REEL TALK

For example, last week we had our men's team at the Mt. SAC Relays all day Friday and all day Saturday. The women competed Saturday afternoon and all day Sunday. Monday our Conference track coaches had their semi-annual meeting. Tuesday we had a make-up meet in Pasadena. Friday and Saturday the men's team competed in the Conference Championships. Friday morning, the women's team left Redlands for San Luis Obispo and the women's Conference Championships. I attended the men's trials on Friday evening, flew to San Luis Obispo Saturday morning for the women's meet which began at 10:30 and was back at Occidental Saturday for the start of the men's finals at 4:30. Sunday the SPAAAU held its District long distance run championships in which we took part. This week our men compete in the District NAIA Championships on Friday and Saturday (with the decathlon at 9:00 each morning and the other events in the evening) and the women are at the Cheetah's Invitational on Sunday starting at 9:30. Of course you must be a little wacky to love the sport enough to keep that schedule - and to this charge I admit. BUT, when does WTFW get done? Unfortunately I do the whole catastrophe: the writing, the circulation, the advertising, the dummy, the paste-up, the headlines, the photo work, the addressing - and something has to give. coached the La Mirada Meteors for a spell, went to New York where he worked with the Syracuse Chargers, and is now the new coach for the La Jolla Track Club in southern California. I am sure you will enjoy the next few issues of WTFW.

Strange how different meanings can be read into the same printed words. Last month we complimented Jarvis Scott for her longevity in the running business and it was interpreted by some to mean she had run so long her eligibility for college competition had expired. We also wrote regarding the vote of the Women's T&F Committee concerning holding the Nationals on a six lane track that we didn't believe it. Referring to the point that we did not believe or could not believe there were 40 members of the Committee who didn't know or care about the athletes to vote for such a situation. This was interpreted by some to mean I didn't believe Pat Rico's reporting of the count. And so it goes.

We are still on the lookout for a college editor but due to the circumstances of the coming summer, we have decided not to contact anyone until September. We have had applications from many more interested persons than we had anticipated, more than 10 - and the position is still unfilled until our return from abroad this summer. The college editor will have a tough task as a look at this issue will show - the sport is growing faster in the college circles than in any other phase of the sport. Dozens and dozens of meet results are reaching us. G-R-E-A-T!! That's what this country needs.

The neophyte conferences, the AIAW, etc., etc., must get together, however, and settle for one set of rules, one set of events and a good order of events. They are still making a lot of mistakes but only from inexperience. Also, we need to get across to the reporters/college news service persons and all that FIRST names are a necessity in reporting results. For example, we have before us a report of the Michigan State University Invitational in which 16 teams took part. No first names. The shot, for example, was won by Smith of Florida State. And that doesn't exactly tell you a heck of a lot.

A further look at the result sheet which indicated "Smith" as the winner of the shot shows that the report states only "Results of the 1975 M.S.U. Invitational". Although a date is listed, there is no site recorded and a perusal of the final scores shows the meet could have been staged by Murray State University or Mississippi State University or Memphis State University, all of whom competed in the meet - and I thought it was Michigan State University! A little more clarity, please.

And the colleges, (and high schools and AAU's) MUST have wind readings from a LEGAL wind gauge. These things will come for the sport is growing fast. But these are some of the things the College Editor will have to battle for. If you are still interested in covering this phase of our sport, drop us a line and give us the information about yourself. Please include your phone number.

We don't usually print letters in this column, but recently we received a letter which needs exposure and comment. It is from a father of an athlete who requests anonymity, but whose problem has come up before - and, unfortunately will undoubtedly come up again. Here are his words:

"In your Kaleidoscope column of the March 1975 issue, in reference to the China trip you make the comment "other criteria" in selection (of the team) means that they pick whom-ever they want. My daughter's recent experience with this procedure would be a case in point. She had received a letter (from the selection committee) asking if she were available for the trip to China, and she answered in the affirmative. As she had been second in the US indoor championships she felt she had a good chance to make the trip, especially if they took two girls for each event. After waiting for three weeks, I finally contacted the AAU office only to learn the committee had selected a girl who had finished behind my daughter at the Nationals. No explanation was given, and to date we have received no official letter of refusal from the AAU. I wonder how many other girls didn't hear from the AAU."

I can appreciate the problems of trying to select and assemble a team for such a major trip, but can you imagine the

CLUB RECORD CONTEST

Repeating their 1974 victories, West Germany's "Tus Levenkussen" and the Los Angeles Track Club took the Club Record Contest titles as best in the world and best in the USA. The German group has put together an amazing list of club marks and the LA group is far and away the best in the United States. Following the LADC this year is the La Jolla TC, presently in a state of suspended animation awaiting reinstatement by the AAU after being disbanded for a spell, followed by the Delaware Sports Club. These two teams reversed their finish of last year. In 1974, the Atoms enjoyed fourth position followed by Albuquerque Olympette Club. This year the Atoms have dropped to 10th and Albuquerque 6th. National AAU Champion Sports International is in 11th position, leaving one to ask just what it takes to be the National Champion? Once again we are indebted to Winfried Kramer for his accurate reporting of the two Germanies, Daniel Grinberg for Poland and Ted Radcliffe for Canada. (*=converted from yards).



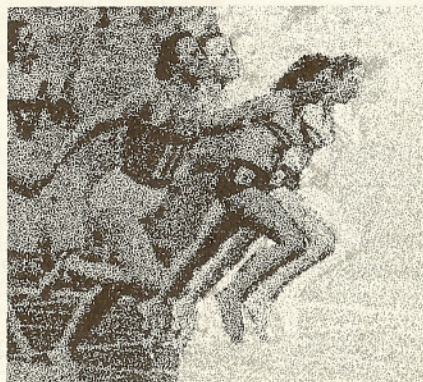

MT. SAC RELAYS

Walnut, California, April 26/27:-The 19th Annual edition of the always good Mt. San Antonio College Relays produced a host of great performances and performers. Under warm southern California sunshine, the women turned in some outstanding marks. Only late on Saturday afternoon did the wind come up and produce havoc with the half milers.

There were two double winners in the Women's Invitational events on Saturday, both from out of State. Robin Campbell, Sports International of Washington DC, captured the 440 yard dash easily in a good 53.5 over Debra Byfield and Kathy Weston, then returned to win the half over Weston and the wind in 2:11.6s. Mayor Daley's Rosalyn Bryant won both dashes, the 220 in a legal 24.1 by the barest of margins over Byfield, and the 100 over an out of shape Renaye Bowen in a wind-aided 10.6.

Another double winner was UCLA's Julie Brown, although she took two days to accomplish the feat. Brown won the Invitational mile on Saturday in 4:43.5 and turned in her lifetime best winning the two mile on Sunday with 10:12.8 with splits of 71-77-77-78-78-79-79-74. Pat Donnelly was a surprise two-time winner on Sunday as she annexed a slow 100 in 11.3, then upset Pat Van Wolvelaere in the 100m hurdles in 14.2 as Van Wolvelaere tangled with a hurdle early in the race and could never get under way.

Two of Sunday's running events brought the crowd to its feet with sterling performances. The 880 was a truly international field with Mexico's record-holder, long, lanky Charlotte Bradley, Canada's fast-rising young Sheila Currie, the Republic of China's Lee Chiu-Shia joining UCLA's Kate Keyes and the Patriots Kathy Keys. Keyes did most of the pace setting with Bradley and Lee trailing at the quarter in 63.5s. With only a furlong to go, Lee turned on the speed, swept past Keyes at the 660 post in 1:38 and won going away with a new ROC record of 2:09.2. Lee covered the first 440 in 65, the second in 64.2. The other race which brought a fine field together was the 400m hurdles matching Janice Lester, Linda Wright, Clydine Crowder and Michelle Hopper. Wright kept the foursome together for the first half of the race, then faded as Crowder led Lester around the final turn. But down the home straight, it was Hopper who turned on the fire and won going away in a good 60.9.

Two field events produced good marks and good competition. Kathy Schmidt won the javelin as expected, but the next three were all over 170 and Teri Sabol upset Monette Driscoll to win the discus with her lifetime best of 163'5, moving her to the number 8 spot on the All Time US list. Driscoll was next just five inches back and Linda Langford only one inch behind Driscoll. Jan Svendsen, now on the road to recovery after knee surgery, tossed almost 140 to indicate she will soon be back with the nation's leaders.

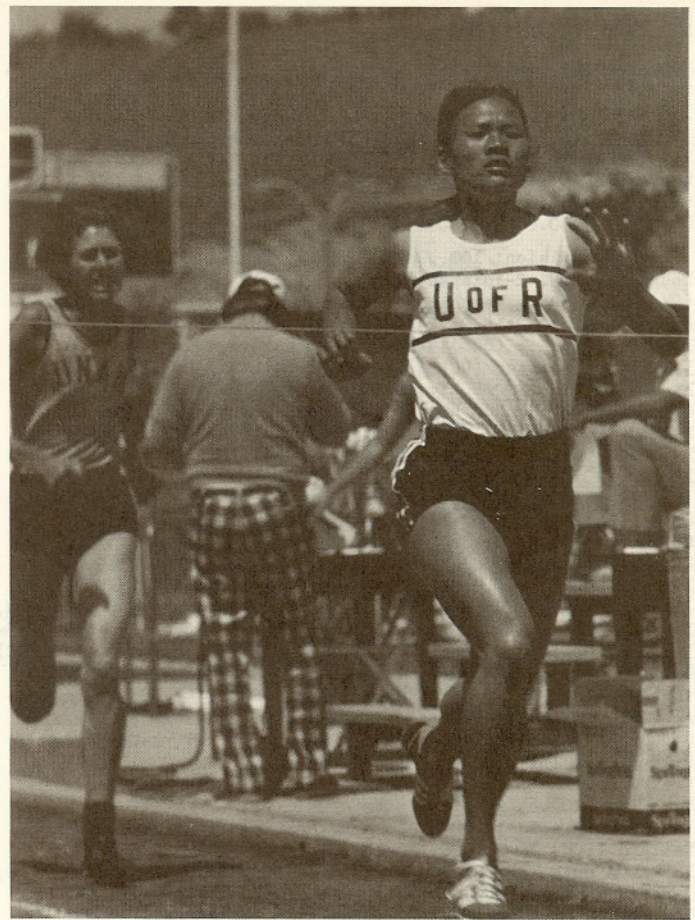
Carol Flournoy, SC Cheetahs, produced the biggest upset of the meet when she trounced Robin Campbell in the 14-18 mile on Sunday with a good 4:57.2 to 4:59.8 for the SITC star. Robin was never a factor in the race and produced no challenge at the finish while Flournoy was full of run.

Frieda Cobbs, Berkeley East Bay TC, had a wind-aided 10.9 century in the 14-15 division while Rialto's grunting shot-putter, Bea Hunt, had a fine toss of 39'6 1/2 in that event.

Roxanne Keating, Phoenix Chaparrals, was the star of the 12-13 division as she hopped 18'1 1/2 to win the long jump. won the 220 in 25.6 and picked up a third in the hurdles. Andrea Kirkhorn had a fine 2:30.3 half in this Division and Ki Ki Lantry of the Rialto Road Runners, took the mile in 5:15.3 over teammate Vicki Cook (5:16.2).

LEE WINS THREE AT CHEETAHS INVITATIONAL

Walnut, California, May 10/11:--Lee Chiu-Shia, Republic of China's gift to the University of Redlands, won the 880, mile and two mile runs with ease to cop the glory in the Open Division of the Annual Southern California Cheetahs Invitational. Lee opened with an early morning win in the half in 2:12.7, came back an hour later to trot the two mile in 11:02.8 and then had a 'workout win' in the mile at 4:57.3. Best race of the day was the 400m hurdles which brought together fast-improving Patty Cape and veteran Janice Lester, both of the Long Beach Comets. Lester pulled into the lead over the 7th hurdle and had a two yard advantage into the home stretch but Cape, who apparently has found her event after several years of drifting, turned on the power and caught her teammate at the tape, both clocking the season's best of 60.8 in a tie.

Jarvis Scott had her usual busy day with a heat in the 100, then the final of the 440 which she won in her season best of 55.4, then the 100 final immediately following the quarter, and finally the 220 where she was a close second to Rosetta Birt in a wind-aided 24.5. Pleasant surprise entrant in the 440 was Mar. Decker who won her flight with ease in a good 56.8 (62.2 was second) and looked good doing it. The two mile relay produced the nation's best mark to date as Wilt's Wonder Women lapped to a 9:15.8 clocking. Best of the field events was the discus where Monette Driscoll, Jan Svendsen and Terri Sabol tangled and finished in that order. The marks were not up to snuff with the exception of Svendsen who upped her season best to 157'4 when she wasn't threatening the lives of the runners on the track with her impliment. The Long Beach Comets had a good 47.7 quartermile relay.

The age groupers produced some fine marks with Roxanne Keating of the Phoenix Chaparells having the best day. 13 year old Roxanne had the best long jump of the meeting at 18'7½ aided by a 2.5mps wind. She also won the 220 in a wind aided 25.2 and narrowly won the 200m hurdles against a 5.7mps wind in 28.5.

Suzanne Keith, Rialto Road Runners, had a good distance double in the 14/15 division, setting a new national record of 10:51.6 in the two mile and then coming back to whip a good mile field in 5:06.0. DISTANCERS GREAT AT BAKERSFIELD CLASSIC

Bakersfield, California, May 17:-Two great distance runs were the highlights of the always-well-run Bakersfield Classic as Ruth Kleinsasser, University of Redlands, upset Mary Decker to win the 800 and Cyndy Poor, San Jose Cindergals, and the University of Redlands' Lee Chiu-Shia staged a classic battle in the 1500.

Running a near perfect tactical race, Kleinsasser followed the field through the 220 in 31, moved into third at the 440 pole in 62, was on Decker's shoulder at the 660 in 1:36, held her position around the final turn and then outsprinted the comebacking internationalist for a 2:07.6 triumph. Decker, in her first two lapper of the year, clocked 2:08.9 for the metric distance and Paula Rose, just turned 14, was a fast finishing third in a lifetime best of 2:09.6.

The 1500 was another of the annual Bakersfield classics. San Jose's Poor had a three yard lead on Lee Chiu-Shia after the first lap and the two ran the entire distance without a centimeters change. Sweden's Gunnilla Lindh stayed with the duo for two laps, but gave up the ghost as the leaders passed the quarter in 72 and the half in 2:23.6. With one lap to go both runners picked up the tempo, passed the three-quarters in 3:34 and covered the last lap in 67 seconds. Down the final straight Lee could not gain on Poor and Cyndy in turn could not pull away from Lee - a beautiful contest with Poor winning it in 4:22.3. Lee was clocked in 4:22.8 although the "railbirds" unanimously had her some four-tenths faster.

Best of the other women's events was the javelin in which Karin Smith upped her season best to 174'9 to defeat Canada's veteran Jay Dahlgren at 164'3. Visiting Joanne McTaggart of Canada won the two sprints over poor fields in not-too-fast times.

confusion and disappointment in this household? The biggest problem, as I see it, is why was this girl contacted, offered the trip and then had the rug yanked from beneath her without a word from the mighty pooh-bahs. And how could the committee select a girl who had finished BEHIND her at the Nationals - unless they had spelled out their selection criteria beforehand.

Have no fear about the success of the National Championships. They will be OK. The people running the meet from White Plains are professional types and there should be no problems. The six lane track problem will probably be resolved by fewer entries than in 1974 and everyone will go home happy. Still believe the athletes are getting the short shift by the date - for the benefit of the USA international team, the meet should be seven days earlier. Here's to a great and successful and argument-free Nationals and success to the hard workers from White Plains.

..During the last six weeks, we have received from the Junior Olympic Committee a 70 page "AAU Official Handbook 1975 Junior Olympics", a 32 page brochure of "1974 National AAU Chevrolet Junior Olympic Championships", six Press Releases from the Junior Olympics and a 66 page "1974 AAU Junior Olympics T&F National Tabulation Results". Being in the publication business, I have a vague idea of how much these things cost to print and to mail. The figures must be tremendous. And our National Women's Cross Country team, the World Champions, had to hustle their own transportation to compete! Now that's incongruous.

THE MONOTONY OF TRAINING by Jack Pross (From 'Australian Athletics')

John Disley, English steeplechaser of some years ago, once wrote an article on the subject of "Why do people run?" He came up with the principle reason - "To prove something".

If you were to ask most athletes the same question you would get replies indicating that they hope to become Internationals, National or State champions, Club champions. But when you analyse it, most respond to an initial urge which had nothing to do with high-level success, and the answer gets back to the reason John Disley gave.

Korobkov (USSR coach) maintained that psychological training depends on the ability of an athlete to master his own feelings about what he is doing - from the earliest days.

One of the greatest obstacles an athlete has to master in his progress to physical achievement and psychological stability, is monotony. The monotony syndrome has as its parameter's the psychological capabilities of athletes. To some there is a reaction to regular and perhaps unimaginative competition; more often it is to regimented training, necessary perhaps to the coach, but irritating to the athlete. One of the potentially greatest of Australian distance runners in the last two decades was quite unable to associate himself with repetition work. He felt that if he could not enjoy himself in free, unrestrained running activity, he should not train. He eventually dropped out.

Some events in track and field respond more than others to repetitive training. In technique training for jumpers and throwers you will find a high personal tolerance to repetition. There exists a competitive attitude of man against himself. In the case of a distance runner it is man against the clock or the kilometers and monotony is usually close by. The unstable fall.

In all aspects of modern life, there are many distasteful tasks which must be carried out if the pleasure of living is to be experienced. Long travel to work, boring occupations, communal living - all are part of the monotony of activity. They have much in common with miles along a country road, heavy repetitions on a track, repeated approach runs to the pit.

Many athletes have experienced this monotony obstacle, only a few have conquered it. Some achieve success by increasing the load, others by decreasing it, but none can turn away from it. Perhaps the best way is to change the type of work; the personal adjustment task then becomes more dominant than the monotony.

One thing is certain - there is a grace responsibility on the coach to ensure that a training program minimises monotonous work and as monotony cannot be measured, it is only instinct brought about by experience that recognises the symptoms. As Korobkov said, "Clear distinction should be made between right and wrong methods, and he (the athlete) should think of possible ways of improving technically and tactically".

LETTER FROM BRAD TOMASINI, Wasco, Cal.

"I am very upset with the new age groupings based on year born rather than birthdate. I do not feel that those who pushed for this new standard really thought the subject completely through.

"I'd like to give you an example of how unfair this new system is towards youngsters born late in the year. Take a boy or girl born late in December of 1964 and use the new Junior Olympic age-grouping 1964-65. Say a championship meet was held in June of 1975. This youngster would be in age approximately 10 years 6 months, while his or her competition could very well be as old as 11 years 6 months. These youngsters would also never come any closer than 12 months from the top of their age group anytime during the 1975 year. The following year 1976, these youngsters would move up an age group and find themselves a full two years from the top.

"I feel if this kind of a system is allowed to continue it will eliminate these youngsters from the program, as they, in essence, will always be at the bottom of their age group, with no chance for success. Of course, without success, one cannot expect a youngster to continue competing."

Mulrooney leads the 880 with 2:26.3 with Berry second in 2:28.8. Mary Mulrooney leads the quarter milers in 60.8. The field events are good for indoor marks. Anne Okonek (Stevens Point) just noses Kathy Neuenfeldt (Manitowoc) in the 8# shot, 42'7 to 42'5. Jill Jirshinger (WA Central) high jumped 5'4. with Lorrie Snyder (Whitefish Bay) close behind at 5'3½. In all there were 11 girls over 5'0 indoors.

The MINNESOTA indoor season consists of "a couple of all-comers meets at the 220y clay track of the University of Minnesota where the girls can run in heats with the boys and arrange their own times" according to Robert Harris of St. Paul. One of the best marks to date is Ruth Harris' (Henry Sibley HS, West St. Paul) 5:12.4 mile. She followed that a week later with a 5:12.5 to prove it was no fluke.

Staying in the area, we have the results from the Spartan Relays indoors at Michigan State University on a 220y tartan track. Anita Lee (Cass Tech) won the two jumps with 17'4½ and 5'4. Opalewski (Saginaw Eisenhower) wpm the mile in 5:25.3 and Kerckaert (Bath) took the 2 mile in 11:51.9, (Ed. note: Should be 11:52.0). Flint Northern won the 880y relay (1:53.2), Walled Lake Western won the mile relay (4:23.0) and Ann Arbor Huron took the distance medley (13:40.6). Karla Amble of Huron has an outdoor 11:35.2 and 5:25.8 and teammate Laviolette has clocked 2:23.7 and 5:31.2

NORTH CAROLINA claims one of the best long jumpers indoors or out in Hoke County's Kathy McMilland who has soared 21'4 this year. She placed fifth in the AAU indoor championships at 19'2.

Fairfax County, VIRGINIA, held its first Girl's Championships in conjunction with their boys meet and awarded the team trophy on a combined score basis. Woodson took the combined award although Groveton was the highest scoring girls team largely on the basis of wins in the 440, 880 and 880y medley relays (50.4/1:49.6/1:52.4) and by Barbara Butler in the 880 (2:25.0). Woodson amassed its points behind Jackie Gordon's wins in the discus (137'8) and 4K shot (41'3½) and a mile relay first (4:18.4). Kim Borden (Mayfield) won both sprints (11.3/25.8) edging Linda Miller (Jefferson) also in 11.3 and Inez Skinner (Groveton) in 11.5 and 25.9. Kim Vollmer (Woodson) claimed third in the furlong in 26.0. Miller turned it around in the 440, winning easily in 59.0 flat. The mile went to Laura Brewer (Robinson) in 5:30.2 while Herndon's jump duo of Cathy Brent and Kelly Walsh went 16'6½ and 5'4 respectively.

From TEXAS we have several district meets, (the first step in qualifying for the State meet). Outstanding marks from the three meets held in Butler Stadium on April 11 were Renalda England's (Madison) 57.0 ahead of Debra Williamson of Worthing in 58.9. Williamson teamed with Loise Boyd, Wilma Harris and Maris Woolridge for a 4:13.3 mile relay win. In another division, Washington won the mile relay in 4:10.8 (Winfrey-Teavy-Sargent-Gibbs), the 880 relay (with Loretta Edwards replacing Charla Sargent) in 1:44.8 and the 440 relay (Stewart-Winfrey-Varnado-Teavy) in 49.4. Gibbs won the hurdles, Winfrey the long jump and second in the triple jump, as Linda Denley (Davis) was the only real dent in Washington's domination as she won the 100/220 in 11.6/25.8. Top 880 of the day was Susan Abernathy (Sterling) who turned in a 2:20.9 solo effort.

The following week, at a regional meet in San Jacinto JC in Houston, running on tartan, Gwen Smith (Conroe) showed last year's marks were not isolated as she won the 220 in 24.48 and the long jump at 18'4½ and anchored the winning 440 and 880 relays (48.3/1:42.08). Worthing took the mile relay in 4:01.5. Gibbs won the 80y hurdles in 11.0 and Laurie Davis (Memorial) won the half in 2:14.8 as Abernathy improved to 2:18.7. In the field, Vivian White (Furr) hurled the discus 132'2 and Ann Moon (Angleton) tossed the shot 42'2½.

Teresa Baugh (North) was the star of Tennessee State University's Development Meet as she claimed both sprints in 11.0 (w-1.8) and 25.3 (1.7). In the 880, Margaret Gilrose (Harpepeth Hall) breezed to a 2:17.0 win to highlight the rest of the meet.

Kelly Jones (Hillsboro) led her team to a win in the Estacada, Oregon, Invitational with state bests in the 100 (11.42) and 440 (58.38) and anchored a 1:51.86 medley relay win in an outstanding meet. Debbie McDonald (Lebanon) led a good

220 field in 26.67 over Linda Parmele (Estacada) in 26.71 and Chris Sannes (Cottage Grove) in 26.81. Parmele also took second in the 440 in 58.70. Barbara Hansen (Centennial) won the middle distances with times of 2:18.6 and 5:19.1 over good fields, (Dale Ramsey, Cottage Grove, 2:19.9; Leslie Aiken, South Eugene, 2:20.1; Robin Baker, South Eugene, 5:25.5; Lisa Wallin, Hillsboro, 5:26.0). Parmele also claimed the 110y hurdles over pentathlon prospect Desiree Gauthier (Madradas), 14.99 to 15.19. In the relays, South Eugene claimed the 440 in 51.68 and Hillsboro took the medley in 1:51.86. Hillsboro also claimed long jumper Tracy Ranf who took that event at 18'0.

In the Oregon outdoor list to date, the outstanding performer has to be Lisa Kirk of Crater. She leads the state in both the discus and the javelin with tooses of 137'11 and 151'5. No one else is close. Ranf, no stranger to plus 18 foot jumps, claims the state best in that event with an 18'6½ effort. Jeannie Gill (Nestucca) leads the furlong with her 25.7 as Jamie Mitchell (LaSalle) leads the mile in 5:17.0. Gail Wigle (Riddle) is the best A Division performer as she trails only Jones in the 440 with 58.8. By the way, the address for "Who's Who in Oregon T&F" is Box 276, Canyonville, Oregon, 97417.

From IOWA, at the Drake Relays, Woodbine High School once again has blasted the mile relay record with a 3:54.7 clocking. Splits on the team were all in two families as Danette Esser led off in 60.3, Caren Horstmeyer ran 59.1, Lynne Horstmeyer 58.6 and Debbie Esser 56.7. Woodbine also took the HS 440 relay (49.7) and Debbie Esser clocked an 11.3 to win the century.

Despite rainouts and mud, CALIFORNIA has had several impressive marks. The Arcadia Invitational showcased the best in the southern California area. Regina Jordan (Muir) won the 100 in 11.4 over teammate Brown (11.5). Barbara Moore (Royal) collected the 440 in 57.8 over CIF "team" champion Pam Curran (LaReina) in 58.8. Karen Moore (Royal) claimed the 880 in 2:18.1 over Laura Johnson (Esperanza) in 2:18.5, Debbie Porter (Simi Valley) 2:18.7, Kathy Chisam (Arcadia) 2:20.2. In the mile, Chris Troffer (Crescenta Valley) won in 5:19.0 to beat Porter (5:20.7) and teammate Fisanotti in 5:20.9. Muir took the 440 relay in 49.8 and Barbara Moore anchored Royal to a 1:49.9 medley win. Julie Lendl of Royal won the high jump at 5'4, Curran took the long jump at 17'3¾ over Arcadia's Barbara Sinclair (17'3½ - but with a best of 17'11½ this year), and Kay Ilertson (Valencia) won the 8# SP at 41'0.

At the Redondo Invitational, host Terri Anderson ran an 11:56.2 two mile to beat teammate Catie Cakebread (12:04.6). Palos Verdes won the mile in the mud in 4:14.0, six seconds up on second place.

Other outstanding results from southern California include Westchester (IA) Kim Robinson who has run 11.1 and 24.9 this year, Arcadia's Sinclair who has an 11.0 80y hurdles as have Upland's Linda Hightower and Corny Sonnenburg. Claremont's Staci Johnson clocked 25.8 in a windy 220 and Chaffey's Tanya Bowie has raced 26.0 seconds. Hightower claimed a 59.1 medley anchor in her league final.

In a rather different vein, Claremont's distance crew took advantage of two weeks off and weathered six hours of rain and three inches of mud to record a 169 mile 1522 yard 24 hour relay, (you should try it sometime, but I don't recommend the rain).

The Mt. SAC Relays condescended to include some girls events this year and invited a few local teams to enter the 440 and mile relays. Chaffey won the 440 in 51.9 and Arcadia took the mile in 4:11.3.

GREATEST HS MEET IN HISTORY



With the age group program designed as it is in the USA, many girls find it extremely difficult to adjust between the ages of 13 and 14. For a girl who has just left the 12/13 Division and is suddenly presented with the stark reality of competing against a girl three or four years older, (and who just might be an Internationalist), it sometimes becomes just too much pressure to bear. It is sometimes referred to by coaches as "Fourteenitis". While many girls were busy hanging up their spikes and calling it a career, the subject of this months article, Linda Wright, was preparing to try her hand (and feet) at track and field.

Linda hails from Peoria, Arizona, a suburb of Phoenix. In 1970, at the age of 13, she began running. Two months later, she turned 14. Linda wasted little time in the older division as she won the Arizona State and Regional Junior Olympic meets in the 440 yard dash. Along with the wummertime 100 degree-plus temperature in Phoenix, Linda has been keeping the heat on her competition ever since.

When Linda was 14, she set herself a goal to break 60 seconds in the 440, and on her 15th birthday she ran 59 flat, running against two of Arizona's all-time bests, Mavis Laing and Nancy Benson. Now, four years later, she is once again trying to dip under 60 seconds for the one lap race - but this time someone has put ten hurdles along the way. Says Linda, "I am really sort of surprised at my progress over the last few years when I realize that I can now run a 440 over hurdles faster than I could when I first started running the 440 without hurdles!"

In 1973, Linda was unranked on any list. But one year later, she found herself resting in 6th position nationally and 7th on the All-Time US 400m hurdles list. Her time of 61.0 was set in a race (Bakersfield Nationals final) in which she was considered at best to have only an outside chance. Every other competitor had registered a better mark at a previous meet or in the qualifying rounds at Bakersfield. Linda recounts, "I really enjoyed being the underdog in that race. No one expected me to do anything, so I just went out and picked off everyone I could. Suddenly I realized I had finished fourth!" This was not Linda's first success with hurdles, however. In 1972 she began running the 200m hurdles and that year won the Region 10 Championship while setting a State record with a time of 28.5. With the onset of 1973 she began training seriously for the 400m hurdles. Her effort was an uneventful 68 seconds. She pulled a hamstring shortly thereafter and didn't run the event again until the Nationals at Irvine, California. During this time Linda was competing for the Arizona Track Club and her coach elected to forego the girls division and enter her in the women's race. Gallantly, she finished 5th overall with a time of 63.4s.

1974 turned out to be Linda's most successful season ever as she set the Arizona State 400m hurdles record on four separate occasions during the season. Linda ran second to Clydine Crowder at the elite Valle Del Sol Invitational clocking 62.4 and later in the season won the Junior Nationals in Hastings, Nebraska, setting a Junior National record of 61.6. The finale came in late June as she finished 4th at Bakersfield in the AAU Nationals clocking her lifetime best of 61.0 flat.

Now with the 1975 season in full swing, Linda Wright is no longer the underdog, but her fiercer competitiveness has not diminished because of her recent successes. In an event full of girls who tend to be rather tall and rangy, don't let that diminutive 5'4 frame fool you! And there are still six names on that All-Time List to "pick off".

Conroe High School had the 47.5 and 1:39.8 relay marks while Temple shattered the week old mile relay mark of Iowa's Woodbine HS as they averaged 58.45. Two speedsters clocked 10.9 for the century, Karen Arp in the Class A final and Michelle Wilkins, a freshman, in the 4A race. Gwen Smith turned in a 24.0 furlong, but all sprints, hurdles and long jump marks will go down as wind-aided as wind readings were either not taken or not reported.

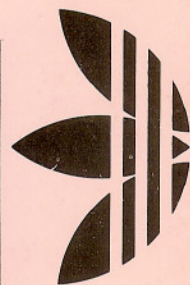
