# TENNESSEE NATIONAL CHAMPS

Tennessee State reigns again as National Champion after their 11 point win over Mayor Daley Youth Foundation at Dayton, Ohio, on July 5-6. The Tigerbelles scored an impressive 55 points with three first places, three seconds and one sixth. MDYF tallied 44 for runner-up spot. Thirty six teams scored points, plus four unattached athletes, indicating the rise in popularity of the sport and promising great things in the years to come.

Women's

Tigerbelle winners were Olympic champion Madeline Manning in a "dog-trot" 880 in 2:11.1, Eleanor Montgomery who set a new American record in the high jump at 5'11, and the medley relay team which also set a new American record at 1:42.4s. Iris Davis (100), Martha Watson (long jump) and the 440y relay team picked up the second places and Matiline Render picked up the other point with her sixth in the 100.

WIFW predicted the winners correctly in every event except the 200m hurdles and the javelin - for another new record.

100 Yard Dash:-The five trial heats saw the elimination of only Sharlene Johnson who supposedly set an American record for the Girl's division only a few days earlier at 10.5 - but this time, without the benefit of a sleeping starter, she was clocked in only 11.3 as she finished sixth in her heat. The first heat seemed overcrowded with good sprinters and the times proved it just that. (Four qualified from the heats.)

Girl's champion Willie Mae Nichols did it once again in the first semi and was disqualified for two false starts.

Scott had her best race of the year to nab runner-up over Stroy. One interesting point, only Scott of the first six finishers was not eligible to compete in the Girl's division!

880 Yard Run:-Only ten athletes confirmed their entry into the 880 yard run - so no heats, no semi-finals. The final was a desultry race so far as the winner, Madeline Manning, was concerned. Madeline was content to trot along saving her energies and abilities for the medley relay and ended up winning in 2:11.1 - nearly a second slower than the girl's 880 just three days earlier! Cheryl Toissaint, Nancy Shafer and Cis Scheafer engaged in a push-shove contest during the first 100 yards and it was a miracle someone didn't fall. Manning led at the quarter in 64.9 and in spite of the slow pace and the slow final time, she won easily over Nancy Shafer and the rest of the field.

1500 Meter Run:-Interest ran high for the 1500. On paper this appeared to be the most evenly contested event of the entire meet. Toss in Doris Brown, Francie Larrieu, defending champ Jane Hill, youngster Debbie Roth, add Vicki Foltz, Cheryl Bridges, Judy Oliver and Maria Stearns - and be prepared for a surprise such as Hill last year - and anything could happen. The two heats were practically routine to set up a good final with 12 athletes competing. In the final it didn't take Doris Brown long to establish herself in the lead although Francie Larrieu picked her up in a hurry and did her best to stay with the veteran. It was fairly close for the first two laps, but Brown poured it on during the third 440 and built up a lead which could not be overtaken. During the final lap the field spread out and for a short while in the drive for the tape it appeared that Foltz might catch Larrieu for the important second place, but as Larrieu stated later that although she was very, very tired and felt she had no strength and legs made of rubber, she kept saying to herself with every stride, "Europe, Europe, Europe, Europe" - and it paid off.

100 Meter Hurdles:-The field for the 100m hurdles included 47 competitors showing the growing interest in the hurdle events in the USA. Six heats were run with only the first two from each heat plus the four fastest thirds making it into the final. Interest was high in the renewal of the Rallins-Chi competition, but the handwriting was on the wall after the first two heats when Chi zipped to a 13.4 world-record-equalling first heat win and Mamie turned in a 14.2 victory in the second trial.

The semi-finals were run on a very sloppy track, puddles of water and piles of mud faced the runners at the start. The two heats were won by Chi (14.1) and Rallins (14.8) and saw the elimination of such highly thought of barrier jumpers as Janene Jaton, Edmonia Veals, Dianne Spangler and Judy Vernon.

Meanwhile, Jan Glotzer was running the best race of her life to nab a close third behind Rallins with both runners clocking 14.0.

The semi-finals were run before the rains came and resulted in good marks despite the fact that the clerk shoved the two seeded runners, Chi and Hawkins, into lane one at the last minute. In spite of this both athletes improved on their heat times with Chi setting a new meet record at 26.8 and Hawkins edging Mamie Rallins for a new American record at 27.1. Some poor seeding was evident when Payne (28.0) and Spangler (28.2) were eliminated in 5<sup>th</sup> and 6<sup>th</sup> places in heat two while Jaton was second (28.1) in the first heat and Martin qualified with 28.95.

Thus the 200m hurdles record books now show Chi holding the meet record and young Pat Hawkins, all 5'2 of her, holding the American citizens record - the first American record for the now very proud Fred Thompson and his Atoms!

440 Yard Relay (4x110):-Due to the rain and event switching, the 440 relay was run in sections and the places awarded on times. The teams were seeded very well and the real running came in the third section when the nation's top quartettes got together - Mayor Daley, Tennessee State, the Atoms, Texas Southern, the St. Louis Blues and Alcorn A&M. Disaster hit the Alcorn team when the baton was dropped on the second exchange - and there went a year's work! The first four teams were very close all the way with Mayor Daley winning by two strides and the other three in a bunch. Tennessee stuck in for second, the Atoms were third and Texas Southern was 4th.

The Atoms, boasting such stars as Reynolds, McMillan, Moore and Toussaint were never close and finished nearly seven seconds to the rear. This race was also run in two sections.

<u>High Jump</u>:-Expected to be one of the worst events of the entire competition, the high jump turned out to be one of the best in spite of a terrible takeoff area and approach area and a pit which took great courage to land in. Complete results were not available when time came to leave Dayton, but we hope to have everyone's mark for the next issue. Eleanor Montgomery moved a notch closer to the magic 6'0 mark with a new American record of 5'11 - and that was news. But the real news for the future was that 13 jumpers were still in the competition at 5'6 and that was the winning height just one year ago!









# NATIONALS - THE GOOD, THE BAD AND THE UGLY

Dayton, Ohio, is a beautiful city. More than half a million people live in Dayton. A good number of them worked on committees for the National Championships. And they really worked! Preparing for such a large competition is time consuming, frustrating and difficult.

Norm Saettel, the Meet Director, is one of the nicest, most sincere persons you will ever hope to meet. I am sure he would cut off his right arm to help anyone in need. I know he spent many a night missing his beauty sleep to properly prepare for this meet.

The Knights of Columbus is a fine organization. They contributed manpower to help make the meet a success - plus money, a fine barbecue dinner for coaches and officials and a great deal of items most athletes will never know about.

Regardless of the excellence of a National Championship, it is impossible to completely satisfy everyone all the time. These are some of the things I overheard, some of the things directly spoken to me, some of the things I thought of myself. At one point Norm Saettel referred to WTFW by saying "I am afraid of what it will say" - but the point to remember is that these are suggestions, complaints, ideas which those who made them hope will improve the next championship meet. And at the next meet, things will come up which will help make the 1971 meet better - and on and on ad infinatum.

My father came from Ohio. Now I know why! Rain in July! One suggestion heard many times was 1) hold the meet where weather is not a problem in July, or 2) if held in possible rain country insist the meet be scheduled for an all-weather track. Of course Dayton, the Knights of Columbus and Norm Saettel can't be blamed for the rain - but.....

Ten lanes is too much! Ten lanes might be all right if the width was 42", but even then ten lanes complicates everything. This narrowness of the lanes complicated things even more when the wide hurdles were placed around the turn - several hurdlers complained or comented after their heat in the 200mH that they nearly soared over the wrong hurdle.

A good athlete who works with a good coach points for the Nationals throughout the entire year. Therefore it must be MANDATORY to insure even and fair competition at the Nationals to insure the best athlete will win. A poor starter is cause for sweat to start pouring from both coach and athlete. An excellent, yes a PERFECT starter is a definite requisite. The starters at the 1969 championships were not in that class. They were inconsistent, they fired the gun too quickly, they allowed athletes to get away with rolling starts - as much as two complete steps. Their poor starting determined several national titles and national records. This is wrong. The athletes should determine who is best - not who is the best guesser. Several coaches clocked the starters from the "s" of their command "set" to the time the gun fired - and in ALL races except one (the first semi-final of the girls 100) the starters never held longer than 0.7 and were as low as 0.3 on many occasions. There is no time required for the starter to hold the runners in the set position, but the rule states the gun can not be fired until all competitors are "still" or motionless. This is impossible in 0.3 second. Try it and SPP.

The Bulova photo timer was here but was not used for the girls events - and where would the photo timer be needed more than in the 50y dash? The timer was also not used, except briefly, in the women's events - but this was due to the rain. This piece of equipment must be a requisite for holding the meet. Not a polaroid camera - a Bulova phototimer!

In 1963 when the nationals were held in Dayton, the long jump pit was not legal. It was still not legal in 1969 although it came closer. The takeoff board MUST be 7.874mm wide (roughly 8 inches) - this one was 18. Part of the board was painted black the morning of the competition - but the action still left an illegal board. The composition of the runway was not good - hard asphalt - but legal.

The wind gauge used was not legal. Fortunately the wind was never above the amount allowed during the running of the entire meet, the highest reading being 4.1mph - but the type of gauge used could not measure the wind accurately - we will never know if those who ran with a 0.0 wind reading were actually running into a wind or not.

The starting blocks were something from the 1938 era. In this meet, the best should be provided for the athletes. The ones here were not the best.

For the first day's relay trials, no international passing zones were marked. The announcer informed the athletes they could "step off" the zone - but no one told the inspectors and they made the girls get back in the marked passing zone. Lap races, the 200m hurdles and 220 sprint should start on the turn. Originally the 200mH and the 220 were set to go from center of the track, but this was changed in time. The lap races, however, were started in the wrong place - and this could have an effect on some athlete who has trained and practiced correctly for this meet.

I hate to mention the 200m hurdles. Scheduled to start at 9:00 o'clock Saturday morning, it was not until 11:08 that the first heat got under way - and then the hurdles were admitedly not exactly correct.

The high jump area was definitely not National Championship calibre. (See picture.) These faclities should be perfect for this competition. The shot and discus rings left much to be desired and in fact the discus ring was re-poured the morning of the competition which necessitated a change in schedule.

Something must be done about the qualifying marks for entrance into the meet. Take, for example, the girls 440 yard dash. Qualifying standard was 60 seconds. 30 or 31 girls actually competed in the trials and 9 of them, or approximately one third of the entries, had EXACTLY 60 seconds as their qualifying mark. That's quite a coincidence! Some pickayunish coaches tried to keep athletes from competing because their qualifying marks were not set in AAU sanctioned meets, but the requirements as set forth by National Chairman Nell Jackson do not specify marks must be made under those conditions.

I must voice another complaint - the Dayton newspapers and their coverage of the moet. For example, two thirds of the entire front page of the sports section covered the men's events which were "exhibition". On page three, eight inches of space covered the women's meet for that day in which one world mark was bettered, one world mark was equalled and several American and meet marks were threatened. And only winning marks were given - all times and distances should always be listed as any track nut knows.

The "ugly" concerns some very petty things which go on among the coaches. "Committees" meet at the beck and call of individuals - if they yell loud enough. Kangaroo court type verdicts are passed - again the loud voices seem to be the "governing body". Anyone speaking soto voce might as well stay home. I wonder just what it is these people want? It certainly isn't perfection in the sport.

#### NATIONALS KALEIDOSCOPE

Cheryl Toussaint is still only 16 - not 17 as previously stated....Jackie Preistly, 14, is an outstanding swimmer and is now making her mark in track....Names in the Nationals which intrigued me included: Queen Ester King, Coleen Wigle, Given Ransom, Lulu Bailey, Bonita Belches, (as a point of interest, the order of throwing in the girl's discus was Born-Belches-Moore), Primrose Abilla, and of course my friend Barbara Pickel...San Gabriel Valley Pacers boast the Ferguson sisters - Mabel, the younger and bigger, and (note the correct spelling) WILLIOMAE, the older and smaller....

In the girls short sprints (50 & 100) and 50y hurdles trials, only 9 of the 19 top seeded runners won their heat. 10 did not win as predicted, some finishing as far back as 5th.....Diane Waters, Frederick TFC high jumper, competed with her right lower leg heavily taped ..... Stenella Mallard, Colorado Pacers, performed extremely well after suffering an injury at the National Pentathlon championships just a week earlier ..... It was a tough meet for the defending champions: Hazel Hughes in the girl's 220, Jenny Otto in the hurdles, Jane Hill in the 1500, Jarvis Scott in the 440, Maren Seidler in the shot and Barbara Freidrich in the javelin. And Crown Cities for the team title!....Calvin Brown did a nice job with the announcing, sometimes under adverse conditions. .... Another frustrating item at the Nationals was the lack of a training field properly prepared and equipped. This should be high priority in the hosts plans for the meet ..... The Cincinatti TV program which hosted Nell Jackson, Madeline Manning, Mamie Rallins, Jan Glotzer and Tara Sheldon should receive a black mark for their handling of these outstanding performers. The format was very bad to begin with and the clown who was the master of ceremonies hadn't the slightest idea of what track and field was let alone who our Olympic and National champions were .....

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### US INTERNATIONAL TEAMS

The aim of nearly every athlete is to be selected on an International team and represent her country in competition against the rest of the world. This year is a banner year for US international competition. A warm-up meet in Hawaii on July 11, the US versus the British Commonwealth (without any British) and the Soviet Union in Los Angeles on July 19-20, the Western Hemisphere vs Europe in Stuttgart on July 30-31, USA versus West Germany in Augsburg on August 5-6, the USA versus Great Britain in London on August 12-13 and the Pacific Conference Games in Tokyo, Japan, on September 27-28.

And if Maren Seidler was still competing for the Shore AC would the choices have been the same? 4-Deanne Kurth, a very nice p rson and not too bad in the hurdles - what were her qualifications? She was only fifth in both hurdles, (one of which is not an international event) and is not speedy enough to double in the sprints. How can a fifth placer be selected above several third plac finishers and an even larger number of fourth placers who will be left home?

### SAN JOSE NATIONAL 12/13 CHAMPIONSHIP

San Jose, California, June 21:-The Second Annual San Jose Cindergals National Invitational T&F Meet, which determines the 12/13 championship for the USA, was a complete success. Twenty two teams competed in the day-long competition which was held on the all-weather track at De Anza College in the small town of Cupertino. Weather was ideal with only some early morning heats being wind-aided and a high temperature for the day of 74°.

The Lakewood Spartans, with 11 girls entered, made a shambles of the scoring winning the title with 100 points to runn-er up Ravenswood Juliettes' 44. 72 of the Lakewood points were scored in field events.

The outstanding performers were: Sandy Goldsberry (Lakewood) who set a new National record winning the high jump at 5'3%, won the 50y hurdles in 7.2 and sped a leg on the second place 440y relay team; Carol Burkland (Hutchinson TC) who was second in the hurdles at 7.5 and won the 50 in 6.3 and the 220 in 25.7; Nancy Irhan (Phoenix TC), winner of the 880 yard



run in 2:20.6 and the exhibition one mile run in 5:19.0; and 12 year Linda Linda Ganzini (Oregon) who leaped 5'1 in the high jump for a 12 year old record; Debbie Langervain and Debbie Riveria, both of the Lakewood team, who dominated the weights - Langervain was first in the discus (96'3) and shot (38'71/2) and second in the baseball throw (265'10) while Rodriguez was the winner in the baseball throw (267'5) and second in the discus (85'11%) and shot (38'214).

In the exhibition 10/11 division, Joyce Wolak (Ontario-Montclair Cheetahs), set a new National record while winning the 440 in 63.0. Wolak was forced into setting the record by Bev-

### GLOTZER WINS PENTATHLON TITLE

Los Alamos, New Mexico, June 28:-The good people of Los Alamos did it again. They staged the finest pentathlon championships this nation has ever had with 13 entries, no big favorite as has been the case the past eight years - close competition and 10 athletes over the 4000 mark with the 11th only 8 points shy.

Jan Glotzer scored a mild upset winning over Olympian Cathy Hamblin - but Dianne Spangler scored a huge upset by doing the same thing and finishing second as Hamblin had to be content with third. Glotzer's winning score was 4544 and was made possible with a 14.1 flight of hurdles, a shot put mark of 31'0%, 5'3% in the high jump, 18'10% in the long jump and 24.9 for the 200 meter dash. Young Stanella Mallard showed tremendous potential but was injured while clearing 5'5 in the high jump and her last two events were substandard. Although there is much work to be done on this event in the USA, a faint glimmer of greatness was seen in Los Alamos. Now the US must provide international competition and pentathlon matches for the US pentathlon team.

## WORLD RECORDS TO ANTENEN, PIGNI, CHIZHOVA & FRANCE

Meta Antenen of Switzerland, pentathlon, Paoli Pigni of Italy, 1500m, and the French 4x400m relay team all claimed world records in the past few weeks. Antenen's mark of 5046 points bettered Heide Rosendahl's old record by 23 points. The 20 year old Antenen had event marks of 13.5 in the 100m hurdles, 37'0 for the shot, 5'7% high jump, 21'0 in the long jump and 24.8 for the 200 meters.

Paola Pigni, the latest Italian sensation, defeated world record holder Maria Gommers (Holland) in a match 1500 at Milan and both athletes proceeded to better Gommer's accepted mark of 4:15.2s. Gommers led most of the way, but on the final lap, Paola pulled up and ran even with the Dutch girl and then in the final straight uncorked a devastating sprint which carried her to victory and the record in 4:12.4s. Gommers was timed in 4:15.0s.

Meanwhile in Paris, the French 4x400m relay team took a shot at England's pending world mark of 3:37.6 and came thru with a new world best of 3:34.2, 3.4 seconds better than the British performance. Splits for the athletes were: Michele Mombet (56.0), Elaine Jacq (53.7), Nicole Duclos (52.0!) and Olympic 400m champion Colette Besson (52.5).

FLASH+++In a meet held at Chorzow, Poland, on July 13, Nadyezhda Chizhova of the Soviet Union set a new world mark in the shot put with a mighty heave of 65'll. She held the old mark at 64'8%. In the same meet, Karin Balzer, East Germany, ran the 100m hurdles in a wind-aided 13.2 and Rita Schmidt, also of East Germany, high jumped 5'11%.
