Letter from Tom Heinonsen, Oregon

"Your pre and post Olympic coverage was marvelous. Reports from several viewers, (Popper, Watman and others), adds much to its creditability. If you only had the finances and manpower to make it all more timely.

"I am hoping your austerity program sees you through until help arrives. Is anyone listening?"

Letter from Michael Cahoon, San Gabriel

"Enjoying your and Jan Popper's commentary on the Olympics, but wondered if we will ever hear from Dick Bank.

"A couple of questions you might answer for me: 1) What ever happened to Pat Bank in the pentathlon? I saw her run a quarter in about 57 seconds on a mile relay team at Mt.SAC and she looked in great shape in April, (no tape or bandages). Why didn't she compete in the trials?

"2) What happened to Madeline Manning between June and September? I read a quote by her in the NY Times the day before the Olympic Trials that she hoped to run 51.2, yet when the results were in she ran only 53.3 for fourth place.

"3) Regarding the IOC request to cut down on the number of events - both walks to possibly be eliminated from the men's events - has women's T&F been asked to also cut down or will the 3000m be added for 1976?"

We try and answer your questions: Pat Bank injured a knee later on and was unable to jump - and that handicaps a pentathlon performer no little. Pat is now an assistant track coach at UCLA dispensing knowledge. I was out of the country when the Olympic Trials were held and have been trying to get news about them for lo these many months, so I can't help you with question number two. Number three - I was fortunate to be able to attend the IAAF meeting in Munich when all this was discussed and all credit goes to Lord Burghley, the organization's president, who told the IOC that track and field was the backbone of the Games and instead of deleting events, T&F should be allowed to increase the number of events. It does not appear that the 3000m will be included in the 1976 Games, but this will not be final until after the 1974 IAAF meeting.

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AN OPEN LETTER TO ABC-TV

"I don't think much of women's lib. If you treat every individual as a human being, there isn't any reason to even think about such a thing as women's lib.

"It's too bad your media either has no respect for or knowledge of the feelings and/or physiological responses in the minds and bodies of women athletes. Your actions at the Sun-kist Indoor Meet will forever be held against you by the 35 female entries, their coaches, their parents, their friends.

"I cite just the activities of one of the athletes I coach, Marilyn Neufville. Two days before the competition she was informed her race, the 500y, was moved from 3:25 to 1:52 because Kathy Hammond had scratched and the race was taken off TV. OK, no big problem there except she was also scheduled to run a lap on the LATC relay team at 2:35 - but we adjusted to that switch.

"Meet day came. Breakfast at ten o'clock. The drive to the Sports Arena brought us there at noon. Parking, entering the arena, greeting friends, getting program, numbers and so forth brought her to warm up time, 1:00 o'clock. At 1:40 shoes were changed and onto the track. At 1:50 the runners were taken to the starting line. Sweats off. Ready to go. Hold it! ABC has decided the race must be postponed. Sweats back on. Off the track. New race time announced as 3:30.

"When 2:30 approaches it is now time to warm up for the relay. A half hour of preparation. Shoes changed and onto the track. Teams taken to the starting line. Hold it! ABC has decided to change the time of the relay. Off the track. Shoes off. Now they have moved the relay up again - next race after the 1000. Shoes back on. Back onto the track. This time they run the relay.

"Women's mile called. Milers are warmed up and ready. Now they are changing shoes on the edge of the track and - you guessed it - ABC has decided to postpone the women's mile. Francie Larrieu, in shoe-changing process throws her shoes wildly across the infield unfortunately just missing an ABC camera.

"By the time the postponed 500, postponed relay, postponed mile have been run and it's time to get ready for the actual running of the 500 - incidentally now nearly seven hours after eating the well-planned breakfast, the desire, the incentive, the adrenalin - all are gone. And so it's scratch from the 500 and a poorer field ambles through the race.

"I suggest to you that an established time schedule, one approved by your directors, must be adhered to. If not, you are going to find yourself an object of hate by the athletes you so mercilessly move around. I am sure this will not do much to deter your million dollar industry, but maybe we just might join that women's lib movement."

WORLD ATHLETE OF THE YEAR - HEIDE ROSENDAHL

Never again will the voting be as close for World Athlete of the Year as it was for the 1972 winner. Forty six correspondents from 27 different nations sent in their ballots and when they were scored only one point separated Heide Rosendahl and Ludmila Bragina. Renate Stecher in third spot and Mary Peters in fourth were also very close to the top two. Names of the correspondents who participated may be found elsewhere in this issue. Rosendahl was born on February 17, 1947 in Huckleswagen West Germany. She is 5'8½ tall and weighs 152 pounds. She began her career at age 14 with a 12.8 100m time and a leap of 5.27/17'3½ in the long jump. Favored to win the pentathlon in the Mexico City Olympics, Heide pulled a muscle while warming up and was not able to compete. With great determination, she continued her athletics, setting a world long jump record of 22'5¼ in 1970 and missing that mark by one centimeter while winning the Olympic title in 1972. At the Games, Heide won two gold medals with her long jump win and her great anchor run as a member of the upsetting West German 4x100 relay team. She added a silver as she was second in the pentathlon behind Mary Peters' world record performance. Heide was fourth in last year's voting. The scores listed below include the number of first place votes received in parenthesis. Scoring was done on a 5-3-1 basis.

Russia's Bragina won with 134 points over GDR's Renate Stecher in spite of getting fewer first place votes, 17 to 20. Just take a look at some athletes who did not get a single vote: Amzina (1:59.9), Burneleit (4:04.1), Bufanu (2nd Olympic hurdles), Gryziecka (world record javelin throw), Hoffmeister (medals in both 800 and 1500 at Munich), Pollak (world record pentathlon) and the list is much longer.

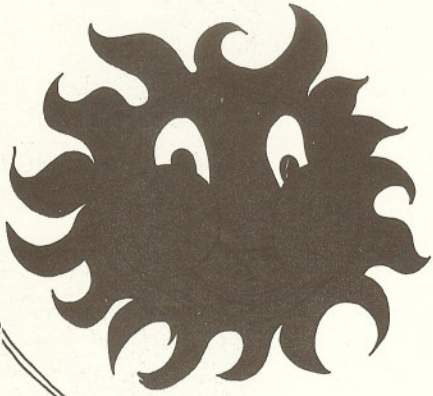

The summer is at its height down in Australia and the new track season is under way. Best of the performances so far has been the new Commonwealth record of 204'2 in the javelin by Petra Rivers - still only 19 years of age at the time. The mark was made in Melbourne on December 2.

1972 WORLD RANKINGS by JAN POPPER & ELIO TRIFARI

For the sixth consecutive year, "Women's Track and Field World" is proud to present the World Rankings as compiled by Jan Popper and Elio Trifari. Rankings are certainly a better method of determining who has been tops in each event than merely the World Lists whereby a performer would benefit from one performance. For the new readers, we repeat that the rankings are determined by consideration of 1) major honors won, (in Olympic year, the Olympic champion is usually the number one ranked athlete - but not always as you see here); 2) won/loss record; 3) sequence and quality/quantity of marks. As in 1971, the co-authors had to examine and compare nearly ten THOUSAND results throughout the year, and the letters from Prague to Napoli and back again must have swelled the post office's coffers. A truly remarkable job by these two outstanding experts.

Due to WTFW's new economy crusade, we have had to cut down on the number of seasonal marks by all athletes except the number one ranked performer and are listing here only the top five performances by each athlete. We hope to return to the original listing next year.

Letter from Ken Foreman

"Only rarely do I respond to items in print, but for several reasons I believe it would be pertinent to comment on 3 separate statements made in the November/December issue of Women's Track and Field World.

"1. Regarding the first six place winners in the Women's division of the AAU Cross Country Championships being "regraded with a trip to Belgium", it should be noted that this reward is contingent upon our being able to raise the funds for such a trip. Once again we have been told by the national office that no funds are available for the Women's International Cross Country Team. Thus, as usual, the Chairman of the Long Distance Sub-Committee and the coaches and athletes involved must scrounge for dollars to sne our deserving athletes to the international meet.

"If Munich taught us anything it is that if we are ever again to compete with European athletes we must set our goals well beyond our wildest dreams. . .and we must enter international competition whenever and wherever possible. In this light the refusal of the National AAU to support all international teams is preposterous.

"2. Reference to Doris Brown having a broken bone in her foot during the Canadian Pan Am Championships is inaccurate. Doris did have an accident on a Seattle Freeway on Thanksgiving day. This resulted in a severely bruised foot and a contusion on the thigh. These injuries markedly restricted her range of motion at the National AAU Meet at Long Beach, yet Doris insisted on running so that her team would have the long awaited chance of winning a National Championship.

"3. Reference to Ken Foreman's "inaccurate evaluation of the talent of Ona Dobratz" is in fact an inaccurate arm chair judgement by someone who wrote an article without having the facts of the case. I have undoubtedly made many poor decisions in a lifetime of coaching, but that really is not the issue with respect to the Pan Am Meet.

"We did not know Ona was going to run until we met her on the starting line. (The teams were practically a 'pickup' with the Oregon TC sending 'two or three runners', etc., etc.) When the runners arrived they were identified as A or B team depending on their finish in the AAU meet the previous week.

"It should be noted that while all of the ladies ran well for the extremely tough conditions, only Doris and Ona had something to prove. Their victory over Reiser and Hoffman was decisive, to say the least. Both of these fine runners proved what most of us already knew - give them an incentive and bodies that are rested and well, and they are virtually unbeatable."



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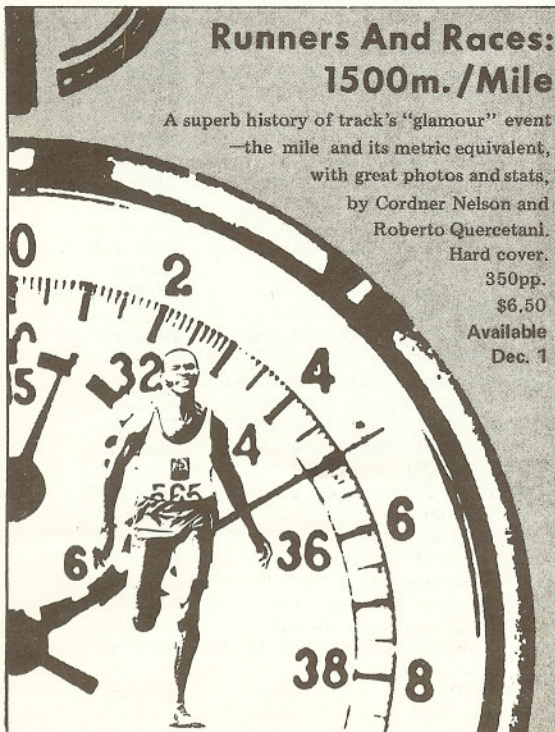

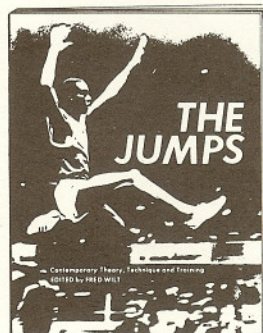

REISER BEATS LARRIEU TWICE by Lyle Sanderson

Saskatoon, Saskatchewan, Canada, December 29/30:-The Annual Saskatoon Indoor Games, held on the small (125 meters per lap) track, was well attended as usual and drew a field of more than 1200 competitors - there were more than 100 elementary school relays alone!

Glenda Reiser of Canada was named "athlete of the meet" for both men and women for her two wins over Francie Larrieu of the United States and two new Canadian National Indoor records in the 800 and 1500 meters.

In the 800, Glenda led from the gun using a 65.2 first 400 to pull clear of Larrieu and the rest of the field. The Ottawa teenager then ran steady to win in 4:20.9s. Larrieu was clocked in 4:27.3 in second spot.

In the 800m the following day, Larrieu led through the first two quick laps before Reiser powered away to a 2:08.0 clocking. Both marks bettered Doris Brown's meet records and were excellent in view of the nearly 13 laps per mile track. Larrieu had to fight off surprising newcomer Ann Marie Davis for second spot, 2:11 to 2:12.

Liz Vanderstam of the University of Alberta was added to the Invitational 400m field at the last minute to replace an injured Kathy Hammond and thanked the committee by turning on the speed over the last part of the race to win in a meet record of 56.5s. Vanderstam tried the same tactics in the 200, but Joanne McTaggart of the Saskatoon TC was too far ahead and both runners clocked 25.4, a track record.

Diane Jones, who had her tonsils out only eight days before the meet, was to be honored at the Labbate post-meet dinner. Although she felt weak after her surgery, she felt she should make a token competitive effort and finished the competition with one of her best performances ever. Diane hopped over 5'2, 5'4 and 5'6 in the high jump without a miss and had three good tries at 5'8. In the long jump, she fouled four straight, then leaped 19'4½" and 19'2½" - both personal bests to win that event. The next day she warmed up in the shot over the 50 foot mark, but had to be content with a winning toss of 48 feet.

USTFF EASTERN CHAMPIONSHIPS

Hanover, New Hampshire, January 6:-The USTFF held their Eastern Regional indoor championships at Dartmouth College on the new 220 yard astro track with more than 800 men and women competing. Running events were timed with the new Accutrack photo timer.

Good marks were recorded by Kathy Lawson as she won the two sprints and Maren Seidler, who led a fine quartette of shot putters.

FALCK BECOMES 'FLOPPER' by Lyle Sanderson

Winnipeg, Canada, January 13:-An enthusiastic crowd of more than 7000 saw a well presented meet where relatively unknown athletes upset established stars in both of the invitational women's events.

Hildegard Falck, Olympic 800m champion and world record holder, was never in the race after the gun fired for the 600 meters event. Liz Vanderstam of the University of Alberta went out fast and looked like she might steal the race over the first two laps, but she slowed just after passing the 400 in 59.0s. Wendy Koenig began to close the gap but Brenda Walsh of the Edmonton Olympic Club accelerated up the back stretch and went by with just over a lap to go. The smooth striding Canadian 400m record holder exhibited great relaxed power to win going away in a fine 1:30.6s and was awarded athlete of the meet honors. Koenig looked strong in second (1:31.5) while Vanderstam, who had earlier won the open 50m in 6.5 and recorded a 55.4 relay leg, held on to third in 1:33.5s. Falck looked very sluggish and was timed in 1:34.9. She stated following the race she had not trained since Munich.

Another world record holder, Marilyn Neufville of the Los Angeles TC, also finished last in her race although the field in the 300m was quite close. Joanne McTaggart and Yvonne Saunders were out well and ran strong first bends to reach the break line even. The tiny 18 year old McTaggart won the race to the bend and then showed relaxed speed and strong bend running for an upressed win in a track record of 40.2s. Saunders looked good throughout for a 40.6 clocking in second spot as Kathy Hammond edged Neufville for third in the final stride, both runners clocking 41.0 flat.

The third invitational event, the high jump saw Heather Welch demonstrate great spring in clearing 5'8 without a miss en route to defeat veteran Diane Jones and Lori Sigfusson, both of whom were over 5'6. Welch of the home town Galaxy TC was a popular winner and equalled her personal best.

SUNKIST INDOOR

Los Angeles, January 13:-Meet Director Al Franken scheduled four events for women and girls and the Annual Sunkist Indoor meet in the LA Sports Arena, then got caught in the middle between ABC-TV and the women athletes when three of the four events were switched at the last minute - and it could be said at the last second - for athletes were on their marks or ready for the starters commands when ordered off the track by the television moguls.

Perhaps it was the anger which turned on Francie Larrieu for she threw shoes at the tv cameras when the mile was moved and then came back to run a fine 4:44.2 over a good field which included world record holder Debbie Heald, Cindy Poor, Judy Graham and Mary Decker. Graham led at the quarter in 71 with Larrieu, Poor and Heald trailing in that order. The Olympian took over just after the 440 marks and led at the half in 2:23 followed by Poor, Heald and Graham.

Heald, running despite great pain and many injuries, made a move at this point and sped into second, but at the 1320 it was still Larrieu in 3:34 followed by Heald, Poor and Graham with Decker now completely out of it and merely jogging.

At the finish, Francie had more than a ten second advantage with Heald clocking 4:55.0 and Poor 4:58.3 and Graham just a step behind.

Jarvis Scott had no trouble winning the 500 after Marilyn Neufville, who had to warm up four times during the day due to ABC-TV switcherooing. Jarvis went to the front early and from then on it was simply a run-through in 1:07.6s. Patty Cape made a good move over the final 120 to grab the runner-up spot from Seden's Anne Hahaansson 1:08.9 to 1:09.1s. MM Maureen Abare was fourth in 1:13.6s.

The four-lap relay was a "no contest" as the Los Angeles Track Club, opening with Olympic 400m relay runner Martha Watson who handed off the baton to world 400m record-holder Marilyn Neufville who in turn passed to world sprint queen Chi Cheng piled up a huge lead and Judy Johnson trotted home the winner in 1:14.3s. Long Beach Comets were second in 1:16.8s.

The LB Comets walked off with the girl's four lap relay showing some excellent baton passing to down the LA Jets who actually had the fastest runners but flubbed the exchanges. No time was announced.
