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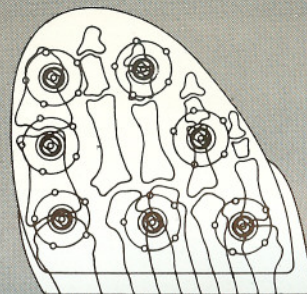

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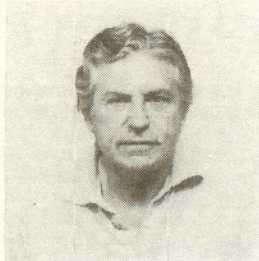
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REEL OFF

The TV people are preparing for the coverage of the World Championships and

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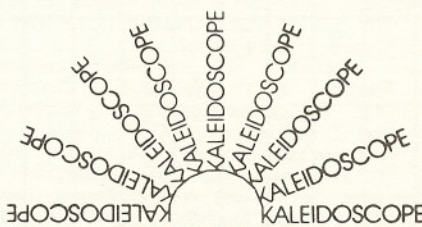

WANTA BE AN OLYMPIC CHAMPION?

WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP QUALIFIERS TO JUNE 6

"Athletics Weekly", the British publication, had a great article in its June 4 edition entitled "The British Milers' Club Red File". All about how the BMC keeps a file on Soviet women athletes. The alleged purpose of the article is to show what the British must do to compete on a par with the Russians, but it also is subtly telling off a few people. Regardless, it is a most interesting article and we have tried to glean a few gems from it and pass these on to you. Or maybe we are being subtle too. Read on -

"What sort of girl is likely to match the Russians from a social background angle?" Answer: Only a well sponsored athlete, or one with wealthy parents, is likely to make the grade. Soviet women have complete security; on paper they may be PE graduates or factory workers, but their food, clothing, accomodation and travel expenses are all paid for, and training time takes priority over studying and work.

"Will the ordinary coach be capable of challenging the mighty Soviet sporting machine?" Answer: It is unlikely that local coaches will produce and guide a female to world class in the present conditions. It is not impossible but unlikely. For such a coach to succeed he will need to be in receipt of \$7000 per year purely for his coaching purposes. The indications are that married coaches are more successful with women than single coaches. (Definition of "successful" might help here.)

Currently national coaches (in England) seem to emphasise TAKING OVER athletes who show ability rather than ASSISTING the coach and the athlete.

And don't miss reading (and interpreting) this: "Given that a promising girl has economic security, an experienced and well off coach with back up facilities easily available, what are the other ingredients for specific success?"

*She will be 25 year old.

*She will be 5'6 tall and weigh 120 pounds.

*She must acquire an oxygen uptake figure as near to 80/ml/Kg/min as possible.

*Her 800m time must be equal to her 1500m time or her 400m time. In the longer events, her 800, 1500 and 3000 times must be all of equal ability, not one greatly superior to the others; e.g. 2:00 for 800m is equal to 4:04 for 1500m and 8:48 for 3000m. Where this has not been achieved shows either a lack of speed preparation and racing in the shorter event or endurance in the longer one.

*She will have been running regularly for ELEVEN years.

*Her leg strength will show a reading of above 22 inches on the sarjent jump, nine hops to cover 25 meters, her standing long jump will equal her height plus 25 percent. If these figures cannot be achieved then specific pliometric work will have to be done until they are.

*Aerobic work will be at a distance not less than 10 miles and every such run is to be matched with one half the distance up and down a 1 in 15 hill.

*Summer mileage is 35mpw aerobic and 4mpw anaerobic (400 and 800 pace), 8x200 in 28 sec with 30 sec rest = 1 mile. The 400/800m specialist will average 25mpw aerobic running and 8mpw anaerobic.

*The world record for 800m will increasingly move towards the 400m runner who moves up rather than the 1500m runner who moves down. The ability to run 400m in 52 seconds is the crucial factor, not the ability to run sub-4:00 for the 1500m. This does not mean that the 400/800m specialist should ignore 10 mile runs!

*She will have her own sports doctor, not a G.P.

*She will have ready access to physiological testing every quarter; these will be all embracing. She will have a complete physiological file. Included in this screening will be a stress test to ascertain the eosinophil white cell level.

*On average she will race once every 16 days in a year. On average she will race her SPECIALIST distance once a month in the track season and one race each over and under-distance per month. In the winter there will be only four cross country races.

*ABOVE ALL she must possess or obtain the 'Championship Character'. All the preceeding points will help her to achieve:- (1) Drive; (2) Aggressiveness; (3) Determination; (4) Guilt-proneness; (5) Leadership; (6) Self-confidence; (7) Emotional Control; (8) Mental Toughness; (9) Coachability; (10) Conscientiousness; (11) Trust.

"A formidable array, you may think. However, the words of the Chinese proverb come to mind: "A journey of a thousand miles starts with the first step". One of the first steps being the cessation of eulogising junior girl wonders in the press, ranking them on a par with Olympic stars. The winning of an Area junior girls cross country title does not warrant the space and photography used and gives the subjects an inflated opinion of their standards which is passed on to the parents. When success is instant it is not constant, very few of these young tyros lasting the ELEVEN YEAR COURSE NECESSARY FOR SUCCESS."

Still wanta be an Olympic champion?



With only the TAC Championships remaining, how is the US of A doing as far as meeting the qualifying marks for entry into the World Championships at Helsinki next month? Far from great. Once we get away from the "natural" events, we are in trouble. To date we have qualified only one 800 runner, one 1500 runner, one javelin thrower, two discus throwers, no shot putters.

According to entry procedures, to enter more than one individual in an event (maximum is three), ALL must meet the standard. We can, of course, enter one person in every event provided she has met Entry Standard "B" - and we have an ample supply of these persons.

Here are the "A" standards (in order to enter more than one person per event) and the names and marks of those who have qualified:

100 (11.43): 11.16 Williams, 11.22 LaBome, 11.24 Loud, 11.28 Givens, 11.30 Cliette, 11.33 Brown, 11.43 Thacker. In addition, the following have met the standard IF the IAAF accepts wind-aided marks: 10.85 Ashford, 10.99 Cheesborough, 11.23 Washington, 11.29 Cowans, 11.33 King, 11.33 Ware, 11.36 Glover, 11.37 Fitzgerald, 11.41 McQueen and 11.42 Dennis.

CONFERENCE COMPARISON

NCAA DIVISION II

Cape Girardeau, May 23/28: Cal Poly/San Luis Obispo easily defended its NCAA Division II title as the Mustangs rolled to 206 points - 101 digits better than runner-up Morgan State. The Lance Harter coached crew won four events and hoarded seconds, thirds and fourths throughout the program for their margin of victory.

It was a California dominated meet with the eight teams from the sunny State scoring almost half of the total points (580) and grabbing six of the top twelve places. The Californians won 12 of the 18 events and finished second in four of those which they lost.

There were three double winners. Kim Whitehead, Morgan State, won both hurdles and added a third gold as a member of the winning 4x400 relay team. Donna Carley, Cal State Sacramento, won both sprints and Cal Poly's Amy Harper captured the 1500 and 5000.

Weather played its usual 1983 part. All 100m finalists, for example, ran slower in the final than in the trials. Same pattern was noted in the other sprint events and hurdles.

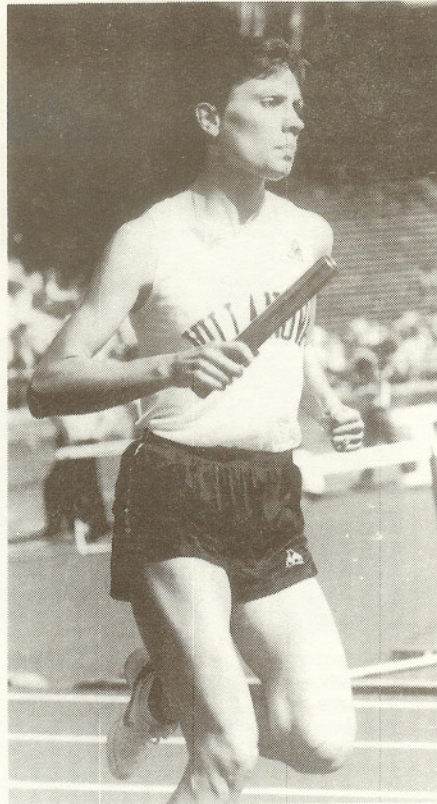

But, as usual, this affair became the prize meet of the season to date with every event filled with excellent competition and the meet providing top marks.

Main event, so to speak, was expected to be the mile where Mary Decker was to go after the world mark she lost last year to Maricia Puica of Rumania. Mary didn't quite do it in this, her first outdoor caper of the year, (not counting that 800 relay leg at Mt. SAC), but her performance was creditable, very creditable, at 4:21.65. Linda Goen, UCLA, was under 4:40 and finished 11th, just to give you an idea of the field in that one.

Heroine turned out to be that old veteran Robin Campbell who, after all these years, finally went under two minutes for 800 meters. Thus Robin becomes the fourth American to break that magic mark, the others being Wendy Knudson, Madeline Manning and Mary Decker. Campbell's time was 1:59.7 with Lee Arbogast getting closer with 2:01.9.

The sprints surprised. Diane Williams, who has not been what you might call sensational so far in 1983 with a best of 11.52, zipped to a speedy, legal 11.16 to nip Alice Brown, who also has not been too speedy in 1983. Brown clocked 11.33 for the silver. Fastest runner in the race was third placer Randy Givens of Florida State who apparently has never learned that the firing of the gun means she can start running. NORPAC TO OREGON

Eugene, Oregon, May 20/21: The Oregon Ducks are lousy hosts. This first year of the NorPac Track & Field Championships were held May 20 and 21 at Hayward Field in Eugene, and after fighting weeks of dismal weather, the temperature rose into the 80's in bright sunshine. A small (for Eugene) but enthusiastic crowd was on hand to greet the competitors. It looked like a fun couple of days in Oregon for all concerned, but it was all a ruse.

The Ducks simply mopped up on the other five schools, scoring more than twice the points of the 2nd and 3rd place teams combined. Oregon took nine individual titles, and there was even talk among the coaches about changing the scoring system to keep it closer.

Of the 10 NorPac schools, the six participants in the championships are the only ones with track programs...and four of those are admittedly developing programs, yet to have a solid tradition from which to recruit to the sport. Fresno State, for example, is competing in track and field for the first time this year. Along with Oregon (215 points) and Fresno (48), the other teams participating were Washington (105), Oregon State (56), Washington State (28) and California (90).

Oregon State's Sonya Crowther was the decisive winner in the Heptathlon despite being hampered by a sore hamstring. Her score (5383) earned her a trip to the NCAA Championships in Houston. Colleen Gibson set an OSU school record in winning the long jump.

Washington took first place honors in the 4x100 relay (47.05), the high jump (Dianne Baumann, 5'9 1/4), and the 100 (Donna Dennis, 11.60). Dennis qualified for but did not run in the 200 which was taken by in 24.2 by Cal's Connie Culbert, who doubled in the 400 in a walkaway 54.08.

Washington's Deanna Carr - who has been suffering with an ailing back and performed disappointingly in the earlier Washington/Oregon dual - showed a bit of her early season form by hurling the javelin 180'8, good enough for 10 Husky points.

Louise Romo, Cal's outstanding middle distance runner, held on at the tape to nip hard-charging Claudette Groenendaal 4:18.2 to 4:18.4 in the 1500. This time the partisan Oregon crowd played into the hands of the visitor. Groenendaal challenged the last 100m eliciting a burst of cheering from the stands that alerted Romo. "I heard the crowd and thought 'Oh, Crud'," said Groenendaal. "I was hoping I could sneak up on her." Nope. "I didn't see her," commented Romo. "I heard the crowd, and it scared me. It was close, but...."

The rest was all Oregon. It was the last home appearance in an Oregon singlet for senior Lexie Miller Beck who doubled in the hurdles (13.56w/57.06), ran a 55s lap on Oregon's winning mile relay team, and a leg on the 2nd place 4x100 relay squad. Quenna Beasley worked a double in the shot and discus (50'2/173'3), Kathy Hayes won the 3000 in 9:13.44 (which in

ON THE ROAD AGAIN By Jack Welch

I ran my first road race on Memorial Day just 11 years ago. It was a 5 miler in Greenwich, Connecticut, and I had been jogging for a couple of months. You could tell simply by my attire that I was a serious competitor. I had scissored the sleeves off a white undershirt which hung loosely over a pair of baggy cotton twill swimming trunks. In those days, a substantial percentage of any field dressed not unlike Johnny Rotten and the Sex Pistols. Running and Punk Rock apparently share common roots, at least as far as tattered t-shirts are concerned.

There must have been 250 people assembled at the starting line, surely one of the largest events in the country. Amby Burfoot won the race (if John Vitale didn't) after warming up for what had to be 10 miles or more. He seemed seriously psychotic about this racing experience. An unknown writer, Jim Fixx, was probably running that day; Jim had begun his racing career at this same run two years earlier.

It was a hot day and the course went past the town's waste treatment plant: Not exactly a highlight, but the memory lingers. So too does a short hill that seemed to be painted like a mural on the side of a building. There was a park, sunshine, and a sense of "Why-am-I-doing-this?" As I plunged down a gentle hill in the last mile, a police officer hustled an old lady out of the path ("Lady, today the street's for runners!") I turned a corner onto the cinder track of the high school, and seeing the finish line 330 yards away I tried to accelerate. I might actually have done so. Some people clapped, I passed some old man in canvas high-tops, and crossed the line in 35:25. A personal best - 7:05 pace.

Some of us have come a furpiece since then. Certainly Fixx has, now a millionaire and a leading apostle with his "Complete Book of Running". Amby, bless his organic soul, continues to be about the only reason trees should die for Bob Anderson's magazines. I can still run five miles in 35:25, despite 15 marathons, 30,000 miles, and a patella relocation. Running is still fun for me, although awesomely different. For all of us it must be different.

For Debbie Eide, winning the inaugural KGW Run Between the States, was different in a most pleasant way. "Not third, not fourth, but first for a change," exulted the Oregon teacher. Covering the 12K (7.44 mile) route in 40:01, Eide had been challenged only by Linda McClennan, who placed second in 40:09. Marjorie Kaput (41:38), Joanne Lanit (43:08) and Barb Clark (43:15) followed in what was billed as the largest first-time running event ever held. Placing 5th woman among some 12,000 starters was Carol Cook at 44:04.

For a week, Spokane's Lilac Bloomsday (May 1) was the biggest race ever held with over 28,000 official entries. Anne Audain, a stride or two ahead of Henry Rono, defended her title setting a course record for 7.54 miles in 39:29. The Kiwi great beat a strong field, unchallenged except by the chunky Kenyan. Lynn (nee Kanuka) Williams, a Canadian cross-country specialist, placed 2nd in 41:06, just 2 seconds in front of Debbie Eide. Eleanor Simonsick finished 4th at 41:21, with Janis Klecker 5th in 41:54 and Laurie Binder 6th at 42:11. Other finishers included Mary Ditz (42:40), Gail Volk (42:51), Pat English (43:01) and Laura Dewald 10th at 43:04. Cindy Dalrymple (43:16), Tina Gandy (43:17) and Linda Edgar (43:45) rounded out the top thirteen. Ruth Kleinsasser Caldwell Wysocki was 19th in 45:08, and Doris Brown Heritage, now 40 years old, placed 22nd in 46:20. Don Kardong and the Spokane community truly put on a magnificent event.

Mary Decker (you can drop the Tab because she did) used the OTC Women's 10K (Eugene, May 1) to test her endurance. Mary passed, I guess, essaying an American Record for a loop course with a time of 31:52. This breaks the previous mark of 32:04 held by Jan Merrill. As is Decker's custom, she built a huge lead early - oh, about 22 seconds by the one mile split - and won by almost 3 minutes.
