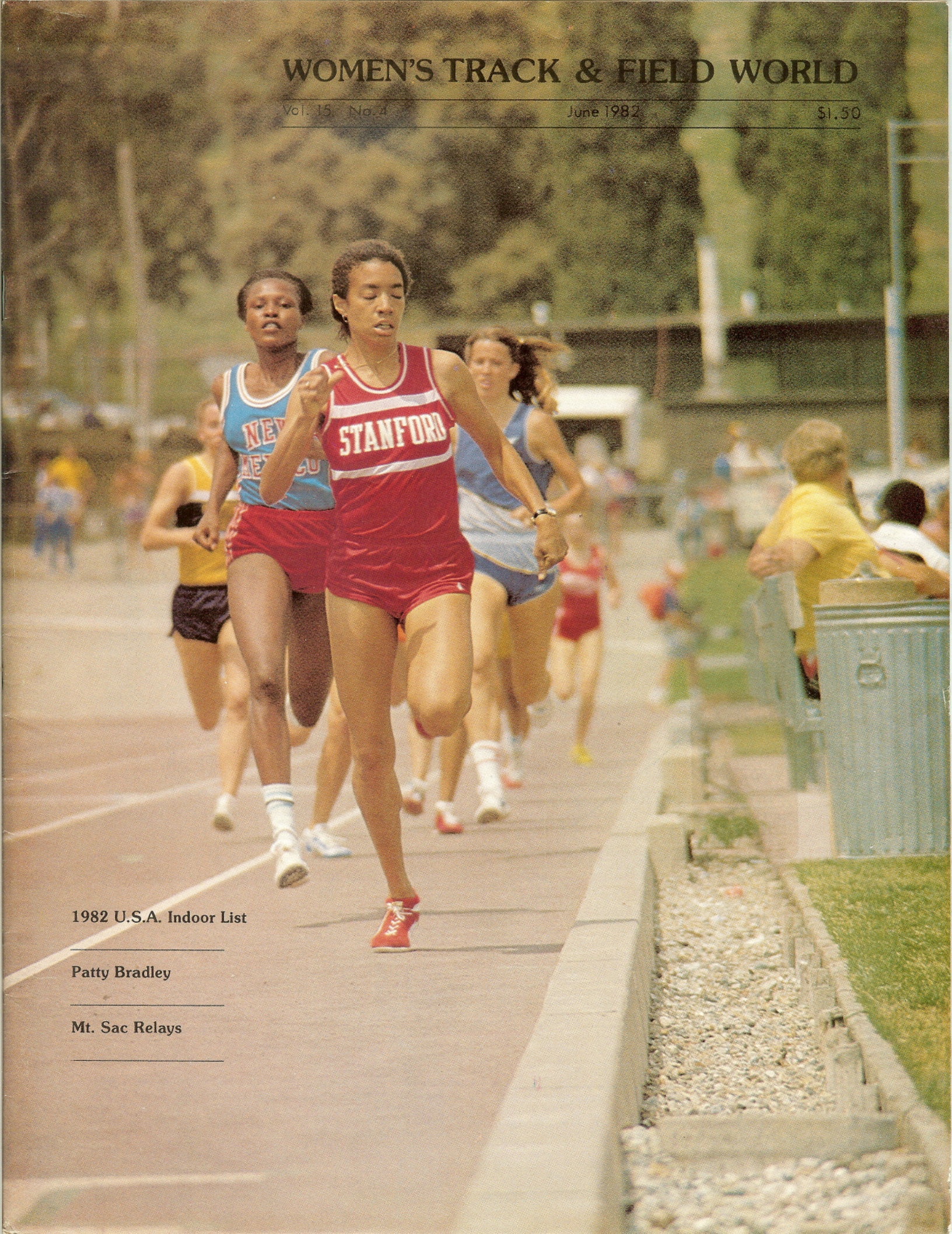

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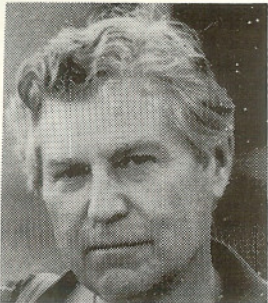

WE ARE LUCKY. Last issue we asked for volunteers to become editors of Division I and Division II programs starting with the 1982 cross country season. Not only have we received some queries for these two positions, we have received queries concerning becoming editor for NAIA colleges. I would like to toss out an invitation for a volunteer editor for the junior college activities. Here's your chance to do a good deed for track and to get the experience to possibly branch out into reporting in your future.

THE GOOD NEWS concerns Jack Welch, sometimes author-reporter-correspondent for "Track & Field News", "Runner's World", "Running Commentary" et al, who will be covering a neglected aspect of our sport beginning with the July issue. And that's Road Running. We haven't done anything with road running simply because we had no time to take on additional news, but road running has grown so much and so fast, we are thankful that Jack will be covering it for us. Prepare to read some good stuff for Senor Welch has a sharp pen!

FOR YEARS we have had a feud with 400 runners and 400m hurdlers who began their races with a standing start. Of course such a start is not faster than the crouch start - if it was, sprinters would use it. We have had a standing offer of one year free subscription for anyone who could send us a photo of a European using a standing start in either of the two races indicated. How many have we given? Zilch. Now, dear readers, we call your attention to two TAC rules, one new, one old. The old rule (61-2) states "Starting blocks MUST be used for all races up to and including 440 yards and the leadoff runner of relays where that leg does not exceed 440 yards". The new rule which compliments 61-2 is 60-7: "In all races up to and including 440 yards and lead-off relay legs not exceeding 440 yards, a crouch start MUST be used". That

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pretty much eliminates our old feud with 400 runners and hurdlers. From now on, use blocks and crouch, kid.

TAKING CARE to choose my words correctly, I would like to advise a couple friends of mine about being careful about doing anything which might be classed as "taking an unfair advantage over opponents". The two are UCLA coach Scott Chisam and the Major Domo of the Wilt's AC, Mr. Wilt himself. Although these words are addressed to them, they can be applied to many other coaches and directors in the US.

Problem arose at the heptathlon at the Mt. SAC Relays. As I heard it, Chisam was the meet director for the heptathlon and conducted the event on the field. True, UCLA did not have an entry in the heptathlon, but Wilt's AC did. And they were all from UCLA.

Three different persons have contacted me with information concerning the UCLA-WAC competitors receiving coaching and "other advantages", whatever that may mean. My advice to the two gentlemen mentioned above is don't put yourself in a position of possibly being criticised in this respect. Both of these men have given much to the sport, but opponents can be picky. Wilt himself said in an interview about his new team that his presence on the field, he felt, was an inspiration to his team members. And that's true. So don't let others believe your athletes have an advantage over their athletes.

If you graduated from USC, don't referee the USC-UCLA football game! You can't win.

IN THIS SAME VEIN, I hope the NCAA returns colleges to the rule which keeps college team members from representing a club until their collegiate season is finished. It is getting most difficult to tell who is representing who (or whom) with this constant switch back and forth from college athlete to club athlete. We even have some athletes representing two clubs during the season. Now THAT'S confusing.

WE ARE GRATEFUL for all the results and information being sent to us by coaches and sports information people. BUT, we have a couple of requests. Please don't send faded ditto copies of results. Not being able to read results received is most frustrating. And please be sure your result sheet lists the date, the site and the participating teams. We have before us the results of a meet called "The Mountaineer Track Classic". And we haven't the slightest idea who the teams are or where the meet took place. Teams taking part were ODU (could be Old Dominion), ASU (could be Arizona State or Adams State), UNC (could be Northern Colorado or North Carolina), ETSU (could be Eastern Tennessee or East Temple), ECU (could be Eastern Colorado), D (now there's one to look up!), GP (could be George Fox), M (there's another goodie), and WFU (could be Western Fountain View). 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MT. SAC RELAYS

Walnut, California, April 24/25:-Ria Stalman's 218'5 discus mark, Kellie Cathey's American record in the 10k and the relay magic of Wilt's AC were the top stories of the Mt. SAC Relays, but all other events were hotly contested and top ranked as well.

In near perfect weather, Stalman got off her record toss on her last effort for her new Dutch national mark. Rest of the discus field wasn't too shabby either as Leslie Deniz, also on her final throw, set a PR at 199'9 and Lorna Griffin, the American record holder, began to approach her 1981 form with the throw of 189'4 for third.

Cathey set her 10k record of 32:22.5 long before most of the fans had arrived at the stadium. She was 1½ minutes in front of Idaho's South African import, Patsy Sharples and surprised the West Coast reporters who asked "Was the race a lap short?"

Wilt's speedsters put on quite a show as they won all four speed events. The 4x100 was clocked in 43.84, the 4x200 in 1:41.74, the 4x400 in 3:32.82 and the sprint medley in 1:41.74.

Sweden's Eva Ernstrom, competing for San Diego State, and Midde Hamrin, yet another Swede, staged a ding-dong battle over 5000 meters with Ernstrom finally winning it in a very good 15:55.5 to 15:58.0 for Hamrin. BYU's Carey May, an Irish import, was third.

San Diego's Lynn Kanuka won a good duel from Maggie Keyes in the 1500 in 4:17.28 to 4:17.95. Kentucky's Bernadette Madigan took the lead with her determined style and passed the 400 mark in 70 seconds followed by New York high schooler Diane Richburg, Kanuka, Michelle Bush and Keyes. Kanuka took over at the 800 mark in 2:20 with Madigan close behind, Keyes next followed by Richburg and Bush. Kanuka led at the 1200 meter mark in 3:27 and now Keyes was second, Madigan still in contention in third, Eileen Kraemer fourth, Bush fifth and Richburg out of it. Bush moved into fourth during the last lap for the only change of positions. Interesting to note 10th place (last) was clocked in a not bad 4:32.8.

Regina Jacobs (Stanford) scored a hard fought win over New Mexico's Regina Dramiga in the 800, 2:05.43 to 2:05.84 with California high schooler Rennie Durand slipping in for third at 2:06.21. Jacobs led all the way with splits of 29-60 and 1:32. Northern Arizona's Charlotte Reeves gave close chase until finally running out of gas near the end. Last place was timed in 2:15.1 (12th).

UTEP's Kim Turner won a fast 100m hurdles, but was the recipient of a gift rolling start from the starters. Turner started in lane 1, a notorious lane for rolling starts.

UCLA's and Wilt's AC's Jackie Joyner continued her up and down performances on the up side this week with an excellent 5960 score to win the heptathlon. Joyner did not have a poor event in the two days. Oregon TC's Cindy Greiner had her best-ever score in second at 5646 and UCLA/WAC's Susie Ray was a good third at 5637.

Naturite's Diane Williams won the 100 in a legal 11.32 and looked very strong all afternoon in her relay runs as well.

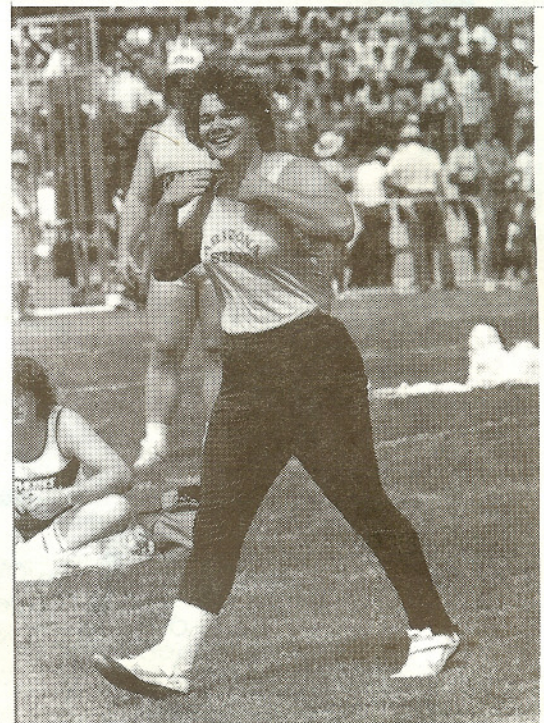
UTEP's Charmaine Crooks won the 400 in the fastest time in the nation to date with a time of 52.30. Naturite's Jackie Pusey ran well at the end to grab the runner-up spot over Stanford TC's June Griffith who slowed dramatically over the final 50 yards.

Foreign athletes continue to dominate. Foreigners won 5 of the 10 individual events in the invitational division as well as grabbing seconds in the 100, 400, 800, 10k, 5k and 400H. They were 1-2-3 in the 5000 and 400 and 1-3 in the 1500. In the University/Open division, foreigners won the javelin, high jump, 400 hurdles and 800 and were second in the javelin, high jump and 100 hurdles. And only one (Frances Rose Boqel in the invitational 100) did not represent a school or a club.

Although they did not all compete, Hopp, Hopper and Harper were all entered in the 1500....The starter fired the gun at 0.4 in the men's 4x100....Isn't there some rule about starting which can eliminate the southern California invention of blowing a whistle instead of a voice command for "set"?

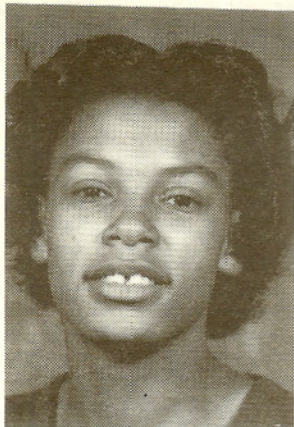

PATTY BRADLEY— A VERY VERSATILE WILDCAT

What's a father to do? Your daughter turns down a host of athletic scholarships to major universities to concentrate on academics and become a nurse, and then drops her nursing program to concentrate on athletics. "Actually," says Villanova University sophomore Patty Bradley, "he was very understanding. He's never forced me to do anything, instead he has encouraged me to do what would be best for me." It just took Patty a little longer to decide what was right.

Coming from an understanding athletic family, (three brothers were football stars at Penn State), Patty followed in her brother's footsteps excelling in high school athletics. She is still Bishop McCort's (Johnstown, Pennsylvania), all-time leading basketball scorer, (men's or women's), netting All-State honors, and still holds the Pennsylvania high school record in the 800 meter run. "I just decided I was thru with athletics. I wanted to go to college and concentrate on academics - period," she says. Only it didn't really work out that way.

"When I arrived in my freshman year I got involved with my schoolwork, but somehow it just didn't seem like enough. Then one day I walked out on the track and saw the girls practicing. You know, this is a pretty impressive place for anyone with a track background," she added with a smirk, "That was it - I was hooked. I started practicing and I haven't stopped since."

Bradley's boredom with nursing has turned into a blessing for Villanova's blossoming women's track program. "I was pretty much told by the nursing officials that I had to make a decision, it would have to be either nursing or athletics. So I'm a communication major now," says Bradley.

Under the watchful eyes of Villanova track coach Dr. Charles Jenkins and his assistant Bob Shoudt, Bradley has transcended into one of the most versatile women's track athletes on the east coast. "There was something about Patty," says Bob Shoudt, "I just had a feeling she could do more than just run the 800 as she had been doing. I'm not sure why, but there was this feeling." More indeed. Today Bradley not only runs the 800 meters, 100m hurdles and 400m hurdles, but also competes in the long jump, high jump and runs a leg on any of three Wildcat relay teams. Versatile, sure, but also a record breaker. In fact in the past two months, Bradley has set three individual Villanova records and been a part of three other relay marks. "I guess I went from a specialist to an everythingist," she deadpans. "Whatever, I really enjoy it."

The versatility appears to have come naturally because Bradley claims her practice regime is still the same. "I really don't train any differently. I still do my distance work and never even get near the long jump pit. Coach Shoudt is bringing me along slowly and it seems to be working," she adds. "When you think about his philosophy it really makes sense. One day I worked out on the hurdles. Mainly because we decided it might be fun to run in the pentathlon. After all, track is not the most exciting sport to practice. That day the hurdles worked out very well. Add that with my ability to run the 400 and it just made sense that I'd do fine in the 400 hurdles." Bradley remembers.

Taking blood pressure is about a mile in difference from landing in a sand pit following a long jump, but it seems to be paying off for Bradley. In the most recent issue of Eastern Track, Bradley's seasons marks have stood up as some of the best in the east. Among the top five eastern performances this season in the 100m hurdles, long jump, 400 hurdles, sprint medley, 4x400, 4x800 and distance medley.

"I admit I'm probably missing a lot as far as social life associated with college, because we do put a lot of time in. But in years to come I'm sure I'll look back and realize I made the right decision," says the 1982 indoor All-American.

And regarding the future? "Right now I'm just looking forward to this year's national championship. I think I might have a chance to win the 400m hurdle title." But even further, like in 1984? "You mean the Olympics - gosh, I never really thought about them, it's so far away. But if it seems to be something I can work for and achieve, I'll give it my best shot."

Villanova is just fortunate that Dr. Bradley is so understanding. Even though Patty won't be becoming a nurse, she's still performed quite a few miracles at Villanova - on the track.

WYOMING'S PAT DAVIS

Pat Davis hopes to long jump 21 feet sometime this track season for the University of Wyoming. But, even if she does, it will just be one of the steps that the University of Wyoming athlete has taken in the past few years.

In the brief space of three years, Davis has transferred from Dodge City, Kansas, Community College to Wyoming, finished third in the nation in the long jump, broken several Cowgirl track records, been married and given birth to a baby girl.

Now a senior, the former Pat Miller is Wyoming's top hope for a national championships at the NCAA meet June 1-5 in Provo, Utah.

"This is my last year at Wyoming," said Davis, "and I'd like to hit 21 feet this year. I know I can do it because I've jumped 21'3 in practice, but that doesn't count. So it's a matter of getting out there and doing it competitively."

In competition, Davis has leaped 20'4 this year, just under the school record of 20'5 she set during the 1980 season.

But that was before she took a year off to have her baby, and coming back this year has not been easy.

"The first day of practice I died," she joked. "I hadn't run for a year and it was tough. I'm still not where I want to be, but I'm getting there."

But, while having a family may have slowed Davis down a little, "Having my husband and my little girl behind me really helps. He really likes to see me win."

Davis has won quite frequently at Wyoming. She was undefeated in the indoor season and was ranked as one of the top 10 long jumpers in the country.

During the indoor season, Davis also had the Cowgirl's top time in the 50 yard dash with a mark of 6.04, and the best in the 55m dash with 7.21. Her time in the sprints were in the top of the nation, but it is as a long jumper, and not as a sprinter that Davis excels.

"Long jump is my number one event," said Davis. "Long jump is first and the dash is second, but I'll run the dash if the team needs it. I'm a member of the Wyoming track team, and I'm there to help them wherever I can."

"Track is my life. I love track to death, and I want to qualify for the Olympics."

JACKSONVILLE INVITATIONAL

Jacksonville, Alabama, March 27:-Alabama A&M easily won the team title at the Jacksonville State Invitational. The Lady Bulldogs scored 221 points to runner-up Berry College's 105.

RATTLELETTE MARY JONES

A few years ago, running competitively did not interest Mary Jones. Today, the Rattlerettes' freshman track stand-out is indeed interested as she strives for a spot on the 1984 Olympic team.

A strong 200 and 400 competitor, the Buffton, South Carolina, native has a simple strategy for achieving her dream. "Each time I run, I will try to lower my time until I get where I want to be," she says.

Jones has followed her plan for success to this point. She improved her performance every time out until she grabbed a second place finish in the Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference Indoor Championships in the 400.

Rattlerette head coach Sarah Hill has been more than pleased with Jones' performances so far. "From the beginning of the indoor season, we knew that Mary would be an outstanding athlete for us," said Hill. "But what we really did not expect was her outstanding performances so early in the outdoor season."

Hill's sentiments ring true as Jones turned in excellent performances from the very onset of the outdoor season.

In Jacksonville's Edward Waters Relays, Jones surpassed her best prep mark of 56.6 in the 400m with a time of 56.2. The following weekend in the FAMU Relays, Jones qualified for the Division II Outdoor National Championships with a clocking of 55.2, a mark which set a new Florida A&M track and field complex record.

In Athens, Georgia, two weekends ago, cold and windy conditions didn't bother Jones as she breezed to yet another school record. This time in the 200 meters as she clocked a 24.0 flat in just her second time running the shorter distance in college. Jones' school record time qualified her for both Division I and II Outdoor National Championships.

Jones also anchored the Rattlerette mile relay team which finished second to nationally ranked Tennessee State and set a school record with a time of 3:45.44.

Hill praises Jones' unselfishness and her strong desire to succeed as the qualities that will not only help Jones as a person and athlete, but contribute to the overall success of her team.

Jones was headed for the military before Florida A&M intervened with a scholarship offer. "I am very thankful for the opportunity FAMU has given me for higher education and for the chance to reach my goals as an athlete," says Jones.

The Rattlerettes rising star says she is proud of her accomplishments to this point but leaves no doubt about the fact she feels she can do much better. "I don't think of what I have accomplished very much," says Jones. "Each time I run I want to do my best, not only for myself, but for my family, coaches and teammates."

Florida A&M has not had an Olympic athlete since Bob Hayes and his gold medal days of 1964. Los Angeles and 1984 are still a long way away, but FAMU track fans will be watching the progress of Mary Jones very closely over the next year and a half.

The world of women's track can give thanks to this Skidmore graduate, (with an MBA from Columbia), who has taken the sport not only to heart, but to pocketbook. Says Deborah, "Striving for peak performance requires diligent training - a full-time effort. We felt Jean Nate support would help nourish and sustain that effort and smooth the path toward the Olympic Games."

HAMRIN RECEIVES "BABE" SCHOLARSHIP

Swedish running ace Marie-Louise "Midde" Hamrin was honored at the Lamar University Women's All-Sports Banquet recently with the coveted John Grey-Babe Didrikson Zaharias Scholarship Award which is given annually to the University's outstanding woman athlete.

The scholarship, which is given to athletes completing their junior year of eligibility, is named in honor of former University president Dr. John Grey, and also in honor of the greatest woman athlete in the history of athletics, Beaumont native Mildred "Babe" Didrikson Zaharias.

Along with a full scholarship for her senior season, Hamrin will be honored with an etching of herself in action to be displayed in eternity in the Zaharias Memorial located in Beaumont. The seventh recipient of the award, Hamrin is also the most noted in the world of women's athletics. An All-American in cross country and track, she has also played point-guard for the Lady Cardinals' basketball team and for her native Sweden's national team. She was named a member of the Swedish National track team for the summer of 1981 in the 3000m run.

Honors Hamrin has accumulated since coming to Lamar include Cross Country Athlete of the Year for three consecutive years in Texas, Track Athlete of the Year in Texas two times. She is a three time state cross country champion and national qualifier, finishing 13th in the last National meet. In track, Hamrin has finished fourth and third in the 10000 meter run on the National level, and is a two-time state champion in the 10000 and 5000 meter runs. She is also the Collegiate record holder in the marathon with a 2:34:29. Her time in the 10000 of 33:10.19 placed her eighth on the All-Time World List in 1980.

Hamrin succeeds teammate Carolyn Ford as the Babe Scholarship recipient. Ford, a senior high jumper and basketball player, is a three-time national qualifier in the high jump. She won the Texas title as a freshman in 1979, upsetting American record holder Louise Ritter. Ford's finishes in the national meet were 6th in 1979 and a tie for 7th (equalling the same height as the second place finisher but with more misses) in 1981. She has already qualified for the nationals in her final season as a Lady Cardinal.

The following is a diary kept by Lisha Lass, 1981 National Junior College Discus Champion who traveled with I.S.E. for a month last summer for meets in Taiwan and Korea.

9:00 P.M. Monday Evening, July 27: We all met at L.A. International airport where each of us are introduced to the rest. I spot Coach Crumpton who is the man who first taught me to throw the discus back in the 9th grade....seems like a long way from that ninth grade team to an International team going abroad. The first people I meet are Kathy Lisle, a shot putter from Chico State and Jeanne Eggart from good ole Washington State U. We place our bags in the long line and head upstairs for a short briefing to make certain all passports etc are in order.

When we board the plane, I can't believe my eyes. It's my first time in a 747 and I never dreamed it was this big. We get our first taste of the orient when the announcements are made in English, Japanese, Chinese, and Korean. We are flying Korean Airlines enroute to Taiwan. However, all Korean flights go to Seoul, Korea, first and then we will change planes to Taipei, Taiwan. It's my first big plane ride and I take it all in: the great food (steak) the friendly crew, the movies (two) and just getting acquainted with our U.S. team. This team is composed of both high school and college athletes, mostly from Oregon and California, both male and female which is gonna make it more enjoyable.

After a 12 hour flight, we land at Kimpo International in Seoul at 6:30 A.M. As we come in for the landing, we see acre upon acre of rice fields and these small houses that in the U.S.A. would pass for shacks. We have a 3 hour layover at the airport which is very modern and beautiful. There is a lounge and coffee shop where we sack out on big couches. The Korean bus boys are fascinated by us and act like they have never seen anyone like us.

Coach Crumpton calls a short meeting and assigns us each a number according to our place in the alphabet. Instead of calling roll by name, we will use the number system to make certain we are all here when we are supposed to be. The first roll call is a flop....seems I can't remember my own number, oh well, try again!

A Korean bus boy is fascinated by Mary Jo, a blonde 800 runner from Corona, Calif. Apparently he has never been around blondes and wants his picture taken with her.... and of course her address.

9:30 A.M. We board the plane bound for Taipei, Taiwan. I am excited about going to my second foreign country and the boy's tease me for my burst of enthusiasm. The steward gives me a some custom forms to fill out which look like a tax form....oh, wow! Coach Gregoire (Coach - Southern California Cheetahs) finally takes pity on me and helps me finish them. At 1:00 we arrive in Taipei and are we ever suprised! Waiting for us is Chi Cheng. Coach C. had briefed us on her. She held six world records...among them a 10.0 hundred yard dash, and is now the Secretary-General of the Republic of China Track & Field Association. Also, she is now in politics and is a Senator in Taiwan.

With Chi Cheng is a whole battery of photographers and T.V. cameras and reporters. To say we are stunned is to put it mildly. Back home, not too many people know we exist, or care a lot about track and field. All of a sudden, we are celebrities, surrounded by the media....and can you believe

it....we don't know what to do. Coach C. sez, "smile, answer their questions and act like you've been giving interviews all your life.....easier said than done!

We head down the escalator and come face to face with what looks like the inside of an ant hill. There are people running all over, squeezing in here and there trying to get their luggage....let me tell you...we learn in a hurry not to be bashful or we will never get out of here. I dive into a group and because of being tall, I prevail and am the first one to come up with my bags. When everyone has found all their bags, we line up in one long line expecting to be there hours while customs goes through everything. BUT, we had not counted on the magic of Chi Cheng...her influence takes us right through the line without a bag being opened.

Again, we are celebrities! I can't believe it.

Outside, we load our bags into a bus and we board another one. Ooooppps! Before we board the bus, we are ushered off to a side area and Coach C. has arranged for a tailor to measure us for our uniforms....can you believe it? Custom uniforms and sweats. They measure us all and will deliver them to the hotel in two days..

Our bus heads for the village of Chiayi where our meet will be held. Chiayi is about two-thirds of the way down the island and will take about three hours to get there. We are overwhelmed by the sights: old houses and our first sight of Chinese writing and signs everywhere. Everything is so green and the rice fields seem to go on forever. In some of the fields the men use what loos like a rotatiler, while others use water buffalo.

Halfway there, the bus stops along the freeway (which has been copied after those in the U.S.) at a rest stop which is unlike anything we have ever seen in the U.S. It has food, drinks, ice cream...and toilet facilities. We look around for the potty and can't find it until Coach C. calls our attention to a sign that says "W.C.". We are told that stands for Water Closet and any dummy ought to know that is the toilet! Well, I'm here to tell you that they don't have such places like this in Oregon. The door to the men's is open and nobody seems to care. Our guys must be a bit timid 'cause they close the door when they go in...only to be left open again by some exiting Chinese. I decide I can wait until we get to the hotel.

Another new experience! We buy a coke and because they are not cold, the girl gives us a small clear plastic bag with ice in it and a straw. We pour the coke into the bag over the ice, place the straw in it and holding it by the neck of the bag, drink cold coke....wonder why we never thought of that before. Gervais McGraw, our Calif. State Champ in the 400 is laughing so hard she drops her coke bag.

On the freeway we pass a lot of trucks that are so overloaded with freight that you wonder how they climb the hills. We pass a lumber truck and I wonder where they are going as I have seen no wooden houses. Most are concrete or brick. The Chinese people are mostly small, but all are thin...I have yet to see a fat Chinese. Makes me think we should all eat rice and be skinny.

We reach Chiayi and the "Village" turns out to be a city of more than 300,000 people. There are hundreds of small motorcycles and they scoot thru the traffic like ants. One drives up on the sidewalk and scatters pedestrians like chickens. Anthony Caire, (our California State high jump champion) about loses it when he spots a family of five on one motorcycle.

The closer we get to the hotel, the smaller the streets are. Upon arrival we are welcomed by a large sign and a huge cluster of firecrackers that is set off in our honor. The noise is deafening, but we are told the more noise, the more important the guest. Bell boys appear from nowhere and unload our bags....eying our girls like they have never seen anyone like us. Coach C. says it is probable that they have never seen a white or black person before....and so they stare!

We chose roommates and are assigned rooms. After unpacking and getting our junk organized we get some card games going. The boys think they can beat us but don't know we plan to cheat a little to deflate their egos.

Dinner is served! We are introduced to Chop Sticks and oh, is it funny time! Coach C. makes the rounds to each table and is about to lose it watching our efforts. We call for forks and spoons, but he won't let us....sez, when in Rome do as the Romans. Gayle Kellon (our national high school record holder in the 330 low hurdles) says doing as the old Romans is going to starve her to death!

I look around the dining room and can't help but think what a super group we have. If you had asked for a perfect group you would have chosen this one. They are all laughing and carrying on like they had known each other forever.

The Chinese team arrives and you would have thought it was old home week. They all know Coach C. and appear to have a warm relationship with him. He introduces all of us and we all laugh at them trying to pronounce our names. Then, it's their turn to laugh. He introduces them and my attempt at Chinese leaves a lot to be desired. They howl as we try their names in Chinese.

Jet lag has us all....to bed at 9:00. Never thought I would go to bed that early.

Wednesday, July 29th. I forgot to mention, we lost the 28th on the way over when we passed the International Date Line. I don't understand that, oh well. Up for breakfast at 6:15 and down to breakfast....ham and eggs. Did you ever eat eggs with chop sticks?

We head for the track at 9:30 to loosen up and a light workout. What a ride! All the bus driver did was honk his horn and drive anywhere he please which included both sides of the road. Coach Clayton Brooks (Coach, University of Redlands, California) is sitting up front and is having the time of his life like he was riding shotgun on a stagecoach. I wanted to cover my eyes, but had to wait and see if we would miss the guy who pulled out in front of us on a motorcycle with his hat over his eyes. We arrived at the stadium with a sigh of relief. Coach C. is laughing and tells us to look around and see how many dented fender we see. There are none! He says even though they drive in all directions, they are really skillful drivers. Oh yeah?

We had expected a dirt track and are pleasantly surprised to find a Tartan surface. It is hot and humid and we all sweat a lot. The coaches have all been assigned an event and we have a light session. Coach C. works with me on my discus and it brings back a lot of fond memories of when I first learned from him years ago.

We head back to the hotel and a shower. The ride back is equally as exciting as the one before. On arrival at the hotel we are met by what looks like several hundred small children. They are all dressed in school uniforms and are here to "see the Americans" They are all so cute we want to take them home with us. After a lot of smiling, touching and staring, they move aside and let us into the hotel. Slept most of the day, just getting up to eat and watch a little Chinese T.V.

There is going to be a team from a Korean University here to compete with us and they are supposed to arrive today but I slept thru their arrival.

Thursday, July 30: This morning I was trying to speak with the Chinese Bellboy on our floor. (Each floor has one boy assigned to us and they have a small desk at the end of the hall. They work around they clock and sleep on the floor behind the desk) My attempts to speak some Chinese fail and as I'm getting into the elevator, I get caught in the door which brings a lot of snickering from him....probably thinks I never saw an elevator before.

After lunch we board the bus and head for the beach which is an hour away. We pass through a lot of small towns and everyone stares at us as usual.. We stopped in a small village and went through a Buddhist Temple. It was so pretty and the people so nice to us. There was a lady worshipping that caught our attention. She bowed, picked up some rocks, walked backwards, dropped the rocks on the ground, bowed, picked them up, walked forward, praying etc. It really did fascinate us.

We finally reach the beach and find that someone goofed! Somebody forgot to read the tide table and the tide is not only out....it is gone! The water has receded over 1/4 mile and you can walk out on the mud flats. Veronica Bell (Cal-Poly University, Pomona, Calif.) announces she is going clam digging. Meantime, we have attracted the usual crowd of children. Mike Powell, our 7'0 high jumper teaches them the "Soul-brother" handshake and you can hear the laughter up and down the beach as they try it our on all of us. The children teach us a game similar to the "rock, paper, scissors" game children play back home. It is a very fast game with a lot of yelling and our guys really get into it.

Instead of going back to the hotel for dinner, we have a surprise and are taken to a sea food place in a small village. It is in the upstairs of what looks like a huge house. They give us these huge shrimp...larger than anything I have ever seen. Then soup, then pork, fish, beef, little balls of fish, then another soft fish in a soup, then fried clams and small shrimp that tasted like our french fries. For dessert we had pineapple, two kinds of melon, mangos and a new kind of orange. We drank so much Orange juice, we probably have orange eyes. We are so full we waddle out to the bus and head back to the hotel.

Friday, July 31st: Up for breakfast and introduced to the Korean team. Immediately one of the Koreans falls for Veronica. He immediately starts teaching her Korean, but she is laughing so hard she may never learn it.

At the track, one of the Korean boys throws my discus back to me and I try to thank him, but my Korean isn't too good, so I smile a lot. One of the Chinese coaches speaks a little English and he watches Kathy and methrow and can't believe it. He wants to talk about Al Orter and keeps saying something that Kathy finally figures out is "Mac Wilkens" He gets a big laugh out of us for that.

Back at the hotel, they are still making up our rooms so we sit in the hall. I notice one of our chairs is missing and go scouting for it. Michelle Taylor (the baby of our team at 14...(but has run 54.2 for 400m) has swiped the chair and is trying to hide it in the bathroom.

Downstairs, one of the officials delivers our competition

numbers to Coach C. who notices there are no pins. Coach C. tries his Chinese on him and tells him we need pins. A few minutes later the guys comes back with a needle and thread. Coach C. smiles and accepts the needle and thread.

After eating, we hit the streets for shopping. We head for a jewelry store and buy two pair of pearl earrings for a bargain. Then we can't resist a stop at the bakery where we devour two large cream puffs for about 9¢. We stop in a luggage store that has sports carry bags. We buy one that has "Pepsi" written on it for \$2.79. In the states it would be about \$15.00.

Saturday, August 1st: Meet day! Up at 7:30 and breakfast at 8:30. Zilda Johnson (California H.S. sprinter) sure looks sleepy this morning. We head for the stadium for opening ceremonies and introduction of coaching staffs. Back to the hotel for lunch and at 12:30 head for the stadium again.

Coach C. asked me if I wanted to throw the javelin also and I agree. Jeanne and I go thru our warmup and check in, but the Chinese officials cannot pronounce our names so they call us by number. Jeanne wins it and I'm back in 5th....wait until the discus! Kathy wins the shot at 45 feet, but had a 48 foot warmup throw.

The afternoon passes by fast and our team picks up a lot of medals in the sprints, 400, 1500, etc. After the meet we return to the hotel. Tonight we are going to a new restaurant down the street from our hotel.

We are introduced to all kinds of new food from sea cucumbers to black chicken. Coach C. introduces me to C.K. Yang who was the world record holder in the 1960's in the decathlon. He went to UCLA and is now back in Taiwan heading up their Olympic Training Camp.

After dinner, each team sang songs to the rest of the group. The Chinese were great...they sang folk songs that were fantastic! The Chinese coaches introduced a new game to our coaches called "Gombay" which means bottoms up with the beer glass. Our coaches only wanted to watch but played three times and lost all three....oh well!

Sunday, August 2nd: We could have slept in but decided to get up...besides, the boys are all up and downstairs and who wants to sleep in when the boys are downstairs??? As we prepare to go to the stadium, all the little children are outside and Dave Walsh (California 5,000) has really made a hit with them. He has taught a group of them to count in English and they follow him everywhere he goes.

When we arrive at the stadium, we are met by a large crowd who must be seeing us for the first time. They crowd all around us waving papers. Coach C. informs us they want autographs and home addresses so they can try their hand at writing letters in English. We are overwhelmed as we have never had this experience back home. Coach C. sez, "sign em!" and we sign autographs for about 20 minutes and then head into the stadium.

I am scheduled to throw at 2:00 PM and inform one-and-all that I'm looking for hardware today, having missed out on the medals yesterday. It is hot and I am sweating. (Coach C. says boys sweat, but ladies mist). My warmups are good and I really get ahold of my first one which is good enough to win it all, and I head for the victory stand and my 1st international medal.

We have been informed of the Asian method of awards. You mount the victory stand along with 2nd and 3rd places and are supposed to salute the official who is going to drape the medal around your neck. Well, I forgot that I'm the one who is suppose to salute first. So, like a dummy, I just stand there and everyone waits and waits until finally, Coach Gregoire says "Lisha, salute the man!". I salute and get a large gorgeous medal that I can't believe.

Toward the end of the meet the sky turned almost dark and it began to rain like I have never seen it rain anywhere at any time. It was like someone up there had a gigantic water hose and had it on full pressure! They held the meet up for a while and it looked like they would have to cancel the remainder of the events because by now there was

ankle deep water standing on the track. Somehow, they did finish everything until it came down to the mile relay. Our super girls ran it and won going away. The guys decided to change their lineup and include a couple of the field event men who had not won a medal.....and the hooting and all the hollaring was on.....it was a very close race for 2nd and third between us and the Koreans and it went down to the final 10 yards with us barely nipping the Koreans. It was really a sight. We were safe and dry in the grandstand and the poor relay team looked like drowned rats. They got the medals and we had a great time taking pictures.

Back at the hotel, they had been preparing a super party for us all day. Across the street from the hotel, they had built a big stage and decorated it with all kinds of beautiful colors. They brought in a big sound system and several hundred chairs for spectators.

We were scheduled to have a big bar-b-que outside, but the rain is still coming down, so we have the meal back in the hotel and it is great. Every kind of food you can imagine was served and we just stuff ourselves like little pigs.

After dinner, the rain has stopped and we move across the street into this large parking lot where everything has been prepared in our honor. All around the block, people living in apartments come out onto the balcony or onto the roof tops to watch. There are the usual welcoming speeches and of course the firecrackers. Then, comes something we have all heard of and wanted to see....the traditional Chinese Dragon Dance. It is a long cloth train that holds about 10 people and they all get under it and do a dance like a serpentine. The head which has this fierce looking dragon has a wooden frame inside which the guy can hold and make all kinds of moves with. After weaving in and out of the crowd amid the guests and firecrackers, they stop in front of our team and the announcer informs Coach C. he is the #1 guest and he is to be honored by getting into the Dragon head and leading them. Oh, yes, the Dragon's head also has small bells mounted on it that contribute to the total noise. There is thunderous applause from about 500 people and I mean to tell you, Coach C. did a real old "get down" dance with that thing and it was something to behold!

Next came a live band and dancing time. We all were a little shy and just danced with the American team. The coaches put an end to that and had us lose our shyness and ask the Chinese and Koreans to dance.....even us girls ask their boys to dance. Talk about loosening the place up!! They all wanted to learn our new dance steps.... which were old to us. I don't know how anyone around the place slept for all the band noise, more firecrackers and applauding. We finally broke up about 12:30 AM.

We were so keyed up, no one wanted to sleep. We went to the coffee shop and ate again and just wandered around as everyone was out in the halls, playing cards, talking, teaching or learning Chinese and Korean etc. What a fun time we had.

Monday, August 3rd: We had to be up at 7:00 and pack for the bus trip back to Taipei at 8:00. The bell boy came and got Dave Walsh and took him to the front of the hotel and there must have been 50 of his little friends waiting outside to see him for the last time. I forgot to mention that they all came to see him at the meet and somehow a group of them got down on the side of the track when he was running the 1500....he had his own private cheering group. It really hurt him to say goodbye. They are so cute and have become so attached to their American friend.

As we walked outside the hotel to board the bus, it seems everyone we have met during our stay is waiting for us. The Chinese and Korean teams follow us outside to say their last goodbyes too. There is a lot of autograph signing, picture taking, hugging, promises to write, and eventually some tears on both sides. How do you become so attached to people in such a short time and have them become part of your life....and then say goodbye, knowing full well you will never see them again?

The bus trip back to Taipei seems to take forever. We arrive and check into the hotel and then hit the streets

for shopping. I go with Coach C. and a group to a one hour film processing shop. We deposit 14 rolls and then go across the street to try our hand at Chinese ice cream. The ice cream was outstanding and so were the pictures when we got back.

Another surprise tonight! They have a big dinner planned at the FASD which used to be an American Army Officers Club. Everyone has to dress up and the dinner is formal. They have a floor show for us and afterwards a dance. We dance half the night away and enjoy ourselves thoroughly.

Tuesday, August 4th: I seem to have lost a day here somewhere and can't find my notes for today.

Wednesday, August 5th: Today we took a bus trip to a super beach and had a great time. This time the tide was in. After swimming a lot, we played the ultimate frisbee game.

We went back to the hotel, took in the national museum and Chiang Kai-Shek memorial. We also had a birthday for one of our group and had a party. We then went to snake alley which is a section of the city that has very narrow streets and looks like a big swap meet. Some of the places have huge amounts of snakes hanging up and in cages and

the idea is to dangle them in front of a mongoose who is in a cage until he goes into a frenzy and attacks and kills the snake. Then they drain the snakes blood and people buy it and mix it with alcohol and drink it. It is supposed to be good for the health. A couple of our guys decided to try it....yuk!

Dinner was at a beautiful hotel called The Mandrin. We had Mongolian Bar-B-Que. You take a bowl and walk down the line filling it with all kinds of cut vegetables, and sliced meats....venison, pork, chicken, turkey, beef, etc. Then you hand it to a man who has this huge stove that he pours the whole thing onto. He walks around the stove using a wooden paddle to stir it with. After one lap round the stove your dinner is cooked and he puts it back into the bowl.....talk about delicious!!!!

Thursday, August 6th: Part of our group will be returning to the U.S.A. and will leave today. They will stop in Hawaii for two days of sun and surf and then on to L.A. Nine of us will stay here for a few days and then fly to Seoul, Korea, for a large junior (age 19 & under) meet. I am one of the lucky ones and will stay here and then on to Korea.

We all go to the airport to say goodbye. I had no idea it was going to be this hard. I stand there looking at people that I have grown so close to and even though they are going back to the States, I wonder if I will see them again. After a couple of embraces, I try to force the tears back...and can't. I also say a short goodbye to Coach C. who is leaving with them. I say short because he will take them home and two days later board a plane with about 55 more athletes bound for Korea and the Seoul Junior Open Meet. Our group of nine will meet him there the next day.

Back at the hotel, we pack our bags and move to another hotel next to the stadium so we can workout the next few days without having to take a taxi. It sure is quiet around here without the team that has gone and we find ourselves talking about the wonderful experiences of the past week and getting excited about the trip to Korea.

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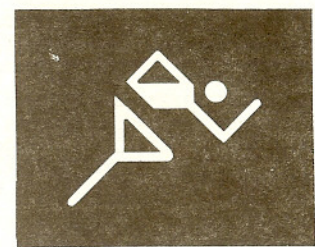
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HIGH SCHOOL TRACK

The Coach Says ...

CURTISS LONG (Western Kentucky): "We're not trying to be a dual meet team. We're looking to have the entire team healthy and ready for the Ohio Valley Conference meet".

FRED WILT (Purdue): "We have only a few weak spots. We've had some good luck this year. This is surely our strongest team ever. Our freshmen have been excellent and they have come through big".

TONY TENISCI (Washington State): "I saw it first in Russia (women's hammer throw) and West Germany in 1971. They used it as a training exercise for coordination and shoulder strength. Our throwers love it. In fact, they'd rather do it than anything else. It's a special experience, a whole different sensation than shot or discus. You have to be an ATHLETE to do it. It's a very technical event".

CAROL STEVENSON (Indiana): "The team performed very well (at Carbondale) under the awful weather conditions. The wind was so strong that the rain was coming down parallel to the ground".

JIM KLEIN (Boise State): "We are very well balanced this year and have had some very good performances".

BEV ROUSE (Arkansas): "We had several good performances last week in the Arkansas Relays. We've been pointing to the outdoor season since we first began workouts in the fall. It's evident our kids are ready to run".

VERN GAMBETTA (California): "I couldn't be more pleased with the progress of the team. We're coming along right on schedule and improving at a good rate, especially considering how young we are".

RANDY SMITH (Moorhead State): "The weather has certainly been unusual this spring. I don't know how it will affect us mentally, but I think we should be ready. It's been difficult to practice, and I know it's disappointing to our squad members to get ready for a meet and then have it cancelled".

It's a curse we have to live with. Unless, of course, some 30 million folks wake up tomorrow and start throwing the javelin.

That's about the only way these specialty track and field shoes can get the recognition they deserve. Better make that — the sales they deserve.

Because we consider an American record in the triple jump, or a world record for the discus, and a world best at sea level in the long jump... little things like that... to be recognition enough.

If we didn't, we wouldn't invest so much time and technology in a bunch of off-beat shoes. We certainly wouldn't waste money advertising them.

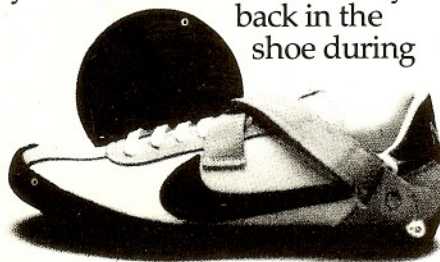
We do. And that's enough of that. Now, for the infamous Nike Seven:

1. PV 19. The whole point of this shoe is to give pole vaulters a stable jumping platform. And do it with a minimum of weight. The two-color jumping/running spike plate and reinforced nylon upper will help get you



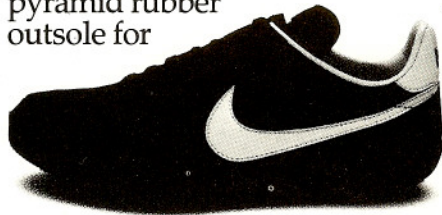
up there. Getting down is your problem.

2. SD 73. Never was fit so critical. When you're throwing the shot, or the discus, you want the foot held firmly back in the shoe during



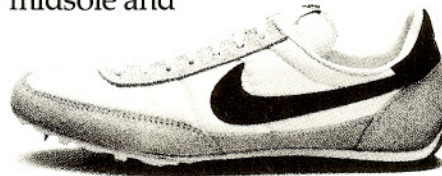
the powerful turning and lifting phases. That's why the criss-cross straps. You also want a non-stretch nylon upper for lightness and durability. A wrapped, textured outsole for excellent traction. And wear. On any ring surface.

3. HJ 8. Floppers and straddlers have one thing in common. Namely, the need for superior spring and lift. Here it is, with a full length, one-piece spike plate, good for either style. Plus pyramid rubber outsole for



better traction. And a nice snug fit. The HJ 8 also comes with matching non-jumping shoe.

4. TJ 60. It's three shoes in one, actually. With both midsole and



outsole wrapped-up at the heel, so triple jumpers can take advantage of its unique "rocker" effect. Reinforced with suede side panels. Metal eyelets for longer shoe life. Impressive, three times over.

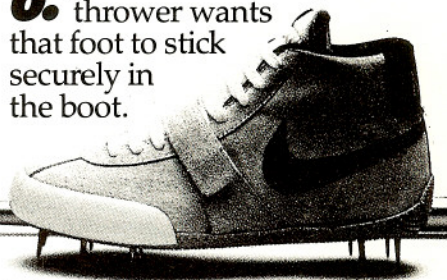
5. LJ 29. True, you don't have to be a world-class long jumper to feel the extra



traction and lift that come from this six hole spike plate. But it helps. Built for extended flight,

the LJ 29 not only has suede side panels for stability and strength, but an extra nylon panel to protect the toe area during take-off.

6. J 300. The serious javelin thrower wants that foot to stick securely in the boot.



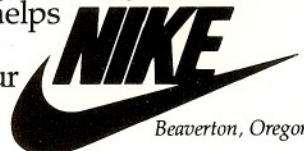
Thus the lateral support strap. You also want it to stick in the ground. So the J 300 comes with six spike holes in the forefoot, four in the rear. About the only thing that won't stick is the toe, thanks to a hefty wrap-around guard.

7. El Viento. Built for one of the true minority groups, the El Viento gives race walkers a unique midsole and wedge arrangement to cushion and stabilize the foot. A beveled heel allows for smoother



heel strike. Plus longer wear to the Anatomical Outsole.™

You have to wear these shoes to appreciate them. That's easier said than done, however. While they may be the most sophisticated models on the market, most places don't want anything to do with them. Which is nice. Because when it comes time for you to buy shoes, it always helps to know who your friends are.
