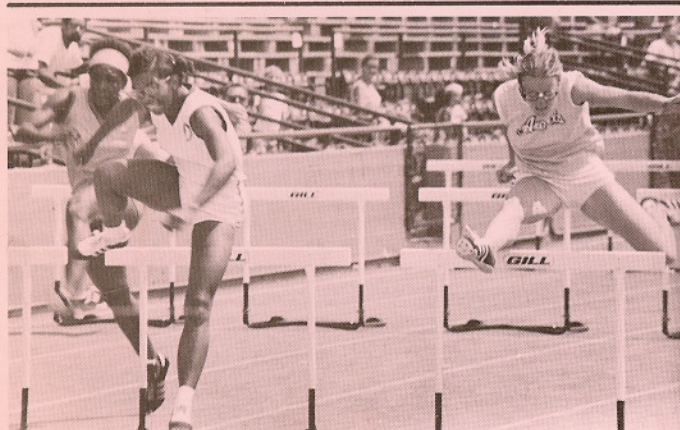
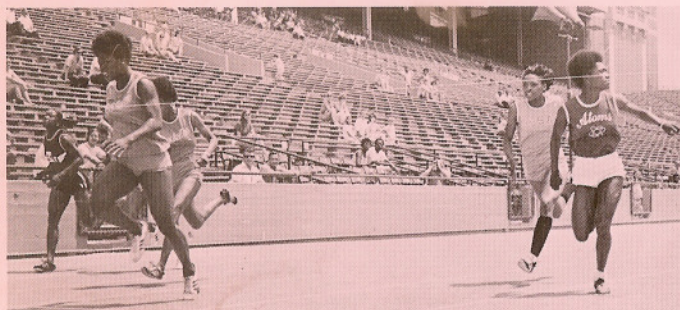

KING WINS PENTATHLON TITLE

Los Alamos, New Mexico, June 12:-Bolstered by the thin air of mile high Los Alamos and aided by adrenaline flow brought about by combining the National AAU Pentathlon Championships with the trials for the Pan American Games, twelve all-around track and field stars met here in a showdown. At the end, it came as no surprise that Marilyn King had won her first pentathlon title and will lead the USA's five-eventers to Cali in late July. What did come as a surprise, however, was King's teammate on the Pan Am team - Judy Durham of the Angels TC.

Durham was rated only 13th in the USA last year with a point score just barely above the elusive four thousand mark with 4001. She had competed in only one pentathlon during the 1971 season and had improved to 4242, but no one was ready for her nearly 300 point improvement with such outstanding marks as 20'0½ in the long jump and 5'4½ in the high jump. She was not even in the top 30 in 1970 in the high jump and was tied for 30th in the long jump at 18'6 - a mark she had failed to reach to date thus far in 1971.

Marilyn King likewise was vastly improved, but not such a surprise as Durham. King upped her best from 4542 to a very respectable 4731 with marks of 13.9 (a personal best) in the hurdles, 20'1 (another personal best) in the long jump, 37'8

THE 'SHOW MEET' by Jeff Johnson

Champaign, Illinois, June 19/20:-There is something sad, something both poignant and ridiculous about a major athletic event that is held in an empty stadium. But that's the state of women's track in America, or at least in Champaign. Or maybe it was the stifling heat and sudden rains on Saturday, or the heat and winds on Sunday. But whatever, except for the competing athletes, coaches, officials and a few interested parents, no one was there. The final competitions on Sunday were opened with the playing of the Star Spangled Banner (a recording), a tune of magnitude and power, a pageant that always serves to unite the spectators with the athletes on the field in a shared feeling of common endeavor. But there were no spectators, none at all, only the wind humming through the stadium and the sparrows shrieking in the rafters of the press box, and that made it all very sad. And to those athletes who had trained for so long and so very hard for this competition, for the right to represent their country against the Soviet Union, perhaps just a little bit embarrassing.

The point of the meet ostensibly was a demonstration of fitness on the part of the place winners at the Pan Am Trials held on April 30/May 1. And, to pick a team for the Russian meet on July 3/4. The Pan Am team members demonstrated their fitness, more or less, as all the Colombia bound girls made it into the finals of their events. Only four events placed the same two girls 1-2, but this is about what was expected.

COMMENTS ON THE 'SHOW MEET' by Luther Blake

The meet was held in an ideal setting at the University of Illinois....all seven girls in the long jump final were over 19 feet. 16 year old Moranda Lacey of the Wichita TC continues to be very impressive. I watched her jump 19'7½ taking off seven inches behind the board. If she ever learns the proper form and technique, she will be over 21 feet consistently....Doris Brown's double in the 880 and 1500 must certainly rank as the outstanding performance of the meet...I have to ask again, "Why Quantico?" Why could not this meet be the Pan Am trials? Under the system (?) used, we have some strange situations such as the new American record holder in the hurdles not being on the Pan Am team and several of the Pan Am team members far back in the finals here. There is a need for everyone involved with women's track and field to become more concerned with the planning for the big international meets such as the Pan Am Games and the Olympic Games so the USA will be able to field the strongest possible team in 1972 at Munich. It is time the coaches and officials stop the petty bickering among themselves and work together. It seems to me that certain coaches and officials are more concerned with their own ego and who is going to accompany what team on which trip than they are with the program....In the semi-final of the 100, Pat Hawkins was completely overlooked by the judges - but luckily the video tape showed she was actually third....Seeding seemed strange once again in the 440 with 55.7 needed to qualify in fourth place in heat one and only 56.6 needed to win in the second while 59.4 made it to the final....The timing left much to be desired in the 1500 as Francie Larrieu was given only 4:43.2 in 5th while Brenda Webb in 6th was clocked in 4:33.7. If Larrieu ran 4:43.2 she would have been LAST....It was too bad Larrieu was suffering from a virus, but she will be ready at the Nationals....Timing again was questioned in the age group 100. The results for the first three finishers were announced as 10.8, 10.9 and 11.1 - then mysteriously changed to 10.7, 10.9 and 10.9 although the first two places were practically a dead heat.

Since new American records were recorded in the 100 yard dash, 100 meter hurdles and the 12/13 100 in addition to many personal bests in the sprints, hurdles and long jump, the question of wind must be raised. When the athletes were on their marks for the 100m hurdles final, their hair was pointing straight forward at the hurdles, and coaches and athletes were unanimous in recognizing that the wind was blowing hard with the runners. A wind gauge of sorts was being used - a black box about the size of a cigarette pack, with a dime-sized hole for the wind to enter and activate a dial. This type gauge is not official and marks made can not be recognized and will not be acceptable to the IAAF. The rules state the gauge must give the "average" wind reading and such a recording is not possible with this hand-held device. Discounting the question of accuracy of such a device, it is evident that if the hand-held instrument was not pointed directly into the wind that the size of the opening would not be adequate to catch the force of the wind. An angling, aiding cross wind would probably defy measurement. Considering the limitations of the wind gauge instrument and everyone's general feeling that it was a very windy weekend, the times in the sprints, hurdles and marks in the long jump on both days have to be called into serious question. And why is it that a meet of this stature does not have a legal wind gauge? And no wind readings were recorded on ANY result sheet. And why oh why were all events run in yards when both the Pan Am Games and the Russian meet are to be contested in meters?

100 Yard Dash: Iris Davis blasted to an American record with a 10.2 clocking the first time she had her spikes on, while Liberty's sprint duo of Kathy Guiney and Kathie Lawson each won their heats from more seasoned competitors. Pat Hawkins looked much improved over early spring with a solid 10.7 heat.

Davis "slowed" to a 10.3 in the first semifinal, while Render looked very good in the second section. Only surprises were the losses of heat winners Guiney and Lawson from the ranks

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of the qualifiers. Several girls were having trouble by this time with the heat and humidity, and Lawson particularly complained of dizziness and weakness after her race.

Iris Davis roared away from everyone in the final as Pat Hawkins edged Mattline Render for second. Pat is again showing the form that carried her through an outstanding indoor season. Pan Am qualifier Orien Brown's 10.8 was only good for sixth place.

The heat and the humidity were starting to affect everyone by the time of the semis, especially those girls who had been contesting other events as well. Heat winners Barr and Lawson were running all out for thirds, reeling at the end. Stroy bombed the field in the second section with a swift 23.6, establishing herself as the one to beat in the final.

By Sunday's final, Esther Stroy had already run the quarter, and her lane one position gave her the tightest turn to run. But she handled the corner beautifully and accelerated down the stretch to take the win away from Kathie Lawson right at the tape. Though the times don't show it, Ferguson was closer to Lawson than Lawson was to Stroy. Laurie Barr's head cold made it difficult to breath, and the Pan Am qualifier never got out of last place.

440 Yard Dash: Mavis Laing showed her stuff with a 54.9 heat win that looked easy, as Sports International qualified four girls for the final, fully half the field.

In the final, Laing started fast, built an early lead and held it as everyone else ran for second. Stroy held off teammate Gwen Norman for the second spot on the Russian team, as Pan Am qualifiers Norman and Scott sewed up third and fourth places.

880 Yard Run: Cheryl Toussaint led the way with a 2:09.1 in the first heat, with Doris Brown riding close behind in second. Terry Crawford set a comfortable pace to the 660, then sensing no pressure, jogged the homestretch to lead all the qualifiers in the second heat with 2:13.8. Of those girls who had run the 1500m final earlier in the day, only Doris Brown and Francie Johnson were successful qualifiers. Johnson, having one of the worst days of her life, snuck in with a 2:17.0 and remarked that she couldn't have run a second faster had her life depended on it. Barbara Lawson was eliminated in the fast first heat with a clocking around 2:12.

Doris Brown likes to win. In fact, she gets downright nasty about losing. In the final, Terry Crawford tried to pin a loss on her by setting a fast early pace, but Brown hung with her, and Crawford's charge in the homestretch was countered by a better one as Brown registered her fastest time of the year with a 2:05.7. Crawford kept second to duplicate the placings of Quantico. Francie Johnson seemed to have Toussaint beaten for third with 150 yards to go, but Cheryl had a kick at the end and tallied her season's best of 2:07.5. Precocious Carol Hudson was never really a factor and finished fifth in 2:09.3.

1500 Meter Run:-This was the first final event on Saturday's program, and had it not been for the short rain shower that immediately preceded the event and cut the worst of the mid-day heat, the times might never have been so fast. Francie Larrieu, weakened by a week long fever, set a pedestrian early pace, but Doris Brown took charge at the half and immediately opened up a 15 yard lead with only Kathy Gibbons quick enough, or nervy enough, to go with her. Larrieu faded to fifth while another favorite for top honors, Liberty's Francie Johnson, had more miseries than she could handle and dropped out with 300 yards to go. Brown made it to the tape in a quick 4:18.8, while Gibbons, Eileen Claugus and Barbara Lawson all recorded lifetime bests in taking the next three places.

100 Meter Hurdles:-Patty Johnson and Mamie Rallins both ran away with their heats in identical 13.4's to set the stage for a great final. Johnson, who trains on cinders, was running high on the hurdles and having some trouble finding a hurdling rhythm on the springy tartan track. Rallins, who trains on tartan, has the same difficulty on cinders, but when she is comfortable with the surface, she is world class.

In the final, Johnson got a bad start, clobbered the first hurdle, and found herself way, way down on a flying Mamie Rallins. It was Rallins all the way, and Mamie was howling with glee from the last hurdle to the tape, then let her momentum carry her half way around the track where she ducked behind a tree and had herself a good cry. The watches showed an American record 13.1 for Rallins, and record tying 13.3's for Johnson in second and Lacey O'Neal in third, but these almost have to be windy times. O'Neal improved nearly a full second over her season best - 14.2 to 13.3, Glotzer came from 14.1 to 13.5, Donnelly was 0.4 better, Rallins improved 0.4 and Johnson 0.3.

COMMENT FROM STEVE PRICE, OHIO

"In the 1500 meters run at the "Show Meet" in Urbana, the times after fourth place are in error. Francie Larriue was credited with 4:43 which couldn't possibly have been correct. Brenda Webb (6th) was timed in 4:33.7, 4:33.7 and 4:33.9 by me, Jerry Hutchinson and Red Simmons of the Michigammas. Athletes in 7th and 8th places (Pam Bagian and Monique Opiola), were clocked in the 4:34-4:35 range. Although the top four places were timed correctly, the times for fifth place on down were not.

"In looking at the latest issue of WFFW, I notice that the best 1500m listed in the US was 4:34.7. In the Urbana meet I believe that at least the first seven finishers produced better times than that. This was possibly the greatest mass finish in US history. Many personal marks were improved upon last Saturday such as Brenda who came from 4:45.5 to 4:33.7. She passed the 400 in 72.1 and was next to last at that point. She has been running only for the past fourteen months."

NM PENTATHLON TO GLOTZER

Los Alamos, New Mexico, June 5:-Jan Glotzer won the 1971 version of the New Mexico AAU pentathlon championship with a good score of 4272, edging Lisa Chiavario who tallied 4221. In an exhibition race, 9 year old Lisa Gilliland ran the 880 in 2:40.6, better than the listed world age record by one-tenth, but only two official watches were used.

Wichita, Kansas, June 11/12:-Texas Track Club annexed the team title at the Annual USTFF Championships here today with a total of 155 points, far ahead of runner-up Iowa TC who scored only 63. The quality of the meet was the best in its brief history with several fine track marks being recorded and good, but wind-aided, marks in the long jump.

VAN KIEKEBELT PENTATHLON RECORD - 4965

Canadian Debbie Van Kiekebelt established herself as the favorite to win the Pan American Games pentathlon title when she scored 4965 points and a new Canadian record in a warm-up competition. Although not yet assured of a spot on the Canadian team, (the Pan Am trials were not held until the 19/20 of June), Van Kiekebelt's mark was the best by a Western hemisphere athlete. She had personal bests in the 100m hurdles and long jump as well as the shot. Her event marks were 13.9-40'2½-5'8-20'1¼-24.8. Second in the competition was Jamaican Yvonne Saunders with 4353 while Liz Damman with 4085 and Linda Hughes (4004) were over the four thousand point mark.

RUSSIA - TRIALS FOR USA from Jan Popper

Tallinn, Soviet Union, June 12/13:-The Pravda Meeting was held at Tallinn on two chilly and cold afternoons with the thermometer never getting above the 8° centigrade mark. The meet was run on the rubber-asphalt track of "Komsomol" Stadium and served as the qualifying meet for the forthcoming USA-USSR=World All Star meet. In most events, the first two finishers should represent the USSR at Berkeley.

KAREN MACK 4900 from Alfonso Posada

Barcelona, Spain, May 29/30:-West Germany's Karen Mack won an international pentathlon competition with a fine score of 4900 points with a well-balanced performance that included 14.4-42'5½-5'7¼-19'2¼-24.6s. Kari Schallau, West Germany, was second with 4799 and Sweden's Britt Johansson set a new Swedish record in third place with her score of 4612. Others were Linda Hedmark (Sweden) 4237, Ana Molina (Spain) 4085, Pilar Fanlo (Spain) 3981 and Mercedes Ribelles (Spain) who set a Spanish junior record at 3671.

BIG NAMES AT BRITISH INTERNATIONAL GAMES

Edinburgh, Scotland, June 12:-The big names of European women's track and field gathered together for the British International Games - but although the competition was there, the results were spoiled by the weather, a constant problem in Edinburgh. But the "wheels" were together - Renate Meissner-Stecher and Irena Szewinska in the sprints, Balzer and Sukniewicz in the hurdles, a fine field of 1500m runners, Rita Schmidt in the high jump, Szewinska, Sherwood and Ann Wilson in the long jump, Karin Illgen in the discus - but the results didn't necessarily pay attention to the advanced press notices!

Renate Stecher won the 100 meters when Szewinska was left in her blocks, but the race was run into a 4.2mps wind and the time only 11.9. In addition, England's Anita Neil, who had an 11.3 earlier in the year in Israel, edged into second ahead of the long Pole with all three being credited with the same time. Only Neil came back in the 200 and she faded to fifth as 15 year old Sonia Lannaman won in 24.4 against a strong wind.

Regina Kleinau scored a disputed win over England's Rita Ridley in the 1500 with both runners given 4:15.6 - and all were bothered by the strong winds. The wind also spoiled the time in the 3000m although Joyce Smith won with a new Commonwealth and UK record at 9:43.8.

The 100m hurdles brought together Balzer and Sukniewicz in a spine tingling anticipated match - which was won by Poland's second (or third) string Danute Straszynska in 13.7 against a 5.5mps (about a 12 mile per hour) wind. Balzer was second, but Sukniewicz slumped into fifth place running only 14.5s. Straszynska also won the 200m hurdles in 26.8 against a 3.6mps wind.

The long jump provided good competition. Szewinska opened with 21'¾, then Ann Wilson countered with 21'4. Szewinska came back to hit 21'8 on her second jump with Wilson once again jumping 21'4. Irena upped her best to 21'10¼ and Wilson showing great consistency, hit 21'¾. Bidding her time, in the meantime, was Commonwealth Games champion Sheila Sherwood who had a best of 20'10½ in the three preliminary jumps. On her fourth attempt she hit 21'¾, went 21'2 on her fifth attempt and on her final jump cleared 21'6¼ to take second place. Unfortunately, all jumps were wind-aided, but that took nothing away from the excellent competition.

Although Rita Schmidt won the high jump as expected, many eyes were on Dorothy Shirley who finished in a tie for 3rd at 5'5¾ - Shirley was the silver medalist in the Olympic Games in Rome in 1960!

WEST GERMANY WHIPS RUMANIA 81-53

Geretsried, West Germany, June 12:—Hildegard Janze-Falck had the best mark of the day with a 2:04.5 run in the 800 meters as West Germany easily outclassed Rumania 81-53 in a dual meet here today. It was a bad day for Olympic champions as Rumania's Mihaela Penes, the 1964 javelin champion, could only nab fourth with a throw of 139'7 and the 1968 long jump winner, Viorica Viscopleanu, was third in her favorite event at 20'1. Still another Olympic champion, Lia Manoliu, the 1968 discus winner, was also third at 187'8.

Second in the race of international competition was Norway's Heidi Vien in 4:38.7. Norway won the girl's match.

Kari Karlsen, 19 year old high jumper, leaped 1.76/5'9 $\frac{1}{4}$ in Groningen, Holland, on June 6th to tie the brand new Nordic record set by Denmark's Grith Ejstrup.

COACHING MYTH NO. 2*

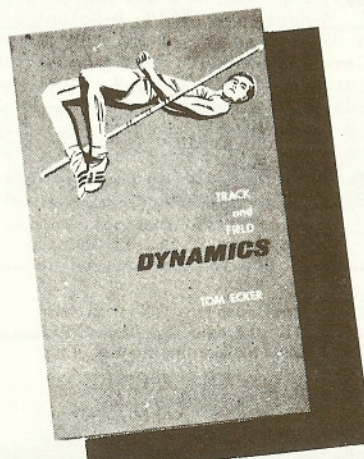
Coaches should encourage their dashmen to lean forward during sprint races.

This is a fairly widely held misconception among U.S. coaches and fans. Under analysis it does not stand up, and it is just one of the many widespread coaching myths exploded in Tom Ecker's great new book **TRACK AND FIELD DYNAMICS**.

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CLIFF TEMPLE'S TRANSATLANTIC CLIFFHANGERS

The day the 3000m becomes a standard individual track race for women can't come too soon for Britain's distance runners, because there are too many top class athletes chasing too few places on the only team that really matters to them this year - Britain's squad for the European Championships. As more and more 400/800 girls try their luck at 1500m, so the slower ones, who have had it their own way until now, are getting squeezed out.

Such is the attraction of the 1500m now that even Joan Allison, number one British two-lapper as I write, is adamant that she wants to run that event in Helsinki although she is only number two in Britain. Joan has had two more attempts at achieving what she couldn't do in last year's Commonwealth Games - beat UK record holder Rita Ridley - and both times she has failed. First, in Warsaw (May 1) Rita outsprinted her; secondly, in Edinburgh (June 12) Rita ran right away from her, and led the invitation race at the British International Games, from the start. Rita didn't win the race, as East Germany's Regina Kleinau pipped her in the last stride, as both ran 4:15.6; Joan scored a personal best of 4:16.6 in third place, but was disappointed. Earlier (May 31) Joan had beaten Rita over 800m at Leicester, 2:04.8 to 2:05.5; and afterwards (June 16th at Reading) beat her again 2:06.7 to 2:07.8, in a race in which Commonwealth 800m gold medallist Rosemary Stirling opened up her season with a 2:06.9 in second place.

So when it comes to 800m, Joan beats Rita; at 1500m Rita beats Joan - think what a helluva race they'd have over 1200m.

Rita, incidentally, left for St. Moritz, Switzerland, on June 18th for a fortnight's altitude training as an experiment (she's never run at altitude before). Then she hopes to have a crack at the world mile record of 4:36.8 by Mia Gommers a couple of days after her return in an invitational event at Edinburgh on July 3rd.

Margaret Beacham, who had such a sensational indoor season, three times breaking the world 1500m record, had a really rough patch when she started to race outdoors, folding up badly in a series of 800/1500m races: her times weren't disastrous, but slower than she had expected. Margaret's coach, Bryan Smith, thought she might be anaemic and she had her blood tested, but it was OK. The strain is probably psychological, and she'll be all right again after a rest from the track for a couple of weeks - her season never really finished last year: she went straight into winter competition, with great success, but trying to have a third successive "season" proved too much.

Bryan Smith's wife, Joyce, is having a great time at present, setting a personal best 1500m mark of 4:25.2 in winning the Southern Women's AAA title on June 5th, and a week later setting UK record 3000m figure of 9:43.8 during the British International Games (Edinburgh, June 12). Second in this race was Chris Haskett, who set a Scottish mark of 10:06.4. While Joyce is 33 years old, Chris is only 18 - and a tiny, shy 18 at that - which hardly makes her the "seasoned performer" she was described as in WTFW's report on the International Cross Country Champs in Spain! In a joking reference to this in "Athletics Weekly", I called her "Granny" Haskett, and when I was in Scotland for the British International Games, I found the poor girl has been stuck with the nickname by all her friends. Now see what you started!

The BIG, incidentally, were staged by the British Amateur Athletic Board as a sort of follow-up to the Commonwealth Games. There was some good competition with names like Rita Schmidt, Danute Straszynska, Karin Balzer, Teresa Sukniewicz, Anneliese Erhardt, Regina Kleinau, Karin Illgen, Irena Szewinska, Renate Stecher taking part, as well as the British top names. Among British girls I now include your own Judy Vernon, a very talented and most attractive newcomer to the British scene. Hurdler Sheila Garnett, who equalled the UK 200m hurdles record of 27.3 at Watford on June 5th, attributed Judy's presence as the stimulant she needed to perform well, (Judy ran 28.0) in lousy weather conditions. Sheila again equalled the record at the BIG though in third place, and into a 3.6mps wind. When she gets good conditions, the record will be well into the twenty-sixes, with Judy Vernon and Sandra Dyson capable of pushing her there. Sandra, incidentally, recently took part in, and won, the first ever women's 400m hurdles race, staged in Bonn on May 15th. Her time was 61.1.

Marilyn Neufville has at last got the bit between her teeth again. At the Southern championships on June 5th, she looked to be running with determination for the first time since her world record 400m. She was pipped for the 100m

title by Andrea Lynch, but won the 200m in 24.4, not letting up until through the tape for the first time in ages. I wasn't surprised to hear the next day that she had run 53.4 for 400m in an inter-club meeting at Brighton - she is obviously getting down to it now for the Pan-American Games.

The Women's AAA National championships are looming on the horizon, and they promise to be a great meeting. But the Press is waiting for one thing with baited breath - and that is: which gimmick will WAAA Secretary Marea Hartman come up with to drum up some publicity for the championships? Although women's track gets a fair amount of publicity here on merit alone, each year since 1968 at this time Marea has announced straight-faced, some ban or other, usually concerned with the competitors clothing, which is being enforced at the championships.

In 1968, it was shorts. A rumour was spread that certain starters at the championships had complained that they couldn't concentrate on their job because the shorts worn by some of the girls were distracting them. Of course, the popular press went wild with pictures of girl athletes in shorts from every angle, interviews with starters about what they thought when they were starting a race, (they all said, gallantly, the start!), interviews with athletes about what they wore under their shorts and so on. The championships, for the first time got on the front pages of many newspapers, usually starting with a story about Marea Hartman checking the girl's shorts, and huge photographs of rows of bottoms at the start of a girl's sprint or hurdle race. It took Vera Nikolic's world record 800m of 2:00.5 to put everyone's mind back on what the meeting was all about!

The sponsors, of course, loved it, and encouraged something similar for the future. Thus in 1969 came a stern warning from Marea Hartman that any girls seen competing in the championships with (would you believe?) a bare midriff would be disqualified.

Now, I don't know what it's like in the warmer climate of the USA, but I have never seen, before then or after, a girl competing with a bare midriff. (Shame, shame.) But as soon as Marea had issued her warning, complaining that "there is a new fashion in which girls are tucking their singlets up into their bras, leaving their midriff bare", the papers were suddenly full of them - but all posed, not competing. And, of course, no one was disqualified.

Then last year, as we took a further step into the permissive age, the edict was that girls, according to Marea Hartman, had been wearing - oh, horror - padded bras to gain them the decision in close finishes. The papers found this a little more difficult to illustrate, but there were interviews with half the British women's team, who all denied wearing such things but most added that it would be a good idea.

So now any day we are waiting for the 1971 "ban". Considering the kind of thing it will be competing with to make print in the national papers, the mind just boggles! But stay tuned to this column for all the latest details on serious topics, such as these, which confront the world of women's track!

Gummersbach, West Germany, June 13:-Holland's four-woman team whipped West Germany 18819-18687 in a pentathlon match here today. Miep van Beek won the individual competition with a total of 4865 points as the West Germans were competing without Rosendahl, Mickler or Schuller - which would have made a difference! van Beek's individual marks were 13.9-41'4½-5'7¼-18'10-25.1.

RENATE STECHER'S ASTOUNDING CAREER by Eberhard Bock

Modestly, smiling in a friendly way, accepting just another congratulation with a nod, that's how she stood before us. We had "cornered" Europe's fastest woman sprinter in a niche of the huge hall of the "City of Sofia" Hotel in the Bulgarian capital. Just for a chat after a long winter and following an impressive victory. Renate is not fond of long interviews; the fuss press reporters make about her and her rise is not to her liking. "That simply puts me out of my stride. And anyway, I am mostly asked the same questions." Since last autumn the 20 year old Jena inhabitant has had a press officer of her own. "Yes, my husband relieves me of quite a number of duties. He knows all about my life and my development and besides he can relate all these things much better than I could." There is a lot in Renate's words. How about, for instance her rocket-like upsurge, that 'sensational explosion', as people referred to her development? "I am often asked, whether I am especially talented. Sure, I am talented, perhaps a little more than the average man in the street. But above all, I am fond of sports, I love the sensation of being able to play with speed, of being faster and still faster."

The development of the Jena sports student is characterized by outspoken continuity. "Year after year I went ahead. There was no stagnation, no injuries worth talking about. Of course, I experienced some difficulties and the ascent to the top of GDR sprinting was not quite as easy as it may sound." That is how Renate looks upon her development today. As a sixteen year old girl she won her first medal in the course of a GDR international championship. A few weeks after the GDR athletes had proved their high standard during their first separate participation at the Budapest European Championships winning eight titles and a total of 17 medals, the new blood proved during the first Juniors European Championships in Odessa that these successes were due to a systematic and purposeful work. Already as a 16 year old girl Renate was a member of the victorious 4x100m GDR relay team.

Relay races and the competitions within the framework and on behalf of the collective played a big role in Renate's development. Coach Horst Hille who has been looking after her for more than seven years, was convinced of her abilities from the very beginning. He not only showed her how to start, how to move her arms while running and how this or that detail during the relay race had to be tackled, he also formed her personality; "What you need now is patience" he impressed upon her. At the age of 18 she won two silver medals during the Second European Junior Championships in Leipzig covering the 100 and 200 meters in a personal record time and another silver medal as a member of the GDR 4x100m relay team, the Soviet team winning the gold medal.

At that time she certainly would have looked doubtfully at anybody prophesying that one year later she would be European champion as a member of the GDR relay team and silver medalist over 200 meters. But her coach knew very well what he was doing, when in 1969 he began to speak about a possibility of her participation in the European Championships and began drafting his plan. But suddenly everything seemed to be jeopardized. For some weeks Renate suffered from an injury, not a bad one, but still an injury, which did not allow her to train very hard. And just during that period the GDR women sprinting underwent a minor revolution. Petra Vogt, an 18 year old secondary school student from Halle, dashed along the tracks like a whirlwind and, competing with the more than 10 years older Karin Balzer, established a new GDR 100m record at 11.3 seconds. The example set by these two women sprinters gave wings to the other girls and so it happened that during the GDR championships 11.4 seconds were just good enough for a fourth place. But Renate had not been among those four competitors. A few days before the departure for Athens she was given just another chance. She clocked 23.3 seconds for the 200 meters and, deputizing in the 4x100 relay for the injured Karin Balzer, did her leg at a terrific pace and was admitted to the team at short notice. Two weeks later she became a European champion as a member of the relay team and 2nd fastest European sprinter over 200 meters behind Petra Vogt.

While this stage of her development progressed in, so to say, slow motion the following months confirmed once again the continuity of her advance. The 1970 indoor season marked the beginning of her successful attempt to break into the ranks of the women's fastest sprinters. During the winter season she was not beaten even once; she established a new world record for the 100 meters event at 11.0 seconds and be-



came one of the pillars of the GDR national team, which excelled itself, winning the European Cup.

The competition for this European Cup revealed one of Renate's further decisive and valuable features, her fighting qualities. Though indisposed due to an infection of her appendix she did not hesitate, after the physician had given her the green light, to participate in the events. For the sake of the reputation of her team she risked a blemish upon her so far flawless record. Every single point was needed. After a week start in the 100m sprint she was only beaten by Ingrid Becker (GFR), but won the 200m sprint and participated in the victorious 4x100m GDR relay, thus gaining six points for the GDR team. Her example helped to inspire the whole team and thus the valuable cup for the best women's track team of our continent was secured by the GDR representation.

Today Renate Stecher is a model for the sports enthusiastic GDR young people, of whom the Socialist sports movement has brought forth so many. These youngsters are modest, friendly, restrained, but sure of their abilities and determined to employ them energetically on behalf of their country.

One year before the Olympic Games, the European Championships at Helsinki will be a climax of the season. In the sprint events the competition of one athlete with the other brings decisions and it is up to the best of them to orientate themselves to the highest accomplishments. Hitherto, three women sprinters have done 100m in 11.0: Olympic champion Wyomia Tyus (USA), Chi Cheng from the Republic of China, and Renate Stecher. Will this record be further lowered? "This will happen, because developments - as illustrated by our contemporary sports - cannot be stopped."

Renate, who was awarded the "Golden Spikes" as the best European runner, as a result of a poll organized by the Československi Sport, is too modest to talk about her capabilities, but her competitors are fully aware of her potentials.

PAT BANK - USA STAR OF THE DECADE

Who has been the most prolific athlete in the United States over the past nine years? Who has won the most individual championships? Who has collected the most medals? Who has made the most points?

WTFW delved into the past and has come up with the name of our most outstanding performer and announces it is none other than Pat Daniels Winslow Bank who has amassed eight individual national outdoor titles and 20 winning places in a most amazing career.

Seven of her eight individual national outdoor crowns were won in the toughest event of all, the pentathlon. Had we gone further back into history, we could have added more pentathlon titles to her collection, but we were covering only the years since 1961. Pat has NEVER been beaten by an American in the pentathlon. That is a record unmatched. In addition to her pentathlon titles, she also won the national long jump title in 1967 at Santa Barbara with a wind-aided jump of 20'8 $\frac{1}{4}$ - and also had a legal jump of 20'6. She has scored in the high jump and shot in addition to her long jump and pentathlon triumphs picking up 8 firsts, three seconds, two thirds, four fourths, one fifth and two sixth places over the years.

Pat won the Pan Am Games pentathlon title in 1967, but because of a very recent knee operation, (she reports she took her first 'bath' on June 20!), she will not be able to defend her title at Cali. She does plan to be ready for the 1972 Olympic Games in Munich, however. Her record of 20 medals is made more amazing when it is recalled she did not compete in 1969 and was injured all of the 1970 season and in spite of this managed to compete in one pentathlon competition - the National Championships - and win it!

Second in the past decade is Willye White who has won 7 individual titles, (all in the long jump) and a total of 13 medals. A very surprising third with 12 places won and four individual titles is unsung Carol Moseke Frost. Chi Cheng has won 11 medals while Eleanor Montgomery and Mamie Rallins have 10 each.

We also delved into the indoor competition which brought about a somewhat different result. First of all, contrary to outdoor championship meets, not all athletes feel compelled or required to take part in the indoor championships and many skip one or two years of running on the boards. But the results of the survey were still interesting. This survey covered 10 seasons and finds Willye White with the most medals won, a total of 12. Willye has won three indoor titles, but the amazing thing is that she has NEVER won an indoor long jump championship in spite of being outdoor champion 7 out of the last 9 years! Willye won the 50y title in 1962 and 1963 and the 100 in 1963 for her three gold indoor medals. As stated previously, athletes do not always take part indoors, and Willye missed the 1965, 1967 and 1969 indoor championships.

The athlete with the most gold indoors is Eleanor Montgomery who won 7 titles over the 10 year period and she retired after 1969. Her only indoor loss came in 1965 when she was second to world record holder Yolanda Balas of Rumania. Chi Cheng has won six indoor golds, three of them in 1970, but she did not compete indoors in 1962, 1963, 1964, 1967, 1969 or 1971. A surprising medal gatherer with a tot-

al of nine, (matching Montgomery and Chi) is Francie Kraker-Johnson.

LETTER FROM RANDALL LAMBERT, Nebraska

'I noted with interest your comments concerning meets that run behind schedule. We certainly do not enjoy the number of quality meets that many areas of the nation have established; however, our largest meet which has been held annually for the past nine years - including site changes from Columbus to Beatrice and finally to Hastings, has never run a minute behind schedule. In fact this year we had an expected threat of tornadoes for the first time and finished the meet an hour early. This hurried approach was orderly and the only real problem occurred in a driving rain during the relays when a team was omitted by a hasty error.

I read your remarks concerning the Iowa State Girl's Track Meet which is certainly a fine event and the envy of the Nebraska girls since we did not have a meet until this year. Actually, because of the experience of Iowa, I believe that we may have a superior State Meet although our times are not comparable because our schools do not have the track background that the Iowa schools have built through the better than ten years of State track meets.

I mention that ours is a better program than the Iowa program because we have the local, district and state meet in four different classes rather than in just one class as Iowa does. This means our large schools such as Omaha and Lincoln schools will be in one of the four classes whereas very few of the Des Moines, Cedar Rapids, Sioux City and other large metropolitan schools compete in girl's track in Iowa. Our State meet will be representative of almost 100% of the total high school girl population next year, while the Iowa State meet would not probably be representative of more than 35% of the total high school girl population.

Whatever the case, we certainly have been fortunate in the midst that the high school activities associations have permitted us to have competition for these girls.

KALEIDOSCOPE

In the top 50 performances of 1970 listing which appeared in WTFW the last two issues, the USA had only six individuals with marks good enough to be so ranked. Iris Davis is the top US performer of 1970 as she had three of her 100m sprints in the world top 10. Mavis Laing was good for two marks in the 400 and 1 in the 200 while Hammond had one mark good enough to make the 400 list, Kathy Schmidt had one mark in the javelin and Pat Hawkins and Pat Donnelly each had one mark in the 200m hurdles....Add to the 1970 US list 10.8 by Diane Hughes (Cleveland Recreation) in the 100, 24.0 by her teammate Robyn Russell in the 220 and Annie Cullum's 29.3 in the 200mH....Our editorial concerned with starting track meets on schedule has been reaping some rewards. The Southern California Cheetahs were hosts for the SPA championships and they report they started the first event on time although only three officials had showed up.

Carol Hudson evidently is the holder of the much mixed up world age best for 14 year old 880 with her 2:08.2 made last year at the Nationals....There was snow and hail during the high jump competition at the National pentathlon championships in Los Alamos, New Mexico....The French magazine, "Athletisme" had a feature entitled "The Champions of Charm" and listed Colette Besson (France), Sylvie Telliez (France), Ghislaine Barnay (France), Teresa Sukniewicz (Poland), Crista Merten (West Germany), Heide Rosendahl (West Germany), Rita Schmidt (East Germany), Chi Cheng (Republic of China), Nicole Pani (France), Miroslava Rezkova-Hubnerova (Czechoslovakia), Petra Rivers (Australia) and Meta Antenen (Switzerland) as the tops....WTFW will NOT list the Club Record contest results until the January issue - so as soon as your season is completed, please send your new club records to us....One of England's top junior 800m runners, Lesley Kiernan (2:13.2 at age 13), wants to communicate with runners in the USA about her age. Write to Lesley Kiernan, 65 Hacton Drive, Hornchurch, Essex, England....In addition to running the "Show Meet" in yards instead of meters, the officials registered distances in the javelin and discus in fractions of an inch and the long jump and high jump in eighths of an inch - all illegal....The Compton Invitational and the Orange Invitational are expected to return to the schedule of big meets in 1972. The Claremont Relays will also return in 1972 and will have a full slate of all events for women.

Maryetta Boitana ran a marathon last December in 3:57:42 at age 7! Now a ripe old age of 8 she has improved (March 7) to 3:46:21....Add marathon results - Vicki Foltz 3:26:28 and former Miss Hawaii, now Mrs. Ken Moore, 5:02:40....And 33 year old Natalie Cullimore covered 100 miles in 16 hours and 11 minutes after having run a marathon just six days before....China's Wu Fu-shan set a new national record for the high jump at 5'11 1/2 in Peking May 8 while Michiyo Inaoka of Japan did the same in her country - but at 5'8 1/2 and Teruko Yagashita had a new discus mark at 168'3....Paola Pignicacchi gave birth to her first baby on March 28 and was back in training 34 days later....Russia's Samotysova recorded a 23.9 200 and a 55.4 400 recently - she is now 31....58 schools scored points in the Iowa State HS Championships....

WTFW listed a Danish high jumper in our world lists as Frith Bistrup - actually her name is Grith Eistrup. She has cleared 5'10 indoors this year and 5'9 1/2 outdoors. Her best a year ago was only 5'3 3/4 and she is now only 18 year old... Another Dane Annelise Dam Olesen will not compete during 1971 as she will soon become a mother - but she will be back in 1972 to pick up the Gold Medal in Munich, so says reader Johannes Quedens of Copenhagen....

LETTER FROM HENRY MEYER, Escondido, California

"I enjoy reading your magazine very much and have all the back issues to date and all the yearbooks you have put out and the Golden Girl by Betty Cuthbert. It is heartening to see the addition of longer runs and the walks in at least some of the meets for the women. By the way, you omitted Cheryl Bridges American record of 16:36 for the three mile run in Los Angeles, March 14, 1970.

"As I said in a letter which you published in part in a 1968 WTFW magazine, it would be nice to have some women pole vaulting. Also, to this date I don't know of any two or three mile walks as yet. In addition, it would be nice to have 1 1/2, 2 1/2, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, and even 10 mile track walks for women. It isn't that difficult and out of the way when done properly. Also, why should the girls and women be deprived

of running the old 80 meter hurdles as well as the 100 yard and 100 meter 2'6 hurdles? The basic problems of staging these various events aren't that great and they add variety to the meets. In addition it could be good to see the triple jump added to the program as well as having the standing high jump, long jump and triple jump included at meets of high level.

"In addition, I really don't think it would be going that far out of the way with proper preparation for the girls and women to throw and heave heavier implements in the meets such as the men's discus, men's javelin and also including the 8, 12 and 16 pound hammer throws as well as the 10, 12 and 16 pound shots. These frontier areas do provide challenge, extra opportunity for participation and extra interest.

"Also I believe it would also contribute to the program, although this sounds somewhat different, to have hopping, sack running and backwards running and jumping at least for the young girls also in the program. Also I would add the three legged race.

"Another thing, I share the viewpoint of Elliott Denman in a letter in a 1968 early WTFW magazine as regards basketball throwing. Really, what is so out of the way about this? Certainly the type of activity is not a sin. Why then be so adversely concerned?

"One more thing, just as a suggestion. One may order 5 pound shots from the Carton Athletic Supply Company in New York for girls, say 10 years of age and younger. Also, if one cared to, one could send to Sweden for a 3 kilo shot and Swedish softball. England has a 7 pound shot available as well as a 3 1/4 pound shot. You can get a 5 and 6 kilo shot from France and England again for a 6 1/4 kilo weight, and finally South Africa for a 14 pound shot. After all, it doesn't hurt to investigate. Perhaps some of the girls or other concerned track personnel could obtain a stock of these implements. One final thing. Athletic empty hand grenades are available at Military surplus stores.

"Please submit this letter in an up coming magazine as you see fit.

"PS. It would be most desirable to say the least to improve track sites and have all the areas up to specifications thus not robbing the various ones of valid performances and records. There has been too much sloppiness in this regard."
