# EAT YOUR BREAKFAST

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# LETTER FROM DON CALLAHAN, Whittier

"OK, I've had it! The Sunskist Indoor meet at the LA Sports Arena on January 19, has reached a new low in the scheduling of women's events.

"For those unaware, they had three women's events and one age-group relay. To top that off, the most outstanding effort of the meet was a new world indoor record in the 1000 yards by fifteen year old Mary Decker.

"Three guesses who got the post-meet publicity. You're right on the first guess. The male types. After all, had they not run a 4:04.6 mile. Big deal!!!

"Don't go away, there's more. They had a full schedule of boy's high school and some junior college events.

"If transportation money was the so-called problem, let me suggest to the sponsors and meet director that there are more outstanding women track and field athletes in southern California than can be found anywhere in the United States. Imagine an athlete of Martha Watson's ability having to be content to run on a relay team because there was no 60y dash and no long jumo.

"Where or where oh where do the powers that be think women are going to get the experience if they are time after time and year after year kept out of these meets?

"The weak-knees in the AAU should have long ago made it a standard requirement that a full schedule of women's events be included in this type meet or none of the meets could get the required sanction. Fat chance!! They will not rock the Boat of Change.

"The day of change is at hand, however. Just as Billie Jean King has brought some equality to women's tennis, change will be the natural order of things in women's track and field. The women themselves must do it. If they wait for others, nothing will happen.

"Maybe the Sunkist Company doesn't like the ladies. They did not see fit to include a couple of women track and field athletes on their Rose Parade float on New Year's day in Pasadena. Had they used two or three, the float and the Sunkist name would have received much more attention. Imagine a couple of lookers like Martha Watson or Chi Cheng riding the Rose Parade float! Hmmmmmm.

"The answers are out there somewhere. We must find them."

# LETTER FROM DON FOLTZ, Washington

"We enjoyed the fine reporting on the National Cross Country Championships; however, the editorializing on how non-representative the meet is I think was naive.

"It was implied the meet was not a "National" one because there were so few teams and individuals from the eastern part of the United States. It was inferred easterners didn't score because of lack of travel funds and/or inconveniences in getting to the meet.

"In the first place, Albuquerque is a relatively central location and secondly, to anyone following women's XC for the past 10 years, it is a fact of life that the main action has always been in the west. This is where the sport started and factors such as better organization, climate, publicity and tradition has had a snowballing effect. That is, more quality competition begets development of new athletes and attracts standouts from the east to migrate, (e.g. Bonner, Anderson, Bridges, McIntyre, Brown) and so on.

"I suspect that when the meet returns to the east next year the results will again, as always, be primarily western because those individuals or teams which have a realistic chance to score in a national meet you can bet will show up regardless of what sacrifices have to be made."

## ALLWOOD'S WR 60 RULED 'ROLLING START'

Word has reached WTFW from Meet Director Hugo Pruter that the world record equalling 6.5 60y sprint by Jamaica's Rose Allwood at West Point last November has been ruled officially by the starter and the Meet Director as a "rolling start" and therefore disallowed.

# LETTER FROM CATHY ROWLAND, California

"In reference to Nov/Dec "Kaleidoscope" quote on HS track that "there is still a long way to go in educating the women coaches in the intricacies of the sport", I believe I recognized the coaches meeting at which the recounted dialogue took place. It could only be the San Antonio League and the one man present could only be Richard Ede. I am one of the women coaches of that league; but I am only hazarding a guess since the league co-ordinator (Richard Ede) inadvertently forgot to invite me.

"While I concede that women coaches are novices at their new assignments, I feel that the author of that quipe has little understanding of where girl's HS athletics and women coaches are at. Before we endure another season of off-thecuff, put-down comments aimed at making we women at the HS level feel like non-colleagues, let me ask what AAU, WTFW, and Richard Ede have done lately to advance the position of women track coaches? Do you want to see female leadership develop at the HS level and women finally integrate AAU coaching ranks where they should have been all along, or do you really want to replace what few women are into coaching with men so you can all relax and get the job done "right"?

"As an undergraduate and hopeful track coach, I had to fight my way into a class titled "Principles of Coaching Track". As a lone and un-welcome female in the class, I battled with officiating assignments where all I was allowed to do was hold the finish yarn. When we were assigned to assist a coach of our choice for three weeks, I flunked because there were no women coaches in the area and no male coach would accept me as an apprentice. And on and on and on. And this from a State University in 1969!

"As a strong supporter of girls' athletics I applaude what AAU has done for girl's track. I believe that in addition to good competitive programs, girls need supervision from strong and competent women who can act as role models and help dispel the notion that girls can take coaching only from a man.

"What we need now is experience and a chance to learn from our mistakes. What we don't need is the pompous, chauvinistic attitude of many male coaches who feel they must guide, correct and scoff behind our backs."

(Ed. note:-Most of what you say is true. I have been involved with track and field athletics since I first competed 'way back in 1926 and I am sure no one can consider me anything but "pro-women's track". I think what most male coaches object to is that the women/girls want the equality yet when they begin with the sport, the first thing they do is sit down and modify this and change that "because they are girls".

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## REPLY FROM RICH EDE

"Your comments regarding the uphill battle for equality on the part of women track coaches and the role of a strong woman coach in acting as a role model are well taken, although I bridle somewhat at the implication that girl athletes can take coaching only from a woman. I, for one, hope that I am doing my part to provide future such strong women coaches by providing a competitive program for female high school athletes which departs from the "punch-and-cookies" attitude which still permeates programs run even by some women who have relatively recent collegiate competitive experiences. At my own school, this is the first year that the accepted, womenrun sports have had any after-school practice time because "the girls musn't get tired". Even the entry and event limitations adopted at the meeting mentioned reflect the view, on the part of the <u>women</u> coaches present, that girls should not strain themselves, (the votes on <u>all</u> measures cited in WTFW were 3-1 along sex lines).

"With regard to what the AAU, WTFW have done lately to advance the position of women track coaches, I would like to ask you, in return, how many women have tried to become track coaches of the strength that, I agree, is badly needed? WTFW has long taken the stand that what is needed in girls track and field is strong coaching, not strong men or strong women. The AAU coaches clinics have been actively seeking participation by women, with minimal response, (but, fortunately, increasing interest). I believe we are only now coming to a point where high school and college athletes, most of whom have come through the AAU ranks, will be reaching positions of influence in the California high school athletic programs.

"I apologize for the implication in "Kaleidoscope" that only women coaches hold the above attitudes toward women in sports. I think we both recognize that this is not the case. However, I feel that the printing of the adopted rules, (and their reasoning), was intended both as a status report on "where girls HS athletics and women coaches are at", and a commentary on where they should be, rather than a "pompous attack on female coaches".

# BAREFOOT SCHOOLGIRL NEWEST KENYA SENSATION

Nairobi, Kenya:-She is only 14, a shy graceful Kenyan schoolgirl with long legs and wide eyes. She lives in a mud hut and tends the cattle on the family farm.

She ran her first big race barefoot and in an old pink petticoat, because she could not afford to buy a pair of spikes, running shorts and a T-shirt.

Sabina Chebichi is Kenya's newest athletic discovery. Already she is favored to become as renowned as fellow Kenyans Kipchoge Keino. Earlier this year, Sabina ran the 800 meters well within the Commonwealth Games qualifying limit of 2:10.

The Games at Christchurch, NZ, in February will be her first top-class international meeting. Kenyan athletics officials predict that it will be far from the last. Beyond

Christchurch are the Montreal Olympics in 1976. "I love running. I love to hear the crowds shouting. It

makes me want to run faster", Sabina says. She first heard the road of the crowds shouting at this

year's opening meeting of the Kenyan athletics season, in the little tea-growing highlands community of Kericho. There she swept gracefully around the track in a time of 2:16 for 800m. She also ran the 1500 meters in 4:40, one second slower than the winning time at the Pan-African Games earlier in the year.

Feisal Sherman of the Kenya AAA was so impressed that he bought her a track suit, spikes, shorts and T-shirt. In Sardinia, on an Italian tour, Sabina set a record for the island of 2:12 for the 800 meters.

With the Christchurch Commonwealth Games and then the Montreal Olympics in her diary, Sabina's swift feet promise to carry her far from the secluded life of a peasant girl in Kenya's western highlands. Sabina belongs to the Elgeyo tribe, a branch of the sturdy, martial Kalenjin peoples who help form the backbone of Kenya's army and police.

Sabina's family is poor. Her brother-in-law sold his only bull for \$36 to help meet the costs of her tour to Italy and Israel. She is one of eight children. Her prowess on the track and her trips abroad have made her father a respected voice in the councils of the tiny village of Kipsaos. He says his daughter may make her life in athletics "if that is what will bring her happiness." All the same, the pressure of tribal custom leads him to wonder whether marriage, a home and children would not be more appropriate.

Many Kalenjin girls are betrothed at 14. "I do not want to be a wife and have children. I like to run and I want to keep on running," Sabina says. But pressures to conform, and the family's rustic poverty will nonetheless prove obstacles to Sabina's career.

At school, Sabina loves history and loathes math. School begins at 7:30 every morning. By that time, Sabina has already completed a two mile training run and helped to prepare breakfast at the farm belonging to her brother-in-law. In the three room grass thatched home, Sabina's running spikes and a brand new suitcase share a storeroom with a heap of corn cobs.

Sabina has no boy friends. Her strict Christian upbringing forbids dance-hall nights out. They would disapprove of the kind of friendships that western girls, and their parents, regard as normal. If she does marry, custom demands that the bridegroom's parents pay a bride price - currently around three cows and a half dozen sheep.

Surely 1973 must be remembered as "The Year of the Sprinter". Except for Kathy Schmidt of North America, every winner of WTFW's "Athlete of the Year" was a sprinter including the overall winner, Renate Stecher. Renate was born on May 12, 1950. She stands 5'7 and is 158 pounds. A powerful, yet feminine, individual. During the past season she has been responsible for seven world record performances in the two sprints and the 4x100m relay. Undefeated since 1971, Stecher ended up with marks of 10.8 for 100m and 22.1 for the 200m sprint, plus 42.6 over the 4x100. Renate is ranked Number one in the world in both sprints for the second consecutive year. She won the two dashes at the European Cup Championships. The voting this year was done by 41 WTFW correspondents from 26 different nations. (The list of voters can be found elsewhere in this issue.) The scores listed below show the number of first place votes in parenthesis.

A ding-dong battle between two outstanding runners, neither of whom finished the 1973 season. Esther Shachamorov-Rot of Israel was forced to stop in mid-year because of pregnancy. Chi Cheng, while running well at times, was handicapped by a muscle injury which finally required surgery. In spite of both athletes short season, they dominated Asia in the 100, 200, 400 and hurdles. Chi Cheng ran to times of 13.4 in the hurdles, 10.7 and 24.1 in the sprints and 56.1 for the 440 before bowing out to the surgeon's scalpel.

# 1973 WORLD RANKINGS by JAN POPPER

For the seventh consecutive year, "Women's Track and Field World" is privileged to present the World Rankings as compiled by Czechoslovakia's Jan Popper. In compiling these Rankings, Popper has culled more than ten thousand results throughout the year and for the 1973 Rankings, he was forced to operate alone due to the Postal strikes in Italy which negated assistance from his usual partner Elio Trifari. Rankings are certainly a better method of determining who has been tops in each event than merely taking the World List at face value whereby a performer might benefit from one single performance. A reminder that the rankings are arrived at by consideration of 1) major honors won, 2) won-loss record, and 3) sequence and quality/ quantity of marks. Popper is using a new format for the 1973 Ranking and we are printing the marks made by the number one athlete, the ten best marks made by the next nine and only the single best performance by numbers 11 through 20.

100 METERS/100 YARDS The third consecutive season of RENATE STECHER's reign as the world's fastest woman was marked by no less than seven world records, four of them at 100 meters and one in the 400m relay. Her first 10.9 came after a dingdong fight with the Cuban pair at the Golden Spike Meet in Ostrava, Czechoslovakia, on June 7<sup>th</sup>; the next two 10.9 clockings were achieved in a more relaxed way during the DDR-GB-Bulgaria triangular and then in a heat of the DDR Championships. Then, on the same afternoon on Dresden's tartan track, Renate stamped through the classic distance with 53% strides in her hard, strong and fast frequence style. The time - :10.8. (Coincidence; Renate wore the number 108 during that race.) With that performance, the DDR ace diminished the space between men's and women's world bests to a startling 9.1%; compared to longer races, her 10.8 is worth 47.7 for 400, 1:53 for 800, 3:50 for 1500 - and so on!

Instead of being far better than any other runner, Stecher's dominance was threatened most remarkably by a relative newcomer, Finland's MONA-LISA PURSIAINEN, (Born June 21, 1951). A loser in the Munich Olympics 400m semis, the former Miss Strandvall, a niece of the Finnish 400m Olympic participant in Los Angeles in 1932, reverted to shorter sprints most successfully and defeated as many world-class sprinters as did Stecher. She got down to 11.19 at Warsaw European Cup semi, 11.41 at the Universiad, and finally 11.0 in a small Helsinki meet. The Pursiainen-Stecher duel never materialized, so both remained unbeaten at this distance for 1973.

Polish vet IRENA SZEWINSKA celebrated her busiest season ever with 30 100m races, including FOUR 11.1's. Her all time total of 11.4 (or better) marks is now an incredible 75! She is ranked third despite a 2-2 score against SILVIA CHIVAS, whose form decreased from three 11.1's in June to mediocrity in August. The Cuban sprinter, who has nine brothers and sisters, (and started her career with a very mediocre 13.6 in a school meet at Santiago de Cuba back in 1969), was plagued by injuries. Even so, her overall record easily dominated the following group.

By the strength of her Edinburgh European Cup final appearance, ANNEGRET RICHTER, nee Irrgang, is ranked ahead of the two most bitter domestic rivals of Stecher, DORIS SELMIGKEIT, 21 years old and never faster than 11.4 in previous seasons who twice ran 11.0 at the DDR Championships, and PETRA KANDAAR, who as Petra Vogt was the most promising DDR talent in 1969. Richter had a 7-1 score over Kandarr. From a very even group of other contenders, I chose for the next place the United States' IRIS DAVIS, who remained unbeaten in domestic competition and ran some fast, even if wind-aided, 100y times. GFR champ ELFGARD SCHITTENHEIM, runner-up to Mona-Lisa at Moscow, and ELLEN STROPHAL, another DDR speedster who was 3rd at the Universiad, closed out the Top Ten ranking despite some domestic losses. In general, the sprinting standard of the DDR in 1973 was sufficiently high to enable four girls from that country to rank in the top ten.


# FLASH! LARRIEU GETS WORLD MILE MARK, 4:33.7

Portland, Oregon, January 26:-Francie Larrieu captured the world indoor mile record with a sparkling 4:33.7 here tonight. Larrieu's mark broke Tamara Pangelova's world record of 4:35.6 set at Richmond in 1973.

200 METERS/220 YARDS RENATE STECHER's favorite theme after her 10.9 world record in early June, was the furlong re-cord and she finally shattered that record by 0.3 one day after her 10.8 100m triumph in Dresden. "I must be very careful to maintain my present form until Montreal," she declared later, well aware of the increasing opposition facing her also in this longer sprint. Although she won all her important matches by a considerable margin, Renate almost lost to Yugoslavia's 19 year old surprise Jelica Pavlicic at Bratislava in June; she never met her two most dangerous opponents.

From this pair, IRENA SZEWINSKA is ranked second, perhaps a bit surprising to many, but the strength of her season combin-ed with her win over MONA-LISA PURSIAINEN at Warsaw justified it. The Finnish revelation, working 3-4 hours daily in preparation, did, in fact, better Stecher's electrical world best from Munich by a tenth during her Universiad triumph as Stecher's Dresden record races were measured by electronic devices unofficially. Both Szewinska and Pursiainen are thinking in terms of 22 flat for next year. We'll wait and see.

At least 15 girls were considered for the remaining Top Ten places. Such is the quality of this event that new US talent Jackie Thompson, (well beaten by the Aussies at the Pacific Games), and South Africa's world class woman athlete Claudie van Straaten, (who has 11 marks in the 22.9-23.4 range) failed to get into the select group. PETRA KANDARR-Vogt was the secondbest DDR runner overall and won an important European Cup semi race. MARINA SIDOROVA, considered by many the best Soviet dash potential for some seasons, came second to Mona-Lisa at the Universiad and to Renate at Meadowbank, beating 23 seconds dash potential for some seasons, came second to hand his at the only of the dash and the dash an her 2-1 score vs Robertson and her win over Thompson gave her a good place. DORIS MALETZKI, (born 11 June 1952), came in second behind Stecher at Dresden in an unbelievable 22.3, half a second under her previous best. The Berlin based student of financial economy scored 1-2 with Strophal and was 4th at the Universiad. DENISE ROBERTSON was 5th in this most important race of the year, lost to Boyle 1-2 and showed improving form in the autumn (22.9w). The Top Ten ranking is closed by DDR's fifth string, veteran CHRISTINE HEINICH who easily beat van Straaten in June. Fran Sichting, USA, was not considered as most of her races, outside of the US Champs, were against men.

## 400 METERS/440 YARDS

Sub-52 second times were rare in the post-Olympic season, and with last year's numbers 2-5 retiring (Seidler), or going back to the sprints (Fergerson), or unable/unwilling to reproduce their high 1972 standard, (Hammond and Wilden), the door was wide open for MONIKA ZEHRT. She lost two races in home meets, but won the DDR title as well as both European Cup appearances easily to remain Number 1 for another year.

Major honors are the most important ranking factors and so the Universiad title as well as the 51.53 record win at the Warsaw European Cup semi, backed by seven other sub-53 clockings gave NADYA KOLESNIKOVA plcae Number two. The Moscow blonde, born in the famous Cosack county of Kuban, bettered the USSR record four times. After two mediocre tries in June, MONA-LISA PURSIAINEN revealed famous potential over her original distance by running 51.27, (actually, two hand clockings had her in 51.0), against RITA KUHN on a very cool Helsinki afternoon. The wife of the Finnish high hurdles champion is the first woman ever ranked No 2 or 3 in the three shortest events although Chi Cheng was 1-1-3 for 1970. Kuhne, who ran 51.1 in a pre-Edinburgh warmup meet and beat Zehrt by 0.4 on that occasion, showed steady progress over the last few years. LILYANA TOMOVA, born 9 August 1946, exemplified the startling progress of many Bulgarian athletes. With a previous best

of 54.3, she won her National Championships with 52.4, surprised at the Balkan Games with 51.99 and evened her score with Kolesnikova to 1-1 with her second place at Edinburgh. And still she claims to be primarily an 800m runner!

From a big group of other contenders we finally chose JUDY CANTY, Australias PacGames winner and runner-up at Moscow, for the next position ahead of RITA WILDEN who won all her home races including the USA-GFR competition, but who was 3rd against USSR and 4th at the European Cup final. RENATE SIEBACH, nee Marder, came out of semi-retirement to run 51.8 and score 2-1 over younger GISELA ANTON (born 28 November 1954) in the fight for the DDR's third string position. In a very close decision CHARLENE RENDINA, the Aussie champ, was placed 10th ahead of indoor ace Verona Bernard and Yvonne Saunders, competing now for her THIRD country after Great Britain and Jamaica - Canada.

Irena Szewinska, who finally tried the 400m distance for the first time and ran a very relaxed 52.0, is not considered for this ranking for she never met competent rivals.

## 800 Meters/880 Yards

Experienced students of Ranking should not be surprised to find GUNHILD HOFFMEISTER ahead of new world record breaker SVYETLANA ZLATEVA in this event. The Cottbus teacher and the Sofia chemistry student met three times during the 1973 campaign in important races. Zlateva won the first clash at Berlin's Olympic Day by two-hundredths of a second, but Hoffmeister countered with a one-tenth win in the Leipzig triangular and when they met in the deciding third race, Hoffmeister won again by O.l in the windy European Cup final. In this race, Zlateva set the fastest known pace over the first 400m at 56.3 as Gunhild trailed by five meters and then came back with a fantasticly timed finish effort. The DDR ace, who won three other big races including the National Championships, bettered her personal best and moved to Number 4 on the All Time List. 21 year old Zlateva certainly has a brilliant future in the form of records and medals; her own prediction is: "Around Montreal, I should be able to run 1:56 after a 55-56 first lap". The pupil of coach Dimitri Volislavov, whose first 800m race back in 1966 was timed in 2:22.4, had a magnificent season although losing the Rotterdam indoor title and the Narodnamladezh meet in May badly and was forced to drop out of the Universiad final forty meters after a splendid 57.4 first lap. Her overall standard, (with 5 sub-2:00 marks plus a 1:58.8 relay and a 1:59.0 exhibition race in mid-summer), resulted in a startling world record in the Balkan Games. With ideal conditions at 10:00 o'clock in the evening in Athens, she covered the two laps in 57.0 and 60.5 to crack both Falck's official and Shin Keum Dan's unofficial marks by a considerable margin.


Bulgarias overall strength on this event is shown by LILYANA TOMOVA's third place ranking as well as Stefka Yordanova's 11<sup>th</sup> ranking plus new world records at 3x800 and 4x800 of the highest quality. Tomova, perhaps the most underrated runner in view of popular recognition, won the Universiad title and went to Number 5 on the All Time List. Another surprise, the USA's 14 year old MARY DECKER is ranked Number 4 in view of her Toronto and Minsk successes ahead of a very even group of opponents. NIOLE RAZIENE, nee SABAITE, was runner-up to Decker, Tomova and Hoffmeister in the most important races of the year; ELFI ROST, not yet w0 during her best races, won an important European Cup semi; ELZBIETA KATOLIK, formerly Skowronska, used her sub-53 quartermiling speed in many corageous front-running and dipped under two minutes in September; and MARITTA POLITZ did the same some weeks earlier in the Bulgaria-DDR return match. Honors won by Ireland's fighting MARY

TRACEY, (including a win over Zlateva at Frankfurt), appears to be a bit more worthy than HILDEGARD FALCK's achievements as the Munich winner lost two races, one against the Soviets and at Meadowbank, under par. Missing from the top ten for the first time in many years is Yugoslavia's Vera Nikolic, and also missing is Karin (Burneleit) Krebs, who in her only 800m race (in 2:00.1) beat only unranked opponents.

1500 METERS/ONE MILE Although never bettering 4:10 in her four major races of the season, GUNHILD HOFFMEISTER is our choice for the top spot here in addition to her number one ranking in the 800. This first-ever double in some sense is the highspot of Hoffmeister's decade-long career, and it was completed - as far as the 1500 is concerned - mainly by virtue of her important 1500m victory in the classic race aganist PAOLA PIGNI-CACCHI during the European Cup semi in Bucharest. After a medium tempo, they ran like devils over the last lap, timed in an unbelievable 58 seconds! Gunhild won by three tenths and remained unbeaten after previous successes against Krebs. Paola, the wife of the Italian chief coach Bruno Cacchi, whose daily 20kms are the basis for a 3000m title attempt in Rome and/or Montreal, won the most important race in a larger world scale at Moscow against Reiser and Petrova, and set the new world mile record at Viarreggio becoming the first female under the 4:30 mark.

Olympic Games heroing LYDMIIA BRAGINA took an easier turn this year, concentrating on speed progress, (she ran 800 in 2:03.5 and dreams of 2:00 for next year), lost the European Cup final but established herself as Number 3 a week later by beating KARIN KREBS, nee Burneleit, whose overall score of 2-1 against TONYA PETROVA decided the next positions. Krebs used a pre-Edinburgh meet for her seasonal best mark of 4:04.6. whereas Petrova crowned a good year by an unexpected EC final victory. Incidentally, Bulgaria's most promising 1500m exponent, Vasilena Amzina, has retired for a while for matrimony. A pair of youngsters earned much support, but ranking criterions are not open for sympathetic moods. INGER KNUT-SSON, Sweden's best track prospect ever, ran an impressive solo during the European Junior Championships and won five other races against Scandinavian and British runners. GLENDA REISER, Canada's revelation at Munich, nested the world mile mark early in July, came in second at the Universiad and finished her travels with a strong mile succes at the Coca-Cola meet in 'ondon. Both girls are first string potential in terms of Montreal.





HILDEGARD FALCK (GFR)

From a crowded group of almost even other contenders, British champ JOAN ALLISON gets the highest position ahead of European indoor champ ELLEN TITTEL who was weak in some important races, and Rumania's ILEANA SILAI who switched from the 800 to new terrain with fast times. Francie Larrieu, AAU and PacGames winner, lost too much in her unsuccessful appearances on Soviet soil.

## 100 METER HURDLES

The most undisputed top ranking in all the running events belongs to ANNELLE EHRHARDT, who started with a sizzling 8.02 60m clocking indoors at Rotterdam, won all major events with an overwhelming superiority and used the hyper-fast track at Dresden for a new world record of 12.3 - against a 1.5mps wind! This mark, a bit under-estimated in comparison with the publicity of other world records of 1973, calls for a symbolic example: When Annelie, a member of a very successful training group from Magdeburg, at last converted her style to the new distance in 1970, she ran 12.9 for the hurdles and 11.9 for 100m flat - now her speed is down to 11.3 - and 12.3!

GRAZYNA RABSZTYN, Poland's newest hurdle queen, met Anneleie only once - and lost by 0.3 secs. Outside of that, she won everything possible, including the Universiad title. The strength of her marks justifies her place ahead of another unbeaten hurdler, the USA's PAT JOHNSON, who went through a hard European campaign with clear wins against many ranking candidates. It should be noted that Pat is the highest ranked US track performer. Olympic silver medalist VALERIA BUFANU started the 1973 season on a high note, won three important internationals in a row, but marred her hopes by injury later. Nevertheless, she earns a high spot than Poland's and DDR's second stringers, TEREZA NOWAK and ANNEROSE KRUMPHOLZ. Nowak, a language talent whose first steps on the track were way back in 1957, lost to Rabsztyn each of the nine times they met, but her six 12.8-13.0 marks, as well as many important second places are worth enough. Krumpholz, in a 1-1 tie with Nowak, was second at Moscow and lost only to higher ranked athletes.

For the next dozen athletes with times from 13.0 to 13.3, Hungary's multi-talented ILONA BRUZSENYAK, (born 13 September 1950), won the highest spot mainly by her wins in the Hungary-GB dual (vs. Vernon) and at Sofia, (vs Nowak). JOHANNA SCHA-LLER, (born 13 September 1952), a DDR pentathlonist, improved by 0.7 to 13.0 and beat other home opponents, (Pollak 1-0, Eckert 1-0, Muller 2-1). English import JUDY VERNON ran many home races in the 14 second range, but rose to important

RITA KIRST, DDR

HIGH JUMP No single jumper went undefeated through the 1973 season which contributed eight marks to the All Time total of 20 jumps over 1.90/6'2%. YORDANKA BLAGOYEVA, who ranked Number One last year despite her loss in the Olympic Games, has earned the top spot once again without question. The mother of three year old Blagoy mastered 1.92/6'3% for a new world indoor best at Rotterdam, jumped over the same height at Warsaw when she won the first-ever competition in which two competitors were over 1.90/6'2%, and battled adverse conditions at Edingurgh to defeat her most dangerous rivals. She had 2-1 scores vs Gusenbauer and Ioan and was 2-0 over Witschas, Karbanova and Gildemeister which far outweighed her 1-1 vs Kirst.

ROSEMARIE WITSCHAS, the Cottbus-based surprise of the indoor season had an up and down season, but her two major honors, (DDR Champs and Bucharest EC semi), as well as her 4-3 score against teammate RITA (Schmidt) KIRST decided the question about No. 2. The young business economy student was still a bit aprehensive in big field competitions such as Rotterdam or Olympic Day. Kirst started in full gear beating Blagoyeva in May and winning the Olympic Day competition, but narowly lost three big top-season meets. Still, she had complete superiority over Gildemeister with seven wins and one tie. VIR-GINIA IOAN, as Miss Bonci was for many years a mediocre 1.70-1.75 (5'7-5'8%) jumper, rose to unexpected heights during the second part of the season, increasing her previous best finally by 9cm (3%") in conquoring both Blagoyeva and 1.90/6'2% at the Athens Balkan Games. Howver, she had negative scores with all the other higher ranked jumpers.

Marks over 1.85/6'0% were more common than last year and the decisions for the next three places of ranking were very close. RITA GILDEMEISTER was best at the European Indoor Championships (2nd) and the Berlin Youth Festival meet (3rd), beat Karbanova 1-0 and jumped over 1.85/60% five times. MILADA KARBANOVA, the new Czech record holder, was 3rd at Rotterdam and had a 1-1-1 tie with Ioan and four 1.85/6'0% or better marks. CORNELIA POPESCU, incidentally the first flopper in the 1973 rankings, won against Ioan only in their final clash of the year and lost the other five times, but has more high marks than the trailing contenders and had a new personal best of 1.88/6'2 in October. MILENA HUBNERGVA enjoyed her best-ever indoor season with a win over Witschas and also won three big meetings in June and was forced to retire with an injury. BARBARA LAWTON, O-1 with Hunerova, went to a pb in late September after a mediocre mid-season in the 1.80/5'10% range. In general, her results were even more than Simeoni's and Rudolf's whose spectacular national records were accompanied by many low placings during the year.

## LONG JUMP

After the 1972 boom, the standard of long jumping decreased rapidly; only one of the 54 all time best performances over 6.65/21'9% was achieved during 1973. From the leading sextet of last year, only one (Viscopoleanu) re-produced her usual form and both Heide Rosendahl and Deanna Yorgova took things easier with the former retiring officially at season's end and the latter withdrawing with injuries after a good indoor campaign. So the door was open for a complete newcomer, ANGELA SCHMALFELD (born May 18, 1951) whose pre-season best was a mere 6.23/20'54. Losing only two competitions in midsummer, (and revenging against Viscopoleanu 2-1 and Albertus 6-1), the wire service employee from Magdeburg, coached by the husband of her teammate Olfert, won major Olympic Day and European Cup final honours and jumped 6.76/22'24 at the DDR Championships for place number 7 on the All Time List. No other rival matched her nine 6.50/21.4 plus total.

MARTHA WATSON, long years in Willye White's shadow in terms of high ranking places, enjoyed her most successful season, won the AAU and PacGames titles and remained unbeaten during a tough European tour. Incidentally, Martha is the highest ranked US athlete in any event for 1973. ILONA BRUZSENYAK, Hungary's 23 year old pentathlete, surprised not only by her 6.83/22'5 wind-aided flying during the EC pentathlon semi at Innsbruck, but with solid winning marks at other meets and won the third ranking spot through her 1-0 score over VIORICA VISCOPOLEANU. The 34 year old Rumanian Olympic ex-champion had a busy season with 21 competitions, won the Bucharest EC semi, the Balkan Games and was runner-up at Edinburgh. Her 2-O score vs Olfert ranked her ahead of the next couple of DDR jumpers, KRISTINA ALBERTUS and MARGRIT OLFERT. A straight 5-0 score in favor of Albertus gave her a clear superiority over the Universiad champ.

MARGARET TREINIETE, a 24 year old blonde from Riga, was second at the student meet and has a good overall record, coming from 6.34/20'9% to 6.62/21'8%. Next place belongs to DEANA YORGOVA, who won the European Indoor Cgampionships and had four 6.40/21'0 plus undercover marks. Soviet champ KAPITOLINA LOTOVA, in a 3-3 tie with Treiniete, but down to 6 place at the Moscow Universiad, and Suomi's surprising Warsaw EC semi winner TUULA RAUTANEN won the last Top Ten places in view of their better average standard ahead of injury-ridden Meta Antenen and Canada's hope Brenda Eisler.

# SHOT PUT

Until August there was no indication of the things to come for NADYEZHDA CHIZHOVA and her famous coach Viktor Alexeyev were preparing in silence their answer to new contender and the improvement of HELENA FIBINGEROVA. Nadya, who lost the Soviet title by a very small margin to ESFIRA DOLZHENKO, disappeared from the shot put rings for one month, came back with a 20.82/68'3% to shatter all Universiad opposition and made all things clear eight days later at the Izvyestia Cup semi in Lvov. After a series of 20.46/67'1%-foul-20.88/68'6-foul-20.95/68'8%, she was able to bang out a 21.20/ 69'6% toss, her first world record of 1973. And another month later, at the sunny autumn beaches of Bulgaria's Varna, she threw 20.82/68'3%-21.03/69'0-foul-21.13/69'4-foul and then finally 21.45/70'4%. In six weeks she added six 20m/65'7 plus marks to her previous total of seven and remained the UNTOUCHABLE for another year.

Nevertheless, she is no longer alone. Fibingerova, a black-haired girl from a small village in the Moravian part of Czechoslovakia, used an unusual low trajectory for long puts for the whole season. She won the European Indoor Championships, went over 20m early in June and sought major competitions throughout Europe, (mostly without finding any real opposition), did 20.80/68'3 at CSSR Championships just a week after fouling a put of 21.04/69'0%. (Incidentally, she stepped over the

JAVLLIN IHKUW In terms of historical comparisons, the javelin was the most successful event of the year 1973. This event improved on places 1 to 4 on the All Time List, 8 out of 10 best All Time Performances and a full half of history's over 61m/200' throws were achieved in 1973. RUTH FUCES, the Hollmann pupil from Jena, who lost for the last time in August of 1971, won all major honors available and bettered her own world record by a full meter in the not-too-favorable wind conditions at Edinburgh during the European Cup final.

From a very even trio of next contenders, our final choice for place number two is NATASA URBANCIC or Yugoslavia who was beaten only once (by Fuchs) and won such major meets as the Znamenskiy Memorial, the Balkan Games and the Rijeka and Sittard EC try-outs. Natasha, (born 25 November 1945), a diploma economist from Celje, started 'way back in 1960 and aims for as high honors as the European Championship in 1974, threw beyond 60m/197 five times. This sounds low compared to eight such marks achieved by KATHY SCHMIDT, but the US champion lost the Universiad to a lower ranked Korolyeva and met by far much weaker competition than Urbancic. Incidentally, coach Pearson's "Sports Illustrated" comments about Kathy's 75m/246' possibilities raised some eyebrows here in Europe. JACQUELINE TODTEN, Munich's surprising silver medalist, started comparatively late, lost five meets in a row against Fuchs and Urbancic, but finished on a high note with a 63.14/207'l personal best at Helsinki's cold September meet and won against strong contenders at Varna.

Although twice beaten at home by newcomers, DANIELA JAWORSKA remained Poland's best exponent, (five 60m marks, the Polish title, EC semi win and a 1-0 score against Mollova and Ozolina). Austrian vet EVA JANKO, who also tried the pentathlow with such marks as a 14.1 hurdles, won an important meet at Frankfurt, has a 2-0 edge over Mollova and 1-0 vs ELVIRA OZOLINA, whose 63.12/207'1 improvement at the SU Championships and 63.96/209'10 record at the SU-USA affair indicated great things for the 34 year old former world record holder. However, her 3rd place at the Warsaw EC semi and an even lower 5<sup>th</sup> place at the EC final marred any higher ranking possibilities. Nevertheless, the endurance of the wife of Janis Lusis is admirable. In all, she beat Universid champion SVIETLANA KOROLYEVA 3-1, so the pretty sports studen, who was born at Ural's Barnaul, must be satisfied with an 8<sup>th</sup> placing here.

Edinburgh second placer LUTVIAN MOLLOVA lost to all the higher ranked athletes during the season but had a slightly better average record than Soviet surprise, 20 year old TATYANA ZHIGALOVA, who won the very first and very last important meets of the season at Sofia, but went down to defeat in international duals against GFR and USA.

## PENTATHLON

Due to the inauguration of the European Pentathlon Cup competition for teams, this event enjoyed its best-ever season. More than 40 girls scored over 4200 points equal to 4800 points of the pre-1970 scale. And two world record performances by BURGLINDE POLLAK opened the door for the magic 5000 points in the very near future. To make clear the procedures at the Sofia Cup semi, time was measured in hundredths, but it was actually hand timing with photofinish intervals used for the marks of other than the winners. By strict standards, Pollak actually ran "only" 13.3 in the hurdles instead of 13.21, but this is surely outweighed by her other marks which included a 6.45/21'2 long jump on her final try. At Bonn in the EC final, she ran a fully electronic 13.21 against a 1.5mps wind - and this after there were three false starts in her heat. Then she flopped over 1.75/5'8% on her final trial and over 1.78/5'10 on her first effort at that height. She had a mediocre shot put mark, far below a 16m/52'6 warmup throw. Once again she saved everything for her fin-al effort in the long jump with her first leap at 6.11/20'0%, then 6.32/20'8% and finally a personal best at 6.47/21'2%. She ended with her fastest-ever furlong in 23.35 which was the crown on the top of her performance. Burglinde, who performs a full pentathlon in three hours during training, favors a one-day competition more than anyone else.

Place Number two went unanimously to NADYEZHDA TKACHENKO, who after an early season loss, won the Soviet title, won over the USA and took the Universiad honors and finally was runner-up at Bonn. Nadya improved in both jumps to 6.40/21'0 and 1.78/5'10 as well as to a USSR hurdles record of 13.2. Helping Pollak to reestablish the DDR supremacy in this event, long jumpers ANGELA SCHMALFELD and MARGRIT OLFERT, both Magdeburg based and eager training mates, battled against each other in major meets with Angela winning this duel 2-1 with two plus 4600 efforts.

Even though she lost to Nadyezhda Tkachenko 1-4, TATYANA VOROKHOBKO, winner of the SU-GFR dual and 2nd at the Universiad. enjoyed a very successful season and had the most plus 4400 marks - six. Hungary's ILONA BRUZSENYAK, who spent almost every weekend racing over the sprints and hurdles, jumping in the long jump and even running some 4x400 relays, lost some ranking places by finishing only 10<sup>th</sup> at the EC final, but her Innsbruck development to 4617 was memorable, as well as her 3-1 score against home rival Margrit Papp. GFR's CHRISTEL VOSS, born 1942, beat Austrian comebacker LIESE PROKOP at both EC rounds, whereas the former WR holder from Vienna was very good at home competitions, amassing as much as 4622 points in her last attempt, (and coming down to 13.4 in the hurdles).

Although she scored not a single victory, Bulgaria's NEDYALKA ANGELOVA, (who improved to 6.50/21'4 in the long jump), deserves a place in the Top Ten on her overall standard ahead of DDR's European Junior Champion BARBEL MULLER, who had a good 2-3 score against Scmalfeld and improved the World Junior best to 4509 and then 4518. Valentina Tikhomirova, Top Ten ranked in every year since 1965, was an injured 10th in the GFR-SU clash and did not finish the EC final, so her great Soviet record improvement in a small meet in Yesentuki in August, (to 4754 points) did not justify a Top Ten place for 1973. And last year's leader Mary Peters surely bothered by the adverse conditions in the Reykjavik semi of the EC, could not even make the top 20. Sorry.

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# **ALL TIME TOP 30 STATS**

A study of the "All Time Top 30" list discloses some interesting facts. The nation boasting the largest number of positions is easily East Germany with 40 spots in the track and 37 in the field for an impressive 77 positions out of a total of 369. The Soviet Union is next with 58 positions, 44 of them earned in the field events.

Only 57 of the 369 spots were established in the 60's. The year 1973 coralled 122 spots but 1972 leads with 136, or 36% of the total.

The eight iron curtain countries grabbed off 213 positions and western Europe hauled in 92 more to give Europe 305 of the total - the USA with 25 and Australia with 21 made up the majority of the spots earned by the rest of the world combined.

Three athletes made the list in four events each: Heide Rosendahl (GFR) in the 200 (24<sup>th</sup>), 100H (14<sup>th</sup>), LJ (1) and pentathlon (3rd); Chi Cheng, (Republic of China) in the 100 (2nd), 200 (3rd), 400 (28th) and 100H (8th) and Irena Szewinska (Pol) in the 100 (10th), 200 (6th). 400 (18th) and long jump (12th).

# **REISER IN RECORD 1500 by Lyle Sanderson**

Saskatchewan, Canada, December 27-29: The Ninth Annual K of C Saskatchewan Indoor Games produced many good performances which, unfortunately were not witnessed by many spectators. The 1526 participating athletes often outnumbered the spectators.

Canada's Glenda Reiser turned in the top performance of the meet as she reduced her own Canadian and North American indoor record over the 1500m by 4.6 seconds, clocking 4:16.3, just 2.0 seconds off Tamara Pangelova's world record. The small (12.88 laps per mile) track makes the time even more impressive.

Reiser went to the front after half a lap and led past 400 in 68. A 64.5 second 400 spread the field as the Ottawa native pulled into a 20 yard lead which she held to the line. Francie Larrieu ran strongly in spite of being well off the pace to lower Doris Brown's American record by 1.8 seconds with a 4:19.35. Anne-Marie Davis (4:30.2) and Mary Decker (4:40.4) finished third and fourth.

Reiser was awarded the Top Canadian Athlete trophy for her performance.

Joni Huntley looked very good over 5'10 in the high jump and was very close to an American record with three good trys at 5'11.

Mary Decker, who had narrowly avoided being lapped the nite before, ran an impressive 800m to miss Marie Mulder's American record by just two-tenths of a second. The tiny Blue Angel ran away from the field passing 400m on the way in 63.6 and finished with 2:08.5s. Brenda Walsh closed very strongly in the final lap, but Decker sprinted off the final corner to maintain her lead. Larrieu significantly lowered her own indoor best for the second straight night but had to settle for third as she passed Linda Halverson in the final lap to record 2:09.6s. US champion Wendy Koenig ran a creditable 2:12. 7 but finished only sixth.

# SEIDLER 54'111/2 RECORD

Her mark also is farther than the American outdoor record of 54'9 set by Earlene Brown in 1960 but will not, of course, be accepted in that category. # WORLD 600 RECORD - WON'T COUNT

Toronto, Canada, January 5:-Two Canadian athletes, a youngster and an oldster, broke the world indoor record for 600 yards at the Ontario T&F Association meeting - but because the track is 15 yards beyond the 220y limit, the record won't stand.

Ten years ago, Roberta Pico retired from the sport. Now she is making a comeback as Mrs. Giovanni Angeloni and she broke the tape over the 600y route just a hair in fromt of 17 year old Rochelle Campbell, both being clocked in 1:19.8, better than Kathy Hammond's world mark of 1:20.5s. In spite of the long layoff of ten years, Angeloni is still only 25 and hopes to return to the form which gave her Canadian records over two miles and for the one hour run. Other results:

Sports International had an amazing number of 7 runners under 38 seconds while the Atoms were not far behind in the quantity/quality department with 4 under 38 seconds.

# DECKER GETS WORLD 1000y MARK from Sharon McKniff

Los Angeles, California, January 19:-Mary Decker, a year older, three inches taller and eight pounds heavier than last summer, nabbed the first indoor world record of the season as she sped to a fine 2:26.7 clocking for the 1000 yards. The old mark, set last year by Canada's Glenda Reiser, was 2:29.4 a time which tonight's runner-up, Francie Larrieu, also bettered with 2:27.3.

Decker took the lead at the start, followed closely by Larrieu and Julie Brown, but by the end of the second lap, the taller Blue Angel had opened up a 15 yard lead over Larrieu as Kathy Gibbons moved into third. Both Decker and Larrieu were leaving the pack at the quarter which was passed in 61.6, and it was strictly a two woman race. With two laps to go, Larrieu began her increase and moved beside her younger rival at the gun, but Decker proved the stronger and won by three yards. Results: 1-Mary Decker (BA) 2:26.7, 2-Francie Larrieu (SJC) 2:27.3, 3-Julie Brown (UCLA) 2:36.0, 4-Kathy Gibbons (GG) 2:36.2. Others included Kathy Lawson (TCG), Lynn Hollins (RRR). Decker passed the 880 in a good 2:09.35.

Only one other individual event was held for the females and the public was greeted with handbills at the exits which pointed out the the two individual runs and the two relays, (one for 13/under) constituted only 12% of the evening program with the men getting a whopping 80% - including 34% of all the events for high school boys! The second running event was over the 500 yard route and brought together young Wendy Koenig and veteran Jarvis Scott. The Coloradoan took the lead early and held it to the gun when Scott accelerated and moved into first. Koenig, showing great determination, came back down the final straight to win by a dip in a good 1:07.7, just one-tenth off the meet record. Finishing third was the West Coast Jets with a powerful quartette of Williamae and Mable Fergerson, Shirley Lenyoun and transplanted Renaye Bowen from San Diego. The LB Comets and the traveling Mayor Daley YF teams were never in the race. No time was given. The Age Group (under 13) relay was won by the Los Angeles Track Club youngsters in 1:19.1 over the West Vernon Jets and the Long Beach Comets. The LA team went into the lead over the Jets and the places remained unchanged for all four laps.

# HELMS WHIPS A'HARRAH by Tim Hickey

Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, January 14:-Pat Helms of the Padukies topped Delaware's Chris A'Harrah in both the 220 and 440 yard dashes to highlight the Middle Atlantic Indoor Women's Meet at the Philadelphia Civic Center. Chris showed the effects of recent leg trouble which has hampered her training as Pat won comfortably in both sprints. Chris came back to win a hotly contested 60 that saw the first four finishers timed in 7.2, and the girl whom many observers thought was the winner, Lisa Batch of the Hawks, placed 5th after a prolonged discussion among officials, coaches, spectators and athletes.

Bonnie Neal was an easy winner in the hurdles and a newcomber to the Middle Atlantic area, Caorl Fridley, was an easy winner in the mile, winning by 100 yards over Kathy Wilf of the Padukies.

An interesting development this year was the appearance of so many high school and college athletes on the list. At least 13 came from Iowa high schools with 10 more from the Lone Star State of Texas.



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# HIGH SCHOOL TRACK RICHARD EDE, Editor

The high school news is short this month due to inactivity in girl's HS programs, but the quality of the results I have to report more than makes up for the lack of quantity.


The only cross country results received came from Roger Shaffer reporting the Oregon HS Cross Country Championships held over a muddy, flat, 2.0 mile course on November 10. From a beginning four years ago with 48 girls from 7 schools, the Orego State Meet has grown to 201 competitors from 44 schools and next year will be contested under full Oregon School Activities Association sponsorship, including meet expenses for teams. That's a goal many program could emulate.

In this year's meet, Rosena Cahall (11:50), Vicky Paddock (12:13) and Mariana Cahill (12:28), all of Bonanza went 1-2-3 in the Class A meet as they led their team to a 29-68 win over runnerup Catlin Gabel of Portland. Lisa Lamoreaux (12:28) of Catlin Gabel finished fourth. The Cahills are juniors and Paddock is only a freshman.

In the Class AA race, <u>Crook County</u> HS of Prineville used a 1-3 finish by sophomore Brenda Cardin (11:41) and Vicki Mitchell (11:51) to beat <u>Lakeview</u> 40-67. Theresa Zimmerlee (<u>Eagle</u> <u>Point</u>) in 11:49 and Letha Williams of <u>Burns</u> (11:55), rounded out the close finish of the top four.

The large schools Class AAA race was wide open for the team title, but Debbie Brundige (<u>Roseburg</u>), an AAU runner, left no doubt as to the individual honors as she blazed a state record ll:18.8 to win by ll seconds over Pat Reed (<u>Portland Wilson</u>). The old mark of ll:33 was set last year by Reed. Molly Morton (<u>Portland Lincoln - 11:45</u>), Dala Ramsey (Cottage Grove-12:00); and Lisa Wallin (Hillsboro - 12:03), rounded out the top five as Portland <u>Wilson</u> beat Portland <u>Franklin</u> 76-99 for team honors.

Track is starting to make news once again, and although it's a bit early for most areas, we do have some results from Will Burns in New York. Westchester County held an indoor meet on the County Center's 12 laps to the mile flat wooden track on December 4. 300 girls from 13 schools participated in the meet and set some impressive marks. The highlight of the meet was a 5.0 40y dash by <u>New Rochelle's Debbie Fortune</u>, who also led her 4-lap relay team to a 1:18.6 win. Nancy Kramer (<u>Croton-Harmon</u>) took the high jump at 5'0%. Junior Hildy Feuerbach (<u>Mamaroneck</u>) breezed the 440 in 66.3 to serve notice that



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

(Mamaroneck girls won 6 of 11 events at last year's championships.) The shot competition was tough as Mary Katalik (<u>Henrick Hudson</u>) edged Marcia Brisson (<u>Pleasantville</u>) 31'7½ to 31'0 with the 4k ball.

Australia is in the middle of its summer season and we have a few results from their high school championships. Kerri Pearson won the 100 meters in an impressive 11.8. Wangman scored a 200/400 double in 24.1/57.7. The high jump soared to 5'7% by McCawley, who incidentally made the Australian team for the Commonwealth Games, the youngest athlete ever to represent Australia in international competition. She jumped 5'8½ as a 14 year old and just celebrated her 15<sup>th</sup> birthday. Gail Mulhall scored a shot/discus double at 44'10%/159'7. Sounds as if some up-and-coming athletes are emerging from "down-under".

Girls athletics in general are making headlines off the competitive scene. As we reported last month, Pennsylvania was facing a suit to allow integration of non-contact sports. Now, in news released less than a week apart, it was reported that the Philadelphia Board of Education was hit with a suit on behalf of swimmer Heidi Kaplan, and then ruled Heidi eligible to swim. Although the original suit was aimed at all noncontact sports, the School Board made its decision applicable only to swimming.

The energy crisis may put a crimp in athletics this year, as at least one California league has cancelled its League prelims and finals as unnecessary and will crown a dual meet champion only. If the situation gets worse, intramural meets at home may be in order. I assume other parts of the country are having similar problems.

Still more scheduling problems. The USA-USSR dual meet is now set for July 5/6 at Durham, BUT the USA-USSR Junior dual meet is set for June 28/29 at Austin - which means the National AAU Championships must either be switched to the 21/22 of June CR there must be a separate qualifying meet for the USA Junior team and this has tentatively been set for Florida. With the Nationals scheduled for California there's going to be some real soul searching to determine just where (and when) the 18-unders will participate.....Lest we get carried away with patting ourselves on the back for good programs, let it be known the Taipei City Championship meet in China had a program of 64 pages - no advertising.

The East Germans are complaining. "What haven't we been reproached with? We inject the girls with male hormones, we fill them up with anabolics, we dope both our men and women. I have never heard so much nonsense in one go. What is true is that we have the best system for searching for talent and encouraging development. That and that alone is our secret". So says Gerd Bathelmes, general secretary of the East German swimming association....Ever been tempted to "bring in a few extra things" when making a foreign tour? Don't do it. In Poland, one of their women athletes was found guilty of smuggling and currency violations and sentenced to six years in prison, fined \$56,000 and had all her property confiscated.

University of California specialists put 50 females through a 10 week course with barbells and other weights and found their strength increased an average of 30% - but the muscle size increase was imperceptable. "Most women fear they will come out looking like Charles Atlas, but this just isn't true" ....European Indoor Championships will be March 9/10 at Goteborg, Sweden...

BBC will televise 14 hours of the Commonwealth Games to home viewers in England from New Zealand ..... When New Zealand held their trials for the Commonwealth Games team, they had to run the women's 200m twice because of an echo in the stadium, one of the competitors thought there had been a recall gun and stopped completely ..... Results were the same both times ..... Remember the story about the Mills family trying to represent NZ at the CG? Well, three of the four made it . only Pappa didn't get on the team, although he finished second in the shot. The rest of the family all came up with personal bests including Mamma Coleen, at age 39, with a 54 flat 400 and daughter Donna with 1.68/5'6 in the high jump....And speaking of the Commonwealth Games, one of the competitors in the women's shot will be 36 year old Valerie Young, 13 times NZ shot put champion and 10 times discus winner. She will be cheered on by her three children after already having won 5 gold medals and a bronze in the CG from 1958-1966, plus a 5th in the Melbourne Olympic Games in 1956 and 4th places in the Olympic shot in 1964 and 1964.

The youngest member of the Australian squad for NZ is Debbie McCawley who made the team just two weeks after her 15th birthday. She has jumped 5'8% as a 14 year old and is the youngest Australian athlete to ever make a international team .... Chile has pulled out as host for the 1975 Pan American Games and Brazil has stepped in to serve as host ..... Would you believe a track meet in southern California was cancelled because of snow? The SPAAAU meet set for Valencia on January 5 was called off because of 8" of snow on the field .... Last issue we stated the 8 yr old 880 record was held by Renee Quigley. Just another error. The record is 2:38.9 set last year by Andrea Kirkorn .... Once one of the top track meet in all of California, the Hanford Invitational has been cancelled .... Word from Australia relative to the fast sprint marks by Denise Robertson casts a doubt at the wind gauge reading ability of the official involved and suggests the 100 as well as the 200 was wind aided .....

Wanta join the "WRAP"...Stands for "Women's Rights - Athletic Progress". Write to Susan Craig, 4610 Marble, NE, Albuquerque, NM, 87110...Good article in the January "Runner's World" on the San Jose Cindergals and coach Augi Argabright. ...Which reminds me the latest rumor is Francie Larrieu is no longer with the SJC but has switched to the Pacific Coast Club...West Germany's Ellen Tittle is now Mrs. Wellmann... Steve Wennerstrom, our roving reporter to the European Cup Final in Edinburgh, took Niole Sabaite to dinner - now she is married. Wonder what he said?.....Miki Gorman who set a new world best for the marathon, is 38 years old, 5'1 and 89 pounds.....Svetla Zlateva was voted Bulgaria's top athlete for 1973 - men and women....



College Park, Maryland, January 11:-The Atoms speedy foursome of Michelle McMillan (57.3), Charyl Toussaint (56.0), Lorna Forde (56.9) and Brenda Nichols (56.8) sped to a clocking of 3:47.0 for the 4x440 relay and the high spot of the CYO National Invitational meet held in the Cole Field House on the grounds of the University of Maryland. Although the mark is better than the recognized American record of 4:50.5, it must go into the books as an "All Comers" record inasmuch as Forde is not a US citizen. All other events produced fine marks with Rosie Allwood's 6.6 over 60y being the tops, just 0.1 off the world mark as she prepares for the Commonwealth Games in New Zealand in February.
