World marks have tumbled with monotonous regularity as the 1970 Indoor season reaches its climax. The flat races have seen several new global bests while every hurdle mark in existence has been bettered this year - even the 200m hurdles! Add new marks in the shot and high jump in the field and you have nearly 100%. Here are the new marks (to March 1):

SPRINTS

(Europe) Again the East German girls are much in evidence in the shorter distances. While the Athens star Petra Vogt showed some troubles to extend her legs in races under 100m, and Karin Balzer divided herself between sprints and hurdles, Renate Meissner, 1950, the silver medalist at Athens for 200, set two world bests on the Berlin indoor board track. DIANE KUMMER BIG SURPRISE: CHI CHENG SCORES TRIPLE WIN

New York, February 27:-So many surprising, interesting and fantastic things took place at the National Indoor Championships that it is difficult to know where to begin.

For example - not a single 1969 winner successfully defended her title, not even the team title. For example - for the first time in history of the meet, one person won three in-dividual titles - two of them with new Meet records. For example - a young, unsung, almost unknown athlete turned in a sterling performance to give her team the team title.

The triple winner was the Los Angeles Track Club's Chi Cheng who annexed the long jump with a meet record of 21'0%, the 60y hurdles with a meet record of 7.6, and the 60y dash with a personal best of 6.7s.

The young upstart who gave her team the points needed to win the team title was Diane Kummer (pronounced "Kum" and not "Koom"), who won the 220, picked up a valuable fourth place point in the long jump at 20'2% and ran a leg on the winning sprint relay team.

Mayor Daley won the team title with 20 points over Fred Thompson and his Brooklyn Atoms who tallied 16 to just edge the "Chi Cheng Track Club" who had 15.

It was a bad day at Black Rock for defending champions -Ferrell was third in the 60 and failed to run the 220, Scott was third in the 440, Manning did not run the 880, Abby Hoffman did not defend her mile title, Rallins was third in the hurdles, Poland's Irene Szewinska did not defend her long jump title, Eleanor Montgomery did not defend her high jump title and Maren Seidler was second in the shot. Add to this the Tennessee State University, team champions in 1969, who finished in a tie for sixth this year with only 5 points. Event by event the results were:

REEL TALK

How about some explanation of the rationale of the "money people" who paid out nearly \$4000 to transport male Club athletes from the Pacific Coast to the National Indoor Meet, some of whom, incidentally, didn't even finish their events, and yet would not provide travel money for the world record holder in the mile run, the world record holder for the 1500 meter run and the holder of the fastest 800m time in the world this year - Doris Brown - to take part? How can the race be called the "National Championship" without Brown and without Foltz and without Larrieu? Don't take anything away from young Kathy Gibbons, the winner - but people are wondering how the men get travel money and the women do not. Of all people in the USA, Doris Brown should have been in the National Championships.

When I first received the official list of entries for the Indoor Nationals, I loudly crowed "Look at the difference between the number of men and women entries. The women have it all over the men". And it looked to be true. In the five comparable track events, the men had a TOTAL of 47 entries to 118 for the women. In the three field events, 58 females were entered to only 21 men. There were more women in the long jump alone than in all of the men's field events.

But after the meet I began to believe the men were the wise ones and we in the women's program not quite so smart as we thought. A championship meet should involve champions. The top performers should not have to wade through heats, semi-finals and finals. The quest is to find out the champion - not who can last the longest. We need to stiffen our entry standards and limit the Nationals to those of national calibre. The AAU provides a Junior National Championships for those who do not meet the requirements of the National Meet. And we should have some way of checking the qualifying marks turned in. Actually, some of the long jumpers were struggling to get into the sand of the pit, only 13% feet from the board. And one 880 heat was won in 2:19 - slower than the qualifying standard by two seconds yet some finishers were nearly twenty seconds back of the winner!

From my seat on the sidelines, the Nationals seemed to have been fairly smooth and well run. There were a couple of minor flubs, but nothing to get very excited about. In one instance the seeding committee evidently did not recog-

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nize Pat (Van Wolvelaer) Johnson's new name and had put her in a heat with Tereza Nowak, Jayne Frederick, Lacey O'Neal and Carol Thomson - but this mental lapse was caught in time and the heats rearranged. Don't know what the reason was for Maria Stearns being placed in the slow, afternoon section of the mile - she just might have won the final - but even that worked out fairly well although I am sure Maria would have welcomed a chance to run at night. Don't know why the entry for Francie Larrieu was rejected - report it was late - but the AAU accepted late entries for several of the men. Actually, you can't blame the coaches and/or athletes too much for late entries. In my case I received the entry blank on February 12th and was shocked to read the entires closed on the 13th. But it was a good meet, the one day part of it didn't seem too bad and the crowd was good and very knowledgeable. And the TV show the next afternoon was probably the best show they have put on to date.

Pretty Tereza Nowak came from Poland this past indoor season to compete in our country and liven up the scene a little with her talent (she was ranked #5 in the world last year), and personality. She had a hard time! She first ran in Toronto not long after the lengthy flight from Europe and was eliminated in the heats of the 50y dash, then finished third in the 50y hurdles behind Chi and Rallins.' A quick flight to Seattle where she was whomped by Pat (Van Wolvelaere) Johnson in the battle of the incorrectly measured 62½ yard hurdles. Back to New York where she did little or nothing at the US Olympian Meet after her second place in the LA Times hurdles. In the National Championships she was eliminated in the semi final of the hurdles.

In addition to the perpetual problem of traveling athletes, lack of rest and sleep, Tereza told me she had not been able to train. "Mr. Cassell took us to Central Park to train", she told me. "What can I do in Central Park?" I suggested she might have worked over the benches, but the idea didn't ring the bell for her.

We should be more careful and more concerned with our guests who come here to compete. Tereza went on to say how hard the people in Poland worked to entertain athletes from the USA whenever they come to her country and how they do everything they can to provide their guests with proper workout sites, entertainment and atmosphere. And it's true. Those who have been inforeign lands for meets know that as a guest you are entertained like queens. We should do no less for our guests - for whatever they do, however well or poorly they perform, the fact remains, they are guests in our land. Let's treat them right.

The three semi-final races brought on the best running of the day as only two from each semi moved into the final. In spite of this, no huge upsets occured and the favored ones moved into the final.

The final was run under much pressure. Ferrell, who had scratched from the 220, was fresh and ready - not sick and not injured. Chi had already won the long jump, three hurdle races and two 60 yard sprints. Davis, ranked the number four sprinter in the world for 1969, was ready to prove her worth. At the gun the field was even and remained together for the first ten yards, then Chi moved into the front and over the final 30 yards pulled away to win by 4-5 feet amid the huge noise of the crowd. Davis snuck in for second ahead of the defending champion.

Rather a dreary event with no real outstanding performers taking part. The heats were slow, the semis not much better. The final was a close race as Diane Kummer won in the last strides over Ohio's Laurie Baar and the Atoms Linda Reynolds and Fred Thompson saw his title hopes fly away.

The indoor 440 is always one of the toughest events in which to qualify as the heat winner only makes it to the final. This year was no exception and such stalwarts as Lois Drinkwater, Darlene Green, Marilyn Bastian, Beth Hutson and Marilyn McClung bit the dust.

side lane, Kathy Hammond sped into the lead around the first turn and built up a good sized advantage over the first 300. Gail Fitzgerald, winner of many races this indoor season and who has only one speed - all out - closed a little as did Jarvis Scott, but none could keep pace with speedy Kathy and she trotted home with a six yard margin - and once again Fred Thompson saw the title go flying!

880 Yard Run: (1969 results, 1-Manning 2:07.9, 2-Hoffman 2:09.0, 3-Toussaint 2:12.9, 4-Werthner 2:13.4, 5-Kraker 2:13.7.) This has to be one of the Cinderella stories of the track meet. Afternoon trials were nondescript - winning time in one heat was a sluggish 2:18.9, nearly two seconds slower than the "standard" for entry - yet some runners were nearly twenty seconds behind! No one was eliminated who was not expected to be eliminated and the only surprise was the absence of defending champion Madeline Manning and the ease with which Francie Kraker-Johnson won the first heat.

The strategy worked out by Francie Johnson and her "coach" worked perfectly in the final. Olinek swept into the lead and people hurried to get in command - but not Francie. Reversing her tactics used as a "single" girl, Francie stayed in back of the pack for the first two laps and moved gradually on the third circuit. Her first 440 was 65 - and so was her second. Francie took the lead with just slightly less than two laps to go and there was no catching her. Toussaint made a game effort, but it was far too late and she was fortunate to catch Nancy Shafer for the silver medal, (as Fred Thompson saw that title flying out the window once again!).

The only flaw in this race was the placing of Maria Stearns in the unseeded section which was run in the afternoon - the final places being awarded on time basis. Something about an incomplete entry blank, no time listed, etc. - it doesn't seem important except to Maria who just might be the 1970 National champion had she been in the evening competition. As it was, Marie won the afternoon section with a 13 second margin and probably could have gone faster with competition.

Take nothing away from Kathy Gibbons, however, who won the evening race and the title. Gibbons, now training via mail with a new coach, Olympian George Young, ran a well planned and well executed race winning over some tough opposition. The race was fairly close until the gun lap - and at the sound of the gun the crowd thought the starter had fired a real bullet at Kathy for she took off like a wild Banshee and clocked a fine 4:58.9 for the win. Stearns had 5:03.0 for her afternoon trot which edged Pam Bagian for the silver medal.

A runner who runs with tense (unrelaxed) antagonistic muscles is comparable to an automobile being driven with the brakes on - different parts of a machine are working against each other.

Tension is the greatest single factor in preventing an athlete from realizing his full potential, and in making it impossible to compete with maximum skill and endurance.

The elimination of tension will create greater all-around improvement in skill and endurance than any other single factor.

The two semis were lulu's - especially the 1st one which looked like an Olympic Games competition with the 1968 3rd place winner (Chi), the 4th place winner (Johnson), the world number five for 1969 (Nowak) and a former world 50y recordholder (Brown) all drawn together. Only two from each semi qualified plus the fastest third - so there was no loafing.

If the semi's were lulu's, the final was a super lulu as a thin baby doll blanket could be spread over the first three runners. Chi was off well and led over the first three hurdles, but Johnson closed fast and so did Mamie and the three zoomed over the final barrier inches apart. Chi won it on the run-in and picked up a new meet record in the process. These three will provide some fancy hurdle races during the 1970 season!

For an hour and twenty minutes an assorted group of jumpers, many of whom could not possibly have made the qualifying standard, bounded and gamboled all of 15 or 16 feet while the real jumpers cooled their heels waiting their turn. In this event is one complaint common to most big meets - the athletes were told they must get their steps before the event started - it was scheduled to start at noon - and then wait around until called upon to jump at which time they were to be given no runthroughs and no warmups - a slight waiting period of 11/2 hours. Fortunately, the officials did not stick to this original decree, but it always shakes up the athletes! If this is going to be the rule, let the top jumpers jump first!

When the real jumping got started, it turned out to be a good competition with the best all-around jumping produced in the USA and by American jumpers for some time. The bright spot of the event was 16 year old Diane Kummer who had jumped over 19 feet only once before, yet had three leaps beyond the 20'2" mark in the final!

Hiroko Yamashita of Japan took the early lead, then Martha Watson hopped out into the fore and the Willye White took over. Chi Cheng was called for her hurdle heat but decided to take one jump before moving onto the track - and her jump was good enough to retire her for the afternoon as she hit 21'0% for a new personal best and a new meet record. She did not jump again.



TWO WORLD RECORDS AT TORONTO

Toronto, Canada, February 5:-The female athletes stole the show at the 8th Annual Telegram-Maple Leaf Games here tonight. World records were set in the 50y hurdles and the 600y run and 16 year old Debbie Brill titillated the Canadian crowd by leaping over 6'0, the tenth distaff athlete to accomplish this feat, in winning the high jump.

Chi Cheng started the evening finals on the right note as she won the 50y hurdles in 6.5 for a new world record. Chi needed the record to win as Mamie Rallins, the record-holder, was second in 6.6 to equal the former mark. Traveling Tereza Nowak of Poland, the number 5 ranked hurdler in the world who had just completed a flight from her native land to Toronto, was a tired third. Jenny Meldrum, who reportedly had "hung up her spikes" to have a baby, unhung them and to celebrate her new daughter's fourth-month birthday, sped to a 7.1 clocking to start her comeback. Chi used an eight step approach to the first hurdle for the first time in many years instead of her usual seven step run and it paid off with the new mark. Although she still feels the seven step run is best for the 100 meter distance and will probably return to it for the outdoor season, she figures the eight step runup gets her out quicker for 50 or 60 yards and the philosophy paid off with the new world mark. The seven step approach begets more power, but the eight steps gives more speed for the first 5-6 hurdles.

A short time later Cheryl Toussaint set a new global mark while winning the 600 yard run in 1:22.2s. The old mark of 1:22.4 was set by Francie Kraker in 1967. The record might have been bettered even more but for an unfortunate separating into different sections of Toussaint and Nancy Shafer. Shafer, who was second in the event with her 1:23.1, had to set her own pace over the entire distance while Toussaint had Jarvis Scott hustling the first 400 in the lead in her section. Madeline Manning was a tired 6th in this event while Scott faded to eighth. Terry Hull ran a strong race to finish third in 1:23.5.

The 50 yard dash brought together probably the finest field of runners in the entire indoor season. In the two heats were the world's number 1 sprinter for 1969 (Chi Cheng) the number 2 sprinter (Barbara Ferrell), the number 4 sprinter (Iris Davis), plus Stephanie Berto (Canada) who had earlier this year beaten Ferrell at 50 yards - plus such stalwarts as Evergreen Willye White, Mattline Render and Gladys Jermison. Chi Cheng won the first heat easily over Davis and Berto while Willy White looked good winning the second over Ferrell and Render although Ferrell eased up at the finish. In the final, Chi won a clear margin over Ferrell as there was daylight between them. Both were given 5.7, just one tenth off the world indoor mark.

Debbie Brill had no competition in the high jump. No one else got past 5'6 and Debbie was over the six foot mark on her first try at that height. Only nine others have ever gone that high, and Brill is certainly the youngest. Her "Brill Bend" looked good and certainly she should do great things in the years to come. Let us hope the Canadians in their zeal for success remember this is a young 16 year old girl who has potential to spare - please don't put pressure on her by predicting "certain" victory at the Commonwealth Games, etc., etc. Give her a chance to grow and mature and get her strength. She will be great!

Esther Stroy won the 300 by a foot over fast-closing Gail Fitzgerald, all 6'l of her, in 35.7s.

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LA TIMES MEET SENSATIONAL

Los Angeles, California, February 13:-Friday the 13th was a lucky night for the Los Angeles Times as their sponsored meet produced outstanding marks and performances in all the women's events. Heading the field was Kathy Hammond's new global mark in the seldom-run 500y event as she crushed her opposition with a mark of 1:06.3, exactly two seconds faster than the old record. Fast closing young Marilyn McClung of the Southern California Missiles was also under the old mark at 1:07.5 as she nudged two international performers, Jarvis Scott and Una Morris for the second place prize.

Doris Brown took a crack at Madeline Manning's world 880 mark of 2:07.9, and came close in spite of a poor third 220 with a good 2:09.5s. Brown passed the 440 mark in 60.3 although she lost some valuable time in the wild scramble at the start resulting in some pushing and shoving with Millbrae's Cis Schaefer being the victim of a couple pokes in the solar-plexis. Francie Larrieu stuck with Brown for the first quarter, but the pace was too swift for the young San Jose star and she lost rhythm during the third quarter of the race.

Chi Cheng had a good night as she won the hurdles over Poland's Tereza Nowak in 7.9 and the long jump with her lifetime best at 20'8% over Hiroko Yamashita of Japan, the Asian record-holder until tonight's competition. Chi had the best series of her life as well as her best-ever mark with jumps of 20'5%, 20'1%, 20'8%, 20'1%, 20'3% and 20'5%.

Barbara Ferrell who stated in an interview she only loses when she has been sick or in an accident, must have been feeling rather poorly after seeing the television shots of the 60 yard dash, for in spite of being given the win by the judges, the pictures prooved Chi Cheng to be the actual winner. Ferrell "jumped" into a huge 1½-2 yard lead at the gun, maintained it through the first 30 yards and appeared to be uncatchable, but the "Flying Chi" caught her over the final 30.

Vancouver, Canada, February 21:-The 6th Annual Achilles Indoor Games was Chi Cheng's Day! She put together three sterling performances in the space of one hour. Chi started the evening with the Canadian Open record of 20'8%, her personal indoor best long jump. Next she tackled the resurging Pat (Van Wolvelaere) Johnson of Renton, Washington, in the 50m hurdles. Chi sprinted the 29" barriers in 6.9 seconds, smashing Mamie Rallins' world record of 7.0 seconds. Pat was a good 7.1 for second and Wendy Taylor set the Canadian record of 7.5 seconds in third place.

Just ten minutes later, she faced Stephanie Berto of Vancouver over 50 metres. Chi, representing the Los Angeles Track Club, was a clear winner in 6.2 seconds while Berto was also given the same time. They will share this mark as a new Canadian record although Berto stated after the race she was a good two-tenths behind Chi and Heinz Piotrowski, Canada's trainer par excellence, clocked Chi in 5.9s.

So within the sapce of one hour, Formosa's World Athlete of 1969 set one world record, three Canadian open records and three personal bests! It WAS Chi Cheng's Day!

Several other fine performances shared the attention of the 3500 track fans at the Pacific Coliseum. The most popular with the hometown crowd was Debbie Brill's high jumping. The meet management scheduled just one event at a time, so the high jumpers were centre stage and solo for 40 minutes. The drama built as Debbie Van Kiekebelt of Toronto cleared 5'6% for her best indoor jump. Brill made 5'8 but Van Kiekebelt, still only 15 years old, missed her three attempts. Brill cleared 5'9% and then had the bar raised to 6'1, a new world record. The crowd watched in hushed silence. Her first two attempts were off, but she missed only by the narrowest of margins on her third trial.

Doris Brown of the Falcon TC had the fastest 800 metres of the season. In her typical driving fashion, she ran a fine 2:07.3 which is a new Canadian open record. Thelma Fynn of British Columbia ran 2:10.0 for the Canadian Junior record and Joan Dyke of the Richmond Kajaks did 2:11.0 for the Canadian Juvenile record. Thelma is 18 years old and Joan is 16. Noreen Leipens of Vancouver Olympic Club was fourth in 2:11.8, her personal best indoors.

Una Morris of Jamaica and now with the Los Angeles Track Club, let Joan Pirie of the Angels set the early pace in the 400 metres but powered by in the last few yards to win in 57.0 to 57.1 seconds. Irene Piotrowski set the Canadian record of 57.1 with her late drive to third spot.


Doreen Martens ofMcPherson TC ran away from Jan Grace, a New Zealand native and now with the Vancouver Olympic Club, and Cheryl Spowage of the Richmond Kajacks in the 1500m run. Martens set a Canadian record of 4:34.5 with Grace in 4:40.7 and Spowage at 4:46.3.

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



Long Sprints

(Europe) A 400m Tartan track is a definite advantage in an indoor 300m race: so the Swedish ace Karin Wallgren-Lundgren sliced a tenth off the world best set last year by Colette Besson on the same track, clocking 38.3 in Paris on February 6. Besson was only third (38.7) trailing countrywoman Telliez (38.5). (Note:-Although no "Official" indoor world records are recognized, most statisticians who keep listings do not acknowledge performances made on tracks longer than 180 yards.)

25.1 Janet Brown.

An encouraging performance from the USSR: 1955 born Lyubov Shibyenkova set a new Soviet mark for 300m running 40.7 (Moscow, February 4), a tenth slower than the winner Lyudmila Golomasova.

No real thrillers for 400m: Only one performance went under 55 seconds - Jamaican born Marylin Neufville (who represents the United Kingdom), won the British title in 54.9 after a 55.7 heat. In the absence of Hannelore Middecke, 4th at Athens, the GDR title went to Waltraud Birnbaum-Dietsch in 55.9 at Berlin on February 15.

And finally the last 400m Tartan performance: Colette Besson tied her French best over 600m in 1:31.6 at Paris on February 6. Best on record is 1:30.9 on a dirt track seven years ago by Tamara Dmitriyeva of USSR.

(USA) Kathy Hammond, Gale Fitzgerald, Esther Stroy and Cheryl Toussaint dominated the US scene over 300y to 600y. Hammond won the US 440 title and set a new world best over 500y and came close over 600y. Toussaint got the 600y mark, and Stroy had some good performances at 300 and 440 yards although she did not participate in the Nationals.

Middle Distances and Distance

(Europe) England's Rosemary Stirling turned in the best performance of the year when she won the English title over Sheila Carey-Taylor at Cosford on January 31 in 2:06.5. The world indoor record holder, East Germany's Barbara Wieck, has not yet started her season, and Waltraud Roessler annexed the national title in 2:09.2 ahead of young prospects Roessler (2:10.5) and Politz (2:10.9). Another East European hope, Galina Frokudina of USSR (1950) ran 2:10.3 at Moscow hall on February 3.

For reasons I really do not understand, very few people seem to know Doris Brown (USA) had set a world indoor mark for 1500m en route to a mile distance in Vancouver, Canada, three years ago. Doris passed the metric mark in 4:21.2 and was timed at the finish line in 4:40.4, a performance perhaps intrinsically better than the existing world record for the outdoor mile (4:36.8 by Mia Gommers, Holland). So the USSR claimed two barely-under 4:30 times last year by Kolyesnikova and Sobolyova as world indoor 1500m records whereas the better of the two times, 4:29.4 by Kolyesnikova, was only a European best! However, Galina Sobolyova, (other sources say Lyudmila Braghina was the person, but according to our USSR correspondent A. Kashcheyev it was Galina), im-roved this European best to 4:24.7 (Moscow, February 2). Thirteen days later, Gunhild Hoffmeister, the GDR girl who fell during the 1500m race at the European Championships in Athens and nevertheless managed a 4:20 performance, lowered this European best to 4:22.3. Lyudmila Braghina, USSR, had a "solo" run of 4:28.2 in Moscow on February 17.

(USA) Cheryl Toussaint has been winning most of the big indoor races, but lost the biggest one in an upset to Francie Kraker-Johnson at the Nationals. Doris Brown has the best mark of the runners made in Vancouver and also a new world best for the 1500m at Seattle. Manning has been desultry and may not run outdoors this year. Kathy Gibbons scored a big upset to win the AAU mile title, but Maria Stearns might have taken the title had she been permitted to run in the "seeded" section.

Hurdles

(Europe) Karin Balzer and Chi Cheng are rewriting the hurdles record book - and Pam Kilborn can not help them due to a lack of indoor facilities in Australia. Mrs. Balzer had two tries at the 55m/60y hurdles and set a new record in her second try at 7.5 at the GDR Championships in Berlin on February 15 and is awaiting Chi's reply.

Less significant are the marks over 50m by Tatyana Ant-aryan and Lilya Zakharkina in Leningrad (7.1); they, along with teammates Kuznyetsova and Zarubina are all four within one-tenth of Mamie Rallins world record.

The comeback of Northern Ireland's Mary Peters, a 5000 point pentathlonist, was emphasized by her 8.5 for the 60m hurdles in Cosford, January 31 that equalled Snezhana Yurukova's world mark. Incidentally, the Bulgarian girl, who is an excellent all-around athlete, will come back in action this year after having given birth to a child last year. In addition to the fine hurdle mark by Mary Peters, she has a practice mark in the shot of 16.50/54'1% and a meet mark of 15.86/52'0%.

(USA) Chi Cheng answered Balzer with new world records over 50y hurdles (6.5) and 50m hurdles (6.9) and a narrow miss at the National Championships for the 55m/60y mark with 7.6s. Pat (Van Wolvelaere) Johnson is back after missing a year and running better than ever. Mamie Rallins is still getting better with each passing year and the hurdle outlook in the USA keeps improving.

High Jump

(Europe) Ilona Gusenbauer (1947) found the needed concentration to clear 1.87/6'11/2 in Vienna on February 6 to break the world mark set by the great Jolanda Balas. Gusenbauer also took trials at 1.90/6'2% - the only athlete to do so except Balas.

Rita Schmidt seems more consistent this year. She devoted the 1969 season to strength training and this work is now paying dividends. Marks of 1.82/5'11% (Leipzig, February 8) and 1.83/6'0 (Berlin, February 15) are already behind her. Karin Schulze, Schmidt's teammate, has marks of 1.76/5'94, 1.75/5'8% and 1.77/5'9% and the vastly improved Rosemarie Witschas was third in the GDR Championships at 1.77/5'9%.

While Debbie Brill cleared 1.83/6'O with her "bend" in Canada, another sudden improvement was registered in Rumania. In addition to Virginia Bonci, the Rumanians now have Cornelia Popescu, born 1950, who went over 1.76/5'9% and then rea-ched 1.81/5'11% (Bucharest, February 15) in spite of her height - only 5'6".

From the USSR comes the news that Irina Syenkina, still only 17, cleared 1.73/5'8% on a dirt runway in Leningrad on January 27.

(USA) This may not be the worst US event this year, but we are searching to find a poorer event for us. Unknown Vann Abram is reputed to have cleared 5'6 and little else can be said. Young Sallie Caton shows promise.

Long Jump

(Europe) The long jump actually seems to ba a Wieczrek affair. The former Miss Neumann from the GDR opened the indoor season wi h a leap of 6.41/21'0% (Leipzig, February 1), then continued with jumps of 6.20/20'4 a week later at the same venue and 6.32/20'8% (Berlin, February 15). Viorica Viscopoleanu (I am hoping for a good writing of this tormented name by Vince!), the reigning Olympic champion is likely to overcome the effects of a long 1969 injury that caused her to lose the European championships to Sarna of Poland. Although she was beaten by Valeria Bufanu (6.14/20'1% to

6.15/20'2%) in her first indoor meet, Viorica was then able to jump 6.30/20'8 at Bucharest on February 15.

An interesting mark was set by 5'10 high jumper Barbara Inkpen, UK, who reached 6.29/20'74 at Cosford on January 10, a British all-comers best. Nina Gavrilova, one of the best USSR prospects according to head coach Vladimir Popov, leaped 6.18/20'314 in Leningrad (dirt) on February 1.

(USA) If the high jump is poor in the USA, the long jump has improved! Chi Cheng leads the pack with a fantastic 6.42/21'0% with her only jump at the Nationals and two other marks of 6.32/20'8% at the Times meet in LA and the Achilles meet in Toronto. Willye White is still jumping well, but the big news is 16 year old Diane Kummer, a teammate of Willye's in Chicago. Diane had only one jump over 19 feet in her life until the Nationals - she qualified as the last jumper, but all three of her final leaps were over the 20 foot mark - and she has evidently had some real coaching from Willye and could just be the next US great in this event.

(Europe)No real excitement at the news of a new indoor world best by Nadya Chizhova. Her 18.36/60'6 is a very far distance from that fabulous 20.43/67'0% achieved in Athens! It is more interesting to note a 17.00/55'9% put by 34 year old Galina Nyekrasova on January 25 in Moscow and another 18m club member, Irina Solontsova, USSR, 33, who put 18.15/ 59'61/2 on February 7 in Voroshilovgrad. Also at the same meet, the immortal Antonina Vashchyenko-Ivanova who is 38 years old, was still able to do 16.93/55'61/2!

But shot putting is also a GDR favorite! While Marianne Adam, the surprise of 1969, was again improving to 16.46/ 54'O at the GDR championships, three girls were placing ahead of her - and it should be pointed out that Margitta Gummel (20.10/65'11%) and Inge Friedrich (17.87/58'7%) were absent! It was Hannelore Friedel winning the event and improving her best mark if 17.02/55'10 set 14 days before in Leipzig to 17.68/58'0. Hannelore won the discus event at the 1966 European Junior (outdoor) championships, then developed a special interest for shot putting and you now see the results. Well beaten in this event was Marita Lange, second in Mexico City Olympics and third in Athens, who put only 17.10/56'114.

Conditioning work at first is detrimental to good performance. The muscles do not react as fast and lack the endurance which they possessed at the start of training due to the amount of :stored up energy" which the athlete accumulated before the practice sessions began.

No muscle or set of muscles will improve or develop unless a need for that development is put on the muscle or set of muscles.

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NEW ZEALAND CHAMPIONSHIPS from Terry Munns

Sylvia Potts was the star of the two-day meeting for the New Zealand Championship. She showed tremendous stamina runnig two 400m events and two 800's on the final day. But the real highlight of the meeting was her runaway 800m win in the world class time of 2:04.0s. She ran the first 200m in 28 and passed the half-way mark in 60 seconds flat. In winning, she conquored high winds and high class competition, with former British Olympian Anne Smith finishing fast for second place in 2:06.7 and Sue Haden in third with 2:08.4. Sylvia turned out less than an hour after the 800m final and clocked 55.4 to win the 400m and only a few minutes later ran a sizzling 400m leg in the 1600m relay to bring her team into third place.

Other notable performances were Val Robinson's dramatic 1500m win in the last few yards over Anne Smith, Penny Hunt's sprint double, Barbara Póulsen's shot put victory at 49'11¼ (her best-ever), and little Pam Weigel's long jump of 19'10¼ in heavy rain.

The muscles will at first break down under the demand of the additional work. Then as the need for improvement is realized, the muscles will gradually strengthen and the athlete's performance will improve.

The beginner must understand that all champions have passed through a period where progress seems at a standstill.

Dear Kerstin - Thanks for your letter and your interest, but I am afraid yours was not the only letter "claiming" knowledge of the one and only original "Handy Alibi Sheet". I first printed this same "Sheet" when I was coaching at Wilson High School in Long Beach California sometime between 1937 and 1958 - so it has been around for quite a while! And I copied it from someone else."

LETTER FROM KIM FAVORITE

"In your last few issues I have been listed as being a member of the Fledgling Track Club, and once as being from the state of California. Both of these statements are wrong. I removed myself from the Fledgling TC on the 29th of June, 1969, and had it announced at the National scratch meeting that I was unattached from the state of Washington. Somehow judges, officials, coaches and people in general did not seem to acknowledge this fact, but the fact still remains that any performance I did after the date of June 29, 1969, was not as a member of the Fledgling TC, but was unattached."

LETTER FROM RICHARD BEYST

"Just a line to tell you of some more "Wolverine LUCK" as you constantly refer to it. So you once again fail to give an objective view of the race (National cross country championships) when you God's Gift to Heaven fail to see a California Victory! Where were the excuses in 1968 at Frederick when the margin of victory was 1 point? Perhaps you should add to your list of excuses (Handy Alibi Sheet) that you printed recently, "Girl Got Sick", "Girl couldn't take it and dropped out". We wouldn't enter a kid who couldn't finish a race in Michigan".

Simmer down a bit Ricardo. The information that certain girls didn't finish the competition is, I believe, an integral part of the story of the meet, and if she is a member of a team which is a contender for the title, the fact should be reported. LETTER FROM MONETTE DRISCOLL

"I like the section titled "Statistics from the 1969 USA List". However, it could have been longer. For individuals with three rankings - Diane Spangler with her 7th ti in the 100mH, 6th tie in the 200mH and 3rd in the pentathlon is very noteworthy and also Sherry Calvert's lst in the javelin, 12th in the shot and 18th in the discus. Also Linda Langford's triple 4th in the discus, 12th in the javelin and 13th in the shot is mentionable. Tripling in three field events is much more spectacular than in running or a combination of jumping and sprinting. Try it some time or ask about it!"

Dear Monette: I am afraid I would have to "ask about it". The last time I tried it we were still digging holes in the track for starts!

LETTER FROM CHERRIE SHERRARD

"I would like to point out an ommission that was made in the "ALL TIME TOP TEN" from Leichtathletik in the February, 1970, edition of the Women's Track & Field World.

My name, Cherrie Sherrard, was left off the All Time Top Ten in the 80m hurdles.

In Toronto, Canada, August 20, 1967, I ran 10.5 in the 80m hurdles. My time was accepted as the American record and the Canadian record.

I know in the November 1967 issue you said that "Reports reach us that Cherrie Sherrard's 10.5 mark is questionable as pictures show a very narrow win over Mamie Rallins who was given 10.8. Spectators state either Rallins also ran 10.5 or Sharrard ran 10.8".

I would just like to say that I ran in the lane next to Mamie and we had been pretty close all year, but she wasn't close at the end of this race. If you have a picture, will you please send me a copy. The only picture I saw was one over the hurdles and not at the finish line.

The 80m hurdles will not be run anymore, so I would like to get credit for what I have done.

When I read your magazine and see how you change the facts to make athletes you like look good and the other ones look bad, I just wonder how you can keep it up month after month. I have been around for some time and I am astonished at some of the things you print and get away with."

Since I have no connection with the German magazine "Leichtathletik", I can not control what they print. However, I do have control over the statements in WTFW and if you will examine the quote you attributed to me, you will discover it was in an article written by Jan Popper of Czechoslovakia and appeared under his by-line.

I'm pleased you appreciate the fact I have favorites just as does everyone else. On October 1967 I wrote, "One cannot say enough for Cherrie Sherrard who, at the age of 29, now has an American record of 10.5". In February of 1968 you will find the following, "Cherrie set a new American record for the 80m hurdles at 10.5 in Toronto in August". After your operation in 1968 I wrote; "Cherrie is now resting at home and a card or letter would be a welcome item. Sherrard's loss to the Olympic team will be great, for after many, many years of campaigning, she was finally running consistently good times - but more important, defeating strong opponents".

Guess you would have to be considered one of my favorites!

LETTER FROM DICK BANK

"I would like to clarify my position as to the reasons why I did not vote for Chi Cheng as the outstanding hurdler (100 and 200) in 1969. Your reference would seem to indicate that I, "your best friend" had turned my back on Miss Chi and therefore voted against her so as to seem as impartial as possible. Not so. (You will recall I voted for her as World Athlete of the Year.)

It was my feeling that one had to rate the athlete on her accomplishment rather than what one felt the outcome might have been had the best hurdlers come together. Having seen Chi run as often as I have, I would not choose against her in a race involving Karen Balzer and/or Pam Kilborn. Unfortunately, this did not become a reality in 1969 but the odds seem to favor her meeting one if not both in 1970.

Chi Cheng's hurdle record in 1969 was spotless but I simply could not rate her ahead of Balzer who had an exceptional record of extremely fast races topped by a 12.9 and an unbeaten year. I have great respect for Balzer but I will reserve opinion on that 12.9 until I see her accomplish it somewhere besides East Berlin. Likewise, Kilborn's record in the 200 hurdles and a faster set of results gives her the top rating in that event.

A meeting involving the three in 1970 would settle many arguments. Chi Cheng was an infinitely better athlete in 1969 than she was in 1968 and from what I have seen already this year she will be far superior in 1970. When the season is concluded let us hope that a sufficient number of womanto-woman meetings has taken place and then personal opinion will need not take precedent over what has been decided on the track."
