson, 44.46 (145'10"); JT—Sally Wijesundera (15), 44.26 (145'2").

In the US, the indoor season is upon us and the big news comes from the East Coast meets. A Washington Post report of the D.C. Interhigh Championship on December 14 reports a 5'10" high jump by Kim Wood of McKinley but makes no mention of the mark in its story so a typo seems logical. Since then, however, the Washington area has shown some hot running. Sue Miley of Fort Hunt, Virginia, seems to be appropriately named as she has nearly dominated indoor competitions in the mile and two-mile. At the Gunston District AA meet she doubled 5:17.6/11:58.6. Then, on

February 2, she claimed the Naval Academy meet mile in 4:58.4 over Kim Kelly (Dunbar) at 5:01.2. Kelly got her revenge at the CYO meet, taking Miley by one tenth in 5:02.5. Miley did, however, lead her two mile relay to a win in 9:49.2.

Rachel Clary (Sparrow Point) also shone in the CYO as she sped to a 1:23.1 in the 600 yard run. Another multiple performer from the area is Tamela Penny (Hermitage) who took both the hurdles (8.3) and high jump (5'41/2") at the East Coast Invitational January 4/5). Piper Bressant (whose hurdle record Penny took) turned in an 8.4, then turned around with a long jump of 18'41/2" and a 1:29.3 600. Clary proved her CYO 600 was no fluke as she improved the mark to 1:22.6 at the Naval Academy with Cecile Carter (H. D. Woodson) and Tracy Edwards (Northwestern) right behind at 1:24.7/1:25.0. Penny high jumped 5'6" there also.

Carter is not the only H. D. Woodson athlete with some speed as a quartet of

Carter, Whitehead, Humphreys, West sped 1:45.4 in the 880 relay in the D.C. Public Schools Invitational.

In Pittsburgh, on January 5/6, Elaine Sobansky (Trinity) claimed the Pittsburgh Indoor Classic shot put with a toss of 41'11'4" to highlight that meet.

Both teams clocked 3:54.0 in the mile relay, with Tech getting the nod. The Tech quartet of Rachel Hall, Lisa Holley, Andrea Paterson, and Rudelle Sargent now claim a national indoor record while Wanda Jackson, Gayle Counts, Tracy Nelson, and Dorian St. Clair from Plainfield will have to wait till next time.

Unfortunately for Brooklyn Tech, however, Long Beach Poly, after running second to San Gorgonio (CA) all last spring, has decided to burn the boards and clocked a 3:51.0 anchored by Faye Page at the Ali Invitational (1600 meters).

first mile together in a quick 5:41 but at five miles, Urish pulled ahead for good.



### There are Two Phases of Conditioning

(From HTC News, Huntsville, Alabama)

Recently a 34 year old runner came into my office stating that he has been tired and rundown for the last several weeks. His legs felt tired and heavy when he ran. He was depressed because he could not improve his times or increase his distance. The harder he trained the worse he felt.

This is a classic example of overtraining or staleness and has been experienced by almost every runner sometime during his running career.

The problem with this state of staleness is in early detection. Staleness often strikes with very little warning, while runners are in the peak of condition.

Frequently, while training for a big race runners get to a point where training is going better than they expected. After they run they feel as if they could have gone twice as far. Then they get greedy. They think if they feel this good one month before the race then if they increase their training, no telling how fast they could run the race. Then staleness hits, they fall off of their peak and over the cliff into fatigue and depression or some musculo skeletal injury.

The cause of staleness is simple. There are two phases of conditioning. Destruction and rebuilding. If one of these phases is left out no conditioning will result.

During the destruction phase, muscle tissue is broken down, waste products accumulate, electrolyte balance is disrupted and glycogen stores are depleted.

Rebuilding occurs during this period in between runs. The body attempts to repair muscles, flush out waste products, restore electrolyte balance and glycogen stores.

Each time the body goes through this

process it rebuilds a little stronger than before to compensate for the increased work load put on it during training.

Staleness occurs when the body is not allowed enough rest and nutrition to rebuild. And the destruction exceeds the body's ability to repair itself. Therefore, the net result of training is negative.

As with other perils of running prevention is the key. Runners should incorporate a routine day off once a week, alternating hard and easy days and increase sleep. Taking your morning pulse may tell you if you have recovered from the preceeding day's training. An increase of 10 beats per minute signals that you should take it easy that day.


Runners should be aware that after a peak performance or setting a new personal record it is a warning it is time to drop off a little in training. Pursuing further improvement with more work is frequently destructive, as so many runners have discovered.

One of the clearest warnings of impending staleness is a bad race. Nine times out of ten a bad race means the runner is overtrained. The impulse is to go out and train harder; however, this only digs the pit deeper. Once staleness hits no therapy beyond ceasation of activity seems to help. Individual recovery time varies from three days to two weeks. When the runner can look on the prospect of running with zest the staleness is usually over.

Remember, progress never travels a straight line. There are peaks and valleys and these must be accepted as a normal pattern on the road to progress. When this is realized, then we will come out of the valleys stronger and our new goals will be reached.

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# **Nation Championships**

New York, New York, February 29 — The first-ever TAC/USA Indoor Track and Field Championships, replacing the extinct AAU, was won by perennial powerhouse Tennessee State University. The Ed Temple coached troop won by the narrowest of margins with 13 points to 12 for the Ali Track Club and 11 for the DC International TC and the Los Angeles Mercurettes. All four of the top teams were speed oriented. The Muhammad Ali crew won two events, the 440 yard dash and the mile relay, while each of the others picked up a single gold.

As is usual in this meet, good marks were standard. The world's top 1979 sprinter, Evelyn Ashford, who has been knocking off opponents all indoor season by huge margins, had her hands full this time with TSU's Brenda Moorehead as both runners clocked 6.76 in the 60 yard sprint. Ashford remained unbeaten through the 1980 campaign.

Jamaica's Merlene Ottey, now a freshman at the University of Nebraska, shook everyone up in the first heat of the 220 with a clocking of 23.6, best on record for that distance. Since the mark was hand-timed, however, it will not go into the record books. Converted to meters and adding the .14 however, Ottey's time places her No. 6 on the world's 200m list. Strange things happened in the 220. First of all, the only heat which did not have FAT (Fully Automatic Timing) was the first one of the four - a slip which negated Ottey's fine run. Secondly, the seeding of the heats once again comes into question. Let it be known that Chandra Cheeseborough, TSU, finished second in that first heat in a hand-timed 23.7, the fastest time ever run by a US citizen - and she did not even qualify for the final! Her time puts her as No. 10 on the All-Time World List, yet she sat on the sidelines and watched the final. The final, incidentally, was not won by Ottey. It was won by Memphis State's Wanda Hooker in 24.0, another malfunction of the automatic timer. What happened to Ottey? She was third after one of the most horrible of starts. Ottey evidently forgot the basic rule of starting — when the gun sounds, you can run. Using a standing start for some unknown reason, she made her first move at the gun by sliding her weight backward to get a push off her back foot and by the time she started to move forward, the other three finalists were long gone.

Veteran Rosalyn Bryant won the 440 with a new meet record in 53.92 over Gwen Gardner and Yolanda Rich. Once again questions arise about the Garden's automatic timing device. In the final, the first two were timed automatically, but the other three were hand-timed. Still Rich's 54.5 third place hand time, converted, moves her to the No. 7 US List.

Madeline Manning, the 1968 Olympic Games 800 meter champion, won again in 1980 over the half mile route. Her clocking of 2:04.5 was a new meet record. The record, was also bested by another veteran, Robin Campbell, who was just twotenths behind. Manning's time puts her as the No. 2 All-Time US performer and Campbell as No. 3 — both behind Mary Decker's new 1:58.9 clocking this season.

Cindy Bremser was the star of the distance runs and was selected as the outstanding female performer of the meet for her win in the two miles and runnerup spot in the mile. California's Maggie Keyes annexed the mile in 4:39.3, a time which moves her into the No. 10 spot on the All-Time US List. Bremser's 9:45.0 winning time in the two mile was the No. 3 performance by an American ever and the No. 5 position on the World All-Time List. The two mile rewrote the All-Time Lists with Brenda Webb, Margaret Groos and Jenifer White all moving onto both US and World Lists, and Joan Benoit back in 5th place, making the All-Time US

Stephanie Hightower and Candy Young staged another of their ding-dong battles in the 60y hurdles. Hightower won a narrow victory — the only kind of a victory either of these two ever register over the other — as both were clocked in 7.4 (hand-timed again).

As in the running of the 220, there were strange things happening in the 60y hurdles. Again the seeding was strange. In the first heat, Hightower won as expected in 7.69. Second was Lori Dinello whose time of 7.72 placed her in a tie for the 6th best ever by an American. Dinello was followed by Jacki Washington. Her time of 7.72 made her the other individual tied for 6th on the All-Time US List. Fourth in the first heat was Karen Wechsler clocked in 7.74, a time which put her on the US List in a tie for 8th. Last in the heat was Benita Fitzgerald in 7.94.

In the second heat, Candy Young win

in 7.59 but Sharon Colyear, who was second, would have been fifth in the first heat. Nevertheless, the final results place Benita Fitzgerald, who was last in the first heat, as fourth place leading one to ask "Where was Jacki Washington?" Of course, the final was hand-timed which ruined all record aspirations, too.

Sue Brodock, who set a new world record for the one mile walk recently, annexed her event by five seconds. Once again, true track affecianados should be alerted that if these California walkers ever get together and compete for the same club, they will win the USA Track and Field Championship team title — without any sprinters or hurdlers or distance runners or weight throwers or jumpers.

Pat Johnson, University of Wisconsin, scored an upset to win the long jump with a lifetime best of 20'111/2. Right behind was Carol Lewis, also with a lifetime best at 20'101/2. These two move to the Number 4 and 5 positions on the All-Time US List. What happened to the favorites? Kathy McMillan almost didn't make it into the final as she fouled her first jump in the trials, leaped only 17'7 on her second, but came through with flying colors on her last attempt with a leap of 20'5. The other favorite, American outdoor record holder Jodi Anderson, hopped 20'41/2 on her first round attempt, injured herself and withdrew for the rest of the day.

For sheer class, the high jump must win the gonfalon. Eight jumpers entered and at 5'10, Yolanda Gibson was out. At 6'0, the field lost Kim Harrell and Marilyn Dubbs. 6'1 saw Pam Spencer, Paula Girven and Wendy Markham bite the dust, leaving only Sharon Burrill and Louise Ritter. Both missed once at 6'2, but both were over on their second tries. Up went the bar to 6'3. First up was Ritter, and she flopped over. Burrill missed her first attempt, but was over on her second. The bar was raised to 6'41/2, but both jumpers failed and Ritter won on fewer misses. Burrill is now the No. 3 on the US All-Time List while Wendy Markham makes the top 10 as equal No. 7.

Maren Seidler and Ann Turbyne shuffled out of the shadows to once again place their perennial 1-2 in the shot. Seidler tossed the bulb 57′0¾ for a routine mark, but Turbyne had her best-ever at 53′5¾ moving her into a tie for the No. 2 All-Time US position with Lorna Griffin. Kathy Devine had her best-ever throw at 52′2¾.





Our sport is strewn with examples of young prodigies who, for a variety of reasons, never made it as senior athletes — girls in particular, for whom the physical changes of adolescence have often ruined a promising career. Injuries, school-leaving, dating, loss of interest or motivation, lack of skilled or sympathetic guidance, inability to adjust to being for a while at least a small fish in a large pond once their age-group competition is left behind . . . these are among

other factors which can prevent a talented athlete from fulfilling her potential.

A classic case in point, or so it appeared until quite recently, was Mary Decker, the American middle-distance runner who achieved world-wide fame at the age of 14. Where was she at 19? Sunk without a trace, it seemed. But happily that was not the case, for despite repeated injury problems which would have driven anyone with less resolve out of the sport for good, she never lost her determination to show that good as she was as a

little girl she had a lot more to offer as an adult. At the age of 21 she is now the swiftest female miler of all time and a prime contender — America's first-ever — for the Olympic 1500m title if given the chance.

Mary began running at age 11 and at the ripe old age of 12 set a world age best of 2:12.7 for 880y and ran 3:09 for the marathon; at 13 she ran a 4:55.0 mile. Next came an emergency appendectomy, injuries to the ankle and heels, plaster casts — but in 1973 she was back and was a close third in the USA-USSR indoor



meet in Richmond running the mile in 4:40.1. The winner was Olympic 1500m champion Lyudmila Bragina. That summer, still only 5'0 and 86 pounds, she ran a 2:02.4 800m, then whipped Russia's Niole Sabaite in 2:02.9. AW described her as "A skinny little Californian, all arms and legs and forward lean".

Between age 15 and 16, she shot up six inches and gained about 25 pounds. As a consequence of this growth spurt and the continued hard training, she developed acute leg pains. For three years she tried everything: acupunc-

ture, acupressure, orthiotics, injections with radio-opaque and radioactive dyes to take x-rays, they put casts on and took them off, have her drugs - cortisone, of course, and every other antiinflamatory drug you can think of, drugs that are illegal, drugs they give to horses, drugs that made her hair fall out in clumps and her legs swell up. That Decker survived three years of medical experimentation unscathed says something about her enormous reserves of strength and vitality, and through it all, she never lost hope or almost never.

Most of the rest of the story is known. The chance meeting with Dick Quax of New Zealand, who had had the same problem, the operations for two years. Fate has at last been kind to Mary Decker and she has been able to run and train unfettered. Now she has run 4:17.6 and 1:58.9m indoors.

"Everything has been aimed towards Moscow", she says. And if anyone deserves to succeed in her ambitions it is surely Mary Decker.



### Anke Weigt at German Championships

### 880 Record to Decker

Decker's half mile mark is a good one in spite of the fact this distance is not run much on the indoor circuit. She owned the former world record which she set way back in 1974, but her time converts to 1:59.0 for 800 meters, the second best ever run and beaten only this season by Russia's Olga Vakrusheva at 1:58.4s.

### Wisconsin Big 10

Lafayette, Indiana, February 22/23 — To the surprise of no one, the University of Wisconsin won the Big Ten Indoor Championship with ease, nearly 50 points ahead of second place Ohio State. But to the surprise of everyone, it was not the vaunted distance crew of the Badgers who turned the tide of victory. Wisconsin won only one distance run, the 1500 with Susie Houston and Mary Stepka going 1-2. They could do no better than 8th in the 3000, 5th in the 5000 and 3rd in the 800. But they were 1-2 in the pentathlon, won the 400, two relays and two of the three field events. Good performances were the rule of the day. Ohio State's Stephanie Hightower grabbed wins in the 60 and 60 hurdles and added a second in the 200. Hightower's winning 8.17 in the hurdles equalled the All-Time US best which she already had. 

# **European Championships**

Sindelfingen, Germany, March 1/2 — The East Germans stayed home and the rest of Europe came to this West German town with only token teams, but despite these drawbacks, the meet produced one new world record and a passel of outstanding performances. Although no score was kept, Poland provided the most place winners and had the meet been socred on a 5-3-2-1 basis, the Poles were easy winners with 26 digits followed by West Germany with 15 and the Soviets with 14.

Star performer of the competition was Poland's "second-string" hurdler, Zofia Bielczyk, wife of the 1976 Olympic fourth placer in the javelin, who stepped to a



new world mark in the 60m hurdles with a sensational 7.77 clocking. Bielczyk also picked up a fourth in the 60m dash. Another top clocking came in the 60 with Bulgaria's Sofka Popova winning the title and clocking 7.11 in both her semi and final races, second fastest ever, only 1/100th from Marlies Gohr's world best. Popova, incidentally, was last in the 1979

In other events, Germany's Elke Decker won the 400 in 52.28, seventh best ever, Jolanda Januchta (Poland) and Anne-Marie van Nuffel (Belgium) were 1-2 in the 800 in 2:00.6 and 2:00.9, the seventh and tenth best ever marks. The high jump was a classic with seven jumpers still in the competition at 6'23/4. Italy's Sara Simeoni won it at 6'434 over Hungary's world record holder Andrea Matay at 6'4. Simeoni made three tries at a new world indoor mark of 1.99/6'61/4, but failed. Poland's Anna Wlodarczyk (22'11/2) and Anke Weigt (Germany) at 21'11 produced the second and third best ever indoor long jumps and Helena Fibingerova, Czechoslovakia's aging world record holder in the shot, got off a put of 65'41/4 on her first effort and captured that title.




