1969 WORLD RECORDS BEGIN KILBORN GETS FIRST OUTDOOR MARK; WIECK & RALLINS SET INDOOR RECORDS

Indoor record breaking was confined to European tracks as 18 year old Barbara Wieck of East Germany romped to a new 800m mark of 2:05.3 at the European Games in Belgrade, Yugoslavia, on March 9, and Mamie Rallins of the USA took over the record for the 50m high hurdles at Kiel, Germany, on the 20th of March with a fantastic 7.0 flat race. In addition, Olympic 400m champion Colette Besson of France equalled the world mark at 400m with a 54.0 race at Belgrade on the 8th.

The new 800m record holder, Barbara Wieck, just turned 18 on February 26. She began competing at age 14, and when just 15 in 1966 ran a 2:09.0 race. She was injured in 1967, but still managed to turn a 2:09.6 time. At Mexico City last October, she ran 2:08.5 in her heat but finished fifth and was eliminated. Her best mark for the 1968 season was an excellent 2:03.7s. Barbara stands 5'8" and weighs 119 pounds. She is still in high school but will graduate this year.

Rallins has been knocking on the record-door for many, many seasons. Now nearing her 29th birthday, Rallins seems to improve with age and gives the young, novice athletes an inspiration and an example for continuing in the sport.

Outdoors, the first world record of the year went to Pam Kilborn when she ran a heat of the 100m high hurdles in 13.3 at the Australian championships. Kilborn improved to 13.1 in the final, but the race was wind-aided.

TENNESSEE WINS INDOOR TITLE

Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, March 1: In a meet cramped into a one day session, bothered by poor management, stifled by small entries and general confusion, Tennessee State University had no difficulty winning their umpteenth indoor title with 26 points, far ahead of the second place Los Angeles Mercurettes 18 - 16% of which were scored by Barbara Ferrell and Jarvis Scott.

A big field entered the 60y dash, but there was no competition for defending champion Ferrell as she ran away from the rest to win in 6.7s. Ferrell won again in the 220 over a surprisingly impressive young Darlene Green of Phoenix.

The 440 trials saw only the heat winners advance to the final - a victim of the "one day" meet. Some mighty fine 440 runners were thereby eliminated - Kathy Hammond, Nancy Schafer, Terry Hull, Lisa Chiavario, Joan Pirie, Marilyn Bastian and Delores Stoneback to mention just a few. In the final, Lois Drinkwater and Esther Stroy staged a real battle and with only one lap remaining the two were some 8 yards ahead of Jarvis Scott, but the long legged Olympian came through over the last circuit to win by a safe margin in a fine 56.4s.

Madeline Manning added a new American indoor 880y record to her collection as she waltzed off with the half mile in 2:07.9 for her best performance since Mexico. Canada's Abby Hoffman was a good second in 2:09.0 while young Cheryl Toussaint finished third. Manning also had two good relay 440's (heat and final) at 56.1 and 56.2s.

Only nine people showed up for the hurdles and the heats eliminated no one not expected. Mamie Rallins won the final in a fine 7.7 with Glotzer and the new sensation, Cheryl Rogers close behind.

Abby Hoffman came back to walk off with the mile in a world best for the year at 4:59.3s. Scotland-bound Cheryl Bridges was second.

Tennessee State didn't hurt their point total in the high jump as Montgomery and Baskerville finished 1-2, both jumping very well. Montgomery was over 5'10 for the first time since the Pan Am Games and Baskerville looked very good clearing 5'8. Canada's "backward" jumper, 15 year old Debbie Brill, was third at 5'6.

Irena Szewinska of Poland won the long jump after being eliminated in the semi-finals of the 60y sprint. This was not one of Uncle Sam's best events as Martha Watson was the first American to place behind the Pole and two Canadians, none of whom jumped what might be called far.

Maren Seidler had her best shot put mark of the year as she beat vastly improved Pauline Thomas of the Angels by nearly four feet. And Barbara Friedrich lost her basketball throw title, (her WHAT?), to Mary Boron of the Canton TC who won with a poor effort of 108'7, some 25 feet back

of the record.

Tennessee State tucked the title away with wins in both relays although the surprising Phoenix Track Club gave them a scare in the 4xl lap affair.

Meet management refused to give out place times for the trials, nor did they announce them. When questioned the response was, "If you don't like the way we are running this meet, go somewhere else". And, hopefully, that's just what we will do for 1970. Let's all hear it for Salt Lake City!

Boston, Massachusettes, February 1:-Debbie is back! After two good showings at Washington and Philadelphia, Debbie Thompson Brown of Jack Griffin's Frederick T&F Club, scored her first invitation victory winning the 50y dash in the very good time of six seconds flat. Deb edged Shirley Lenyoun in the fast final with Pat Hawkins (Atoms) third. Fourth place went to the still un-impressive Heide Rosendahl of West Germany.

Sports International, running with Gwen LeBlanc, Jane Burnett, Esther Stroy and Shirley Lenyoun, took advantage of poor stick work by the Atoms to win the four by one lap relay in the good time of 1:15.8s. Good back-to-back legs by Guiney and Osborne put Liberty AC into third place over hometown rivals, the Denny AC.

Esther Stroy improved on her Philadelphia performance by turning 57.1 for the quarter mile as she just nosed out Canada's Joan Fisher for the victory. Fisher was also credited with 57.1s. Michele McMillan, the little sprinter, was 3rd ahead of Johanna Danos of Sports International and New London's Jody Connolly.

Abby Hoffman came out of the north to win the Boston AA 880 by 15 yards over Francie Kraker in a time of 2:13.7s. Hoffman went to the front after Julia Brand of Baltimore led through the first two laps, and then ran away from the field which included, in addition to Kraker and Brand, third place finisher Penny Werthner of Ottowa, Canada, Deidre Moore of the Atoms who placed fourth in her first half mile of the season. Brand finished in fifth spot.

Baltimore, Maryland, February 8:-The sparse crowd at the beautiful Baltimore Civic Center was treated to some good distaff running by a fine field of athletes.

The first heat of the 60y dash brought together Boston winner Debbie Brown, Barbara Sowden of Delaware, Linda Reynolds, Mary Flint of the Shore AC, Pat Hawkins and SITC's Yolanda Maddox. Debbie promptly dispatched this group with a flashy 6.8 clocking with Hawkins second and Maddox third.

In the second of the "pick three" semi-finals, SITC's Shirley Lenyoun, Carol Thomson (Delaware TFC), Bonnie McMillin (Shore AC), Gladys Jermison (PAL), Betty Johnson (Baltimore Stridettes) and Jamaican Carmen Smith (Atoms) tangled in a close contest. Lenyoun drew a false start and then had to come on strong to stay close to Jermison as the New Yorker won, also in 6.8s. Lenyoun was second, one-tenth back, with Carmen Smith at Shirl's shoulder for the third spot.

The final saw Debbie called for a false start, but they were all off together on the second try and Jermison showed the competition what sprinting is all about by winning with a time of 6.9s. Brown was second in 6.9 with Lenyoun third in 7.0s. Heavily bandaged Carmen Smith was fourth with 7.1s.

As always in this meet the hurdles were run over the 50y distance, (at the old height and spacing). The race was a final with defending champ Mamie Rallins, Lou Ann Jones (Baltimore), Debbie Brown, Carmen Smith, Beth Miller (DTFC) and Pat Hawkins.

After considerable delay they were away with Rallins and Brown shoulder to shoulder all the way. Mamie got the nod over Debbie at the tape as both clocked 6.5s. Smith held off Hawkins for third place and Miller dusted Jones after Lou Ann banged a couple of hurdles.

Three teams - The Atoms, Ambler Olympic Club and Delaware TFC - went to the line in the four by two lap relay. The Brooklyn Club, running with Hawkins, Smith, Brenda Merritt and Michele McMillan, went through a "no contest" run to win by a full straight over Ambler and Delaware in 2:43.0 flat.

This year the meet directors, Phil Jackman and John Stewart, replaced the 880 with a 600 and again the long race of the evening proved to be of great interest, if not spectacular. The field was a good one: first section - Jane Hill (FTF) on the pole, Esther Stroy (SITC), Shelley "Shin Splints" Marshall and Canadian Abby Hoffman. Hoffman carried them thru the full run to win by four yards over Stroy and 18 over Hill and Marshall.

Second section - Rita Perkins (Atoms), Marilyn Bastian (PAL), Debbie Simmons (Atoms) and on the outside Ann Coleman (Philadelphia Haws). Bastian went to the front by a stride and she and Coleman traded one-two positions for most of the first lap. Marilyn took over on the second lap to lead and

never relinquished that lead going on to win by eight yards over ${\tt Coleman.}$

CLEVELAND KC GAMES by Jack Clowser

Cleveland, Ohio, February 22: Two Olympic Champions and record-holders were victorious in the Cleveland Knights of Columbus 29th annual indoor meet here tonight.

This city's own Madeline Manning, the 800 meters titlist at Mexico City, helped her Tennessee State team to triumph in the 880y relay, then breezed through the 880y run to win in 2:18.0 on this 12-lap banked board oval. Her time was a disappointment to the sellout throng of 8885 fans who wanted her to attack her own meet mark of 2:11.4s.

Irena Kirzenstein-Szewinska, Poland's world record holder at 200 meters, nipped her rivals in the 50 yard dash, an event which is not ideally suited for her long striding gait. She edged Mattilene Render of Tennessee State in six seconds flat, Render clocking the same time, with Iris Davis of the Tigerbelles third at 6.1 and Mary Marshall of the Cleveland Recreation Division squad fourth in 6.3s.

Manning ran the third leg of the 880y relay with Una Morris anchoring and the other two legs being handled by Render and Davis, their time of 1:44.1 missing the meet record by only two-tenths of a second. The Ohio Track Club of Columbus had 1:45.1 and the others trailed badly.

Eleanor Montgomery, another Clevelander and Tigerbelle, took the high jump at 5'8/1.725 on a surface made slippery when dampness from the Cleveland Arena's hockey ice, under the boards, seeped through. It did the same in the men's event where four 7-foot plus jumpers could do nothing better than 6'8. Estelle Baskerville, also an Olympian from Tennessee State, did 5'6 and Susan Binion of the Hamilton Olympic Club, Canada, jumped 5'4.

When Jane Burnett and Esther Stroy of the Sports International Club failed to answer the clerk of course's call for the 440, it was won by the Ohio Track Club's Beth Hudson in 58.2. She outkicked Morris who had 59 flat.

There can be no doubt but the experience gained by the young US athletes will benefit them in the years to come, but for the most part the young athletes failed to produce much excitement in international competition. The few "veterans" on the team came through with fine performances, however, as Mildrette Netter, the pride of Alcorn A&M, won the 50m sprint over Soviet speedster, cute, blond Lyudmila Zharkova; Jarvis Scott annexed the 400 meter sprint and old reliable Mamie Rallins sped to a world-equalling best of 7.1 to win the 50m hurdles.

US WHIPS WEST GERMANY; RALLINS SETS WORLD RECORD

Kiel, West Germany, March 20:-Ageless Mamie Rallins whipped Europe's fastest indoor hurdler, Inge Schell, over the 50m distance here tonight, winning with a new world best of 7.0 seconds flat. Schell, who had the world best at 7.1 previous to this race, finished second in 7.3s.

Sparked by Rallins performance, the young US aces scored a huge upset by defeating the West German team 45-37 - although contrary to the UPI report the win was not a "rout". Actually, had the West Germans won the 4xl lap relay, they would have won the meet - but they didn't, and all credit goes to the travelling youngsters from the USA.

Next best mark for the Americans was the breakthrough of high schooler Cheryl Toussaint as she whipped a good field in a lifetime best of 2:08.1s. Cheryl, who made this traveling team with a 2:12.9 at Philadelphia and finished only 4th a few days earlier against the Russians in 2:12.2 - and who had a 1968 outdoor best of 2:10.3 - suddenly improved her indoor best by nearly 35 yards to win over Rottmueller who had a respectable 2:08.2 and alter-bound Francie Kraker who had a lifetime indoor best for third at 2:09.8s.

Jan Glotzer competed in three events scoring in the high jump (3rd at 5'4%), the long jump (3rd at 18'9%) and the SHOT PUT (4m at 27'2%) less than half the distance of the winner, Marlene Fuchs at 57'6% - but good for one big point for the USA.

Belgrade, Yugoslavia, March 8/9: The IV edition of the European Indoor Games came too close to the Olympic Games. Although more than 100 girls took part in a competition in which the organization was perfect and dynamic, the performances of the athletes often seemed a little "forced" and many were far from being in good condition. Colette Besson highlighted the meet with her two records and a fine showing of class and condition. A young athlete and a veteran athlete, Barbara Weick and Karin Balzer, started or reaffirmed their good chances for Athens and the European Championship. Only one event - the high jump - was really exciting. And that is too little for such a meet. Let us hope the V European Indoor Games next year in Vienna will bring back top caliber performances and competition.

First Day: Long jump. At 9:30 a.m. the Games were opened with the women's long jump. The world's best performer for the 1969 indoor season, USSR's Tatyana Bychkova, wasn't in form so all were waiting for a duel between the long legged Polish girl Irena Szewinska and West Germany's all-arounder Heide Rosendahl. But until the fifth round the surprise leader was 17 year old Sue Scott from Birmingham, England with a good mark of 6.17/20'3. Then Irena, who had some troubles with her run-up, did a fair execution and reached 6.38/20'11½, a world seasonal best. The blond, attractive Swiss Meta Antenen placed third ahead of a deluded Rosendahl.

400m. The semi-finals showed the good effects of a very intensive cross country season work for Olympic gold medal winner Colette Besson. The French girl equalled her European best set last November with a fine 54.2. The vastly improved West German girl Christel Frese appeared to be her primary opponent. In the final Colette took the lead and soon held a 3 yard advantage over the duo of Frese and Great Britain's Rosemarie Stirling. The beautiful Soviet runner, Marina Nikanorova, placed herself in poor condition when she faltered after the gun thinking there had been a false start. Besson improved her lead to 5 yards as the field headed for the tape, but seemed to lower her pace and both Frese and Stirling closed the gap. Stirling's desperate last minute effort failed to catch the flying West German. Besson's time of 54.0 equalled the world best set by the USA's Janell Smith and both second and third place finishers had personal bests.

50mHH. The new hurdle height and spacings involve many problems for all hurdlers - even the fast and experienced ones. Polish ace Teresa Nowak fell after two hurdles failing to find the right rhythm in the first semifinal which was won by Heide Rosendahl over French girl Christiane Martinetto, while USSR's Galina Zarubina who had run 7.2 earlier in the season, was eliminated. Karin Balzer showed her great "acclimatization" to the new conditions in the second semifinal downing young UK ace Christine Perera in 7.3s. Another world ranked hurdler and finalist in the Olympic Games, pretty Polish star Betty Bednarek-Zebrowska, also failed to reach the final. In the third semifinal, Meta Antenen and the Soviet Galina Kuznyetsova caught the Bulgarian Koleva who started before the gun. In the final, after two false starts by Balzer and Lubej, the former dominated the field in 7.2, vainly followed by Kuznyetsova and Perera. Only one person, West Germany's Inge Schell, who wasn't at the meeting, has run better in the new hurdles this year (7.1). Balis over 30 year old, but still at the top of the European hurdling scene while Kuznyetsova, Perera and Antenen seem the leaders of the young generation.

High Jump. A very selected field entered the meet. Only three of the top flight jumpers of Europe were absent; Karin Schulze of East Germany, and the two Czechs Jaroslava Valentova and Olympic champion Miloslava Rezkova who did not compete indoors this season. Tonya Okorokova, (now Mrs. Lazaryeva) and Rita Schmidt were the favorites, but the entire field was excellent and an upset was highly possible.

Eight girls cleared 1.73/5'8. The Olympic silver medalist in the pentathlon, Austria's Liese Prokop-Sykora, was eliminated at 1.55/5'1, but for the first time used an effective "Fosbury" style. Others who failed were Ilona Gusen-

bauer (Austria) and Bulgarian Jordanka Blagoyeva.

At 1.79/5'10½ Czech Maria Faithova, who passed until 1.70/5'7, and the Polish Berezowska failed to clear. Okorokova had some trouble at this height as did teammate Olympic bronze medalist Valentina Kozyr, but they did clear the bar. Also over 5'10½ was France's coloured jumper Ghislaine Barnay. Of the whole field, only Rita Schmidt was incredibly sure of herself as she used only a three-step approach run to lift herself over 5'10½.

Rita cleared the bar at 1.82/5'11 5/8 on her second attempt while the surprising Blagoyeva was over on her third trial. The bar was raised to 1.85/6'0 7/8 and although the Bulgarian girl came the closest on her second attempt, both

girls failed and Schmidt won on fewer misses.

Weick seemed to get better and better as the race progressed and came home with a new world indoor best, 2:05.3s. Barbara ran 2:03.7 outdoors last year at the age of only 17! Hungarian Kulcsar held off Soviet Anna Zimina for the silver medal after the Russian had stayed far off the pace for the major portion of the race. Barbara Weick seemed to already have the international stature of a first class athlete - a new Vera Nikolic - (who did not enter due to lack of training).

Lange's lowest throw was better than the best of the second place Ivanka Khistova. East Germany's third putter, Inge Friedrich, showed much improvement to finish ahead of Hungary's Judit Bognar. Lange's best put, 17.52/52', was nearly two and a half feet from Chizhova's world indoor best, but this was Marita's only second meet of the season.





Clyde Bank, Scotland, March 22:Placing three runners in the first four finishers, the United States successfully defended its International Cross Country Championship over this 2½ mile course on a surprisingly sunny day and 42° temperature.

Led by defending individual champion Doris Brown, who repeated her 1968 triumph, the Americans scored 23 points to 35 for New Zealand, 37 for England, 61 for Ireland, 94 for host Scotland, 105 for Wales and 110 for Canada.

Running the best race of her career, 16 year old Maureen Dickson from southern California, led the field through the first 1½ miles. Brown took command at that point and was never headed crossing the line in 14:46, some five seconds ahead of Dickson who finished second.

Third was Vera Robinson of New Zealand in 14:58 and 45 came Cheryl Bridges, Indiana, in 15:00 flat. Fifth place was won by Ann O'Brien of Ireland at 15:03.

Other USA runners were: Vicki Foltz, who was in sixth place during most of the race but faded at the finish, finishing 16th in 15:34, Judy Oliver, 17th in 15:38 and Maria Stearns 19th in 15:45.



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Available Now! Nothing Else Like It! WOMEN'S 1968 OLYMPIC INSTRUCTIONAL FILM

Taken during the action at the 1968 Olympic Games in Mexico City, the new Women's Instructional Film shows 36 Olympic stars in super slow motion (some at a fantastic 140 frames a second!), and from various angles. Filmed by the official IAAF photographer, Toni Nett, these are beautiful technique studies of the world's top female athletes.

Covered are the 400m. Relay (USSR, France); 800m. (Manning, Nikolic); 80m. Hurdles (Caird, Kilborn); Shot Put (the top three medalists, plus 5th, 6th, and 7th placers); Long Jump (the top 8 finishers, plus Kirzsenstein-Szewinska); Javelin (the top five).

The film doesn't show every event, unfortunately, but there is nothing else like it available. A magnificent coaching aid that should be studied over and over again. Black-and-white. Silent, with titles. Running time: about 20 minutes.

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AUSTRALIAN REPORT; KILBORN SETS WORLD RECORD OF 13.3 FOR 100mHH from Bernie Cecins

Brisbane, Australia: Pam Kilborn, bronze hurdle medalist at Tokyo and silver medalist at Mexico City, became the first athleteof 1969 to set a new world outdoor record when she won her heat of the 100mHH at the Austrlian Championships ir 13.3s. The old mark, held by Kilborn, was 13.4s. The wind measured an allowable lm per second.

The Championships commenced with the pentathlon on March 12/13 and were marred the first day by rain, but the conditions improved for the second day which also included the 100mHH heats. The pentathlon Senior championships was won by Jeannette Tany (nee Knee) 4467, 2-Diane Pease 4421, 3-Carolyn Wright 4200. Penny McCallum won the Junior title with 4413 points followed by Lynette Tillett with 4156.

The 100mHH heats enabled Pam Kilborn to clip 0.1s off her own world record of 13.4. Heat #1, 1-Caird 14.0, 2-Helen Windred 14.5; Heat #2, 1-Pease 13.9, 2-Pam Taplin 14.4; Heat #3, 1-Kilborn 13.3, 2-McCallum 13.9.

The first day of the individual championships found a following wind of from 2.4 to 4.0 meters per second which rendered invalid several world class performances - including Kilborn's 13.1 for the 100mHH. The new Olympic hurdles event provided a tense atmosphere as there were three breaks and only on the fourth attempt did the field get away. Kilborn and Caird took the early lead, but Caird hit the third hurdle and lost rhythm as Kilborn went on to win easily in 13.1 from McCallum (13.3), Pease (13.4) with Caird 4th in 13.5s.

With Raelene Boyle showing effects from a back injury and entered only in the Junior division, Jennifer Lamy won a wind-assisted 100m final in 11.1 from Marion Hoffman (11.3) and Kaye Thomas (11.4).

The 400m was a lame affair won by Ealine Frawley 56.1 over Bennett 56.7 and WTFW reporter Katrina Graham 57.1s.

The 1500m noted continued marked improvement from Cheryl Peasley who clocked 4:28.6 to beat Brenda Carr (4:30.0) with Rae Thompson next in 4:39.4.

Long jump, (no wind details), 1-Pease 19'11¼, 2-Kilborn 19'1, 3-Katie Csardas 19'0¼. Shot put, 1-Jean Roberts 47'8½, 2-Anna Karner 44'2½. Javelin throw was marred by the fact

that organizers did not permit the use of private Held javelins and only orthodox implements were available: 1-Mary Thomas 169'7, 2-Chris Thompson 167'7, 3-Petra Rivers 165'll.

In the Junior Division Boyle won a legal 200m in 23.4, Jennifer Orr the 800 in 2:14.6, Caird the 80mH in 10.6w and Sue Culley the discus with a fine throw of 146'2.

The second day brought together Caird and Kilborn in the first race at 80mH since the Olympic final - and the 29 year old Kilborn reversed the placings by winning her 16th individual Australian title, (7th in the 80mH) in 10.7 against a headwind with Caird just beating Pease for second place in equal times of 10.8s. Lamy, with Boyle not opposing her, ran very strongly in the 200m to win easily in 23.1 from Hoffman (23.7). 800m, Peasley 2:08.1. HJ, 1-Wright 5'6½, 2-Frances Slaap 5'4. DT, 1-Roberts 165'5. 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





1968 WORLD RANKING by Jan Popper and Luigi Mengoni

This is the thirteenth year the World Rankings have been announced and the second year for printing in WOMEN'S TRACK & FIELD WORLD. The 1968 list was delayed due to the inability of contacting Jan Popper in Czechoslovakia after he returned to his home from Mexico. But late last month his ranking list was received by Luigi Mengoni in Italy and the final list was compiled. The order of ranking is based on an evaluation of the season record of every athlete, the three major criteria being: 1-Major honors won and important placings in major meets; 2-Win-loss record; 3-Sequence of marks, i.e. the quality and quantity of best performances for each athlete. The ranking is not an idealized contest but was decided on by the authors only on the actual achievements of last season. In this respect the authors report that for the 1968 ranking, Olympic gold decided all the number one performers except in the pentathlon where Rosendahl did not compete.

Some explanations for the Ranking: after the name of the athlete is her position in previous year's rankings; next is a short summary of her placings in major meets (A); remarks on the win-loss record and other explanations (B); and the five best marks of the season with dates (C). The other abbreviations are well known to readers of this magazine.

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

AGE GROUP TRACK by Calvin Brown

Judy Rejebian, who turned 14 on January 25, has already made an international trip to Russia where she competed in the long jump and jumped 18'0. Before Judy turned 14 she set a new National record in the pentathlon with 4072 points. Within this event, Judy also tied the National record in the 50y hurdles at 7.2s. Her other marks were: 32'9 (6#SP), 4'6 (HJ), 18'6% (LJ) and 26.1 (200m). Judy also competed indoors in Germany and jumped 18'4% for fourth. Judy should have a great year for she is an intense competitor and loves to do her best.

Debbie Heald has regained some of her lost prestige. On Sunday, March 16, in Phoenix, she ran a great and season opener in the mile of 5:07.6 for a National record and US age best for 13 year olds. Debbie has also improved her best in the half to 2:22.2s. Debbie has grown and is now 5'2 or 5'3.

I understand that Debbie Heald and Debbie Roth have met and worked out with each other in La Mirada, California. So apparently there is mutual admiration among the athletes.

Debbie's teammate Karen Hurlocker, also 13, is doing some tremendous running during the early part of this 1969 season. At Phoenix, Karen encountered two very fine qurter milers, Anne Gallaher and Carol Hudson. Heat times were: Hudson 61.0 in heat #1, Hurlocker 61.0 in heat #2 and Gallaher 60.9 in heat #3. This set the stage for the final on the next day. Running practically stride for stride was Gallaher and Hurlocker with Hudson in third all the way. With about 150 yards to go, Hurlocker really started to run and steadily moved away from the other fine athletes. Karen bettered a fine National record of 58.2 set by Joyce Scott last year with a 58.1s. Anne Gallaher was second at 59.2 for a lifetime best and Carol Hudson ran 60.0s. Fourth place was 63.8. Karen Hurlocker also ran 25.7 in 220 heat and 26.2 to win the final. Karen and Debbie brought Coach Roy Swett two National records in one day. It could quite easily happen again unless Debbie Roth and Joyce Scott or some other fine athlete decide to make it tougher for them!

Anne Gallaher is another girl to keep your eyes open for. She has been very impressive so far this season. Anne is 5'7 and 125 pounds. Tall and strongly built. She has run the 50y hurdles in 7.3. She is the third athlete from Arizona that has run 7.3 or better. Judy Rejebian ran 7.2 and Jackie Van Buskirk ran 7.3 before turning 14. Jackie ran 12.8 on March 16 at Phoenix. Back to Anne - she has run 26.6 and the aforementioned 59.2s.

Ten year old Pam Young at Phoenix ran the half in 2:37.8s.

This is a US Best by age 10.

Jill South of the Tempe Rockets in the 10/11 high jump did very well at the Phoenix Invitational where she jumped 4'6%. The NR is 4'8%.

SOUTH AFRICA REPORT from Gert le Roux

South Africa's star so far this year is a sensational 14 year old sprinting star, Claudie van Straaten. She has been clocking sub 12 second times consistently and is now all set for the series of major meetings to follow.

She showed first signs of things to come when clocking a wind-assisted 11.6 toward the end of last year on a grass

track in Pretoria.

After clocking 11.8 three times and 11.9 twice at schools meetings between February 1 and March 1, she showed her class at Middelburg on March 8b. In the Northern Transvaal Championships, held at this country town, she won the women's title with a time of 11.6 sec. after having won her heat in 11.5. Unfortunately both races were wind-assisted at 3 meters per second in the heat (6.71mph), and 7 meters per second in the final (15.65mph).

Claudie van Straaten will not be 15 until May. She is 5'6% tall and has very long legs. Her best time for the 200m

is 24.4 done last year.

Another schoolgirl, Susan Viljoen (16) clocked 11.7 in second place at Middelburg. She won the 200m final in 24.4w. Other leading results: Middelburg 8/3, 400m-A. Botha 55.2; Bellville 28/2, 800m-B. Marais 2:10.5, T. Kitshoff 2:13.2: Durban 8/3, LJ-L. Schmidt 19'10: Benoni 15/2, HJ-Susan du Plessis 5'64: Kempton Park 19/2, HJ-du Plessis 5'6: Potchefstroom 26/2, HJ-du Plessis 5'5%.

Eugene Brasler, who will try and win the South African 80m hurdle title for the 9th time at Easter-time in Port Elizabeth, has clocked 11.2 five times this. Arona Boshoff was

beaten three times although clocking 11.3 each time.

NEW ZEALAND CHAMPIONSHIPS from Laurence Booth

Hamilton, New Zealand, February 28-March 3): From the time the championships were awarded to Hamilton with a grass track, the worst was feared - and sure enough, continual rain on the final day coupled with strong winds ruined any chances of outstanding performances. One could only sit back and imagine "what might have been". Sylvia Potts, after a 60.4 first lap, was slowed by the wind and rain-soaked track but still held on to convincingly win her first NZ 880y title in an excellent 2:07.5. The seventeen year old sister of '56 and '60 Olympian Beverly, Pam Weigel jumped 19'8 into a loft per second headwind to win the long jump title by nine inches. In a year or two they could head the all-time sisters list, the Press sisters excepted.

Others to impress were Adrienne Lowe, who set a NZ 100mH record of 14.5 (wind -3.2); Barbara Poulsen who won the shot, finished 2nd in the 100mH and relay, 3rd in the 100y and 4th in the high jump - all on the final afternoon; and Penny Ha-

worth who convincingly won the sprint double.
