

VANCOUVER RELAYS

Vancouver, Canada, May 2:-Fine performances were recorded in practically every event at the 22nd Annual Vancouver Relays held today in warm, sunny weather. Athletes from the Angel TC and the Falcon TC added an international spice to the program and Angel hurdler Pat Johnson had a busy day with a heat, semi final and final in the 100m sprint, two 100m hurdle races, a flight of 200m hurdles and a leg on the 4x200 meter relay.

RECORDS FALL AT MT. SAC RELAYS

Walnut, California, April 25/26:-Records - American, Meet and National Age - fell here in the beautiful San Jose Hills as meet director Jim Allen gethered together some of the finest of the US and Canadian athletes for the Annual Mt. San Antonio Relays.

Six invitational events spiced the first day of competition as 7000 sun-drenched spectators watched. Chi Cheng did the most damage to the record books with two new American All Comers records for the 100m hurdles and the 220 yard dash. On the second day, devoted to a full age group and women's program, Doris Brown got into the act with a new American mark over the new 3000 meter distance and young Teri Sabol once again upped her discus mark for 12/13 year olds to 115'6". Still another high spot was 12 year old Debbie Johnson's fine 5:08.8 mile and Debbie Heald's 4:55.8 mile in the women's division.

Saturday's hurdle race brought together the finest field possible to assemble in the United States with Mamie Rallins, Pat (Van Wolvelaere) Johnson, Deanne Carlson, Pat Donnelly, Dianne Spangler, Una Morris and Alberta Martin facing the starter's gun. The race was a good one with Chi getting off well, Mamie closing in the middle of the run and Chi pulling away over the final three hurdles to win in 13.3 to Mamie's 13.4 and Johnson's 13.9s. The same field lined up again for the first event of the Sunday's program, but this time it was no contest as Chi again started fast and kept right on going to win by a huge margin in 13.5 as Pat Johnson nipped Mamie for second in 14.1 to 14.2s.

The invitational 220 saw Chi again off to a blazing start and win easily in 23.2 to break the American mark of 23.4 set by Edith McGuire in 1964. Young Mavis Laing of Phoenix TC was a good second in 23.7 with Williamae Fergerson edging Kathy Hammond in a surprise for third as these two plus Una Morris and Nancy Benson all clocked 24.2s.

The invitational 880 brought together a fine field with Brown meeting the 1970 US Indoor champion Francie (Kraker) Johnson; fast-improving Terry Hull and Canada's Thelma Fynn. Hull set the pace for the first lap, at one time leading by ten yards, but Brown put in a sizzling third 220 to take the lead and then poured it on down the home straight for a 2:08 victory.

The "Open" 880 brought together a parcel of excellent young half milers with most eyes on the duel between Long Beach's Patty Cape and La Mirada's Karen Hurlocker. While eyes were glued to these two, Lyle Knudsen's Barbara Lawson of the Colorado Pacers was building up a huge lead - and no one caught her as she won in 2:14.5 to Cape's 2:14.8 with Hurlocker just one second behind. In the 12/13 events on Saturday, La Jolla's Bobbette Krug won the 50y hurdles in 7.0 and Carol Burkland the 100 in 11.1s.

Plans are coming along for the 1970 National Girl's and Women's Outdoor Track and Field Championships. Committees are and have been hard at work. Entry blanks will be mailed on or about May 15/18. If you are fearful you may be missed in the mailing, send your request to Vince Reel, Meet Director, care of this magazine. Entry blanks for the 12/13 Invitational to be staged at the same site on July 2 will be included in the packet sent to all clubs. Here again if you are afraid of being missed, send your name to the address above.

The facility at UCLA has to be the best in the USA. And the housing matches the field - the best. Only 200 yards from the dorm to the stadium. Reservations for housing, (all information will be included in your packet) must be made by June 12. Send to Thomas J. Wanket, UCLA - Rieber Residence Hall, 310 De Neva Drive, Los Angeles, California, 90024. The phone is (213) 825-5305. Cost will be \$8.50 per day (two to a room) including three meals. If you wish a single, the cost is \$10.50 per day, including the three meals. Meal hours have been set to match the requirements of the competition.

Girl's Championships will start on Tuesday, June 30 with morning and late afternoon sessions. The Girl's finals will be on Wednesday, July 1 at twilight. On Thursday, July 2, the Invitational 12/13 competition will be held with Calvin Brown as Meet Director. The Women take over with morning and twilight sessions on Friday, July 3, and the finals will be Saturday, July 4, starting at 1:30 with TV coverage. And there will NOT be any men's exhibition events this year!

A unique ticket selling program was instigated by Don De Noon - tickets sell for \$1 per session, the lowest price in many years, seats not reserved and all tickets good for the drawing for color tv, portable tv, stereo sets, etc. Plans are to sell 40,000 tickets - and if they all save their ticket until the women's finals the 12000 seat stadium will really be jumping.

Talk about a track fan - Casey Ide HAS to be the biggest in the world. Here is a recent letter.

"It took me 3½ hours from my house to the stadium in Long Beach including waiting for various busses, but it was worth it to see Chi run that 440 in 54.8 - wow! I missed the last bus home - intentionally, because it left Long Beach at 6:45 - but fortunately Don Chadez showed up and brought me home. I've just got to move out of Santa Ana - there is absolutely no decent transportation anywhere. It takes over 4 hours each way from my house to UCLA - but I will be there! To get to Mt. SAC I will have to leave home at 6:15 AM, go into Los Angeles, get a bus to El Monte, change to a bus that stops there and WALK the last mile and a half. But I will be there!

This letter does have a point, so I'd better get to it. I know that you agree with me that we need to encourage our "strong" girls in America to go out for the field events and stay with it if we are ever going to give the east-Europeans any challenge at all. These youngsters need all the encouragement we can give them, and seeing their names in print is a great morale booster, of course. Twice last year you gave some nice comments in the magazine about a 12-year old from the Lakewood Spartans, Debbie Rivera. I wish you would print a picture of her - I've been trying to get Don Chadez to take one. She is one of the most attractive girls of her age I have ever seen. She was 13 in April so is still in the age 12/13 group, and although she has never thrown the javelin competitively, her coach entered her in the event at Long Beach and she took second. She is excellent in the baseball throw, and was also second in the shot put at Long Beach. Her father is a doctor and she is a very witty girl. Once when she came within 11/2 inches of the national record for her age in the baseball throw, she told her father, "Just think -I missed the record by the length of an appendix!" Her mother has a very intelligent attitude toward Debbie's competition, and her parents go to the meets in a camper so they can stay over when necessary. Of course next year she will be up against the 17 year olds, and I hope she won't get discouraged. I don't think she will."

Sunday's competition was marred by a biting cold wind which came up about halfway through the program and nullified a good 20'3 long jump mark by Vicki Betts and a 23.8 furlong by Williamae Fergerson in addition to making the late events uncomfortable for the spectators and athletes alike.

Before the winds came, Chi Cheng won the 100m hurdles, (see story above), and the 100 yard dash in 10.5.

Doris Brown set a new American record over 3000 meters in 9:44.6 while Debbie Heald won the mile in 4:55.9 and 13 year old Debbie Jordan won her mile in 5:08.8s. Terri Sabol upped her 12/13 discus record to 115'6 and Canadian Debbie Brill had a bad day at the pit with a clearance of only 5'6.

"Perhaps the biggest surprise of the Women's International cross-country championship at Frederick, Maryland, last month was the failure of the Americans to do better on home ground. At Clydebank last year the USA won the team title from England, 23 points to 35; in Maryland England won 18 to 46.

"One American paper said before the race that with New Zealand having to drop out for financial reasons, the USA should have a fairly easy run, with the nearest opposition coming from England", says Rita Ridley, the English national champion who finished second to America's Doris Brown in the individual race.

"The event was held round the perimeter of a golf course", she says. "There was just one twisting lap, and it was very hilly. Even Doris told me afterwards that she was nearly walking in places.

"We were a bit worried that it might be a fast start. We'd been told that in the American championship on the same course a year ago, Doris had gone through the first half mile in 2:16 - and was three seconds down on the leader! In fact, it turned out to be quite a leisurely start. By half a mile our own Barbara Banks was leading, and she opened up a gap of four yards over Doris and myself, running together. Barbara had a really good run going, and was leading at 1½ miles, when Doris got away from me by a yard. We passed Barbara, but she repassed me at 1½ miles, and it was only in the closing stages that she fell back. I closed a bit on Doris, while Barbara was passed by Thelma Fynn - who's only 17, but was the OLDEST member of the Canadian team. They even had a 14 year old running!"

The weather, apparently, could have been English. "The Tuesday before the race was quite warm. Then on Wednesday we had four inches of snow, and the American girls, who all had short spikes, went out and bought ripple-soled shoes. One of them, from California, had never seen snow before. Then on Thursday the snow melted, the course was flooded and the Americans went out and bought long spikes. By Saturday it had dried out, and they ended up running in their original short spikes!"

After the on-off-on situation of the English girls going to Frederick at all, due to financial difficulties, they found their money problems were not over once they got there. "We stayed in a very nice motel in Frederick, but had to buy some meals ourselves. With the cost of living so high over there, sometimes we could only afford a cup of coffee and a doughnut for breakfast".

On their way back from the race, the English team stopped off sightseeing. "The area around Frederick has no less than ten Tartan tracks", says Rita. "We also went to a Naval Academy with a 220 yard indoor Tartan track which Pat Lowe had heard about, and we did some training on it".

Just before flying home from New York, they visited the Empire State Building where Rita, who missed the International last year with her wedding day, had two proposals of marriage! "On the way up the liftman (elevator man) asked me to marry him," she reveals. "Then on the way down he asked me if I'd changed my mind!"





Reconfirmation Policy

We need to establish a policy that will help the meet run smoothly and not penalize the athlete. Think about this because it will also be discussed at our next meeting.


