

CHIZHOVA, ROSENDAHL AND CHI SET WORLD RECORDS

Nadyezhda Chizhova of the Soviet Union broke Margitta Gummel's world mark in the shot with a throw of 64'8 $\frac{3}{4}$ " for the lone record "broken" during the past month. Two other marks will go in the books - Heidi Rosendahl scored 4995 points in the pentathlon - the best ever with the new 100m hurdles and consequently the new world record. Chi Cheng completely obliterated Roza Babich's 27.1 world best for the 200m hurdles running 26.2 the first time she tried the event. Chi also equalled Pam Kilborn's 13.4 100m hurdle record but Kilborn has a 13.3 pending. The West Germans set a mark in the new 3x1500m relay and Italy's Paola Pigni set a world best for 5000 meters and also whacked the three mile mark, the 4000m mark and the 3000m mark on the way.

Crown Cities Invitational

Walnut, California, May 25:-Crown Cities Track Club, the defending National Champions, hosted their Annual Invitational on the fast and beautiful Mt. San Antonio College field and more than 800 athletes took part in the day long competition which started - and ended - on schedule.

There were some outstanding performances, but the best marks were turned in by Crown Cities' Chi Cheng who scored a triple win, broke one world record and equalled a second. Chi began the day's activities by waltzing off with the 100m hurdles in 13.4, equalling Pam Kilborn's official world record. Wind velocity was 0.00mps. Chi returned two hours later to run her first-ever flight of 200m hurdles, taking dead aim at Roza Babich (USSR) world best of 27.1s. Chi not only broke Babich's record, she completely obliterated it with a fantastic 26.2 race. Wind was 0.67mps. Diane Spangler (Crescenta-Canada Spikettes) was second in both races with times of 14.8 and 28.0s. Chi later won the long jump at 19'10 $\frac{1}{4}$ " to complete a perfect day.

Barbara Ferrell, LA Mercuresses, also got in on the record breaking, but ran afoul of the wind gauge as she sped to an easy win in the 100y in 10.3 to equal the mark set by Marlene Matthews (Australia) and Wyomia Tyus (USA) - but she was aided by a 7.6mph wind. However, need we remind you that 10.3 is very, very fast - even with the wind, downhill and on a short course! That's moving!

Best of the remaining marks occurred in the 9/under division where the Bakersfield Saints tireless foursome sped to relay marks of 61.1 in the 4x110 and 2:06.2 in the 4x220 relays. In addition, blonde speedster Terry Frye, about the size of a large mosquito who anchored the two fast relays, won the 100y in 12.9.

Woodland Invitational from Natalie Rocha

Woodland, California, May 3:-Despite frequent onslaughts of rain, the women's portion of the Woodland Invitational Track Meet produced some good performances.

The shot put, interrupted by a momentary storm, had some good marks. Lynn Graham, now living in San Jose, led the field with a throw of 48'6, best in the USA this season. Carmelita Capilla was second (45'5) with Linda Langford, in her second meet after undergoing surgery on her left shoulder, third.

The high jump was the highlight of the meet as Fran Parham jumped 5'7 to outdistance her nearest opponent by three inches. This jump was especially good considering the wet and soggy takeoff area from which Parham had to jump.

The mile was an interesting event as it presented a talented field. Francie Larrieu, electing to run in flats because of the wet, lumpy condition of the track, made up a 25 yard deficit in the last 220 to just catch the tiring pace-setter Linda McCain of the Millbrae Lions. Vickie Eberly and Cis Schafer were third and fourth, while Kathy Hammond, obviously lacking the necessary endurance, came in a tired fifth.

In other events, Jayne Frederick won the 100m low hurdles (old height, new spacing) easily in 14.3 over Deanne Kurth and veteran Cherrie Sherrard. Smallwood of Millbrae led her teammates to a 1-2-3 sweep of the 100y dash, Rhonda Albers won the long jump with a leap of 18 feet and the Millbrae foursome annexed the mile relay in 4:06.8, far off their season best of 3:55.4s.

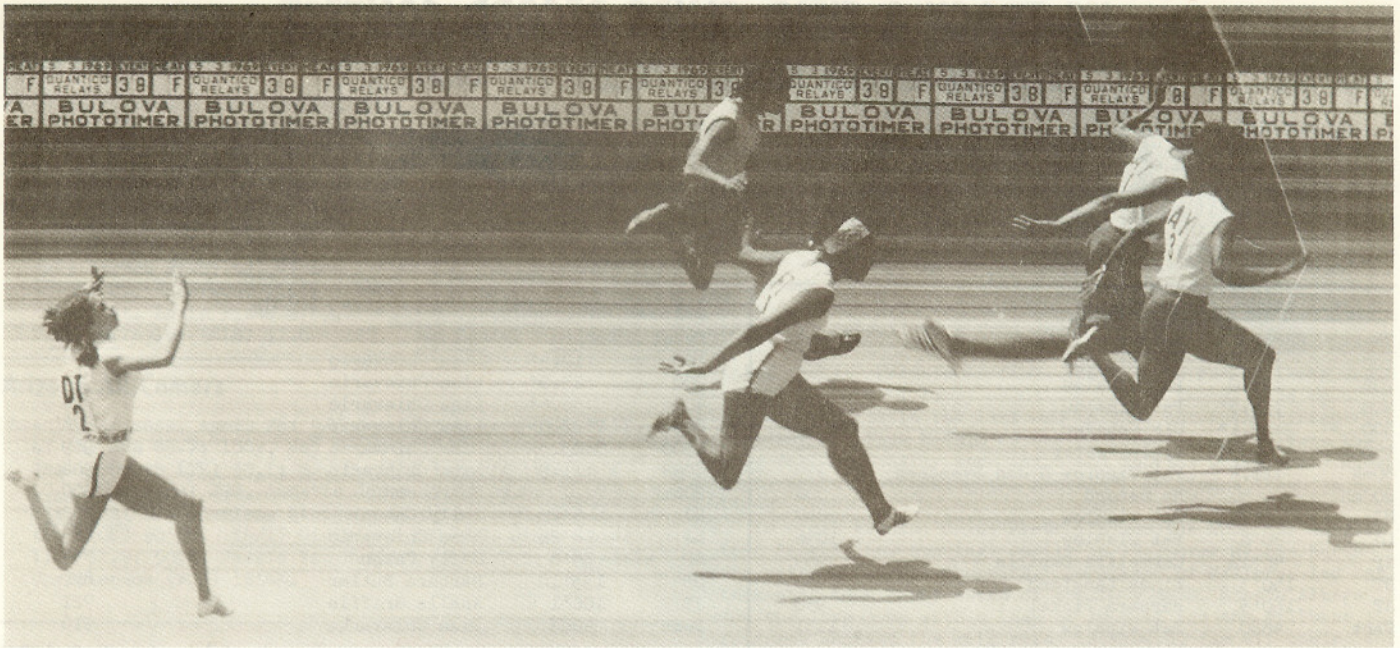

San Jose Collegiate Invitational

San Jose, California, May 10:-Thirteen California colleges gathered at San Jose State for the Second Annual Women's Track & Field Meet. Harbor (Junior) College of Los Angeles successfully defended the title it won in 1968 scoring 98 points to far outdistance runner-up host San Jose State with 71 points and Humboldt State with 70.

The SJ Women's Recreation Association did a fine job in the staging and handling of the meet - by far the most professional handling of a collegiate meet we have yet witnessed. The officiating was good, the meet started and finished on schedule and the competition and performances were better than the usual women's college meet.

Chi Cheng, Cal Poly (Pomona), staged a one-woman show on the track running in and winning eight races during the competition including heats and semi-finals. When the finals rolled around, Chi won three consecutive races all by huge margins. She first annexed the 80m hurdles by a full second in 10.8 over defending champion Jane Phineas of Harbor. She walked back to the starting line and walked off with the 100 with a 9-10 yard win over Linda Huey, SJS. After a 15 minute recovery, Chi won the 220 in 23.9 by nearly four seconds or about 35 yards over Carolyn Williams of Harbor. Needless to add, Chi was voted the outstanding track performer.

Only other good mark on the track was Huey's 6.1 victory in the 50y dash.

Veteran performer Janis Nay of the home team San Jose State Spartans, won the shot and discus and the outstanding field event award as she posted marks of 42'3/2 and 113'7 - far below her best. Jane Phineas won the long jump with a fine leap of 18'7/4 and Martha Lutz of UC Davis showed good form in winning the high jump at an even five feet.

The Harbor 4x110 relay team of Orintha Woodson-Bonnie Elstad-Jane Phineas and Williams ran a good 50.8 in the one lap event.

Only real complaint about the conduct of the meet concerns the continued announcing of individuals as "Miss Phineas" did this and "Miss Rico" did that - not only does this seem affected to me, but the fact that "Miss Rico" is a mother indicates something is wrong about the procedure!

1st Annual National Collegiate Championships

San Marcos, Texas, May 8/9: Southwest Texas State College was host for the First Annual National Intercollegiate Track and Field Championships - a great innovation - and fifteen universities and colleges took part.

Texas Woman's University of Denton won the team title with 74 points over Texas Tech and Indiana State University who both tallied 61 points. Montclair, NJ, team of two athletes, each of whom won three events, scored 60 points for fourth.

The meet was marred by 1) a lack of communication to interested institutions, (for example, no California schools sent competitors although the Commissioner in Charge of National Championships, Frances Schaafsma, is at Cal State in Long Beach), 2) a wishy-washy "Rule #4" which eliminated all "Club" athletes, but was bent enough to permit competition by at least a dozen outstanding club athletes - but no telling how many good athletes did not enter for fear of being ruled out after arriving in Texas.

Nonetheless, the meet was a start in the right direction and in future years, according to the DGWS, all college students will be eligible to compete and the meet should eventually become the highlight of the collegiate season.

Outstanding performers were Terry Hull of the University of Tennessee (and also the Knoxville Track Club) who won the 220 (25.4) and 440 (56.4) dashes and Cherrie Bridges of Indiana State University, (one of the Indiana AAU's outstanding athletes) who won the 880 (2:19.4) and one mile (5:15.1) runs.

Montclair (NJ) College duo of Denise Wood and Frances Greene, (both AAU club athletes), provided some sort of record by winning three events each. Wood was victorious in the three weight events while Greene won both hurdles and the long jump.

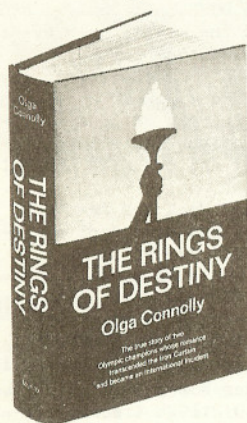

BAKERSFIELD INVITATIONAL

World's Biggest Meet

Bakersfield, California, May 10:—Probably the biggest meet of the 1969 track season was staged by the Bakersfield Saints Athletic Club today in the beautiful Bakersfield stadium on the fast clay track. The huge entry list included 38 clubs and 751 athletes. The competition got under way at 10:15 in the morning and ended more than nine hours later at 7:18. More than 100 races were run including heats and finals and some outstanding marks were turned in.

"Doc" Brown's Millbrae Lions, taking dead aim on the National championship this year, won the Women's division over San Jose and the Los Angeles Mercurettes. Nancy Mullen led the Millbrae crew with a victory in the 220 (24.9) and a second (56.5) behind Jarvis Scott (56.4) in the 440. The only other Millbrae winner was Barbara Pickel who upset Olympian RaNae Bair to win the javelin with a throw of 154'10, but the northern California crew scored in nearly every event to win the title.

Barbara Ferrell had a good 10.5 100y win (10.4 wind-aided heat), Pat Donnelly a fine 14.0 100mHH win and Franzetta Parham, now jumping for the Laurel Track Club, soared 5'6 to win her specialty.

Orinda TC's Jayne Frederick, who has fantastic potential in the pentathlon and just could be America's next Olympic threat, scored two outstanding wins in the girl's division. In their effort to determine the absolute greatest in track and field of all time, these two have spent countless hours of research and have arrived at their list by taking the ten best performances by every athlete, then averaging them to determine the true ranking of the standard events since stop watches and measuring tapes were invented. In the Yearbook, the performances are tabulated in detail with each performance being listed along with the place the athlete achieved in that competition, the site of the competition and the date of the competition. However, just to give you a sample of the feature, we are printing here the ranking list of the "All-Time Greatest" in all track and field history, but are listing only the average of the individual's top ten performances. As the authors, Popper and Visek, state, there are some REAL surprises and the results may be an eye-opener to those accustomed to judging athletes on the merits of a single solitary result. 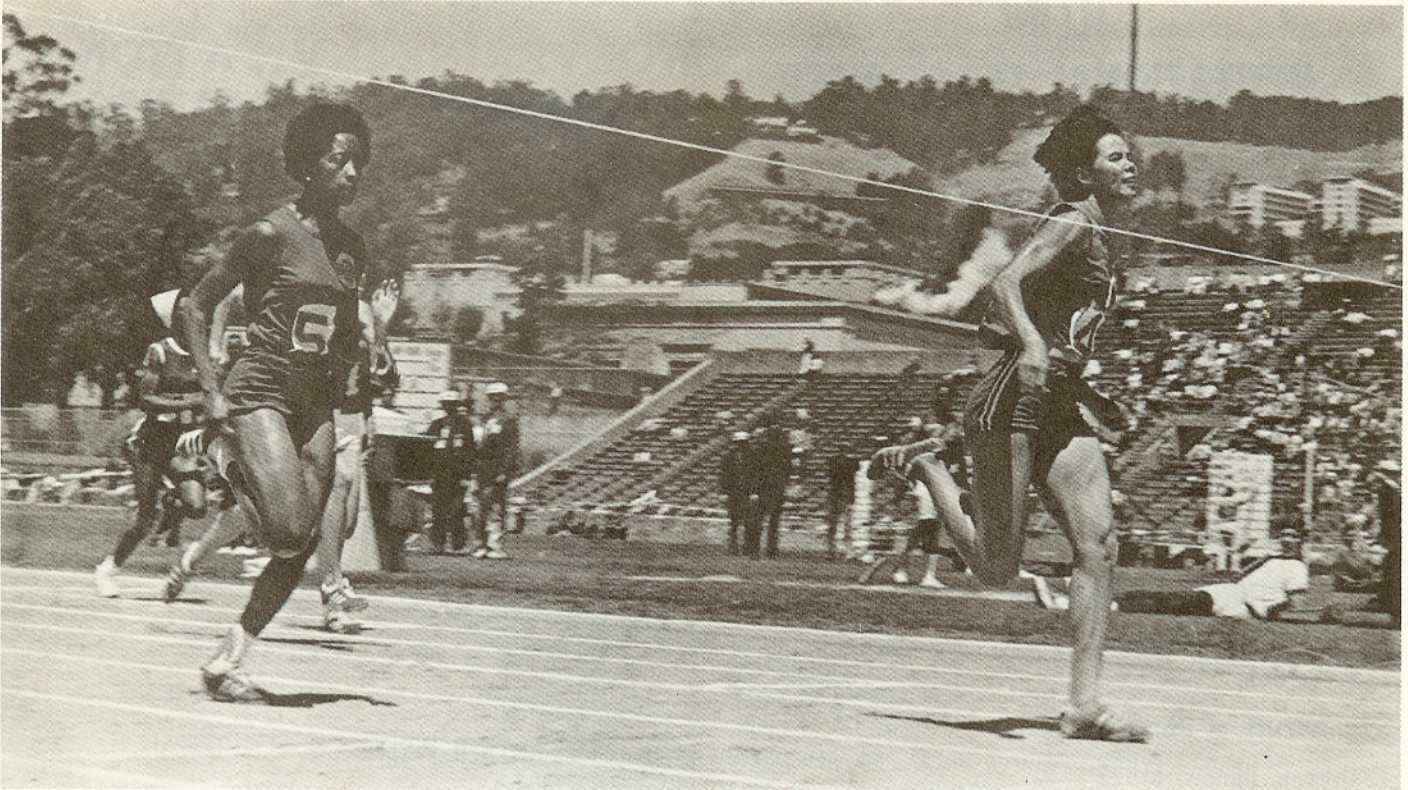

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AGE GROUP TRACK by Calvin Brown

Debbie Heald is back running again after an injury. She's five seconds off her lap pace. Debbie ran 5:27.7 on Saturday, May 24, and a relay leg of 5:27.8 on Sunday, May 25, at Walnut. Earlier this year at Phoenix on March 16, Debbie ran 5:07.6 for a National record in the mile.

It has been reported that Debbie Roth has run 2:17 and 5:02 in the 880 and mile. I have no further information. Maybe the two Debbie's - Roth and Heald - will get a chance to meet each other at San Jose on June 21. Here's hoping so!

Twelve year old Debbie Rivera continues to improve in the weight events. Her best marks to date, all on May 25 at Walnut, are: 38'10" (SP 6#), 95'8" (DT) and 235'2 (BPT). Her 95'8" is a US Best for age 12.

Nine year old Lou Jenkins is back with a 13.4 for 100y and 12'8" in the long jump. Her 13.4, usually believed to be a good time, looks a little feeble compared to Terri Frye of Bakersfield who set three National Records on May 10 at the 2nd Annual Bakersfield Invitational with a great 12.6 hundred, 29.9 in the 220 and a member of 58.9 440y relay team. Terri will turn 10 on June 7, 1969. Also looking very good at Bakersfield was Chris Smallwood of the Millbrae Lions TC who took second to Terri in the 100 at 12.9 but ran 12.8 in her heat which established a N.R. Terri's heat time of 12.7 was wind aided.

Bakersfield was quite the meet. It was the largest female meet in US history with 751 athletes entered. Thirty nine teams from as far away as Chicago competed. There were at least nine National Records set in this meet. I'll give them to you as they occurred: It started out with Karol Stewart (13) when she broke her own NR, when at age 12 she ran 7.2, with a great time of 6.9 for the 50y hurdles. I feel Karol will do even better. The conditions were very good at Bakersfield which helped. Karol will be 14 on July 27, 1969. Karol also jumped 17'1 at Bakersfield and has done 17'7 in AAU competition this season, 1/2 inch off her own Association record. Karol also ran 26.6 for 3rd in the 220 at the Bakersfield Meet.

Record No. 2 was when Bakersfield Saints 9-U 4x110 relay team ran 58.9 to break Arizona's NR of 59.4, (inaccurately announced by me as Bakersfield's old NR). The relay team was composed of Sonya Jackson (8), Stephanie Stanbury (9), Cheryl Washington (9) and Terri Frye (9), I think! Number 3 was the Diablo Valley's 10/11 440 relay team breaking Bakersfield's accepted 53.7 and Arizona's 53.3 (run earlier this year), with a time of 53.1. On Diablo Valley's team are at least two very fine sprinters in Toni Strickland with wins in individual events 11.9 and 27.1, and Sherri Uhalde with a 6.4 win in the 50 and second in the 100 at 12.0.

Record No. 4 was Chris Smallwood's 12.8 in 9/U 100 - the accepted record is 13.2 run by several girls. No. 5 was a great 440 by Marietta Brown of Stockton Women's TC in 67.5 bettering Kim Major's 70.7 run last year at the "12/13 Nationals" at San Jose. No. 6 was also Marietta Brown in her flight of the 220 with a time of 30.1s. Unfortunately Marietta and Terri Frye weren't running together because record No. 7 came in the next flight of the 9/Under 220 where Terri ran 29.9s. The old NR was 30.3 by Bernadine Armstrong of Will's Spiketees. Terri ran bare-foot with white socks.

Record No. 8 became Terri's also with a great 12.6! The current record is 13.2 by Renee Moore of Oakland Oakettes. Finishing 3rd in the 100 was Terri's teammate Cheryl Washington in 13.2. No. 9 was the 10/11 880 medley relay (220-110-110-440) which is a first year event, so the best recorded and NR applicant team will get the National Record. The Bakersfield Saints time of 2:00.0 was processed as that potential record. It was a good team effort.

Anne Gallaher ran 7.1 in the 50y hurdles which was good for only third in the competition! Sandy Goldsberry was second at 7.1s. Anne's mark set an Arizona Association record. Anne scored 3458 in the pentathlon under bad conditions with 8.0 (50yH), 33'7" (SP-6), 4'4 (HJ), 13'10" (LJ) and 26.6 (200m). Sandy has jumped 5'3 for new NR in the high jump and also "World Age Best" for 13. Sandy has improved her long jump to 16'11".

We have a new distance find in young Julia Shea. Julie turned 10 on May 5 but before she changed divisions on May 1 she ran a great 5:40.0 mile to beat the previous best for a 9 year old by 23 seconds. Julie's performance was at Raleigh, North Carolina.

FLASH! Marietta Brown (Stockton) set two National records on Saturday, May 31, at Sacramento when she whipped through the 220 in 29.5 and the 440 in 67.4! In both races she was pushed by Millbrae's Chris Smallwood who clocked 29.7 and 70.2s.

Not only was the Bakersfield Invitational the biggest meet ever held for female athletes in the USA, the meet program was the best seen in many a moon.....Jody Peterson of the Ontario-Montclair TC, snaps her fingers as she goes over the hurdles.....USTFF holds their Annual National Championships June 13/14 at the University of Kentucky. A full and complete schedule of women's events is included.....The Third South Pacific Games will be held in August in Port Moresby.

Millbrae's Linda Langford is coming along nicely after a shoulder operation....One of the other outstanding weight athletes for Millbrae, Carmelita Capilla, has developed a sore shoulder and may be lost for the remainder of the season....Ken Simons has withdrawn from the women's track scene for reasons unknown to us and his loss seriously threatens the Michigammas as a track power....Speaking of the Michigammas, the wedding of Francie Kraker and Jeff Johnson has been postponed....The Michigan AAU Long Distance Invitational Meet coming up in the fall announces the first TEN teams in ALL divisions will receive awards.....As of June 1, it is a requirement for all Wolverine Parkettes to subscribe to WTFW before membership is granted. How about that!!!!.....

The San Jose 12/13 National Invitational Meet will be run on an all-weather track this year and has already received invitations from all parts of the USA. Top five teams in the 12/13 division will receive trophies. All individual winners will also receive trophies, the next three medals.....

The Western US Women's and Girl's Track and Field Games will be held again this year at Chico on Saturday, June 28. Best news of this meet is a new meet director! It's a fine meet, spoiled in 1968 by poor direction.....

Maeve Kyle competed in eight events in Ireland on May 10. Her marks included 25.1 for 220y, 15.2 for 100mH, 4'8" in the high jump, 17'4 in the long jump, 29'8" in the shot put, (making a total pentathlon score of 4041 for her personal best), 80'0" in the discus, 67'9 in the javelin and running a leg on the relay. Maeve Kyle is 40 years old....The "Women's Mile of the Century" scheduled for England on June 14, has lined up Maria Gommers (Holland), Paola Pigni (Italy), Emilia Ovadkova (Czechoslovakia) and Gerda Klopfer (West Germany) in addition to the English runners.

West Germany set a world record in the newly approved 3x 1500m relay at Bendorf recently. The team of Christa Koppenschlaeger, Sigrun Schumacher and Manuela Preiss clocked 15 minutes 40.6 seconds....Almut Brommel is a javelinist to watch. Now 34 years old she's training very hard and should do even better than last year when she reached a personal best of 180'11.

A new addition to the best sister's list of Andrew Huxtable is Rita and Monique Vanherck, twin sisters from Belgium. Rita has high jumped 5'3" and Monique long jumped 19'8"....Have you ever been disgusted when you try and pin numbers on your uniform? "Dear Editor;

I have been in about 140 track meets during my career which I classify as being from the best-run (the National AAU at Frederick, Maryland in 1966) to the worst-run, (at Cal Poly, San Luis Obispo, on May 17, 1969). Never has there been such a fiasco! The meet director was trying so hard to stick by every rule in the book that she forgot about the athletes. As a result, the meet not only ran two hours late, but, for example, the competitors in the long jump, (which started at 3:00 o'clock), were not even allowed to run-thru to check their step or to take any 'pop-ups' or warmup jumps because "the meet officially started at 11:30 and all competitors were told to warm up at that time". The approach to the high jump was up-hill and involved crossing three varied surfaces - starting on grass, going to dirt and then on to rubberized asphalt - and the asphalt was in two tiers necessitating a hop up. During the meet, the members of the UCLA team set four new meet records while on their way to building up a lead in the point score and were evidently all set to be declared the winning team in the eleven-team competition - BUT, at that moment, the entire UCLA team was disqualified. They voided all our records and took back all our awards - because we did not have an "advisor" present. And guess who now won the meet? You're right, Cal Poly of San Luis Obispo!"

"Regarding the letter in May WTFW may we respectfully suggest Larry Berman purchase a copy of the 1968 WTFW Yearbook. He will see therein separate 1500m and mile lists in the World Progressive Performances section. He will see a similar separate list for 1500m in the World Age Records section, and again a 1500m list in the Annual Best Performance Tables. In addition in the World Top 100 Lists there is a section for 1500m to a depth of 60 performers, (lack of number of competitors in this event was the reason we did not go deeper last year).

In the forthcoming 1969 Yearbook he will again see full parity given to the 1500m and the event is also featured in national top-10 lists when the statisticians of the countries deem the performances worthy of recording.

On conversion factor, I myself use the system of Race Time x 1500 + 1609 which gives a truer comparison than a flat 19 second deduction. For instance a 5:20 mile comes out 4:58.4e for 1500m, a 5:15 mile = 4:53.7e, a 5:00 mile is 4:39.7e and a world class mile of 4:40 is equivalent to 4:21.0e 1500m run.

Incidentally, you DO have world class girls in this event - notably Doris Brown whom we esteem most highly in Europe. We consider her one of the most stylish, determined and able women ever to compete over the distance.

I probably owe an explanation for the discus mark (US TRACK AND FIELD CLUBS RECORD CONTEST) Carol Moseke had that exceeded 178'0, (better than the American record).

Three of the past five years we have conducted a fall meet in Nebraska. This year's meet was held at John F. Kennedy College in Wahoo, Nebraska, the site of our Midwestern AAU Championships in the spring. The meet, which was held on Friday, September 7, is where Carol threw 178'0. In fact, she had seven throws that would have qualified her for the Olympics. We sent an affidavit of performance to Jim Lorimer, Nell Jackson, Marilyn West, Alex Ferenczy and Connie Ford which included the proper number of signatures, etc. We also enclosed a photo copy of the sanction and a newspaper article that appeared in the Omaha World-Herald telling about the meet and the results.

We did not have the American record blanks at the meet. I had worked up the certification of performance forms and the other documents; however, much to my dismay, I depended on someone else for the record forms.

Since the meet was held some five hundred miles from my home I was at a loss.

It was too bad because Carol had been throwing over 180 feet in practice which made us expect her to possibly match that mark at the meet.

EUROPEAN REPORT

The season is just getting under way in Europe, but already some fine performances have been recorded - also some interesting ones.

World record holder Leisel Westermann, West Germany, has one of the top marks with her discus toss of 201'1. Heidi Rosendahl scored 4995 points in the first pentathlon of the year using the new scoring table for the 100m hurdles and thus set a "world" record.

Interesting things are being done by several athletes. One is the Olympic Games 400m champion, Colette Besson from France. Colette has competed in the 100m (12.3), the 200m (24.9), the 400m (54.6), the 100m hurdles (16.5!) and the long jump (17'5); Irina Szewinska-Kirszenstein (Poland) has not only turned in an 11.7 100m time and a long jump mark of 21'3/4, but has run the 100m hurdles in 14.1. Even all-arounder Rosendahl is branching out with a discus mark of 127'5.

Italy's Paoli Pigni has been doing fantastic things in the 1500 and mile, and also ran a 16:17.4 5000 meters - and on the way to that new world mark, was clocked in 15:48.6 for a new mark in the 3 mile, 13:10.0 for the 4000 meters and 9:42.8 for the 3000 meters. Her time at two miles was just a shade behind Roberta Pico's world mark of 10:26.8 as the Italian lass clocked 10:28.6s.

31 year old Karin Balzer, East Germany, the 1964 Olympic 80m hurdle champion, has seemingly found a "fountain of youth". After finishing only fifth in the hurdles at Mexico and thought to be running her "swan song", Balzer has suddenly come to life all over again setting a new national record and a lifetime best for the 100 meters with a brilliant 11.4 clocking, plus running the new 100m hurdles in 13.4 and the 200m in 24.1s.

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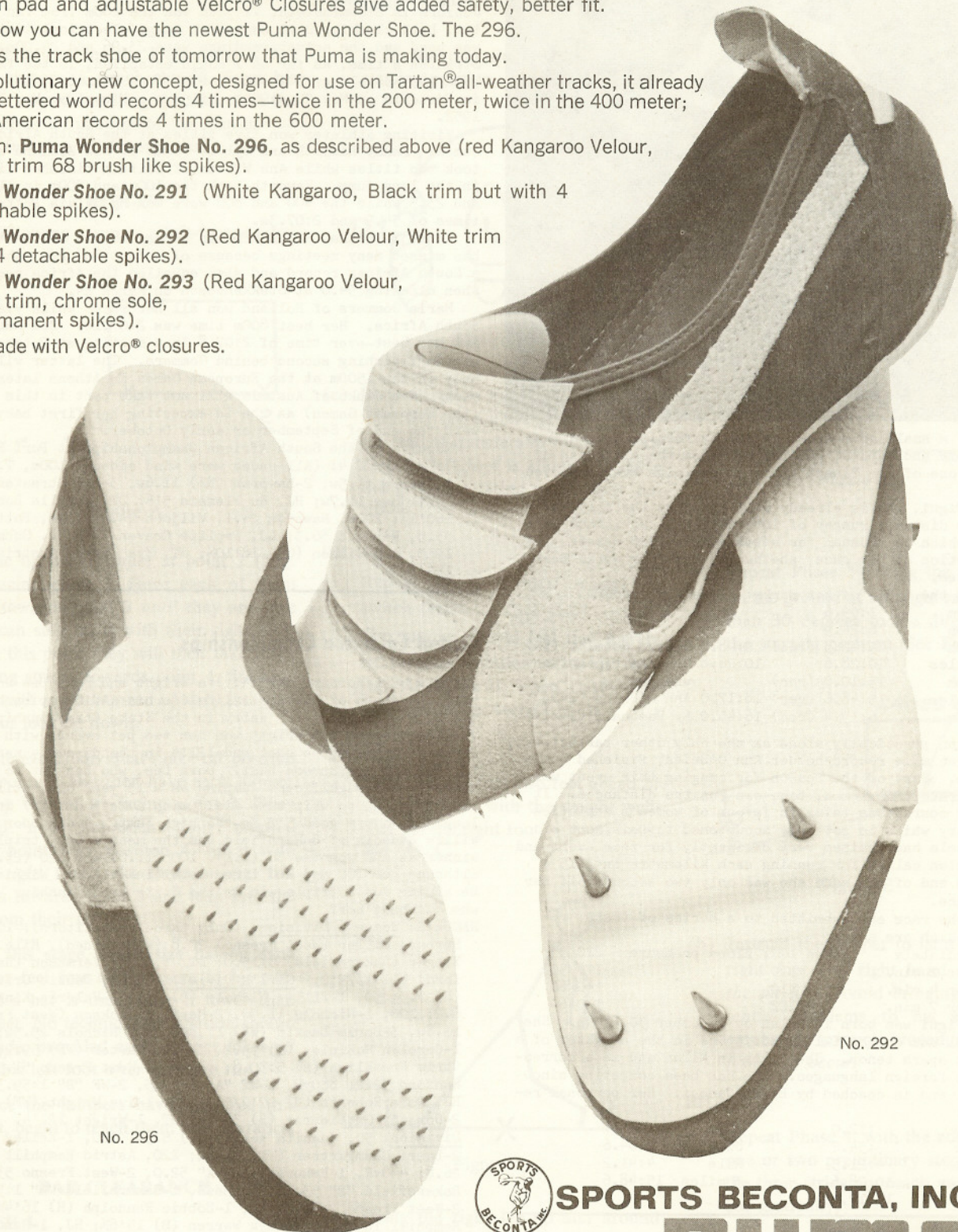
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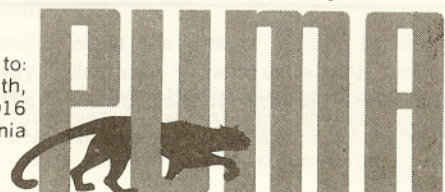
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PAOLA PIGNI - 5000m in 16:17.4 from Gianfranco Sozzani **REPORT ON SOUTH AFRICA from Gert Le Roux**



Formia, a small coast town on the Tyrrhenian Sea halfway between Rome and Naples, was the scene on the afternoon of May 11 of one of the finest athletic exploits ever achieved by a girl.

Paola Pigni, who is already well known as the only Italian middle distance runner of international rank, took on a distance which is unusual for a woman, the 5000 meters. At the completion of her race, she had beaten four world best performances.

Here is the table of her marks: (previous record)

Paola ran practically alone as the only other participant, former three mile record-holder Ann O'Brien, finished only in 17:30.4. Part of the reason for staging this event was to demonstrate that women, too, can run the distances. It was a very courageous thing in favour of women's athletics in a country which is not very accustomed to this sort of thing. Paola had trained very diligently for this event and her race plan called for running each kilometre in 3:15 - and at the end of the race she was only two seconds off her planned pace.

After the race she submitted to a series of tests, results of which are shown:

Paola Pigni was born in Milan on December 30, 1945. She is 5'8 tall and weighs 121 pounds. She is the daughter of a well-known opera tenor. She lives in Milan and is a correspondent in foreign languages. She has been competing since the age 15 and is coached by Bruno Cacchi. Her personal records are:

Along with hard work, the athlete must have some fun, but fun does not include unsupervised "horseplay"; it implies variety in practice schedules, an occasional movie, recognition and a pleasurable trip once in a while.

Two schoolgirls, Claudie van Straaten (14) and Susan Viljoen (16) were the stars of the South African track season. In a meeting at Krugersdorp, on a damp track, Van Straaten clocked 24.0 for 200m behind Penny Haworth of New Zealand (23.7). Viljoen was third in 24.1s.

Then a week later, running in the South African Games for Juniors in Bloemfontein, Viljoen won the 200m from Van Straaten, both clocking 24.0 seconds. Omega electrical timing was used and the actual readings were 23.96 and 24.00s. Van Straaten's time, as far as I could establish, is the fastest by a 14 year old girl in the world. Van Straaten was born in Pretoria on May 22, 1954. Viljoen was born on May 19, 1952.

Visiting athletes won five titles at the South African Games. Penny Haworth and Sylvia Potts of New Zealand each took two titles while Ann Wilson of Britain finished first in the long jump. Haworth took the 100m and 200m in 11.6 and 23.5 while the 400 and 800 were won by Sylvia Potts in times of 54.9 and 2:07.3s.

Annatjie Botha, South African record holder in the 400m, has missed many meetings because of a foot injury. She set a South African record and also equalled the Africa record when clocking 54.0 at Stekenbosch on March 24.

Maria Gommers of Holland won all her races while visiting South Africa. Her best 800m time was 2:07.1s. Bea Marais set her best-ever time of 2:07.8 in a meeting at Potchefstroom finishing second behind Gommers. The latter will run only in the 1500m at the European Games in Athens later this year. Eva Janko of Austria will not take part in this meet (the European Games) as she is expecting her first baby toward the end of September or early October.

Central California Championships

Dora Lee, who has yet to come close to her magnificent jumping as a 13 year old, still had enough talent to whip this field with a leap of 17'7 in the long jump and a good 5'3 in the high jump. Unorthodox Willie Nichols of Bakersfield was the meet's only triple winner as she won the 50 (6.1), 100 (11.0) and 220 (25.5) although her 100 and 220 times were wind-aided. Willie will be aiming for a triple win in the State championships - and who can beat her?

INTRODUCTION TO STRADDLE JUMPING

By John Dobroth

ROYAL CANADIAN LEGION'S "COACHING REVIEW"

When teaching the High Jump to beginners, a coach should direct his efforts toward instilling the idea that the take-off is a function of the run-up — not a function of the cross-bar.

RUN-UP

The following assumes a left-footed take-off:

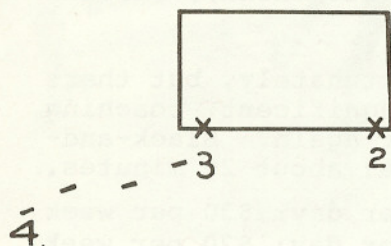

Line up each jumper at point 2 (Fig. A), facing point 3. Have each of them walk towards point 3 until they are sure they can step on it with their right foot. From this point they will then take three running strides towards point 4, finishing there with a pronounced upward jump — without looking down.

Note each individual's take-off position near point 4, and then have each jumper line up behind it, facing point 3. They should now approach their original check-point near position 4, hit it with their *right* foot, take three strong, full strides towards point 3 and leap into the pit from their *left* foot.

At this stage, emphasize having each jumper feel free and positive in his run-up. If a bar is used, have it lower than two feet. No technical designation should be made, provided each jumper takes-off from his left foot *after a strong run*.

Once the jumpers have mastered this aspect, begin to teach them bar clearance.

BAR CLEARANCE

PHASE 1

- Have the jumper stand with his feet 12 inches apart.
- He places his right foot around and to the left of the left foot, pointing

it in the opposite direction of his starting position. See Fig. B.

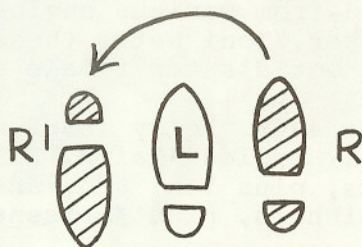

- Body-weight is kept on the left foot until the command "shift" — when the weight transfers to the right foot and the left foot is allowed to leave the ground rotating to an open position.

PHASE 2

- Repeat Phase 1 (c), except to switch feet.
- The jumper should feel that merely by creating rotation with his right leg, the left will "open" and naturally follow the correct path.

PHASE 3

- Place the left foot two feet ahead of the right foot, with the weight well-back on the right foot — arms back. See Fig. C.

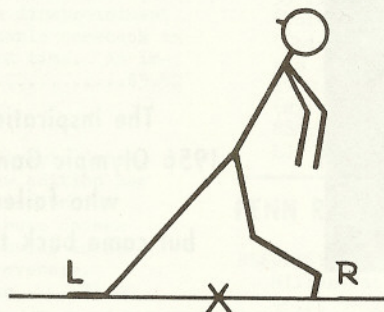

- Swing the right leg up and around the planted left foot, trying to land on the right foot at a point midway between the starting position of the feet — (i.e. at a point marked X in Fig. C).

(c) Eyes should be kept on the potential landing place of the right foot; the right arm should be swung quickly in front of and across the body.

(d) Allow the left leg to leave the ground as in Phase 2, following the path of the right foot. See Fig. D.

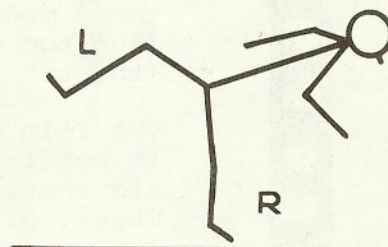

PHASE 4

- Repeat Phase 3 setting the crossbar on the ground at an angle rather less than 30 degrees to the direction of the starting position. See Fig. E.

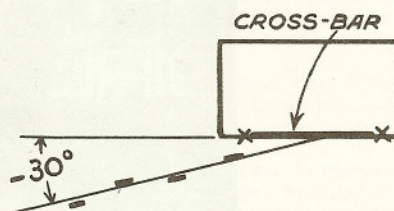

- Instruct the jumper to land with his right foot and right hand *touching the pit first*. Avoid bringing the potential problems to his attention; emphasize correct procedure *when problems occur*.

PHASE 5

Repeat Phase 4, with the addition of one or two preliminary steps before the three-stride approach, raising the bar gradually.

When the jumper is able to effect bar clearance without extraneous motion, he is then ready to combine it with the run-up. Usually this presents no difficulty.
