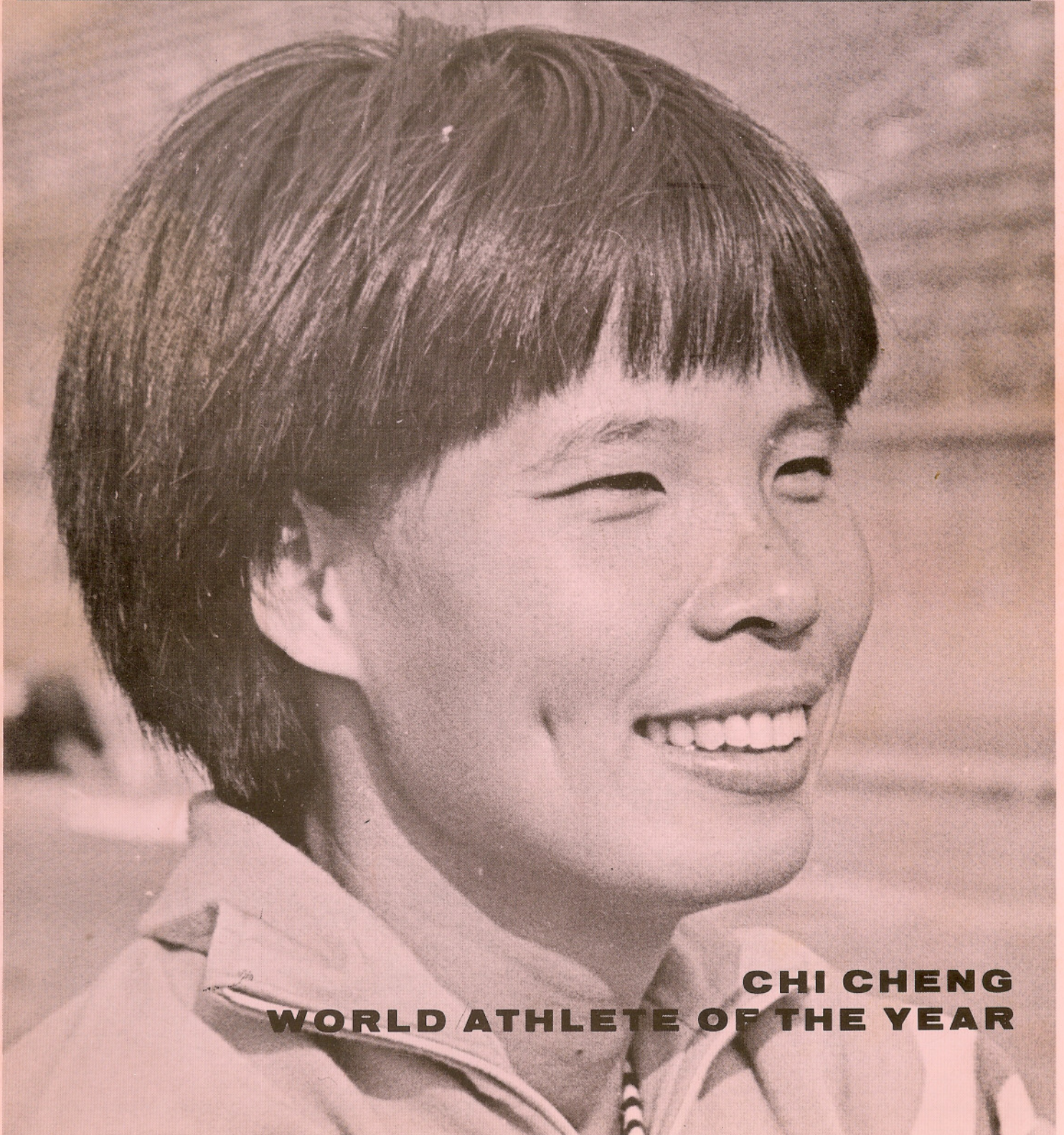

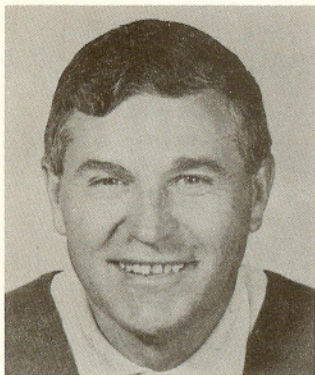

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## WORLD REPORT ADDENDA from Elio Trifari

### 100y/100m

Figuring a differential of 0.9 between 100y and 100m, Chi Cheng with her two 10.3 (Pomona 23/5 and Dublin 29/7) leads the world; the latter time can be submitted to the IAAF for ratification as tying the world record...Mildrette Netter ranks 9th with her 10.5y clocking at Itta Bena on 3/5, (her best metric time is a mere 11.7)....Raelene Boyle ran a 10.5 'at Brisbane on 9/11 and ranks 16th....Marion Hoffman was 2nd to Boyle in 10.7....In the 11.5 group I shall also include Mattilene Render (10.6y coming second at Quantico on 3/5), Gladys Jermison (10.6y at Yonkers on 7/6, Canadian Stephanie Berto (10.6y in heat at Victoria 21/6), Janet Brown (10.6y at heat in Dayton championships), Willie Mae Nichols (10.6 on the same occasion) and Vardo Kutateladse, USSR, whose 11.5m at Kosice (5/9) was, after all, legal....Note also that Boyle ran 11.1w ahead of Kilborn 11.2w at Melbourne (1/11).

### 200m/220y

Liz Sissons of Great Britain ranks 52nd in her country in the 400m with a 58.2 - but her statistical work ranks her as one of the best - she reports a clocking of 23.5 by Dorothy Hyman, set at Castleford on 28/6, which was given as wind-aided and made on a downhill course, is given an "ok" which reinstates Hyman on the top-20 list....Raelene Boyle had an excellent 23.2y made in Brisbane, 9/11, ahead of Hoffman at 23.7y.

### 400m/440y

Two corrections from Australia...Cheryl Peasley ran only 53.8 at Sydney (15/2) and not 53.4, (she was left out of the last World Report in WTFW for which I am very sorry), while Joyce Bennett must only be happy with a 55.4 instead of a mysterious 53.9.

### 800m/880y

The only change is a 2:03.7 by Gertrud Schmidt while Gunhil Hoffmeister did 2:05.8 in the same race, a personal best, at Berlin (11/9)....the event was won by Barbara Wieck.

### 1500m

Emilia Privrelova ran 4:19.0 in her heat at the European Championships which must be added to the top list....Starting from next March, call Paola Pigni Mrs. Bruno Cacchi - she will marry her coach. She will continue her career and hopes to get back the world record. (How many athletes are married to their coach?)

### 100mH/200mH

Pam Kilborn goes to 2nd place in the 100mH with her 13.2 at Brisbane (9/11). She also has a windy 12.8! at Melbourne...At 200mH the same Kilborn set a new world mark with 26.0 (not 25.5 as announced by some agencies) at Brisbane (9/11)...Diane Pease, Australia, enters the lists with a 27.6 at Sydney on 8/11....Raelene Boyle, 1st try ever, 26.4!

### Long Jump

The only legal jump of the Chorzow meet was Hauer with a leap of 6.43/21'1¼; Warzocha had a wind-aided mark of 6.32/20'8¾ and a legal 6.29/20'7¾. So insert Warzocha and USSR Morvanyuk (6.28/20'7¾ at Leninakan on 18/7) to complete the top 20.

### High Jump

The girl who high jumped 1.67/5'5¾ with Chepketer at the Kenyan Championships was in fact Nyankoru, not Nyagothi.

### Shot Put

Some mix-up with Adam....she was third behind Gummell and Lange at Halle (11/10) with 16.16/53'0¼, then improved the day after in Berlin, winning with 16.35/53'7¾.

### Discus Throw

Best 1969 performance of Karin Illgen, GDR, was 61.40/201'5 at Halle on 11/10.

### Pentathlon

Miroslava Sarna improved the Polish record held by Kirzsenstein-Szewinska with 4733 points at Ostrowiec (4-5/10)...Valentina Tikhomirova, USSR, added three points to her best at the national all-around championships held in Sochi, (1-2/11), with 4838 points. Second was Maria Sizyakova, 4749, third Tatyana Kondrashova with 4663 (13.9 hs), fourth Nyole Kvietkauskaitė, 4660, and fifth the immortal Galina Bystrova, 34, with 4608 points.

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# ATHLETES OF THE YEAR

## WORLD ATHLETE OF THE YEAR - CHI CHENG



CHI CHENG

The first track athlete to ever win the "World Athlete of the Year" balloting is Chi Cheng from the Republic of China. Previous winners were discus thrower Liesel Westermann from West Germany in 1967 and shot putter Margitta Gummel of East Germany last year. The voting for the 1969 title was extremely close - only 5 points separated the winner from the third place finisher. Because of the closeness of the voting and the fact that I am the coach of Chi Cheng, the tallying of the votes was done with extreme care and caution and all results certified by a C.P.A. Voting was done by 38 WFW correspondents from 23 different nations. Each section of the world had its favorite for 1969 and the voting was in strange patterns. Those correspondents who had never seen Chi Cheng perform paid her little heed - she hardly scored at all, for example, from the Eastern European voters. On the other hand, those in Western Europe who watched her perfect record during the summer, were fantastically impressed and the votes rolled in. The voting was extremely close - 9 athletes received at least one vote for first place and the top three athletes were practically tied in first place votes. The list of correspondents and their nationalities are printed elsewhere in this issue. Note that the number of first place votes follows each athlete's name in parenthesis. Scoring was done with 5 points for a first place vote, 3 points for second and 1 for third.

## EASTERN EUROPE - NADYEZHDA CHIZHOVA

The toughest section of the world - Eastern Europe. Fantastic performers and most difficult to select the top three when you are voting. Nadyezhda Chizhova, USSR, with her excellent new world record in the shot was the winner over 31 year old Karin Balzer, East Germany's undefeated hurdler. Surprising Jaroslava Jehlickova, the 1500 meter record holder was third. Interesting to note that last years "World Athlete of the Year", East Germany's Margitta Gummel, failed to receive a single vote for first this year in her section of the world, and not a single vote at all as "World Athlete of the Year".

## WESTERN EUROPE - LIESL PROKOP

A real battle for the Western European title. Here again each section of the world, and especially each of the different nations of Europe, had their particular favorites. It was a three-way fight with Austria's Liesl Prokop the winner with 96 points. Close behind was Liesel Westermann with 91 points and France's Nicole Duclos with 85 points. It is interesting to note that while Prokop won by only 5 points, she outscored Westermann in first place votes 12-8 - and Duclos had 10 first place votes way down in third place. Last year's Western Europe winner, Ingrid Becker, did not get a single vote in 1969.

## OCEANIA - PAM KILBORN

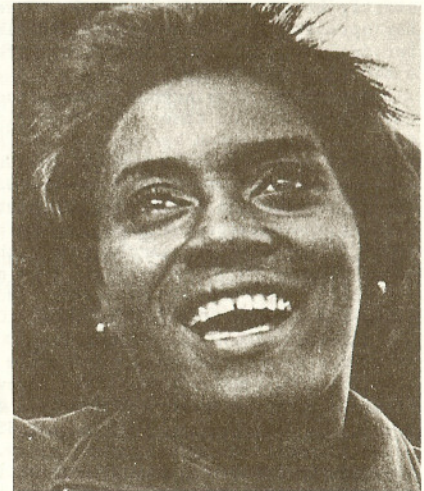

## WHAT A YEAR BY CHI CHENG!

Chi Cheng, the vastly under-rated sprinter-hurdler from the Republic of China, concluded 1969 with an almost perfect record. In 67 competitions during the year she was defeated only once! If indoor results are included, it becomes 70 out of 71! Her only defeat came in the Southern Pacific AAU Championships over 100 yards when Barbara Ferrell, the Olympic silver medalist, defeated Chi with both runners timed in 10.4 - just one-tenth shy of the world record. Of the five times that the pair met, Chi won on four occasions. She won 23 of 24 races over 100y/100m, all 13 of her 200/220 starts and 26 hurdle races without a loss! This is an unbelievable record for a sprinter-hurdler.

She equalled the long-standing world record of 10.3 for 100 yards and the first time she attempted the 200m hurdles she did 26.2 to better the previous best on record - by Roza Babich of the USSR - by nine-tenths of a second!

Her best time of 13.3 for the 100m hurdles is four-tenths off Karin Balzer's pending world record, but many feel Chi would have defeated Balzer had they met. The ideal conditions of a Tartan track, aiding wind and a co-operating starter never were afforded Chi. However, she annihilated her opposition. Poland's two 13.3 girls, Tereza Nowak and Tereza Sukniewicz, were beaten by three and five-tenths of a second respectively.

The Mexico City bronze medal winner concentrates on winning rather than on time. Her four victories out of five over Ferrell stamped her as the best sprinter in the United States. In Europe, she handled the Cuban Miguelina Cobian, who has run 11.3 and 23.1, like she was a novice rather than one of the world's best. Over 100 meters she defeated Cobian by three-tenths of a second and by five-tenths over the 200. Both the Polish hurdlers felt there was no one who could compare to Balzer - until they met Chi.

During 1969 she set new Asian records (there are 33 Asian nations) at 100y, 200m, 400m, 100 and 200m hurdles. She already held Asian records for 100m, long jump and pentathlon. As for Chinese records, she now holds them all except for 800, 1500 and the three throwing events! In her first-ever try at 400m, she ran 54.6 which is the fastest ever by an Asian woman, (not taking Sin Kim Dan into account).

Her career has been one of injury. In 1965 she pulled a muscle in April and then re-pulled it in June. The following June, while leading Ferrell at the 80 yard mark by two yards, she pulled still another muscle. Later that year in Bangkok, she injured a knee which necessitated surgery. In the last Olympic year, a combination of infected tonsils (another operation) and an allergy to grass caused her to lose 25 pounds and the inability to sleep. This past June, while lunging for the finish string in defeating Ferrell once again, she fell to the track causing a separation of her right shoulder which took her off the track for three weeks.

It is hoped that at some time in 1970 she will face Balzer and/or Kilborn in the 100 hurdles. There seems little doubt that there is no sprinter in the world who can defeat her and there is strong reason to believe there is not a hurdler who can beat her either!

Chi Cheng was born in Hein-chu, Taiwan, on March 15, 1944. She is 5'7½ and weighs 135 pounds. She is a student of physical education at California Polytechnic College in Pomona (with a 3.54 grade point average). Her annual progression:

With the same velocity, a projectile (or a long jumper) will travel twice as far at 45° than it will at 15°.

The muscles of a long jumper must be of stronger fibre than those of a sprinter or any other athlete.

## LETTER FROM PETE POZZOLI

"On going through all your national material, I find strange things which are not allowed to occur in Europe in similar area championships. For instance Mary Norrells won the Gulf area championships 440y and also the Southwestern area championships 440y. How can she belong to two areas we cannot understand over here.

Likewise Carmen Smith competed in the Southeastern area championships and again in the Metropolitan area championships. How is it possible to compete in two area championships in the same year?

Molly Hence competed in Southwestern area championships, in Southeastern area championships, in Gulf area championships, and who knows where else!

In Europe, area championships are open only to athletes who are members of clubs of that particular area. I assumed your rules were like those in all other countries. If any athlete is free to go anywhere and take part in any area championship meet the whole purpose of area titles seems completely defeated. The National Championships is the place where all the Area champions and top liners can meet to thrash out the question of national supremacy. This is how things are organized in all European countries.

I also find it remarkable how many girls are apparently "unattached". In Europe, an athlete can compete for one season as 'unattached'. Thereafter she MUST join a club. The rules about leaving a club are stingent - one can't just hop from club to club at will, except of course when one moves residence to another location. Clubs (and schools) are the basis of the sport. 'Unattached' athletes are in fact using the facilities provided by the clubs and schools who own the grounds without any return contributing anything to the clubs as competitors. That is why they have one year to find themselves a club - if not, then fairly enough, they're in effect told to go and compete on your own and organize your own races if you don't want to belong to any club or official group of athletes.

It was staggering to find athletes of the calibre of Lynn Graham, Nancy Norberg, Kathy Hamblin and others not members of any club. Something seems wrong with your organization when this is possible.

It is a FACT that Sin Kim Dan was medically examined by a team of Japanese doctors in Tokyo before the 1964 Games and pronounced 100% female. This is not only vouched for by the Japanese, but such authorities as Kolatchoff, one of Asia's top track experts, and others. Russian women who competed with her several years in Moscow are also convinced she was female."

# 1969 WORLD RANKINGS by JAN POPPER & LUIGI MENGONI

This is the fourteenth year World Rankings have been made for women - and always Jan Popper of Czechoslovakia has been the man in charge. This year, as last, he has been assisted by Luigi Mengoni of Italy, and the two of them have spent much time and effort in working out the selections. This is the third consecutive year that WOMEN'S TRACK & FIELD WORLD has had the privilege of announcing these world rankings. The ranking is not an idealized contest but was decided by the authors only on the achievements of the past season, the three major criteria being: 1-Major honors won and important placings in major meets, 2-Win-loss record, and 3-Sequence of marks, i.e. the quality and quantity of best performances for each athlete.

Some explanations for the Ranking: (A) Athletes position in previous years' rankings; (B) best marks of the season with a short summary of placings in major meets; (C) remarks on the win-loss record and other comments.

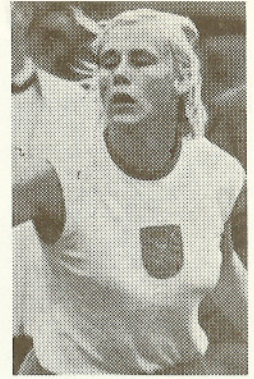

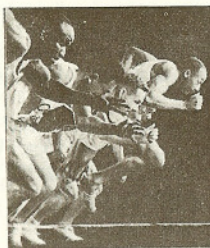

Editors Note:-The ordinary individual does not realize the amount of work required to prepare the annual World Ranking. The compilers do not sit down and immediately come up with rankings. They work painstakingly for hour after hour, pouring over statistics and results until they feel they have come up with the correct order. Elsewhere in the magazine this month I have remarked about the lack of a statistician for the USA for 1969 - and I take this opportunity of warning the new National statistician, Eli Gagich, that much work is required. When I visited the home of Luigi Mengoni in Italy last summer, for example, I saw the files he keeps - unbelievable the information he has on every athlete in the world, (he maintains a listing of the top 100 in each event). The time required to keep the records up to date is three hours per day! This is what he estimates. (Of course his wife estimates closer to six hours per day, but that's the way things are!) Popper has available all the wire services and therefore can quickly secure the information needed. Between the two of them, we have the best in the world.

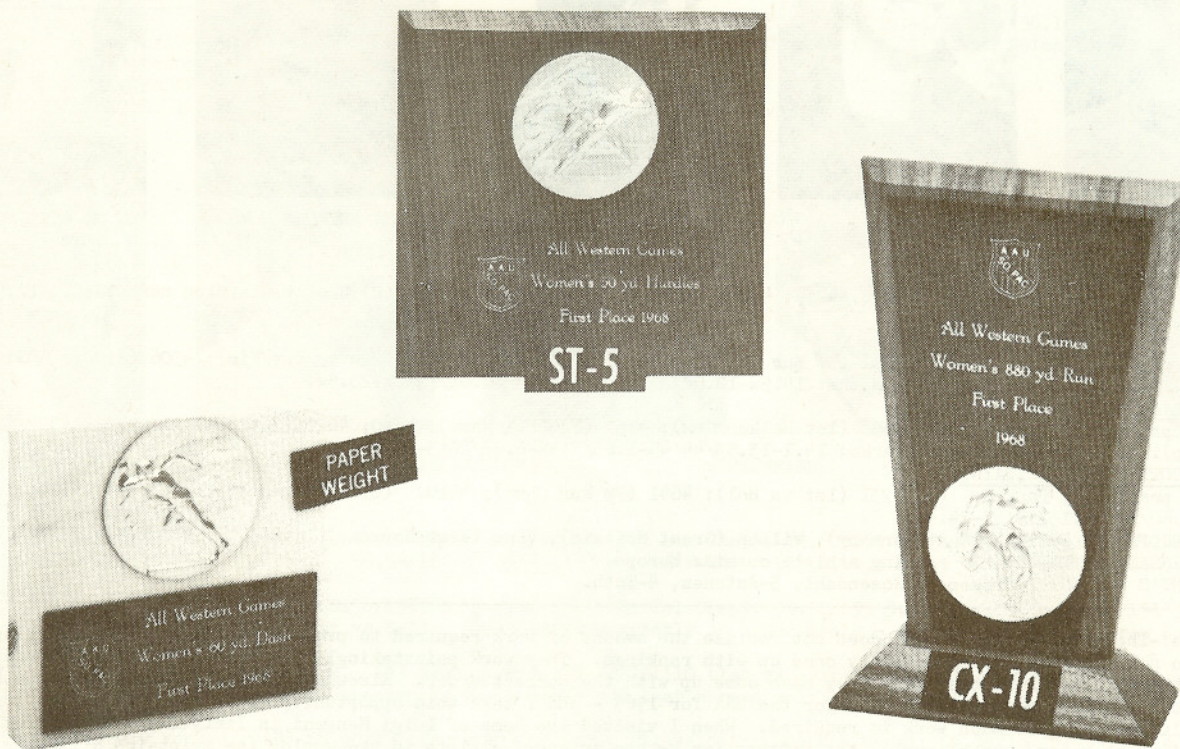

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Who was the Steadiest Star of the Sixties? This may come as a great surprise to some, but it's Pam Kilborn, the great Aussie hurdling champion. How do we arrive at this conclusion? The choice is made by studying the World Rankings from 1960 through 1969. As you know, the World Ranking is a sort of evaluation where big wins, steady form and results of direct clashes with other top performers counts more than positions in World Lists - which could result from only a single performance.

We have given 10 points every time an athlete was ranked Number One in the world for each year, 9 points if second, 8 if third and so on. As a result of this tabulation, Pam Kilborn scored more points in a single event during 1960-1969 than any other athlete of the decade.

Making Kilborn's achievement even more remarkable is the fact that several of her closest rivals on the final score sheet were individuals discussed many times in relation to their eligibility to compete as women, (Balas, Tamara and Irina Press and Sin Kim Dan). But as in other fields, WTFW respects the facts; and one of them is that all these athletes have competed officially during the first half of this ending decade - and any historical attempt to look back could not be made without respecting that. It is up to our readers to make their own decisions and observations.

Pam Kilborn was ranked for the first time back in 1961 when she was picked fourth in the world. In all the following years she never was again as low: she was first in 1963, 1966 and 1967, second in 1962, 1965 (behind Irina Press) and 1968, and third in 1964 and - now on the new 100m distance - in 1969. On the basis of 10-9-8 etc., points system this adds up to 80 points - ten more than Jolanda Balas, the runner-up in this survey.

The Rumanian high jumper, an unbeaten stalwart between 1960 and 1966 when she gave up the sport due to a series of leg injuries, scored the most wins during the years of ranking with seven first place years. Tamara and Irina Press follow with six in the shot put and pentathlon respectively. Kilborn's record of being ranked in nine years out of the ten of this decade was matched by Renate Garisch-Boy in the shot while Karin Balzer (hurdles), Taisia Chenchik (high jump), Galina Zybyna (shot), Margit Gummel (shot), Mary Rand (long jump), Jolan Kleiber (discus) and Yelena Gorchakova (javelin) have all been ranked eight times in the sixties.

- Regional Championships to be scheduled no less than one week before the entry deadline established by the Indoor National Meet Director. Regional meet results must be post marked on or before the National Meet deadline filing date by the Regional Meet Director and/or the Regional Chairman.

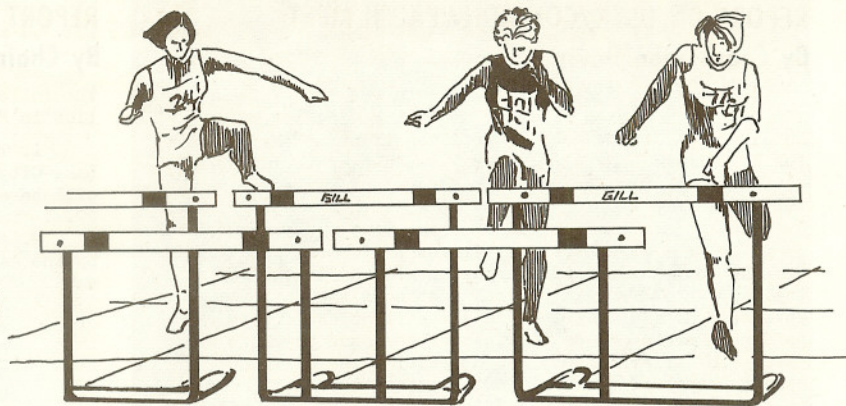
## FLASH - HERE'S W.G. BEST CLUB

## REPORT ON USSR/COMMONWEALTH MEET

### By Coach John Davis

It is most gratifying to report to you in my summary that the USA girls scored their first victory in history over the Russians and in the same competition triumphed easily over the British Commonwealth. The Russian competition began some 11 years ago and after an absence of three years was renewed in Los Angeles on July 19/20 with a 60-57 triumph over the Russians and a win over the British Commonwealth.

It is true that every top flight performer was available for the competition and everyone performed to the maximum of their potential and in several instances the maximum was even exceeded. The first day's competition ended with the USA holding a narrow 38-36 margin over the once powerful Russians. In the second day of competition the US forces received a pair of terrific performances to protect a one point margin, 65-64, as the final event, the 1600 meter relay came up. Willye White, an old pro and co-captain of the group, won the long jump to ignite a spark of hope and Pam Greene, a rookie sprinter to international competition, finished a solid second in the 200 meters to give the United States a one-two punch after the Russians had gone one-two in the shot put.

The 1600 meter relay, possessing the strongest foursome in US history to date composed of Kathy Hammond, who won the open 400 meters; Jarvis Scott, 6th place finisher in the 1968 Olympic 400 meters; Esther Stroy, who had not competed in any other races in Los Angeles, and anchored by Olympic 800 meter gold medalist Madeline Manning responded with a world record time of 3:33.4. The relays were scored 5 and 3 so this brought a 60-57 victory while if the relay team had lost, the meet would have gone to the Russians 69-68.

This victory was not accomplished without some trying moments to the team leaders and the athletes as well. With the meet in the USA several performers were absent for various legitimate reasons. We really only had Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday for formal workouts prior to Friday night's initial competition. I had the opportunity to work with the team in 1962 and again in 1966 but I must compliment the '69 aggregation as the most cooperative under trying conditions as excellent personnel delivered winning performances.

I cannot complete this report without covering some of the obstacles and handicaps which constantly seem to besiege all areas of Women's Track and Field. This year was no exception and perhaps reached an all-time high. We don't mind the men and our guests from Russia and the British Commonwealth being recognized and introduced at the banquet, but we feel the American girls who supplied the first-ever victory should be introduced. After the banquet was over those in charge suddenly remembered, (when informed by the National Chairman), that they had not introduced the American girls and team leaders nor had the American girls received the awards (plates) which were presented to all athletes. Of course, an apology was forthcoming after 75% of those who attended had left the banquet hall. It might even have been proper to introduce the girls in true female fashion before the men. In the past the women's team leaders have had some difficulty in securing equipment normally allotted by New York to the group leaders....this year was no exception. Regular T-shirts, hats and sweats were conspicuously "not available" for the men leaders. We were lucky to get a coat, shirt, tie and pants....I realize that these meets are rather hastily put together and that some oversights are bound to occur, but having had this same thing happen for the third time as a team leader means that although the women are contributing their part, proper recognition to the girls and their leaders still seems to be lacking.

I want to say in closing that my associate Ron Sorkness was a very valuable team leader and the week spent working together with him will be remembered for a life time. Other team leaders Rebecca Griffin and Veirian Bruce gave us a group that performed with a minimum of problems and harmony prevailed between athletes and leaders in all areas. Another unofficial member of our staff must be complimented. She is Juner Bellew who worked like a Trojan in the area of uniforms for both men and women.

The 1969 Los Angeles meet will go down in history as an harmonious and successful performance for our American Track Girls who performed in excess of their maximum potential but were blemished and plagued by lack of recognition from official sources by those people who only live and breathe with Men's Track and Field.

## REPORT ON NATIONAL CONVENTION

### By Chairman Nell Jackson

The following items were approved at the National AAU Convention in Miami, Florida, in December:

1. The Indoor Nationals have been switched from Salt Lake City, Utah, to Madison Square Garden, New York City, and will be a one day affair including men and women on February 27.

2. An addendum to the rule book will be published soon by the AAU office and will include the following rule changes:

A. The basketball throw has been deleted from the indoor championships.

B. The 80 yard hurdles was added to the Girl's outdoor championships. The 50 yard dash and the 50 yd hurdles were deleted from the Girl's program.

C. An athlete may now compete in a maximum of four events per meet. However, no more than two of the events may be 400 meters or longer including a relay leg.

D. The following events were added to the list of approved events for outdoor sanctioned track meets for female athletes age 14 and over: 60m dash, 60m hurdles, 80y hurdles, 3000m run, 3200m relay (4x800m), two mile relay (4x880y).

E. The following changes were made in the age group events: 9/Under Division (Outdoor), delete 75y dash and 220y relay and add 220y dash and 660y run; (Indoor), add 50y dash, 220y dash, 440y run, 440y relay, running long jump and running high jump. 10/11 Division, add 6# shot put; (Indoor) add 50y dash, 220y dash, 440y dash, 660y run, 880y run, 440y relay, 880y medley relay, long jump and high jump. 12/13 Division (Outdoor), add one mile run, (Indoor) add 50y dash, 220y dash, 440y dash, 880y run, mile run, 880y medley relay, high jump, long jump & 6# shot.

F. Cross country events for age group girls may be conducted up to and including the following distances: 6/9 Division, one mile; 10/11 Division, 1 1/4 miles; 12/13 Division, 1 1/2 miles.

3. The Committee approved the following international meets for 1970:

A. Dual meet with West Germany, July 15-16;

B. Dual meet with USSR, July 23-24;

C. Dual meet with Rumania, August 5-6;

D. Selected athletes, approximately 8, will have an extended tour in Europe until September 3;

E. Invitational meet at Paris, France, July 8-9;

F. Invitational Meet - Southern Games, Port-of-Spain, Trinidad, February 11-24.

4. Championships awarded for 1970:

A. Senior Championships:

1-Outdoor Nationals, Los Angeles, California, June 30-July 4;

2-Cross Country, St. Louis, Missouri, November;

3-Pentathlon, South Lake Tahoe, California, July 11-12 (Tentative);

4-Triathlon, South Lake Tahoe, California, July 11-12.

B. Junior Championships:

1-Indoor Nationals, Pacific Association;

2-Cross Country, Las Vegas, Nevada, November;

3-Pentathlon, Ozark Association, tentative date June 20.

5. Championships awarded for 1971:

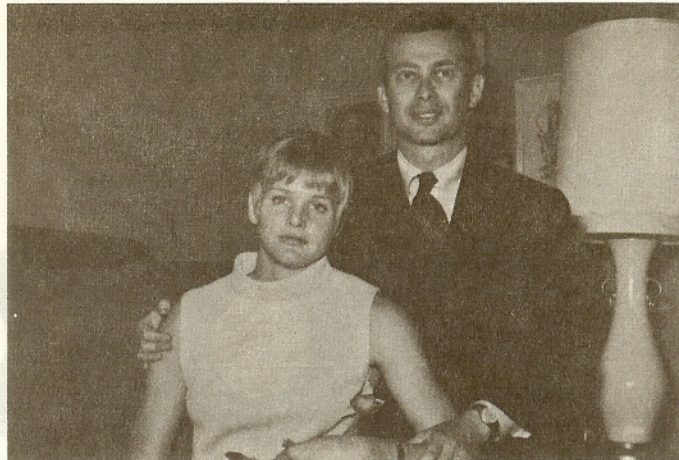
A. Senior pentathlon, Los Alamos, New Mexico

6. A committee was appointed to investigate the interest in race walking for girls.

7. Eli Gagich was appointed statistician for women's track and field. All coaches and meet directors are encouraged to send a copy of their meet results to Eli as soon as possible in order for him to compile the statistics for the indoor nationals. 8. Madeline Manning and Mamie Rallins were nominated for the Sullivan award.

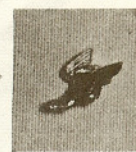

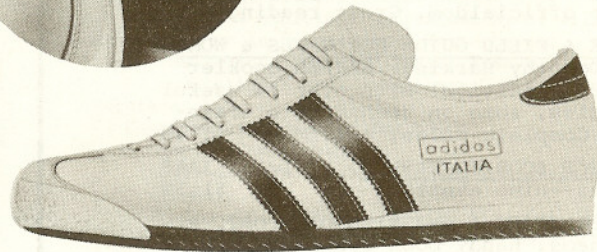
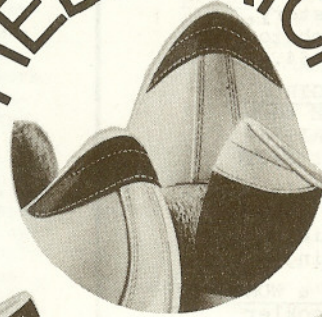
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## PROFILE OF A CHAMPION - MIROSLAVA SARNA by Daniel Grinberg

The long and uncommon career of Mirosława Salacinska begins way back in 1953 when her teacher, M. Janiak, sent the 11 year old youngster to represent her school at the International Scouts Championships. Mirosława placed fourth and was allowed to compete in the "Petrathlon of the Sztandar Moldyeh Newspaper", a sort of popular children's games. Her track and field career began with the "Sparta Lodz" Club, but the first appearances weren't particularly exciting: as example 14.8 for the 100m and 1.18/3'10½ in the high jump.

At the time of the Melbourne Olympics, the blonde, attractive youngster was age group champion of the Lodz district (15/16 years group) with 14.0 for the 100m. Because of her

consistent progress, she entered the Polish Junior Team and was many times national junior record holder. But perhaps the very versatility of this young, all-around athlete caused a general fading of her performances level. In fact, nobody knew at that time which should have been THE event of Mirosława. So, some coaches made up their minds about her possibilities in the sprints.

In the following Olympic season (1960), Mirosława, already a Polish international, clocked 24.1 over 200 meters at the National Championships in Olsztyn, August 7. This clocking shocked the experts, (she was only 18 years old), but it should be pointed out there was a clear error on the part of the timekeeper. However, this 24.1 opened the road to Rome until she was told, "Sorry, you're too young", and she was left off the Polish squad.

In 1961 the girl from Lodz entered the WSWF, (Superior Institute of Physical Education) in Cracovia. There she was under the guidance of Emil Dudrinski, head coach for the sprint section of the national team, who forced her to concentrate on the dashes, neglecting the jumps. As a consequence of that, Mirosława showed no significant progress in the following four years, the dark period of her career. She was a definite lost talent. Only an accidental participation in a high jump contest in which she cleared 1.70/5'7 indicated her still undeveloped possibilities.

In 1966 Mirosława graduated as a physical education teacher and went to Kielce. Here she married engineer Edmund Sarn. Although her new husband had no coaching experience and little knowledge of track, Mrs. Sarna, under his urging, once again began training. She had intended to retire from track competition due to the remarks made by the critics and by her recent lack of improvement. It is interesting to note that the institution of "husband-coach" seems to be a successful one in Poland - and all over the world.

A new, ambitious, obstinate, hard-training Mirosława came from this union and she began looking forward to competition and the chance to show her true class. Despite the lack of facilities, (typical of Kielce - a poor track, no dressing rooms or showers, etc.), Sarna improved to European class in the long jump. However, she went to Mexico City primarily as a member of the sprint relay team, and her fifth place in the long jump at 6.47/21'2½ was an upset for everyone - her coaches, the experts and....Mirosława Sarna herself.

Back in Kielce she found a letter waiting from one of her former coaches saying that her jump was only a "happy coincidence" and that is she would train hard for the sprints she would become the champion - of the Kielce district! That did it! Stimulated by this letter, Mirosława planned the most serious winter training of her career and gained the highest prize - the European title.

At the end of the 1969 season, Sarna showed her splendid condition by collecting 4733 points in the pentathlon, (a national record breaking Kirszenstein-Szewinska's mark), and clocking 55.6 for the quarter on her first-ever attempt and on a cold, windy day without competition. I think she could have been a medalist in the 200m at Athens also, but the time schedule did not permit the double with the long jump.

A great part of Sarna's training is devoted to strength exercises. Since the facilities at Kielce are old and dangerous, Mirosława does most of her training indoors. A good fighter, Sarna will be at the top for a good many years if she continues the sport.

Mirosława Salacinska-Sarna was born on June 8, 1942 in Lodz. She is 5'5½ and weighs 132 pounds. Married to Edmund Sarna, her actual coach. Her profession is physical education teacher for children.

Her annual progression: (Editors note - we hope athletes in the USA will take notice of the progression charts of the champions of our sport, noting that most champions do not become champions or world class until they reach ages 25-29. If we in the United States expect to become a world power, our athletes must stay in competition until the age of 30 or above. It takes years and years of work to become a champion. Our citizens have the tendency to quit at 18. We must keep them in the sport for another ten years!)

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# DORIS BROWN (AGAIN), WOLVERINES (FINALLY) WIN XC TITLES

Inglewood, California, November 29:—It was billed as the "Run of the Decade". It brought together four top-notch undefeated cross country runners - the defending champion and three time world champion from the Falcon Track Club, Doris Brown; tough, hard-trained and ready Cheryl Bridges of the Wolverine Parkettes with five straight rugged wins; and two youngsters, Debbie Roth of Oregon TC who was the first 13 year old to run the mile under five minutes, and San Jose's Francie Larrieu who holds the US 1500 meter record along with Doris Brown.

And that wasn't all. The "back-up" runners numbered beyond the dozen mark. From the 1969 USA World Championship team, the runner-up to the world title, Maureen Dickson; also from the 1969 World Championship team, blonde teenager Maria Stearns of the Santa Monica AA and one of Igloy's stable; Pat Cole, out of competition for a year, but now working with Igloy and boasting her finest-ever season; Debbie Heald of the La Mirada Meteors, the California girls champion; Kathy Gibbons of Phoenix who had trounced Cole, Stearns and Heald only a few weeks earlier; Jane Hill from Frederick TFC, the 1968 US 1500 meter champion; Pam Bagian of the Wolverine club, a consistent runner with more racing in 1969 than any of the other runners; dependable Vicki Foltz, Brown's teammate and also a member of the 1969 World Champions; and add the usual "dark horses" flitting through the entry list and it added up to a race which was looked forward to by all spectators. A real challenge. A tough competitive run.

Up for grabs were the six places on the 1970 International team just to add a little spice to the proceedings. The calibre of competition was so tough that the five-time US champions Will's Spikettes dropped down into the girls division. The entry list which was near the 100 mark only the night before the race, suddenly dropped to a little more than 60 as those who could slipped back into the 14-17 race.

Those who knew her worried about Doris Brown. The night before the competition she was asked how she felt - and she answered "fine". For the first time anyone could remember there were no sore tendons, aching legs, barking calves - and her friends worried. But it was true, and the race turned into a "no contest" as the Champion poured it on, taking the lead soon after the start and after the first mile simply adding distance between herself and the pack. Crown Cities new French distance ace Jausseu Martine stayed with Brown for the first mile, but soon gave up the ghost and dropped out.

The veterans, the cagey old pros, gobbled up four of the six spots on the International team as the wise ones stayed back in the pack and let the youngsters kill themselves off on the deceptively tough, grassy, hilly course.

Bridges and Bagian ran the first mile together far off the pace, but made their move over the final three-quarters of a mile and with only 50 yards to go Bagian was a few feet in front of favoured Bridges - but up the final steep hill the veteran Indiana runner pulled ahead to win the second spot over her teammate by only a second. Two seconds back came Vicki Foltz with Pat Cole trailing by still two more seconds. The final spot on the team was grabbed by Larrieu, some 11 seconds behind Cole.

But Doris Brown won by 18 seconds over the toughest field ever assembled for a US Cross Country Championship.

Meanwhile back in the pack wild things were happening. Two surprises - in fact three surprises - were the 7-8-9 place finishes by Shirley Springer of the San Jose Cindergals, Nancy Main of the Frederick TFC and Nanette Torrey of the San Diego Lancerettes. More than a month ago I was told by the coach of Nanette Torrey that she would be ready for the Nationals, but knowing how coaches are I simply filed the information - and now I remember it.

What happened to the favorites? Maria Stearns struggled in 10<sup>th</sup> and Debbie Roth 11<sup>th</sup>. Debbie Heald was 16<sup>th</sup>, Jane Hill 17<sup>th</sup>. Maureen Dickson, obviously overweight and lacking running, finished 23<sup>rd</sup> while Kathy Gibbons, among the leaders for most of the distance, dropped out with 600 yards to go.

Richard Beyst's Wolverine Parkettes won the team title as expected, but not as easily as expected. Lucky for the Michigan crew that Cheryl Bridges had become eligible for pushing them for the championship was the San Jose Cindergals coached by Estelle Argabright. The score was close, 35 to 39. And the Parkettes will breathe easier after learning San Jose's #5 runner dropped out of the race - or.....

The Wolverines won another championship by edging Will's Spikettes 51-53 in the Girl's Division - and Lady Luck was

with the Mid-westerners once again as the Spikettes had their number 3 runner get sick during the race and drop out. But that is all part of the "game" - and the Wolverines are the champions. They came through when it was required.

Philadelphia Striders' Beth Bonner won the Girl's race. For a while it appeared Bonner would win it all alone for she set a fast pace and built up a big lead. But skinny Reeny Westcott of the La Mirada Meteors cut loose with a devastating final 400 to come within three seconds of the winner.

The 12/13 Division, with the largest number of competitors to ever run in a National Championship race, 138, saw a huge upset as Patty Cape of the Long Beach Comets swished past a tiring Debra Johnson of the Rialto Road Runners to win that championship by five full seconds. With only 50 yards to go, Johnson, who had been winning all her races in southern California with monotonous regularity, was still leading. Wild screams from the spectators woke her to the fact something was happening - and the happening was Cape coming at her like a wild banshee. Cape sailed past Johnson to win easily and as Johnson eased off, Tanya Gould from the Phoenix Flyers also whizzed past to grab the silver medal. The enormity of Cape's win can be realized when one searches the results of the California State Championships just two weeks earlier: first place, Debra Johnson - fifth place, Patty Cape!

The Rialto Road Runners had little competition score-wise as they tallied 53 points to give Coach David Japs the first place trophy over Will's Spikettes who scored 82.

The RRR team also won the 10/11 Division as Doreen Assumma scored a four second triumph over the mile course.

Steve Price and his Kettering (Ohio) Striders travelled a long way to win the 9/Under Division Championship in the closest team scoring of the day. Kettering won with 73 points to 78 for the Colorado Pacers, 79 for the La Mirada Meteors and 82 for the Ontario-Montclair Cheetahs. Pint-sized Lezli Peterson from San Jose won the three-quarter mile race by a huge margin and eight seconds.

As far as is known, no complaints were made concerning the course, the meet management or the housing. The Meet Director, Sandy Williams, and her crew did a terrific job with such minute detail work as making certain EVERY name was correctly spelled and providing every one of the 532 entries with a personalized number.

On second thought, there were two complaints. The first, heard quite often during the pre-race warmups, was the weather. It was too hot for the mid-Westerners and Easterners. How 78° can be classed as "too hot" escapes the southern California natives. The second complaint was the placing of the finish line in the chute. The finish was just at the top of a very steep, but short hill. Finishers were bushed as they completed the climb up the hill, and were going slowly as they entered the chute. Secondly, the finish line itself was moved by some official just before race time to a spot closer to the front end of the chute - result of these conditions was that many athletes were not able to get a "time" as the runners filled the chute in front of the finish line, cutting off as much as 25 yards for some of the later, trailing runners. The closed circuit tv camera recorded every athlete as she crossed the finish line, and the officials made certain the athletes were in the correct order - much credit to Sandy Williams once again who reviewed and reviewed the film to make certain every place was correct. However, nearly 100 runners were not timed.

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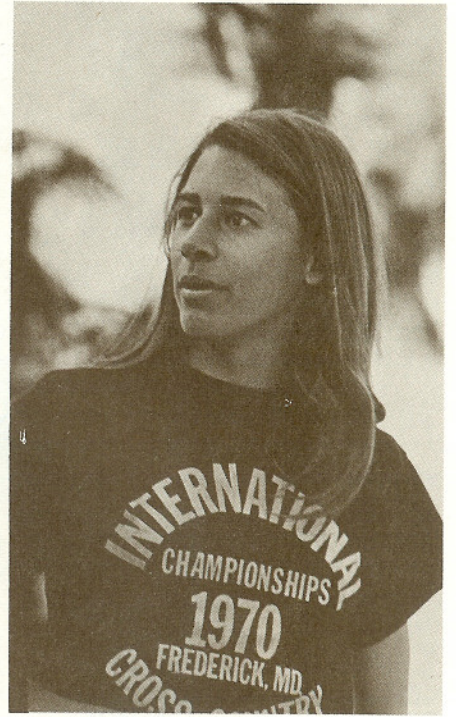
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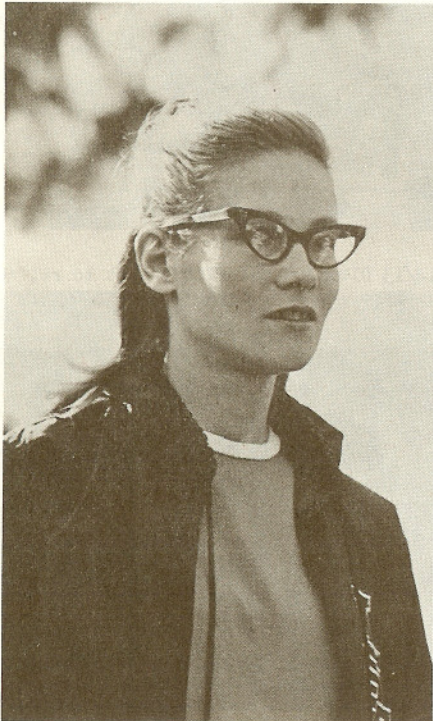


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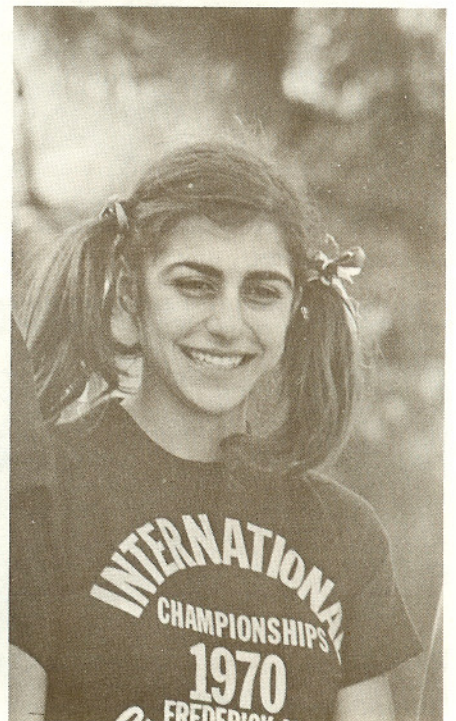
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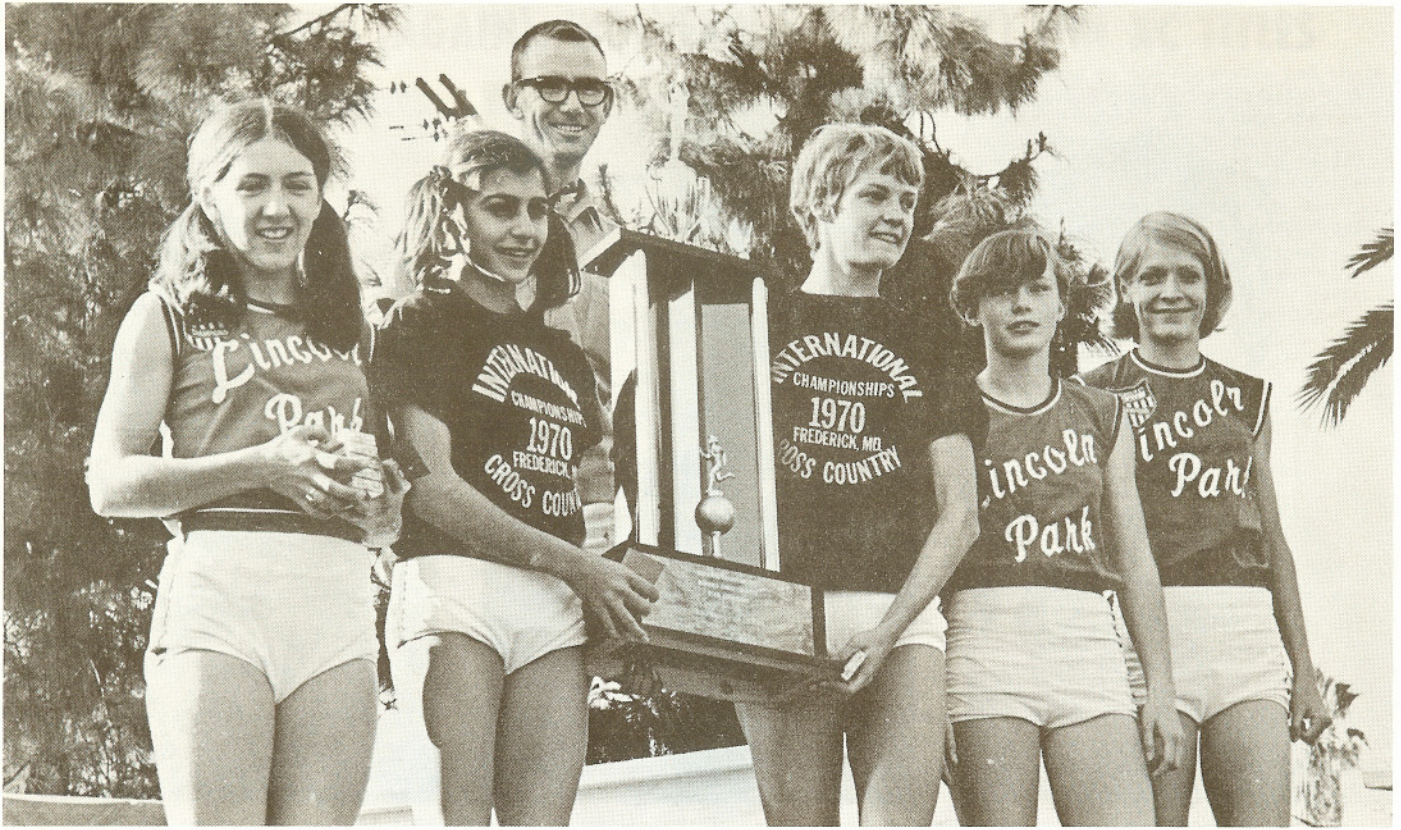

## AGE GROUP TRACK By CALVIN BROWN

In this great New Year issue, I will review the 1969 season. I'd like to make some reference to the age group graduates at this time. We have some very good athletes who have moved up to the 14 and over division. So, here goes!

### GRADUATE SECTION

**SPRINTS:** The most improved sprinter as a 14 year old was Jackie Thompson. She improved from 25.7 to 24.5, the latter being a US age 14 best. Jackie moved up to the quarter to clock a very fine 55.6s. Mable Ferguson was solid most of the year and had bests of 24.8 and 55.0s. Marilyn McClung moved up from the short sprints to the quarter and recorded 59.0 first time out and had a best of 57.5. Marilyn might move up again and run the half mile in 1970.

**MIDDLE DISTANCES:** In this category we have three Debbie's: Roth, Heald and Norris. Debbie Norris competed all year as a fourteen year old and had a very successful year. She managed to collect World age 14 best in the 880 with a 2:12.9. I still haven't made up my mind as to who is the best runner between Heald and Roth. Heald ran 5:07.6 in her mile outing at Phoenix in March. She was then injured and didn't run again until late in the year and ran 5:26, plus 2:22.2 in the half. Roth had a great year to record 2:17.6 which tied Debbie Norris' US 12 and 13 National Record and 5:02.6 which established a National Record - the mile run being a new event in 1969. At 13, Roth ran against older competition and ran under five minutes with a great 4:59.6. At Dayton, Roth ran 4:39.2 in the 1500 meters. It seems Debbie Norris prefers the 880, Debbie Roth the mile and Debbie Heald the two miles where she has a time trial, on the track, on November 23 in a great 10:43.0. I look for continued success for all three girls. It is easy to remember them. Just remember the name Debbie!

**HURDLES:** In the 50 yard hurdles, it's hard to beat Karol Stewart's 6.9 at age 13. Almost equally as good was Judy Rejebian's 7.0 and sixth place finish at Dayton in the Girl's Nationals. Other 7.0 runners were: Rhonda Albers 14 and DeAnne Wilson 14. Moving up to the 100 meter hurdles, Judy ran 15.8, DeAnne 16.1 and Jackie Van Buskirk about 16.2.

**PENTATHLON:** Judy Rejebian had a great year in this event. While 13, earlier in the year, Judy established a 12/13 NR with a first-ever over 4000 point performance with 4072. Later in the year, competing in the women's National Meet, she had a score of 3992 and improved her best 200 with a fine 25.1. Jackie Van Buskirk scored 3510 in a women's competition later in the year.

**FIELD EVENTS:** Probably the most outstanding field event performer was Dora Lee Roberts, 14. She won the Girl's Nationals at Dayton with a jump of 18'8 $\frac{3}{4}$  and had a qualifying round jump of 19'5 $\frac{1}{2}$  which was just three inches off the 14/17 National record set in 1961. Dora Lee now has the best US by age record at 14 and also at 13 with her jump of 19'1. She has also high jumped 5'3 this year. Rhonda Albers, 14, jumped over 19 feet with 19'2 and placed second at Dayton in the Girl's Division with 18'5. Karol Stewart, at 13, jumped 18'2. Judy Rejebian, at 13, jumped 18'6 $\frac{3}{4}$  and at 14 went on an international indoor trip to Europe. In the weight events Iva Wright was very successful. She set a US best in the discus for 14 with a throw of 135'4 and put the 8# shot just  $\frac{1}{4}$  inch under 41 feet.

Now a review of the season with the 13 and under runners:

**SPRINTS:** The most complete sprinter of the 1969 season was Karen Hurlocker. Karen ran distances from 50 yards up to the half mile where she turned in 2:26.5. Karen was injured during the year as was teammate Debbie Heald, but she still managed good marks. Karen ran 6.4, 11.3, 25.7 and in her best event, the 440, 58.1 for a 12/13 NR beating Joyce Scott's 1968 mark by one-tenth of a second. Joyce had a late season start and recorded only 11.8, 26.6 and 60.2. We had some very fine 12 year old sprinters in 1969. Creola Miller, after a very successful 1968 season, had US bests at 11 with a 6.3, 11.8 and 26.7. She improved in 1969 to 11.3 and 26.4. Her 11.3 is also a US age 12 best along with Karen McDaniel. Creola's teammate, Denise Julian, age 12 also, ran 6.1 and 11.4. Creola, Denise and two others teamed together to clock the fastest time of the year in the 4x110 relay with 49.8, just 0.5 off the 12/13 NR. Juanita Kelley came into the sprint picture this year with a sound 6.0 and 11.7. I believe Juanita ran faster in the 100 during the year, around 11.4, but I'm not sure. Carol Burkland, 1968 NR holder in the 10/11 440 with 63.4 had a good year with bests of 6.1, 11.9, 25.7 and 62.3.

**10/11 SPRINTS:** Probably the most outstanding in this group was Anita Lee, although her main strength as an athlete is in other events. Nonetheless, Anita ran 11.8, 28.0 and 65.9 in 1969. Toni Strickland ran 11.9 in the 100. B. Dexter ran 6.4 and 12.1. Bernadine Armstrong ran 6.5 and 28.2. Joyce Wolak ran distances from 50 yards through 880 yards. I'll list her short sprints here. They were: 6.9, 12.4 and 27.6. Cynthia McKenzie ran 12.2 and 27.7.

**9/UNDER SPRINTS:** We had a great group of sprinters in this category. The best was probably Terri Frye who ran a great and colorful 12.6 NR and at the time also a NR in the 220 in 29.9. Terri was on the cover of the June issue this year of WTFW. She was the bare-foot wonder. Two other sprinters were very close to Terri in ability and the one who matures the most will be the better athlete in 1970. There's Chris Smallwood who ran a NR 12.8 in a heat - then Terri ran 12.6 in the final to wipe it out. Chris also ran 6.9, 29.7 and 70.4. A longer sprinter and maybe the most impressive of all is Marietta Brown who set two NR in one day on May 31 when she ran a 29.5 and an unbelievable 67.2. Nancy Springhorn recorded the best time in the 50 for the year with a 6.8 and ran 13.2 in the 100. T. Marcum ran 12.8 in the 100. Cheryl Washington ran 6.9 and 13.2.

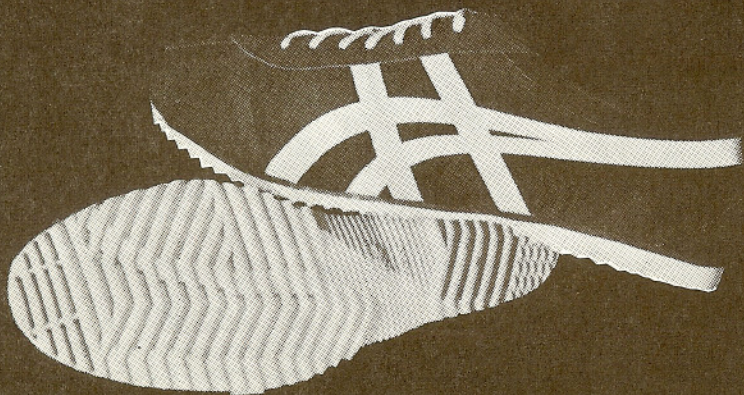
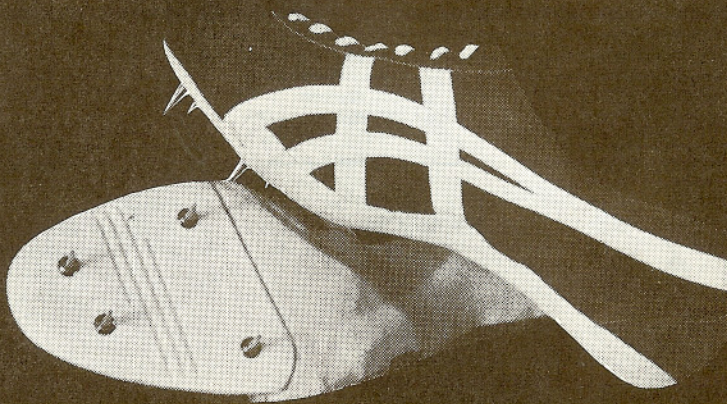
**MIDDLE DISTANCES: 12/13:** Debbie Roth had an outstanding year, claiming two 12/13 National Records in the half mile and mile with 2:17.6 (tie) and 5:02.6. Debbie Heald set the NR for the mile earlier in the year in March at 5:07.6. Probably the best (over-all) runner during the year was Carol Slocum who ran the short sprints through the mile run. She had best times during the year of: 11.8, 26.3, 60.0 (58.4 relay leg), 2:21.0 and 5:27.0. Pat Cape, a girl who started her career late in the season, ran 59.9 to "win" the 12/13 Nationals at San Jose and then won the 12/13 National Cross

Country mile run at Inglewood on November 29, 1969, in 5:38 over the hills and on grass. Pat Cape is a real comer! Pam Swalley won the California State Championship 880 in 2:21.5. Tanya Gould barely edged Nancy Ihrman at the San Jose Nationals in 2:20.3 to 2:20.4.

**MIDDLE DISTANCES: 10/11:** Nadine Bowers has the best time that was submitted for a NR in the 880 with her 2:29.6. So Nadine will probably be the record holder. She also ran the 660 in 1:46.8. Shauna Baxter has a regular season best of 2:33.1 in the half and on July 3 ran 2:24.6 in a competition unknown to me. Betty Shell of Ohio ran the half in 2:32.5 and moved up to the 12/13 Division later and placed 9<sup>th</sup> in the National Cross Country Championship. Joyce Wolak ran national bests of 62.9 and 2:27.5 in non-AAU competition, but 63.0 and 2:27.6 in AAU competition. Effie Jordan is a comer. She developed late in the track season and had bests of 65.1, 2:36.2 and 5:35.1 at age 10. Effie was eighth in the Cross Country Nationals. Her teammate, Doreen Assumma, won in 5:47. Effie had lost only once during the cross country season and that was to Doreen and then again at Inglewood. Pam Young had an early season leading 2:33.6 in the half. B. Heglar ran 63.4 at San Jose.

**12/13 HURDLES:** Karol Stewart didn't compete the whole season which was rather unfortunate, but when she did, she was unbeatable. Karol ran a great 6.9! A surprise performance came from Nora Carter while taking part in a pentathlon. She ran the hurdles in 7.0. DeAnne Wilson ran 7.1 before turning 14 and then she ran 7.0. Sandy Goldsberry and Anne Gallaher both ran 7.1. Judy Rejebian ran 7.2 early in the year and ran 7.0 after she turned 14. Jackie Van Buskirk ran 7.3 before turning 14. Carol Burkland at age 12 and in her first year of hurdling, ran a couple of 7.3's. Cynthia McKenzie competed during the regular season as an eleven year old and at San Jose in June, in her first hurdle race in the new division, she ran 7.5!

**12/13 PENTATHLON:** In the pentathlon, until you hear differently from me, Judy Rejebian is the greatest. She was the Cathy Hamblin and the Irena Press of her division. I'm sorry she didn't get another opportunity later in the 12/13 season to compete in another pentathlon. The five events in this competition are: 50y hurdles, 6# shot put, high jump, long jump and 200m dash. Sandy Goldsberry could have gone over the 4000 point mark but it was late in the long season for her and her high jump was not up to normal. Sandy scored 3915 but at the time of competition her attitude was that of indifference. Nora Carter scored 3833 to beat Anne Gallagher with 3758 as Anne was recovering from an injury. L. Chirnside scored 3561 and I think she'll do much better. Cynthia McKenzie scored 3406 after turning 12.

**12/13 FIELD EVENTS:** Probably the most impressive field event performer in this age group during the 1969 year was 12 year old Debbie Rivers. 1969 was Debbie's first season of competition. She turned 12 in March and before she did, Debbie put the 6 pound shot 33'0 and threw the baseball 228'1", and the discus 81'3. At 12, she put the shot 41'6 $\frac{3}{4}$ , threw the discus 95'11 $\frac{3}{4}$  and the baseball 267'5. The 12/13 NR are 113'1 in the discus and 267'6 in the baseball throw. Debbie will have a full 1970 season in which to better those two marks. The shot record is 47'7, a little too far for Debbie, I believe. Terri Sabol threw the discus 93'0 $\frac{1}{2}$  in 1969 and since has thrown over 104 feet in practice. Debbie and Terri will be competing continually against each other in 1970. It will be interesting to see who betters 113'1" first, if in fact either one does. While on the weight events, let us mention these girls: Debbie Langevain put the shot 38'7 $\frac{7}{8}$  and threw 100'1 and 265'10; Yvonne Uhalde threw 101'4 and 264'4; Lori Lyford put the shot 38'4 $\frac{1}{2}$  and threw 101'7 and 227'6; Ruth Tucker put the shot 38'1 and threw 94'9. These girls were all very close in 1969. The one, or the ones, who work the hardest will probably improve the most in 1970. In the high jump, Sandy Goldsberry bettered the NR with a leap of 5'2 $\frac{1}{4}$ , then improved to 5'3 and then 5'3 $\frac{3}{4}$ . After the regular season, Sue Parks continued to improve after

a season on consistent performances and topped Sandy's mark with a great leap of 5'4. Sandy also long jumped 17' - less ¼ inch. There were other jumpers over 5 feet - in 1968 there was only one! In addition to Goldsberry and Parks, 1969 produced Goldie Kraft 5'0 early in the year, plus M. McMillan and L. Ganzine both 5'1 at San Jose in June. DeAnne Wilson also topped 5'0 and long jumped 16'11. Judy Rejebian jumped 18'6¼ before turning 14 early in 1969. Astrid Hemphill jumped ½ inch less than 17 feet.

**10/11 FIELD EVENTS:** Anita Lee, one of the greatest for her age of all time, had a tremendous year. At age 11, Anita high jumped 5'0 and long jumped 17'7. She competed in a 12/13 pentathlon and scored 3366. If you know anything about track and field, Anita's marks tell you her story. If you don't know much about girl's track, take it from me, Anita is great. Glenna Pickel with her 28.1 220 speed, long jumped 15'11. Jill South of Arizona jumped 14'11½ and 4'6¼. Cynthia McKenzie jumped 15 feet plus ¼ inch.

**9/UNDER FIELD EVENTS:** We had a lot of good performances in this division with no one standing out above the others. They included: Diane Rodriguez with a 13'8 NR and a 3'6 high jump; Lori Jenkins with 13'6½ in the LJ to tie the old NR; Shelly South with 13'5; Linda McQuarrie with 13'2; Elvira Compton with 12'9½; T. Marcum with a high jump of 4'0; Chris Shawhan with 4'2¼ and 12'6½ and Ronell Powell with 4'0 and 12'4½.

**ADDENDA:** I completely overlooked Renee Quigley, age 8, and I feel I should point out her accomplishments. In her first 660, Renee ran 1:57.5 and in her first mile she ran 6:00.7, which is a US age 8 best. Renee finished 7th in the 9/Under Cross Country Nationals. On December 6, Renee ran the 440 in 72.3 and on December 7 ran the half mile in 2:42.4 - both US age 8 bests.

## LETTER FROM NATALIE ROCHA, California

"Regarding your statement about not seeing the connection of Amos Alonzo Stagg medals to women's cross country: Amos Alonzo Stagg was a true example of an amateur athlete. He dedicated his life to the coaching of amateur athletics. He devoted much time and effort to the AAU and the NCAA. Contrary to what you believe, Stagg was not only the "grand old man of football". He was very much involved with track and field meets in America since the beginning of this century.

He coached his collegiate teams in Chicago to seven conference championships and developed many middle-distance stars. He was a member of the American Olympic Committee in 1908, 1912, 1920, 1924, 1928 and 1932. Stagg coached the 400 and 800 meter runners and the 1600 meter relay team in the 1924 Olympics. In 1932 he served both as track committeeman and member of the Executive Committee for the Olympic Games that year. He was also in charge of the preliminary training of track and field athletes who were candidates for the Olympic team that year.

Write Floyd Highfill, 1201 Princeton NE, Albuquerque, NM, 87106....It seems we stirred up a hornets nest with our remark about Austrian Liesl Prokop's pentathlon competitions. Everyone is on the defensive. First of all, we made no insinuation about her world record, but we did state we had heard, (and how surprised the Austrian officials would be if they knew our source), there were discrepancies in her previous pentathlons - six jumps in the long jump with a foul jump measured and counting, etc., etc. And we still can't believe an athlete with only 24.6 (and wind aided at that) speed can run 13.5 in the 100mH - even in Switzerland!

Julie Shea continues her winning ways in North Carolina. Her last race saw her break a course record by 46 seconds - and Julie is only 10 years of age.
