

REEL TALK

You're right, of course, just as you knew you would be. Not a word has been received from either the National Chairman Pat Rico or the T&F Administrator Bob Lafferty in reply to the questions asked about the conduct of the National Indoor Championships in New York last February. We have, however, had more letters from coaches and athletes which have not only seconded the points we have raised through this column, but have added more fuel to the fire with such charges as individuals being allowed to compete in events AFTER withdrawing from previous events in strict violation of the rules, and more complaints about the seeding. Even the men's events get into the act with a claim that a certain walker was refused entry, but a representative of UC Irvine was permitted to enter late simply because Bill Toomey is the coach. Now is this really true?

Next month's issue will be a goodie, we hope. It will be released just prior to the Nationals at Bakersfield and will have everything you always wanted to know about everyone en-tered in the meet. The July issue will be on sale at Bakersfield and we hope you will enjoy it.

One of the ways in which foreign track and field has the advantage over us in the United States is the basic item of consistency. By that I mean the consistency of their program of events. When one reads a summary of a foreign competition there is no need to wonder what weight was the shot, what was the height of the hurdles, what was the spacing of the hurdles. The other nations, regardless of whether their meet is for "juniors" or an international match, are always set in their events. Not so in the USA. Take the report by High School Editor Rich Ede. Some states run a 50 yard dash, some a 60, some a 75. Some run 80 yard hurdles, some run 80 meter hurdles, some 110 yard hurdles, some 100 meter hurdles - and never is known the spacing or height of the hurdles. International rules say women should run the 100, 200, 400, 800, 1500, 100m hurdles, 400m hurdles, high jump, long jump, shot put (4-kilo), discus, javelin, pentathlon, 4x100 relay and 4x400 relay. That sounds like a pretty good program. Why don't we try it? Perhaps those in charge of setting up state or regional or local meets could write to WTFW and give their reasons for including strange and different events in their particular locality. I believe the major reason is the continued belief that women/girls are "different" and must be coddled, hence the 50's and 60's and changes in weight of impliments or spacings of hurdles or heights of hurdles. If there is another reason, let us know. Isn't it time we all got together and acknowledge that "track is track" and should be the same everywhere.

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LETTER FROM CASEY IDE, Long Beach

"The May issue is great, but I still say only MEN seem to find time to write letters to the editor. (There hasn't been a letter in the magazine from a female since the January issue.) Aren't any women interested in the issues at stake?

"My campaign would be to get coaches to learn how to spell the names of their athletes! If they sent in the entries with names correctly spelled, then the results would have them spelled right too, and barring typos, the magazines and newspapers wouldn't have such a lot of incorrectly spelled names! The girls care. Their mothers and fathers care. Apparently the coaches don't care!"

(It is true names reach us in a variety of spellings. The big problem arises when we receive results in which the same girl has placed in two or three events and her name is spelled differently each time. Or she is listed as competing for a different club in each event.)

FLASH - LA JOLLA INVITATIONAL

San Diego, California, May 27:-Outstanding marks were the standard as the La Jolla Track Club staged its invitational in famous Balboa Stadium. Renaye Bowen won both sprints, the 100 in 10.8 against a 2.8mph wind and the furlong in 23.8 into a 4.5mph breeze. Debbie Byfield was second in the short sprint with Canada's Patty Loverock third.

Janice Wiser, fresh from a tour of Japan, upset Mary Decker in the 440, scoring a lifetime best of 53.7 to 54.4 for Decker. This clocking moves the 17 year old into a tie for 10th on the All-Time USA list. Decker came back to win an easy victory in the 880 in 2:08.7 with New Zealand's Sue Haden second in 2:11.4 and Canada's Thelma Wright third just a half second later. Wright had previously scored her own win in the mile at 4:52.2.

Janice Lester won a close 400m hurdles race over Clydine Crowder, 61.3 to 61.8 and Jan Svendson had an excellent double in the shot and discus with marks of 50'34 and 152'5. In the javelin, Karin Smith threw to a lifetime best of 183'6. Complete results and details in next month's issue.

PRARIE VIEW NATIONAL COLLEGIATE CHAMPIONS

Denton, Texas, May 17/18:-The little baby has grown up. What began just in 1970 as a small idea at Urbana, Illionois, has finally emerged as a full-fledged track and field classic as the 1974 Women's National Collegiate T&F Championships were staged on the grounds of the defending champions from Texas Women's University. 84 colleges and universities took part and 41 of them scored. New meet records were set in six events plus in three new events staged for the first time, and only the well-known Texas wind negated marks in two other running events.

Prarie View A&M, with a well-rounded squad, won the team title with 84 points over distance-oriented UCLA who finished second with 68 points and the defending champions from TWU with 47 digits.

The two outstanding performers were Prarie View's Jamaican import Andrea Bruce and UCLA's Francie Larrieu. Both were triple winners. Bruce had the busiest two days with heats in the 100m hurdles and 400m hurdles, then semi-finals in the two hurdles races plus qualifying in the high jump and long jump. Andrea won the 100m hurdles, the two jumps and was second in the 400m hurdles with the same time as the winner. Larrieu wasn't exactly spending her days in front of the television, either, as she sped through heats in the 880, the mile and the 4x440 relay before adding the 880, mile, two mile and relay finals to her program. Larrieu's only defeat came in the relay where UCLA nabbed second place.

Bruce and teammate Mary Ayers gobbled up the first two spots in both hurdles events, but an 11.66mph aiding win kept Bruce from getting the new 100m record. The 400m hurdles saw the two Prarie View athletes clock 61.1, followed very closely by Cal State LA's Michelle Hooper in 61.2 and Oklahoma States' Marilyn Linsenmeyer in 61.9.

Rochelle Davis, TWU, successfully defended her 100y sprint crown, winning in a wind aided 10.4 (+9.25) over teammate Janet Brown who clocked 10.5.

Prarie View's Debra Sapenter had an outstanding 440 as she broke the tape in the season's best for the USA in 53.4s. In the 880, Larrieu won over Wendy (Koenig) Knudson of Colorado State, who is making her return to the track after suffering a muscle pull some weeks ago. Knudson and UCLA's Julie Brown were both clocked in 2:11.9, 1.4 seconds behind Larrieu. The three UCLA distance aces, Larrieu, Brown and Claire Choate, scored 60 points in the three distance runs. TWU scored a mild upset when they downed Prarie View in the 440y relay.

On the field, it was again Andrea Bruce in the two jumps as she won the high jump over Karen Moller with a leap of six feet and took the long jump over Vicki Betts at 19'5%. The wind in the long jump measured between a minimum of 6.75 to a maximum of 21mph! On Bruce's winning jump, she was assisted by a 9.25mph wind.

One good side-effect of the women's track program in the USA can be noted in the list of college coaches for now we are beginning to find former athletes taking over in the coaching side. Among these are Deanne Carlsen at Cal State Chico, Linda MacArthur at Eastern Washington State, Virginia Husted at Seattle Pacific, Jean Roberts (Australia and Delaware SC) at Temple, Marian Washington at the University of Kansas, Sherry Calvert at USC and Terry Crawford at the University of Tennessee.

Also re-discovered the whereabouts of some former outstanding athletes who have been missing from the result sheets to date such as Diane Kummer at the University of Illinois; Jane Oas, Unibersity of Minnesota; Robin Evane, Iowa State; Eileen Claugus, UC Davis; Terry Wheeler, Flathead Valley; Leslie ' Clark, UC Davis, Lucie Vaamonde, TWU; Dalal Ahmad at USC; and Marilyn Neufville, UC Berkeley, who sped only a leg on the mile relay.





AMERICAN RECORDS TO HUNTLEY AND SEIDLER

Modesto, California, May 24:-Maren Seidler did it again here today. For the second time this season, she improved on the America record for the 4k shot with a toss of 56'11/2 to drae the Americans into close proximity, at least, with the Europeans. One other American record was bettered, but will not be approved because of excessive wind. Martha Watson hopped 21'9%, better than her own AR of 21'7/2. Joni Huntley representing the Oregon Track Club, equalled her new American record of 6'0 while winning the high jump over Canada's Debbie Brill. Renaye Bowen received tough competition from Debbie Byfield, Berkeley TC, in the LOO, with both runners timed in a windy 10.5s. The "Big Three" of the middle distances, Francie Larrieu, Kathy Weston and Mary Decker, kept a safe distance from each other as they won the mile, 440 and 880 respectively. Best mark was by Larrieu who came close to the AR in the mile as she stopped the watches in a fine 4:38.2, just 0.3 off the record.

'ADVENTURES DOWN UNDER' by Casey Ide

Anyone whose memory of women's track and field goes back ten years is considered an "old-timer". Few of the girls and women interested in the sport today - especially in the age group program - remember any women on our US Olympic team in Rome in 1960. A few recall the name of Wilma Rudolph if you bring it up, but not that she won three gold medals there. A few more know that Wyomia Tyus won gold in Tokyo in 1964, but do they remember Edith McGuire who won the 200m? Or that before she married Bill Toomey, Mary Rand won gold, silver and bronze in Tokyo, (for England), in the long jump, pentathlon and relay, setting a world record in the long jump? I saw those two Olympics on TV, and of course we were shown only such women's events as the sprints which the US won, so I had o study the books to learn much more about our teams there. Most people today know who Martha Watson is, but do they know she has represented us in Three Olympics - so far!

"Nostalgia" seems to be very big right now, and if we want to go further back on memory lane we would come to the real pioneers of women's track in this country when the sport had even less of a following than it has today. Any popularity it now enjoys is a big step forward. Not too many of our present coaches have been involved with girl's track more than a few years, and this magazine came into being about seven years ago about the same time I got really involved as a spectator. The first international meet I attended was called "International Games" at the Coliseum in Los Angeles in the summer of 1966. It was planned as a meet with the Soviet Union, but when they pulled out, some of the British Commonwealth athletes agreed to stop over here on their way to their Games in Jamaica. That was the first time I saw Mary Rand compete - she won the long jump. It was also the first time I saw two of New Zealand's best-known women athletes, Marise (Chamberlain) Stephens and Valerie (Sloper) Young). Marise, a bronze medallist in the 800 at the Tokyo Olympics, ran second to Charlette Cooke in Los Angeles. In 1967 the Commonwealth sent another international team to the Coliseum to compete with our team before the Pan-American Games in Winnipeg. This time Marise ran the 400 and took second behind the late, great Lilian Board of England. I met Val Young last summer when she competed at the Pacific Conference Games in Canada, where she was making a come-back after retirement and three children, and then saw

her this past winter when she took second in the Commonwealth Games in New Zealand.

When I was in the 7th grade, I had a "pen-pal" in New Zealand and have always dreamed of going there, so when the opportunity came along to go with the US Masters Track Team last winter to Fiji, Australia and New Zealand, I jumped at the chance. I wrote to Christchurch and got press credentials for the Commonwealth Games so I could meet the athletes, but first we went to Fiji where we had an impromptu track meet with the younger "masters" and some of their sons and daughters who were along for the trip, competing against the Fijian team that was preparing for the Games. I got acquainted with most of the women on their team, and later when Ed Fox (of Track & Field News) and I walked into the postoffice at the athlete's village in Christchurch, and I was greeted by several Fijian girls with "Mbula, Casey!", Ed was rather startled. (It means "hello".)

Next we went on to Australia where our Masters competed in meets with the "Veterans" in Sydney and Melbourne, and we were all invited to homes for Christmas dinner! In Rotorua, I had a chance to talk to Pam Kenny who represented NZ in the high jump at the Pacific Conference Games and Satellite Meets in Canada last summer. She has now retired. We went to crosscountry runs in every city, and I talked to all the women and girls I could meet, about their school and club track programs. I found that they have girls track in all the secondary schools in Fiji, and a Peace Corps teacher there has promised to send me some results. If he comes through, I'll see that Rich Ede gets them for his high school section! In Australia, they have an age-group program called "Little Athletics" and in New Zealand the boys and girls have both school and club meets for all ages.

After the Masters left for home, I was on my own and took in the NZ Veteran's Championshops where Peter Snell, Bill Baillie and other former track greats were competing. And among the officials was Marise Chamberlain Stephens! My hostess introduced us, and we talked both days, and then later at the athlete's village in a more relaxed atmosphere. She told me that they used to consider the old Coliseum track a paradise for running, because in her day they had only grass tracks in New Zealand, and their workouts were often run through tall grass and weeds.

And then she introduced me to Maeve Kyle! Those of you who have been reading WTFW for several years will recall that Maeve has been mentioned in these pages from time to time - in fact, I wrote about my delight in seeing her run the 400m at the Commonwealth Games in Edinburgh where she made the final and ran in that race where Marilyn Neufville ran the world's first 51.0. I think our youngsters should hear about Maeve - she is a legend in her own time. Is there any other woman who has been running competitively (and without once retiring maternity leave doesn't count) for more than 20 years? And Maeve is still running like a deer! She won, with the greatest of ease, the women's exhibition 400 at the Veterans Championships. While I am a friend and admirer of Mary Peters, and am delighted that Belfast is naming their new track for her, I feel that in some ways Mrs. Kyle has made an even greater contribution to women's track, and that if her career could be more widely publicized, she might be an inspiration to a lot of runners who think that 20 is "over the hill". Maeve has a daughter that age. She also has an Irish wit. When I momentarily forgot the race in Edinburgh, and asked Maeve one day at the village if she knew Marilyn Neufville, who was with me, she replied, "I have a long acquaintance with the soles of her feet and her rear view".

If you read the full story of the Commonwealth Games in the March issue of WTFW, did you recognize the name of the gold medal winner in the 100m hurdles? Of course her former teammates in the Ozark TC, when she was Judy Toeneboehn, must have felt a glow of pride in Judy Vernon's accomplishment. Her Ozark coach, Bob Hyten, had introduced me to Judy during the Munich Olympics, and asked me to look her up in Christchurch. He had also told Judy I would be there and she was expecting to hear from me. But what a time we had getting together! Before I learned that reporters - even women reporters - were strictly taboo in the women's quarters, I had sent Judy a message to meet me in the women's lounge one morning. Judy went to the lounge, but where was I? My "News Media" pass got me into the village all right, but at the gate to the women's section, alas, I was told I could go no farther and that they could not send her a message. I went back to the main gate where a more helpful lady made several phone calls and finally found a female VIP who went to the lounge, got Judy, and brought her to me. Then we walked



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

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clear around the village to a back gate where I sat under a tree while Judy went back to her quarters and got me one of her team pins. Needless to say I was one of those leading the cheering when Judy got her gold medal! Later we found that Press people could go to the second

floor of the recreation building, which also housed the athlete's cafeteria. I would send messages to "meet me by the coffee urn in the TV room", and I managed to talk to some of the girls from England, Canada, Ghana, Kenya, Nigeria and others up there. I had met most of the girls from Australia and New Zealand at the Pacific Conference Games in Canada last summer and they brought others over to meet me. Because the reporters kept referring to Modupe Oshikoya, (now a student at Chicago State U), as a "newcomer", she was quite surrpised when I told her I have been watching her since 1970 when I saw her compete in the Commonwealth Games pentathlon at Edinburgh. In 1971 she took second in the long jump in our meet with Africa in Durham, NC, and in 1972 was in both the pentathlon and long jump at Munich. And in 1973 when out international team competed in Africa, Modupe took third in the hurdles, so I assured her that her gold, silver and bronze in the Games long jump, pentathlon and hurdles came as no great surprise to me. Alice Annum was another who express-ed surprise that I remembered her shivering with cold on the victory stand in Edinburgh and that I have been following her career ever since.

Oh, I tried to be legal in contacting the girls at the village. I made dozens of phone calls to chaperones, but they were almost never in their quarters. I actually did contact some of the girls through their team managers or coaches. I even asked permission from the Australian chaperone to invite Raelene Boyle and Charlene Rendina to dinner. One day, I was sitting chatting with Chee Swee Lee of Singapore, when her coach came bearing down upon us with his big eyes eyeing my press badge with a mean gleam. She hastily told him that I knew Vince Reel, and all was well. But somehow, I just couldn't see going through channels to contact good friend Marilyn Neufville. She suggested that we might

meet in the post office and pretend to be buying stamps! My usual rendezvous with Marilyn and Raelene was outside the back door of the athletes' dining room. I went out to have lunch with the two of them the day after the Games ended and Marilyn finally remembered to bring me a Jamaican pin. Alice Annum gave me one from Ghana, Mary Peters one from Northern Ireland, Modupe one from Nigeria - so all together, I ended up with quite a collection.

New Zealand is a very friendly country. Due to air line ancellations, I was "forced" to stay over four days after the Games, and was invited to a number of homes. The trip I had anticipated for more than fifty years was no disappointment.

The next Commonwealth Games (in 1978) will be in Edmonton, Alberta, Canada. I can hardly wait!

BRAZIL SOUTH AMERICAN CHAMP

Santiago, Chile, April 16/21:-Brazil easily won the XII Annual South American Championships at Santiago's National Stadium scoring 149 points to runner-up Chile's 88, but it was Peru's Edith Noeding who was the individual star as the athletes set new South American records in the 1500, 100m hurdles, high jump and pentathlon - two of them by Noeding.

The Peruvian athlete, who gained valuable experience in the 1972 Olympics at Munich, won the hurdles in 13.9, scored 4170 to win the pentathlon, placed second in the high jump at 5'7, and third in the long jump with a hop of 19'4%.

Brazil won only three individual events, (100, long jump and high jump), plus the two relays, but picked up many second and third places for their team victory. The new SA high jump mark was set by Brazil's Maria Domingos with 5'8%, just a fraction above Aida dos Santos old mark. The 1500 record was set by Carmen Oye of Chile at 4:32.1.



Walnut, California, May 11/12:-The Southern California Cheetahs staged their annual Invitational on the speedy Mt. San Antonio College track, (which will have a Tartan surface for 1975), in a meeting which produced some outstanding performances and some savage individual duels.

Major interest was centered on the appearance of New Zealand's Sue Haden in the 880. The 28 year old silver medalist at the recent Commonwealth Games showed up for her first USA guest competition full of holes from the physicians needle, a head cold and various other bothersome items, but in need of running, she took part while feeling below par. This combination brought about the best race of the meet as Haden met the determined Debbie Heald plus New Mexico's fast improving Cindy Ashby and the National Girl's 400m hurdles champion, Clydine Crowder. The four went out very slowly with Haden leading at the 220 mark in 33.1 and at that point Heald decided she wanted none of that kind of pace and zoomed past the field into the lead. By 440 time, however, Haden was back in the lead at 66.5 with the other three tightly bunched. The foursome passed the 660 pole in 1:40 and Heald made another sudden move to spurt into the lead around the last turn. A surprised Haden closed the gap as the two hit the straight, and with both runners occupying the inside lane, battled down the stretch, neither giving ground and Heald hung on to win by a half stride. Winning time was announced as 2:11.4 with Haden at 2:11.7, but everyone (except the second place timer) agrees both runners should be given the same clocking. Haden came back later in the program to try her luck at the 440 and wound up fourth in 57.4

Renaye Bowen once again looked exceedingly strong in the sprints as she duplicated her season bests at 10.5 and a windaided 220 in 23.6. Bowen completely dominated the races as Rosetta Birt, second in the two dashes, was clocked in 11.1 and 24.7. And that's not very close!

Two new faces in the 400m hurdles field were unveiled and a one-year veteran in the event turned in a lifetime best. The Long Beach Comet's Janice Lester moved into the Number 5 spot on the All-Time USA List with a 61.4 triumph in the women's division. Teammate Patty Cape, heretofore known only as an 880 runner, zipped to a 64.6 clocking in her first attempt at the event and Carol Burkland of the La Mirada Meteors won the Girl's Division in her first attempt at a smooth 64.4.

Julie Brown, the LATC's half mile ace via Montana and UCLA, moved onto the All-Time US List in the mile as her 4:48.7 was good enough for the Number 10 spot. Teammate Monette Driscoll spun the discus 165'8 for a five inch personal improvement to solidify her Number 5 position on the All-Time List. Sue Brodock had anoth speedy mile walk in 7:24.3 and the LATC two mile relay team of Kleinsasser-Choate-Johnson-Brown had the nation's best clocking to date at 9:29.2. DeAnne Wilson, the defending National high jump champion, upped her 1974 best to 5'8 in defeating the National Girl's Champion, Cindy Gilbert.

South Africa, April 19/May 1:-The Republic of South Africa staged four invitational track meets throughout the country with representatives of most of the major powers in track and field in attendance, but when it was all over, 19 year old Claudie Van Straaten of the host country had emerged as the outstanding performer. Claudie took part in and won seven events during the 13 day period including bettering the South African and African record in the 400m three times, finally running 51.17 (52.2) in Pretoria on April 27. Van Straaten's list of wins: 4/19, 400m in 52.5 (National record and African record); 4/20, 200m in 23.5; 4/23, 200m in 23.6; 4/26, 200m in 23.4; 4/27, 400m in 51.17 (National and African record); 5/1, 200m in 23.2 and 400m in 52.3. Other good marks during the tiur were turned in by Sybil Van Zyl of South Africa with a National record of 4:13.1 for 1500 meters, a 2:03.9 800 by new bride Gisella (Ellenberger) Klein of West Germany, and a good duel between Austria's Eva Janko (199'8) and GFR's Anna Koloska (190'7) in the javelin. Canada's Diane Jones was a frequent winner in the shot, high jump events.

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BAKERSFIELD CLASSIC

Bakersfield, California, May 18:-In spite of what the home town papers conceded to be the "worst track weather ever in the history of this city", some outstanding performances were turned in at the Third Annual Bakersfield Track Classic. The weather was extremely cold, the wind was blowing, the meet was stopped for a while, but eventually continued and fine marks were turned in by Renaye Bowen, Debbie Heald, Mary Decker and Kathy Weston. Plus Cindy Gilbert in the field.

New Zealand's Sue Haden and China's Lee Chiu-Hsia were expected to provide the competition for Decker in her first run since her tonsil operation, but Haden was under the weather and Lee was competing in Manila and what looked like a breeze for the precocious youngster from Huntington Beach turned out to be a ding-dong battle with fast improving Kathy Weston. Decker led at the quarter post, but down the back straight Weston turned on the power and whisked past. Weston, who fears neither man nor beast, held the lead around the final turn and into the home stretch and with 130 yards to go the Blue Angel zoomed to the front for a three yard lead but couldn't increase it as Weston held on to clock 2:04.9 in only her fifth-ever half while Decker won at 2:04.6. Weston's time moves her into sixth place on the All-Time USA List and at no time during the race did she believe she was going to lose.

Bowen, bothered by a lack of competition, did it again, winning the 100 in a life-time best of 10.4 with a legal 1.1 mph wind. This moves Bowen into a tie for sixth on the All-Time USA list. Renaye came back to easily win the 220 by a full second over Canada's Joanne McTaggart in 23.8.

Debbie Heald, getting stronger with each race, won the 1500 under very difficult weather conditions in her life-time best of 4:22.7 which moves her to the #7 spot on the All-Time USA List. Heald took the lead at the end of the second lap and gradually increased her margin to the tape. Teri Anderson, San Jose Cindergals, was second in her best-ever 4:25.9, a mark which is only two-tenths of a second off the US List. Young Becky Wolfinbarger was third in a good 4:32.2.

Cindy Gilbert won the high jump over a comebacking Debbie Brill and was over 5'10 once again. Gilbert, who lost to Deanne Wilson 5'8 to 5'4 last week, turned the tables on her opponent tonight, 5'10 to 5'4. Such is the consistency of high jumpers.

HIGH SCHOOL TRACK RICHARD EDE, Editor

As results started coming in for this issue, I was at a loss as to which story to use as a lead. When the Oregon results arrived, there was no longer any doubt which story overshadowed even the outstanding results in the rest of the country. Joni Huntley of Sheridan high jumped 6'0 to obscure even her own 38 point performance in the meet. Huntley's longawaited outdoor six footer came in the Class AA Championships at Springfield on May 18 and capped a tremendous series of marks by the AA girls, (schools of 200-600 three-year enrollment). Her six foot jump broke Eleanor Montgomery's American record set in 1969. Huntley opened her jumping at 5'0 and didn't miss until her first attempt at 6'0. After the record jump, competition was delayed more than 10 minutes until a steel tape could be located to measure the jump. (Ed. note:-This fact may prevent Huntley's mark from being accepted as the rules require the height to be measured with steel tape BEFORE and AFTER the successful attempt at a record). By that time, Huntley had lost her edge and failed at 6'1%. Failure at the higher height did not dim the luster of Huntley's day, however, as the Sheridan athlete won the 110y hurdles in a record 14.6, the 100 in 11.25 (electronic timing?) and placed second in the long jump at 18'34. Only Vicky Paget's windy 18'4 leap kept Huntley from a sweep and a "team" title as Sheridan's 38 points tied Madras' total for the co-championship and apparently no tie-breaker rule was used. Joy Moore of Bandon had the misfortune to score her three wins in the same meet as Huntley's, but her marks were impressive and would have highlighted many other meets. Moore won the shot (8#) at 39'5, the discus at 116'2 and the javelin at 136'2. The other multiple winner in the meet was Teress Zimmerlee (Eagle Point) who annexed the two longer races in 2:18.5/5:26.9. Desirce Gauthier's (Madras) excellent 15.0 second place in the 110y hurdles almost gets lost in the crowd!

In the AAA Division, Kelly Jones (<u>Hillsboro</u>) collected a triple winning the 100/440 in 11.5/58.5 and teaming with Colleen Mack, Pam Tangen and Kathy Shattock to anchor the winning 880 medley in 1:53.6. Dala Ramsey (Cottage Grove) won the half in 2:20.5 and took second in the mile 5:23.6 to Debbi Brundige (Roseburg) with 5:18.8. Debbie McDonald (Lebanon) sped to a 25.85(?) win in the 220, and anchored her team's winning 440 relay in 50.8. The greatest depth of the meet showed in the hurdles and weights. In the hurdles, Linda Parmele (Estacada) edged Neala Ford (<u>Newberg</u>) with both girls clocking 15.0. Third place Donna Collins (<u>South Salem</u>) had no time recorded and fourth placer DeeDee Miller (Lakeridge) clocked 15.3. The shot found four girls over 39'10 as winner Karen Marshall (South Eugene) threw 44'0, Betty Ledgerwood (Silverton) 42'10, Marcia Mecklenburg (Estacada) 41'4 and Cheri Viltz (The Dalles) 39'10%. Ledgerwood and Mecklenberg went 1-2 in the discus (130'0/123'5). In the javelin, Monica Stoltenburg (Beaverton) took the title with a heave of 139'11 followed by Charity Wood (Ashland) 130'0, Shauna Baxter of Churchill 129'1, Joanne Kaup (Centennial) 126'9, Judy Schoepp (Cleveland) 126'3 and Sue Schlerling (Dalles) 124'10.

Class A girls posted some outstanding marks also. Gail Wigle (Riddle) took the 220 in 26.1. Kit Sundling (<u>Concordia</u> <u>Lutheran</u>) set a record in the 880 at 2:21.8. State marks fell in the throws also. Margaret Bonn (<u>Riddle</u>) claimed the shot mark at 40'3, Mary Abb Stevenson (<u>Lost River</u>) took the discus at 119'3, and Vicki Emmons (<u>Wallowa</u>)claimed the javelin at 136'10.

The State of Texas demonstrates what happens when quality competition comes together with a strong school program as the State Championship meet provided a series of marks for the rest of the country to shoot at, not merely the winners but quality in depth. West Columbia's relay team of Sharion Higgins, Marlo Diggs, Earlene Williams and Willena Williams set the stage as they blasted 47.1 and 1:39.9 for the 440 and 880 yard relays. They had to be fast, as 6th place was 49.2 in the shorter relay and 1:42.0 by <u>Conroe</u> in the longer event. In individual events, Marsha Talley (<u>Forney</u>) won the Class A 220 in 24.4 with Peggy Louwein (Sanderson) just a tenth back, An-gela Fleming (Jacksboro) 24.8 and Christa Womack (Waco Connally) at 24.9. (Wind was +4.0mph). That State record stood alone very briefly as Gwen Smith (Conroe) won the Class AA race in the same 24.4 (no wind info). Donna Cother (Corpus Christi Flour Bluff), Diana Bowser (Pearland) and Becky Mc-Clenny (<u>Richardson Lake Highlands</u>) following with the same times as the Class A "travelers". Cother was the only one of the four to place in the AA 100, winning it in 11.4. The A 100 was won by Karen Arp (Ropesville) who repeated her 1973 double by annexing the 60 also (11.3 against a 7.1 mph wind).

Moving up a couple of paces, Essie Kelly (Spur) ran the 5th fastest 440 in the US to date as she took the A quarter in 55.0, 1.1 seconds faster than the AA winner and the meets high pointer, Linda Cornelius (Fort Worth Paschal). Cornelius also won the high jump at 5'4% and placed second in the long jump with 18'8. Probably the most thoroughly broken state record was the triple jump where Retha Swindell (Center) broke her own record on all five legal jumps with a best of 39'2%. Louise Ritter (Red Oak) came off her second place A triple to high jump 5'8%. Carol Sheffield (<u>New Braunfels</u>) led all 880 runners with her 2:14.5. Laura Davis (Spring Branch Memorial) clocked 2:15.6 with Esther Franco (Flour Bluff) at 2:16.6 and Susan Folk (Everman) at 2:19.1 and Judy Partain (Spring Klein) 2:20.2 rounding out the top five. Pam Beacham of <u>Mexia</u> Led a fine long jump field with her 18'10% Leap fol-lowed by Cornelius (18'8), Pam Burkhalter (<u>North Mesquite</u>) 18'7%, Robena Johnson (Canyon) 18'4%, Magda Villareal (<u>Edin</u>burg) 18'1% and Mable Woodson (Orange Stark) 18'0. In Class A, Kathy Jones (Baird) won with a leap of 18'1. The AA mile relay was quite a race. The winning team from Dallas Lincoln (Angela Dudley, Dorothy Johnson, LeEsther Giddings and Bever-ly Day), sped 3:57.1, followed by <u>Clear Creek</u> (Carrie Arolfo, Marcie Donovan, Judy Landiault, Sue Davis) in 3:59.0, Irving 3:59.0 and Conroe 4:01.9. Canyon (4:08.0) and Brownsville (4:08.1) ran excellent times and finished far up the track!

In the A mile relay, Waco Robinson (Vicki Keinz, Debbie Bradley, Ida Evans, Virginia Lewis) ran a 4:02.4 ahead of La-Feria (Dominguez, Rios, Dominguez, Cherrington) 4:03.2, Powderly North Lamar 4:03.7, Pflugerville 4:06.9 and Panhandle 4:07.1, Sundown (Dorothy Phillips, Lucy Jones, Marva Parker, Alma King) ran an almost solo Class B win in 4:03.3. King and Parker also went 1-2 in the 440 (57.2/58.5) and Princess Lindsay won the 880 in 2:20.9. Other excellent marks: 100, Toni Burks (El Paso Eastwood) 11.4, Linda Jackson (Houston King) 11.5, Pauline Davis (Manor) 11.5, Marsha Talley (Forney) 11.5; 220, Margaret Brous (Ft. The Illinois State meet highlighted a number of outstanding performances, mostly by underclassmen. Junior Lisa Hamity of Oak Park, seeded into the slower flight of the race on the basis of a poor qualifying time, soloed a 5:04.5 mile, far surpassing the winning performance in the "fast" flight by soph-omore Melody Miller (Maine East) who ran 5:13.8 to beat Libertyville's Pam Kroening (5:16.8), edging Robin Smith (Lincoln-Way) in 2:15.0. Another junior, Trudi Rebsamen of Prospect, a veteran of AAU running, led a fine 440_field in 56.5 ahead of Elizabeth Boesen (Maine South) 58.9. Rebsamen also won the 220 in 25.3 to beat Calumet's Gwendolyn Bush. Last year's triple winner, and still a junior, Kim Schofield (Springfield Southeast) cost herself a possible repeat triple and perhaps her team the meet when she fouled out of the 50, (won by Deborah Mosesnof of Harrison in 6.2). Schofield did win the 100 and long jump (11.1/18'7/2) as Moses also copped the 80yH in a meet record of 10.8. In the 110y hurdles, Debbie Kilhoffer,a freshman from Illiopolis, blasted 15.2 to top Georgette Maines (Centralia) in 15.3. Pat Johnson (a familiar hurdle name!) ran 15.3 in a heat. Pat is from Elgin Larkin. Kilhoffer teamed with sister Jeannie, Jani Blakeman and Barb Ballinger to take the 440y relay in a record 50.1. The with Susie Blakeman replacing Ballinger, <u>Illiapolis</u> took the 880y relay in another meet record 1:46.1. <u>Halfmiler</u> Olson high jumped 5'5 to set still another record. In the shot, Sheila Yurkshat, a MDYF product, from Reavis broke her own record with a 41'51/2 heave but that was only good for second behind Mary Ann Johnson of Conant who recorded 42'11½. Maine South's mile relay team of Nancy Swidler, Diane Havlir, Marilyn Pluta and Elizabeth Bossen took that event easily in 4:07.2.

From New Mexico, Paul Frederick of Texico reports on the second New Mexico Track Meet held at Portales, May 10/11. "The weather was good for Eastern New Mexico and West Texas where days with wind velocity of 5mph or less are almost unknown during the track season. There were variable winds of about 8 to 15mph each day and no anemometer was used, (which classifies everything as 'wind-aided'), but they were not either head winds or tail winds, but were diagonal to the straightaway and long jump runway - some of the time almost at right angles. The track was Eastern New Mexico's new all-weather track and was in good shape. Some field event finals and all preliminaries were run Friday afternoon in 85-90 degree weather, and all running finals, plus the shot and long jump, were held Saturday morning in 70-80 degrees weather. The winning marks are now the State records in every event except the softball throw. Fifteen of the other records were broken, in many cases by all five placewinners - except the 80y hurdles where last year's mark was equalled. The only double winner was a very small ninth grader, Lynette Gutierrez of Magdelena who won the 220 and 440 (25.9/62.5) and was selected as the outstanding athlete and won high point honors. She was very popular with the crowd."

Other winners and marks: 50, Connie Kuper (Amistad) 6.0; 100, Delores Hudson (Artesia) 11.1; 880 Kathy Governale (Bel-en) 2:28.9; Mile, Ellen Hart (Albuquerque Academy) 5:32.5;50y H, Tarry (San Jon) 7.2; 80yH, Liz Dyer (Tatum) 11.4; 440yR, Artesia 51.0; 880yR, Tatum 1:51.4 (Portales 1:49.7h); 880yMed Relay, Tatum 1:57.0 (1:56.1h); HJ, Janet Marsh (Los Alamos), Libby Wood (Los Alamos) and Susan Spohr (West Mesa) all 5'0; SP, Alma Flowers (Silver City) 39'1; LJ, Sharon Scott (Reserve) 17'1; SBT, Dorothy Sisneros (Espanola) 189'5; DT, Mildred Morris (Capitan) 118'2. Portales won the team title with 45 points over Tatum with 40 and West Mesa of Albuquerque at 39. Three of the top four teams, including the winner, were larger schools competing for the first time and had only two winners among them, but scored with greater depth. Portales scored in 13 of the 16 events. Present plans arelto divide the schools into two divisions next year. I might add that last year's winners Nora Carter and Sharon Lindley were present. Carter unable to compete because of a leg injury and Lindley running second in the twi sprints in 11.2 and 26.0 after suffering calf-cramps in the preliminaries.

Results of the Northern Virginia Regional Championships, May 10/11, at Woodson HS, Fairfax, show Woodson repeating as Regional champion for the fourth time, scoring 35 points to 32 for Groveton and 30 for Jefferson. Jackie Gordon, defending State champion in the shot and discus, set a meet record winning the shot at 41'8 and a State record in the discus at 142'8 plus picking up a second in the high jump (4'11) and a 4th in the hurdles (11.0) to score 18 points. Carol Butler of Groveton set meet records in the 80yH (10.6s), 100 (11.3s) and 220 (26.0s), but had to settle for 3rd-2nd-3rd (10.9/11.5/26.5) in the finals. Other meet records fell in the long jump at 17'6% by Linda Miller of Jefferson; 440, Sherry James (Groveton) 58.3; 440yR, Jefferson (Patty Delewski, Sandy Reed, Tracy Schneeweis, Linda Miller) 51.6; 880yR, Woodson (Bonnie Wiseman, Karen Christofferson, Sharon Segall, Ann Wessell) 1:48.8; 880yMedR, Jefferson (Sally Holt, Delewski, Miller, Chris Abba) 1:54.4. Competition was tight in many events. Miller of Jefferson copped her fourth first place, winning the 100 in 11.4. Micki Harden (Mt. Vernon) edged Bonnie Wiseman (Woodson) in the hurdles with both girls clocking 10.8. James of Groveton was also a double winner as she took the 220 over Jeannie Purple, (a competitor in last year's Nationals), of Robinson as both girls clocked 26.4. Sandy McGuire (Annandale), a freshman, won the 880 in 2:23.5 over Barbara Butler (Groveton) who ran 2:24.9. <u>Woodson</u> and <u>Annandale</u> ran 2-3 in the 440y relay, both in 51.7. <u>T.C.Williams</u> and <u>Jefferson</u> battled to a 2-3 finsh in the 880y relay (1:50.1 to 1:50.2). LaWanda Champ (T.C.Williams) won the high jump at 5'0. No wind information is given but our correspondent (Charles Haines of Fairfax) reports that all races are E to W while the winds were from the W and NW.

From Maryland we have two county championships to report. Apparently, the first four in each county meet advance to the state meet. In the Prince George's County meet May 9, nine county records fell but the meet's only triple winner didn't have a hand in any of them! Washington from DuVal (sorry I don't have first names) won the 60/100/Lj in 7.35(?)/11.55(?)/ 17'1¼, (electronic timing or guess-work?) Double winner Hall (Friendly) did run to meet records as she took the middle distances (2:25.2/5:34.8). Other meet marks went to Clagon of Largo in the 440, 59.7; Ihrig (Friendly) in the 220 (26.3), Draper, Cross, 108'6 in the discus, Friendly 51.6 in the 440y relay, Largo (1:47.45??) in the 880yR, Humphrey (DuVal) 7.3 50yH, and Williams (Friendly) 4'10 in the high jump. In addition, Clagon equalled the county 220 mark in second place. Other good marks: Edelen (Douglass) 106'9 in the discus. The other Martland county meet report comes from Montgomery County. Cathy Wheeler (BCC) was a triple winner with an unusual combination - she took the 100 in 11.8, 220 in 26.4 and discus at 101'3. Danete Hallick (Kennedy) won a fast 440 in 57.6 over Lynn Davis (BCC) 58.2, and also sped 2:22.4 to win the 880 over Kim Fine (BCC) 2:25.8. Hallick was also second in the 220. Morse won the mile in 5:25.5 and Davis took the 60 in 7.5. 50yH, Joanie Wilson (Gaithersburg) 7.2; 440yR, Gaithersburg 53.1; 880yR, Magruder 1:50.0; HJ, 1-Reba Green (Wooten) 5'3, 2-Sue Blemker (Gaithersburg) 5'2; SP, Pat Horan (G) 36'1; LJ, Relser (Churchill) 16'6.

One final preliminary meet is the California Southern Section prelims held in the cold and wind at Rolling Hills. Marred by rule changes that kept confusing athletes and meet officials all day long as to who was to qualify or whther or not semifinals (called "repechages") would be run, some outstanding performances were recorded. Pam Curran of La Reina, (the only member of her high school 'team') easily outclassed the rest of the short sprinters (11.3/26.2). Royal qualified 1st in both the 440yR (50.0) and 880yMed (1:52.9) as anchor runner Barbara Moore also led all qualifiers in the 440 in 59.4, the only runner under 60, and sister Karen was second in the half (2:22.3) behind Morningside's Joyce Anderson (2:20.5). Favoured sprint team Muir, which failed to receive notcie of the change in starting time for the meet and so was automatically advanced to all repechage heats, qualified in the 440 relay (50.9) and placed two sprinters in the 100 in Sabrina Strawder and Regina Jordan. Reseeding in the mile left heats with as many as 15 and as few as 6 runners. Linda Heinmiller recorded a 5:14.0 to lead the qualifiers. In the field, a leap of 16' was necessary to advance to the final of the long jump as Cheryl Czorny (University) claimed the best at 17'0%. Defending champ Kay Ilertson (Valencia) heaved the 8# shot 39'14. After being required to take as much as TWO HOURS between jumps, nine girls cleared 5'0 to qualify in the high jump.

Actually not a State preliminary meet, but large enough to qualify, was the First Red Bank Catholic Relay Festival at Monmouth College, New Jersey. 44 teams participated and the middle distance running was amazing. Ridgewood HS won the 2 mile relay in a fine 9:46.3. Juniors Kandie Latham (2:21) and Nancy Reed (2:37) combined with seniors Cindi Hansen (2:29) and Jane Green (2:19) to beat host Red Bank Catholic by 6.3 seconds. The host team came back with four other runners to claim the 4 mile relay in 22:44.3, (actually 22:44.4 as races over a mile should be timed in fifths), or a 5:41.1 average. Tom's River South, though not competing in the invitational division, clocked a 4:05.3 mile relay to claim an 8 second edge on the winner of the invitational. Incidentally, Jack Rafter, the Red Bank Catholic coach and athletic director, got an excellent write-up in the Newark Star-Ledger for the girls program he has developed - with good reason. Red Bank has not lost a dual meet in 7 years and has won 42 straight cross country meets. With six girls under 2:30 in the 880, it is easy to see how.

Another fine invitational is the Falmouth, Massachusetts, Girls' Invitational which turned into a two-team affair with <u>Brockton</u> beating host <u>Falmouth</u> 52% to 47%. Meet records in the field events went to Thalia Holmes of <u>Brockton</u> in the shot (39'%), Alexis Williams (<u>Brockton</u>) in the discus (116'10), Becky Welch (<u>Falmouth</u>) in the javelin (116'8), Meg Silver (<u>Bishop Stang</u>) in the long jump (16'5%) and Laurie Ozelius (<u>Brockton</u>) in the high jump (4'11%). On the track, <u>Falmouth's</u> Cindy Shepherd kept her undefeated string alive with a mile win in 5:51.8, another meet record. <u>Falmouth</u> frosh, Johana Forman, claimed the 880 record (2:22.5) as teammate Carla Richard gave the hosts a 1-2 finish. <u>Falmouth</u> also annexed both relays, winning the 440 in 51.2, beating <u>Brockton</u> for the 1st time in three meetings, and taking the 880 medley in 1:53.7, equalling the State record.

It seems almost criminal to bury the next report so far down the column, but Pam Spencer of <u>Great Falls</u> HS in Montana equalled the official American record in the high jump at 5'll in a double dual meet in Great Falls on May 4. Pam's leap ties the mark set by Eleanor Montgomery in 1969. The high jump was by no means the only outstanding mark of the day as Maureen Gallogly (C.M.Russell) heaved the 8# shot 39'lO% to beat Diane Theusen (<u>Billings Senior</u>) who threw 38'5%. In the llOy hurdles, (26'3 between: HS Ed question: When are we going to stop fooling around with hurdle spacing and heights and standardize on the international 8.5m/27'lO%?), of Billings West trimmed Wendie Carlson (<u>Great Falls</u>) 15.0 to 15.4. The same two finished the same way in the 80y hurdles, 11.1 to 11.4. In the javelin, Marri Ann Furlong (<u>Great Falls</u>) and

Dede Korwald (<u>Billings West</u>) both threw 126'0 and Theresa Higbie (<u>Billings Senior</u>) hurdled the disc 119'1 to beat Jodi Sorenson (<u>Russell</u>) at 113'7. Speedster Peggy Schroeder of <u>Great</u> <u>Falls</u> annexed both sprints in a good 11.5/26.2 double. Incidentally, Spencer's mark was measured by three different judges. This is her second successive meet in which she has been 5'10 or higher.

The Florida State Invitational highlighted some excellent high school marks. Bonnie Smith (<u>Leon HS</u>) was a double winner in the sprints (11.4/26.1) as teammate Lisa Kinch took the 880 in 2:38.7. In the junior high division, Loretta Bradley (<u>Madison</u>) took the dashes in 12.0/27.8 and <u>Madison's 53.7 re-</u> lay win was only a tick off the high school's winning time.

Norm Higgins of Connecticutt and coach of <u>St. Bernard's</u> girls team chides us for ignoring some "basic facts" about <u>North Ĥaven HS</u>, "the team that has won two state CIAC Championships and gave <u>Fitch</u> its only dual defeat in three years". I can only say to Norm, we print the results we get.

Also from Connecticutt comes an update on Judy Fontaine. The 16 year old (5/26/57) ran 10.9/25.2 on successive days in April after a 2:20.0 clocking the week before. <u>Waterford's</u> Jan Merrill has improved her mile best to 5:12.0 after clocking 4:55.1 indoors this year. She is aiming for Connecticutt's first sub-5 minute high school mile at the CIAC Championships at <u>Amity HS</u> on June 1. Norm's modesty must have prevented him from pointing out his own Susan Connolley who has improved her 880 mark to 2:27.2. She is a freshman. <u>Fitch</u> reports several improvements in their results as Monica Hyman is credited with an 11.5 80yH with sister Yvette clocking 11.6 in the 100. Delores Williamson is credited by some reports with a 25.3 in the furlong but other sources claim it was 28.3. Dottie Richardson upped her javelin mark to 147'6.

John Goodridge, of Ann Arbor <u>Huron HS</u>, writes to report on a deep track team. <u>Huron claims seven quartermilers under 66</u> led by Cindy LeClair (62.0) and Leslie Lavilollette (62.5) and 10 half milers under 2:45 led by the only senior on the squad, Ann Forshee (2:29.0). Forshee ran second in the recent Grass Lake Invitational mile (5:29.2) behind Ann Arbor <u>Pioneer's</u> Sue Keebnick (5:28.8). Also in that meet, Sue Parks (<u>Ypsilanti</u>) ran 62.0/2:21.8 and jumped 4'10 to claim three wins. Cathy Hadden of <u>Adrian</u> doubled 12.3/27.0 in the sprints as C. Dowling (Adrian) claimed the shot (36'7).

Marks from all over: Karlis Zvejnieks reported changes in his South Dakota report too late to make the last issue. Sophomore Jane Wipf's (Freeman) mile record is 5:35.8, not 5:35.4, and Fran Hoogestraat (Lennox) upped the shot record to 42'6... Kathy Costello (Orinda) hampered by California's run-withcompetition-or-run-with-high-school take your pick rule has nevertheless claimed a 2:13.8 half mile mark...Jim Duncan from Drake University passes on seom excellent Iowa marks. Jo Ellen Mitchell (Montezuma) has put the 4K shot 40'24. Patty Grubb (Burt) claims a 5'4% high jump. National rankers Debbie Essler (14.2 100mH) and Rosemary Holder (Scranton) 2:18.2 in the 880, also lead the state. Jim is looking for senior 220 and 880 runners for the International Prep Meet in Chicago on June 8. Wayne Cooley of the Iowa State Association is the meet director for the two girl's events.

A few comments on meet results: due to the hodgepodge that is high school track and field in this country, I have taken it upon myself to standardize the kinds of recording of results in this column based on international standards; thus, any measurements in excess of 100' are rounded off to the lower inch (fractions are disregarded). Measurements under 100' are rounded to the next lower ¼ inch. Times over one mile are taken to the next higher even tenth. Marks reported without wind information are considered wind-aided. When sending results, please include the weight of the shot and the height of the hurdles as well as the spacing (DGWS conforms to the international hurdle standards but the National Federation does not). Also a note on reading stopwatches. ALWAYS ROUND UP! And always take the middle time of three (or the slower of two) watches rather than averaging. Times taken in 100ths are allowable ONLY with electric timing - and there just aren't too many schools using electric timing for their girl's (or boy's) meets!

LATE RESULTS: From the Blade Girl's Relays in Toledo, Ohio: Brenda Morehead (Scott) long jumped 19'44. There was no wind information and word is that the board was not of legal specifications.
