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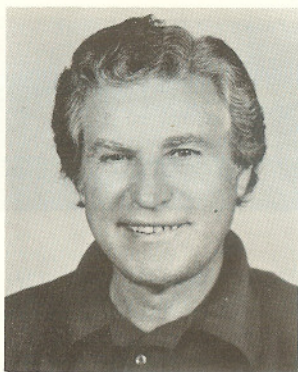
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## REEL OFF

For the past few weeks, we have been busy here at the WTW office preparing statistical lists for this January issue, and during these probing sessions my eye caught a couple of items which might be of interest to readers. Just how long does it take a performer to reach the top ten in her particular event and how long can she remain in that select group?

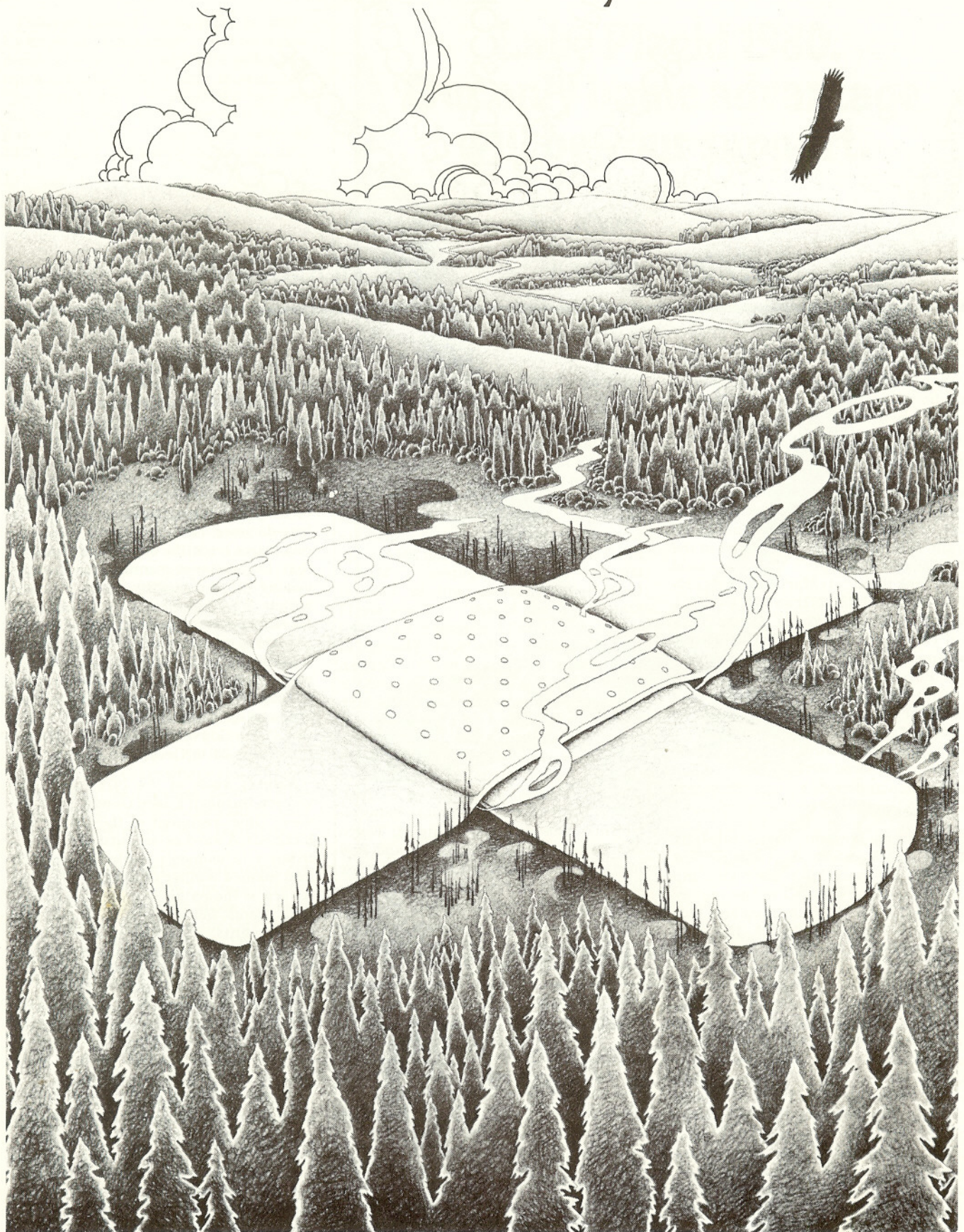
Schmidt, Smith, Calvert, Cannon, Friedrich, Sulinski and Roberta Brown and there wouldn't be much of a list.

... Sad news of the death of Pete Pozzoli, prolific author of the Women's Track & Field Yearbook. Pete was one of the world's top statisticians and his Yearbooks were filled with an unbelievable amount of information. His 1973 book, for example, had 402 pages of information on every phase of women's track and field. He was a good friend... Five athletes are on the All-Time World Top 50 List in the 100, 200 and 400. Here's how their total times rank them: 1) Marita Koch ((11.12-21.71-48.60) 81.43, 2) Irena Szewinska (11.13-22.21-49.28) 82.62, 3) Evelyn Ashford (10.97-21.83-51.57) 84.37, 4) Christine Brehmer (11.28-22.61-49.72) 84.51, 5) Mona-Lisa Pursiainen ((11.19-22.39-51.27) 84.85... Rumanian officials are petitioning the IAAF to cancel the suspension of Natalia Marasescu, recently ousted for using steroids. Claim is that Natalia had been bothered with a chest cold and the substance detected in the tests was prescribed medicine for her ailment.

From Luigi Mengoni comes information on track marks in Albania. Best performances were 5'9 in the high jump by Tatyana Cave and 46'2 in the shot by Antoneta Koqi. Other marks include 12.9, 26.3, 57.3, 2:09.9, 4:24.9, 10:02.8, 15.0, 61.4, 17'9<sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub>, 132'8 (JT) and 3655 pentathlon. There's proof that all Eastern European countries are not super women... If you'd like to join in the efforts of the International Runners Committee, whose main function at present is getting the distance runs added to the Olympic program, write to them at 1126 Pelican Road, Pebble Beach, CA 93953... If a man thinks for one minute that he understands women, he has timed it just about right... Drake University has picked up a couple of Swedish aces in Liz Hjalmarsson (2:06.2-4:17.8-9:18.3) and Marie Simonsson (2:06.0-4:23.1)... Cathy Sulinski has moved from Cal State Hayward to Chico State... Another athlete-coach

marriage. Esther Alfonso is now Esther Mahr.

Nigeria's Modupe Oshikoya, missing from last year's track scene while expecting a family addition, will be back on the tartan this summer... Where will the 1088 Olympics be held? So far, the IOC has three choices: Seoul, Nagoya and somewhere in Belgium... Renate Stecher, 1972 Olympic 100 and 200 champion, now has two daughters... Martin Luther King Games will be held at Stanford in late March... There are 14 standard events in women's track and field recognized by the IAAF. Thirteen of these event records are held by Eastern European athletes. Sara Simeoni, Italy, is the lone outsider with her high jump record... National AAU's will be back at Mt. SAC this year and will not move to Oregon as rumored... First "World Championship" (with the exception of Olympic Games) will be held in 1983. Where? The IAAF has a choice between Helsinki, Los Angeles, Stuttgart, Tokyo and Paris... The 400 hurdles and 3000 meter run scheduled originally for Dublin following the Games in Moscow have been switched to Sittard, Holland.

Here's an interesting development in the continuing story of the steroid battle: Russian pentathlete Nadyezhda Tkachenko was caught and suspended in 1978. Since the ruling states she cannot compete in international competition, she has been competing in her own country. She will be eligible for the Olympic Games next summer. But has she really been punished for her use of the drug? Not really, because since she did not compete internationally for those 18 months, she could be stuffing the steroids daily without fear of being detected since no tests are given for internal competition. Now who is being punished? The Good Guys, of course.

The American College of Sports Med-

icine has issued an Opinion Statement (along with several pages of supportive evidence), concerning "The Participation of the Female Athlete in Long-Distance Running". The statement reads: "It is the opinion of the American College of Sports Medicine that females should not be denied the opportunity to compete in long-distance running. There exists no conclusive scientific or medical evidence that long-distance running is contraindicated for the healthy, trained female athlete. The American College of Sports Medicine recommends that females be allowed to compete at the national and international level in the same distances in which their male counterparts compete"... Ocean State Marathon in Watwick, RI, was won by Patty Lyons in 2:40.28... The 1980 AAU Convention is set for Miami, November 30 to December 7.

Awards made at the 1979 AAU Convention included Eileen Goodnight, Fairview, Ohio, recipient of the Joseph Robichaux Award as an outstanding contributor to women's track; Evelyn Ashford, named winner of the C. C. Jackson Award as the nation's top female in running events; Maren Seidler, ditto for the field events; Doris Brown Heritage, winner of the women's Long Distance Running Award... Ashford has also been nominated for the Sullivan Award... Qualifying standards for these two events following the Olympics are: 3000 meters 9:10, 400m hurdles 59.0/59.14... From the Coach's Bulletin Board: "There is no heavier burden than a 'Great Potential'... The Third Annual NIKE-US Club Road Racing Championship will take place in San Diego, April 5. Open to any AAU or RRCA organized club. Winning club will receive travel expenses to compete in a major International Club Racing Championship to be held in Europe. Each team will consist of three members. You may have four members, but

only the first three score. For information contact Peter Thompson, P.O. Box 10412, Eugene, Oregon 97440.

Did you know Kate Schmidt is really Kathryn Joan Schmidt? . . . The world record in the marathon has improved by more than an hour in only 15 years . . . The third L'eggs/YWCA 10,000 meter run for women only is set for San Diego, February 18. Contact San Diego YWCA, 1012 C Street, San Diego, California 92101

. . . We are looking forward to a visit from Rolf von der Laage and Gladys Chai over the holiday season.

Mel Watman, editor of Britain's "Athletics Weekly" has written concerning the "Transcutaneous nerve stimulator" which has appeared on the market recently and making many claims. "The TNS only relieves pain, and does nothing to heal an injury. There is, therefore, the danger that an athlete, relieved of her pain, will go out and train hard and do more damage. An injured athlete should always work within the limits of the pain. The "nerve stimulator" should only be used on long-standing pain where other forms of treatment have failed". So you've been alerted . . . Mainland Chinese athletes have been setting some new national and area marks recently. Among them 4:22.4 over 1500 meters, 9:25.8 for 3000 meters, 59.79 for 400m hurdles and 3:43.3 for the 4x400 relay . . . Incidentally, a group of PROC athletes will arrive in the USA soon, will train at Mt. SAC and will compete in competitions in southern California, ending with the Mt. SAC Relays . . . Excellent book on South American Track and Field by Hailrath/Kramer/Mengoni. Price is \$8 if you are in Europe, \$10 for everywhere else — that's including air mail postage. 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# TWO RAZORBACKS

Watch for them at the finish line, and you'll notice they're out in front. But just because Diann Ousley and Jody Rittenhouse place in a similar fashion, that doesn't mean their personalities are identical. The fact is, the two freshman runners from the University of Arkansas live contrasting lives.

What they do have in common is a relatively short acquaintance with running, coupled with the desire to win and the means to see it through.

Jody is outgoing and constantly animated. If you're not greeted with a smile and a fluttering of the eyelids, you know you're speaking with the wrong person.

Her energy flows in unending streams as she finds natural ways to attract attention to herself and her accomplishments. This also leads to a regular verbal report of the new injuries she is hampered with. There's always something to talk about and someone to talk to when Jody's around.

With Diann, the opposite is true.

It may take a while before you're acquainted with her voice. Diann is shy, soft-spoken and doesn't need much external support. She draws on her own powers and takes her wins quietly.

This sedate appearance shouldn't be mistaken for a lack of enthusiasm, however, because when it comes to exerting herself, Diann has an endless reserve.

"Both these athletes have helped our program to develop tremendously with just the short time they've been here," said Ed Renfrow, the Lady Razorbacks' track and cross country coach. "They came here with good high school marks, but they're coming from two different approaches. Jody had recognition in high school and Diann was limited in her competition to just Arkansas."

Diann, a native Arkansan from Blytheville, Arkansas, and Jody, who is from Janesville, Wisconsin, have had brief high school running experiences.

"Jody only started in the 10th grade and Diann when she was in the 11th," said their college coach. "I think this is one reason they have a lot of capability they haven't reached. They have tremendous potential to develop into top class athletes, but they are different.

"Jody has a tendency to have a lot of injuries. This is something she is going to have to overcome to develop to her full potential. When she overcomes these in-

juries and is able to have a long, steady season, there's no telling what type of season she may have.

"Diann doesn't get hurt," Renfrow continued. "She's been a workhorse for us in meets and has been real durable in the amount of running she can do and also stay away from injuries. She has a real good attitude and she's very competitive. She doesn't hold anything back. That'll help her reach the national caliber I think she's capable of.

"Both Diann and Jody have shown they're not afraid of top competition. They'll get in there and battle with anybody and know they can come out on top. It's confidence."

"I'm a competitive person," Jody said. "I like to set high goals. To be good, it takes a lot of determination and hard work. I think 95 percent of it is psychological — how much you want to do it."

But mixed in with this overt will to win is a bit of superstition. When it's time to begin the race, Jody's ideosyncrasies are visible to the astute observer.

"I put my hair in seven braids," she said. "I've put 21 in before, but it takes too long and seven is a multiple of 21. And Mickey Mouse brings me good luck too." Orange socks, butterfly earrings and an assortment of other "helpers" are always with Jody when she's competing. There may be something to it, though, as she points out, "I'll be 21 for the '80 Olympics."

Diann's claim to habits rests in wearing school colors. While traveling to away meets and during competition, cardinal and white clothing is what she dons.

Unlike Jody, Diann is not a distance runner. At the 1979 indoor nationals at the University of Missouri, Columbia, Jody took second in the mile run at 4:50.88 and Diann became the national champion in the 600 in 1:21.22. It was only the second time she had run the 600.

"I guess I never thought I'd do any distance longer than the 440," Diann said. "When I do middle distance, if I don't start off fast enough," she noted with a smile, "I have time to catch up."

And catch up is what she does best as the anchor leg on the mile relay team. "I like being the anchor leg," Diann said. "If you're behind and you pull it up, it's kind of like doing the whole thing yourself. It's really exciting. I nearly block out everything. I just see the track, until I run up on her."

Spectators watched Diann anchor Arkansas' mile relay team to a third place finish at the 1979 AIAW indoor nationals, but what they didn't realize was in the early hours of that morning, Coach Renfrow had to take Diann to the hospital because she was suffering from severe headache pains. The hospital attendant said it was from stress.

"Before a meet," Diann said, "I'll just make up my mind I won't be scared and be in bed early. I'll also stretch before I'll go to bed. The day of the meet, I'm so nervous, I just try to lie down and think. But after the event is over, the whole track meet is such a relief."

During the indoor nationals, Diann had just a short break between her individual event and the mile relay, and Jody, who also ran in the mile relay, barely had enough time to recover between events. Their winning team spirit prevailed.

Part of Jody's individual spirit begins to form a while prior to a race. "I need to psych up a few days before the meet," she said, "to look at what I want to do time-

wise and place-wise and dream what's going to happen. You've got to think through your race," she advises, "and plan and take into consideration your competition.

"When I'm in my race, I talk to myself. I usually don't hear other people yelling at me. I try strengthening my stride and getting stronger. What I've noticed lately is because of my running, I'm a happier

person. When I'm running, I'm out on my own.

"I run twice a day. Eat, sleep, study and run — that's all it seems I do. But I enjoy it."

Satisfaction is what Diann gets from running too, but this may not have been the case if she had taken up another sport — basketball.

"The same year I went out for track," said the Arkansas native, "I went out for basketball first. But it would have taken me some time to learn all the basketball moves, so I dropped going out for basketball and went out for track.

"I was always interested in track and I had a good friend and we'd always run together and she was running track and I wasn't. Everybody else was doing something and I wasn't doing anything — not participating in anything — and I thought I'd be some help to the team so I joined.

"My coach was my physical education teacher and she noticed I had speed and she'd been hoping I'd go out for the team."

Her coach wasn't disappointed. "I was the first girl in the state to run the 440 in under a minute, in 57.5," said Diann of her high school days. "It was exciting, but I didn't get a big head. And all the events I competed in, I came in first."

Now that she's at the U of A and is

running with and against higher caliber athletes from more states than Arkansas, she's still comfortable that she belongs and hasn't gotten in over her head.

"I've really enjoyed this year as far as track is concerned," Diann said. "The competition is not as tough as I thought it would be. From what I had been hearing I didn't think I'd be able to compete against these people, but from what I've seen, I stopped thinking like that 'cause I'm in college too and they're just about on the same level I'm on. I just didn't know I'd do this well."

On this same line of thought, Jody said, "I think running collegiate is a lot more than I expected. It takes a lot of time, but running well takes a lot of time. It's also neat running against 'names'."

When she was in high school, Jody was first in her state of Wisconsin in the mile and cross country, fifth in the National Junior Olympics in the three mile event, besides collecting an assortment of fast times in the shorter races. She was on the boys' cross country team her senior year and was co-captain too. "I had a good time running with the guys," she said.

Jody comes from a string of avid runners and quickly points out, "I guess it all 'runs' in the family," but an earlier experience almost discouraged her. "I started running in the ninth grade and had a collapsed lung, so I quit and didn't run my ninth grade year. In tenth grade I really began and my senior year was my first in cross country."

Both Jody's and Diann's first year of collegiate running has been guided by Coach Renfrow.

"We're trying to bring them along relatively slowly so they don't peak out. They both have a lot of running capability that we haven't tapped. Overall, our program is a young program," he said, "in our attempts to do well nationally. That's the only reason the freshmen are doing so well.

It's going to take two to three years before the upper-classmen are leaders because it'll be the ones who are freshmen right now. I feel our program is just barely off the ground, but we've come a long way in just this one year's time.

"What I'm going to try to do," said the Lady Razorbacks' coach, "is recruit quality athletes. We don't have to have a lot of athletes to get a lot of recognition nationally.

"Diann and Jody are two athletes bringing recognition to themselves and the school. They have the qualities we're going to be looking for. They've been a pleasure in coaching.

"With athletes like that, it makes coaching a lot easier. You've got it made."

They're different, but they're similar too.

## MARITA KOCH WORLD ATHLETE OF THE YEAR

By virtue of her outstanding season and two new world records, Marita Koch of East Germany was voted World Athlete of the Year by the 30 WTW correspondents from 18 nations. Koch was the number one choice of 19 voters and won with 113 points to become only the second athlete in history to win World Athlete of the Year honors for two years in a row. Only three athletes received first place votes, Koch, the USA's Evelyn Ashford and Norway's Grete Waitz. So tough was the competition in this pre-Olympic year that Bulgaria's Totka Petrova, who led the world in both the 800 and 1500, received only six points in fifth place. ## SAKINA BOUTAMINE African Athlete of the Year

When this magazine began selecting Athlete's of the Year in 1967, the continent of Africa was in hiding. That year only three countries had athletes who received votes: South Africa was represented by five athletes, Nigeria by two and Kenya by one. In 1957, I coached and taught in a Muslim nation (Iraq) for a year, and the idea of having a female perform athletics was as foreign as an idea could be. And so this year's winner, from Algeria marks a great breakthrough for women in this part of the world. Most of the African nations have provided nominees for this yearly honor over the past years, but this is the first time an athlete from the Muslim sector of the continent has not only been a winner, but even in contention. Boutamine scorched a 4:10.6 for 1500 meters and seems headed for a possible spot in the Olympics final next summer. Seventeen athletes received votes, 12 of them were first place winners from our correspondents.

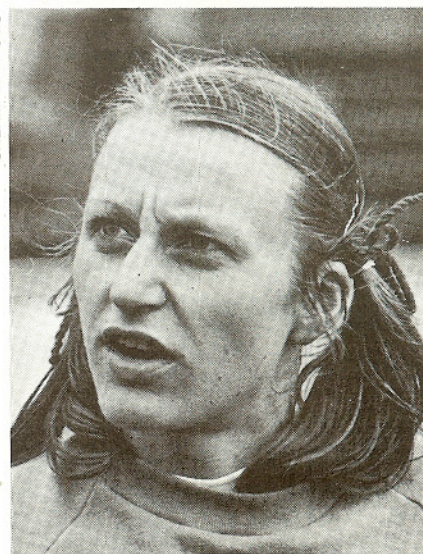

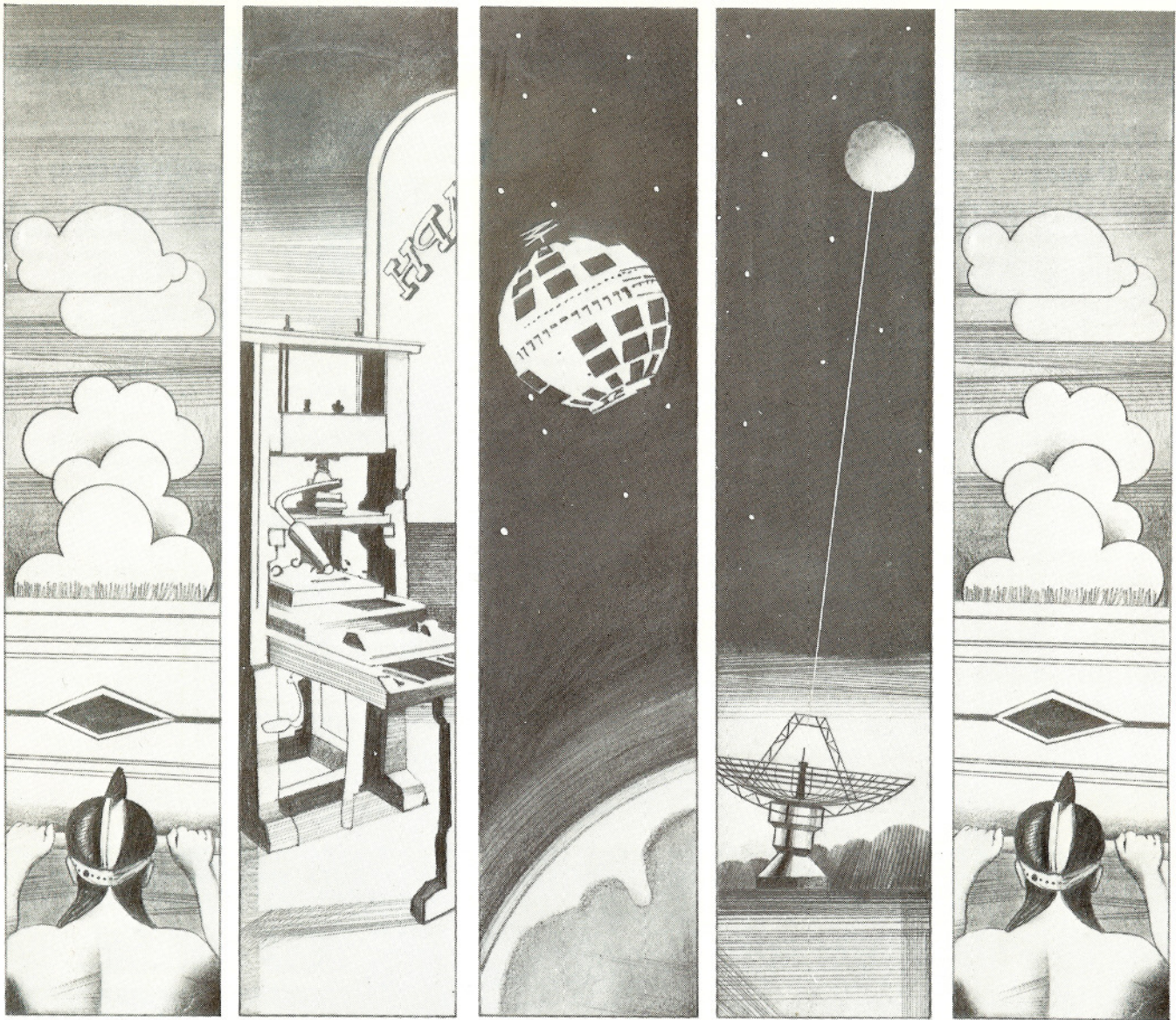

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# China's Ace Jumper — Zheng Dazhen

At the fourth Sino-Japanese track and field meet held in Beijing in July of 1979, Zheng Dazhen flopped over the bar at 1.89/6'2½ — 5½ inches over her own height. One month earlier, at the Asian Track and Field Meet in Tokyo, Zheng had carried off the high jump title with a 1.87/6'1¾ jump.

Born to a civil servant in Fujian's Xiamen (Amoy) province 19 years ago, Zheng Dazhen began to show her vivacious character in early childhood.

As a toddler she never tired of bounding about all the time. At primary school she was very fond of skipping with her playmates or inviting them to a "jumping contest" to see who could reach some tree leaves in the air. Eager to do well in everything, Dazhen was rated one of the best in her class not only in conduct and school work, but also in sports. She frequently came on top at her school's athletic meets, and was chosen to take part in competitions held at the municipal and

provincial levels. By the time she attended middle school, she was already well known in her locality.

In 1973, China's premier high jumper Ni Zhiqin and his coach Huang Jian came to Xiamen on an exhibition tour. Dazhen, then 14, was one of the six junior athletes selected by the local spare-time sports school to accompany the visitors at sports performances. With a flair for recognizing athletic talent, Coach Huang quickly spotted Dazhen's potential although she

was the shortest of the six, and he encouraged her to train hard with a view to representing her country in future international competitions.

In June of the following year, young Dazhen showed sparkling form and straddled over the bar at 1.48/4'10<sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> to place first in the provincial junior division championships. Her powerful spring and excellent physical attributes attracted attention in athletic circles. Three months later, using newly acquired flop technique, she cleared 1.51/4'11<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>, and by the end of the year she had raised this mark another half inch.

By this time, Dazhen was mature enough to realize she was not just jumping for fun; she had to undergo serious training to upgrade her performance. To build up her stamina she practiced takeoffs wearing a weighted vest, doing a hundred repetitions in each session while the others did only 80. She always took great pains to fulfill her assignments with exactitude.

In 1975 Dazhen had her first international experience at the World Middle School Student's Games in Paris, finishing seventh with a jump of 1.65/5'5. At the Third National Games held later that year, she won the girl's high jump at 1.69/5'6<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>, an improvement of 6<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> inches in less than a year!

In the following two years Dazhen continued to improve her performance, leaping 1.76/5'9<sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> in 1976 and 1.78/5'10 in 1977 in spite of an injury.

The year 1978 was a most fruitful one for Dazhen. Taken on by Coach Huang Jian for special training, she made amazing progress clearing 1.82/5'11<sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> at the preliminaries for the national athletic meet and equalling the national record of 1.83/6'0 in her first encounter with Japan's Tamami Yagi at the Third Sino-Japanese track and field meet in Tokyo. On the latter occasion, she displayed great fortitude and perseverance. As a result of bad weather caused by a brewing typhoon and the unfamiliar track conditions in Japan, Dazhen fell on her first attempt at 1.75/5'9, scratching her left knee, injuring her left ankle, and ripping open her right shoe. Being the only Chinese jumper remaining in the competition she was determined to continue and, with her right foot bare and her left knee bandaged, she successfully cleared the bar.

Dazhen always keeps an open mind toward innovate trends and unique styles. When world-record holder Sara Simeoni was in China after the Sino-

Japanese meet, Dazhen, still favoring her injured leg, carefully watched the Italian jumper's movements and started to correct her own by strengthening her swinging leg through intensified weight training. A month later, she set a national record by soaring over the bar at 1.84/6'0<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> at an athletic contest in Wuhan, although she had not yet completely recovered from her injury.

At the Eighth Asian Games held in December 1978, Dazhen cleared the bar at 1.88/6'2 to foil the challenge of Japan's highly favored Tamami Yagi and capture the women's high jump title.

After Dazhen's return to her native

town of Xiamen from the Asian Games, her teachers and schoolmates came to offer their congratulations while admiring her trophy and all the badges, albums, dolls and other souvenirs she had received from friends at home and abroad. She was invited to give a talk at her school and, in keeping with a Chinese tradition, was presented with a giant crimson flower and a red scarf by the Young Pioneers.

Encouraged by her successes, Dazhen is now working hard in preparation for the forthcoming track season and the Olympic Games.

## Groos AAU Champ

Raleigh, North Carolina, November 24 — Virginia's Margaret Groos, abandoning her 1979 distance role as bridesmaid, won the big one here today with some different tactics and a strong finish. Groos and Lynn Jennings led the pack of crack runners over the first half of the race but over the final mile, Groos steadily pulled ahead to defeat her constant nemesis Julie Shea by 10 seconds. Practically every top distance runner in the States was on hand to bid for a spot on the international cross country team which will race next March in Paris. Joining Groos and Shea will be veterans Jan Merrill, Brenda Webb, Jennings and Joan Benoit. Defending champion Julie Brown, still suffering from an injured hamstring, was forced to drop out of the race at the halfway mark.

Here's one coach's view of the Raleigh setup (name withheld): "The Raleigh course was really great, but they had a crack team of militant morons as meet organizers. They raced around in jeeps all through the day screaming at people to get so far back off the course that you had to have binoculars to see anything. They all had wind breakers of identical color, all the officials, and they operated like a military unit out of a Peter Seller's

movie. I had never seen so many thoroughly stupid people in one group at one time! At the coaches meeting the night before, questions were met with antagonism by the meet director — the other officials were somewhat more pleasant, but no more sharp — probably because he didn't have any answers. The finish line procedure wasn't worth a damn, and they mixed up a lot of places. The entry to the chute (wooden chutes like for cattle) were too close to the finish line itself, runners couldn't slow down between the line and the chutes, officials didn't have room to sort them when people finished fast in a group, which occurred many, many times, and it was messy. They tried like hell, and they had a super course, but they could have used an average intellect or two on their organizing committee. There was nothing more frustrating than to arrive in Raleigh at 3 p.m. on Friday with kids running in several different age groups the next day to discover there were no course maps at Meet Headquarters, none in our packets, none in the meet program, none posted on the course, and to mill around out there with about 2,000 other people trying to sort out the maze of courses, cones, flags and trails."

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## AIAW Championships

Tallahassee, Florida, November 17 — Julie Shea and her North Carolina State teammates finished their 1979 cross country season by capturing the AIAW Division I Championship. It was a hard fought battle for the team title with the winners scoring a huge 108 points and only 34 points separating the first four teams. Iowa State, who had never lost an AIAW title, finished far down the line in ninth position as Oregon moved in for second spot followed by Penn State and Wisconsin/Madison. Arizona surprised highly ranked Virginia for sixth with University of California and Michigan State both slipping in ahead of the defending champions.

Margaret Groos, Virginia, and Shea, along with Lynn Jennings of Princeton, had a close battle for individual honors with Shea getting the bid by just under two seconds. Jennings was less than a second behind Groos. Some big names finished far behind the leaders as some runners and coaches criticized the course. Wisconsin's Pete Tegen, who relies on movement by his runners over the final half of the race stated, "The course narrowed to 10 feet for about a mile and a half and our runners were unable to pass along with the other 100 runners boxed in. From 25th to 125th place finished within 15 seconds of one another due to the course with many of the runners finishing fresh. The course was really a disadvantage for the runner who starts slow and finishes strong."

But the biggest foulup of the day was the computer, scheduled to provide complete results within 15 minutes. Due to computeritis, results were not known until more than six hours after the last runner had trudged across the line and many of the teams were already on their way home.

The Air Force Academy scored a real surprise by winning the Division II title over favored Seattle Pacific and Villanova. Air Force's first runner was only in seventh position, but their fifth runner was only 29th and they won by 26 points. Seattle Pacific's Joan Corbin took individual honors over Villanova's Bridg Leddy.

Cal State Hayward ended a super season by winning the Division III title with the lowest score of the day, 56 points as only 65 seconds separated their first finisher, Michelle Aubuchon, from their fifth runner. Bowdoin's marathoner Joan Benoit took the individual honors in Division III.

## Vickie Cook Wins L'eggs/YWCA 10,000

Santa Monica, Calif., November 30 — The streets were void of cars and filled with runners here on a beautiful Sunday morning, November 11. More than 600 women, ranging in age from nine to 63, gathered from throughout greater Los Angeles for the area's first L'eggs/YWCA 10,000 meter run for women.

Pre-race expectations called for a classic confrontation between youth and experience. Youth being in the person of 15-year-old Vickie Cook of Northridge, and experience represented by world class runners, Bev Shingles, 39, of New Zealand, and Miki Gorman, 44, of Los Angeles. Shingles, a week earlier, won the L.A. Women's Marathon. Gorman has won many races, including the Boston and New York City Marathons.

It was an extremely competitive race, with 12 women finishing the 6.2 mile course in under 40 minutes. High schooler Cook won the race in a personal best of 35:07. Shingles crossed the tape 17 seconds later, closely followed by Gorman in 35:47.

When the starting cannon boomed, Yvonne Yanke, 21, of Seal Beach, raced out to a 100 yard lead for the first mile. She was unable to hold her pace and fell back to finish fourth.

Cook, Shingles and Gorman, running side by side, separated themselves from the crowd. At the 3 1/2 mile mark, Cook started moving ahead. When she neared the finish at the Santa Monica College track, she had a lead of 100 yards.

"I didn't expect to win," Cook said after the race. "I just came to run. It helped running with Bev and Miki. They just kept pushing us harder." She was excited about winning a trip to New York to compete in the L'eggs Mini Marathon next May 31. Already a veteran at 15, Cook has been running for nine and a half years.

Eleven-year-old Carol Doody of Upland had extra eyes focused on her. A camera crew from NBC's "Real People" television show is doing a segment on the young runner who was unable to collect her award for winning her age group. She had to rush to Huntington Beach, TV cameras in tow, to run with her school

teammates at the State women's cross country championships.

Margaret Miller chukled one up for experience. The 53-year-old from Thousand Oaks finished 18th overall, in an incredible 40:45.

For Denise Chiesa, 27, of Santa Monica, it was a special day. The L'eggs/YWCA 10,000 was her first race after running only three months. It was also her birthday.

The last runner to cross the finish line was Diane Graham, a student at Pasture Junior High in Los Angeles. This was her fourth race, but the first she was able to finish.

Sharon Barbano, a top U.S. runner and spokesperson for L'eggs, said the race was "an important and dramatic way of showing that women can run longer distances than the 1,500 meters they are now permitted to run in Olympic competition."

## National High School C.C. Champions

San Diego, California, December 8 — The first-ever high school cross country national championships ever staged in the United States turned into a tight battle for the team championships as the Northeast edged the Western team by only two points, 29 to 31. Sponsored by the Kinney Shoe Company, athletes qualified for this championship meet through a series of five divisional meets staged in Houston, New York, Chicago, San Francisco and Atlanta. More than 4000 runners from 35 states took part in these regional qualifying meets. Seven runners from each region were flown to San Diego by the Kinney Shoe people, housed at the sumptuous Hyatt Islandia and provided with uniforms, bags and warmups.

The meet, in beautiful Balboa Park, was well run except for two items: first, there was no official meet program and second, all runners were given the exact same uniform making it impossible to tell who belonged to which of the five competing teams. Meet Director was Fred LaPlante, coach of the San Diego State University team, and the starter was wife Deby, the American record holder for the 100 meter hurdles.

Favored for the individual title at race time was Idaho's undefeated Ellen Lyons, a member of the West squad. Teammate Vicki Cook of California was also getting some votes as a possible winner with Ann Gladue of New Jersey (Northeast) the favored long shot.

As the teams lined up for the start, the fact of the similar uniforms was most

apparent and unless one had a program (and there was none), it was impossible to tell one team from another in their baggy blue shorts with yellow, white and blue jerseys.

True to predictions, Lyons leaped ahead at the gun in what appeared to be a 100 meter dash and at the 100 mark she was, indeed taking a commanding, if not risky, early lead.

At the one mile mark, it was still Lyons leading in about 5:12. Lynne Strauss of the Northeast team, Vicki Cook and Roxanne Bier were her closest opponents. Meanwhile, Ann Gladue (Northeast) took off slowly and had begun to work her way up through the pack. At the two mile mark, Lyons roared past in under 10 minutes, but with less than a mile to go, Strauss took over the lead with Lyons hanging on. With 800m to go, Lyons regained command for the final time and finished the 5000m course in a new course record of 17:28.8, some 50 meters ahead of a fading Strauss. Lyons thereby completed her unbeaten season.

Ann Gladue overtook all but the first two finishers to finish third and Roxanne Bier of California (West) just nipped Suzanne Girard (Northeast) at the tape for the fourth spot. It was a case of Roxanne leaning at the finish and Suzanne staying straight up.

Final scores saw the Northeast team win the title 29 to 31 over the West. Other

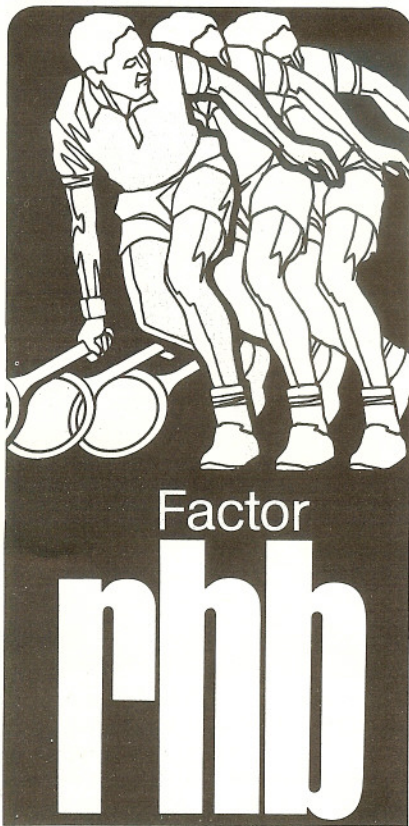
