



UCLA-PEPSI INVITATIONAL

Los Angeles, California, May 16:-Each year the UCLA-Pepsi Invitational provides track fans with some of the best competition of the year. 1982 was no exception. Here's how the afternoon went:

Event #1, 10:45AM, Javelin Throw: Time to answer the big question: is Karin Smith's injured hand healed? The University of Oregon's Lynda Hughes opened the competition with a bang, tossing her first throw 194'7. Smith fouled. Hughes' second throw was 197'4. Smith fouled. On the third round, Hughes threw to a lifetime best of 199'1 and moved to the #4 position on the All-Time USA List. Smith answered with 182' 6. The excitement got to Hughes on the fourth round and her throw was only 177'0. Smith improved to 187'6. Hughes passed her fifth throw while Smith put things together for the best mark of the day, 199'2 - just one inch in front of the Oregonian. Sixth round was anti-climatic. Hughes hit 182' 10 and Smith 186'1. The hand is evidently well and the determination still intact.

Barba Moro of Fullerton Junior College had a PR at 173'6 to pick up third place and move to the #23 position on the All-Time USA List. The 1981 AIAW champion, Sally Harmon of Oregon, had her year's best at 172'8 for fourth.

Unfortunately, the event began and ended long before the spectators were in place, in fact, probably before most of the spectators left home.

Event #2, 4x100, 12:00 Noon: Fine field for this sprint relay. UCLA, Florida State, the Atoms, Naturite, Wilt's AC. Starting for LA Naturite was Jamaican Leleith Hodges. Hodges became the victim of the southern California starters Association who insist on blowing a whistle instead of giving the command "Set". Naturite was second from the inside, far from the starter. When the whistle blew, Hodges was under the impression the runners were being called off their marks and started to get up only to have the gun fired. Perhaps LAN would have won the race, perhaps not. Surely they would have placed higher. Regardless, blowing a whistle is not legal and something should be done about it.


The race itself was a good one. UCLA was off to a slight lead from La Shon Nedd and Jeanette Bolden gained a few feet on Florida State's Marita Payne. The Seminoles completely botched the second exchange and were out of the running. The UCLA crew had the lead when Florence Griffith received the baton on the anchor leg and only Naturite's Diane Williams was making a run for it at the tape. The Bruins had a fast 43.86 to win over Naturite (44.33), the Atoms (44.38) and Florida State, who despite the stop and go tactics at the second exchange, still managed to run 44.58.

Event #3, 12:20PM, 100m Hurdles: Another confrontation between Stephanie Hightower and Candy Young with the decision never in doubt. There were some other pretty fair hurdlers in the field, but it was strictly a two-woman race. Hightower took the lead by the third barrier and went on to win in a very good 12.98 and a legal wind.

Event #4, 12:45PM, 100 Meters: Meet directors had gathered a better than average field for this event. Big question was Jeanette Bolden who had not been running too fast to date. Pitted against Bolden was Diane Williams, the Mt. SAC Relays winner, a couple of 1981 prep sensations in Jackie Washington and Sharon Ware along with veterans Leleith Hodges and Karen Hawkins. Never much doubt as to the winner once the gun was fired for Bolden assumed command after a few yards. UCLA teammate freshman La Shon Nedd was the one keeping Bolden company over the first half of the race, but Williams came on strong over the final 25 meters to grab the runner-up spot. The one making the most haste over the second half was Florida State's Randy Givens. Far behind in the first 50 meters, Givens final 50 was nothing short of sensational.

Event #5, 1:13PM, One Mile: At first there was disappointment when three of the star entries failed to appear. Mary Decker-Tabb, Leann Warren and Joan Hansen were absent from the starting line. But what was on the starting line turned out to be a grande crew. And 4½ minutes later, the US All-Time List had been rewritten. UCLA's Michele Bush, running on Sunday, led the pack of 11 runners past the 200 meters in 34 seconds with Cathey Twomey close behind. At the 400 it was Twomey in front in 68 followed by Bush, Brenda Webb, Sheila Ralston and Regina Joyce. Twomey and Bush were still 1-2 at the halfway mark in 2:16, but now Maggie Keyes was in third with Joyce and high schooler Polly Plumer following.

People spread out a bit over the third lap with Cindy Bremser now in front in 3:23.5, Maggie Keyes a tick back, Francie Larrieu another phtt behind followed by Twomey and Jayce. As the passed the 1500m mark, it was Bremser, Keyes, Larrieu, Twomey, Webb, Joyce, Bush, Linda Goen, Plumer, Ralston and Cook. Webb had the fastest final sprint as did high school star Plumer.

Bremser won it in 4:29.21 for a PR and the #4 position on the All-Time US List. Bremser's previous best was 4:31.57 which she set four years before, in 1978. Of the 11 runners in the race, only Larrieu and prepster Vicki Cook failed to register a personal best. On the US List, Webb is now #8, Kcres #9, Twomey #10, Plumer #12, Bush #13, Goen #14 and Ralston #20. Keyes, Plumer, Bush and Ralston all had their PR's at 1500 meters as well. And the first nine finishers are now on the World Top 50 List.

Who needs Decker, Hansen and Warren?

Event #6, 1:30PM, 800 Meters: The field included Lee Ballinger who has nun close to 2:02 this year, Regina Jacobs, the Mt. SAC Relays winner, Regina Dramiga, Mt. SAC runner-up and veteran Robin Campbell. Not announced was Cornell's Swiss miss, Dorian Lambelet-McClive. As she usually does, Deanne Gutowski took the lead and passed the 200 mark in 28.5 with Dramiga and the pack on her heels. By the end of the first lap, it was Lambelet in front in 60.9, followed by Ballenger and Gutowski. With 200 to go, it was still Lambelet in the lead in 1:32.3 with New York high schooler Diane Richburg in second. Lambelet held her lead around the final turn and pulled away from the field in the home straight. California

freshman Louise Komo closed well and grabbed the runner-up spot behind McClive. Romo's time of 2:04.13, a personal best, puts her #24 on the All Time US List while Gutowski's 2:04.83, just 0.70 behind Romo, nets her only the #36 spot, proving there are a lot of 800 runners who run in the 2:04's.

Event #7, 1:30PM, High Jump: A couple of "name" scratches in the high jump, Pam Spencer and Joni Huntley. But it still turned out to be a good competition with Cal Poly's Sue McNeal downing CS Bakersfield's Phyllis Blunston with both jumpers over the bar at 6'l. Kari Gosswiller, UCLA returnee, and the Atoms Yolanda Gibson were over 5'lO with Gosswiller getting the nod on the misses rule.

Event #8, 1:38PM, 200 Meters: Most of the West Coast fans anticipated watching Jeanette Bolden whump the field again although there were some pretty fair country sprinters in the field such as Alice Brown, Karen Hawkins, Leleith Hodges and Rosalyn Bryant. The home folks, therefore, were not prepared to see Florida State's Randy Givens mow down the field and power to a huge win with a lifetime best, a meet and stadium record of 22.3. Bolden led 'for the first 100, but ran out of gas and finished fifth. Michele Matthias, Stanford TC, zipped past Alice Brown in the closing strides for second place, but she was almost a full second back of the flying Givens.

Event #9, 1:50PM, Shot Put: Finally comes an event in which the no-shows had an effect. Not appearing were Carol Cady (Stanford), Sandy Burke (Northeatern), Elaine Sobansky (Penn State), Denise Wood (Knoxville TC) and Lorna Griffin (Athletics West).' That didn't leave too much. High schooler Natalie Kaaiawahia won it with a toss of 50'll and Kathy Picknell was the only other over fifty feet.

Event #10, 2:01FM, 400 Meters: An expected good race became a top flight affair. Two scratches - Kim White (California) and La Shon Nedd (UCLA) were replaced by two old troupers -Lorpa Forde (Atoms) and Sharon Dahney (Naturite). Running in an outside lane, Brooklyn high schooler Diane Dixon entered the home straight with an even position on the field and proceeded to draw away from her more experienced opponents and clocked a 51.75 to in it. UCLA's Florence Griffith was next

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in a very good 51.91 and the entire field ran wall with the exception of UCLA's Arlise Emerson who jogged in in 54.8, far behind the rest. Dixon's mark places her #12 on the All-Time US List. Griffith is #14.

Event #11, 2:30PM, Discus Throw: Good field, good results. Not the greatest gathering of discus throwers ever gathered in the USA, but good enough. Leslie Deniz downed American record holder Lorna Griffin once more this year with a toss of 196'7. Griffin was next at 187'10, and all five entrants had good marks.

Event #12, 2:30PM, Long Jump: After the completion of the men's triple jump and then the men's long jump, the women's long jump failed to start on schedule - about 20 minutes late. Unfortunately, the final running event, the men's mile, finished at 2:50 after which nearly everyone went home. In so doing, they missed one of the best jump competitions of the season. First of all, the long jump was one of the few events of the day in which everyone listed on the program showed up! Secondly, all best jumps by all contestants were legal and not wind aided. Thirdly, every contestant had quality marks. Carol Lewis won it at 21'10%. No surprise. Second was Gwen Loud who has been trying to get a legal good mark for quite a while. This time she hopped out 21'6%, a lifetime best and equal 6th, (with Jane Frederick and Pat Johnson), on the All-Time USA List. Kathy McMillan was third at 21'2 and UCLA's Jackie Joyner fourth with 20'10%.

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MICHELE PINGAR -

AN ANATOMY OF AN ALL AMERICAN

She came to Kutztown State a rather unhealded runner. Sure, she had finished 33rd in the state high school cross country championships, but that would hardly mark her as having the potential to become an outstanding collegiate runner. Michele Pingar from Freeland, Pennsylvania, however, had something as yet uncharted in her performances - determination.

Pingar arrived at Kutztown in the fall of 1980 and joined five other runners who immediately began to rewrite the KSC record books. Still, though, her performances were not that outstanding - that is, until the Pennsylvania Conference Track Championships in the spring of 1981.

Coach Kelley Neyhart had a problem. Although Pingar had grabbed four firsts and two seconds in the 3000 during the season, her times were not fast enough to place in the Championships. "The 3000 at States is always fast and Michele does not have a lot of speed," noted Neyhart. "She does, however, have the ability to maintain a pace for quite a while, so I decided to let her run the 5000 and 10000."

The move was the turning point in Pingar's career. She responded by finishing second in the 1000 and third in the 5000. Her time of 18:27 in the 5000 meters was just one second shy of the national qualifying time, a second that kept her from traveling to San Francisco for the Division III National Championships. That second ived in her mind as she trained for the 1982 season.

When she returned to Kutztown in the fall of 1981, she was a different person. "When she reported to cross country practice I didn't recognize her," remembers Neyhart. "She had trimmed down and her legs appeared extremely fit." Pingar immediately established herself as the team leader in cross country, admittedly not her strongest sport. She led the team to an 8-1 record, a fourth in the conference championship and a third in the Eastern Regional Championships. Once again, however, Nationals eluded her as only the top two teams in the East travel to the championships. Kutztown had finished third by one point!

So, as most runners retired to the indoor workouts that winter forces, Michele Pingar could be found on the roads around Kutztown building her mileage and thinking about a second and a minute. Over the winter she went from training 40 miles a week to averaging over 60. Her growth became apparent as the indoor season wore on. Her marks approached times that she was unable to run until late sprig of the previous year.

When the outdoor season arrived she bested all opponents in the 3000 and 5000 meter races. Then it was time for States. Here Pingar finished second to East Stroudsberg's All American Corky Cardon in both the 5000 and 10000 meter races. More importantly, she had qualified for Nationals in both events with school record times of 17:57 in the 5000 and 36:52 in the 10000. Next Pingar raced in the 10000 at the Eastern Regional Championships. She placed second in this race also, but this time she defeated Carden.

Now the stage was set for the ultimate goal - All American status. The second she had lived with for a year was now meaningless. She was here and she was determined to prove she belonged. Pingar and her coach decided she would put her best effort into the 10000 since it was her strongest race. This was to be no easy task, however, as eight girls, including Pingar, had run times fast enough to qualify for the Division I Nationals and only six girls could be All Americans. Compounding the matter was the weather. The temperature and the humidity were such that race officials decided to hose down the contestants as they ran to insure safety.

As the race developed, seventeen women ran in a tightly bunched pack through the first two miles until Cristy Purdy, the eventual winner from Pacific Lutheran, decided to pick up the pace and the race was on. As the miles went by runner after runner dropped out of the lead pack until only six were left - one of them Michele Pingar. Now her goal was in sight. All she needed to do was hang on. With one lap to go, Pingar moved into fifth place and sprinted the last 200 meters to the finish. She had achieved her goal - All American. By doing so she became the first woman All American in the history of Kutztown State. Yet as congratulations were being given to her and her fellow competitors, her thoughts were already on next year when Kutztown moves up to Division II... ..a whole new set of goals and challenges. Will determination win out? I wouldn't bet against it.

The Coach Says...

JEFF FULLER (Wyoming): "We have a much stronger squad than last year. But on the regional level, I don't think things will change much. Obviously, it's frustrating to look at how much we're improving, but yet not moving up on the regional level. We're improving, but we still have a long way to go."

DORIS HERITAGE (Seattle Pacific): "My goal for our team is to individually compete at our best. We have always done well in regionals."

PETE TEGREN (Wisonsin): (Before the Big-10 Meet); "This could be the year which will end our dominance of the outdoor conference meet. All of the competition in the Big Ten has become so even."

GUNTHER PADOO (Omye U): "I think there should be a rule concerning all these foreign athletes. Put them out! Unless, of course, I can get some to come to Omye U."

ON THE ROAD AGAIN

Joyce Smith continues to improve at age 44. At the City of Bath Half Marathon (Mar. 21), Mrs. Smith improved the British best performance to 71:45.

A fornight later <u>Paula Fudge</u> passed 10 miles in about 54½ minutes at the Fleet & Crookham Half Marathon, but a series of hills in the last 5k cost her well over a minute. Fudge finished in 72:31, 2nd best ever by an Englishwoman.

1380 women entered the London Marathon (May 9) and few were surprised to see <u>Joyce Smith</u> beat them all to the finish. Smith's 2:29:43 PR removed 14 seconds from the UK national and world veterans best she established in the previous year's event. Kiwi <u>Lorraine Moller</u> lost her first ever marathon after 8 consecutive wins - finishing 2nd in a disappointing 2:36:15. ("Disappointing" is so relative in women's roadracing, as Mrs. Davis' time would have been a world record only several years ago.)

Smith reached the halfway mark in a sparkling 1:13.39, already more than 2 minutes ahead of Moller. 15 miles were passed in 1:24:25 as Smith strode on to her 6th national mark at this distance. Beginning with 2:41:37 and 2:36:27 in 1979, Jcroe has improved to 2:33:32 and 2:30:27 in 1980, 2:29:57 in 1981 and this 2:29:43. She's still not satisfied: "I'm a little disappointed with the times. I would have liked 2:27... ..There is still a faster time inside me. You learn something from every marathon you-race."

Others educated at the London Marathon were New Zealanders Judith Hines (3rd in 2:41:49) and <u>Bev Shingles</u> (4th at 2:43: 34). Placing 5th was <u>Libby Pfeiffer</u> (2:45:52), 6th was <u>Jean</u> <u>Lochhead</u> in 2:46:04, and 7th was <u>Margaret Lockley</u> in the same time. Winnie Ny of Hong Kong finished next at 2:46:53.

Annick Lebretonne of Paris captured the prestigious Marathon crown May 30 in 2:36:05

<u>Annick Lebretonne</u> of Paris captured the prestigious Montreal Marathon crown May 30 in 2:36:05. The unknown reduced her previous best by approximately 6 minutes, beating <u>Cindy</u> <u>Hamilton's 2:38:30.</u> <u>Jacqueline Gareau</u>, the first lady of running in Canada, apparently slowed by the heat and her recent Boston Marathon performance, finished third with a mark of 2:41:19.

Gareau fought a strong headwind to win the Run for Women (April 4th, Albany, New York) in 34:51. The lOk race was billed as an "AAU Championship".

Nancy Conz has been covering some road mileage in rapid fashion. On May 8th Conz cruised an Avon 10k in Knoxville, Tennessee, in a personal best of 35:15. The intense redhead attacked the Eagle-Tribute 10-Mile Challenge (Lawrence, Mass., May 2) shattering the course record by over 7½ minutes. On a hot, hilly route Conz clicked off splits of 5:11, 10:50, 16:32, 21:57 and 27:24 for the first five miles on her way to 55 flat, the 6th fastest time in US history.

Another 10 miler took place the same day in New York's Central Park. On a less than difficult course, facing infinitely superior competition, <u>Carol Urish</u> won the Trevira race in 55:42. In her effort, Urish reach 5M in 27:45. Judi St. Hilaire placed second in 55:01, followed by <u>Eleanor Simonsick</u> (56:29) and <u>Linda McLennan</u> (56:33).

McLennan, a University of Alabama alumna, established a course record of 35:59 at the tough Johnson City, Tennessee Spring Classic 10k (April 10).

Doreen Ennis fought a tough battle to win the Pantera Women's 4 miler April 11 (Liberty State Park, NJ). Ennis was clocked in 22:27, just 2 seconds ahead of <u>Mary Beth Evans</u>. Another two seconds back was <u>Kiki Sweigart</u>. <u>Cindy Wuss</u> placed 4th at 22:40.

The Tucson Sun Run (March 14) was the site of a marvelous performance by Athletics West's Joan Hansen. Hansen clocked 51:36, the 8th best 15th ever run by an American. <u>Francie Larrieu</u> provided a more recent response to "What has Francie been doing lately?" with a 52 even effort, finishing second, 37 seconds ahead of <u>Katy Shilly</u>.

At Aukland, New Zealand (April 18), <u>Wendy Hancock</u> covered a very demanding 10k in 33:15. Placing second in 33:52 was Barbara Moore.

Barbara Moore. Speaking of New Zealand, that country's top distaff re%resentative, <u>Allison Roe</u> journeyed to Seoul, Korea (March 28) to capture that city's marathon in an almost pedestrian 2:43: 12. <u>Cindy Hamilton</u> of Vancouver, British Columbia, finished in the runner-up slot at 2:49:13. <u>Sue Krenn</u> filled 3rd in 2:49:49. Speaking of British Columbia and Ms. Krenn, the Vancouver International Marathon held May 3, was captured by that young (32) woman in 2:45:15, just a tick ahead of <u>Paula Pick</u>.

Predicting a winner is normally not very difficult when Allison Roe is entered, so finish line spectators were almost slocked to see Marty Cooksey appear first among the women at the 3rd Annual St. Joseph Heart Run (Racoma, Washington, May 15). Cooksey's time of 34:04 was a course record, handily beating defending champion <u>Gail Volk</u> (36:10). But the big news was Roe's collapse at about 1½ miles. Covering the initial mile in 5:10, Roe had just begun to establish dominance over her competitors when she crumpled to the roadway.

"It felt like somebody shot a bullet through my (right) achilles tendon," Roe dejectedly recounted. "I felt it snap and I must have jumped about 50 feet in the air off my other foot. That was it. I was done." Roe traveled to Boston the next day to see medical specialists there. Early reports indicate the world marathon record holder will not run for many weeks.

<u>Grete Waitz</u> can surely sympathize with Roe. Mrs. Waitz claims she couldn't walk properly for 9 days after dropping out of the Boston Marathon 23% miles into a new world mark. "The first three days, I had to go down steps backwards. Then I was limping when I was walking. The 10th day, I force ed myself to jog. It was painful."

Mrs. Waitz improved to run a half marathon in Gothenburg, Sweden (May 16), in 69:50. As further testamony to her health, the 29-year old Norwegian won the prestigious L'Eggs Mini-Marathon in New York City for the 4m straight year. Grete Waitz' time for the 10k was 31:59.

One woman who can give Waitz a run for her money - or Fred Lebow's or ARRA's - is <u>Anne Audain</u>, a New Zealander currently residing in Denver, Colorado. Audain captured the Bloomsday megarace covering the hilly 7.5 mile course in 40:02, almost two minutes better than her own course record, and nearly 3 minutes ahead of Lorraine Moller (42:54). Audain went past lOk in 32:20 on her way to pocketing the \$5000 first grize. Moller earned \$3000 for her run through the streets of Spokame on May 2, with South African <u>Patsy Sharples</u>, a student at Idaho, Jrd. Miss Sharples declined the \$1500 earned by her 43:11. Former national high school mile record holder <u>Eileen Claugus</u> took the money after running 4m in 43:32.







Virginia's Jill Haworth took the 800 in 2:06.31 as eight runners were under the 2:10 mark. Lesley Welch, Virginia, nipped Sue Latter in the 1500, 4:14. 6 to 4:16.9 with three other runners under 4:20. Jan Merrill captured the 3000 in 9:25.8 and Linda McLennon the 10k in 34:14.5. Sprinters were not totally shut out as Janet Dodson of Morgan State took both dashes in 11.78 and 23.5. Kim Whitehead kept the hurdlers in the picture as she captured the 100 barriers in 14.05 and had her best 400 hurdle race of the year in 57.93.

NCAA REPORT **By Tim Ostroot**

It was a week of firsts in Provo, Utah, May 31-June 5, as the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) unveiled its women's track and field championships for an initial look. Women's championships became an exclusive NCAA commodity with the meet as the old Association of Intercollegiate Athletics for Women (AIAW) concluded its championships the previous week, and the board of directors voted in favor of a resolution to dissolve. The NCAA made its first effort a notable one, as Brigham Young University's sparkling new stadium, just completed this season, provided a first-class setting for the landmark confrontation of the finest collegiate female track athletes in the country.

It was, of course, the first-ever NCAA track and field championship for women. Thus, Jackie Joyner became the first woman to win an NCAA title with her heptathlon win on Tuesday, and Kim Schnurpfeil became the first single-event winner with her 10000 meter victory on Wednesday.

It was also the first major championship event to be held in BYU's spectacular new stadium, a Chevron 440 oval thet was designed with both athlete and spectator in mind. All events are contested within the view of the stands - including the javelin. discus, and other field events. To enable this to be done, the infield was widened some 30 feet, with the track straightaways somewhat shortened and the curves less rounded. In addition, the high jump approach area, also the Chevron 440 surface, is some 80 feet in radius, able to accomodate two pits, and long jump runways and pits run both ways. The facility is extravagant right down to the scoreboard, which boasts a capacity to hold cumulative splits in view for 10 seconds and provide lap splits instantly. Many, including BYU coach Clarence Robinson, who was in charge of overseeing the facility's design, feel it is one of the finest track and field facilities anywhere.

The meet also marked the first trial run for the controversial 12-place scoring system (15-12-10-9-8-7-6-5-4-3-2-1) which included "championship finals" and "consolation finals" in some events. No matter what the time was for the winner of the consolation heat, she was doomed to ninth place. The system, obviously patterned after an almost identical set-up in swimming championships, was lauded by some and brandished by others, depending upon whether or not it aided or hindered their clubs.

Despite all the firsts and the almost novelty atmosphere, tradition dominated the five-day meet run in conjunction with the men's championships in the most obvious fashion - UCLA, a perennial women's track powerhouse and pre-meet favorite, used Joyner's heptathlon win and Florence Griffith's startling 200 meter upset to cruise to the team title, tallying 153 points to beat Tennessee by 27.

Joyner became the first women's NCAA titlist by virtue of her collegiate record 6099 points effort in the seven-event tester. It was the first time the 19-year old had broken the 6000 point barrier, her previous collegiate mark, set at the Mt. SAC Relays in late April, being 5960. It was also the third best performance ever by an American, veteran Jane Frederick's marks of 6423 and 6308 the only better.

"Coming into the meet, I didn't think I had a chance to break 6000," said Joyner after running away with the event, beating runner-up Annette Tannander of Colorado by some 443 points, "but I did better in the shot and javelin than I thought I would." Joyner was third in the javelin at 142'8, utilizing a full run approach compared to her former, a three-step approach, and was fourth in the shot with a toss of 40'0%. . Also a starting forward on the national-class Bruin basketball squad in the winter, Joyner won three events on her way to the win, taking the 100 meter hurdles in 13.94, the 200 meter dash in 24.07, and the long jump with a 20'll effort. Her 100 hurdle win would have placed her sixth in the championship final of that event, while her 200 mark would have placed her equaleleventh with teammate Jeanette Bolden. Her long jump mark would have placed her sixth on the open market, although Joyner upped that mark to 21'8% in the open event to finish second to Cal State-Los Angeles' Jennifer Innis by an inch.

Joyner wasn't the only heptathlon standout, however, as Arizona's Cindy Holmes, diminutive in stature at 5 feet tall, scaled 6'0 in the high jump. Meet officials announced she had set a "world record" for women by leaping a full foot over her height.

Yet, to single out Joyner as the starlette of the Bruins, who grabbed their third national title, the first two being AIAW crowns claimed in 1975 and 1977, would be a bit one-dimensional. Another catalyst was sprinter Florence Griffith, who pulled off the meet's biggest upset, racing to a 200 meter win over heavy favorite Merlene Ottey of Nebraska.

Ottey, who had sped to a 10.97 wind-aided win the the 100m on Friday, came into Saturday's final with the fastest qualifying time, a 22.29 from heat three, while Griffith recorded a 22.72 in winning heat one. Owning a 1980 Olympic bronze medal in the 200m event, when running for her home country of Jamaica, the defending AIAW 100m and 200m champ already had three race wins in 100m and 200m trials and the 100m final prior to the 200m final. After running her 22.29 into a brisk headwind, she credited the altitude for her quick times. "The track is just a track," said Ottey. "I think it's the altitude."

But in the final, run on another windy day, Griffith came out of the blocks hard, zoomed around the turn and held off Ottey coming home for a 22.39 upset victory. Ottey was second in 22.46. The Bruins collected 25 points in the event, with LaShon Nedd getting fifth (23.20) and Bolden 11th (24.07)

UCLA and Tennessee simply switched places compared to last year's AIAW meet, when the Lady Vols took a 61-57 win under the six place scoring system. Florida State and Oregon, tied for third last year, were third and fourth with 121% and 104 points respectively, while Stanford rounded out the top five by scoring 78.

Tennessee got big points fast with three individual event wins and a relay triumph. The Lady Vols won the 1600m relay Friday with Cathy Rattray, Sharieffa Barksdale, Joetta Clark and Delisa Walton exchanging the stick to a 3:28.55 collegiate record, breaking their own former mark of 3:31.39. Walton came back on Saturday to win the 800 in 2:05.22, with teammate Clark second in 2:06.49. Ever-steady Benita Fitz-gerald won the 100 hurdles in 13.13, beating rivals Candy Young (Farleigh Dickinson, second in 13.23) and Kim Turner (UTEP, third in 13.34) once again. Kathy Bryant completed the Tennessee winning spree, taking the 5000 in 16:10.41.

UCLA's only wins were from Joyner and Griffith.

Besides Walton's 1600 relay/800m double, the meet had only one double winner, Meg Ritchie of Arizona who, not surprisingly, dominated the field events in winning the shot and discus. The shot champ from last year tossed the steel ball

55'5% on Friday to repeat, and came back to chuck the platter 202'O on Saturday, both efforts in full view of appreciative spectators.

Oregon and Stanford both made most of their bid in the distance events. Schnurpfeil got the 10000 win in 33:36.51. beating Oregon's Eryn Forbes who finished second in 33:55.10. Oklahoma's Kellie Cathy, who created such a storm with her 32:32 win at Mt. SAC, finished fifth in 34:55.90. Some claim Cathy's Mt. SAC clocking, which was run in a race with men involved, negating it as an American record, was actually a lap shy of 10000 meters.

Schnurpfeil followed Jill Molen of Utah as the pacemaker early in the race, as the entire field seemed a bit hesitant to take out the pace, perhaps fearing BYU's altitude. That same hesitation was common throughout the distance races. But when Schnurpfeil took over, the race was over. "I wanted to pass Jill earlier, but my coach just kept saying, 'relax, relax, "", said Schnurpfeil. Brooks Johnson's advice proved to be worth listening to.

Oregon also went 2-3 in the 5000m. with Kathy Haves and Forbes trailing Bryant, and Rosa Gutierrez was third in the 3000m. In the short event, Stanford went 1-2 with Ceci Hopp (9:28.92) and Patti Sue Plumer (9:29.49). The Cardinals also got distance points from Ann Locke (seventh 10000 35:05.56), Michelle Mason (10th, 5000 17:05.60), plus Schnurpfeil's fifth place (16:37:05) in the 5000 on Saturday.

Florida State got wins in both 400m races - the open 400 and the one lap barrier race. Tonya Brown won the 400 hurdles in 56.46, while Marita Payne took the open 400 in 52.01. In addition, FSU was second in the two relay events, the 400 and the 1600, and Randy Givens was third in the 200 and 7th in the 100. Payne came back from her 400 win to place fourth in the 200, as well.

Leanne Warren of Oregon failed in her bid to double in the 800 and 1500 runs two consecutive years, faltering to 3rd (2:06.58) in the short event on Saturday after winning Friday's 1500 in 4:17.90. Warren pulled off the double in Texas during last year's AIAW meet.

Oregon State had three high jumpers - none qualified for the final. Oregon had three javelineers, all qualified for the final and two of them scored. Cal State Long Beach had three shot putters, all three qualified and all three scored UCLA's LaShon Nedd may have been the busiest little body at the meet. She was 8th in the 100, 5th in the 200, 4th in the 400 and ran a leg on the 4x400 team for third place. All this plus heatsDid the altitude or weather affect the distancers? In the 1500, only winner Warren had her season best. In the 3k. the USA has 71 runners with times UNDER 9:40, but 10:08 time SCORED at Provo. There are 68 athletes who have run better than 16:50 for 5000m, yet 17:30 SCORED at Provo....1-2 finishes, a rarity in National competition, were scored by Tennessee in the 800 and by Stanford in the 3000 And let's not forget the 10000 where the US has 52 runners UNDER 35:49 and yet 36:05 SCORED in the NCAA Hats are off to Faye Paige of Cal State Long Beach. She ran her first 400m hurdles race on May 2 and clocked 60.97. At Irvine the following week she ran 60.81. Came to Provo and ran 59.04 in her heat and then zipped to 58.21 in the final third place....Biggest upset has to be the high jump won by Icelander Disa Gisladottir of Alabama. Gisladottir began the season strong and then recently dropped off - way off. She wasn't even the best jumper at her own institution over the past six weeks. But she came through with her PR at 6'11% and won the gold...

Who's glad the Committee changed the scoring system? I can guess Scott Chisam of UCLA joins the Florida State crew in buying a bottle of the bubbly for the Committee. With the new scoring, UCLA finished first and Florida State third. If the six place scoring was still in effect, Tennessee would be the 1982 champion and Oregon would be third. Here's how the top seven scored with 12 places: 1-UCLA 153, 2-Tennessee 126, 3-Florida State 121%, 4-Oregon 104, 5-Stanford 78, 6-Arizona 68, 7-Nebraska 51. AIAW NATIONALS

The Association for Intercollegiate Athletics for Women (AIAW) drew its last breath May 27-29 in College Station, Texas, with the running of the 1982 AIAW National Track and Field Championships. That breath, despite showing some faint signs of life, was anticlimactic, at best.

After pioneering women's championships on the collegiate level, the AIAW's final effort was far from their finest. Only a few schools showed up. Thirty five teams scored in the meet, but none of last year's top 10 showed for the 1982 rendition, choosing to wait instead for a week for the NCAA's inaugural meet. The University of Wisconsin, 13th last year, was the top returning squad, and the Badgers promptly rolled to a third place finish. The University of Texas, tied for 14th last year, won the team title with 82 points, beating Cal-Berkeley, equal 34th last year, by 38 points.

Even so, five AIAW Division I records were set, led by two distance marks. California's Louise Romo, a freshman, won the 800 in 2:04.39, while Midde Hamrin of Lamar won the 5000 in 16:03.75. Both of those marks would have won at the NCAA's, two of only three such efforts, the other being Purdue's Andrea Marek's 9:16.18 3000m win.

Pat Johnson of Wisconsin broke the long jump record with a leap of 21'4%, besting Donna Thomas' old record. Thomas, from North Texas State, was second at 21'0, also better than her old record. Temple's Edna Brown dipped under the existing 400m hurdle standard with her 57.17 win.

Texas got the team win behind some flawless relay running -The Lady Ags got wins in the 400m relay (46.04), the 800m sprint medley relay (1:39.92), the 1600m relay (3:37.66) and the 3200m relay (8:39.67). The relay points alone (40) were enough to place Texas fifth, only four points away from the team title.

Lorri Kokkola was the only individual champion for Texas, as she chucked the javelin 170'9 for a 10-point win that sewed up the championship for her squad.

Merry Johnson was the meet's only double winner, as the West Texas State runner copped firsts in the 400m (52.34) and 200m (23.57).

The competition marked the end of an era for the AIAW, as the board of directors recently voted to adopt a resolution of dissolution. That measure still needs ratification from member schools, but the AIAW is obviously crippled beyond repair by the intrusion of the NCAA into women's championships. Several AIAW-instituted court actions against the NCAA based upon alleged Sherman Anti-Trust Act violations have failed to get a court injunction against the NCAA, and women's championships will become the eminent domain of the NCAA next season.

FLASH - 5000 WORLD RECORD TO DECKER




PACIFIC COAST INVITATIONAL

Berkeley, California May 14:-Cal Berkeley was once again host of a day of world class performances and national bests in their Pacific Coast Invitational.

Stephanie Hightower, LA Naturite TC, must find the Edwards Stadium her particular lieu. Last April, Hightower ran to a world best at the "Meet of Champions". Today she lowered that mark to 12.95, barely missing Deby LaPlante's 100m hurdle record of 12.86. Still this performance was a disappointment to Hightower. Coming out of the blocks, she stumbled and trialed UTEP's Kim Turner during the early part of the race. "I was glad that did happen", she said, "because I had to play catchup. I had to run the entire race all out. If I had't fallen out of the blocks, I would have been in the 12.8's. I'm mad now."

Leann Warren, Oregon, won the 800, but she must have had visions of her last effort at Edwards Stadium. In that race, Warren fell during the first lap and was unable to finish. This time, she did it differently and was content to let the others do all the work and then emerge quickly to take the lead at the head of the home straight. Front running Regina Jacobs of Stanford took the lead as she likes to do, but faded at the end. After the race, Warren commented, "I like to kind of sit back. Normally, I'm not afraid to go out the first lap, but I've been sick for about two weeks and held back to see if I'm ready to run again. This race showed I'm on the comeback trail." Second in the race was New York prepster Dianne Richburg whose time of 2:05.0 was the fastest prep time this year to date.

Veteran Alice Trumbly, California, took the early lead in the 1500 and managed to turn in a PR of 4:23.5, but it wasn't good enough as Oregon's Claudette Groendahl kicked past for a 4:20.1 winning time. Oregon's Karen Drake was third in 4:25.0.

Carol Urish proved that being in your 30's doesn't inhibit your running. Urish of the Houston Harriers, followed Stanford's Michelle Mason and Washington's Karen Petley for a couple of laps, then took off and with a series of 76-78 laps, finished with a personal best at 16:00.1. Petley was next half a minute behind in 16:32.4 with Mason third. Urish commented, "I'm very pleased. I was ready for a good race." Urish will run the 10k at the TAC Championships and is eventually aiming for the marathon at the 84 Olympics.

The 3000 brought together an excellent field of distance runners including Cathey Twomey (9:03.75), Kathy Hayes of Oregon (9:07.94), Julie Shea (9:08.18), Ceci Hopp, Regina Joyce, Washington, the current collegiate record holder. Also in the race was Canada's Geri Fitch. Joyce, Twomey, Fitch and Hopp battled the first part of the race, but finally it was just Twomey and Fitch with Twomey winning it by three-tenths of a second, 8:58.0 to 8:58.3. Joyce was third and brought her collegiate mark down to 8:59.7. "Dynamite!" I was hoping that would happen!", the elated Twomey blurted out after the race. "I did not feel good. The entire Oregon team has the flu. I think it's from living in that stupid valley! I felt tired and weak." Commenting about Joyce's race, Twomey added, "Today Regina had an excellent race. I give her credit for the time. That was a strong field today"

Fitch was also estatic. Her time was the best by a Canadian for many years and 10 seconds under her PR. "You can come down here and know you'll get a good race. The 3000 has a lot of good competition this year. It's very competitive throughout the world." Fitch said she feels the most pressure when running in Canada. In American races, she can relax more and is able to perform better. Fitch has run the 5000 in 15:58 and covered the 10k on the road in 33:30.

Tammy Etienne of the Dallas Metroplex Striders, former Texas hurdler, flew to a 56.67 clocking for the 400m event, the fastest time in the US to date this year. "I was really happy with the time. I felt everything was really going smooth. The American record is my goal. It's something to go after." Other national bests came in the 400m relay and the 10000.

Other national bests came in the 400m relay and the 10000. Florida State's team of Angela Wright, Marita Payne, Randy Givens and Alice Bennett clocked a 44.19, the third best collegiate time.

Kim Schnurpfeil, Stanford, had the hardest race of the day as she was forced to lead the 10k from start to finish. She ran 80-82 nearly all the way and had mile splits of 5:15, 10:41, 16:07, 21:30, 26:57 and 32:25 with a 10k time of 33: 41.0. This makes her the #3 American and the second best collegian.

Jody Anderson, LA Naturite, the American record holder in the long jump, ran in the 100 and the 4x100, but was watched by the spectators not for her running, but for having just been seen as "Pooch" in "Personal Best".

Norman, Oklahoma, May 14/15:-Things went pretty much according to form at the Annual Big-8 Championships. Nebraska won the team title as expected, Merlene Ottey won both dashes as expected, Kellie Cathey won the two long runs as expected, Oklahoma was second as expected and there were some outstanding marks - as expected.

Ottey sped to times of 11.33 and 22.63 to win the sprints and added the anchor leg of the 4x100 which won in a swift 44.1 plus the anchor 400 of the sprint medley which was won in the nation's fastest time to date, 1:38.7. Kellie Cathey won the 10000 by more than FOUR minutes in 33:16.2 and took the 5k by nearly a minute. Gotzis, Austria, May 22/23:-Jane Frederick upped her American heptathlon record to a healthy 6423 points while winning the Gotzis International Heptathlon over a fine field. Frederick had 118 point margin over East Germany's Arke Vater. Twenty one athletes completed the seven event contest.

All of Frederick's marks were good. She opened with 13.81 for the 100m hurdles. Canada's Jill Ross-Giffen was the only participant with a faster time at 13.57. Frederick's mark in the shot was 49'6%, best of the competition. Her high jump was 5'11%, one inch lower than Poland's Malgorzata Novak. She completed the first day with a 24.81 200 and led with 3702 points to 3672 for Vater, 3650 for Novak and 3607 for the Soviet's Valentina Kurotschkiha.

Vater made a move in the long jump as the second day began with a wind-aided jump of 21.3% to 20.3% for Frederick, but the game was over after the javelin as Frederick threw best of the competition at 158.4%. Vater could muster only 116.9, one of the competition's worst marks. Vater did return to spin a 2:09.96 800, but Frederick responded with a not too bad 2:12.84 and the new American record.

SPEED IN ENDURANCE EVENTS

By Harry Wilson, BAAB National Event Coach Reprinted from "South African Atleet"

Types of speed in Endurance Events

A. Speed is needed to stay with the pace for a major part of the race. This speed is dependent on oxygen uptake and ability to withstand oxygen debt.

B. Speed is needed to match or inject surges during the race - largely dependent on (A) but technique also plays a part.

C. Finishing speed - varies from short very fast to long not so fast. It depends on (A) plus basic speed; plus technique; plus tactical ability; plus mental attitude.

The relative value of 3 speeds at different distances varies considerably.

To be complete, athlete has to have all 3 types of speed. Let us examine the types of speed in more detail:

A. An athlete must build up to endurance side of her event so that she can cruise along for the major part of the race. She has to be fresh physically and mentally during vital stages of the face - maybe midrace, maybe at the finish. Endurance is linked to the specific distance. A runner may have endurance to run 20 miles in an hour and fifty minutes but not endurance to run 5000 meters in 14 minutes. Yet usually we say such an athlete hasn't the <u>speed</u> to run a fast 5000 meters. 4:30 for a mile (for a man) may be fast or difficult, but 14 minutes for 5000 is fast <u>and</u> difficult. Same with fourminutes for a mile.

Gradual development or large oxygen uptake is the major factor in developing this sort of speed. Mainly this is a result of steady pace runs but not all at the same pace, i.e. longer slowish runs 10-15 miles, shorter faster runs 4-8 miles. Also work at race pace e.g repetitions over 100km for 1500m, repetitions of 2 miles for 10000 runners.

I recommended use of hilly circuits for these repetitions. Development of efficient, relaxed style is important - no energy wasting actions. Relaxing while cruising along means being able to be active mentally and able to react quickly to race developments.

Developing this sort of speed needs time, Gradual mileage build up over a period of years. One period each year specifically on this track. 800m may provide exceptions - some people have so much basic speed that race-pace is relatively slow. I feel that this is the most important side of the 800/ 1500 events for women at the moment.

If race pace is fast there must be oxygen debt involved so there must be some specific work to combat this. My form of oxygen debt work is usually built around several sets of a small number of repetitions - very short recovery between repetitions, longer recovery between sets. e.g.

1500 runners - 4 sets of 2x300m (15 seconds between reps, 4-5 minutes between sets.

800 runners - 4 sets of 2x1000m (30 seconds between reps, 2 minutes between sets.

To develop relaxed action and attitude some work is done with emphasis not on achieving fast times, but on achieving reasonable times as smoothly as possible i.e runner arrives at the end of each fast repetition with as low a pulse rate as possible, e.g. 4×1000 in 2:55.

B. Surging Speed- obvious ability to cruise is vital but athlete must be able to withstand oxygen debt during race then partially recover. Oxygen debt training is necessary, also ability to change running technique quickly. Practice changing action, e.g.

Reps of 200m - 100m striding, 50m fast, 50m stride. Reps of 200m - 50m fast, 100m stride, 50m fast.

Also some long runs can be split up - 6 miles, 3 steady, 800 fast, 400 steady, 400 fast.

C. Finishing Speed - Related to endurance build up. Basic sprinting speed important, particularly in 800/1500 races. Various types of finishing speed. Viren 800 at end of 10k; Ovett 200 at end of 1500. Ability to sprint - technique leg strength plus mobility. Practice technique in addition to working on strength and mobility - resistance work - sand, mud. Many runners unable to change to sprinting technique.

Run under distance races to get feel of faster pace, not specifically training for shorter races, e.g. for a woman's 800/ 1500 runner 54 for a 400 without specific preparation is more useful than 53 after many specific sessions.

Race positioning is important in order to make best use of finishing speed. Mental attitude must be right - the runner must believe in her ability to beat others at the finish and enjoy his way of running. He must be prepared to risk experimenting and relish the physical contact that is common in the shorter races.

Timing the development of the types of speed - long term short term is important. Runners must not arrive at the competitive season short of endurance speed. The sooner the athlete starts working on basic speed and technique the better. There are different approaches to development of the three types of speed. One approach is to develop all speeds concurrently; another approach is to develop eniods of time to develop specific speeds. One thing is sure, neglect one part and sooner or later it will show up.

It wasn't billed as a high school meet, but when you look at the agate type, the names look awfully familiar. You have to look to seventh place in the mile, but the result is a national record for Polly Plumer of University (Irvine, Ca) in 4:35.24. Along the way, she equalled Francie Larrieu's 14-year-old 1500 meter mark of 4:16.8. All this came the day after she won her divisional qualifying meet in the 800, 1600, and 1600 relay. Vickie Cook (Alemany/Mission Hills, Ca) ran eleventh in the race, but still moved to the number two spot this year in both the mile and 1500 (4:45.5/4:24.1).

Diane Dixon (Tech/Brooklyn) claimed the 400 in 51.75, moving her ahead of Denean Howard to the top of the list so far. Diane Richburg (Lansingburgh/Troy, NY) edged list leader Rennie Durrand (Laguna Beach, Ca) in the 800 (6th in 2:06.24 to 7th in 2:07.46) but was not able to displace Durrand in the lists.

Natalii Kaaiawahia (Fullerton, Ca) won the shot at 50'11" and placed fifth in the discus (168'4").

California Southern Section Divisional Meet--May 22--Cerritos

Perhaps the finest non-state meet anywhere, and arguably the best period, this year's divisional finals did not disappoint. Topped off with Gayle Kellon's (Walnut) NR 41.11 in the 300H (she also went 53.76 in the 400) and nation-leading 11.64's by Lisa Winston (Jordan/Long Beach) and Gervaise MoGraw (Ganesha/Pomona), the four races in each event whetted the interest of fans for the state finals.

Sarah Allaback (Cate) ran 10:47.63 in the small schools (1A) 3200 and did not advance to the state qualifying meet since she was simply FOURTH in her race and 10th overall. Vickie Cook (Alemany/Mission Hills) ran a section best in 10:11.78 ahead of Lori Lopez (Sacred Heart/Los Angeles) at 10:24.6 and Tanya Fischer (Chaminade/Canoga Park) in 10:30.89. In the 4A race, Denise Ball (Newbury Park) ran away from Shannon Stryker (Tustin) 10:23.43 to 10:29.42 (the same order of finish as the 1600 4:55.48 to 4:57.85) while the other divisions featured pass 'em at the last 200 races by Laura Cattavera (Mira Costa/ Redondo Beach frosh) 10:37.38 over Teresa Barrios (University/Irvine) 10:38.17 and Tammy Brazel (Chino) 10:35.42 over Karen Ebiner (Bishop Amat/La Puente) 10:38.40. That's a loaded field. Fischer (4:52.62) beat Lopez (4:54.73) in the 1600 in the fastest time of the day to raise the small schools' stock considerably.

In the sprints, Ganesha's McGraw and Jordan's Winston dominated their 2A and 4A divisions. With TAC teammate Zelda Johnson still having hamstring trouble, McGraw claimed 100/200 and relay titles easily as she and Johnson ran different races from the rest of the fields (11.64 to 11.79 and 23.27 to 23.83). Winston was the only person in the same vicinity with her 11.64 and 23.93 marks in the 4A. Diane Pullins (Muir/Pasadena) beat Winston in the 200 at 23.80 and placed 2nd in the 400 to Kellon, running 55.31.

Freshman Michelle Taylor (Ganesha) surprised Rennie Durrand (Laguna Beach) by holding off the national leader in the 800. Taylor was disqualified for running on the line around the first curve (southern California still runs a two turn stagger in this event) and Durrand's 2:08.10 held up as the winner. Jennie Stachura (Newbury Park), distinguished as a 300 and 400 meter hurdler, claimed the 4A title at 2:12.30. The other 800 winners were familiar names but chose to concentrate elsewhere. Polly Plumer (University/ Irvine) won the 3A (2:11.43) and Vickie Cook took the 1A (2:13.02). Plumer, who also won the 1600 (4:58.31) and ran a 1600 relay leg did not advance in the 800 and Cook chose to stay in the longer distances. Ironically, despite the multi-event efforts by both girls, their schools finished 2nd in the team races.

In technique events, multi-event talent was the rule. CeCe Chandler (Elsinore) blasted 14.10 in the 100 hurdles (30") with a 4.7mph wind, then tripled jumped 38'5-3/4". Katrena Johnson (Marshall Fundamental/ Pasadena), the defending state HJ champion, equalled Denise Yamada (Dos Pueblos/Santa Barbara) at 5'8", then won the LJ at 18'0-3/4", the 100 hurdles (14.76w) and the triple jump (36'9"). Heptathlete Sharon Hatfield (Fountain Valley) placed in all four of her events (5'4", 18'3-3/4", 14.26, 42.55). Frosh Gayle Wadsworth (Hawthorne) led her team to the 3A title with a win in the triple (38'2-1/2") 4th in the

Of course she had to move. Lisa Winston (Jordan/Long Beach 11.69 and 24.32), Zelda Johnson (Garey/Pomona 11.69 and 24.03), and Kim Grant (Hawthorne 11.96 and 24.77) didn't really let her coast. And wear. On any ring surface. HJ 8. Floppers and Istraddlers have one thing in common. Namely, the need for superior spring and lift. Here it is, with a full length, one-piece spike plate, good for either style. Plus pyramid rubber outsole for



better traction. And a nice snug fit. The HJ 8 also comes with matching non-jumping shoe.

4. TJ 60. It's three shoes in one, actually. With both midsole and



outsole wrapped-up at the heel, so triple jumpers can take advantage of its unique

"rocker" effect. Reinforced with suede side panels. Metal eyelets for longer shoe life. Impressive, three times over.

5. LJ 29. True, you don't have to be a world-class long jumper to feel



traction and lift that come from this six hole spike plate. But it helps. Built for extended flight, the LJ 29 not only has suede side panels for stability and strength, but an extra nylon panel to protect the toe area during take-off.

6. J'300. The serious javelin thrower wants that foot to stick securely in the boot.
