


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Three undefeated sprinters will meet in the 100 meter dash at the National Championships in Santa Barbara on Sunday, July 2. Who's your choice?

NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS

Never has such an outstanding field been assembled for the USA National Championships. Although almost every event is evenly matched, five events stand out as not only excellent competition, but because the athletes are of world class. The 100 meter dash finds three undefeated sprinters, plus a host of speedsters capable of surprising the big three. The 400 brings together defending champion Charlette Cooke, young Kathy Hammond, upstart youngsters Sara Beckord, Delores Stoneback and Diane Knight plus Janet Johnson, Jane Burnett, Jarvis Scott, Norma Harris and possisbly Madeline Manning - all experienced veterans who could easily upset the two favorites. Doris Brown, Charlette Cooke and Madeline Manning meet in a classic 800 meters - three different styles of running, Manning the "kicker", Brown the pacer, Cooke the question mark. The 80 meter hurdles should provide the closest finish of the competition with seven hurdlers having the ability to win. No debate as to the fifth outstanding event - the javelin with the world's number 1 performer, the world's number 2 performer and the world's number 9 performer plus the finest collection of young javelin throwers in any nation of the world. WORLD FEMALE ATHLETES RUNNING WILD!

With the season just under way, the female track and field athletes give every indication they will rewrite the record books before the 1968 Olympic Games are even held. So many outstanding performances have been turned in since last month's issue of WTFW it is hardly possible to select one above the others. Anne Smith must rate the number one spot, however, with her new world marks in the mile and 1500 meter run. Close behind ranks Russia's 21 year old Nadyezhda Chizhova with a 60'2/18.34 mark in the shot. And don't forget the 11.3 100's by K+K, the second 52.5 400m by Judy Pollock, Yugoslavia's 18 year old Vera Nikolic's 2:02.8 800, the long jumping of Kirszenstein, Becker, Viscopoleanu, four discus throwers over the 184'/56m mark, and 18 year old Barbara Friedrich's 198'8/60.55 javelin throw. Just toss in Poland's 44.4 400m relay mark and Sashka Varbanova's 4707 pentathlon points and you have the start of a sensational season. For World Report see page 12.

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

He has been a member of the Royal Dutch Athletic Federation since 1935. In 1936 he was Assistant Team Manager for the Dutch Olympic team at Berlin, and was Head Team Manager for the 1948 (London), 1952 (Helsinki), 1960 (Rome) and 1964 (Tokyo) Olympic Games.

He became interested in women's athletics (track & field) when he attended the 1928 Olympic Games in Amsterdam as a schoolboy spectator.

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FROM THE EDITOR

NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS

Once again the very important National Championships are upon us. The first three place winners here qualify for the USA vs British Commonwealth meet to be held in Los Angeles July 8-9. The first six qualify to participate in the Pan American Games Trials on the 14-15. From there it is on to the Pan American Games in Winnipeg from July 29 to August 5, then the Americas vs Europe at Montreal and then European competition.

Each year sees improvement in the staging of the Nationals. In the past strange things have taken place in these meets - illegal pits, assinine seeding, suspicious timing, poor facilities. Staging a National Championships is a most difficult and complex assignment, requiring coordination of many people. It is a tough job. Not until you serve as Meet Director for such an undertaking can you appreciate the problems which arise.

Santa Barbara's facilities are excellent. The pits are legal. The officials are experienced. Let us hope the lessons of previous Championships have been learned and we will not have to suffer through 12 heats in the 440 to eliminate one competitor. All we ask is fair and equal opportunity for every athlete to produce her maximum performance.

POLITICS AGAIN

We have learned the Organizing Committee of the World University Games scheduled this summer in Japan has given in to pressures and has failed to invite or has withdrawn invitations to several nations to participate in the Gamees. It is quite impossible to figure their reasoning. Some nations are not being invited because they are Communists. Other nations are not being invited because the Communists do not approve of them. Just how ridiculous can you get? The solution? Simple. So simple it will never be tried. Just invite everyone — then if someone doesn't like to compete against someone else, they can stay home.

ERRORS

Whenever you set yourself up as perfect, the Good Lord has a way of quickly cutting you down to size. In the first issue of WTFW, we bravely crowed there would be no errors in OUR magazine. So what happens? The picture of Christine Spielberg turns out to be Anita Hentschel. And of course Luigi Mengoni didn't become interested in women's track and field when he was three yeaers old in 1933 as stated - it was in 1953. Both Pozzoli and Mengoni were rated the world's greatest authorities — and both give that title to Jan Popper. There were other things, too — Brandin's javelin mark was 157'4 not 175'4, etc., etc.

It was also discovered in the publishing business neither the editor nor publisher controls the publication. It's the printer. Lost between office and shop was the story on the U. S. National Championships, the story on track in South Africa and a feature on Pauline Craven. Also lost were the page numbers. We shall simply aim at improving each issue.

DIANA YORGOVA by MARKO PETRUNOV

(Ed. Note: Diana Yorgova is the perfect example of the statement "never trust a woman"! Last October this pretty, blue eyed girl sat across the lunch table from me in the beautiful Mediteranian Turkish city of Antalya, looked me straight in the eye and said, "This is my last competition. I am retiring." The following story by Marko Petrunov tells more about this remarkable athlete. VR)

It was early in the spring of 1959. Trials were being held in Sofia to select the Bulgarian junior squad. A rather skinny, pale-faced girl stood at the end of the long jump runway. She was quite unknown and I looked at her only because I had over-heard one of the judges say, "But why is she here?" The next moment, after a rainbow action in the air that I had never seen before, the child landed beyond the girl's National record. This leap of 5.54/18' 2½" gave the 17 year old girl not only a place on the girl's squad but also on the women's team for the Balkan Championships.

Diana Yorgova had actually done some running and jumping in her home town of Lovech, but no one back home dared hope that the light youngster would make such progress. From that day on there was no stopping her. Between 1960-1962 she won three Balkan titles & a silver medal at the World Student Games in Sofia. In 1963 she won first place at the Znamenski Memorial Games in Moscow defeating Olympic Champion Vera Krepkina. The following year she lost her Balkan title to her new great rival Viorica Viscopleanu of Rumania. Changing to the scissors style, Yorgova placed sixth at the Olympic Games in Tokyo and at 24 won her greatest success, a silver medal at the European Championships in a field which included many great long jump champions — Kirszenstein, Talisheva, Rand, Viscopoleanu, Hoffman and Bakker.

I have great respect for athletes who do their best under pressure. Modest and self-possessed, quiet Yorgova is a strong fighter. In her six year international career, she lost only once to an opponent whose best mark was not as good as her own. On the other hand, she consistantly defeated rivals whose marks indicated they were superior — but they were only superior on paper.

Diana Yorgova bettered the national long jump record on 15 different occasions, raising the mark from 5.58/18' 3¼ in 1959 to 6.47/21' 2¾ in 1966. Her achievements include seven national long jump titles (1960-1966), four gold and three silver medals in the long jump at the Balkan Games (plus another three gold in the relay), two participations in European Championships placing 7th in 1962 and 2nd in 1966, plus one Olympic Games competition in Tokyo, placing 6th.

Diana was married in an historical ceremony in the Olympic Village at the Tokyo Games, to a member of the Bulgarian gymnastics team. The marriage caused much excitement among the athletes in the village. In 1965 she graduated from the University of Sofia as an historical journalist.

After the conclusion of the 1966 track season, she and her husband decided to have a baby, but many of their friends and athletic officials insisted she continue competition until after the Olympic Games in Mexico. After much hesitation and consideration, husband and wife decided she should continue with her athletics, and at the end of February Diana began training once

again. Already she has jumped 6.30/20' 8" and will be ready for much better marks before the season progresses too far.

OLYMPIC DEVELOPMENT: Cooke runs, wins firstever mile; Burnett wins double

Baltimore, Maryland, May 27, 1967

American middle - distance star Charlette Cooke ran the first competitive mile of her career and was

pleasantly surprised at her 5:12.0.

On advice of her coach, Brooks Johnson, Miss Cooke decided to move up to the mile for this meet because of a sore thigh which has hampered her sprinting in training. Johnson also felt that an outing at the longer distance would be a good confidence builder at this stage of Charlette's training.

In this first of a series of local development meets teams from New York, New Jersey, Delaware, Virginia, the District of Columbia and host Baltimore competed. The meet served as a tune up for the Alantic Coast Regionals upcoming in New York City.

Jane Burnett, the carrot topped sprinter of D.C.'s Sports International Track Club, had a busy day as she won the 100 and 440 yard dashes and anchored the victorious S.I.T.C. 880 yard medley relay team.

After winning a 100 heat in 11.0, Jane returned to capture the final in 10.9. An hour later she came back to take the quarter in 55.7, seven tenths off her winning Penn Relays time of last April. Team-mate Lynnda Best came on in the last 80 yards to gain second spot with a :57.0 clocking. Marilyn Warner, New York P.A.L. was third in :58.0.

When the 880 yard medley relay rolled around, Jane and Lynnda combined with Becky Alderman and Sandy Naylor to swamp the opposition with a good 1:47.4 timing.

POINTS FROM PRAGUE

Henry Schubert is right! Vera Nikolic could be the first girl under two minutes in the half before these words are printed! In her first serious test of the season, at Belgrade, June 3, the Yugoslav youngster destroyed all the whole European elite (minus injured Zsuzsa Szabo) with 200 meters in 29.0, 400m in 59.2 and 600m in 1:31. She finished 20 meters ahead and for the third time equalled her best mark - 2:02.8. In the week before, she ran the metric quarter in 54.1, although unofficial . . . Another Yugoslav talent, Liljana Petnjaric, has had bad luck: the promising 400m runner (54.6) broke her leg during a gymnastic exercise at school . . . News from Albania is rare. During a meet against a Rumanian delegation Tronjari cleared 1.58/5'2¼ in the HJ and Dani did 2:15.3 in the 800m. The latter was announced as a 2:08 runner in last year's official Albanian application form for the European Championships, as well as her teammate Djani with 15m for the SP and 50m for the DT - some three and seven meters over her actual limits . . . The biggest surprise of the well-prepared Bulgarian squad: Sashka Varbanova bettered her national record in the pentathlon with a mighty 4707 points on May 23-24. With that, the 24 year old PE student from Sofia bettered her 1965 mark by more than 200 points . . . Margit Nemeshazi, Hungary's best sprinter, tried the 400m for the first time during her team's

league match. The time-57.5 . . . Valentina Kozyr, the very talented find from Chernovtsi, is not the only high jumper in her family. Valentina's younger sister, Tatyana cleared 1.65/5'5 in mid-May — and the coach of the pair, Felix Brodskiy, expects she will be in the 1.75/5'8% class early. Two Kozyr girls for Mexico? . . . Renate Boy, as Renate Garisch the only woman shot putter who was able to conquer (once) or tied (once again) in clashes with Tamara Press during 1960-65, made a come-back after two seasons of inactivity. Result: 15.50/50'10% . . . Long jumpers from all of Europe were pleasantly surprised by the quality of the new Sofia "bitumen" runway where they made their first "Montreal" trial on June 4. Irena Kirszenstein improved her Polish record (made at Tokyo Olympics) with 6.62/21'84, Ingrid Becker, (who may be a contender for 5000 pentathlon points), bettered her mark with 6.53/21'51/2. Home favourite Deana Yorgova did 6.30/20'8-which was only good for fifth place . . . Ewa Klobukowska (11.4 - 11.3 -11.4-11.3) and Irena K. (11.5-11.5-11.5-11.3-11.5-11.3) are in fantastic condition, but more surprising are good Polish hurdlers "en masse": Tereza Gierczak (now Nowak) improved from 10.9 to 10.6, 19 year old Tereza Sukniewica from 10.9 to 10.7, and another junior, Urszula Styranka, came from nowhere to 10.8. But perhaps the best known is still Elzbieta Bednarek, third place winner at last year's European Championships at Budapest. (Jan Popper)





Not much action yet, but listed are a few marks turned in to date. Poland's quartette looks pretty powerful.



DEBBIE HEALD (11) born 20 August 1955, is 4'9" tall and weighs 80 pounds. She runs for Hutchinson Track Club in La Mirada, California, and is in the sixth grade.

Debbie has the following best marks so far in her career: 14.3 (100) 33.5 (220) 70.0 (440) 1:53.1 (660) 2:34.3 (880) 4:08.0 (1320) 5:33.9 (Mile) and

8:42.5 (1½M).



Debbie began running in the afterschool recreation program at her school as a ten year old fifth grader. She was soon beating most of the boys in the 440 and 660 yard runs.

She began working in earnest last fall during the cross country season. As a result she won 7 of 9 races including the SPA AAU Championship in the 11 and Under Age Group. According to her coach, Roy Swett, Debbie has a real drive to succeed

and often becomes quite unhappy when he doesn't have her workout.

Much of Debbie's workouts are done on a 300 yard grass track at school. Debbie Heald's splits in her fabulous mile at Antelope Valley on 13 May, 1967, included the following: 79.0, 2:45.0, 4:09.0, 5:33.9 which were 440s of 79, 86, 84 and 85.

Alhough Debbie has only ordinary speed, she makes up for it with fantastic strength and an excellent sense of pace. She realizes that she cannot hang on opponents and then outkick them if the pace is slow. In this respect she is like Doris Brown, who doesn't have the innate speed either. Debbie's strategy is to go out hard and break away or set such a fast pace that if her opponents stay with her into the last 300 yards she has taken the kick out of them and can easily pull away. Debbie has the courage and intelligence this sort of strategy requires. She is a B+ student and former student body president, vice president and treasurer.

Debbie seems to improve almost daily according to coach Swett. In September, 1966, she ran a time trial at 1320 in 4:49.0; now she can run 4:08.0. Her first mile was a time trial last December where she ran 6:08.5. Now she has run 35 seconds faster.

In the off season she does no running whatsoever. She plays whatever sports are in season. She was chosen to the school's all star basketball team, which included boys, this past winter and has been chosen the MVP for the past two years on the girls' softball team. In addition, she is far and away the best soccer player in the school.

In short, Debbie is a tremendous little girl. She has a great attitude and is the most popular kid in school. On nights before a race Debbie goes to bed at 7:30 p.m. and on week days she is always in bed by 8:15 p.m.

I'm looking for Debbie to have an even more successful cross country season (now called LONG DISTANCE RUNNING) come August, 1967. She will turn 12 and be able to run a longer distance than last cross country season. The longer the distance, the better Debbie performs. Good luck Debbie, during the coming Long Distance Running season!

Next, I'd like to tell you about another very promising young runner and field event girl. Her name is DEBBIE NORRIS, aged 12. She was born 8 November, 1954, under the same sign as I—Scorpion. She runs for the Southern California Missiles, a team



coached by Wilbur Williams, a former LA Track Club runner under Mihaly Igoli. Debbie is 5'¾" tall and weighs 94 pounds. She is in her third year of track and field and has run cross country.

Debbie has always been interested in sports, running in particular. One day she read an article in the local paper that said 10-11 year old runners were needed for the Missiles club. So, being interested, she called the right number, etc. and that's how she got started.

Debbie attends Hillcrest Junior HS in Redondo Beach and is in the advanced 7th grade where she is an Honor student. She holds the school record in the 660 yard run, over boys and girls.

Debbie has played the violin for 4 year. She excels in volleyball, softball, and swimming.

Debbie was one of the top runners in Age Group cross country last season along with Debbie Heald. On the track, Debbie is best noted for her middle distance running. She has run the exhibition 880 in 2:29.0, the best recorded time in the U.S. this year to my knowledge. The reason it was an exhibition race is that the 880 is not a regular event in the 12-13 AAU competition. We're hoping that it will be an accepted event for the 1968 season. Debbie has also run 2:29.5, virtually a solo race, with no major opposition. She won hands down. She has also run the 440 in 61.0. Debbie is a good all around athlete. She runs a good lead-off leg on the sprint relay team. She has jumped 15'3½" (LJ) and is consistently over 15 feet.

By the way, Debbie is a twin. Her other half is Denise, also in track and field. It makes for interesting comparisons, but I won't do that here.

EAST GERMANY DEFEATS USSR 61-56 (From Ernst Elert)

In a meet which, as you would expect, produced some outstanding performances, the East German team defeated the Soviet Union 61-56 in a two day competition in Karl Marx Stadium in Fuhrung. Best competitive performances were in the javelin where 182'1/52.50 could get only third place, and the best individual performance was by 21 year old Soviet shot putter Nadyezhda Chizhova who moved closer to the world mark of 61'0/18.59 with a terrific throw of 60'2/18.34. 



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WALLGREN DEFEATS CHMELKOVA

Scandinavian Report from Erik Aarset

SWEDEN

The pre-summer season in Sweden has been very inspiring. Records have been smashed very frequently, and the star performer has been 23 year old Karin Wallgren. Karin began to attract attention at the end of the 1966 season, and at the 1967 European Indoor Championships she showed her capabilities by winning the 400 and placing second in the 50m sprint. On May 13, Karin recorded a 54.4 400m and pulled young Ingela Ericsson into a new junior record of 55.6s.

Karin and Ingela were sent to an International competition in Paris, and on June 8 they lined up against celebrated athletes such as last year's European champion Anna Chmelkova (Czech), Noirot (France) and Munkacsi (Hun). This 400m competition was designated as a trial for the team selection for the European squad which will meet the Americas in Montreal this summer. Noirot was forced out of the finals due to an injury sustained in her heat. In the final, Wallgren defeated Chmelkova by a margin of 0.8 and young Miss Ericsson surprised by running third. Result: Wallgren (Swe) 54.0; Chmelkova (Czech) 54.8; Ericsson (Swe) 55.8.

On June 12 in Goettenburg, Wallgren made her debut at 800m and missed the Swedish record by only 0.2 with a fine 2:10.2s.

The new event, the 100m hurdles, has been a popular event for the record-hunters. In Sweden the record has improved from 17.0 to 14.2 in the last few weeks, and the present record holder is Ulla-Britt Wieslander. NORWAY

In the two competitions she has entered this year, 15 year old Anne Lise Warnes has bettered the Norwegian high jump record twice. On May 16 she jumped 5'5\%/1.67 and days later she lifted the standard to 5'6/1.68. The world age-record for 15 year olds in 5'7/1.70 and with the whole season ahead of her, Anne Lise must be considered to have a fine chance to break the world mark. (She will not be 16 until September 1).

Despite Anne Lise's good jumping, Berit Berthelsen is still the star of Norway. She opened the season better than ever in Porsgrunn on June 4 with a legal jump of 20'8/6.30 and a wind-aided leap of 20'9½/6.34. She also ran 100m in 11.9. Britt Krogh Sorensen ran a 2:12.0 800 m, and 16 year old Astrid Aamodt has this spring beaten the Norwegian junior 100m record with a legal 12.0 clocking.

DENMARK

20 year old Inger Husted has tied the Scandinavian record in the high jump at 5'7/1.70 and together with rival countryman Solveij Rasmussen (17 years) is heading for a great season.

Barbara Friedrich had two javelin throws over 200' in recent competition against high school boys . . . Brooks Johnson, coach for Sports International, is attempting to form a National Women's Coaching Association . . .

The State of Iowa claims to have the best high school program of girl's track in the nation . . . and results seem to back their claim . . . at the Federation Meet in Ft. Dodge, more than 1100 girls competed with some events requiring more than 20 heats . . . Francie Kraker will be out of competition for an indefinite period due to an injury of the hip area . . . Mickie De Mattia, 13, won the 100/220/440 at Dayton, Ohio, in 12.1/27.8/64.0 . . . She also scored 3271 points in pentathlon competition . . . Marian Thomas and Corrie Bakker of Holland will try to break the Dutch pentathlon record soon — the record, which was a world mark when set by Mrs. Fanny Blankers-Koen, is 4692 . . . Ingrid Becker's LJ series at Sofia was 19'8½/20'5½/21'5 (rec)/foul/21'1½/foul . . . The State of Montana also has an outstanding track program for its girls and women.

Millbrae Lions TC claims to have the best aggregate mark of five shot putters in the country with Pat Winslow (43'8), Janis Nay (43'1), Carol Haskins (39'0¾), Linda Langford (39'5¾) and Janet Svendson (36'5) for a total of 201'8¼ - can any club top that? . . . Diane

Knight, Cullen Astro Belles, who ran 56.5 at Albuquerque on June 9 is only 15 . . . Pete Pozzoli figured on an exponential curve of her 100-200-400-800m times, North Korea's Sin Kim Dan should run the mile in 4:12.8! . . . Message from Bert Nelson, editor "Track & Field News" claims our new publication is discriminating — wants to know where the men's news can be found . . .

How to remember the correct way to spell the name of the defending 400-800 champion - just remember she was supposed to be a boy and her name was to be "Charles" - so the surprised parents simply changed it to "Charlette" Cooke . . .

Corrie Bakker, the new Dutch LJ record-holder, made her record while competing in a pentathlon competition, but did it the hard way. She injured her foot during the high jump, quickly ran to a neighborhood hospital where a doctor repaired her wound, she ran back to the field, continued the high jump, (she cleared 5'1), then next took her three trails in the long jump and cleared 20'8/20'8¼/20'10 - the latter being the new record . . . incidentally, she scored 4600 points in the pentathlon.
