NATIONAL COLLEGIATE CHAMPIONSHIPS

Urbana, Illinois, May 29/30:-The Second Annual DGWS National Intercollegiate Track and Field Championships were a huge success. The upgrading of the meet over the first affair by adding the outstanding club athletes to compete and represent their colleges made this a first class affair. Performances were outstanding in nearly every event.

Fifty three institutions were represented by more than 200 athletes and the host University of Illinois ended up winning the team title with 39 points edging Alcorn College with 34.

Sensational hurdle marks were turned in as Pat Donnelly of Grossmont College won the 100m event in 13.5 (wind-aided) to whip Cheryl Rogers, Deanne Carlsen and Pat Hawkins. Hawkins came back to win the 200m hurdles in a new American record at 26.7 with Donnelly second in 26.9.

The sprints were won by newcomer Judy Murphy of Texas Women's College and Una Morris of Cal Poly (Pomona). Murphy nipped Hawkins and Kathryn J nes in the 100 in a wind-aided 10.4 to become one of the few non-club athletes to win an individual title. Morris sped the 220 in a wind-aided 23.9 with Murphy second.

Barbara Lawson, Colorado State, won the mile over Shelley Marshall, Gail Fitzgerald downed Gwen Norman in the quarter, Terry Hull outran Nancy Shafer in the half and Sherry Calvert whipped American record-holder Barbara Friedrich in the javelin for other outstanding performances.

It is universally accepted as fact that the one thing which keeps the USA on top in the world of men's track and field is the system of high school and college dual meets and championship meets. Woe be unto the rest of the world if the USA comes up with the same system in women's track. And that's just what they have done. The staging of the Second Annual Intercollegiate Championships in Urbana on June 29-30 was the first of a number of giant steps forward the USA is taking. This meet, hosted by AAU National Chairman Nell Jackson, was a first rate, top-notch, A, number One affair with good competition, good staging and fine marks. Fifty three colleges and universities took part.

Most of the colleges on the west coast compete in dual or "Invitational" meets during the spring. High schools are beginning to indulge in the sport all over the United States. Oregon, Montana, Texas, Iowa are a few who have official State Championships for their high school girls. This is just what the USA needs - a "farm" system which will continually feed the nation and provide top ranked athletes each year. It's the same thing that is true of the age group program - we need find only two or three outstanding performers each year out of the thousands who take part to raise our country to the top of world track.

We're on our way and the College women are now a big part of the program. Once again - Look out world. Here we come!

The May issue must have been the Jinx issue of all time. First of all, we waited an extra week to begin putting the magazine together since results were slow in coming in. Then once we got everything ready, the college strike came along and that shut down the college print shop where the shooting of the magazine takes place. Since we had waited five extra days, I waited two more to get weekend results in the issue. Then somewhere along the way between the college shop and the actual printing shop, a picture of the finish of the 100 at the Dogwood Relays was lost - and I could not be contacted by the printer - so another 24 hours went by the boards. After the magazine was printed, the bindery was late with their bit of required work - and so the May issue ended up about three weeks late. NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS NEWS

Small Gremlins invaded the typewriter when the entry blanks for the Nationals were being readied. The net result was the reversal of qualifying standards for the javelin and the discus in both the girl's and women's divisions. This is to officially notify all interested individuals that the qualifying standard for entering the discus in the girl's division is 105' (not 115') as listed. The qualifying standard for entering the women's discus is 125' (not 135') as listed. To avoid confusion and complaints, we will leave the qualifying standards in the javelin at 105' for the girls and 125' for the women.

The Commonwealth Games, which are held every four years, are being staged this summer in Scotland and we had hoped to entice the Australian and New Zealand girls to our meet. But unfortunately the two teams will be heading for Scotland via the Middle East instead of through the USA. The Canadian team, stronger this year under new National Coach Lionel Pugh, will be here to add an international flavor to the competition.

Nell Jackson, National AAU Chairman, has sent in an explanation of the awarding of appropriations to athletes relative to National Championships. She is constantly plagued by questions about this, so here is her (annual) explanation:

"The allotments are based on the bid made by the host (meet sponsor). The defending champions are alloted full expenses to defend their championship provided they are in condition to do so. Full expenses include transportation equal to tourist class (air), room and board. Other place finishers are allocated a percentage of their expenses based on their place. If there are funds left over, then those girls who have turned in outstanding performances during the season may receive some money to attend the championships.

All of the allocations are recommended by the National Chairman. A list and the amount is sent to the National office and the track and field administrator sends the money to the Association in which the girl is registered. They (the Association) determine whether or not a girl is in condition to defend her title or attend the National Championships. If the money is not used it should be returned to the AAU office to be reallocated to those girls who did quite well in the final but did not receive any money to attend the meet.

Often a problem arises because an outstanding athlete, who would not ordinarily receive an allotment, suddenly realized that she is getting something to attend the Nationals and she has not completed her entry form. This occurs more often for the indoor Nationals than for the outdoor meet."

There will be an exhibition 3000 meter run on Friday, July 3rd. The race will come between the relay trials. Entries may be made at UCLA and will be accepted up to the time the gun goes off.

SD LANCERETTES INVITATIONAL Sabol Sets Discus Mark

San Diego, California, May 9:-San Diego Lancerettes staged their first annual invitational on the grasstex track of Grossmont College, a beautiful setting for a college and a track. Good marks were the order of the day, but the short sprints, hurdles and long jumps were all marred by an aiding wind.

A 4.lmps wind negated the 13.0 flat 100m hurdles race of Chi Cheng as well as 10.9 100's by Juanita Kelly and Carol Burkland in the 12/13 Division and a 10.6 in the girl's division by Williamae Fergerson and Chi's 10.4 in the women's section.

Wind did not hamper the throwing arm of Terri Sabol, La Mirada Meteors, who tossed the discus 12^{4} '6 for a new 12/13 record. Young Terri will just miss being eligible to compete in the National Championships this year celebrating her 14^{4b} birthday on July 4^{4b} , the day of the women's finals. She will still be 13 on the day of women's qualifying, so misses the opportunity to throw in the top competition – but she will be watched as she takes part in the 12/13 Invitational to be staged on July 2 at UCLA.

Debbie Johnson had another good run in the 12/13 mile as she sped to lap times of 68, 2:28 and 3:51 on her way to a 5:11.7 clocking. Debbie Heald had her best ever 3000 meters with a 10:03.8 and came back an hour later to whip through a 5:07.5 mile.

Dora Lee Roberts, San Joaquin Valley AC, won the girl's long jump with a wind-aided 19'1½ over Rhonda Albers, San Leandro TC, who leaped 19'0½ and Vicki Betts, Lakewood Spartans, fresh from her wind-aided 20'3 jump at Mt. SAC, who could only get out 18'9 today.

The Los Angeles Track Club won the women's team title over Mickey's Missiles, 106-101 as the Angel City squad made up in quality for what it lacked in quantity by winning the 100, 220, 440, 880, hurdles. A total of 22 clubs took part.



CALIFORNIA RELAYS Brill 6'01/4; Chi 11.1w & 53.4

Modesto, California, May 23:-Three outstanding marks were the result of three women's events at the 29½ Annual California Relays. Warm California weather and a fast track contributed to the two fine performances on the track by Chi Cheng, but a strong California wind negated her 100 meter time of 11.1 as it whipped along at 4.45mps. Canada's Debbie Brill treated the USA crowd to its first feminine six foot jump as she was over the bar at 6'0%. And Chi returned to win the 440 over a strong field just one tenth off Charlette Cooke's American record with a sparkling 53.4s.

Neither Chi nor Brill had much competition. In the 100m sprint, Chi won by close to 10 yards over Kathy Smallwood while the closest anyone could come to the kangaroo-like Debbie Brill was her 14 year old sister, Connie, who was nearly a foot below her older sister - and still nearly seven inches

above any of the US jumpers.

The 440 looked to be, on paper, a tossup. Although Chi had beaten Kathy Hammond some four weeks earlier, Hammond was still the American champion and record holder at 400 meters. However, Kathy has been having muscle porblems and has not been able to train correctly and this affected the latter part of her race. In addition to Hammond and Chi, the field contained Gail Fitzgerald and Cheryl Toussaint from the Atoms of Brooklyn, Jarvis Scott, the sixth place finisher in this event in the 1968 Olympics, and Nancy Mullen (Millbrae) and young Kathy Leineke of Ventura. The pace was fast for the first 220 as both Scott and Hammond poured it on in an effort to take the sprint out of Chi Cheng, but Chi took over from Hammond at the 200 yard mark and whipped by Scott at the 210 post to win by nearly 25 yards. Both Hammond and Scott tired and were passed by the two Atoms with Fitzgerald just taking the measure of Toussaint in the final 10 yards.

All throws over 100 feet are supposed to be rounded off to the inch below, so Terri's throw officially is 124'6, but because I am such a statistician, I wanted everything that Terri threw recorded as such.

The next record or records were turned in by Debbie Johnson in the mile run. Due to the fact that the mile run became an official event in 1970 instead of 1969, Debbie Roth's 5:02.6 made last year is just a "best known" performance in the 12/13 Division. But since such is the case, the best time recorded this year will be the NR if processed and turned in to Glenn Shaw or Dr. Harmon Brown. Debbie Johnson, on May 16, ran 5:07.4 and then on May 23 ran 5:05.5 running the first lap in 68.0, the half mile in 2:27.4 (which is her lifetime best for the 880). If Debbie continues to improve and all goes well, and if she hasn't run under five minutes before July 2, then in all probability we'll see Debbie run under five minutes at UCLA.

The next record was made during the pentathlon competition at Glendale. I was again witness and helper at the record site. Jan Dill was trying for maximum points in the high jump and was jumping at metric heights for points. So when thr bar was close to the record of 5'4, the next metric height was 1.60 or 5'4% which she made fairly easily. After making the height and exhibiting great jubilation, Jan asked that the bar be raised to 5'5, regardless of what the metric thing was. She had two great attempts at the height and almost cleared it. Jan Dill is 5'9 and weighs 117 pounds. We'll see her at UCLA in the 12/13 Invitational also.

Anita Lee, age 12, not a NR holder in this age group but s great athlete, will be coming to UCLA also. Here is one athlete I have been looking forward to seeing for a long time. Anita holds various world age bests. She is primarily a

LETTER from LARRY BRIDGES, Michigan

"I just ant to let you know that your coverage of the Internationa Cross Country race was about as unfair a piece of reporting as I have ever read.

I can completely respect the anonymous author's opinion as I am sure he or she is very knowledgable. But I feel it is a very second-rate magazine that would publicly print a critique of this type. I would hope that you and your magazine are out to promote women's track and field, not tear it down. Surely you were not that hard up for reporting or possibly you were. This is the type of reporting that took the greatest miler in history off the track . . a la Jim Ryan!

I am not making excuses for the girls' performances but cross country was over November 1969 and the girls were ready then, but a lot happens with four months between. I am sure that each of us working with these girls recognize the problems that came up on March 21st without having an onlooker recapitulate what was seen on one miserable afternoon.

In summary I feel the real tragedy in this type of reporting is the poor taste and lack of professionalism which unfortunately seems to be very common in sports reporting and I must congratulate you for keeping right in the race for 'unsportsmanlike reporting' and to top it off, from an anonymous reporter.

I am the husband and coach of the "plodder" who has come from a 3:00 half-miler to an established distance runner who was plodding 70-80 miles a week in this cold, snowy Michigan weather the three months prior to the International Meet. A lot of work to merit criticism in reference to a physiological phenomenon not even understood completely by physiologists. (Oxygen debt.)"

Dear Larry: It's time the United States woke up to the fact that we are rated by the rest of the world on our performances in International competition. It doesn't matter what we do in our own National championships or any other domestic competition. Only our record in competition against the rest of the world makes any difference. That was the tragedy of last summer's international tour when we, with the best material, went to Europe and lost three straight dual meets. To the world, we were second rank. And the thing that irks those of us who are interested in improving the immage is that we are NOT second rate. We have the talent to be the best in the world - and then we louse it up in International competition when we should be at our very best - or we should not compete. We invented the phrase "Sock it to 'em" - now let's wake up and do it! SFVR
