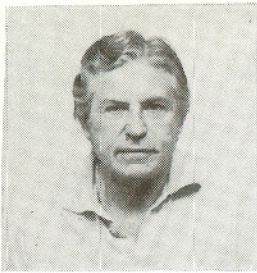

REEL OFF

Some observations from the Silver Anniversary of the Mt. San Antonio Relays:

It may take some time, but the future of women's track in the USA looks good. Although there were no earth shattering marks, competition in the junior college division was an eye-opener. Not too many years ago, it was tough to get meet management to include more than three or four women's events in

the entire program. Now the community colleges have a full day of competition with most of the individual events plus seven different relays. If Mt. SAC is any indication, things are looking up. For example the sprint medley and distance medley relays each had 20 teams entered - that's 160 runners in two events. There were 27 high jumpers, 27 shot putters, 24 3000m runners, 23 1500 runners, 21 javelin throwers and on and on.

Of course the high school division was filled. 24 teams in the 4x200, 24 in the 4x400, 15 teams in the shuttle hurdles - that's 45 hurdlers. Remember when it took much coaxing to get a "girl" to try going over a hurdle? There were 29 high school shot putters, 46 in the 3k and 1500. Every school in the meet had a distance medley team - it looked like a feminine invasion when they came on the field. Lord knows how many teams were in that race.

On the other hand, the Invitational events seem to have lost some of their appeal and glamour. We tried to put our finger on the reason, and the best we can come up with is these events are rushed through so fast there is no time to savour the anticipation. In past years there were fewer events (both men and women), they were spaced farther apart and before the race the athletes were introduced to the spectators and the pre-race anticipation provided the goose bumps. Now it is difficult for the announcer to get the introductions in before the starter has his gun up. I would rather have just the Invitational events and drop the Open events or put them on the program another day. The Open 800 is run, five minutes later the women's 800 goes and in another five minutes there goes the men's Invitational. A body simply can't assimilate all that information, sort it out and decide who to watch.

One other point - wish the Southern California starters would throw away their whistles and start races as the rules state, by voice.



Weather has been most important in our sport this year. Yet another meet bit the dust - er, rain or snow or sleet or hail. The Iowa State Invitational was postponed a week because of bad weather, then cancelled entirely - because of bad weather....There's a new book out called "The Athlete's Kitchen". Much info on nutrition et al, but best part is the two hundred plus recipes plus information on how to gain muscle weight, guidelines on effective carbohydrate use, vitamin and mineral intake and such. Nancy Clark. 666 Fifth Avenue, NY 10103. \$3.95....According to Ruth Berkey, head of NCAA Championships, there are 182 schools in Division I track, 114 in Division II and 162 in Division III....Oregon hasn't lost a dual meet to a Northwestern opponent since Seattle Pacific downed them 68-59 in 1978....Washington State reports it has never rained on any Cougar women's track meet held in their Mooberry Stadium since it was built in 1980 - pretty good record for the northwest!

Here's a result that would tax the stability of any coach. At the Southcoast Conference Junior College Championships in Southern California recently, Mt. San Antonio College won the 100, went 1-2 in the 200, won the 400, won the 1500, was second in the 800, 3000 and long jump and won both relays - but lost the meet to Cerritos 148-132....Like the "Ed Adams Invitational" held at Hartnell College. Entries were the top 27 Northern California Community College athletes in each event. Scoring was done by the International Table and the meet winner was the school with the most points of the combined men and women performers. Plus a huge barbeque for 1000 following the meet....

The National Women's Marathon Squad of England now wears specially created Squad "vests" and shorts in a striking pink design. All Squad members have been provided with special pink tracksuits (warmups), vests, shorts and T-shirts....Washington heptathlete Diane Baumann has been lost for the year with stress fractures in BOTH legs....Washington also announces the signing of Shirley Walker from Seattle. Walker is the 1982 Junior Olympic 100 hurdles champion....

Latest in the Lydia DeLaVega story from the Philippines is the announcement by police they have broken up the attempt to kidnap Lydia who was to have been held for ransom. Watch your step in Manila. Couple of years ago a Taiwanese hurdler won the 110's, went into the stands and was shot by a spectator....Since praising the Nebraska brochure, we have received other fine productions which require praise - Wisconsin, Texas, Oklahoma, Oregon, Iowa State, Houston, Kansas State. SAC Relays heptathlon and distance runner Beth Weber was hit by a car while training. This is Weber's second time to be struck by a car. Weber is deaf....Oregon's Ghana sprinter Grace Bakari is finally back running. She severed her Achilles tendon with a broken glass in a freak accident nearly a year ago....

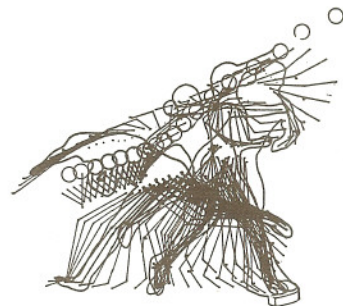

NCAA UPDATE

In the March issue of WTFW, we published our prediction of the Top 30 Teams at this year's NCAA Championships in Houston. In the two months since publication, things have changed. Here's our quick update on the NCAA's as of May 8: (We'll have our usual "NCAA Handicap" at Houston for readers).

1-UCLA. Must give the Bruins a sort of "wishy-washy" rating. As of this date, Bolden and Griffith have run only one competitive century with Bolden winning at Mt. SAC 11.48 to 11.52 - a far cry from their 1982 bests of 11.16 and 11.12. LaShon Nedd, who placed in the 100, 200 and 400 last year has yet to break 11.70 or 24 flat or 54 seconds. Arlise Emerson, with 51.79 to her credit in 1982, is not yet under 54 seconds. Brenda Peterson, 2:04.97 for 800 in '82, has not even run a two lapper and is barely under 61 for the 400 hurdles. Prep star of '82, Vicki

Cook has done zip, Sandy Myers Leung, the 1981 National 400 hurdles champion has not broken 60 seconds. On the plus side, Linda Goen appears to be running as well as ever with 4:19.9 for 1500. Michele Rush is still consistent in all the distances. Jackie Joyner is gang-busters in the heptathlon and Tonya Alston is a possible scorer in the seven-eventer. Brightest new star has been freshman Poly Plumer who has run well in the 1500, but she is still a freshman and inconsistent. Relay teams are coming along with 45.27 and 3:34.64. Suzie Ray has been up and down in the javelin and hep. Threw 178'1 early in the year, now stays under 165. Lindy Toman has improved in the weights, but still its not enough. If the Bruins get their motor running, they will still be tough, but compared to March, they must be classed a few rungs lower.

2-TENNESSEE. Coach Crawford has the Tennessee crew operating on nearly all cylinders. Old faithful's Rattray, Fitzgerald, Clark and Walton are still tough and ready to go. The plus for Tennessee has been their new athletes or old athletes revived. Sharrieffa Barksdale has now become the nation's number one intermediate hurdler. Australian import Allison Quelch should be an NCAA placewinner in the

distances. Newcomers Kelia Polton in the 400, Veronica Findley and Ilrey Oliver give the Vols some speed. Oralee Fowler has surprised with her renewed vigor and 53.67 clocking in the 400. Pat Walsh has already improved her shot and discus marks to 50'8 and 184'6 and Jackie Wallace is close to 180' in the platter. Myrtle Chester has upped her heptathlon score. The 4x100 and 4x400 teams are threats with 44.79 and 3:32.77 (done without Walton!). On the negative side, not much has been heard from veterans Kathy Hadler or Linda Portasik. But the pluses outrank this minus. Move Tennessee up a notch. They'll be hard to beat.

3-OREGON. Bye-bye, Ducks. In spite of some remarkable improvement by a number of athletes, the Oregon Ducks

won't finish in third place. They have lost Leann Warren and javelinist Sally Harmon, both national champions. Eryn Forbes has not run for a couple of months. High jumper Sheri Collins is injured. They are zilch in the two relays. They have nothing in the sprints. Lynda Hughes has only now begun to throw the javelin as she is capable - 188'1 at Mt. SAC. The Ducks, incidentally, have four spear throwers on the US List to date, (Hughes 188'1, Rouse 171'9, Vobora 160'11 and Karen Martin 162'6). Kathy Hayes, of course, is red hot, Kim Roth and Lisa Martin are running well. Lexie Miller Peck is a consistent competitor. And Quenna Beasley weekly improves Oregon records in the shot and discus, now 51'6 and 174'3. Whether or not these marks will

score at Houston is a question. Drop the Ducks down a few notches.

4-ARIZONA. Arizona has Meg Ritchie (214'4 and 62'3 3/4) for a starter. Unfortunately, Ritchie is just about the end too. Kim Gallagher dropped out of school. Irish sprint champion Michelle Walsh has done little. Robin Marks, the 1981 national 400 hurdles champion has broken 60 seconds only once. The Wildcats will not score in either relay. Bright spots are the

improvement of Becky Levi from 159'2 in the disc last year to 178'1; the high jumping of freshman Katrina Johnson (6'1 1/4), and the improvement by Laura Lim who has marks of 23.67 for the 200 and 13.41 for the short hurdles. Ruth Waithera has done well in the 400 and will be a scoring threat at Houston. Poor Arizona comes down a few pegs, too.

5-HOUSTON. The enigma team for 1983. With Washington, Jefferson, Underwood, Glover, Mastin and Lewis one would think they would be world beaters. They haven't been. On occasion they rise, but they are not consistent. Dana Olson is lost for the year, Kym Carter, the 6'2 1/4 high jumper, is not competing. Lewis will be tough to beat in the LJ and Patsy Walker, now back in good health, will be a heptathlon threat (5691 this year). Rachel Clary keeps improving in the 400 hurdles, but must cut quite a bit more from her time to score. The two relay teams will be in the fight all the way. Competing at home on their own track and in front of their home crowd won't hurt the Cougars one bit. Keep Houston just about where it is.

6-CS LOS ANGELES. Another enigma. With personnel competing for various track clubs during the season, one never knows who is available or who will represent the Diablos at Houston. They ran their first "together" 4x100 on May 7 - a not-so-bad 44.24, then got together for the first time later that

afternoon for a 3:35.14 4x400. Jennifer Inniss ran her first 100 also on May 7 - a sizzling 11.1s. She has yet to long jump, but we imagine she will do so before qualifying time has passed. What of the "Howard's"? Deann doing well with 23.34 and 52.74. Tina not cutting much of a swath. Sherri not competing at all. Diane Williams is not running as well as last year - yet, at least. Sharon Dabney appears to be on a good course for top condition at Houston. She's running 200's and 800's - watch out for Dabney in Houston. IF - and that's a big one - these Diablos can get acquainted with each other before Houston, they might finish in the top 10 - but those sprints and relays are going to be killers!

7- NEBRASKA. Who was the dummie who put Nebraska in SPVENTH place? Very doubtful Ottey is going to lose whatever she takes part in - and we suspect it will be the 100, 200 and both relays. Her supporting speed cast includes Marcia Tate, Janet Burke, Angela Thacker, Rhonda Blanford and Nicole Ali - zounds! Biggest surprise has been Thacker who has improved from 11.52 to 11.20w, 23.91 to 23.07w and 19'11 to 21'5 1/4. Thacker's problem is inconsistency - but she is a freshman. Big plusses for the Huskers

are a trio of imports, most important of which is Denise Thiemard (Switzerland) who has tossed the javelin over 190 in three of four meets. That reads first place at Houston. A second import who has improved tremendously is Marjan Goedhart (Holland) who has scored 5638 in the heptathlon (up 400 points from 1982) - and she did it with a sub-par long jump (she has been over 20'5). The third jewel in the crown is Kristi Voldness. Although she has not recorded spectacular times outdoors to date, remember she was second in the NCAA indoor 1000. Just to add to the insurance, Karen Wood has come alive in the weights. With no mark in 1982, she has thrown the shot 51'5 1/2 this year and has improved in the disc from 162'2 to 169'0. The Huskers have three 100m hurdlers on the US list. In addition to Blanford (13.57), they have Stephanie Thomas (13.55w) and Deborah Powell (13.91w). Their relay teams will be in the thick for the gold, and with Ottey anchoring, their times of 43.80 and 3:34.65 to date will have to go. Move Nebraska up there with Tennessee and UCLA!

8-STANFORD. Drape this column with black. Things are not so hot down on the Farm. What a contrast with this team! Carol Cady has become the fastest improving athlete in the country. She came from a 1982 shot mark of 52'3 to 56'0 3/4 in 1983. The disc even a greater improvement from 179'0 to 197'8. Allison Wiley was runner-up to Grete Waitz for the World Cross Country Championship and has improved her PR in the 1500 and will do so soon in the 3000 and 5000. Patti Sue Plumer has been nothing short of sensational and is a big scoring threat at Houston - as high as gold. Regina Jacobs is right on schedule, which means she will be tough at Houston. Mary Osborne, the javelin Olympian, did nothing until May, then suddenly 173'7 - she's back. BUT! Kim Schnurpfel has run only once, a 17:15 5000. Ceci Hopp has not appeared, nor has Ann Locke or Michelle Mason. Ellen Lyons ran a 16:28.35 5k in early February and hasn't been heard from since. Sprinter/hurdler Pam Donald has done zip to date. Drop Stanford out of the Top Ten.

9-FLORIDA STATE. The same person who ranked Nebraska 7th must have put Florida State 9th! The Lady Seminoles have been red hot. Like Nebraska, everyone is coming along fine. Unfortunately for FSU, nearly all of their power is in one division - speed. But they have plenty of that. Randy Givens (11.24w and 23.04), Brenda Cliette (11.24w and 23.54), Marita Payne (11.43, 22.94w and 52.54) start things off. Angie Wright has moved to the 400 hurdles where she has recorded 57.62 - FSU has four 400m hurdlers on the US list. Help comes from Margaret Coomber in the 800 and 1500 - a possible point getter at age 32 (or 33?) - Wendy Markahm, over six feet in the high jump, and Ovrill Brown, a reformed half miler now running the 400 hurdles. Piper Bressant also gallops the 400 barriers under 59 (58.43) and could score. The relay teams are both Number One in the nation as of this writing - 43.58 and 3:32.28 in defeating Tennessee at the Penn Relays. Move these people up in the first division and get Lisa Morton off my back!

10-VIRGINIA: Virginia is yet another team with all its eggs in one basket - distance. And the basket isn't very full right now. Lisa and Lesley Welch are not around - actually Lisa has trudged a race or two, but not the way she would like. Jill Haworth has done little outdoors. Only Martha White and Mary Jean Wright have made much progress for Coach Cradock. Lisa Garrett is a journeyman quartermiler but will have to hustle to score at Houston. The Hatchett girls help in dual meets but will watch the NCAA finals from the stands. Ann Bair has been the best of the Virginian's to date with her 6'2 mark in the high jump and 5378 in the heptathlon. We must realistically take Virginia down a few rungs.

11-TEXAS: The surprise bunch of 1983. Texas defeated Nebraska but lost to Tennessee in a meeting early in the year, and they have been performing better than expected. They do not have depth, but the athletes they do have are doing well. Sprinters Susan Shurr (23.64 and 22.59w) and freshman Jamaican Juliet Outhbert (11.39w) are the basis for the 4x100 and 4x400 teams (45.31 and 3:38.66). Tara Arnold has run well in the 800 and 1500 (4:19.25). Jo Beth Palmer has gotten better in the weights (49'4 and 163'4) and is assisted by Dedi Kavanaugh, Mary Chrobak and Lori Kakkola. Nothing heard from touted frosh Jill Redo and Terry Turner. Texas could make it to the Top Ten, but it won't be easy.

12-ARIZONA STATE: We evidently were expecting too much from the Sun Devils. Twelfth would be a bit much, but they get a great start from Leslie Deniz, the new American record holder in the disc. Jennifer Lemke is over 51 feet in the shot and might tally. Sabrina Peters might score in the 1500 (4:26.02) or 3000 (9:24.48). Rhonda Paine has been a surprise in the long jump at 20'10 3/4 and Dodie Campbell has wafted the wand 169'6. They have a fair 4x100 team (45.67) but nothing in the longer batoner. ASU should finish in the Top Fifteen.

And now a quick look event by event without dwelling on members of the twelve teams discussed above:

100/200: Sheila LaBome of Prairie View credited with a legal 11.22 sprint marks from PV and Texas Southern and Southern and Grambling are always suspect. LaBome has also run in the 11.9's and has been beaten in 11.5 or 6...Washington's Junior Pan Am champ Donna Dennis has not lived up to expectations. The environment is not good for fast sprinting in the north-west part of the country, so there's no telling how fast she may be. Her only outing in California saw a good 23.74 at Berkeley, but the slow times during the season may affect her mental condition...Former Nebraska sprinter now at Wichita State, Alicia McQueen. A scoring possibility (11.41w)...Lisa Thompson, UNLV, is an experienced campaigner with fast marks, but seems to fold in the big ones...Clotee Cowans, Northeast Louisiana State. Never know if these athletes will show up. Has an 11.29w century...Kansas State's Donna King has been coming on nicely, improving as the season progressed. She just could be a sleeper...Missouri Nigerian Rufina Mbah started out well, but has tapered off in recent weeks. (11.47w)...Gwen Loud, Hawaii. Better known as a long jumper, Loud sped to a legal 11.24 clocking in Honolulu. She is a veteran which will be to her credit, but that's pretty fast - even for Honolulu...Barbara Bell, New Mexico, ran a couple of good ones at the California Invitational and may be peaking at the right time.

400: Diane Dixon, Ohio State, who ate up the runners on the indoor circuit, finally came up with a good performance on May 8 when she won the Jesse Owens Games in 52.64....Lori McCauley, Rutgers, is one of those enigmas. Has the talent and runs some swift races (53.04), then sputters. May opt for the 400 hurdles (a wise choice)....Easter Gabriel of Prairie View has beaten most of the good ones at one time or another this season. Best of 53.06 for 1983. Won the Cal meet over good runners in 53.24.

800: Louise Romo will probably opt for the 1500, but would be a threat if entered here. A smart runner with talent. Can't do much better than that!....The aforementioned Campbell of Oklahoma runs pretty well twice around (2:05.01) and is a threat at this distance....Clemson's Tina Krebs is one of a stable of fine distancers from the Tigers (2:04.08). The entire herd of Clemson distancers seem to vary from week to week. If "on", she should do well....Others include Donna Curtis

1500: Romo again, of course (4:16.24), a smart cookie...San Luis Obispo's Amy Harper, if she gets through the Division II ordeal, could be a factor. Hasn't been touted highly, but always runs well....Veteran Rose Thomson of Wisconsin. If healthy might score pretty high. Much experience and a lotta talent....Richmond's Jo White, after being predicted for an outstanding season, hasn't done much. But she could!....A couple more foreign performers in Bernadette Madigan (Kentucky) and Aisling Molloy (BYU). Molloy was the indoor champ and Madigan has been around. Both under 4:20...Sandra and Susan Gregg of Washington. Sandra has the fastest time (4:21.86), but Susan beat her in their only meeting (4:24.72). Long shots.

3000: What looked to be the great distance crop in 1983 has fallen apart. Gone are Warren, Schnurpfeil, Hopp, Gallagher, the Welch's, Lyons, Forbes, Locke, Mason and others are not up to par. Watch for Middle Hamrin (Lamar), Regina Joyce (Washington) - if she stays home - Michigan's Sue Foster and Clemson's Stephanie Weikert. All run under 9:19.

5000: Again keep the eyes peeled for Hamrin and Cal Poly's Harper. Betty Springs is back in good form at North Carolina State, sub, and Beth Farmer (Florida) just had success running in Israel. Nan Doak of Iowa, Tokyo marathon champ Carrie May (Back to Ol' Virginie), A couple of Robinsons from Clemson and North Carolina State, Madigan and Harvard's Kate Wiley plus Cathy Branta of Wisconsin. All are in the 15:40-16:18 range.

10000: Farmer is better at this distance as is May and Joyce. Springs will be tough and so will Harvard's Wiley. Utah's Jill Molen runs a good one ever so often, but can't be depended on every time. SHOT PUT: No one is really going to give Ritchie any problems for the gold, but Peggy Pollock (CSLR) has been consistently beyond 54 feet and several times beyond 55 feet....Maryland's Marita Walton is also over 55 feet while Rice's Pappa Pushed Regina Cavanaugh and Elaine Sobansky (Penn State) are both beyond 53 feet.

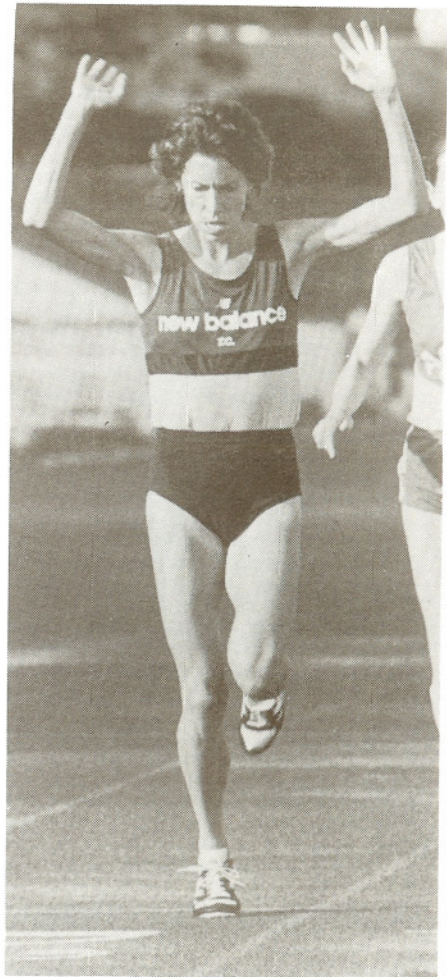

Joyner, the NCAA and TAC heptathlon champion was scheduled to perform in seven events, but took part of the day off (reluctantly...she says she needs the work) competing in ONLY five events and counting in 23 of the Bruin point total.

She tied the meet record in the long jump (19'6"), set a meet record during an upset win in the 100m hurdles (14.02), won the 200m, took second in the 400m behind Jeanette Bolden, and ran a leg for the Bruin's winning 4x100 relay team. She did not high jump - owing to a decision by the coach - or run the mile relay for the meet had been decided by then.

The strength of the distances in the ACC was evident with outstanding marks in the 1500, 5000 and 10000. The weakness of the ACC in nearly all of the other events was also evident. Except for some routine putting of the shot and throwing of the disc by Maryland's Maria Walton and a satisfactory heptathlon score by Virginia's Ann Bair, there was little to cheer.

MT. SAC RELAYS

Walnut, California, April 21/24: The Silver Anniversary production of the Mt. San Antonio College Relays was a conglomeration of good and almost good performances. The meet has grown so large one does not have time to anticipate a great race or savor its results. Only the next day does one really begin to understand what went on in the magic arena. Starting guns are fired so often it is impossible to keep up with what's going on. Announcers are never quiet for they must report pre-race information and post-race results within a three or four minute period - plus play-by-play of the race in progress. Too much, too much. Cull the best for 1984!

Best performance of the meet is debatable - depending on if you're a "track" person or a "field" person. Evelyn Ashford, making a rare appearance in 1983, sped through 200 meters in a swift 22.07, aided by a +2.37mps wind. Ashford did not have everything her own way. Chandra Cheeseborough, finally a matured runner, stayed with Ashford around the bend and stuck like glue the first part of the home straight. Only over the final 50 meters could Ashford pull away. Cheeseborough was clocked in 22.30. Diane Williams, who has not been running well to date, finished in 22.65 for her best race of the year. Grace Jackson (Atoms) was also under 23 seconds.

The "field" event had to be the discus where, in spite of the absence of Leslie Deniz with muscle problems, a great duel ensued. Former American record holder, Lorna Griffin, threw 194'7. That got her fourth place! Stanford's fast improving Carol Cady had an effort of 197'0 for third and will soon be over that magical 200 foot mark. Meg Ritchie tossed the disc 214'4 for second and Ria Stalman had a PR to win with 220'6.

Karin Smith returned to the javelin wars in this meet and won with a throw of 211'11 for a new meet record, a couple of inches better than Kate Schmidt's old mark. Schmidt was late in arriving, (the event had already begun when she got to the gate), did not get to warm up properly and did not qualify for the final rounds. Lynda Hughes, fighting a sore elbow in 1983, made her preliminary throws from a 5-6 step approach but moved back for a full run in the finals and managed her season best at 188'1 for the silver.

A good field showed for the 1500 (see cover photo). Jan Merrill, Michele Bush, Linda Goen, Louise Romo, Brenda Webb, Kathy Hayes, Ann Harper, Monica Joyce among others. Bush led by a whisker after the first lap, Amy Harper was in front by a nose at the 800 in 2:18.5. Merrill made her move on schedule and led after three laps in 3:27 but the field was tightly bunched all the way. California's Louise Romo merely sat in third or fourth all this time and closed with a rush to win it in 4:16.24 as only a second separated first from fourth. Hayes closed the fastest of all to grab second over Merrill. Romo's splits were 69.6,

2:19, 3:28 with a final 400 in 65.4.

Another good field showed up for the 800. For years we have been watching Deann Gutowski take the lead in 800's, keep it for 400 to 600 meters, then fade into oblivion. This time the plucky runner went to the front and stayed there, winning in 2:03.92. Gutowski led Cynthia Warner and Ranza Clark at the 200 in 28.6, led the same two at the 400 in 60.8, led the same two at the 600 in 1:31.8 with Monica Joyce moving up into fourth, and led the field across the finish line. The surprise of the race was the speed of Cindy Bremser who came from the back of the pack to grab second in 2:04.20.

Carol Lewis and Gwen Loud both hopped a good 21'8 1/4 in the long jump, Lewis without and Loud with the aid of wind. Lewis won the gold via second-best jump routine. Coleen Sommer bested Debbie Brill in the high jump, both ladies clearing 6'2 3/4.

UTEP's Charmaine Crooks put herself right into the NCAA 400m picture with her 53.19 win over one lap. Gwen Gardner set a too fast pace and paid over the final 75 finishing third behind Jackie Pusey and Crooks.

Stephanie Hightower won the short hurdles in a legal 13 flat over Kim Turner (13.13) and Sherrieffa Barksdale gave Tennessee a big NCAA boost by winning the 400 hurdles in the nation's fastest time to date, 56.75. Barksdale, who was just learning the event at the close of the 1982 campaign, beat a good field which included Sandra Farmer, Edna Brown, Tonya Brown, Lexie Beck, Kim Whitehead and Robin Marks. The first five were under 59 seconds.

Eleanor Simonsick captured the 10k before most of the fans had arrived in a fine 32:58.6 over Oregon's Lisa Martin.

The "Open Division" 1500 held on the 23rd also produced a good result with Robin Campbell winning in 4:17.16 over Regina Jacobs (4:17.96) and Aisling Molloy (4:19.58). Also in the "Open Division", Patti Sue Plumer captured the 3000 with a fast 9:09.4 over Merrill with 9:13.2.

In the relay events, the top performance came from the Athletics West 4x800 team which set a new American record of 8:17.09. The old mark of 8:19.8 was set by National team four years ago. Sue Addison opened with 2:06.8, Lee (Ballenger) Arbogast ankled 2:02.0, Mary Decker provided a 2:01.5 and Chris Mullen anchored in 2:06.8.

Other relays were rather routine. Best of the lot was an "Olympic Development Team" of Jeanette Bolden, Florence Griffith, Alice Brown and Cheeseborough who galloped 43.67 to win the 4x100. Earlie Bolden had won the Invitational 100 over teammate Griffith in 11.48, the first real run of the year for these two sprinters.

Jackie Joyner competed in her first heptathlon of the year and came up with her best-ever score of 6161. The mark cannot be accepted as a collegiate record due to a wind-aided hurdle race, but for a first-effort of the year, the score can not be discredited. Although the competition was almost the best possible in the US (Frederick was not present), it was all over after the first event where Joyner ran that wind-aided 13.94. The UCLA student had a good series with a high jump of 5'9 3/4, a shot toss of 38'2 3/4 and a 23.85 200 on the first day. Joyner began with a 20'11 1/4 hop the second day, threw the spear 129'10 and had a good 800 in 2:11.82. Just a thought - do you think the East Germans would let a 6161 point heptathlete play basketball?

KANSAS RELAYS

Lawrence, Kansas, April 21/23: The 58th Annual Kansas Relays provided its usual good marks in spite of not too cooperative weather. A handful of visiting Russians made the meet more interesting as they monopolized the 800, 1500, 3000 and 4x880 relay.

From an American viewpoint, Nebraska dominated the meet. Merlene Ottey scampered 200 meters in a wind-aided 22.11 with teammate Angela Thacker next across the line in 23.07. Thacker had a busy weekend with her second in the 200 plus a win in the 100 (11.20w), a win in the 4x110, a second in the sprint medley and a second in the long jump at 21'5 1/4. Plus trial heats. Nebraska's Swiss javelin thrower, Denise Thiernard, who has been over 190 feet the past two weeks, showed she is human by tossing the spear only 163'2 - still good enough for the gold. The Huskers sprint medley team was upset by Morgan State, Marjan Goedhart scored 5638 to win the heptathlon including a 5'9 high jump and 19'11 1/2 long jump, (she cleared 20'5 1/4 in the open long jump), and the Nebraska hurdlers went 1-2-4 in the 100 barriers with times of 13.50, 13.55 and 13.91 - wind aided.

The long jump was very good with two over 21 feet - perhaps this event, too, was wind aided. The 5000 was a spotlight for Illinois State with the Redbirds snatching first and second with Wendy Van Mierlo and Sara Schumacher.

As for the Russians, their domination was complete. They went 1-2-3 in the 800, 1-2 in the 1500, won the 3000 and the 4x880. And they didn't appear to work too hard. The effect of running against the Russians was apparent in the 800. All three Russians ran faster in the final than in their trial heats. All 9 American collegians ran slower in the final than in the trials!

ON THE ROAD AGAIN By Jack Welch

No big head here. When you last tuned in, I had just made a most audacious prognostication regarding the winners of the 1983 BAA Marathon (Boston, April 18). As you remember, I predicted Greg Meyer and Eleanor Simonsick. Ah, such accuracy. Meyer, of course, won rather easily, establishing a course record of 2:09 flat. Simonsick probably would have won, if she had entered and Joan Benoit had not. Miss Benoit - actually, not all that close of a friend of mine - virtually guaranteed me, personally, that she would not participate in this year's race. Apparently, she changed her mind.

Benoit, the 25-year-old coach at Boston University, appeared in Hopkinton intent on breaking the world record (2:25:29) jointly held by Allison Roe and Grete Waitz. Waitz had tied the

mark at the London Marathon the previous day. Just to make things more interesting, Roe was in Boston rather hopeful of re-establishing her pre-eminence. She need not have bothered.

2:22:43 is the new world record for the marathon by a woman. Oh, what a woman! Benoit blitzed the first 10k in 31:50, and never looked back. She passed 10 miles in 51:38, and went past the halfway point in 1:08:23. Obviously, all of Benoit's long splits bettered existing standards. It was quite a performance.

You may hear some discussion of the salubrious conditions which accompanied Benoit's accomplishment - cloudy skies with temperatures in the 40's...a 15 mph tailwind most of the way. Okay, optimal weather, but Benoit still had to move her legs 26 miles 385 yards. And she prepared for her Boston effort by standing in the same chill Saturday afternoon coaching her BU squad through a track meet. The kids still came first.

Coming along ever so far back in second place was Jacqueline Gareau, breaking the 2 1/2 hour mark for the first time with 2:29:27. Almost 7 minutes back of the winner. Almost inconceivable.

Mary Shea placed third at 2:33:23 with Karen Dunn (2:33:35), Sue King (2:33:52) and Jane Wipf Logan (2:37:18) following. Karen Cossaboon-Holm (2:37:51), Mindy Ireland (2:39:05) and Maria Trujillo (2:39:51) all broke 2:40. Kim Burns logged a 2:42:09 to round out the top 10. Roe dropped out at 17 miles with a severe cramp in her leg.

The London Marathon (April 17) also had a world best, 2 runners below 2 1/2 hours and perhaps a deeper field. 10th place here went to Paula Welch at 2:39:29. Waitz got her equal best - queen for a day - at 2:25:29 while New Zealand's Mary O'Connor became the newest member of the exclusive sub-150 minutes sorority with a time of 2:28:19.

Glynis Penny earned third at 2:36:22, just one second ahead of Hungarian K. Szabo. Jillian Colwell of Australia

Benoit's 2:22:43 Marathon (From Joe Henderson's "Running Commentary"):

"For what it's worth. Joan Benoit's 2:22:43 may have been the greatest Boston performance ever, by man or woman. Consider this:

*She improved the course record by 2.7 percent. If someone did that to Alberto Salazar's Boston mark, he would run 2:06:00!

*Benoit's time would have beaten everyone in nine of every ten US races last year, including TAC's Nationals.

*She would have qualified for the men's Olympic Trials in 1976.

*She brought the women's mark within 15 minutes of the men's. Fifteen years ago, the difference was almost an hour.

*She would have won the Boston Marathon (men) as recently as 1962, led every Olympics before 1960 and held the world record in the 1940's.

Benoit averaged 5:27 miles - or put another way, four back-to-back 10-K's of 33:46. She ran the first 10 miles (51:38) at slightly better than 5:10 pace, the second 10 (she reached 20 miles in 1:46:44) at 5:30 pace and the last 10-K at 5:47 pace. Joan's first half passed in 1:08:23, and she came home in 1:14:20.

To put these incredible times into perspective, think how few women have even run one 10-K, 10-miler or half-marathon this fast."

crossed in 5th at 2:37:12, with both Ladanyi and Nagle given the same time of 2:37:42. Kathryn Binns (2:38:11) finished a full minute ahead of Rowell in 9th.

Only seven women were invited to participate in the by-invitation-only soiree known as the Rotterdam Marathon (Netherlands, April 9). Rosa Mota was the fastest in 2:32:27.

Moving away from the big-time, big-town, big-distances, we'll go to that capital of democracy, porkbarrels and pundits, Washington, D.C. 24-year-old Eleanor Simonsick broke the course record at the Cherry Blossom 10 Miler (March 27) by over 1 1/2 minutes clocking 53:46. Suzanne Girard, a junior at Georgetown University, was the runnerup in 54:13.

Allison Roe prepped for her Boston Marathon effort by winning the Milk Run 10k in that city (April 10) in 33:07. That same day Regina Joyce captured the TAC 10k Nationals (Albany, NY) crossing the finish line at 33:52. First American, Judi St. Hilaire placed second in 33:44, trailed by Ann Hird (33:52), Jacqueline Gareau (34:01) and Laurie Binder (34:02).

No one minds if I interject a little cross country, do they? I would loathe to violate someone else's turf. Margaret Groos traveled to San Vittore Olona, Italy (March 27) to participate in the prestigious 51st Cinque Milini (5 Mills). Groos covered the 4 kilometers in 18:19, nine seconds ahead of Agnese Possamai (Italy). Mary O'Connor was 4th at 18:47.

Back on the hardtop, Kiwi star Anne Audain did nothing unusual for her by winning a 10k in Little Rock, Arkansas (April 2) in 32:50. Maybe it is out of the ordinary for the New Zealander to do that in Arkansas.

Karen Dunn, the University of New Hampshire junior, toured the New Jersey Ten Miler (Cherry Hill, March 20) in a course record 55:34. Judi St. Hilaire placed 2nd in 56:10 ahead of Kare Cossaboon-Holm (56:42) and Jan Yerkes (57:58). A friend of mine, Susan Hughes - she's also a friend of Benoit's - placed 7th in 59:12.

Christine Rose, Nick's beauteous spouse, won her third consecutive title at the City Run 10k in a PR 35:14. There is some suggestion that the race - which may have occurred in Louisville, Kentucky, in late March maybe - was long.

On a definitely accurate course, Marilyn Matthews won the Pear Blossom Run (Medford, Oregon, April 10), covering 20k in 1:12:58.

"I said, 'If she's going to win it this time, she was going to have to run for it,'" explained Kitty Consolo after the 10th Chopperthon, Schenectady-to-Albany, NY, March 20. "She" was Jane Welzel, the defending champion who had beaten Consolo last year by nearly 5 minutes. Welzel did

have to run for it, as Consolo caught her at 6, 12 and 16 miles, before Jane finally pulled away. Her 30k time of 1:50:59 put her just 20 seconds ahead of Consolo. There's something positive to be said for the revenge motive.

I am convinced - despite his valiant, sometimes successful, struggle against senility, - that even so marvelous a human being as is he, can only endure so much abuse without lashing back. TORI NEUBAUER

Tori Neubauer, a 21-year-old junior at the University of Wisconsin/La Crosse, achieves the goals she sets for herself.

"She had a goal of being Conference champion in the indoor mile and two mile. She got that," says Gary Wilson, UW-L men's and women's track co-ordinator and women's cross country coach.

"She wanted to win the two mile at the NAIA Indoor Nationals and set a record and she did that," adds Wilson. Her time was 10:22.21, which broke the record of 10:37.37 she had set in the preliminaries the night before.

Neubauer also ran on the UW-L distance medley relay team at the NAIA Nationals. The foursome not only won the event, but set a record of 12:09.55, eclipsing the previous record by 32 seconds.

Last fall Neubauer won the NCAA Division III regional cross country meet, setting a new course record with a time of 16:53.8. She won the Division III National cross country meet, missing the women's championship record by three seconds with her time of 18:45. A mere 36 hours later, she traveled from Fredonia, NY, to Bloomington, Indiana, to compete in the NCAA Division I Cross Country Championships.

She was running with "the so-called big girls," says Wilson.

"Her goal was to be in the top 50," remembers Wilson. "She ran it on the button," he says, by placing 50th.

Neubauer's running career got off to less than a stellar start as a freshman at Oshkosh North High School in Wisconsin.

"I first started running cross country when I was a junior in high school. I ran track when I was a freshman. I was a sprinter," she says.

"In the winter of my sophomore year when it got too cold to run outside, I started running at the YMCA. That's when a man named David Werner pointed out to me that I had natural ability to be a distance runner and that I should work on it."

Werner, a runner himself, is the father of an All-American track runner.

Neubauer first started running because she wanted to do well in the Presidential Fitness Award Program.

"Then I guess I just got addicted to it. So my philosophy now is a lot different because of what I've achieved and all the rewards I've gained from it. I feel better about myself, I have a better attitude about life. Physically I'm in a lot better shape than when I first started out. And I think I'm a lot stronger mentally. I don't blow up on little things. I can handle stress a lot easier."

Her addiction to running has earned her the honor of being among the five finalists for the Broderick Award which is given annually to the most outstanding athlete in women's cross country in the USA.

What's a runner who has won three national championships doing at a non-scholarship school like La Crosse?

UW-L's athletic and academic programs brought her here.

"It was mostly the coaching and the program and the philosophies here. A close-knit team where people help each other out and you can go and talk to anybody at any time and the coach understands because he's not only your coach but also your friend."

The UW-L men's and women's cross country and track teams have the largest team membership of any college in the country. Participation and non-pressure are part of the philosophy of La Crosse track. The program is based on the premise that scholastic excellence comes first and running comes second. The UW-L team was national track champion in AIAW Division III in 1981-82.

"We want every athlete to come out of La Crosse with an excellent education and a desire to run for the rest of their lives," says Wilson.

He has a tentative ten-year plan for Neubauer.

"He's allowing me to mature as a runner at a slower pace, whereas I wouldn't if I was at a scholarship school," says Neubauer, who was actively recruited by scholarship schools before she chose UW-L.

She's not in a hurry.

"I'm glad that I started out with my distance running when I was older because a lot of those people get run down because of the programs, there's a lot of stress. I feel lucky that I started later, because they usually say it's ten years after you start running when you're going to peak. Peaking at age 28 is just about the right time, that's when you're at your maximum strength and all."

Neubauer runs the mile and two mile in indoor track, the 3000 and 5000 meters in outdoor.

What's her training schedule like?

"In the beginning of the track season when we come in in January, I do a lot of distance, I'm up in the 70, 75 mile range a week. As the season progresses the mileage decreases. I usually do two hard workouts a week, distances where you go a date pace, like half miles or three-quarters of a mile, sometimes quarter miles."

For the rest of the season she'll probably do 50 to 55 miles a week.

In June she'll compete in the 3000 and 5000 meter races in the NCAA Division III National Outdoor T&F Championships in Naperville, Illinois, the NCAA Division I Championships in Houston, Texas, and the TAC Championships in Indianapolis, Indiana.

"After that I'm going to decrease my mileage - it's probably going to kill me because I get so used to doing it that my body goes nuts without it. You know you need the rest, but it's hard to settle down. I'll run easy for the summer, maybe get into one or two road races just to see where I am," Neubauer says, adding she'll probably decrease to about 30 miles per week this summer.

She has another year of collegiate competition and plans to compete in marathons after she's out of school.

Any other long range goals?

"The Olympics."

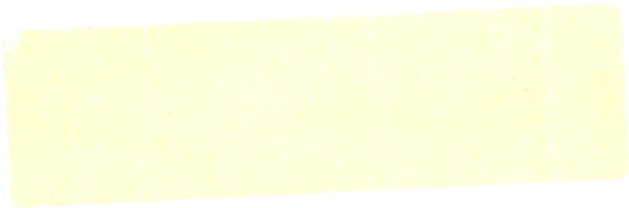
