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NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS PREVIEW

Women track and field athletes from the United States will take their first step toward the 1968 Olympic Games when they compete in the Annual National AAU Championships at Aurora, Colorado. From this competition the athletes will qualify for the Olympic Trials at Mt. San Antonio College, California, on August 24-25.

Only two of the 1967 Champions will not be defending their titles - Charlette Cooke in the 400 and Natalie Rocha in the 1500. Cooke has retired and Rocha is recovering from injuries and illness. On hand will be Barbara Ferrell (100), Diana Wilson (200), Madeline Manning (800), Mamie Rallins (80m H), Pat Van Wolvelaere (200mH), Eleanor Montgomery (HJ), Pat Winslow (LJ), Maren Seidler (SP), Carole Moseke (DT) and Ra Nae Bair (JT). Plus, of course, Tennessee State as the defending team champion.

Most of the defending champions will be hard pressed to retain their titles with Rallins, Montgomery and Seidler the only real solid choices for a repeat gold. The sprints will bring together a classy collection of speedsters aiming at dethroning Ferrell and Wilson led by a healthy Wyomia Tyus, the 1964 Olympic Games 100m champion. Manning can expect all sorts of trouble from the "new" Doris Brown in the 800, Van Wolvelaere is not yet 100% healthy after a broken leg, Winslow has not come close to her 1967 long jump marks, Moseke must meet the challenge of the return to track of Olga Connolly, a three-time Olympian and the 1956 Olympic Champion, and Bair is far below her 1967 form.

Nikolic 2:00.5 800m - Westermann 205'2 Discus

Two more world records have been set during the past month as Yugoslavia's 19 year old Vera Nikolic sped to a 2:00.5 800 meters at the English Championships and West Germany's 1967 World Athlete of the Year, Liesel Westermann, got the discus record back again with a throw of 205'2 on July 25.

In London the 800m final was set up when Nikolic, Brown and England's Lillian Board all won their qualifying heats. Nikolic went out fast in the final, zipping the first 200 in 28.9 with Board only a yard back. At the quarter Board was right on Nikolic's shoulder in 60.5 but after the third turn Nikolic spurred to lead at the 600 mark in 1:30.6 to Board's 1:31.6 while Brown trailed. Down the final straight Nikolic pulled slightly further away and Doris Brown made a run at Board, just falling short as six of the first seven finishers all ran lifetime personal bests. Nikolic's final lap was an even 60 seconds for her new world record. For Westermann in was a great satisfaction to regain the world discus mark. She was the first woman to throw over the magic 200 foot level when she set the record at 200'11 in

REEL TALK

The Communication Gap

We should establish one basic fact before digging into this subject - that fact is: everyone connected with the sport of Women's Track and Field wants what is best for the sport. Unfortunately the athletes, the coaches, the officials, the committee members, the rules makers, the press don't agree on what is best for the sport. We feel that probably the most important missing ingredient is a lack of communication between these various parts of the sport making it difficult for the "whole" to be unified. But we must all always remember the basic fact stated above: we all want what is best for the sport.

Now let's talk about a few specifics. How does the ordinary athlete communicate with the AAU? Did you know you as athletes have a committee of representatives who are expected to meet with the T&F Committee and present ideas, complaints, suggestions? Your committee is composed of Mamie Rallins, Doris Brown and Estelle Baskerville - and they have called a meeting of all athletes, coaches and interested individuals for the morning of Friday, August 16. The committee wants a complete turnout for the meeting for they intend to discuss many things - among which will be:

1. The athletes want to know exactly how persons are chosen for foreign trips. Exactly! There is no escaping the fact that foreign trips are looked forward to by all competitors yet the athletes themselves haven't the slightest, foggiest idea of who does the selecting and on what basis. The athletes want to know IN ADVANCE what trips are in the offing and HOW they can qualify.
2. The athletes want to know how the coaches and chaperones for these trips are selected - who chooses them? And what are the requirements for being selected. The athletes are concerned over the fact that when they travel with male athletes to foreign countries, there is little, if any, control over these male athletes, that the young

girls especially are subjected to embarrassment by men representing the USA who believe getting drunk each nite is the accepted policy. It's time the parents of the female athletes demand proper protection and proper policing of their daughters on foreign trips. Know beforehand who is responsible for the safety and well-being of your daughter.

3. The athletes want to know who receives invitations from foreign countries inviting them to compete - and why the athlete concerned is not informed of the invitations, the financial arrangements, the travel plans, the itinerary, etc., etc. It is a known fact that the Central AAU office receives invitations requesting certain athletes, yet keeps this information to itself. Why?
4. The athletes want to receive and give communication to and with the officials. They want to cooperate, but feel completely frustrated at not being able to reach anyone - and being given the double run-around whenever they do contact someone.
5. The athletes want to know why a girl must be 14 before she can be on a US Olympic team - in track and field. In other sports no such rule exists. Why?
6. What happens when rule changes are passed at the Convention and then fail to appear in the rule book - or are changed, "by the printer"?

There are other items which your Committee hopes to present at this, the first organized meeting for athletes. They hope to present a panel discussing appropriate dress at meets, workouts and travel; they want to discuss the use of "qualifying marks" for the National Championships - why some individuals, (and coaches), manage to get into these meets without having met the standard set; they might even discuss "human rights".

BUT MOST IMPORTANT, THEY WANT YOU, YOUR COACH, YOUR PARENTS TO BE AT THE GENERAL MEETING, FRIDAY, AUGUST 16.

Los Alamos - The Perfect Spot

The United States Olympic Committee has selected Los Alamos, New Mexico, as the training site for the 1968 Women's Olympic Track and Field Team. The Team will assemble at the site on September 15th and remain until October 3rd when they will depart for Mexico City via Denver. The athletes will stay at the Los Alamos Inn - 36 athletes and 3 officials.

Those are the bare, basic facts in the news release form. But what about Los Alamos? What about the Los Alamos Inn? The people, the local committees, the weather, the track?

Relax! This has to be one of the best decisions ever made. Los Alamos appears to be the perfect city. Situated at 7300 feet, surrounded by higher mountains, the track located in the foothills with tall trees nearby - it's practically perfect. The Los Alamos Inn is a beautiful, well-kept, new motel with large swimming pool and other recreational facilities available. The population is 30000 and a good number of them showed up for the Development meet, (and paid admission) on July 27 - and were a very appreciative and demonstrative audience. They applauded good effort and bravoed good performances. The local people working on the Los Alamos Olympic Committee are sincere, dedicated individuals who seem willing to do anything to help the athlete. For those fortunate enough to be selected for this training camp you will meet people like Roy Reider, Steve Stoddard, John Rogers, Mark McMahon and others - they are all tops.

The track is all-weather "grasstex" type - very good and quite fast. The weather, according to the local experts, should be perfect by mid-September as the rains will have ended and the snows not yet started. If you make this team, you will have a wonderful three weeks in Los Alamos.

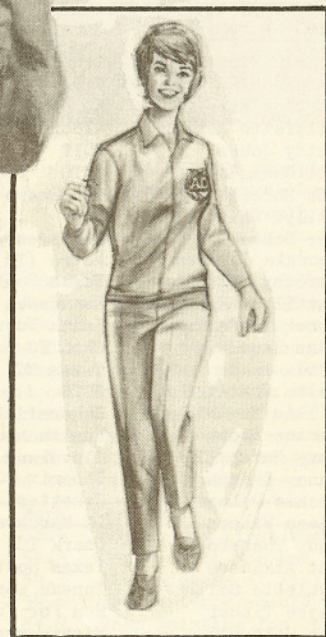

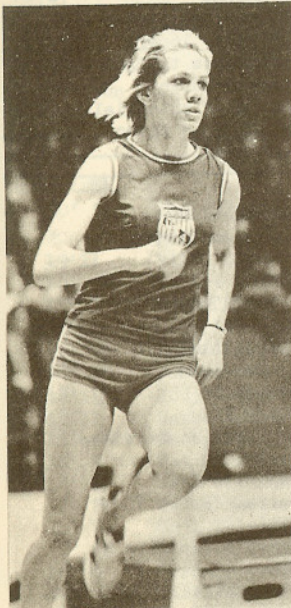

Chico, California, July 6:-It was listed as the "Western USA Women & Girls AAU Track and Field Games", and it contained all the ingredients for an outstanding production - a terrific field of athletes from Texas, Washington, Colorado, Oregon, New Jersey, Arizona, Iowa and California; a fast track; set late in the season when athletes would be reaching their peak; a city boasting excellent weather for track - but it never came off!

It was too bad, too, for as usual the athletes performed extremely well under adverse conditions, but the meet was evidently too big a bite for the management to do anything with. Not only were coaches and athletes disgusted with the meet arrangements, but the officials and meet director seemed to be on opposite sides of the war and even the lowly ranked score-keepers were mad at the director. Consensus is that a meet director should be a dictator, but he should be a democratic dictator not an unapproachable autocratic dictator.

Chief complaints centered around entries listed erroneously or completely omitted, (as one coach said, "It's a long way to come from Denver to find out your athletes have been left out of the meet!"); poor assignment of lanes, (i.e. the LA Mercuresses were placed outside of BOTH the "A" and "B" relay teams of Will's Spikettes); evidently a complete and total lack of knowledge by the meet management of any of the outstanding athletes, (see comments on 100 yard dash below); poor - almost no - announcing, (due in great part to the announcer not receiving any results from the field); complete bedlam caused by the presentation-of-medals-announcer who on at least one occasion mispronounced five of the six names of the medal winners; still another announcer, (with a good idea) was presenting the athletes to the spectators before the start of each event, but he ranked only slightly below the "medal-presenting" announcer in mispronouncing not only names but Clubs, (i.e. the "LA Merkettes"); the recall starter firing before the official starter on at least six occasions; the official starter using three commands instead of two for the distance races - causing some false starts in the mile.

To top it all, the Chamber of Commerce weather even failed to cooperate. Trials were run in the morning, finishing at one o'clock and the thermometer registered 105°. The finals were scheduled in the evening when it is usually ideal in Chico - but this night the wind came up like a small typhoon just before the races were to start and blew directly into the face of the runners. So strong was the wind that it blew the door off the announcer's booth and one time, while one athlete was standing at her marks, the wind blew the hair-band right off her head. We will never know the strength of the wind, however, for in spite of having a terrific field of athletes particularly in the 100 where a world record was a distinct possibility, there was no wind gauge!

RESULTS: 100 Yard Dash. This must be ranked as the biggest mix-up in seeding of the entire meet, (which makes it a pretty mixed-up thing), and also the biggest victory in the finals for Barbara Ferrell who came back from a bad defeat only seven days before by Margaret Bailes to whip her young opponent under circumstances which definitely favoured the heavier athlete. Four heats were set, with the first three in each heat moving to the semi-finals. The first heat brought together Dee DeBusk (10.5), Georgia Johnson of Texas with a 10.5 recent win over Netter, Janet Macfarlane who had just returned from competition in Mexico where she ran an 11.6 100m, and Chi Cheng who ran only 11.7m the week before but defeated Jenda Jones and Diane Wilson - the heat was won by DeBusk in 10.7 with Johnson (10.7) and Chi (10.8) in second and third. Macfarlane was fourth with 11.2s. In the second heat, Loretta Stevenson was the winner in 11.3 and Diane Hewdlyn of the Oregon TC qualified with 12.1s. Bailes won the third heat in 10.6 with second and third clocked in 11.3 and 11.7s. Ferrell won the fourth heat in 10.9 while 11.5 and 12.2 qualified. Semi final heats were won by Bailes and Ferrell setting up the rematch for the expected fast final. The wind spoiled any chance for a record and according to all logic eliminated any chance Ferrell had of getting revenge over Bailes for the defeat the week before - but Ferrell didn't read the script or pay attention to the wind - she simply went to the front and stayed there to win by a foot over the strong youngster from Oregon. DeBusk was third and Chi fourth which relegated Georgia Johnson to fifth.

220 Yard Dash. Fortunately there were enough scratches to eliminate the heats and require only semi-finals. The "seeding" committee was hard at work in the heats for they placed Ferrell, Bailes and Macfarlane all in the same heat! Semi-final results are not available, but six good runners qualified for the final - Bailes, Hammond, Macfarlane, Ferrell and the 1967 National Champion, Diana Wilson. The final was stripped of some glamour however, when Ferrell scratched and Hammond pulled up just after running the turn with a muscle pull. Diana Wilson, who really knows how to run this race on the turn, won in excellent time of 24.0 with the wind having dropped down somewhat. (Oh, for a wind gauge!!!) Final: Wilson 24.0, 2-Bailes 24.1, 3-Johnson 24.2, 4-Macfarlane 25.6, Hammond pulled up and Ferrell scratched.

440 Yard Dash. The "Seeding Committee" loused up the heats by placing too many good runners in the same heat - and in the longer events where places were awarded by time they did it again by placing the good runners in different sections instead of running the good athletes together. The 440 was no exception - except scratches made it possible for this race to be run in one flight - and Kathy Hammond eased through a 27 furlong and came home in a good 54.5s. Sara Beckord, the Iowa record holder who had taken a bad spill in the 880 earlier in the evening, was second just a step ahead of Bunny Pope. 1-Hammond 54.5, 2-Beckord 57.6, 3-Pope (SYTC) 57.8, 4-Nancy Mullen (ML) 58.0, 5-Bobbie Conyers (WS) 60.4, 6-Anna Baccianrini (SYTC) 61.1s.

880 Yard Run. This was run in three sections and the good performers were, as usual, separated by the seeding committee. Young Linda McCain of the Tucson TC, won the first heat in her lifetime best and a well-run, evenly paced race of 2:15.6, (33-32.2-36.5-33.9) finishing yards and yards ahead of all opposition. Cis Schafer (Millbrae Lions) won the second section in 2:23.0. Sara Beckord (Iowa TC) fell at the 220 mark in this flight. Jarvis Scott outlasted Paula Schmidt to win the third flight in 2:11.4s. Perhaps she would not have run faster, but I'll bet Linda McCain would have liked being in the third flight! 1-Scott 2:11.4, 2-Schafer 2:15.0, 3-McCain 2:15.6, 4-Lille Foster (ML) 2:17.8, 5-Mary Franklin (Stockton) 2:21.3, 6-Cis Schafer (ML) 2:23.0s. US REPORT Long Beach Comets Invitational

Long Beach, California, July 14:-Ron Allice and his Long Beach Comets successfully staged their Fourth Annual Invitational meet at Wilson High School today. The day long affair brought together athletes from not only the southern section, but from distant areas of the San Francisco Bay area, Arizona, New Mexico and others.

Best mark of the day was turned in by Arizona's 13 year old Judy Rejebian who recorded 18'9½ to win her division of the long jump. Rejebian is now very consistent in the 18/19 foot range and soon should move to a new plateau and greater performances. Certainly she gives the US a ray of hope in this event for the future for the long jump has long been one of the weak points of American athletics.

RaNae Bair won a close decision in the javelin with a not-too-good throw of 149'10. RaNae has never recovered from the ankle injury suffered while playing basketball last year. In fifth place was teammate Roberta Brown (131'7) who upset Bair to win the State title a few weeks ago.

Paula Schmidt (Millbrae Lions) and Bunny Pope (Santa Ynez TC) both came close to victories with near misses in the 880 to Jarvis Scott and the 440 to Lois Drinkwater - but the times were not fast.

Barbara Ferrell and teammate Diane Wilson had no trouble annexing the two sprints in 10.7 and 24.5s. Mo Dixon came close to the five minute mark in the mile with 5:02.0s.

Willie Nichols won the three sprints in the girl's division and continued to perform in her rag-tag fashion with shirts torn hanging out and below her trunks. Teammate Judy Smith (Bakersfield) likewise won the three sprints in the 12/13 division.

A report on this fine meet can not be complete without a few remarks on the coverage in the Long Beach papers. The Comets, their sponsors and the adult staff did an excellent job of preparation and staged a fine meet. The summary of the meet in the Long Beach Press-Telegram was so full of errors, misspellings, misstatements, etc., that it seemed to be covering some other competition. Lead story concerned Leslie Gliessman (SYTC), a fine shot putter, who, according to the story set a new State record in winning the shot put with a throw of 42'4½ - this mark would not get her in the top five in the State for 1968, let alone set a new State record. The reporter added Gliessman was also second in the discus with a throw of 148'11 - actually Nancy Norberg was second with a throw of 148'11 while Gliessman was third at 119'1.

Briefly, others errors include Crowden (Crowder), Hanford TC (Hollywood AC), misspelling Flakes and RaNae, Babes Brandon (Babs), Paul Schmitz (Paula Schmidt), Velma (Wilma), Mac Farlane (Macfarlane), Timke (Temke), Van Eres (Van Gores), and so on. I presume we should be thankful the meet was reported at all, but since the reporter was present at the competition I feel he could have done better!

Los Alamos, New Mexico, July 27:-It was billed as the AAU Region 10 Track and Field Championships, but the local lasses had a difficult time scoring against the "outlanders" who took advantage of the outstanding hospitality of the citizens of Los Alamos and poured into the 7330 foot high city to test the altitude in competition.

Crown Cities Chi Cheng "stole the show", as the local papers exclaimed, and knocked into a cocked hat any ideas athletes might have that, except for the 800 and 1500, an individual must be acclimated to anticipate top performance. Chi did not arrive in Los Alamos until the day of the competition and ran five races, including two afternoon trials, (100 in 10.9 and 220 in 24.5), winning three final races within 60 minutes and setting two lifetime bests and equalling her season best in the third event. In the 100 she pulled away for a five yard margin over good sprinter Jenda Jones to clock 10.4, just one-tenth off the world mark. Jones clocked a good 10.8 while Linda Schram of Abilene, Texas, was another five yards back in 11.3s. Trotting back to the starting line Chi zipped through the 80m hurdles in 10.8 for a seven yard win over fast improving Pat Donnelly, (Tucson, Arizona), who had her lifetime best at 11.5s. Texas TC Dianne Yancey was third in 11.7s. Twenty minutes later, Chi took off in the 220y final and passed Jenda Jones, (running two lanes out), before the pair had gone 50 yards. It was a solo run after that with Chi some 12 yards ahead at the tape with a personal best of 23.7s. Jones had a good 24.7 for second while Schram was again third in 25.3s. (Wind: 100 +1.5; 80mH +3.5; 220 -1.7)

Lois Drinkwater (Phoenix TC) and a sleepy Doris Brown, just three days away from a race in Ireland, tangled in an interesting 440 which went exactly according to the script - Drinkwater off fast building up a huge lead, and Brown coming on in the final straight to make up much ground. Times were 55.5 and 56.3 with no ill effects noted from the devil altitude. Albuquerque's young Lisa Chavarrio was third in 60.2s.

Vicki Foltz, Falcon TC, had no difficulty winning the 880 in 2:13.6 with Debbie Hancock, Phoenix, second in 2:20.1 - after winning the mile. Hancock had a good mile time at 5:18.0 after a 2:35 first half. Soap Lake's Judy Oliver hung close for a while, but faded on the third lap and finished second in 5:26.2, barely nosing out Barbara Lawson of Broomfield, Colorado, who clocked 5:26.8s.

Pat Donnelly won the 200m hurdles in 28.7 - but the result was clouded by suspicions of erroneous hurdle spacings. Pat ran over 10 hurdles and completed the distance of 200 meters, but the measurements put the hurdles 16 meters apart with 19 meters to the first hurdle, exactly the opposite of the correct spacings. This gave Pat a good sprint of 37 meters after clearing the last barrier. Versatile Chavarrio was second in 29.1 and Texas TC's Marsha Null third in 29.2s.

The field events failed to exude much in the way of excitement or performance. Chavarrio won the long jump at a so-so 18'2 1/2 followed by Sharon Bell (TTC) at 17'8 and Sally Caton (Albuquerque) with 16'11 1/4. Kerry Roach (TTC) won the high jump at 5'0 on fewer misses over Mavis Laing of Phoenix. Although the marks were nothing to rave about, the shot and javelin were won by Beverly Lilly of Tucson who just turned 14 a few days before the competition. Beverly threw the shot 34'2 1/2 and the javelin 108'9. Barbara Butler, Albuquerque OC, won the discus by twenty feet with a throw of 119'5.

Saskatchewan the Winner

SASKATCHEWAN WINS TRI-PROVINCE MEET

Saskatoon, Saskatchewan, Canada, July 6:-For the first time, the three Canadian Prairie Provinces, Saskatchewan, Alberta and Manitoba, met in track and field competition with the host team winning the women's title with 102 points to 97 for Manitoba and 72 for Alberta. Best performance of the meet was Marlene Kurt's 158'8 in the discus.

NATIONAL PENTATHLON CHAMPIONSHIP & OLYMPIC TRIALS

Chi Cheng Upsets Winslow; Crown Cities 1-2-3

Columbia, Missouri, August 3/4:-Before the competition ever began, everyone knew there were two separate battles to be fought in the 1968 National Pentathlon Championships and Olympic trials. The big battle was for the championship itself and included only two athletes - seven-time defending champion Pat Winslow and a healthy Chi Cheng. The second, and the most interesting battle, was for the third spot in the championship scoring, but the runner-up spot for the USA and the chance to qualify for the Olympics. In this second battle were the youngsters of the USA who will be the red, white and blue internationalists of the future - 16 year old Nancy Benson, 16 year old Jan Glotzer, 15 year old Cathy Hamblin, 17 year old Barbara Emerson, 17 year old Diane Spangler and 19 year old Marilyn King - plus a dark horse old-timer making a comeback after having a daughter only seven months ago, Barbara Brown, a 1960 Olympian. Both battles were thrilling ones, best described as they unfolded:

80m Hurdles:-The battle for the title stuck almost to the script as Chi Cheng turned in her life-time best winning her heat in 10.6s for 1114 points; Winslow, although last in her heat, was happy with her 11.9 and 904 points. The "little but battle" wound up with Jan Glotzer zipping a life-time equalling best at 11.4 (979 points) to take the lead over Benson (11.6), Spangler and King at 11.7, Hamblin 11.8 and Emerson and Brown at 11.9s.

Shot Put:-Twenty four athletes competed in the pentathlon and the general weakness in the USA in the shot put was quite evident as one watched these competitors - technique was a lost phrase as the implement was thrown off the wrong foot, lofted high in the ozone or sent on a course which looked as though the putter was throwing to second base. In the Big Battle, Winslow got off the day's best put on her final try with a toss of 43'8/13.31 good for 941 points and a two event total of 1845. However, Chi Cheng turned in her second life-time best with a throw of 36'6/11.14 and 796 points to keep a slim lead of 1910. The youngsters had difficulty in this event, but not Barbara Brown. Barbara wafted her first try out a mighty 42'2/12.87 for 913 points to take the lead over her group with 1817 points. Marilyn King moved into second with a put of 36'5 and 1726 points followed by Hamblin (1673), Spangler (1657), Glotzer (1625), Benson (1609) and Emerson (1570).

High Jump:-Another horrible exhibition of fundamentals! Only a few, a very, very few had any conception of high jump technique and one wondered after viewing the kicks, twists, hippity-hop approaches and impossible foot-plants just how some of these performers had turned in such good marks in the past. The battle for first turned out to be no battle at all as Chi just scraped over the bar at 4'10/1.48 on her third trial and Winslow didn't even start jumping until five feet. Winslow ended up with a mark of 5'4/1.63 and took the lead at the end of the first day with 2821 points to 2724 for Chi. In the "little" battle, things tightened up even more so after this event. Brown, who high jumped in the 1960 Games, had a bad day and cleared only 4'7/4 but managed to end up the first day in third place with 2550 points. Right behind her was Marilyn King (4'10/4) with 2540. In fifth spot was a surprise - unhealed Ann Poulos who had quietly slipped in a flight of hurdles in 11.5, put the shot a satisfactory 33'9 and jumped 4'10/4 for 2512 points. Sixth was Glotzer who also had a bad day at the pit with a jump of 5'0/4 as compared to her mark of 5'4/4 only a week before - and 2494. In seventh, just one point back, was Barbara Emerson at 2493 helped along by a nice leap of 5'2/4. Cathy Hamblin's "Fosbury Flop" didn't work for her today and she cleared only 4'10/4 and had 2487 points - still in stiking distance for that vital third place. Chasing them in was Spangler at 2471 and Benson 2342.

Long Jump:-The tension was so thick as the athletes prepared for the second day's events that you could practically feel it. Both Winslow and Chi, teammates, longtime opponents and good friends off the track, were silent, pacing back and forth on opposite sides of the field. Both knew the outcome of the entire pentathlon hinged on the long jump. Chi knew she had to be close to Winslow to maintain any chance of winning with a speedy 200. And Winslow knew she had to beat Chi by a good margin to build a lead impossible to catch. Winslow jumped first - and missed her approach and ran thru

Pentathlon Kaleidoscope

All was not peaches and cream at the USA Pentathlon Championships and Olympic Trials. I must frankly admit the meet turned out better than I thought it would - the competition was fantastic and the athletes all world class in the "heart and desire" department....Our crew arrived in Columbia, Missouri, on Thursday evening - it was raining. It rained most of the day on Friday as we went to the high school field designated for workouts. The track was there, but nothing else - no hurdles, no starting blocks, a hard, solid asphalt runway for the long jump - and no preparation on the pit itself, nothing in the way of a high jump facility....Friday night the skies opened up shortly after we had visited the meet site. We found the track soft and sloppy, didn't think too much of the high jump approach, (hard asphalt with a 10' rectangular slab of Tartan in front of the pit); a rubber long jump board had been installed and the shot ring was marked only by paint....And then it rained. Really rained. In a small town only a few miles from Columbia they received 6/4 inches of rain during the night - and we all abandoned hope....Upon our arrival in Columbia we tried to get information about the meet - you know, the kind of information every athlete wants as soon as she arrives - who was entered, the time schedule, etc., etc., etc. But nothing....And the rain... Plus the fact the National Men's Pentathlon Championships were being held in the stadium on Saturday morning!....But lo and behold! The rain stopped by daylight and when I visited the track at 9:00 it was drying well. In addition, a regulation long jump board had been installed and the shot ring had been put in place. By the time the meet began, the track was excellent and nearly all was well.... Of course, everything which takes place in a meet of this calibre doesn't always satisfy everyone and there were some legitimate complaints by the coaches concerning heat assignments, timing, officiating in the high jump, (as one coach said, the head judge was wearing combat boots and apparently was taking on the entire world), and various assorted other items....Personally I was of the opinion not enough was done to give the "feel" of an Olympic Trial! It seemed an ordinary competition, not a battle for a spot on the United States Olympic Team. I felt there should be some official presence of the US Olympic Committee to give the athletes the feeling they were important to this country. Olympic coach Conrad Ford was present, but he was there as coach of Barbara Brown. Meet Director John Davis did a good job under trying circumstances and local Recreation chief Marvin Sprigg worked hard - as did everyone connected with the meet. As I said, it was much better than I thought it was going to be at first, but there should have been that extra something to give the athletes the feeling of the importance of this Olympic trial....The buffet dinner for the coaches and athletes on Saturday nite was excellent. And if you are ever going to Columbia, Mo., I can tell you where to get the best cheese cake this side of the Atlantic Ocean!

Crown Cities Track Club picked off first, second, third and sixth places to dominate the all-around category in the United States....Ann Poulos has been troubled with a bad knee which may require surgery in the near future....Happy to report the Phoenix duo of Glotzer and Benson now can aggregate more in the shot put than Pat Winslow alone!....Judy Toeneboehn has just returned from a free trip to England where she took part in several track meets - her fiance won \$12,000 on a drawing in England and the money could not be taken out of the country....Lenda Benggeli high jumped in regular track clothes - not in her bathing suit....Although the entry list was not too bulky this year, it is evident from the scores that soon a qualifying standard must be set for entry into the National Championships....Interesting to note that except for Chi, no one was over 19 feet in the long jump - a notoriously weak event in the United States....Emerson beat Glotzer in their only other meeting in the pentathlon on June 16 with 4233 to 4228....Results of the 1967 National Pentathlon were: 1-Winslow 4824 (11.4-43'8/4-5'5-19'1/2-24.7), 2-Cherrie Sherrard 4378, 3-Janet Johnson 4281, 4-Marilyn King 4159, 5-Kay Cox 4029, 6-Diane Spangler 3998, 7-Lois Drinkwater 3977, 8-Nancy Ridley 3938, 9-Jan Svendsen 3870, 10-Jan Glotzer 3857, 11-Pat Ridley 3847, 12-Alberta Martin 3843, 13-Jayne Frederick 3736,

for no mark. Chi's first jump was good for 19'2 and the pressure was on. Winslow jumped 18'0½ on her second jump and gave every indication much more could be expected on her final attempt. But Chi broke the meet wide open with her second jump as she flew to a third life-time best at 20'5½ to the applause of the crowd. Winslow's final jump was 18'0¼ and it was all over. Chi's final jump again was an all-time best as she improved to 20'5¼/6.24, only ¼ of an inch from the Olympic qualifying standard and her second event over the 1000 point mark to take the lead 3766 to 3694.

Meanwhile back at the farm, the third place fight was really tightening up also. Poulos eliminated herself from any consideration when she jumped less than 14 feet. Spangler did likewise by jumping only 16'8¼, but Janet Svendsen now moved into contention. Glotzer got off her life-time best on her final jump with her 25 step approach run and hit 18' 11¼ to put herself in third at 3432 points with only the 200 remaining. Fourth (18'1¼) was Barbara Brown 3428; fifth was Cathy Hamblin 3405 and sixth, just one point down (3404) was Emerson. King was 7th (3375), Svendsen 8th (3291) and Benson 10th (3122).

200m:-The championship battle had now lost all its allure for the winner was a foregone conclusion - and Chi did not let up as she sped a fourth life-time best running a solo 23.7 200, (although she ran 23.7 for 220y the week before). Winslow crossed the line in 26.7 as Chi Cheng became the first

US pentathlon performer since 1960 to defeat Pat Winslow. But Winslow retained her scoring record as Chi turned in 4823 points to miss the record of 4824 by one, single digit. Needless to say, it was her life-time best. Winslow scored 4481 for second.

Running in the first flight with Chi and Winslow, Glotzer sped to a 25.5 time giving her 887 points for a total of 4319. The second flight would determine the third place winner with all three, Brown, Hamlin and Emerson, having a chance to catch the Phoenix Phenom. Brown was on the pole, Hamblin in the middle and Emerson drew the outside. Around the turn Emerson built up a slight lead over Hamblin as Brown was clearly out of the picture. As they hit the straight, Hamblin pulled up even with Emerson, the Southern California girl's 100y champ, and the two battled stride for stride to the 180 mark when Emerson dug into her reserve power room and pulled away to a one yard win. Emerson's time of 25.1 (a lifetime best) was good for 923 points while Hamblin's 25.2 gave her 914 points. A quick session in addition showed Emerson had scored a narrow win over the others with 4327 points in her third-ever pentathlon. Glotzer and Hamblin both ended up with 4319 points, but Glotzer was awarded the fourth place by virtue of 3 wins over Hamblin out of the 5 events. Marilyn King (25.5) finished sixth with 4262 and Barbara Brown seventh at 4231.

Thus ended the finest pentathlon in US history - and gives promise of better things for this country in the future. In the past the USA has had only one good pentathlon athlete - Pat Winslow. Now we have the beginning of a fine crop of all around performers. Let us hope these fine athletes (3-4-5-6 place winners), will be taken to the Olympic training camp at Los Alamos where they can participate in additional pentathlon competitions to enable them to make the Olympic qualifying standard of 4600 points.

FLASH - ROSENDAHL 5129

London, England, August 2/3:-West Germany's Heide Rosendahl moved into the number two spot on the all-time pentathlon list with a fantastic 5129 point performance in the WG-England dual meet. Ingrid Becker, the number one pentathlete of 1967, was second with a fine 4923 in this, her first 5-eventer of the year. Ann Wilson (4804), Mary Peters (4740), Manon Bornholdt, 18 year old West German, (4598) and Canada's Jenny Meldrum (4551) completed the field.

Rosendahl's individual event marks included 10.9 for the 80m hurdles, 45'11½ in the shot put, 5'4½ high jump, 21'2 in the long jump and 24.2 for the 200 meters. Thus she has become a definite threat to better Irina Press' world record of 5246 set at the Tokyo Olympics. Heide has run the hurdles in 10.7 this year, had "near-misses" at 5'5½ in this competition, has long jumped 21'6 and should run a faster 200.

Competition for the first day was held at the Crystal Palace where the weather was cold. It began raining during the high jump competition. On the second day the site moved to White City, site of the 1956 Olympics - and again it was very cold.

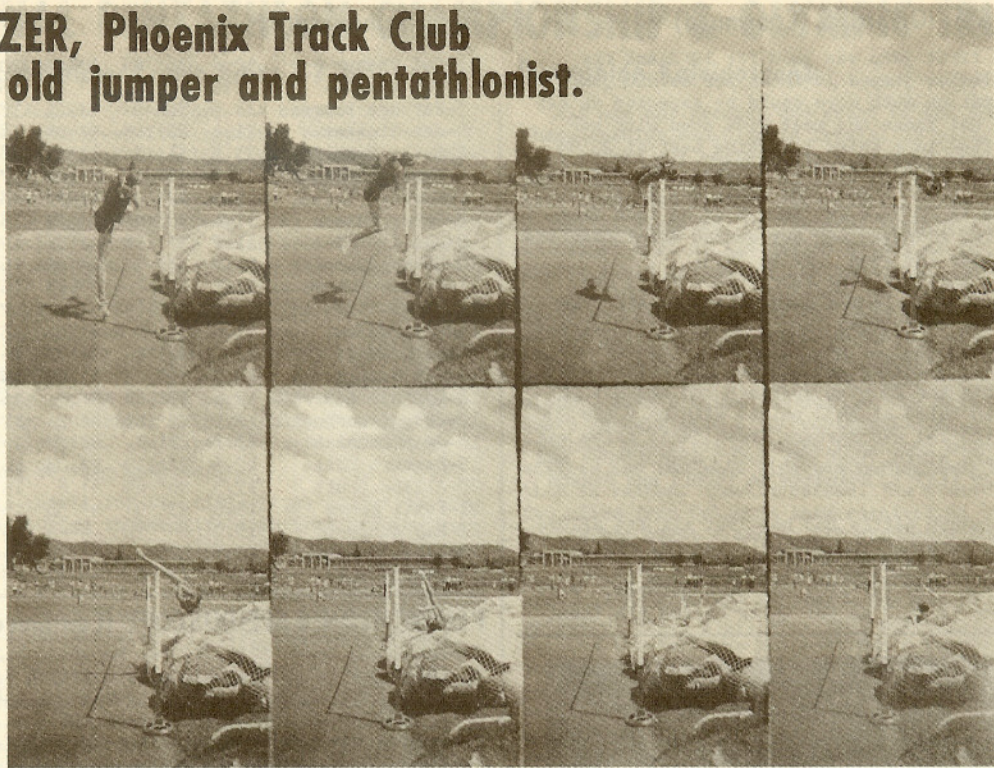

100 meters/100 yards

Results of important competitions in Eastern Europe have been marred by strong winds; Szewinska (Kirszenstein) ran 11.0 in the Kusocinski meet and bespectacled Lyudmila Samotyeyova 11.2 in the semi-final of the Znamenskiy meet....Szewinska has beaten all opposition by a clear margin, but she has not met those from the West who now come up with some competition to offer: Sylvianne Telliez, now at 11.4, and Wilma van den Berg, are unbeaten up to now....A typical British surprise is Val Peat, nee Wild, an almost unknown runner a year ago, now the English Open Champion and surely a threat....GDR's Renate Heldt, well on her way to last year's 11.4, was disqualified for disciplinary reasons and is definitely out for the season....Miguelina Cobian, a victim of the wind, (she ran 11.2-11.3-11.4-11.4, all wind-aided), was beaten by Telliez and the Soviet pair Samotyeyova and Popkova in her last trials in Europe....Watch Lyudmila Zharkova, a 15 year old prospect from Svyerdlovsk - she won the "Olympic Hopes" meet in Berlin with 11.2w and 11.3w during the past month and is one of the pretiest faces on the track right now. Her best legal time is 11.7....Note: Bukharinas and Golomazovas 11.4 and 11.5, reported last month, have been announced as wind-assisted. For the first time, Soviet sprint marks, even in small meets, are thoroughly confirmed regarding their regularity....An important "come-back": Karin Frisch, now Reichert, the well-known "big occasions" fighter of the past.

Lillian Board demonstrated her ability at the Moscow Pravda meet with 53.5, but the real surprise of the month is a new Dutch 400m hope, Myrna van der Hoeven, as Myrna Janssen one

of the best junior 200m runners two years ago. She started with 54.9 and five weeks later she won the English title with a Dutch record time of 53.6 - against Janet Simpson.... So with Louer and van der Made, Holland is surely the best aggregate quarter-miling country in Europe....Monique Noirot is gaining tempo, but she lost twice to her home-opposition, Colette Besson....Vera Nikolic, fresh from a tactical 800m in the Yugoslavia-Rumania-Czech triangular, set a new personal best at the shorter distance with 53.8....European Champ Chmelkova was surprisingly beaten in her inaugural race by Rumanian junior Filip, 55.7 to 55.6....Donata Govoni shattered the Italian best with a 53.9 clocking but was dead last at the Znamenskiy meet three weeks later....With Samotyeyova concentrating herself on the shorter sprints, the Soviet number one is Ingrida Verbele, a strong built Latvian girl, with two 54.4's....Yes, and Rosemary Stirling attacked the Olympic qualifying standard three times in eight days - result, the clock remained the same on all three occasions - 55.5 for 440 yards!

Vera Nikolic fulfilled only one part of our prognostications, the other part - the first under-two-minutes race - still remains. She is not now the childish miracle girl with the long socks and long hair who shattered all opposition at Budapest. This young lady is now on her way to becoming one of the greatest-ever stars of our sport. She was a very busy runner in the past weeks with six hard half-miles from June 27 to July 20 - and she beat everything everyone had to offer and usually with a faster second lap - and that's a surprising change of tactics for her. But, in spite of all the running, her only slow win was the one over Jehlickova and Salai at Trinec on July 13 - in 2:07.5....Another almost unbelievable progress was that of come-backing Ilja Keizer-Laman, Holland's sharp finisher....And not to forget Lillian Board's great struggle at the London race. But, as almost every track fan, we have been sure that Lillian is the most "Packer-like" runner in Britain today. The big news is the Leningrad clash between the best Soviet, East German and Polish hurdlers, i.e., the cream of European hurdling. Karin Balzer, in front at the next-to-last hurdle, stepped into a hole on the somewhat uneven track, lost rhythm a stride and ran into the last hurdle and lost to Korsakova and Nowak by a meter.....Korsakova's win could be a verification of her class, but it is not yet the answer for all the questions connected with her 10.2 world record. She is not the speedster Irina Press was, and according to eye-witnesses of her Leningrad race; also not a technical miracle. Her best mark, with the exception of the 10.3 and 10.2 she ran on the same day, is still 10.7, and she was disqualified for two false starts in the very next meet after her record at Riga... ..Balzer ran another 10.5, reportedly without too strong an aiding wind, at Warsaw to beat all the Polish girls....Note the success of the veterans: Talisheva won the Znamenskiy race, and Schell the West Germany-France match, both in 10.6....Very steady is Rumania's hope Valeria Bufanu: five 10.7 races so far this year....An Italian surprise: Panerai with a new record at 10.7s.

Three times she was over 6.60/21'7 during the Kusocinski meet in Warsaw - but all were wind-aided - (6.68/21'11, 6.63/21'9 and 6.60/21'7¾) - to beat Szewinska by a considerable margin; then went to Zurich to win over Viscopoleanu and the West Germans with her last jump, (a record 6.48/21'¾) and last but not least bettered the Norwegian mark with a legal 6.53/21'5 on July 24....Viscopoleanu beat the Rosendahl-Becker pair another time at Osnabruck; Szewinska scored against very strong East Germans and Russians at Leningrad....The GDR record, tied by Wieczorek during a pentathlon competition in June, was bettered twice at Sokolov, July 21. Liesel Westermann regained the record, as reported elsewhere in this issue, but in the weeks before she found some tough opposition from an unexpected source - not from the East German trio, but in Rumanian veteran Lia Manoliu. The Bucharest engineer, who was thinking about retirement during the winter, is now in her best form ever - as she is in every Olympic year, (she was third at Rome and Tokyo). Manoliu beat Westermann twice - at Osnabruck, June 30, 57.98/190'2 to 57.68/189'3 and at Cologne, July 10, 56.97/186'11 to 56.22/184'5 - and also lost twice - at Munster, July 5, 58.98/193'6 to 57.90/189'11, and at Koblenz, July 17, 57.96/190'2 to 56.56/185'6. Such close battles are unusual..... Best East German is Karin Illgen, unbeaten in June and July competitions. Her most notable win was at Leningrad where she held off the surprisingly well prepared Soviets - and Spielberg was only fourth.....Antonina Popova, nee Vashchenko, a 33 year old veteran, threw 59.80/196'2 at Moscow, July 6, 10 centimeters better than Tamara Press' last Soviet record mark.

Pentathlon

European champion Valentina Tikhomirova mastered the 5000 points peak during the USSR-GDR match at Kiev, June 30-July 1, where ten others scored more than 4400 points. Valentine was in top form with three personal bests in the hurdles (11.2), shot put (14.85/46'0¼) and long jump (6.15/20'2¼), accompanied by a 1.70/5'7 high jump and a 24.9 furlong..... Another prospect is Gerda Uhlemann, formerly Mittenzwei, who was a European medalist two years ago. In her fifth competition of the year she mastered 4889 points at Znamenskiy.....Note Maria-Vittoria Trio's improvement at the big international meet at Cluj, Rumania. Report from Norway by Erik Arset

Berit Berthelsen consistently breaking the 21 foot barrier.. In defeating Irena Kirszenstein-Szewinska by 8 inches, Berit Berthelsen confirmed her aiming for a medal at Mexico, (maybe gold!). This rugged meeting took place in Warsaw on June 30th and Mrs. Berthelsen's winning mark was a wind-aided 6.68/21'11. In the competition her phenomenal series was 21'9¼-21'1¼-21'2¼-21'0¼-21'7¼-21'11-foul. The wind was too strong during the competition however, but her jump of 21'2¼ was legal and goes into the record books equalling her national record. On her 21'11 jump, the wind was barely over the allowable - 2.02mps. Szewinska was second with 21'2¼ and Great Britain's Ann Wilson was third at 21'0¼.

In May Berit jumped 20'6 twice and 20'6½ on one other occasion. In Oslo on June 13th she jumped 21'2¼ and two days later competed in a pentathlon in Copenhagen which included a 21'4 (wind 2.15). In this competition she set her new Scandinavia pentathlon record of 4711. I believe Mrs. Berthelsen's marks in Copenhagen show how to have success in the pentathlon without really trying. She may be able to score 4900 points with a portion of luck for she was well behind her her personal best in the shot and can improve on all the other marks as well. (11.4-5'2¼-21'4-32'9-24.3.)

Anne Lise Waerness, the 16 year old high jump ace of Norway, has injured her back and has thus taken a pause in the high jump - her best mark of the season is 1.68/5'6. While resting she has concentrated on the discus and so far has a best throw of 143'2, only 8'4 short of Vladimira Srbova's world age record. On the National scene the most astonishing happening is the up and coming of a girl named Kirsten Levik, (born in 1953), who came from nowhere and made a charming debut in the high jump with a leap of 5'1½.

Seven British Columbia women were named to the National team which will meet Sweden and Norway in dual competition in Europe in late July. Irene Piotrowski, Valerie Parker and Stephanie Berto will be the sprinters. Anne Langdale will run the 400, Debbie Brill will high jump, Jay Dahlgran and Carol Martin will throw the javelin and discus. Also selected were Marleen Dowds of Manitoba and Jane Haist of Ontario in the shot and discus. From Ontario there is also Joan Fisher in the 400, Abilgail Hoffman and Roberta Picco in the 800 plus Jenny Meldrum and Marg Chatland in the 800m hurdles. Joan Hendry, the lone long jumper, is from Quebec.

British Columbia Open Championships from Doug Clement

Vancouver, BC, Canada, July 6:-Vicki Foltz of the Seattle Falcons flew north to the British Columbia Championships and returned south with two titles under her wings. On Friday evening she jumped to an early lead in the 800m and ran away from the pack to win in 2:11.8s. Noreen Liepens ran her career best in a struggle for the silver medal with Thelma Fynn. Her 2:13.3 improves her 2:13.6 established in the 1963 Pan American Games in Brazil. Observers were hoping Thelma Fynn would repeat her 2:11.4 which she achieved on July 1st at Toronto at the National Team Trials, but she finished 3rd in 2:14.6 with Joan Dyke fourth in 2:17.7s.

Saturday on the 1500m, Vicki was content to sit back and let Cheryl Spowage lead the pack through a leisurely 760 yards. However, after a 2:30 first half she opened up a sustained drive which carried her strongly through the tape in a new Canadian Open record of 4:33.9s. Thelma Fynn passed Spowage with 300 yards to complete and recorded 4:45.8s. Thelma's time and Cheryl Spowage's 4:50.2 broke the Canadian records for their age groups.

The sprint scene was relatively quiet with Stephanie Berto injured and with Piotrowski and Parker running only one dash. Valerie Parker easily powered by Arlene McLaughlin at the 50 yard mark to win the 100m in 11.8 to 12.2s. Irene Piotrowski controlled her 200m with 24.4 ahead of Anne Langdale's 25.3s.

The 400m was hotly contested and the crowd of 800 were stunned by an upset. Local experts had expected the Seattle Dynamic duo of Lindy Oliver and Delores Stoneback to be favored. Anne Langdale, fresh from her 56.0 runover 440 yards at the National Team trials, was thought to be ready for something even better. After an early lead, Langdale, in lane 6, was caught by a trio on the inside three lanes. Orange-clad Oliver and Stoneback were separated by Anne Covelle as they reached the stretch drive. Covelle, 5'3 and 110 pounds, drove away in the last 50 yards for a 57.0 ahead of Oliver's 57.3 and a fast-closing Karen Emerey McCune's 57.4. Stoneback was 57.8 and Langdale 57.9 in fourth and fifth spots.

Wendy Taylor edged Violet Tittler in the 80m hurdles with both recording 11.8s.

On Friday, Jay Dahlgren again broke the present Canadian record with a throw of 167'10 in the javelin. Carol Martin was second with 140'2, but the next day won the discus with 153'10 to defeat Helen Thayer who did 129'1. Kathy Langham won the shot with 40'7½.

Brenda Eisler equaled her Canadian record for under 18 years with her leap of 19'0¼ in the long jump while Debbie Brill won the high jump with only 4'11½.

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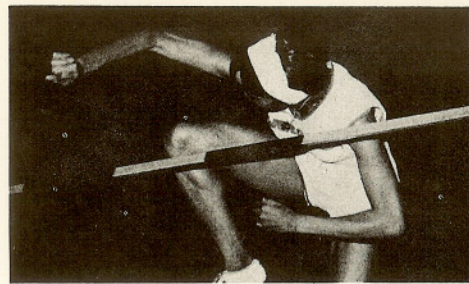
