WHERE'S WENDY - CHAPTER II

When we left Wendy (Koenig) last month, she was being hailed as a "martyr to the cause" after being ruled ineligible to participate in the National AAU Indoor Championships and because of that ineligibility was not chosen to compete for the USA in the dual meet against the Soviets in Richmond. According to administrative forces, rules are rules and must be applied equally to all souls. Sound reasoning and most praisworthy. But now comes word from Roger Simpson, the Official AAU Statistician, who states "17 place winners were not certified by me, according to the rules, as having qualified to participate in the National Championships". Here is Roger Simpson's letter:

"I am enclosing copies of all the lists I submitted as certified qualifiers for the Indoor Nationals.

"I have only seen the final results of the meet. There were 17 place winners who do not appear on my lists. When the whole matter of the Statistician's job was discussed at the Convention, it was unanimously agreed that <u>ALL</u> competitors would have to be certified by me before their participation would be allowed in the Championships. I felt that this was being done in an attempt to remove "politics".

"It is, unfortunately, probably still as important to have the "right" coach as it has ever been.

"I would support the action of the (Games) Committee in the Koenig matter had the same action been applied to <u>all</u> in her situation. I do think rules and policies must be applied e-

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VAN STRAATEN 22.9 AT SA GAMES

Pretoria, South Africa, April 5/6/7:-South Africa's major venture into multi-racial sport was a great success. Black and white athletes from South African and twenty other countries lived, trained and competed together without incident. The general feeling of individuals and the press was that the Games had a tremendous effect on the attitudes of the people. Mark Colley, writing in the Sunday Times of April 8 summed up the general feeling: "Here was a real blow to the heart of apartheid".

The quality and depth of performances by the South African athletes was impressive. They provided some first rate marks as well as competition.

Pilditch Stadium has a good 8-lane tartan track with tartan approaches for all jumping events. The altitude is 5100 feet plus. Timing by Omega was fully electronic but there was no explanation why times were not shown in the 100th in the results.

Weather entered into the program. On opening day, Thursday, April 5, it was 70° with wind up to 15mph usually against the sprints and jumps. On Friday it was hot and humid at 80° plus a shower late in the afternoon, and no wind. Saturday it rained all day, but no wind. The attendance figures were approximately 20000 on Thursday, 22000 on Friday and the same number for the final day - and all stayed through the rain until the end of the program.

Claudie Van Straaten was the only South African woman to win two titles. At age 18, she is one of the truly great sprint prospects in the world. Her start leaves much to be desired, but her relaxed power and her strength in the final stages more than compensates for what she gives up at the start. Her 22.9 in the rain is a world best for 18 year olds.

Hybre DeLange is an impressive 20 year old. Her 26.8 win in the 200m hurdles and 13.5 second place in the 100m hurdles both lowered South African records. A 5'8½ third in the high jump, (her best is 5'10), gave her a full set of medals.

Susan Hansen (nee Viljoen) lowered the South African 400m record to 53.1. Hester-Anna Coetzee showed very strong finishes in both the 400m (second in 53.6) and 800m, (third in 2:06.1), for a fine double with four races in three days.

Meta Antenen was the top foreign competitor with SA all comers tecords of 13.5 for the 100m hurdles and 21'1½ in the long jump. Liesel Westermann, West Germany, also took home two golds with a SA all comers record of 188'5 in the discus and a 50'2% shot put victory. Glenda Reiser, Canada, (1500 in 4:17.2) and Mary Tracey, Ireland, (800m in 2:05.3) traded wins. Ann Wilson, England, now a flopper, cleared 5'9% for her best-ever in winning the high jump. It was Austria's Eva Janko, however, who produced the top result of the foreign athletes with a 199'9 throw in the javelin to move to the #12 spot on the all-time list.

The list of losers reads like a 'who's-who' of women's track and field with Annegret Kroniger, Wilma van Gool, Ilja Keiser, Maria Sykora, Rita Wilden, Debbie Van Kiekebelt, Heide Rosendahl and Anna Koloska all going home without gold.

100 Meters. Heats (Against the wind). In Heat #1, Claudie Van Straaten came from well back at 60m to nip Annegret Kroniger while Wilma Van Gool could manage only 12.4 and did not qualify. In Heat #2, Ester (Shachamurov) Rot, Israel, looked good all the way in her first race since the Munich tragedy. Rita Wilden, GFR, was placed fifth by the judges, but was given new life when re-examination of the photo finish moved her to 4mb.

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The American All Comers record in the high jump, listed in last month's WTFW as 6'0% by Debbie Brill of Canada, actually is 6'0% set last year by Jamaica's Audrey Reid.

The record listed for the 880y medley (220-110-110-440) was 1:40.6 set by Sports International in 1972. Actually, this must be listed as an All Comers record as two of their runners, Annum of Ghana and Allwood of Jamaica, are not US citizens. The record reverts to the West Coast Jets at 1:41.5 but already this year Prarie View has run 1:40.6 to claim the mark.

One new American record has been set by Tennessee State in the 4x220 relay at 1:35.9, just 0.1 off the world mark.

Does This Sound Familiar?

"We have talked about communication many times in the past. Unfortunately, we still have a long way to go in this regard at a National level. Where is the policy for selection set down in a clear-cut manner that gives justice to athletes and allows them to know how to prepare for upsoming competitions and what requirements they must meet to qualify for teams? Until those in charge can come up with such a program they have failed us miserably.

"And what of the National Championships? At this time, just 11 days before the meet, there does not seem to be a single entry form available. I thought that such forms were supposed to be ciculated 30 days in advance of the meet. Who is to blame for this and what have the people at the National Office been doing - having a sleep? I have read editorials from National Headquarters that say we must forget the past and look to a bright future. At this point the future looks darker than the past, if that is possible.

"We will lose to Russia, of course. We deserve to be thrashed because we are inept at even going about establishing a sound policy and have some sound guide lines for a change instead of a lot of confusion, passing the buck, and cheap power plays.

"It is now just 16 days before we meet the Russians. And how are we going to pick the team to compete in this meet? No one knows."

"They told me I risked disqualification if I did that in a race overseas," said the seething Raelene. "I know my rules as well as they, if not better, and there is no such rule in the international book." (Raelene has a fear of tapes ever since she was badly burned across the neck by such a tape.)

Yesterday in winning the 200m title in Australian record time (and the world best for 1973) at 22.8, Raelene again broke the tape with her hands - and she rolled up the wool and presented it to the meet referee, Mrs. Jean Gell.

Later the chairman of the men's council retrieved the wool, wound it neatly, attached a safety pin to it and presented it to Raelene.

As Raelene laughed and accepted her "trophy", the chairman said: "She is right, there is no rule that says you can't break the tape with your hands."

The following day at the University track in Rio Piedras, she easily set another national record with 60.2 for 400m and also won the 100/200 in 12.2 and 25.8.

Nerva will go to Maracaibo, Venezuela, at the end of July for the Fourth Central America and Caribbean T&F Championships. There she will face the Cuban and Jamaican speedsters.

880 RELAY RECORD TO TSU

Knoxville, Tennessee, April 13/14:-Averaging 24 seconds flat, the 4x220 relay team from Tennessee State set a new American record for the 880y relay and missed Australia's world mark by just 0.1 of a second. The team of Diane Hughes, Iris Davis, Pat Hunter and Theresa Montgomery will unfortunately probably not have another run at this distance this season and so must settle for the new American mark. 





"Will we have this same problem for the outdoor Nationals." It is time those in charge communicate with the coaches and athletes giving specific and explicit instructions. Note I say communicate with the "coaches and athletes" - not with the District Chairmen who may receive such information and sit on it without distributing it to those who are vitally concerned. Time is slipping past and the Nationals will soon be upon us. Let us know - what is the procedure. We want the best USA team possible for our International competition so let's not have anyone ruled out on a technicality.

So, who's to blame and how do you enter an athlete properly? I entered Neufville in the Indoor Championships, listed her 440 mark, where it was made, what the date was. Yet her entry was illegal. Who is responsible for getting the marks to the National Statistician? Surely not the coaches of the athletes for some coaches have been known to stretch marks a bit. Who is responsible? Is it the meet directors or is it the District Chairmen? Let's have the royal scoop from the administrators so things can be coordinated and we can get our best athletes entered legally into the National Championships this year and all the years to come.

YORDANKA BLAGOYEVA

Interview with Yordanka Blagoyeva, indoor and outdoor world record holder in the high jump, taken from Der Leichtathlet, East Germany, for 5 April 1973. Coutesy of "Track and Field Hews".

Yordanka Blagoyeva, born 19 January 1947; 5'8% and 139 pounds; teaches sports; married and has a son. Interview by Klaus Fiedler:

- Q: When were you actually the Bulgarian record holder for the first time?
- A: In 1965. At that time I jumped 1.69/5'6%. The first jump over 1.70/5'7 came two years later. From then on it went slowly forward for me; in 1969 I was over 1.80/5'10% and in 1972 over 1.90/6'2%.
- Q: And when will 2.0m fall?
- A: I am no prophet. We will probably see the first woman's 2.0m jump before Montreal.
- Q: From Yordanka Blagoyeva?
- A: Why not? I have now found the correct combination of runup, jump and straddle technique. The 2m entices me. Q: Who else do you think could jump 2m?
- A: Gusenbauer, Witschas, Kirst-Schmidt, Hubnerova and possibly a few others.
- Q: You named only jumpers who use the straddle. Was that intentional?
- A: I have more confidence in straddle jumpers. They perform steadily. The flop jumpers are dependant on the situation. Of course it is possible one of them could do it - but personally, I don't believe it.
- Q: At 1.74/5'8%, you really are no giant among jumpers. Is that a disadvantage?
- A: Valeriy Brumel jumped 43cm/1'5" higher than his own height. Why shouldn't we women do as well? The height isn't always decisive. A lot of things are necessary to make a good jumper.
- Q: You performed so assuredly in Rotterdam, (at the European Indoor Championships). Wweren't you interested in what the other jumpers were doing?
- A: Certainly it interested me, but I didn't let it affect me. I had my plan, and I followed it. From that came the certainty of my condition. I wanted to jump at least 1.90/ 6'2% in Rotterdam. I turned myself on. And then turned it off ...
- Q: Is it always so easy to do?
- A: Of course not. I believe that the world record in September gave me a lot of confidence. Now I enter a competition much more relaxed than I used to.
- Q: And what do you think about during the competition?
- A: You will laugh --- often I think of eating. I like to cook and many times I think about things that I am going to cook. BRAGINA RUSSIA'S TOP ATHLETE from 'Sportsworld' Q: Is there a potential Bulgarian to follow you?
- A: Happily the high jump for women is very popular. Perhaps there is a girl somewhere that will follow in my footsteps. Until then I want to keep on jumping. That two meters



Little gymnast Olga Korbut may be the Olympic darling of the rest of the world, but inside the Soviet Union she is way down the list in post-Munich popularity.

Her teen-age pyrptechnics in the Munich floor exercises may have boosted gymnastics among the young in other parts of the world, but she is a distinct second to multi gold medalist Ludmilla Turischeva in that sport alone.

But when it comes to being heroines of the Soviet Union in Russian eyes, both Turischeva and Korbut are beaten out of sight by 29 year old Ludmilla Bragina, 1500m gold medalist who broke her own world record every time she ran in Munich. She is still receiving an average of 100 letters a day asking for details of her training and secrets of her competitive success.


Ludmilla appeals because she is not a glamour girl and holds out hope for those who enter athletics comparatively late in

"I only began training properly when I was 21 and my exlife. ample shows that it is never too late to start sport", she says. Never physically strong, she was often ill as a girl, but as an athlete she does not stint herself. "One must be able to take defeat, and struggle against failure, tiredness, opponents and the weather to do oneself justive."

"There is no training formula except to do it hard and regularly. My personal record is covering 13% miles in a session and I run about 100 miles a week. But that would not suit evervbody".

Although she was beaten in a world indoor mile by America's Francie Larrieu recently, Ludmilla did not consider it anything other than an early training spin.

Her sights are set higher; "My next target is the European Championships in 1974 - and, of course, I hope to be back at the Olympics in Montreal, " she says.

JAN POPPER REPORTS ON OLYMPIC DISCUS

Exactly twelve discus throwers made the qualifying standard of 55 meters/180'5 in the September 9 morning session, with British evt Rosemary Payne, an Olympic novice despite her age of 39, being the last one with a third round effort of 55.56/ 182'3. The Olympic record mark of 58.28/191'2 was almost equalled by Liesel Westermann in the very first throw of the competition, and then was shattered by Menis with 61.58/201'9 and bettered again by three other qualfiers: Tamara Danilova, Gabrielle Hinzmann and lasy but not least, Faina Melnik who managed it on her second try, the first being a very disappointing slip of 53.00/173'10.

Nevertheless, there were some sentimental disillusions as five-time Olympian Olga Connolly, honored by bearing the USA flag in the Opening Ceremonies, tried hard, but unsuccessfully. Olga, a popular and not egoistic captain of the US woman's squad, involved herself in many off-track activities, including a stop-the-bombing petition and a constant pledge for bettering the training conditions of her teammates. Now she failed in the ring, doing 51.58/169'2, a foul and 50.76/ 166'0; but let us remember, that no other mother of four reached Olympic participation this time in any event under such limited training and free-time possibilities as the Melbourne champ had. Thank you, Olga.

In contrast to that qualification round, which lasted from 10:30 until 11:11, the September 10 final, the last field event of the Games, was a tiring affair. From 1500 to 1621, the discus throwers had to battle not only against each other, but also against a tricky wind, against an up-coming cold wave and against constant disturbing factors from other events. In fact, only for a short period, up to Westermann's first long, but foul throw, the public was fully aware of the goings on in the discus ring. After that, only peripheral attention was possible and this came in the pauses between the other eight final contests of the closing day.

One has to bear in mind that never before the 1972 season have more than two women bettered 60 meters/196'10 in the same competition. Therefore, with six throwers exceeding 60 meters as early as round three, in the very tough wind conditions and in the biggest competitive fight in four years, the standard was really sensational. In fact, a last round effort by the youngest finalist, Carmen Ionescu, born 28 July 1951, a Bucharest student coached by her father, increased the number to seven. Lia Manoliu's 58.50/191'll exceeded her winning mark and Olympic record set at Mexico by 22cm/9", but was too short to ensure her a place among the best eight to move her into the final rounds.

Nearly everyone expected a three-way fight between Melnik, Menis and Westermann. The GFR champ, with a flash-like rotation, sent the implement well over 65 meters/213', but stepped over the ring edge with a small part of her shoe-point. Foul. And, as it turned out, a bad decision against Westermann. But then came the first indication that the favored trio weren't the only ones who could be dangerous in this big competition. Tamara Danilova, the 1969 European champ and

always a tough competitor in the big meets, whirled out a toss of 62.64/205'6. fifth best on the all-time list and a decimeter better than her previous lifetime best. Vassilka Stoyeva, whose body weight was announced as an improbable 105 kilo or 231 pounds, came along with a throw of 61.08/200'4. Blackhaired Menis answered with her second best-ever throw - 64.28/ 210'10. In fifteen minutes, the Olympic record climbed almost three meters/10 feet. Although Melnik's next throw was rather disappointing, it was still over the 60m mark, 60.56/198'8. In round two, Westerman did poorly, (by her standards) and

was in danger now of being 9th and eliminated from the final. Stoyeva fouled a throw which was well beyond the 60m mark. Hinzmann climbed to 5th place with 59.14/194'0, Menis did only marginally farther this round, but Melnik went into action at ober 61 meters - 61.32/201'2, which still left her only in third place. Round three saved Westermann, whose 62.18/204'0 surprisingly was her best of the entire afternoon. And Lyudmila Muravyeva, Sovier champ of the sixties, finally eliminated the defending champ, Manoliu, with her 59.00/193'7 effort. Her teammate, Danilova, added another bit to her initial improvement and looked now like a medal winner. But shortly after, Stoyeva exploded unpredictably with a long, long toss close to the 65 meter line - 64.10/210'7, a two-meter improvement of her record and a distance bettered only by the two "M's" in their best days. Menis was in the lead by a mere 8 cms/3", and so, after Hinzmann's significant 60.12/197'3 throw, everyone was eager to get at the leaders. Menis did "only" 60.88/199'9, but Melnik did even poorer - 57.96/190'2, and was now in fifth position.

Those who closely follow this event were understandably upset and confused. Of course, Faina Melnik's habit of being a very inconsistent thrower during each competition with her concentration on one or two big explosions was familiar to the experts, but the question mark in this battle was not the nerves or form of Faina, but the opposition. Where were the limits of the two Balkan-based challengers whose strength exceeded by far anyone known in the discus circle both in terms

of visual appearance and the tons of weight they handled so easily in the closely followed weight-lifting sessions prior to the Games. Thoughts of 70 meters/ 230' flashed through the minds of the experts. Could it happen now?

Well, Olympic contests are certainly not the best grounds for discus records is the usual accepted saying. But wait! Look what happens in round four.. Westermann, Danilova and Hinzmann all threw solid 61 meters, Stoyeva again bested her pre-Games record with 62.24/204'2 and at 1555, Menis added almost a meter to her leading mark with a splendid 65.06/213'5. Remember, the world's first 65 meter throw was made a mere 14 weeks earlier. Then Faina stepped into the ring, recalling all of Kim Bukhantsev's advice to her during the long training sessions prior to the Games. Her effort resulted in an excellent delivery which this time overcame all the wind effects in the stadium completely. The discus came down far beyond Menis' Olympic record flag at 66.62/218'7, a mere 14cm under the world record, certifying Faina's fantastic fighting qualities. Melnik won it, moving from fifth place - the same position Ludvik Danek had before his winning effort in the men's event some days earlier. But Danek did it in the last round while here Melnik had to wait through two more rounds as her super opponents took dead aim at the now leading mark.

With her own last two tries clearly on the declining side, Melnik watched the fouls of Danilova and Westermann, the solid improvement of Hinzmann, and the all-out efforts of her nearest contenders from the Balkans intensively. The agricultural school graduate from Sofia and the mother of a son, Stoyeva, added to her best in round five, reaching 64.34/211'1, then settled down to a "mere" 62.10/203'9 on her last throw for an unexpected and joyously appreciated bronze medal. Menis fought excellently, driving for 63.78/209'3 on her fifth and 64.90/212'11 on her last attempt for an admirable six throw average of 63.12/207'1 - a distance bettered by only four other throwers in history - not four throwers with a better average, but only four throwers with solo throws beyond that distance.

All three conquerors smiled broadly and enjoyed a good atmosphere of relaxation, typical of the discus-throwing fraternity (or sorority), afterwards. Stoyeva received most pleasant words from Melnik and Menis as she was the surprise of the event. And for a moment, Menis spoke of the future: "Maybe next time..." And just a few weeks later, as a sort of consolation - she did get the world record. But for Olympic gold she must wait for Montreal.

KARIN BURNELEIT

Former world 1500m record holder Karin Burneleit, GDR, was for a long time only a spectator in track and field athletics. At the beginning she only practised in obligatory sports at school in Tollow, Wismar district, and later in Grevesmuhlen where she successfully concluded the 12-year extended secondary school. This was followed by her apprenticship as a gardner, which she concluded by obtaining the skilled worker's certificate.

Then she started her university studies in Berlin and attended several general student sport training sessions. Her sports teacher at the university, Kurt Salk, also noted the plans Karin had in the field of sports. He registered her moderate performances attained in secondary school over 100 meters (14.8) and the long jump (14'%). He also nodded assent when she said, "I would like to practice the long jump, I like it", but then he asked her to run a round on the sports ground, then tp walk a round, then to run one again - altogether six rounds. Karin Burneleit, 20 years old at the time, did not stick to this instruction. She ran all six rounds without interuption. "That was decisive", Kurt Salk recounted later. "I was convinced she would become a middle-distance runner."

Karin completed her first 800 meter race in the winter of 1963 indoors. Shortly before her start, Kurt told her: "I have nominated you for the 800 meters. Here are the running shoes with spikes..." Karin was afraid like a young filly. "I am to run with spiked shoes? I have never worn any before. And over 800 meters..." She finished second in the race and her time was 2:27.0s.

Just the same, it took years until Karin lost her doubts and her inferiority complex and became self-confident in her performances. The breakthrough came at the 1968 European indoor championships in Madrid. There she won the 800m final in a manner which she likes till this day - immediately at the



start she took over the lead and defended this position to the finish.

In 1969 Karin Burneleit interrupted her training and competition program. She gave birth to a son. A year earlier, at the Olympic Games in Mexico, she was eliminated from the competition in the second round heat over 800 meters. Her old friend and trainer, Kurt Salk, voiced the opinion then: "Karin's future is in the 1500m run. At that distance she is best able to run away from any pursuers because she has perseverance and she can fight."

She fulfilled this vision in August of 1971 in the 1500 final at the European Championships. In a tactical and very clever race, and supported by her teammates Gunhild Hoffmeister and Regina Kleinau, she had the greatest reserve of strength at the end and won the title and the world record in the final


spurt. "I was not tired at all when the race was over", she

HIGH SCHOOL TRACK RICHARD EDE, Editor

Probably the biggest news anywhere this month was a California Interscholastic Federation ruling allowing girls to compete on heretofore boys' teams in varsity sports. <u>Azusa's</u> Ruth Kleinsasser and <u>Corona del Mar's</u> Jennifer Walt have already announced plans to take their school up on it. Ruth ran a 2:14.0 half at the Arcadia Invitational and a 2:10.7 at the Mt. San Antonio Relays (to atone for a slowish half mentioned here last month), and Jennifer has jumped 5'6 this year.

Since the last issue, I have received several letters from coaches across the country wanting to know how their girls stack up with other "high school level" competitors. I hope that by publishing marks achieved in high school competition, rather than open AAU, (although there is a great deal of overlap) this column might serve to provide some relatively objective standards for comparison.

Southern California schools are heading toward the firstever CIF (Southern Section) T&F Championships for girls on May 19 and 25, (in conjunction with the boys' championships). Although we go to press before the entry deadline, we do have a mixed bag of qualifying standards to report. Some of the standards sound a bit tough considering the number of schools with high-powered programs, (220-27.8, 80yH-12.5), while others seem designed to allow a rather large representation, (100-12.3, 880-2:45, 8#SP-30'), but the remainder seem representative of the state of the sport: 440-66.0, Mile-5:50, LJ-15'6, HJ-4'6, 4x110-54.0, Medley Relay 2:04. The results should make for interesting reading next month.

Results from two invitationals and a scattering of marks have come in from around California. The Arcadia Invitational, in addition to Kleinsasser's 880, also produced a series of fine marks. The 100 registered five girls with 11.6 or 11.7 clockings led by Jardon from Muir or Pasadena. In spite of placing two others in addition to the winner in the 100, Muir lost the 4x110 relay to Laguna Beach, 51.0 to 51.1. Ventura HS was well represented as Boatner and Lewis went 1-2 in the 440, (61.9, 62.8) and 2-3 in the 880, (2:24.5 and 2:26.1). The Farrell sisters from Ventura went 1-3 in the high jump at 5'l and 5'0, split only by Arcadia's own Farrell at 5'0 - making for a most unusual result: 1-Farrell, 2-Farrell, 3-Farrell! Valendia's Ilertson threw 41'5 to win the shot by more than 8 feet. One of the most interesting runs of the evening was Alhambra's Mary Lee Erickson's 59.2 anchor on the medley, coming after the second and third runners collided and fell. Royal ran away with the race in 1:52.1. Four jumpers were over 16 feet in the long jump led by University's Czony at 16'9%.

In the other Relay Carnival, the Chino Relays, <u>Upland</u> parlayed sprint speed to a relays title as host Chino won the combined boys' and girls' sweepstakes. Girls' runnerup <u>Claremont</u> dipped their fourth quartermiler under 65 but unfortunately the mile relay is not a recognized event. <u>Ontario Christian</u> HS boasts a great sprint squad led by Angela Wind, (12.1w hurdles).

Former high jump great (5'8) Sharon Callahan, forced into retirement by recurring knee problems, is keeping her hand in as assistant coach at La Serna HS. Some of her talent must have rubbed off as she has two jumpers over 5'0 consistently in Rosetta Birt (5'2) and Karen Amende (5'3). Birt is also an 11.0 sprinter while Maureen Radcliffe has covered the half in 2:26.

Reports from outside California: From James Milligan, Council Rock Schools, Newton, Pennsylvania:

"Girl's track and field is a new and upcoming sport here in Bucks County, Pa. We do not have the large population to draw from like our neighbors in Philadelphia, but the interest is running high and the turnouts have been very good. We had 140 girls sign up for the spring season, not bad for a sport that is not "recognized". This is our second year of competition. As of this date girl's track still remains a do-it-yourself effort. The State of Pennsylvania has not yet taken girls track under its wing and locally we must fend for ourselves. We haven't reached the level of the Los Angeles Track Club or the Atoms, but at least we have produced an area of interest for young girls." (Despite running in the snow -Ed.) Mr. Milligan lists some excellent times: Junior LeeAnne Plesser (11.5, 27.5, 6.4), senior Chris Atkinson (16'4%), sophomore Betsy Belmont (63.5 indoors in her firstever 440), sophomore Judy Fetterolf (93'6 discus).

From John Carroll, Lawrence HS, Falmouth, Mass:

"I would like to volunteer some information about our program in Falmouth. We have the following girls and their 1973 performances: Patti Barr, senior, 11.6/26.2/61.0; Michelle Dufresne, sophomore, 7.2 (50yH0; Cindy Shepherd, junior, 59.2/ 2:21.9/5:22.0(i); Sue Nowak (senior) 103'6 (DT); 880Medley, 1:53.6. "We have a few other good girls in this state; Claudia Graham (Melrose HS) has run 5:20.4 and Kathy Whitcomb of Sommerville HS ran 5:15.3 indoors. I am sure there must be others....Falmouth has won the State HS Girls' XC meet for the past two years and was New England AAU Women's team champion this year. We ended up 7th at the Jr. Nationals this year at Kettering, Ohio."

From Carl H. Phillips, Washington, DC: "The Annual Eastern HS Relays held three events for girls teams. Coolidge HS won two of the three races, with Roosevelt HS winning the other and placing second behind Coolidge in the other two. 440yR, Coolidge 51.3, Roosevelt 52.8; 880R, Coolidge 1:50.0, Roosevelt 1:50.2; 880 Medley, Roosevelt 1:53.9, (Brinkley 59.1).

"The Marc Jenkins Relays was another example of how women's track is pushed to the background when run in conjunction with men's events, (Ed note - see above CIF ruling for California). The top three teams were put in different heats. The 440, 880 and medley relays were run back to back as were the hurdles relay and the mile relay.

"An outstanding performance was turned in by Sandra Upshaw of Roosevelt. In the 440 relay, Sandra received the baton 5 yards behind Jackie Taylor, (6th in the Girl's national 100), and came within a half step of catching her. In the next event, Sandra ran 25.7 over 220 yards. Then she ran a 110 leg on the medley relay in the next event. Later on, she ran the third leg of the hurdles relay and finished with a lap in the mile relay. 440yR, Coolidge 52.3; 880yR, Coolidge 1:49.3; 880yMedR, Coolidge 1:55.2; shuttle hurdles (400y, 4 hurdles), Eastern 56.8; MileR, Coolidge 4:31.0s.

From Gerald Christensen, Thunderbolt TC, Kansas: "I am sure you will be interested to know the progress of the Kansas girls and some significant times and distances. The State has over 340 high school girls track teams out of a possible 410 high schools. Last year over 5000 girls competed in a statewide program. Summer track is excellent with several track teams providing continued motivation. Lincoln HS, Mankato and Dighton High Schools have three of the primary sprinters in Leesa Wallace (10.9/25.5/57.8), Diane Grout (10.7 as a sophomore, third place winner in the USTFF 100), and Charmane Smith (11.0/25.3/58.8/18'5%, a junior), respectively. Inman

HS has Cheryl Freisen who jumped 4'6 indoors. "Junior High track is equally big in Kansas with many girls competing".

From Rotary Relays, Manchester, Tennessee: "The 3rd Annual Rotary Relays were a tremendous success. Held on the allweather track at Coffee County Stadium in Manchester, Tennessee, the third edition of the Relays attracted 50% more entries than last year. Seventeen senior high schools and fifteen junior high school were entered with a total participation of 317 girls. Six new meet records were established.

Changes in this year's format included the substitution of the llOy (100m) hurdles for the 80y hurdles and the inclusion of the mile run.

A unique feature continued to be the Team Decathlon wherein ten different girls from the same school compete in ten different events. Points are earned based on performance with the team compiling the highest number of points being the winner. Hillsboro HS of Nashville replaced David Lipscomb HS also of Nashville, as the Team Decathlon winner.

A team from Ringgold, Georgia, was entered in the Relays making this meet the first inter-state girl's track meet held in Tennessee. Best results included: 440yR, Hillsboro 52.4; Jr HS 440yR, New Providence 53.2; 110yH, Sherry Salley (Church Hill) 16.2; 50y, Deborah Young (Shelbyville) 6.5; 880, Chris Skinner (Hillsboro) 2:27.2; 220, Sally Clunan (Hillsboro) 27.4; Jr HS 440, Ann Rego (Du Pont) 63.7; DT, Janie Seat (Lipscomb) 105'6; HJ, Laura Ward (H) 5'4 and Carla Tart (Manchester) 5'4.

From Myron Glass, Lourdes High School, Rochester, Minnesota:

"Girl's track and field in Minnesota has grown by leaps and bounds in the past four years. Public and private school meets have been held for the last three years. One of the stronger high school teams in the State is Rochester Lourdes. The Rochester team boasts four sprinters who have run under 12.2 in the 100y dash and have a strong 4x110 (53.3) and 4x 220 (1:52.6) relay teams. They also have three half milers who have run under 2:35. Carmen King is a State champion with a best time of 2:29.0s.

Lourdes is also strong in the field events. Cathy Mueller and Marriane Wente have both cleared 5 feet in the high jump. Laurie Frey is giving the team strength in the shot by throwing the 8 pound ball over 33 feet.

Because track and field has been growing so fast in Minnesota, it can do nothing but continue to improve.

I liked Ruth Kleinsasser's answer when she was asked if she intended to take advantage of the new California ruling and compete for her high school's varsity cross country team. She said she certainly would run with the boys. For two reasons: first, the boy's race is a mile shorter than the AAU women's race and second, she could be number two on the high school team but only number five on her women's Club team.
