CHI: 10.0 & 22.7

Portland, Oregon, June 13:-Chi Cheng, who has been threatening the world sprint records with every outing this year, finally put it all together today on the cinder and clay surface in a dazzling display of speed to crack two world records with marks of 10 seconds flat for the 100 yards and 22.7 for the 220 yards.

Chi, who has been winning her sprint races by huge margins on slow tracks and in good time, was not to be denied today. Facing her in the 100 were Irene Piotrowski, the Canadian record holder at 10.4 and Patty Johnson of the Angels. Chi blasted from the blocks, led by four yards at the halfway post and won by a sizeable margin. Piotrowski, who finished second in 10.8, summed up the race best of anyone when she said, "I took two steps and was three yards behind!"

The 220, with the 9000 spectators on their feet from the sound of the gun, was nearly anticlimatic as everyone expected the second world mark to fall - and they were not disappointed as Chi won in 22.7, two tenths better than the old record set in 1964. Teammate Una Morris was second in 24.0s.

In addition, Chi won the 100 meter hurdles with her lifetime best legal mark and a new American All Comers record at 13.2s.

Watches for the sprint races read 9.9-10.0-10.1 for the 100 and 22.6-22.7-22.8 for the 220.

Almost overlooked in the world record excitement were the two outstanding runs by Doris Brown of the Falcon TC who won the mile in 4:45.2 and came back to double in the 880 with a clocking of 2:06.5, both marks the best in the USA to date. Young Debbie Heald, who trains on cheesecake, made a game try

Excitement gets greater and greater during the coming week as the date for the finals of the Women's National AAU Track and Field Championship comes closer. Athletes from all over the USA are looking forward to competing on the famed Tartan track and specially designed facility at UCLA.

Individual battles spice the meeting, but the team title is also of major interest. Tennessee State is the defending champion, but their chances look slim for 1970 as they can boast only Iris Davis in the 100 Martha Watson in the long jump and a good 4x110 relay team. The team title seems to be a duel between perennial favorite Mayor Daley Youth Foundation of Chicago and the Los Angeles Track Club. To overcome the possible 30 points scored by LATC's Chi Cheng, the Chicago crew offers a well balanced unit with Mamie Rallins (hurdles), Willye White (long jump), Diane Kummer (sprints and long jump), a strong weight team led by Maren Seidler and Josephine Dela Vina, and a couple of other highly talented lassies. The MDYF team must win the meet before the final event, the mile relay, however, as they have not entered that event and must watch the LATC roll to a possible win.

Up for grabs are spots on the USA International teams which will be travelling to Europe soon after the completion of the meet on Saturday. Meets are scheduled in Germany, Russia and Romania as well as other international invitationals throughout Europe.

TEXAS TC WINS USTFF TITLE

Wichita, Kansas, June 13:-The Texas Track Club, bolstered by some of the outstanding collegians and high school stars from the Lone Star State, edged perennial champions the Iowa Track Club 154 to 142 to win the team title at the 8th Annual United States Track and Field Federation Championships. With their performances thus improved, the Texas squad may make quite an impression at the National AAU Championships at UCLA in July.

Rhonda Fleming, formerly of Texas Southern, was one of the TTC recruits and came through with two fine sprint wins over the National Collegiate champion Judy Murphy, formerly of Texas Women's University but now a teammate of Flemings. The sprint times of 10.6 and 24.5 were excellent.

Diane Knight edged the Michigammas Francie Johnson in the 440 for another Texas TC victory, but Johnson was an easy winner in her specialty, the half mile.

The Texas TC foursome of Fleming, Murphy, Knight and Rivera sped to the fastest 440 relay time in the nation as they whipped through the lap in 46.1 and also had a good 880 medley time of 1:44.9s.

In spite of the upgrading of the USTFF Championships over past years, the field events produced not a single mark worthy of note.

SACRAMENTO INVITATIONAL by Natalie Rocha

Sacramento, California, June 13:-The women's portion of the Sacramento Invitational Track and Field Meet provided many of the highlights of the competition as the men's events proved to be a lackluster affair. The meet, held in conjunction with the Pacific Association Championships for men and women, was held on the fast Hughes Stadium track. The weather, however, was not ideal as blustery winds and chilly air swept the stadium constantly.

Despite the wind, there were some good performances. Alberta Martin and Deborah Payne, both of the Los Angeles Track Club, fought to a near dead heat in the 200 meter hurdles as both were timed in 27.8s. Deanna Carlsen of the Laurel TC, set a new Pacific Association record in the 100m hurdles as she skimmed the barriers in a good 14.1s. Barbara Ferrell led a sprint field in the 100 yard dash with a time of 10.4s. Kathy Hammond turned in her best 440 time of the season with a mark of 54.7s. She led five other runners to sub 57 flat times, as the fight for second place was close with Jarvis Scott just beating out Mable Ferguson and Nancy Mullen.

Francie Larrieu captured the 880 title by outlasting Cig Schafer, 2:10.5 to 2:10.7s. Francie led at the 440 in 63.8 and never relinquished the lead to the determined Schafer. The Will's Spikettes turned in a 1-2-3 sweep in the mile as three of Will's youngsters turned in fast times. Eileen Clausen, 15, ran 5:06.0, Sandy Langan, 14, was second in 5:08.1, and Ronalee Slosson, 15, third in 5:10.5s.

In the field events, Lynn Graham once again was over the 50 foot mark in the shot. Linda Langford turned in a great triple as she won the javelin with a new PAA record of 160'1, was first in the discus with a throw of 153'7 and second in the shot at 41'8½. Marilyn King continued to impress with her long jump leap of 19'10.

The powerful Millbrae Lions captured the team title with 45 points. The Laurel Track Club was second with 31 followed by Will's Spikettes and the San Jose Cindergals with 21 each.

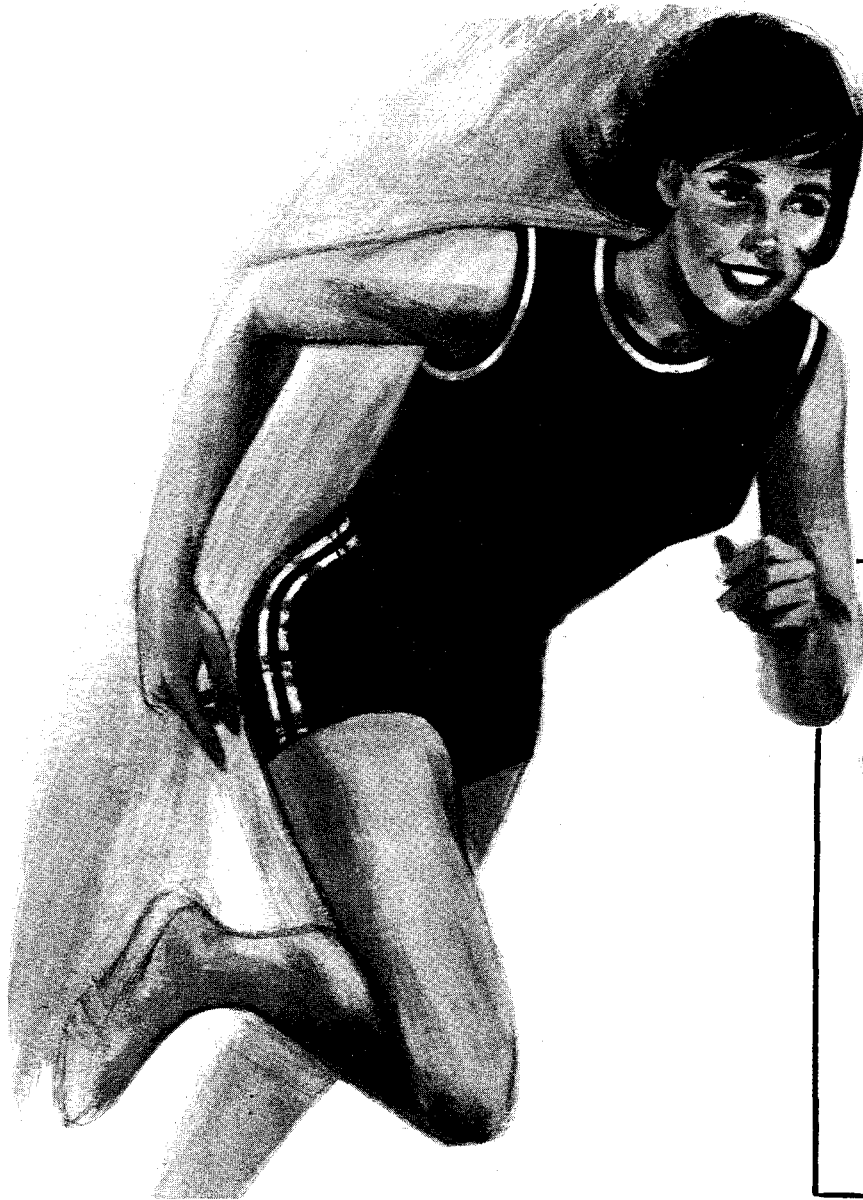
GOOD EUROPEAN PENTATHLONS

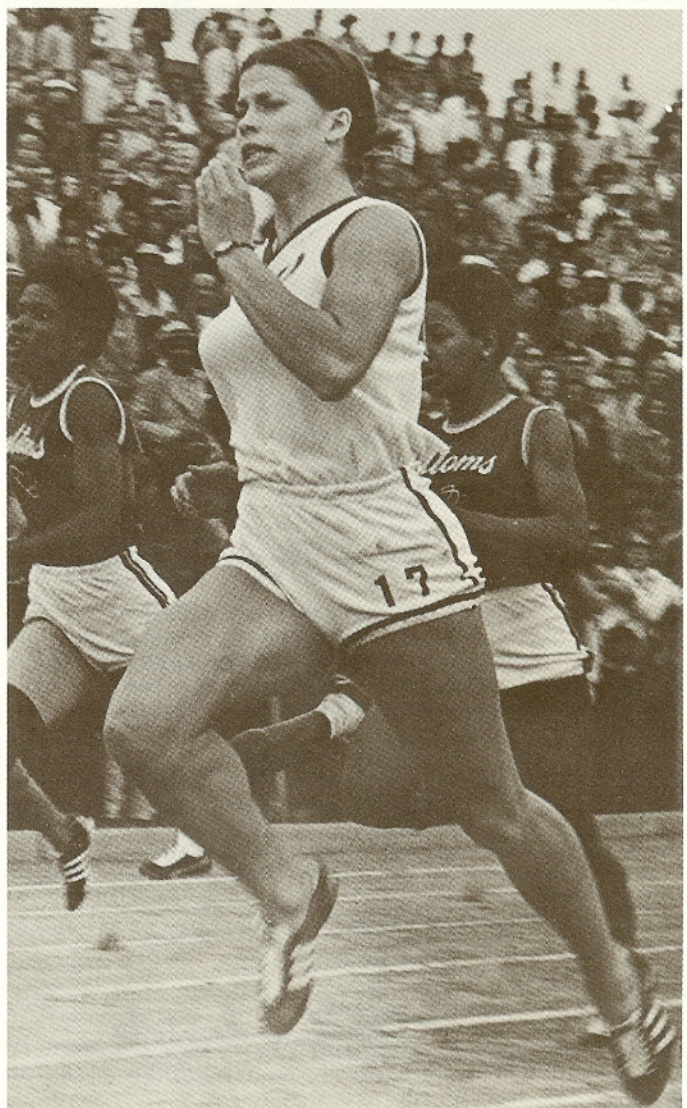

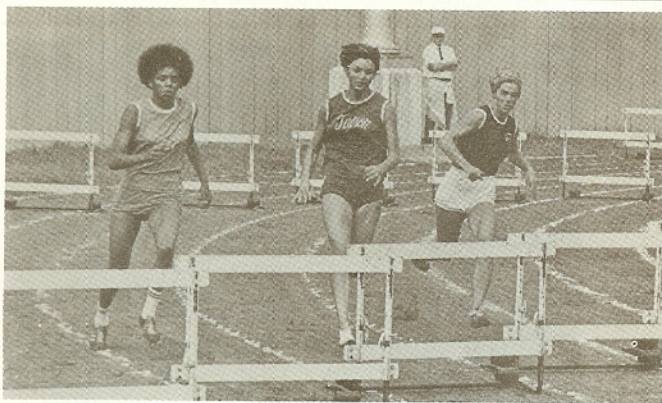

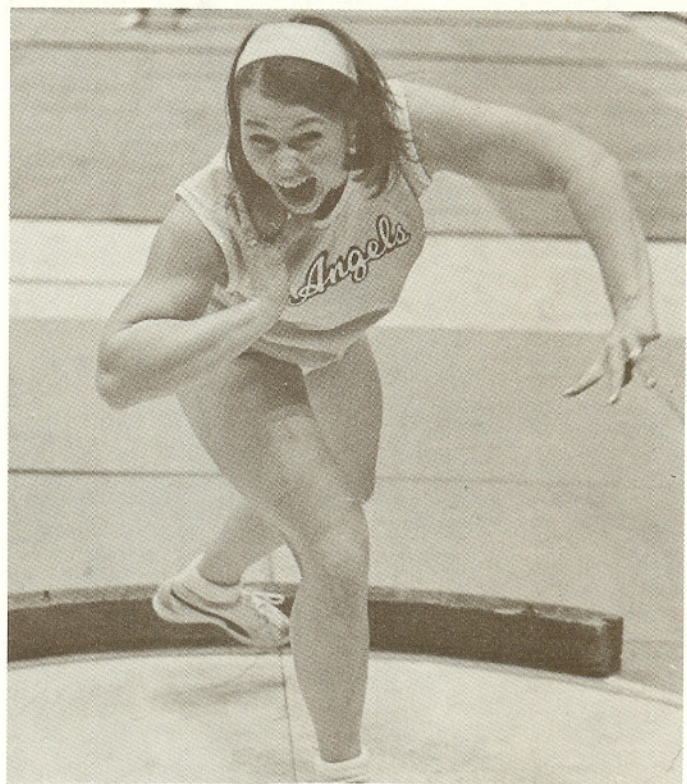

CHI 52.6 AT COMPTON INVITATIONAL

Los Angeles, June 6:-Chi Cheng was the whole show at the 31st Annual Compton Invitational as she won both the women's events by huge margins and set a new American All-comers record in the 440.

The anticipated first meeting of the year between Chi and Olympian Barbara Ferrell failed to materialize when Ferrell scratched from the event after warming up. Chi won easily into a 3.16mph wind in 10.6 on the slow Coliseum track. Donna Beckstrom of the Southern California Missiles was a surprise second ahead of 10.6 sprinter Williamae Fergerson who could only manage 11.3 on the Coliseum surface.

Ninety minutes later Chi returned for a rematch against Kathy Hammond and Olympic sixth placer Jarvis Scott in the 440. Hammond, running in lane two, went out too slow and lost contact over the first 180. Scott in lane five was off fast and Chi, running in lane four, stayed with the Olympic veteran for the first 220 yards when she slowly began to pull away and over the final 100 the Chinese ace was flying and went on to win by 25 yards. Scott held on for second in 55.2 with Hammond registering her season best at 55.3 for third and Una Morris getting 55.6 for fourth after mis-judging the finish line and easing up.

ORANGE - CHI 13.2, 10.3 & 52.5

Orange, California, June 20:-The TV cameras spotlighted Chi Cheng once again as she highlighted the Orange County Invitational by winning three events over the top opposition in the USA and won the voting by the press for the meet's outstanding athlete.

On the very, very poor track composed of steel slag scrapings, soft on top and rock-hard ¾ of an inch under the surface, Chi opened her day by winning the 100m hurdles in 13.2, equalling her own personal best and her own American All Comers record. Runner-up was Mamie Rallins given 13.5 but seemingly closer than that. Third was Jan Glotzer in 14.2 and fourth the Atoms Pat Hawkins in 14.9s.

Next up was the 100 yard dash in which Chi was called upon to face three 10.4 sprinters - Barbara Ferrell, Judy Murphy (Texas TC) and Pat Hawkins. Chi was the winner in 10.3, the world record only one week earlier, with Ferrell given a generous 10.5 for second. Una Morris surprised the field with her third place finish in 10.8 and Mavis Laing of Phoenix was fourth at 10.9 - leaving one to wonder where the 10.4 sprinters went.

Thirty minutes later Chi faced a strong field in the 440 with the intent of setting a new world mark. Had it not been for a coaching error, she probably would have the record today, but obeying orders she followed the field through what turned out to be a slow first half and although coming through to win easily by some 20 yards she missed the record by one-tenth of a second. The surprising second place winner was Mavis Laing, running in the outside lane, who turned in her lifetime best at 54.1s. Third went to Jamaican Una Morris, given 55.2 but adjusted by the TV pictures and press to 54.9. Fourth was Olympian Jarvis Scott in 55.4 followed by Kathy Hammond, who ran out of gas, and the Atoms Gail Fitzgerald.

Cheryl Toussaint won the 880 in a slow 2:11.6 over Terry Hull (2:12.0) and Maria Stearns (2:16.5). Doris Brown, who reinjured a knee while warming up, was forced to scratch.

San Mateo, California, June 21:-The Los Angeles Track Club, resplendent in new uniforms, walked off with the 1970 State title here today scoring 139 points to runner-up Millbrae Lion's 96 and Mickey's Missiles' 52. Lakewood Spartans edged cross-town rivals Long Beach Comets for the girl's title and La Mirada Meteors won the 12/13 championship.

Chi Cheng had the best performances as she won the 100 yard dash final by a large margin over teammate Una Morris in 10.5, came back to win the 220 and equal her new world record at 22.7 - ruled wind-aided by the wind gauge watcher which came as quite a surprise since no other race all day was wind-aided and no breeze could be felt yet the race was ruled as being aided by a twelve mph wind! - then faced new National Collegiate champion Pat Donnelly (13.5w) in the 100m hurdles and won easily to equal her own American all-comers record at 13.2 with Donnelly more than a second behind in 14.4, and then sped to a 52.5 anchor leg on the winning mile relay team.

There were other fine performances as well. Maria Stearns won the women's mile in 4:56.8 while Francie Larrieu toyed with Debbie Heald in the girls mile as she won in her season best of 4:50.8. Heald was a badly beaten third as Nanette Torrey broke the five minute mark for the first time for the silver medal in 4:57.9. Lynn Graham had her best shot mark of the year at 50'8 and Sherry Calvert her best in the javelin with a toss of 179'6. Larrieu also won the half with an easy 2:13.8, and Bobbette Krug sped to a 10.3 clocking for the 80y hurdles in the girls division.

WORLD REPORT by ELIO TRIFARI & JAN POPPER

Jan Popper does most of the statistical work for these World Reports while Elio Trifari does most of the commentary. In this respect, Trifari has asked it to be known he is greatly indebted for this comment to the following experts: Andy Huxtable (GB), Sven-Ivar Johansson (Sweden), Anatoliy Kashcheyev (USSR), Daniel Grinberg (Poland), Istvan Laszle and Gabriel Szabo (Hungary), Niculae Marasescu (Romania), Ted Radcliffe (Canada), Ken Peterson (USA), Milan Skocovsky (Czechoslovakia), Ants Teder (USSR) and also the magazines "Leichtathletik" (West Germany), "der Leichtathlet" (East Germany), "Athletics Weekly" (GB) and "Atletica Leggera" (Italy) and the daily sportspapers "Sovjetskiy Sport" (USSR), "L'Equipe" (France) and "La Gazzetta dello Sport" and "Tuttosport" (Italy).

Dashes: The fantastic show of Chi Cheng at the Portland Invitational has no equivalent in women's track history. A small amount of wind, a good track and a supporting crowd are poor explanations for the Chinese girls performances, and a couple of facts can better explain what I mean: for example the report in "Newsweek" (June 22) which tells how finally a woman is demanded by the crowd as the athlete of the meet after her big margin win in the 100y and her sizzling 52.6 on the quarter (fourth best girl in the world history over the distance). It could be said that Chi is confirming NOW the effective rightness of the WTFW poll at the end of last year that credited her with the title of best woman athlete of the 1969 season.

The second fact is that Chi has now a hard decision to make looking forward to the 1972 Olympic Games when she will be 28. Her speed seems to be "compressed" when she runs the hurdles, while on the flat races from 100 to 440 yards she could hardly be beaten today - if even! Personally, I think Chi could be under 50 seconds for the 400 with a little more dedication to the event and I wonder how many other girls would follow her under the fifties barrier in the future, (Neufville, perhaps, who's only 18). On the other side, I think she should avoid the long jump to prevent other muscle or cartilage accidents which bothered her during her early years in the States.

The European scene shows a low standard for even this early in the season. On the 100m, Renate Meissner (GDR) in absence of Petra Vogt, who is recovering from an illness has done no better than 11.4 (and 24.5 for 200m), and leads the Continent, but seems a little inconsistent as she faded to 11.7 three days after her 11.4. Other good marks were turned in by the Dutch Wilma Van Den Berg who flew 11.4 in the old city of Leyden while the wind aided Scotland's Helen Golden to 11.3 and blonde soccer player (!) Sylvie Telliez from France to 11.4.

Dorothy Hyman, whose ineligibility for international matches with the UK vest was recently confirmed by the Women's AAA, continues to perform as in the early 60's where she was second at Rome. Dorothy won the Yorkshire championships in the 100m in a fine 11.5 after doing the same time with the wind in her heat.

Seventeen year old Canadian Stephanie Berto seems to have given a definite check to Irene Piotrowski's dominion on the Canadian scene. At New Westminster Stephanie was stopped in 11.5, one tenth ahead of Piotrowski on May 30th with the promising Patti Loverock only one meter behind Irene.

The Soviet Union is usually slow in producing good sprint times in the first matches of the season, claims to have a good prospect for the Munich Olympics in Nadye Besfamilnaya, a 19 year old whose family name curiously means "without family". Nadye started as a dancer, but lost interest in dancing and developed slowly, but continuously, in track and field and in the sprints. Coached by former USSR 400m champion Zoya Petrova, Nadye has a target of 11.1/11.2 for Munich time. Actually, she is unbeaten in the USSR, the most recent win coming at the Pravada running meet in Moscow when she defeated the cream of USSR sprinters over 200m with a time of 23.7 tying her personal best.

Often inconsistent Hungarian ace Gyorgyi Balogh leads Europe on 200m with a fine 23.4 at Nepszava Cup meet in Budapest after a 23.5 on the same track the previous month.

First seasonal clashes between Marilyn Neufville and Lillian Board over the quartermile went to Neufville at the Crystal Palace at the end of May and the dark Jamaican-born outclassed Lillian with a world seasonal best of 52.0s. The British magazine "Athletics Weekly" reported, however, that Marilyn had gotten a "roller" worth two or three tenths, but

it also stated the true fact that it didn't matter because she would be running faster yet very soon. Consider that Lillian Board has competed on a wide range of events this season, from 200m through the mile and seems willing to concentrate on the 800, her running was also magnificent. There is no reason why she shouldn't go under the two minute mark in the 800 this season.

Judith Ayaa, the 18 year old Ugandian who was voted athlete of the year for Africa by WTFW correspondents last year has started another fine season. After an opening 56.9 last March, Judy did 54.4, 54.9 and 54.2 without opposition, and her African best of 53.6 set last year is in clear danger.

Colette Besson, after Nicole Duclos has scratched due to an expected baby next September, has had an unusual slow start. In her major meetings this year, Colette easily destroyed Lundgren and Govoni in Formia with 53.6, then reduced her seasonal best to 53.4 on the rain-soaked track of Saint Jean d'Angeley on June 6. It is possible Colette and Chi will clash over 400m in Paris on July 8.

Middle Distances: Little to say about the 800m if you exclude the Zagreb (Yugoslavia) meet of June 7th. There Vera Nikolic faced a strong foreign field and was, at the end, no less than fifth! She is now passing the European scepter she conquered in 1966 while winning the continental title, but no one could have imagined such a defeat/ Back from a 2:06.7 performance, Vera passed the bell in 58.0!! but faded immediately after and the race went to newcomer Marta Velekei of Hungary, a 400m runner who developed a special interest for the half mile only this year. The 22 year old Magyar won in 2:03.9, a world seasonal best, and look at the other finishers: 2, Sheila Taylor (GB) 2:04.3 (pb), 3-Waltraud Poehland (GDR) 2:04.4 (pb), 4-Donata Govoni (Italy) 2:05.0 (pb) (only her sixth-ever 800), and finally 5-Nikolic 2:05.7.

GDR and GFR have started a postal battle with Barbara Wieck and Hildegard Janze with Janze now leading 2:05.2 to 2:05.5.

In the 1500m the first two girls in the world seasonal list had to face each other in Berlin on June 17. Karin Burneleit, GDR, 27 year old and a 2:03.3 performer over 800m two years ago, came back after motherhood and turned in an excellent 4:14.2 on June 10 in Erfurt, an All-German record. Paola Pigni, 4:19.0 on May 1st in Warsaw, went to meet her in Berlin, but after warming up, Burneleit had to scratch from the race and Pigni won easily in 4:17.5. It

is interesting to note that Pigni recently clocked 35:30.5 over 10000 meters. She ran 5000m in 17:08.5 for a world unofficial best at that distance.

Great improvement must be noted in the 1500 for Nora Braithwaite, GB, who clocked 4:23.4 in early June.

Hurdles: Very few competitions for Karin Balzer this year to date. The world record-holder started the season with 13.6h in Erfurt in mid-May and reduced this time to 13.3 a week later on the same track. But at the "Olympic Day" Meet in East Berlin (June 17) she was slightly injured and Polish specialist Tereza Nowak won in 13.3 with the much improved Annelie Jahns, 20, finishing second ahead of Balzer, all three in 13.3s.

Nowak had a late seasonal start while teammate Tereza Sukniewicz lowered the national best to 13.2 (Warsaw, June 7). But the only clash between Nowak and Sukniewicz (Krakow on May 30) saw again the former coming home first, 13.8 to 13.9s. (Note: Sukniewicz lowered the world record to 12.8 just a few weeks later!)

Back from a year's disqualification because of drugs, Valeria Bufanu of Rumania clocked 13.6 and 13.5 in two weeks, the latter a national best. No news from the USSR after those two early season 13.4s by Lya Khitrina. At the "Riga Cup" meeting in early June, while Tamara Antaryan was winning in 13.9, 36 year old Galina Bystrova was coming home third in 14.3!

The 200m hurdles seem to be a Polish affair in Europe. Sukniewicz raised the continental best to 26.4 (Sofia on May 10) and you can count 18 times under 29 seconds up to now by Polish girls.

The Cubans also tried the event, and Raquel Martinez defeated Marlene Elejarde 27.8 to 27.9 in January at their national championships.

Chi Cheng has given up this event. Forced to chop her step greatly because of her speed and the wrong spacing of the hurdles, Chi tried one race only this year using eight steps and alternating. She recorded 26.6 in this early season (March) effort and hasn't tried the distance since.

EUROPEAN NEWS from Luigi Mengoni

Albania: On May 15 at Tirana, Marieta Pronjari, a student of the Physical Culture Institute, 19 years old, once again set a new national record in the high jump with a leap of 1.72/5'7". She is the only Albanian athlete who is ranked in the all-time world list.

Rumania: Bucharest, May 27/28, Cornelia Popescu set a record in the pentathlon with 4762 points. Her marks were: 14.5-34'5-6'0½-19'5½-25.6. In the same meet, Viscoploaneau had 4499 in the pentathlon including a long jump of 20'10½.

A new national record was set in the 100m by Mariana Goth when she sped to an 11.5 clocking on May 6th. She also has a 24.0 200 this season. Valeria Bufanu set a national mark in the 100m hurdles with 13.5 and Viorica Viscoploaneau, the world record holder in the long jump, got off a mark of 6.44/21'1½.

Yugoslavia: Velekei of Hungary ran the 800 in 2:03.9 on June 7 followed by Sheila Carey of Great Britain in 2:04.3, Pohland (EG) 2:04.4, Govoni (Italy) 2:05.0 and Nikolic (Yug) 2:05.7s. Nikolic won in Belgrad three days later in 2:04.8s.

WORLD RECORD 4x800m FOR ENGLAND

Edinburgh, Scotland, June 13:-British runners Rosemary Stirling, Pat Lowe, Lillian Board and Sheila Carey set a world record when they ran the 3200m relay in 8:27.0 today.

Competing in the British International Games at the new Meadowbank Stadium where the Commonwealth Games will be staged next month, the British team clipped six seconds off the previous record held by East Germany.

Britain was hard pressed by West Germany in today's race as the German squad also was under the old record with a time of 8:28.7s. The German team was composed of Ellen Tittel, Hildegard Janze, Christa Merten and Rosie Klut.

MARY PETERS SCORES 5031

Belfast, Ireland, June 6:-Mary Peters came within four points of Mary Toomey's UK pentathlon best (made with 80mH) and smashed Sue Scott's UK record (with 100mH) with the brilliant score of 5031 points. This is also a Commonwealth record.

Mary's performances were 13.7w for the 100mH, 51'2¼ for the shot put, 5'5¼ for the high jump, 17'11½ for the long jump and 24.5 for the 200m. (From "Athletics Weekly")
