## REEL TALK

An announcement from the National Chairman reveals the Women's Track and Field Committee voted 2-1 (40-20) to hold the National Championships in White Plains, New York, on the six lane track. I don't believe it. I just don't believe there are 40 members of the National Committee who would vote to subject a girl to five 440y hurdles races over a two-day span. That's exactly what will happen IF there are the same number of entries in this event in 1975 as were in 1974. FIVE 440y hurdles races in two days if you reach the finals. Rule II, Section 5, item (b) states, "Not less than 3 (men) shall advance to the next round of heats, semi-finals or finals." That means EVERY TIME a race is run, HALF of the contestants will advance to the next round. And I simply do not believe the National Committee as a whole is so stupid as to not take those points into consideration. I would like to have the ballots checked by "Price, Waterhouse" just to determine what the actual vote was. My wager is it was not 2-1 as announced.

It is near the end of March and we are still trying to obtain the results of the National Championships held last month in New York. Too bad the public relations bit is so poor in this country. We receive reams of material from foreign nations, but zip from the USA. (Unless you want to count the Junior Olympic program which uses more money for promotion than the combined USA Women's program.) Neat, detailed results with times and distances for EVERY performer in EVERY event reach us from Canada. What do we get from New York? Incomplete results, some with erroneous marks (for example, Debby LaPlante winning her 60y hurdles heat in 7.2!), poorly done on evidently an old mimeograph machine. What a contrast with our northern neighbors. After four weeks of effort including phone calls to New York, et al, we have managed to corral heat results of the 440 and 60y hurdles plus the final results of all events, but no heats results of the sprint or relays or semis of any event. Little wonder Canada is catching - or has caught - us.

Well, the USA International Cross Country team made it to the World Championships in Morocco after all. The team members didn't actually pay their own way this time, but neither did the National AAU provide the needed funds. How will this affect teams in the future? Will the women continue to pay their own money to represent their own country? Did our men pay their own way to go to the same competition at the same course on the same day? Unfortunately for the rest of the world, Chuck Debus, a schemer from 'way back, came up with a plan to finance the American team and it worked. The team

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made the trip and came back with both the team and individual titles at a cost of only \$100 per athlete. We still think this is a chintzy way for our National body to treat a team of World Champions. We don't get too many these days. They should be treated like Queens when they represent the country, not like servants.

Our sport has grown rapidly over the past twelve months. More and more is being written in the newspapers and magazines. I realize it is most difficult to ALWAYS be correct in reporting, but an effort should be made. Our sport, let's face it, is not well known by the general public and it is not well known by the average working reporter who might be assigned to cover a feature or a competition. Those who have been in the spotlight in track and field over the years have come to accept the fact that there will be errors in a feature article written about you. But let's see if we can't work toward getting accurate reporting in the media. It shouldn't be done in a vindictive sort of way, but errors should be pointed out to those who have written articles or to the news services.

We have collected just a few samples over the past couple of weeks. Take a look:

(An Associated Press release via wire service) "Joni Huntley of Sheridan, Oregon, world record holder in the women's high jump....She set the world mark of 6'2 7/8 at the recent New Zealand Games in Christchurch." First of all, of course, Joni Huntley does NOT hold either the world indoor or outdoor record in the high jump. Secondly, there is no such measurement in track in eighths of an inch. (Another AP release of Huntley's winning in Christchurch): "Miss Huntley's 6'2 7/8 is the world indoor high jump mark." Here they are reporting on the Games in New Zealand and they call it an INDOOR mark.

The Newark Star-Ledger on February 19 wrote, "Last Friday night in Toronto she (Larrieu) lowered the world indoor 1500m mark for women with a time of 4:01.4. After a night's sleep she hopped a plane for San Diego where, with little rest she went out and bettered the women's world mile record with a time of 4:20.6." Both marks are wrong. FAR wrong.

In a pre-write story for the AGAA Track Classic the writer states, "In the 60, the three girls who currently share the world record of 6.5 seconds are all entered. They are Rose Allwood and Alice Annum of Sports International and Mattline Render of the NY PAL." Actually there are four, not three, girls who have the world 60y record at 6.5 - but Allwood and Annum are not two of them. Tyus, Render, Daniels and Doyle are the record holders.

The Norwich Bulletin of February 24 says, "Campbell...took first place in the Invitational 440 with a time of 54.2. Campbell holds the world record for the 440 with a time of 53.7." Wrong again. World record is 54.2 by Charlette Cooke and later reports show Robin did not run 54.2 at that meet. At the same meet, Denise Wood won the shot and the mark is listed 3 times in the story and the summary: 49'6", 47'6" and 47'9". Just what do you believe?

The Associated Press got in yet another boo-boo in a release about the new world shot record by Fibingerova. The story says, "Czechoslovakia's Helena Fibingerova bettered her women's world shot put record with a toss of ABOUT 69'4". The throw was approximately 15 inches further than Miss Fibingerova's world outdoor record." First of all I wish I could get some results in my campaign to stop referring to women athletes as "Miss". I contend a report of Ralph Boston long jumping doesn't say "Mr. Boston's jump was 15 inches farther than his nearest competitor" - so why should they stick the girls with a "Miss". But this is the first time I have read a report of a world record listed as "about" so many feet and inches. Also, of course, the outdoor world record by Fibingerova is 70'9", hardly 15 inches less than the new indoor mark.

This issue is late. Couldn't be helped. Full time college coaching and magazine publishing both demand time and we have done our best to do justice to both. In spite of our tardiness, we must report that so many Clubs sent their club records for our Club Record Contest at such a late date that we have decided to wait until next month to publish the standings. This will give a few more clubs time to send in their records - but this time we draw the line at April 20 - no records will be considered for the contest unless they are in our hands by that date.

## NATIONAL INDOOR CHAMPIONSHIPS

New York, NY, February 28:—Sports International Track Club replaced the Atoms as National AAU Indoor Champions in the annual amateur extravaganza staged, as usual, in New York's Madison Square Garden. The Washington DC-based team tallied 29 points to edge the Atoms with 25. The Atoms picked up only 7 points in the individual events, but added 18 more in the three relays to stay close to the Washingtonians. Sports International used its foreign stars (Allwood, Oshikoya and Annun) to gather in 14 points and added 10 more in the relays for their total.

Rosalyn Bryant, who has been giving notice she would be on world-record pace, turned in the most impressive performance when she equaled the world best 220y time in her heat and then cruised through a 23.6 final to knock Edith McGuire off the books.

Upsets were the order during the evening finals with Oshikoya scoring a big one in the hurdles over defending champion Pat VanWolvelaere. Deby LaPlante, who has picked up the arm action of the East Germans, also slipped in ahead of VanWolvelaere. Kathy Weston, who hasn't exactly been red-hot to date, zipped past home-town favorite Cheryl Toussaint to win a close half mile in 2:07.6 and Wendy Knudson was a close third in a good 2:08.2.

Francie Larrieu easily won the mile as she "demonstrated" against the AAU for not allowing her to run the two mile by staying in lane two the entire distance. The Rialto Road Runners, with not a runner on the team, scored 10 points with an unprecedented 1-2-3 finish in the mile walk as Sue Brodock won in record time over sister Linda and teammate Esther Marquez.

Martha Watson set a new meet record in winning the long jump at a fine 21'2. Willye White was runner-up. Interesting side-light on Willye - she has been jumping since the mid-1950's and has won numerous National outdoor titles - but she has never won an indoor championship.

(Ed. Note:—We regret we have been unable to secure complete results of the National Championships in spite of repeated, super efforts to do so. We do not have heats of the 60, 220, 880 and no semi-final results of any events.)

## EUROPEAN CHAMPIONSHIPS by Jan Popper

Katowice, Poland, March 8/9:—Grazyna Rabsztyń, the most attractive Polish woman athlete of the young generation, was the author of the biggest surprise of the 6th annual European Indoor Championships, held at Katowice, the metropolis of industrial Silesia. Grazyna beat Annelie Ehrhardt in the 60m hurdles race and made so an end to one of the longest winning streaks in modern history, for Annelie won all hurdles competition, big or small, since Helsinki in 1971.

In contrast to the five previous editions of the European Indoor Championships, no world indoor records were broken or tied; nearest to this goal was Rosemarie Ackermann-Witschas, whose three tries at 1.95/6'4½ were close despite the fact that the best high jumper of the present time slightly injured her ankle during her clearance of 1.92/6'3½, (itself a mark unachieved until last winter).

Caribbean-born, British-vested Andrea Lynch and Verona Elder-Bernard were authors of best marks on the tartan covered track. Andrea won the first big gold medal by a perfect start and fast time of 7.17 over 60m; Verona mastered the difficulties of lane two on a somewhat curiously banked 160m track and achieved a perfect 52.68 400 meters time. Both longer races were run more on the tactical side, with leaders storming from the back of the pack in the final stages.

Helena Fibingerova, fresh from a world indoor record achievement over 21 meters (69'), could not master her nerves and weakness from a recent flu battle and lost clearly to a first-class prepared Marianne Adam in the shot, both athletes being almost even in the 20 mtrs (65'5) class.

With the exception of Ackermann, both jumps were worldly minor affairs in terms of marks, with a medal in the high jump won at 1.80/5'10½, (which happened for the last time in 1968), and only one 6.30/20'8 jump deciding the question of gold in the long jump. Perhaps a complicated construction of the boards, erected 180cm over the floor and based on 1800 pillars, robbed the original elasticity of that tartan-covered floor too much.

Nevertheless, the general atmosphere of the beautiful Rondo Hall, capacity 8000, was very high, and most observers agree that this Katowice surrounding was the best ever in the history of the European Championships. Women athletes from 20 countries took part, but only the home squad, the Soviet team (minus their Richmond representative), the Bulgarian, GFR, GDR and Czechoslovakia contingents were as numerous as usual. A big achievement was done by the three-head-strong Rumanian team: Natalia Andrei, a runner to watch in the future, and new hope Dora Catineanu won gold medals. Among minor surprises was the bronze medal of diminutive (5'0½) Rosita Pekhlianova at 800 meters and the final place in the 60m of Italian newcomer Rita Bottiglieri.

Miscellaneous: 400m time in the half was 61.3...Katolik lost too much energy in an early collision with Shtereva and fell from the lead to fourth in the last lap....400 times in the 1500 were 63.66, 2:13, 3:24.62, young Stoll and later Klapieczynski doing most of the leading work....Ehrhardt after the race, "I was well aware of the possibility of eventually losing a race. I did not think it was important to speak about an injury during the GDR Championships, but it hurts. I could not remember my last false start before the one here".... Marianne Adam after her unexpected victory, "I have not dreamed about such a situation. We were all very nervous, but I seemingly overcame this better than the others".... Bulgarian standout of the past, Vasilena Amzina (1500) tried a comeback, but had not enough strength in the latter stages....A dramatic relay situation occurred after Klimovicha lost the baton on the last change and Rita Wilden lowered the Soviet leading margin from three seconds to one.

Although the Russians won only one event, the 4x2 lap relay, they scored the unofficial team victory (5-3-2-1) with 24 points to 22 for GDR although the German crew had three victories....Two former "names" were back in competition with 1968 Olympic 400m champion Colette Besson of France having a good try in the 800 (2:07.2 in her heat and 5th in the final), and Teresa Sukniewicz (now Kleiber) fourth in her hurdle heat.

## LETTER FROM BARBARA LAWSON, Coach U-W Parkside

"It is really disgusting how they run some meets. At the last Illinois TC meet, the high jump bar was never measured until it had been raised to 5'8. The measurement made it officially 5'6. My high jumper (Von Behren) and I had repeatedly requested a measurement. If you receive results from them saying the winners had jumped 5'8 and Von Behren 5'7, you will know these results are false. (The official announced to the athletes that a 2" sag was present, yet the official result sheets show the heights to be 5'8 and 5'7.

"I think it is really pathetic to record marks such as these as they give the athlete a false sense of achievement. About as bad as coaches who round off times or give estimates."

## LETTER FROM TOM JENNINGS , Coach Pacific Coast Club

"1) While reading WTFW (Annual issue) I became confused to such an extent I felt writing was necessary. The ranking of your "Athlete of the Year" listings show that the 38 "experts" combined decisions may be at the moronic level (A) When Sue Brodock equals Nadyezhda Chizhova, (B) When Glenda Reider outranks Francie Larrieu while well behind in world ranking in the 1500 - not to mention Francie's ranking in the 3000, (C) When Charlotte Bradley (whoever that is) is ranked above Joni Huntley. Some of the above assumes Jan Popper is the top expert in his field. He is!

"2) I was confused by your statement in Kaleidoscope regarding the AAU "doing its job" and your suggestion that the media "get off the back of the AAU". In your same issue, you are "on the back" of the AAU women's T&F Committee regarding the International (cross country) meet in Morocco. You also are "on the back" of the AAU regarding the outdoor AAU sight. The idea of the AAU "doing its job" is easy to accept if you wish an incompetent job of administrating IAAF rules.

"3) The exclusion of Francie Larrieu from the two mile in the AAU and US-USSR meets was certainly bad for women's T&F. Had Francie been allowed to run, all media would have been tuned to the positive position of the sport - not the negative. The Pacific Coast Club is constantly receiving barbs about non-support of US teams. When we were giving 200% support by our sole female athlete, she was cut in half.

"Needless to say, the AAU paid public relations staff was promoting Francie's double at the AAU."

(Ed. Note: Thomas, old friend, your letter requires some answering. Agreed the results of balloting can produce some strange results, but that's the way they came out. Some experts would even pick athletes in different order in their sectional voting and in the world voting. That's why Jan Popper's Ranking List is such a good indicator of actual performance during a calendar year. Also you must remember the majority of the foreign voters see only "International" results and consider little else - so when Reiser wins the Commonwealth Games, it adds up to more in their book than when Larrieu wins the Southern Pacific AAU.

You are right about my picking on the AAU and at the same time protecting them from some of the media. You must admit there are some people (no names mentioned) who pick on the AAU regardless of what they have done. I, in turn, pick on them only when they have goofed.

"The Larrieu case at the National Indoor Championships has two sides - maybe three. A couple of years ago they barred Wendy Koenig from the 880 although she had run world class marks in the 600 and the 1000. She simply had not run an 880, and in their eyes she did not qualify. She, too, was kept out of the half against the Russians although she had won that very race the year before. After that fiasco, the AAU changed its rules and made certain performances in fringe races acceptable for qualifying for the Championships. Unfortunately they did not make such provisions for the two mile. Personally, I would have permitted Koenig to run the 880 two years ago and I would have permitted Larrieu to run the two mile this year. The purpose of the qualifying standard is to keep the hoi-polois from saturating the fields with clinkers. On the other side of the ledger, had I been Larrieu's coach and known she was interested in competing in the two mile, I would have made certain she had a qualifying mark."

## LETTER FROM KENNETH HEREL

"Along with my subscription renewal, I would also like to renew my plea for information on Maren Seidler.

"There was a good article on Ms. Seidler in 'Strength and Health' magazine, but even that seemed incomplete.

"The article stated Maren's goal as wanting to win an Olympic shot put medal and how she is training diligently to achieve it. She is heavily into weights and is the strongest woman power-lifter in the US. Maren was also listed as being six feet two and possessing forty inch thighs.

"I would like to know what are Maren's best lifts in exercises such as squats, bench press, clean and jerk and whatever other lifts she performs.

## MAPLE LEAF GAMES by Cecil Smith

Toronto, Canada, February 14:-The 13th Toronto Maple Leaf Games, once again played before a capacity crowd of 16,129. And what a night it was. Electrifying performances and world indoor bests charged the crowd on occasion to fever pitch.

On the track we had Annelie Ehrhardt, GDR, displaying magnificent form as she twice broke the existing world record for 60y hurdles. In the heat she cruised to an easy win in 6.3, and then in the final, after a magnificent start, she uncoiled herself to shatter her minutes-old record by clocking 6.2. In her wake we had American Patty Van Wolvelaere 6.4, and another American Deby LaPlante, 6.4.

The majestic Irena Szewinska easily outpaced the field in the 300 yards to clock a comfortable 40.1 win. Szewinska can obviously go much faster, but on the tight 160 yard track, her height and build isn't exactly conducive for this type of running. Canada's Joanne McTaggart came second in 40.8 with Rose Allwood of Jamaica third in 41.0 flat. Szewinska had to accept second place in the 50y dash, clocking 5.7 to Alice Annum (Ghana) 5.6, with Marjorie Bailey (Canada) third in 5.8.

Switching to one of the major highlights of the evening, the women's 1500 meters, we had an in form Francie Larrieu, who recently set a world best 1000m in 2:40.2, up against Glenda Reiser and Thelma Wright. But from the gun, it was no contest. Larrieu simply tore the field apart as she went through 440y in 64.9, the 880y in 2:11.2 and the 1320 in 3:19.8. Her final 440 was covered in a fast 67.8. So, once again as it was last year, the diminutive Larrieu has set a new world best performance of 4:10.4s. In second place was Reiser, who is not enjoying much success this year, who clocked 4:25.2, with Wright at 4:25.8.

In the field events, the one which captured the most attention was the women's high jump. Reason was, it is not every day a 14-year old has the chance to compete against the best in the world in front of a sellout crowd. Young Julie White of Brampton Kinsmen Harriers, and coached by David Baetz, at this tender age of 14 was virtually taking all the attention away from the great world-record holder Rosemary (Witschas) Akerman, the Commonwealth record-holder Debbie Brill, the American record-holder Joni Huntley and Louise Hanna-Walker, silver medalist at the Commonwealth Games.

But Akerman, using a six-stride straddle, easily won the competition at 1.90/6'2¾, and narrowly failed at 1.96/6'5¼. The first five were all over 6'0.

## STEVE'S WONDERS

# KATHY WESTON

Over the past eleven years, Will Stephens has had the good fortune to develop a number of very fine Olympic, International, and past National champion athletes. Familiar names such as Kathy Hammond, Natalie Rocha, Marie Mulder, Dino Lowery and Eileen Claugus have all, at one time or another, competed for the Will's Spikettes in Sacramento, California. However, the finest which Coach Stephens has seen may just now be coming into her own as a world-class athlete.

Kathy Weston is 16 years old. By European age standards she is a mere child competitively. Especially in the events in which Kathy has selected as her specialties. In European countries, the average age of competitors in the 400 and 800 meter races is 23. The point being, Kathy Weston has only just begun.

She first became involved in track and field in 1971 with Clayton Junior HS Girls team in her hometown of Reno, Nevada. She was 12 years old and ran the 50 and 100 yard dashes. The next year, 1972, Coach Stephens asked her to join the Will's Spikettes team after hearing of her accomplishments in the Reno area meets. That year she was moved up to the 220.

Kathy recounts, "1973 was my first big season, and reflected the training Stephens and the Spikettes afforded me." She then settled into the 440 as her specialty. The event certainly seemed to settle well with Kathy as witnessed by her impressive string of accomplishments for the 1973 season. After winning the California State Girl's Championship, the Girls Nationals and the 14-15 Nationals, (all in the 440), she was named to the USA Junior Team. All Kathy did on the European tour was run six races, (400 and 1600 relay) twice in each of three cities. She won six Gold Medals. Two in Warsaw, Poland, two in Odessa, Russia, and two in Heidenheim, West Germany where she was also selected as the "Outstanding Female Athlete of the Meet".

Following such a successful tour, Stephens and Kathy decided a rest was in order and she skipped the 1973 cross country season.

Reno's winter of ice and snow defeated her attempts to train properly for the 1974 Indoor season. She pulled a muscle and was out of action during most of December and January. She ran in only one meet before going to the Nationals where her lack of training cost her placing in the final.

However, her 1974 Outdoor season would not follow suit with her regrettable indoor season. She was finally able to get back into shape and went on to win the Junior National Championship in Gainesville in both the 400 and 800 meters. She broke Robin Campbell's meet record of 2:06.3 with a 2:03.7 in the 800.

Kathy recalls, "After returning home from the USA-USSR meet, we were told to stay in shape in case of a possible trip to Jamaica. I trained hard for a month and finally realized there was not going to be a trip. I started training on an every-other-day easy-run workout, figuring this would go on until early December, when I would begin indoor training. Instead, I received a surprise call from Jessie Liscomb in October. He asked if I could be ready in two weeks to travel to Brazil with a small USA Senior team for an international meet. Immediately I began to train again, alone or with whomever I could find. Usually my Dad, one of my brothers, or anyone who happened to be on the track. Stephens decided that the Brazilian trip would be good for me, and after a quick trip to Sacramento, where he timed me against some of the Spikettes, figured I could make a presentable showing for the USA. He assumed I would be running against South Americans and might not have too much competition. When I arrived in Rio de Janeiro and discovered 17 nations would be there, I got a little nervous."

Kathy's two weeks of training, haphazard as they may have been, did not go to waste. She clocked 2:06.3 in the 800 against France's Francoise Dubois, (who incidentally finished fourth in the European Championships with a lifetime best of 1:59.9), who ran 2:06.0. Kathy collected her second Silver medal of the competition in placing second to West Germany's Karola Claus, 55.6 to 55.9. To be sure, a most commendable showing for such short notice.

Most recently, coming out of a snowbound Reno with a minimal amount of training, Kathy rose to the occasion at the Times Indoor Games and outkicked an impressive field which included Debra Sapenter, Canada's Brenda Walsh and Olympian Jarvis Scott and won the race in the final burst with a time of 1:06.5 for the 500y run.

"I am now battling Reno's winter weather again. There's not much I can do when I can't find the track through the snow and ice, and there are no indoor facilities. I try and make weekend trips to Sacramento, but have been turned around more than once by the snow in the Sierras".

It is a 200 mile round trip for Kathy to get in her track workouts with her team and coach, but her desire and dedication is unfettered. She is a super girl with super potential. Kathy Weston. Remember the name!

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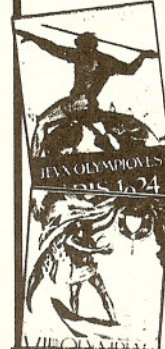


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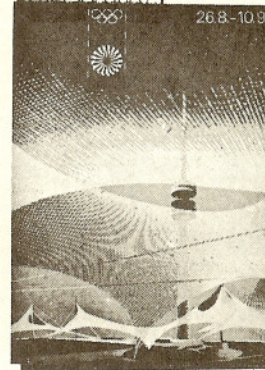

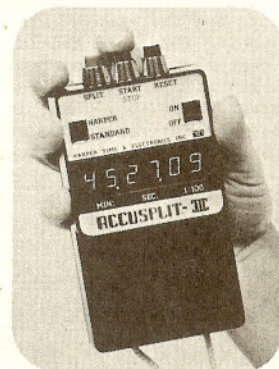
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# OUTDOOR REPORT

Alberta defeated Saskatchewan in a dual meet held in Edmonton on February 1, 68-56 with Saskatchewan's Diane Jones winning three events with a 7.2 in the 50m hurdles, 5'7 in the high jump and 49'9½ in the shot. Linda Browne, Alberta, won both sprints in 6.7 and 25.7. Brenda Walsh won the 400 easily in 57.1. Jones also picked up a third in the 50.... Shauna Miller had a good 9:51.2 for the 3000 and Alberta ran 3:56.6 to win the 4x400 relay.....

Once again it was Diane Jones who stole the show, this time at the Golden Bear Invitational in Edmonton, February 8. On the finest day in her career, she won four events and was second in a fifth as well as running on the winning relay team. In the process, she twice equalled the Canadian record for the 50m hurdles and bettered Saskatchewan records five times. During the grueling day from 9AM until 6PM, she competed in three field events and a total of six track races counting heats, semis and finals. In order, here is "Her Day" of work: Personal best 6.7 to win 50m hurdle heat; won high jump at 5'6; put shot 50'4½; won hurdle heat in 7.1; long jump was next, 19'9½; 6.7 for 50m semi-final; back to the long jump - this time 20'2½; hurdles final and a victory in 7.1; sprint final in second place at 6.6; finished by anchoring her relay team to victory....Joanne McTaggart ran three 200m races - all in 24.9...

Yvonne Saunders set a new Canadian record for 800m at Toronto on February 4th as she went through in 31-63-1:37-2:04.4. Great competition in the race with Abby Hoffman second in 2:05.1 and Roberto Angeloni third in 2:07.1...14 year old June White was over 6'0½....

At the Canada West University AA Indoor T&F Championships in Edmonton, February 28, Joanne McTaggart turned in the second fastest 300m ever run, a fine 38.2. Only GFR's Rita Wilden with a 37.4 just two weeks prior to McTaggart's run has been faster.....Diane Jones high jumped 5'10½ and continues to improve and become more and more a threat to the world in the pentathlon for the Montreal Games next year.

Diane Jones again grabbed the headlines at the Canadian National Indoor Championships held in Edmonton on February 28 and March 1. Jones bettered the world indoor pentathlon mark (with 50mH) as she scored 4540 points off her marks of 7.15 for the hurdles, 50'8½ in the shot, 5'8½ in the high jump, 19'10½ in the long jump and 26.1 for the 200m....The next day she came back to win the long jump at 20'5 and take the hurdles in 7.09. She picked up a bronze in the shot, but increased her best to 51'0½ ... Other National Championship results:

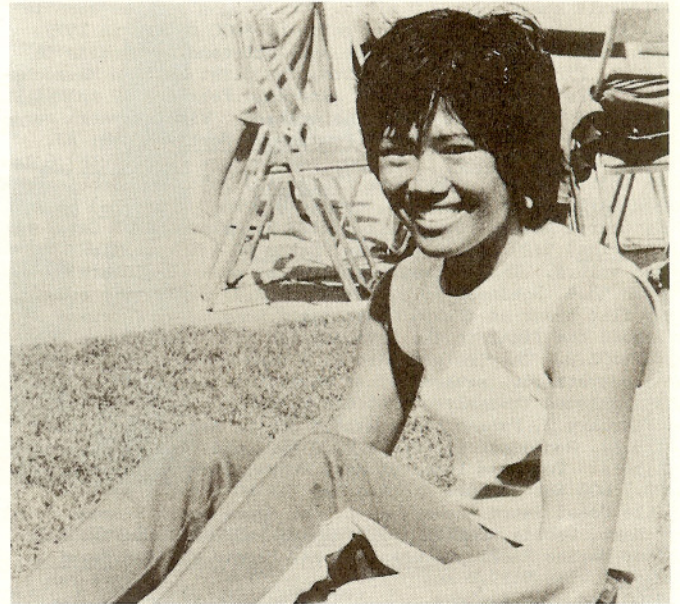

"I witnessed the '1975 Colgate Women's Games' held in Madison Square Garden, March 3, from 4:00-7:00 P.M. It was the culmination of a series of about half a dozen preliminaries held in various small arenas throughout the New York City area over a period of a few months. I went to one of these events - about 5000 youngsters ranging from the lower grade-school to the college and open categories. Heats with ten and twelve kids, two events going at a time, starting guns popping every few seconds, and everything falling into place, from 10AM to 6PM. Really a sight for sore eyes. Finally, it all boiled down to a few hundred competitors in Madison Square Garden. There were four categories (age groups), each headed by a noted athlete: Willie Mays, Billie Jean King, Bill Bradley and Wyomia Tyus were the stars who led their groups in a mini-Olympic parade around the track and later presented the winners their rewards. Each participant received an award and the winner received \$500 scholarships toward their education. Everyone wore yellow sweat suits and suitable shirts provided by Colgate who also furnished all the awards and took over all the expenses, amounting to in the neighborhood of \$250,000. Wow! There were about 10000 people in attendance, no charge, and they were just as enthusiastic as the crowds at the big meets. I know because I attend them all.

"This whole thing was the brainchild of Fred Thompson with the financing and cooperation of the Colgate Company. He deserves recognition for this super effort. Fred should get an award as "Man of the Year" in Women's Track and Field.

# HIGH SCHOOL TRACK By RICH EDE

We're going to start out this month's column by wrapping up our cross country report with a pair of meets from New York. The Western Sullivan League meet on October 29 presaged the Section 9 meet (southeastern NY) as Tri-Valley HS edged Livingston Manor 31-39 with Eldred third with 54. The same order of finish prevailed in the Sectional meet (held over a 2.0m course at Bear Mountain State Park) with the scores 40-73-83 in the later race. Missy Stratton of Tri-Valley won both races decisively over teammate Cindy Sauchuk (12:34 to 13:10 in the Sectional). The two TV girls left the field behind in the League meet but Diane Halpin (MW?) ran only four seconds behind Sauchuk in the Section meet. An interesting note is that the three WSL schools were the smallest of the top eight finishers yet pulled down 1-2 3.

One additional note to add to our report on the Oregon X-country meet (December issue) is the distance (omitted from the result sheet) was 2.0 miles. The Oregon coaches association is seriously considering going to 3000 meters in 1975.

Moving back indoors, we have some outstanding results to report. First from Massachusetts, the first Eastern Massachusetts Girls' T&F Championships were held February 17 in Falmouth on a 12 lap flat track (no spikes). Winning marks were as follows: SP, Donna Moquin (Framingham North) 35'4½; HJ, Vickie Smith (Wayland) 5'3½; 50, Les Ventura (Dartmouth) 6.1; 50yH (33"), Michelle Dufresne (Falmouth) 7.3; 220, Debbie Patterson (Arlington) 28.0; 440, Connie O'Brinet (Danvers) 63.2; 880, Cheryl Amsler (Somerville) 2:23.5; Mile, Cheryl Cavaretta (Billerica) 5:29.4; 4x146 relay, Salem HS 1:16.9; MileR, Falmouth 4:16.1. That Falmouth mile relay team (Hennemuth 57.8, Forman 58.4, Robinson 59.5, Dufresne 60.7) ran 3:56.6 on a 220y flat track at the US Coast Guard Academy on February 23 and made the final in the National AAU Indoor Championships with 4:01.2. They're going to be a team to reckon with. In open competition, several other Massachusetts HS girls have distinguished themselves. At the University of Rhode Island on February 7, Forman ran a 2:14.5 880 to beat Jan Merrill (2:15.3), Hennemuth clocked a 59.7 440, and Ventura ran three 6.1 50's. Two days later at West Point, Forman clocked a 1:23.7 600 and Ventura clocked two 7.1 60's and a 37.5 300. In the Coast Guard Academy meet, the Massachusetts cross country champ, Debbie Mueller (Bellingham) ran 5:11.0 in the mile to top Marine Buckley (Cohasset) and Maggie McNiff (Fenwick-Peabody) with 5:17.0 and 5:19.8 respectively. Ventura ran a 7.0 60 and 27.7 furlong.

In New York, the Third Annual Westchester T&F Coaches Association Frosh-Soph Indoor Championships (now THAT'S a title!) was held February 25. This is a combined boys-girls meet. Outstanding performers were Robin Gilmore-Barnes (Dobbs Ferry) and Sylvia Blocker (Mt. Vernon). Gilmore-Barnes doubled the mile (5:41.2) and 1000 (3:03.1), both shattering meet records. Blocker ran 39.8 (300y), well under both meet and fieldhouse records, and anchored her team's winning 880y relay (2:05.1). Getting the baton 8 yards back, she built up an 8 yard margin. Stephanie Becker (Mamaroneck), only a freshman, shattered the meet 600 record in 1:39.8 and ran the third leg on her team's 880 relay to build up the lead over Mt. Vernon.

Woodbine HS won the Iowa State Indoor Championship despite having to train on the streets due to 18" of snow on their track, (a condition foreign to Californians) with 66 points to Washington's 34½ and Ames 34. Debbie Esser starred for the winners by taking the one lap race (146y) in 18.15, 300 in 39.3, hurdles (4 flights, 30") in 7.59 and anchoring the 8 lap relay (2:37.8). Woodbine was second in the mile relay, won by North HS of West Union in 4:23.88. Sue Deppe (Ames) ran a 2:24.57/5:32.22 880/mile double win and Caren Horstmeyer (Woodbine) took the 440 in 63.62. Erin Eggers (Gilbert) won the 4K shot with a toss of 38'4½. Over 1500 competitors participated in the meet which was held at Drake University Fieldhouse.

The 5th Annual D.C. Girls Invitational Indoor Meet also produced some outstanding performances. Sophomore Lelani Kelley (Coolidge) smashed meet records in winning the 880 and mile in 2:24.9 and 5:16.2. The mile time was not as good as her 5:03 run earlier this year. Sheila Ingram (Coolidge) took the 220/440 double (26.4/61.4) despite a heavily taped leg (she has a 55.2 indoor to her credit already this year.) Gar-Field's Paula Girvan was a versatile performer taking the 70H (10.0 in semis), second in the HJ (5'2) and 3rd in the 220 (27.0). The HJ winner was Toni Jones (McKinley) who soared 5'6. The 70 was hotly contested as five runners equalled the meet record of 8.5 with Gloria McRae (Wilson) getting the nod over Debbie Jackson (Eastern). LaRoya Huff of Rabaut Jr. HS was an impressive 14-year old, clocking 8.0 for the 70 and 25.9 in the

220. Coolidge easily won the team title over Gar-Field and Bethesda-Chevy Chase, 68-42-39.

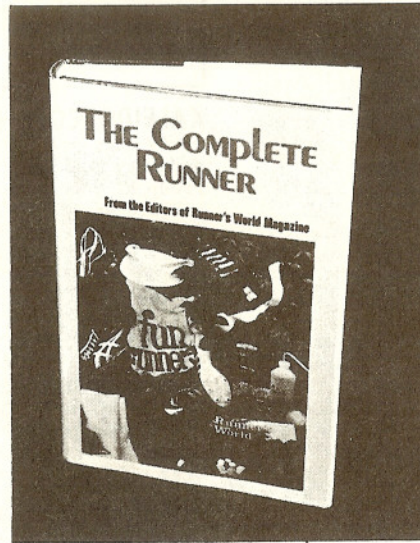
Moving outdoors, we have the results of the High School Division of the Houston Astro-Belles Relays held on the San Jacinto Jr. College tartan track. As is expected from Texas, some outstanding marks were recorded. Team champion Lanier (69%) got big points from Debra Melrose who won the 220 in 25.4 over Jan Kellum (Jersey Village) and Sheila St. Julien (Jones) both clocked in 26.5. Lanier's Michele Wilkins took the 60 (7.2) and teamed with Melrose, Ruby Seguna and J. Stewart to win the mile relay (4:08.5) by 0.2 over Worthing. Interestingly, Letitis Collins of Lanier, who ran 3rd in the 440 to Seguna's 4th, (61.3-61.4) did not even run the mile relay. Booker T. Washington's sprint corps seems to be something to behold. They won both 440 and 880 relays (49.8 and 1:48.6) without using Rose Stewart on either relay team. Stewart was 4th in the 60 (7.4) and 5th in the 100 (12.2). Lena Gibbs (BT Washington) won the 80yH in 10.9 and also did not run on the 440 relay team. She did, however, anchor the 880 team and mile relay (4th in 4:16.6). Julie Bergeron (St. Agnes) won the 100 into a 2.0 mph wind in 11.4 over Wilkins' 11.6. Renalda England (Madison) won the 440 in 58.1 over Wilma Harris (Worthing) in 59.7. The 880 yard DASH was won by Laurie Davis of Memorial (2:20.8) with Carol Sheffield (New Braunfels) second in 2:23.0 and Susan Abernathy (Sterling) third in 2:26.4.

In the field, Vivian White (Abilene) hurled the discus 121'2, Louise Ritter (Red Oak) high jumped 5'6 by herself (second was 4'9) and Carolyn Walker (Sterling) won the shot with a toss of 25'5. Sandie Lambert (Clear Lake) won the long jump at 16'4½ as Debra Melrose of Lanier won the triple jump at 36'4.

From Sweden, we have the results of the Swedish School Championships. These are conducted in age divisions, (girls born in 1956-57 and born in 1958 or later). Top marks are as follows: 100m, Malin Michaelsson 11.9, Lena Karlsson 11.9, Lena Moller 12.0; 400m, Helena Selligren 57.1, Maria Noring 57.5, Maud Engbo 58.2; 100mH, Brigitta Andersson 14.8 (record), Eva Gothberg 14.9, Lena Dejmdahl 15.0, Lena Johnson 15.0; 400m Relay, Rudbecksskolan Sollentuna 48.7 (record); HJ, Ann-Katrin Wiberg 5'4; LJ, Kerstin Olsson 18'10, Britt-Marie Olsson 18'2½; SP, Liz Brandeborn 39'10½; DT, Gunnevi Magnusson 124'8. (Ed. Note:-What's this? High school girls throwing the DISCUS and the JAVELIN. Horrors! And running 100m hurdles? Impossible! And the 4 kilo shot? They're too young for those things)

Results seem to get here from California more slowly than from across the country, but we do have some individual marks for you. The Moore sisters of Royal are at it again as Barbara won the 100 (11.8) and 440 (63.5) and Karen took the 880 in 2:29.4. Lugo of Royal won the mile in 5:46.2. Julie Lendl of Royal served notice in her first meet by high jumping 5'2¼ with only basketball workouts for training. Second in that meet was Claremont's Jenny Stary who later jumped 5'1 to win the Coachella Relays crown. Claremont won all three relays contested in the latter meet (440, 880 medley, mile) on the grass track, (high winds blow anything else away) to claim the team title. Lee, of host Coachella Valley, won the shot in that meet with a put of 33'8½. From the San Antonio League results, Claremont's Staci Johnson has wind-aided 11.5 and 26.2 marks, (the latter coming from a kneeling start as she missed the 'set' command). Chaffey's Janice Mulcock has clocked a 64.0 quarter while Chino's Pam Hofstra has a 2:30.9 880 to her credit. Chino's Sherri Morris has soloed 5'1 and Chaff-

ey's Tanya Bowie leads area long jumpers with a leap of 16'0". On the coast, Costa Mesa's Erin Gallagher has a 5:43.3 solo mile to her credit.

Now some bits and pieces of miscellaneous information: Who's Who in Oregon High School Track & Field, edited by Roger Shaffer, once again sets a standard the rest of the country could attempt to emulate. The cover photo is, appropriately, Joni Huntley, and the information is as complete as ever for both boys and girls. Roger also advises us that all three Oregon State Championship meets will be co-ed this year, (only the Class A meet has been so in the past). Joe Smetanka (Dominican HS, Detroit) would like to hear from any schools in Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Pennsylvania and Missouri interested in a dual meet. California Interscholastic Federation has made a significant step forward in sanctioning the Claremont Invitational which will include the standard international events except the javelin, (State law prohibits high school athletes from throwing it on a high school campus and that rule is evidently being extended to the college facility where this meet will be held). Finally, from Marilyn Krause, we have word that the University of Houston will be offering a limited number of grants-in-aid to potential women athletes in track and field. Special emphasis is being placed on middle distances. Nancy Norvell Laird will handle the middle distance runners.

Now a personal appeal. In order to present some statistics regarding the relative safety of various track and field events, I would appreciate any statistics anyone might have regarding the number and severity of injuries caused by being struck by the three throwing implements (shot, discus, javelin). 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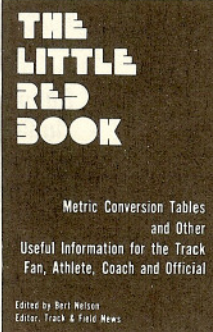

The winner, if a professional, will earn a cash award of \$10000 and a sterling silver trophy designed by Tiffany. If the winner is an amateur, the prize money will be given to a charity of her choice (WTFW?) Among top candidates are Francie Larrieu, Chris Evert, Evonne Goolagong....Irena Szewinska says she will run the 400 at Montreal....Abby Hoffman, long an 800 world class runner, has moved up to the 1500 in earnest and ran a 4:13.3 indoors at Toronto on February 22....The first Asia-Africa dual meet has been scheduled in Algeria July 5/6....Hopefully, the first T&F World Championship will be held in Dusseldorf, West Germany, in 1979. That city is planning on making a bid for such an event....

The French government has adopted a policy whereby leading athletes will be paid to train for top competition. The Vice Minister of Youth and Sports said, "Athletes who desire, and are able, to pursue an athletic career at the highest level will be taken over by the state and completely supported by the state. They will be supported for a period of two years so they will be able to prepare without other worries.".... The Republic of China has appropriated nearly three-quarters of a million dollars to prepare its athletes for Montreal....

..The Finnish Olympic Committee has included in its 1975 budget the allotment of about \$120,000 to be paid in cash to 85 sportsmen expected to keep their country's honor high in the Olympics....Larrieu's splits in her 4:29.0 mile in Toronto were 64.1-2:11.5-3:19.8 and 1500m at 4:09.0....Jack Griffin, Frederick TFC, will be the head coach of the US team to meet the Russians and assorted others this summer....

Janine Giliberti of Miami won the women's 10,000m in Miami on February 16 with a clocking of 47:31....The 'L'Quipe' and 'Athletisme' award of "Le Coq Sportif" is one of the most sought-after of all awards. Not only do they award a nice gold medal, but the recipient is flown to Paris to receive the medal and is treated like a King (or Queen). This year's voting was the closest in history with Rick Wohlhuter winning with 107 points, Bayi next with 105 and Irena Szewinska third with 103. Only one female has ever won this coveted award, Chi Cheng in 1970. 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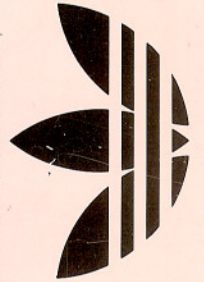
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
