CAL-EYE - DO - SCOPE

A couple of issues ago we said in our Kaleidoscope column that we "wondered how fast Stephanie Hightower could run the hurdles if she knew what to do with her left arm" - or something like that.

Hightower's coach, old friend Mamie Rall-Hightower's coach, old friend Mamie Railins, answered in an article which appeared in the LA Times, "Everyone complains about Stephanie's left arm, but she has done all right with it the way it is" - or something like that.

This is no indicment against Mamie or her pupil, but this is exactly what's wrong with women's track and field in the UNited States. We have so many, many talented individuals who "do all right" with what they're doing. They win over domestic competition because of their natural talent, therefore figuring, "I am a winner, I am great, I do not need to work on

But when they get into competition against someone with just as much natural talent who has worked on technique, they get trounced. And it's all so sad because we have the most talent of any nation in the world.

Mamie is right. Hightower has done all right with what she is doing. So has Kate Schmidt. Just think what they might do had they learned it right.

Let's face it. Hightower is a very fortunate individual. She is exactly the right size and right speed for the 100m hurdles as they now are. If Hightower was taller, she would have step difficulty - just ask Benita Fitzgerald. If she was able to run 100 meters near 11 flat, she would have step troubles. And so she flails her arms, (her right arm isn't the picture of perfection), and gets away with it because the hurdles are exactly the right spacing for her height and speed. I simply think she could get to the finish line quicker if she kept her balance properly.

We are always anxious to see track and field on TV - and so far we have always been disappointed in what we are shown, Biggest com-plaint is ALWAYS the announcing. This time we were in Gunnison, Colorado, when the TV of the Olympic Trials came on. We registered at the Motel, rushed into the room with a little more than an hour remaining on the show listed as "US Olympic Trials".

First thing that went wrong was when we turned on the set and there were several swimsuit clad Cheshire Cat grinning, hair-lacquered swimming types who proceeded to splash about a pool, usually upside down, while Esther Williams regaled us with the news that "these were REAL athletes".

That left us with about 40 minutes of track remaining. The picture coverage of the events wasn't so bad, but the worst thing that ever happened to ABC's Olympic Telecast was when Dwight Stones made the Olympic Team in the high jump. He was superb in everything he said on the tube. He KNOWS what he is talking about.

Eugene, Oregon, May 28/June 2: We picked Tennessee to win the NCAA title - finally - and if the officials had cancelled the last event of the meet, we would have been correct. Tennessee led Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, Friday and 99% of Saturday. But it was that 200 meters, last event of the competi-tion, that did us (and Tennessee) in. The Flor-ida State Lady Seminoles scored 48 points in less than 231/2 seconds with 1-2-3-6-7 places and

less than 23½ seconds with 1-2-3-6-7 places and came from behind to win the NCAA gonfalon. Florida State sprinters (Givens, Cliette, Payne, Finn and Davis) scored 129 points of the winning total of 145. The rest of the team could have stayed home as Tennessee, with its balanced team power, could corral only 124 points. Randy Givens went home with four rolls meals in the two dashes and the two results.

gold medals in the two dashes and the two re-lays. There were no other doublers.

Two days after the closing of entries, we contacted Oregon to determine team entries. At that time several schools had not entered. Grambling, for example. But Grambling was there on Hayward Field, galloping with the rest. Heptathletes visited constantly with their coach following each jump or throw, leaving the field to do so. Some of these things, we have been led to believe, are against the rules. So what are the rules for?

The home team came through even better than they usually do on Hayward Field. Kathy Hayes staged a 'comeback' and won the 10000, Claudette Gronendaal took the 1500 and was second in the 800, Ranza Clark was seventh in the 800 and sixth in the 1500, Kim Roth picked up a ninth in the 1500. Eryn Forbes limped to an eighth in the 5000 and an honorable mention 13th in the 10k. One might

able mention 13th in the 10k. One might conclude Oregon is a distance team.

Another team which leans toward the distances, Stanford, finished third, one place in front of Oregon, but they received help from some field eventers. PattiSue PLumer won the 5000 and was second in the 3000, Alison Wiley was second in the 5000 and 9th in the 3k. Carol Cady won the discus and picked up. 3k. Carol Cady won the discus and picked up 12 more points for her second in the shot for the Cardinals 71 points.

As is the usual case in big meets, some in-dividulas came through, some bombed. Her's how it went event by event.

We always hesitate to consider marks turned in by some schools in the south in the short dashes. But Jackson State's Eunice Jones had done some mighty swift flying down south and there she was, seeded number one in the 100. Jones was entered in the first heat, but as soon as she took her first practice start, we knew something was not quite kosher. Poor technique, no knowledge of how to start - Jones finished last in her heat with 11.97, nearly a full second slower than her reported best time. Houston's Jackie Washington, long on the in-jured list, captured the first heat in 11.37 and was the only qualifier from that section.

Randy Givens won heat number two in 11 20over Tennessee's Mary Bolden and Georgia's

Gwen Torrance with the help of the wind. FSU's Michelle Finn took the third heat and

yet another Lady Seminole, Brenda Cliette, crossed the line first in heat four.

Interesting point which will probably be overlooked by the NCAA officials - six of the eight qualifiers came from wind-aided races.

In the final, Givens pressed the turbo button at about 70 yards and won clearly over teammate Cliette in a windy 11.06. No one threatened although Washington closed fast for third to break up the FSU trio.

#### HEPTATHLON

We picked Nebraska's Debbie Clark to win the heptathlon based on her best score which was made with two poor throwing marks. She had done much better in the throws and therefore, we figured, could be the upset winner.

Nothing seemed to be right for Ms Clark. First of all, her declaration was about an hour late, but she was admitted. Her lethargic attitude didn't become evident until the following morning when runners settled into their blocks for the 100m hurdles. At the starter's 'Set' command, Clark stayed on her marks. The starter waited a few seconds, apparently used to this tactic by some speedsters, and finally called the runners off their marks. Clark was given a warning.

The bad news didn't stay away very long, however, as Clark hit the first hurdle, triple jumped over the second and knocked the third down with her hands, (a disqualification). She registered a 16.19 - and there went our upset prediction.

The heptathlon is a bad news event any way. Ask Tonya Alston, UCLA. Alston had a good hurdle mark, was numero uno in the high jump and long jump, was third in the 200 and very respectable in the spear. But zilch in the shot. Three fouls. For shame! One can see it possible to make three fouls in the long jump, but NEVER in the shot. So a possible winner finished 13th.

The battle for the title went to UNLV's 19-year old Sheila Tarr, a freshman. Tarr pipped Tennessee's senior Myrtle Chester 62 points with a well-balanced performance. Only her 800 was really poor (2:29.67). The small Tennesseean had some PR's (javelin and shot), but her PR's in those two throwing events are so weak it didn't matter as much as her slipping in the long jump. Chester leaped only 18'10'4, more than a foot off her best.

Big surprise was third placer Linda Spenst of Maryland. Picked for no better than 12th and having a best of 5350, the small athlete came up with a horde of bests to tally 5594 and take home the bronze.

KALEIDOSCOPE: Only one of the 60 events picked by these 'experts' was 100% correct. Everyone picked Decker to win the 3000 - and everyone was right. WTFW was the only predictor who included Ruth Wysocki - unfortunately we picked her to win the 800 and she did us dirt by winning the 1500. Surprisingly not everyone picked Decker to win the 1500 - Runner's World chose Addison. Everyone picked Ritter to win the high jump and Lewis to win the Long Jump. The 400 seemed to be the toughest to pick as both TFN and Runner's World failed to name a single Olympic Team member. TFN selected D.Howard, Bryant and Griffith while Runner's World named D.Howard, Bryant and Dixon. None of them made the team. RW also bombed out of the 1500 picks by selecting Addison, Bremser and Warren for the team.

Which organization got the most Olympic Team members? With 7 individuals in 9 events, it's Athletics West as Number One. AW has Cheeseborough (400), Decker (1500/3000), Hansen (3000), Griffin (SP/DT), Smith (JT), Greiner (heptathlon) and Benoit (marathon). Not far behind was Puma/Energizer and the World Class AC. Adidas, (Fitzgerald and Julie Brown), Pacific Coast Club (Ritter and Huntley) and San Diego State (Pagel and DeSnoo) were the only other groups with more than one individual. Brooks with Wysocki in the 800 and 1500 had two places.

What about the colleges? Nine athletes from eight schools made the team. San Diego State with Pagel and DeSnoo grabbed top honors. Others included Cady (Stanford), Lewis (Houston - although she jumped in the Santa Monica TC colors), Thacker (Nebraska), Givens (Florida State), Leatherwood (Alabama), Turner (UTEP) and Barksdale (Tennessee).

Lincoln, Nebraska, May 11/12: It's not too often that an athlete goes away from a championship meet - especially one as tough as the Big-8 - with FIVE gold medals. But that's what happened at Lincoln as Rhonda Blanford, known primarily as a journeywoman hurdler, captured three individual events and ran on two winning relay teams to lead the Nebraska team to its usual Big-8 Conference crown.

The Denver, Colorado, native won the 100 hurdles as expected in a legal 13.47, her season best. Then she upset Missouri's Rufina Ubah to capture the 100 meter sprint in 11.54 and once again broke the worsted in the 200, winning over teammate Angela Thacker in 23.71. She earned her fourth and fifth gold medal on the winning 4x100 and 4x400 relay teams.

Iowa State's Nawal El Moutawakil tallied couple of fine marks with a win in the 400 at 51.80 and another in the 400 hurdles in 55.75.

Yet another doubler was Kansas State's Deb Pihl who took the 3000 by nearly 13 seconds and returned to capture the 1500 by six seconds.

A fine mark was recorded by Nebraska's Thacker as she won the long jump with a fine leap of 22'41/4.

Nebraska's Debbie Clark took the heptath-Ion with 5580 points including marks of 38'61/4 in the shot and 134'8 in the javelin. Clark returned in the open events to record a put of 43'8 and a throw of 150'7. If she can blend those performances into her seven-event effort, she will be a threat for the NCAA title.

#### CALIFORNIA STATE MEET

Los Angeles Coliseum, June 2: California's year-old Regional format, (now discarded by CIF officials), took some of the quality out of the State meet again, but not the top quality as two National Federation records fell, and multi-talent was the word of the day.

Wendy Brown won the State title for Wood-side by winning all three jumps and placing second in the short hurdles. Capping the effort was a Federation record in the triple jump of 42'10½ (although Brown has windy jumps beyond the 43 foot mark this year).

Sweetwater's Yolanda Devers set the other National Federation mark, clipping .01 off her week-old 100H mark with 13.41. Devers also won the 100 (11.51) and took second in the long jump.

The other National record holder in the meet, Leslie Maxie (Mills/Millbrae) won the 300 hurdles in the second fastest time ever (40.90) but could manage only fifth in the short barriers in 13.87.

Pre-meet favorite Compton dropped the baton while leading the 400 relay and had to settle for a second place tie with Locke. 
