

Where in the world DID they come from?

The Los Angeles Times made us feel a little better the day after the Sunkist Meet, however, for they had a front page photo of Jarmilla Kratochvilova passing Louise Romo of California in the 800. To the uninitiated they might have gotten away with it except the person being passed was not the same color as Romo and in fact, Romo wasn't even in the race. They did get Jarmilla correct, however.

JARMILA - ATHLETICS AND FEMINISM

Speaking of the LA Times and Kratochvilova, that paper had two excellent articles in the January 19 edition. One written by Julie Cart entitled "Whom Should Women Athletes Try To Please" and one written by Mal Florence entitled "Kratochvilova Had To Work Very Hard To Get Where She Is". The articles were really about how Americans think as opposed to how the rest of the world thinks when it comes to female athletes. It should have been required reading for every track fan, every track coach, every parent of an athlete and, yes, every athlete. We're not going to reprint the entire articles, but we'd like to give some of the best quotes from them.

Says Cart: "Reporters who dwelled on Jarmila Kratochvilova's physique and speculated about her feminity rather than her unequaled double at last year's world track championships in Helsinki, revealed a naiveite about the international track and field scene. And, more significantly, the stories pointed up the East-West cultural gap that exists in reporting international sports.

"Ria Stalman, a Dutch discus thrower who has trained in the United States for five years, said of Kratochvilova: 'She is, of course, a very extreme example of a very muscular woman. I don't think it's anything that has been brought on by steroids as far as her looks are concerned. When I look at Evelyn Ashford, I don't think she is the most beautiful woman in the world. They are not running a beauty contest. When you walk down the street and look around, you see lots of ugly people. Kratochvilova happens to be a runner, and a very good one, and that brings her into the public eye. And then everybody says, 'Look at that!'.

"In a country like the United States, beauty is emphasized; superficial beauty, makeup. But in the East Bloc, people don't have that. In the first place, most women don't have the money to go out and buy Revlon or Lancome makeup and all that kind of stuff. It's just not necessary for Eastern European women to look like Mary Decker, who looks like she goes two hours before the meet and puts on makeup and curls her hair. That is not the way their society is being run. Here, it's all surface that people look at."

It is not the custom for European women to shave their legs or under their arms. How fair is it then for Western observers to project western sensibilities on this different culture?

Martina Navratilova, another Czech, said that when she was growing up in Czechoslovakia, the social climate for girls competing in sports was different than for their American counterparts.

"We were never told we were not feminine because sports were for boys. There was never any problem like that. We never got mixed signals like kids do here. You're just an athlete, not a man or a woman. I think it is important to note that there is no word for 'tomboy' in Czechoslovakia.

Navratilova sees a double standard. She sites England's slightly built champion middle-distance runner, Sebastian Coe, as an example of that.

"If women are considered masculine for doing sports, does that mean that men who don't compete in sports are feminine? If Kratochvilova is masculine, does that mean Sebastian Coe is feminine?"

There's a real dilemma here. The very traits that set a woman apart as a successful athlete - a competitive nature, aggressiveness, natural strength and size - are the same characteristics that are generally regarded as 'masculine' and therefore are not to be cultivated by women. The problem for American women: is it possible to tone down those traits while still maintaining an acceptable level of success in sports?

Dr. Paul Ward, a consultant to the US Olympic Committee's Elite Athlete Program and coach to many American throwers, believes the fear of getting big is preventing American

TAC CHAMPIONSHIPS

New York, NY, Feb. 24: Foreign performers grabbed two of the seven running event titles and half of the four field events as the TAC staged its annual National Championships.

Russia won the 880 and high jump, Great Britain took the shot and Canada went home with the mile gold.

Americans, however, performed at top level and produced a few upsets. Alice Brown dethroned Chandra Cheeseborough in the 60y dash, winning by a clear margin in 6.62. In the hurdles, Stephanie Hightower completed an undefeated season with a 7.43 win over Debby (LaPlante) Smith.

Diane Dixon defended her 440 title, running this year for the Atoms Track Club. Dixon also anchored the winning mile relay team.

If the World Championships were held in Tennessee, Brenda Webb would quite probably win them. But she seems to win no where else and tonight's two mile was no exception as she lost to Wisconsin's Cathy Branta. Branta had a huge edge on the field with her 9:49.39 clocking. Webb was next in 10:03.39.

Good long jumping with the first four places beyond the 21 foot mark. Carol Lewis won it at 21'8", but it wasn't easy as Cal State LA's Jennifer Inniss led most of the night with her 21'5 1/4 leap.

As for the foreign contingent, Luybov Gurina swept past Robin Campbell in the last 25 meters to win the 880 in 2:05.34, some two seconds slower than Campbell's season best. Canadian Britt McRoberts had too much speed for Jan Merrill in the mile. Always interesting to watch Merrill compete - one can see the wheels turning in her mind every step of the way. Her 4:35.16 wasn't too far away from her best-ever indoor clocking of 4:31.14 made back in 1977.

England's (and Arizona's) Meg Ritchie took the shot at 58'6 3/4 more than three feet better than Rice's Regina Cavanaugh and Russia's world champion Tamara Bykova set a new US All Comers high jump mark at 6'6 3/4.

Team scores have not been announced as this article is written, but defending champ Athletics West did not capture the crown with only Cheeseborough and Webb picking off six points. The Atoms TC, the Soviet Union and the World Class AC loom as the 1-2-3 teams.

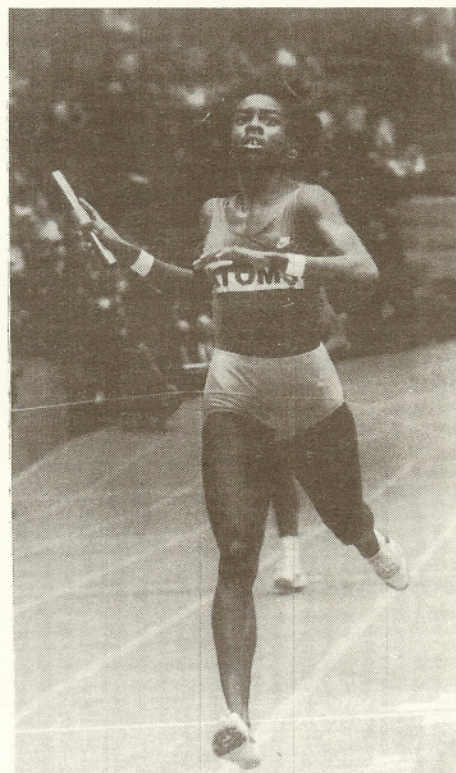

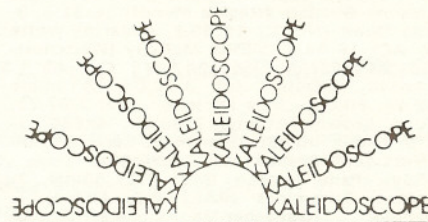

Other good performances came in the shot where Sandy Burke tossed the bulb 52'4, 2:04.55 by Canada's Christina Slythe, the 16:04.63 clocking by Judi St. Hilaire over 5000 which moves her into the number three spot on the US All Time List and the double win by Georgia's Linda Detlefsen in the 800 (2:07.71) and the mile (4:45.92).

women from 'stepping over the line' and into the weight room.

Leslie Deniz, the American record-holder in the discus, has taken that step and adjusted to the consequences.

"As far as the way I look, it's something you get used to. Some Betty Boop with 23% body fat will be called a woman before I will. It is very frustrating - you can't go into a grocery store in shorts, you can't show your legs because people will gawk."

"Competing is my goal in life and it means everything in the world to me. I will do everything in my power to reach my goals. Yes, it hurts. But every athlete must make some sort of sacrifice and this is my sacrifice."

The American female athlete receives the mixed signals Navratilova talks about. Do well, they are told, beat the Communists, but be a lady - and for God's sake, don't get huge!

Is the US losing potential world class athletes because the women aren't willing to pay the social price?

Stalman says the Eastern European women are insulated from social stigma because of the prestige athletes enjoy in the society.

"With women in the Eastern Bloc, it's totally accepted to do whatever you can to become a good athlete. They are heroes no matter what they look like. Whereas, in the United States women athletes have to deal with a social stigma. There is a certain way you are supposed to look. I think that's keeping a lot of people away from sports. Until this society changes, they will have the edge."

How is it possible to train with intensity and not sweat? The first wave of women athletes to receive college scholarships, and train alongside men, know all about the image pressure. Today they can laugh that they applied makeup before attending workouts. Just to prove they were real women.

on her left hand and is said to have a boyfriend, and offer this as proof of her femininity. Do we require Coe to carry around a razor or cripple the hand he shakes to convince the world of his masculinity?

"This sort of thing sets us back 50 years," said Brooks Johnson, women's Olympic track coach. "The times Kratochvilova ran are reachable by others who are willing to train hard. As long as we hide that lady's accomplishments under a barrel and talk only of her body, then what she accomplishes remains - in the minds of other women athletes - out of the ordinary. We make her a freak. Then American women will look at her and believe the only way they can achieve those times is to look like her. They have to see her as being normal, or her accomplishments will never seem attainable."

Mal Florence's article took a different tack, but he managed to get in a few well chosen words on the subject: "Americans who believe in the work ethic should admire Jarmila Kratochvilova. As recently as 1980 she was not ranked in the top ten in any event, although she has been competing since age 20. (She is now 32).

Her coach credits intense training, saying the runner has handled increasing volumes of work, including a weight lifting program.

"Many who saw her last August at the world track championships in Finland, where she won the 400 and 800, were astounded not only by her performance but also by her appearance.

"At 5'7 and 148 pounds, she has a physique that most men would envy.

"At a recent workout at UCLA, she had experienced athletes gaping when she briskly ran 300 meters 15 times with only two-minute intervals between. The tempo was about 48 seconds or slightly better.

"Deanne Johnson, Robin Campbell's coach: 'Our image of female athletes is just so different. We want a sterile, fragile woman. It's just a case of women coming from totally different societies. I'm sure that in Czechoslovakia Jarmila is not only accepted, but tremendously respected. This attitude (female perception) has kept a whole lot of good American women athletes out of competition. They don't want to be looked at a certain way. There is no question that Jarmila is an amazing female specimen. But just because she's big, I don't think she is masculine.'"

Brooks Johnson, coach of the American women's Olympic team, says that much has been said about Kratochvilova by American women is just sour grapes. "That lady (Kratochvilova) has passed the same tests (femininity and drugs) as Mary Decker. What else can be said? Her physiognomy should be of no one's concern. If she were on steroids her body would look totally different (more bulk, less definition)."

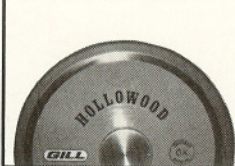

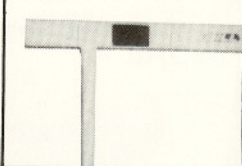

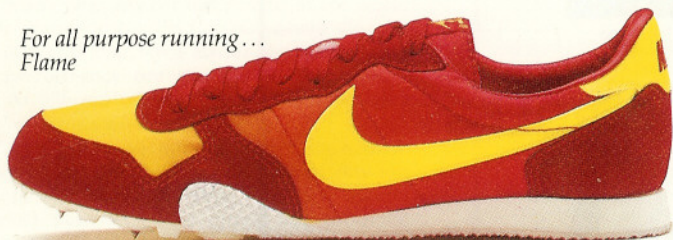
