It has now been two months since WTFW contacted our National Chairman, Pat Rico, and our AAU T&F head, Bob Lafferty requesting answers to questions which had been brought to our attention by athletes and coaches. We have had a brief answer from Lafferty giving his side of the Pacific Coast Club-AAU Championship picture, (see story in this issue), but no word from Mrs. Rico and no answers to our other questions from Lafferty. I originally wrote on March 18 and contacted them once again on April 17. No response. According to Albuquerque Olympette coach Floyd Highfill, I shouldn't expect a reply, (see Letters), but I feel it is imperative communication be established between those who run the program and those who participate as performers or coaches. As I pointed out in my April letter to them, coaches and athletes write to this publication with their problems, requesting anonymity because of fear of reprisals against them or their athletes by the National body. This is ridiculous. Why should the administrators and the participants be on opposite sides? Why should anyone fear punishment for suggestions made for the improvement of the sport and the organization? But I know this feeling among coaches and athletes is real.

And so once again I ask these questions of Mrs. Rico and Bob Lafferty for those coaches and athletes who have written to WTFW or have spoken to me in person: In the National AAU Indoor Championships, who did the seeding? On what Basis? Who submitted the qualifying marks to the Committee? Who verified the submitted marks? How is it possible to foul up the seeding when it is done on a mathematical basis? How did some athletes get into the meet without making the qualifying requirements? And what is the story behind the travel arrangements for our International Cross Country team? (See letter from Chuck Debus.)

Communication is the name of the Game. Let's make it a two-way bit, huh!

Sprint, hurdle and long jump performances continue to be problems for statisticians. The shortness of the sprints and hurdles is bad enough for accurate recording, but in the United States we have the added problem of wind - its presence or absence.

At last year's National outdoor championships in Irvine, California, Bob Seaman, the SPAAAU Chairman, made an impromptu survey of the coaches present, and it was almost unnanimously agreed upon that not only were no wind gauges used at their meets, but that the majority of the districts didn't even own a wind gauge. Since a wind reading is required for these e-

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vents, it puts our National Lists in a bad light.

In the 1973 USA Lists, WTFW reported 49 performances in the 100 which were regarded as legitimate - but 20 of those marks were checked with an asterick indicating no wind reading had been included with the report of the mark. In the 220, it was 13 out of 43, 17 out of 39 in the hurdles and 13 out of 26 for the long jump. Nearly one-half of the supposedly legal US marks were not supported by fact. Little wonder so many of the top seeded sprinters failed to advance in the Nationals even as far as the quarter-finals.

How important is wind? Some say it does not make much of a difference, but results say otherwise. In recent talks with athletes and coaches from the south, (where fantastic sprint marks are standard), we were informed there is NEVER a wind gauge at their meets. One Texas athlete recorded a 10.7 100y mark in her State, but was clocked in 11.6 in a regulated meet which included a wind gauge and electronic timing. The 10.2 recorded by Pat Henderson of Texas Southern, reportedly was aided by practically a gale - in fact, the direction of the race was reversed to enable the runners to get fast marks and qualify for the Narionals.

Some meets report the wind in the long jump as, for example, 3.2 wind. Wind must be taken and recorded for EACH jump by EACH jumper - only the SPAAAU turns in reports with that reading so indicated.

Statisticians do not accept wind-aided performances, so should wind-aided marks be acceptable for qualification into National competition? These unverified performances are responsible not only for admitting under-par athletes into the meet, but also bring about faulty seeding. The qualifying standards for entry into the Championships, do not state if wind-aided marks are acceptable or not. Is it not time this point was cleared up?

Let's do what we can to straighten out news releases. Now that our sport is coming more and more into the spotlight, it receives more news space. But the information printed is not always accurate, and we can help the reporters if we keep up with the sport and learn about it. Today (April 25) we received a news release from United Press International (UPI) headlining "Debra Sapenter of Prarie View A&M tied the national record for the women's 200(!) yard dash Friday night, covering the distance in 24.1 seconds in the Pelican State Relays at Southern University. Miss Sapenter's run tied the national record of Edith McGuire set in 1966." About the only correct fact in this release is that Debra Sapenter won. The distance was certainly 220 yards, not 200, and of course the national record is not 24.1. Edith McGuire's record of 23.4 was set in 1964, but the AAU has recently approved the 23.3 performance of Mable Fergerson as the national mark. It is too bad such releases are so full of errors. Evidently the reporter did not check with Debra for she certainly knew 24.1 was not the national mark. Let's help the reporters, who admittedly are neophytes in the sport of women's track and field, to turn in accurate reports.

And while on the subject of newspaper and magazine reports let's see what we can do to get reports filed which state the W's of reporting - who, what, where, when. A typical story in a southern California newspaper went something like this: "Joyce Puffinfeather, a long-legged blonde, won two events here tonight. Miss Puffenfeather defeated Miss Allen and a teammate, Miss Jones, in near record time and the blue-eyed girl set a new field mark at the same time." If men's events were reported in the same fashion, the story would read something like this: "Ralph Boston, a brown-eyed brunette with knobby knees, won two events here tonight. Mr. Boston defeated Mr. Smoothstone and a teammate, Mr. Toomey, in nearrecord time and the long-legged well-built man set a field mark at the same time."

In addition to the obvious chauvinistic remarks in the usual report of women's results, you will note the event and the performance was ommitted. Why reporters insist on calling girls "Miss" instead of simply stating their name, is another mystery. Let's go to work on that problem, too.

Trivia time: Everyone has something that irritates them. Dick Bank's pet peeve is to hear an announcer say "so and so has qualified for the 100 yard dash finals" - when actually they have qualified for the 100 yard dash final. My campaign

is to stop announcers from saying, "so and so had a near miss in the high jump" - anyone with a modicum knows there is no such thing as a "near miss". A miss is a miss. The high jump-er may have had a "near make", but never a "near miss".

LAFFERTY ANSWERS JENNINGS

Bob Lafferty, the AAU T&F Administrator, sends a reply on the Pacific Coast Club participation in the National AAU Indoor Championships:

"Tom Jennings sent us a list of five demands that had to be met before any of "his" athletes would come to the Indoor Championships. The only demand that was printed for the public, was the one that said we sent \$2100 in response to his \$4270 request. I was not about to send him money for nine athletes plus himself, to come from Los Angeles, when Woods lives in St. Louis, Bolding is in Oklahoma, Hilton is in Texas, etc. All of his athletes were not defending champions, which is another point. Unfortunately, Tom got the better side of the publicity."

JENNINGS ANSWERS LAFFERTY

Tom Jennings, Pacific Coast Club coach, pens the following reply to Bob Lafferty:

"It should be pointed out that we could care less about the competition itself as it is an unweildy one-day meet, in the worst-ever city, at the end of a long season. Our athletes are not at a level that they are seeking a "title" or a patch for their warm-ups.

"We have had some difficulty in the past on allocations to the Nationals. Most notable of late has been the '74 indoor meet and the '73 outdoor men's championships at Bakersfield where Leonard Hilton (mile in 3:55.9) and Jim Bolding (400mH in 48.8) both won, yet had to pay their entire expenses from Houston and Oklahoma City respectively. (On the other hand) Byron Dyce, a Jamaican national from New York, was allocated \$300 and did not place, and, of course, was not eligible for the US National Team."

THE LAFFERTY-JENNINGS 'FACTS'

Jennings' group of nine athletes were, without debate, a most powerful unit. Of the nine, two had set world records during the season, one had a new American record and the other six ranked from #2 in the world to #5 in the USA. All nine would undoubtedly made the US team to compete against USSR.

According to Jennings' figuring, air costs for the nine athletes totaled an even \$3000 with Woods, Semkiw, Hilton and Bolding flying from their own homes to NY. According to Lafferty, expense money is allocated in accordance with the athletes finish in the 1973 indoor championships as well as their noteworthy performances to date. This is true. It is standard procedure. But it is also true the amount offered the PCC was not even enough for transportation and left a deficit even before hotel and meals were taken into consideration. So there are two sides to the problem.

The PCC athletes skipped the Nationals and went directly to Winnipeg for a meet the night following the Nationals. The question arises did the PCC receive a travel allotment, housing, meals, per diem from Winnipeg? If so, and I am not so naive as to believe they paid their own costs, could not the team have competed in New York the day before, added the \$2100 to what they were receiving from Winnipeg and become a part of the US team against the Russians? I guess I shall always remain a flag-waving anti-Communist, pro-USA booster, and I feel the highest honor an athlete can win is to represent his country in international competition. I am not a babe in the woods in the financial wheelings and dealings, so what about an answer to that Mr. Jennings? And what about an answer from Mr. Lafferty explaining why such top world class athletes could not receive money enough to cover costs of taking part in the Nationals.

And, Tom, don't talk to me about winning athletes who receive nothing from the AAU. I had an athlete a few years ago who went to the Indoor Nationals in New York, won three 60y dashes, won 3 60y hurdles and won the long jump and had to pay her own way to the meet. And so did her coach! In addition to which, the spectators voted her the outstanding athlete of the meet, (male or female) for which she was to receive a Longene watch - it has never arrived either!



LETTER FROM KARLIS ZVEJNIEKS, South Dakota

"Last year, I suggested starting a "High School Track" section to you and now it looks like under Richard Ede it is going over great. At least our own area girl's coaches are very much interested. People are interested in comparing the results from different parts of the country. How nice it would be to have a National High School Girls meet every year where the best from all the states could come together. Looks like USTFF meet last year in Des Moines, (which I covered for you), was the move in the right direction. The future of women's T&F in the USA depends upon high school and college athletic programs, the same way it is in Russia, East Germany and other satelite states. I am familiar with such programs as I myself come from Latvia, now under Russian rule, (the same as your Australian correspondent Berni Cecins). They start their athletic programs with young people, selecting the most promising ones and sending them to sport schools to develop their ability. And the results speak for themselves. Why could not something similar be done here? We have a lot of rough talent here in the midwest alone. Let them get the chance to develop under proper training and excellent coaches, specialists each one in their own field."

LETTER FROM FLOYD HIGHFILL, Albuquerque

"I am writing this letter regarding the March issue of WT FW. Just a couple of comments, one of which will support a point of yours and one of which will be in opposition.

"First, the good news. It seems that every year we have to go through the annual fiasco of the National Indoor Championships and the poor management which goes with them. Most of the points are adequately discussed in the coverage of the meet in the March issue of WIFW. As it pertains directly to us, (Albuquerque Olympette Club), our mile relay team, (which ran 3:51.5, the 3rd fastest indoor time this year), was not at the Indoor Nationals. We are proud of the women's track and field program in New Mexico, of our Club and of our mile relay team and would have considered it an honor to represent all three at the Nationals. When it came time to make plans to attend, we had to consider that in addition to the roughly \$2000 it would cost, there was a better-than-even chance that we would not even get an opportunity to try and win because of the unfathomable seeding procedures used at this meet. New York is a long way to go to run second to the Atoms or SITC in your heat and then watch the final from the stands. We decided we couldn't take the chance. All in all, it's a Hell of a way to pick a National team!

"Secondly, I feel I must take exception to your stand regarding the use of sanctions in an attempt to force indoor meet directors to include more women's events in their programs. This is advocating tge same kind of thing which the AAU has been so rightly criticized for in the past - the use of foreign travel permits to try and force competitors to either compete in the National Championships or to accompany a National team on a trip. As the present National AAU code is written, the regulations which must be adhered to in order to obtain a sanction are clear, and running women's events, (or men's events), per se, is not one of them.

"Unilateral action on the part of the women's committee would do absolutely no good. It would require similar action by the men and there is absolutely no chance of that happening. In addition, it should be up to the meet director and promoters and sponsors to determine the exact format and schedule of events which they are going to present to the public. They are the ones who take the chances, not the competitors, coaches, or even the AAU. I can only feel you are forgetting that this is a two-way street. If "mens" meets can be forced to include women in their schedule, then "womens" meets can be forced to include men in theirs. How would the organizers of the Phoenix Invitational like to run 50% more events for men than they now run for women? Our Club now sponsors four meets for women in the New Mexico area each year and we are not going to include men in these meets irregardless of any action taken by any group, (the ACLU included).

"While prejudice, discrimination and plain male chauvinism play a major role in the perpetuation of this injustice, not a small part is the lack of quality performers to fill womens events. Except for an occasional Decker or Huntley or Larrieu, most meet directors are looking at filling a field for a women's event with 5'6 high jumpers and 2:12 half-milers. No matter how you slice it, a 5'6 high jump is a 5'6 high jump, and most track and field fans will not pay from \$5 to \$15 a seat to watch it or to watch girls long jump 18 feet or run five minute miles. (Even our own Indoor Nationals, which should pit the cream of the crop against each other, was won in 4:50, a very poor display of miling, equivalent to men running 4:15-4:20). If you will show a meet director how he can assemble a field of 21' long jumpers or 53 second quarter milers, for a reasonable cost, (or even at the same cost for an equivalent men's field), you will not have any trouble getting women's events into the larger indoor meets.

"The argument that the inclusion of women's events would, in and of itself, improve the competition and quality of women's performers in the US is not very convincing. The Albuquerque Jaycee Indoor has consistently spent more money on women for its annual meet than any other meet in the country, and yet we have seen the quality of performances and performers decrease over the last 4-5 years to the extent that three international team hurdlers could produce only an 8.2 clocking this year in the 60y hurdles, (this after watching the likes of Chi Cheng, Glotzer, Mary Rose, Krug, Donnelly, etc. in the past run 7.6-7.8's almost every year). In 1969, two relay teams ran under 1:18.9 in the 4-lap relay, but since that time, no team has run under 1:20.5 and the event was won last year in 1:23.4. It took only 2:14 to place third in the 880 this year and 59.6 to get third in the 440. In 1969 it took 56.9 for third!

"I really doubt that we have much ammunition to fight the battle with at the present time. If we think we do, then there are two or three things which can be done. We can try to get legislation passed which will equalize the opportunities (won't be done!). We can hustle out and find sponsors for meets which will cater to both men and women, get TV contracts, hire promoters and meet directors, and in general go into competition with the "establishment" (probably impossible to generate the financial resources necessary to do this on a large enough scale). Finally, women track and field athletes as a group could refuse to patronize those meets which did not offer a women's slate comparable to the men in the meet. (I do think that 10 women's events is unrealistic for most meets. More like 6-8 would be acceptable with at least two field events.) If this were done, it would not take the meet directors long to realize the folly of their ways since half a dozen meets would be getting all the women and the only chance to see the Watsons, Johnsons, Deckers, Huntleys, (and their attendant American and World records), would be at these meets. This would, however, place the success of the campaign in the hands of a relatively few athletes/coaches/clubs, (although most meet directors would not run an event for a 'superstar' if they could not also "fill the field" with cheap local entrants. Association chairmen for the women could approve or disapprove a meet's schedule of women's events and "advise" athletes not to enter if they felt there had not been a genuine attempt to equalize the competition.

"I think you will find that passive resistance will accomplish the end much faster than trying to cram legislation down the National Committee's throats. (You can't even get an answer to your letter re: "Reel Talk", WTFW, April, 1974) to the National Chairman and the National T&F boss when you asked some very pertinent and forthright questions! How could we possibly expect anything except staunch resistance every step of the way?

"Some other thoughts: I don't know if subscriptions raise much money for you, but I'll bet you could raise your subscription rates considerably and not lose very many subscribers. Re: your USA All-Time Indoor Top 10 - I doubt that Nora Carter ever ran 7.5 for the 5 m hurdles. It's possible, but I don't recall any time she ever ran the race."

LETTER FROM CHUCK DEBUS, Los Angeles

"Open letter to Ollan Cassell, Bob Lafferty, Pat Rico, Ken Foreman and the AAU Long Distance Running Subcommittee:

"Regarding: Travel arrangements of the US Women's Cross Country Team to the World Championships in Milan, Italy, held February 16, 1974.

"Vancouver was selected as the point of departure by our National Long Distance Running Sub-committee Chairman and coach of the team, Ken Foreman. It was chosen because there was a youth fare (23 and under) from any place in Canada to Italy. The team members were asked to fly to Seattle on March 9, stay overnight at Seattle Pacific College, and fly to Vancouver the following morning to connect with the flight to Italy. This was quite convenient for two of the team members and the team coach as they live in Seattle. However, it was not so convenient for the other four members as they were asked to pay their air fares to and from Vancouver. Three of the four had to pay for a round trip ticket from Los Angeles to Vancouver, while the fourth had to pay round trip fare from Ohio to Vancouver, which is ridiculous unless she was planning to fly to Italy the long way around. These four girls paid a total of \$900 to get to Vancouver so that the AAU could use the less-expensive youth fare. Why should the AAU save money at the expense of the athletes?

"I presented an alternate flight route to the LDRC Chairman which would have the team depart from Toronto, thereby still taking advantage of the youth fare from Canada to Italy. There is a youth fare from LA to Toronto and on to Milan totaling \$485, which is \$63 more than the youth fare from Vancouver to Milan. It would therefore cost an additional \$189 to send the number 1, 2 and 3 runners, (Francie Larrieu, Clare Choate and Julie Brown) from LA to Milan. However, the AAU would have saved \$95 by flying Brenda Webb from Dayton, Ohio, to Toronto and back instead of asking her to pay her way to Vancouver, and then paying the \$210 from Vancouver to Toronto (round trip). Had the AAU paid the extra \$95, the entire team could have departed from Toronto and the athletes could have saved \$900. It should be noted that there were flights from Vancouver, LA and Dayton which all arrived in Toronto

within an hour of one another. Since Toronto was the most convenient place from which to depart, and the most economical, why was the team requested to come to Seattle Pacific College prior to departure from Vancouver? Incidentally, our chairman failed to acknowledge receipt of this alternate travel plan.

"Because of the travel expenses involved, the number one distance runner in the world, Francie Larrieu, was unable to compete as a member of the US team in the World Championship Meet. Her alternate, Cheryl Bridges, went instead. However, Cheryl is no longer eligible for the youth fare (23 and under) which meant that it cost the AAU an additional \$400 to send Cheryl in place of Francie. Where was this money when Larrieu, Clare and Julie appealed for their fare to Vancouver? The money was there all the time. Had it been applied towards the fare to Vancouver, or had the team departed from Toronto, Francie could have competed.

"As it was, our team left Vancouver Sunday morning. They landed in Calgary, in Alberta, and in Winnipeg where they waited 3½ hours, then on to Prescott, Scotland, then to London, England (where they waited another two hours) and finally arrived in Milan on Monday night. If you ran a travel agency with arrangements of this sort, you'd go broke in a hurry. Housing and meals were provided by the AAU from Monday through the following Sunday, the day after the meet. Meanwhile, the US Men's Junior Team arrived in Italy Thursday morning, raced Saturday, (winning the meet), and departed Sunday. Had we used the same travel arrangements, enough money would have been saved on room and board to pay for the air fare of the four athletes to Vancouver.

"The Chairman of the LDRSC was given \$2500 by the US Olympic Committee and the responsibility of planning and budgeting this trip to Italy. It seems that perhaps he was more interested in serving his own ends.

"Summary of Important Points:

1-The coach and his two team members did not have to pay any travel expenses to Seattle while the other four members paid a total of \$900. Is this fair?

2-Why did the coach request the team to arrive at Seattle Pacific College before departing for Italy?

3-Why was the flight schedule so poorly planned that it took 36 hours to arrive in Milan?

4-Why were return flight arrangements not completed prior to departure from the US?

5-Why was it necessary to leave six days early when expenses were so limited?

6-Why was it necessary to leave from Vancouver when alternate plans proved to be less expensive?

7-If the expense money was not available to pay for the four athletes' flight to Vancouver, how did it suddenly become available to send the alternate (who was not eligible for the youth fare) in her place?

8-Why should the AAU save money at the expense of the athletes?

9-The Chairman requested up-to-date competition marks in January and February to establish fitness level for the team members to see if the alternates would have to be used. Why did he refuse our request to see the competition marks of his own two athletes?

10-I am sure our Chairman will supply us with justifyable rebuttal in the next issue which will placate everyone, but why couldn't he acknowledge our request for this information via letter instead of through this medium?

"I am deeply concerned with what I feel to be poor handling of the arrangements for this trip. I do not wish to sabotage the trip or its competitors, as I was one of the initial supporters of US participation in the International XC Championships when I was LDRSC Chairman in 1967. I am appealing to the AAU National Office and the LDRSC to assume the responsibility that is their, so that in the future, athletes who are selected for this team may represent their country without regards to their financial status. A long-range viable plan should be drafted by the LDRSC to be presented to Ollan Cassell and/or the US Olympic Committee which would justify financial support of US participation in the International XC Championships as an Olympic Development project."





THE DIFFERENCES THAT COUNT

Women who run are different from men who run-in ways other than the obvious.

The rules of exercise physiology, of training and racing techniques, apply almost equally to women and men. But the rules of society in general and athletic administration in particular split women and men into two camps—the male being pushed into strenuous sport, the female being held away.

Social influences, more than physical ones, shape women's role in running. The hardest thing for a girl or woman to do, says one of the booklet's contributors, is even to think of herself as a runner. The mythology lingers that this isn't the proper activity for her. Men don't face this. This is the biggest difference between runners of the two sexes.

The Women's discus provided good competition between Linda Langford, Iva Wright and Judy Lane with Langford the winner at 150'3.



Premeet publicity was centered on Francie Larrieu and Mary Decker, (both of whom won their events with ease), and post-meet och's and ahh's went to Cindy Gilbert of the La Jolla Track Club and Mayor Daley's Maren Seidler.

Gilbert, who looked as good today as she did bad just seven days earlier in Tempe, was over 5'10% to equal Debbie Brill's meet record, but more importantly, to set a lifetime best and to move into the number two spot on the US all-time list only %" behind Eleanor Montgomery's American record. The tall leaper had good efforts at the magic six foot mark - and came back the following day with a scintilating 30 foot performance in the shot. Gilbert's weight efforts failed to slow down Maren Seidler's movement toward Earlene Brown's American mark in the shot as she opened her 1974 outdoor season just one-quarter of an inch off her all time outdoor best with a toss of 53'4%.

Mary Decker, although falling short of her predicted 1:59 for her first outdoor race, ran away from a good field over the last 180 yards to win in a fast 2:05.6. Mean Kathy Weston took the lead down the backstraight of the first lap, but by 220 time Decker had moved in front with a 28.4 furling. The field passed the quarter post in 60.5 and veteran Nancy Shafer made her move, pulling up on Decker's shoulder as the two sped down the backstraight for the last time. Decker was 1:32.1 at the 660 pole where Shafer ran out of gas and fell back. Robin Campbell moved into second down the home stretch as she, Weston, Lynn Hollins, Mexico's Charlotte Bradley and Shafer all finished between 2:08 and 2:09. It was a good race.

Larrieu had no opposition in spite of a rather strong field as she led all the way with splits of 69.8, 2:19.0 and 3:29.6 on her way to a 4:40.8 triumph. Canada's Thelma Wright and former indoor world record holder Debbie Heald made vain efforts to keep up.

Renaye Bowen, who just might be the nation's best sprinter, won both dashes in 10.7 and 23.7w, but did not look as good as she had in Tempe the week before. The 100 saw Martha Watson take the lead and stay there for the first 80-85 yards when Bowen and Canada's Patty Loverock caught her and the trio hit the tape together, all clocking 10.7s. Bowen won the 220 easily over Loverock, but not with the authority of the previous week.

Kathy Weston won an exciting 440 over Robin Campbell and Jarvis Scott, turning in the fastest clocking in the US to date with a speedy 54.1s. Scott led into the home stretch where lack of running caught up with her and Campbell and Weston stormed past and Weston, who is harder to beat than a broken drum, turned on the power for her 0.4 margin over the SITC youngster.

Kathy Schmidt opened her 1974 outdoor season with a rather lackluster toss of 192'1 and Sue Brodock set a new national mark in the 5000m walk at 26:00.2s.

Biggest applause of the meeting went to ll year old Mari Gibbs as the Japanese-American squirt zipped to a 5:12.6 time in winning her division of the mile. Mari, who set a new national record seven days earlier in Tempe at 5:11.4, was under the old mark again here today as she won by more than 25 seconds.

PRARIE VIEW 1:41.1 MEDLEY AT DRAKE RELAYS

Des Moines, Iowa, April 27:-Debra Sapenter's sparkling 53.1 anchor lap gave Prarie View A&M an American record in the 880 yard medley relay (220-110-110-440) to highlight the women's division of the 1974 Drake Relays. The old American record was 1:41.4 set by the West Coast Jets in 1972. This particular event has been plagued by "foreignitis" in the past as Prarie View itself ran 1:40.86 at the Texas Relays just two weeks earlier, but the team had one foreign athlete on it and the mark could not be accepted as an American record - and it missed the American All-Comers mark of 1:40.6 set by Sports International in 1972 with two foreign runners, and equalled last year by Prarie View using foreigner Carol Cummings. This time caoch Barbara Jackett took no chances and put together a team of Marlene Branch, Mary Wallace, Shirley Williams and Sapenter and the foursome got their record. The performance was all the more valuable due to the wind which hampered all performances.

The Atoms Track Club, running without Cheryl Toussaint who was injured the previous week in the 4x220 yard relay at the Dogwood Relays, came close to the world's record in winning the same 880y relay Friday with Linda Corde, Pat Collins, Brenda Nichols and Lorna Forde wunning 1:36.4. Here again, had the Atoms broken the world mark, it would be listed only as an All-Comers mark since Forde is not a US citizen. The Atoms got a race from the Mayor Daley YF that clocked 1:36.9 with Rosalyn Bryant running leadoff. Rosalyn had won the 220 previously Friday in 24.1, bucking a wind all the way. In the medley, she collided with Valerie Millan on the exchange, and although Millan fell, the team still rallied to finish third in 1:46.8s. The Iowa TC, thanks to Debbie Esser's 55.8 anchor, picked up fourth.

Brenda Webb defeated a field that included Barbara Lawson, Sue Parks and Karen MacHarg in a 5:00.2 mile that would have been many seconds faster had the 35mph wind gusts not been a factor.

In the High School division, Debbie Carroll of Collins, Iowa, became the first performer to win four straight Relays titles as she led the 100y field in 11.2 against a 7mph wind. The Carroll family has now won five straight Relays titles in this event as sister Cathy triumphed in 1970.

Woodbine, led by Debbie Esser, won the 440y relay in 50.2 with a new school in the Iowa girl's track picture, Indianola, second.

Lynn Cannon, unattached from Sacramento, threw the javelin to a personal best at 184'4 and Francie Larrieu trounced Cindy Poor in a fast 1500m, 4:14.8 to 4:21.9s. Kathy Weston was a double winner in the 440 at 54 flat and the 880 at 2:10.3s. Berkeley's Debbie Byfield won the 100 and 200 meter sprints in 11.9 and 25.4

At Quantico, Virginia, in the Marine Corps Relays, Robin Campbell won the 880 (2:11.4) and the mile (4:59.4), Willye White made her debut with a long jump win over Nigeria's Modupe Oshikoya 20'4 to 19'8; Denise Wood threw the discus 152'7; Karen Moller high jumped a fine 5'10 to defeat Canada's Hanna at 5'8 1/4 and Oshikoya at 5'6.

As high school track moves outdoors for keeps this year, we have a widespread set of results to report. In Connecticutt, Fitch, Ledyard and St. Bernard have all posted some excellent dual meet results. Monica Hyman of Fitch has run 11.9 for the 80y hurdles and teamed with Dolores Williamson, Yvette Hyman and Robin Lowe to score a dual meet 1:56.9 medley relay. Yvette Hyman leads the team with an 11.9 hundred; Lowe has 440/880 bests of 62.9/2:30.0, and Williamson leads in the long jump (15'2%), and 220 (27.5). Dot Richardson of Fitch has an interesting javelin/high jump double of 136'9/ 4'8, and Cara Richardson has marked 37'10 in the shot. Ledyard counts heavily on the distance talents of Lavinia Muncy (2:28.7/5:31.6) and the sprinting of Mary Hill (12.0/27.4) with strong field support from Jane Markley in the javelin (101'2), Debbie Tatmon in the discus (97'6%) and Robin Rogalski in the shot (32'0%). Sue St. Louis leads St. Bernard in three events including a 30'8% shot mark. Connolly lends distance support with a 2:31.4 half-mile, while Pinkston has a 15'11 long jump mark.

Several other Connecticutt individuals have shown good marks. Judy Fontaine of <u>Norwich</u> amassed 3263 points in the Eastern Invitational pentathlon at West Point on April 28 with a good set of marks, (16.9, 26'9%, 4'7, 18'4%, 25.5). Knighton (<u>Northwest Catholic</u>) has an 11.5 100 and a 4'10 high jump. Jan <u>Merrill (Waterford</u>) has clocked 2:23.5 and 5:16.4 to lead the area's middle distance runners. Waterford's Judy Vanness has a 97'l discus throw.

Massachusetts reports fast happenings in relay meets thus far this year. The Falmouth Spring Relays on April 6, (in the rain), took advantage of an all-weather track as host Falmouth set two State records with 10:17.8 in the two-mile relay with Tammy Hennemuth 2:31.4, Cindy Shepherd 2:36.3, Carla Richard 2:38.4 and Johanna Forman 2:31.5 and 4:07.8 (Lilo Nichy 63.8, Hennemuth 60.8, Michelle Dufresne 62.2 and Forman 61.0). Falmouth also placed second in the 440 and the 880 medley relays with Brockton copping both of these in 52.2 and 1:57.7. Brockton ran an excellent 4:18.6 in placing far down the track in the mile relay. Freshman Patty Feeley of Brockton anchored both of her team's wins. For Falmouth, Nichy and Forman are both freshmen and Hennemuth and Dufresne are juniors. The State Coaches Relays in Brockton gave Falmouth a shot at bettering its own mile relay record as the same four girls ran 4:03.6, (Nichy 63.8, Dufresne 60.0, Forman 60.6, Hennemuth 59.2). <u>Brockton</u> also bettered its time in the race in 4:12.8 with Bishop Stang (4:17.5), Bishop Fenwick (4:22.7), Stoneham (4:23.4) and Falmouth's B team (4:26.6) also turning in good times. In the same meet, Brockton once again won the 440 relay in a quick 51.3 with Falmouth (51.8) second and Salem (52.0) third. Falmouth's strength isn't limited to relays as Dufresne has clocked 11.5 in the 80y hurdles, Henne-muth 59.3 in the 440, Forman 2:20.5 (the fastest HS time in the State) and Shepherd 5:33.6. Becky Welch has thrown 110'8 in the javelin, Karen Halloran 27.0 in the 220. The individual marks above all come from a single dual meet in which Richard also clocked a 2:31.4 third place and Stacey Vallas ran 5:43.3, also in third. Bishop Strong athletes must have copped seconds in both distances, but the results are lacking. Two other outstanding Massachusetts marks have been turned in by Diane Ventura (<u>Dartmouth</u>) with a windy 11.3-100 and Margaret McNiff (Bishop Fenwick) with a 5:26.6 mile in a boy's meet.

Moving a bit south, we have results from the Murray State University (Kentucky) Invitational on April 13. Sheree Davis breezed to an 11.7 win in the 100. In the 440, Carol Schafer won in 58.0 with Kathy Shafer (any relation?) second in 60.0. Both girls are listed as unattached. The places were reversed in the 880 as Kathy ran 2:31.8 to Carol's 2:32.7. The Shafer's teamed with Davis and Cheryl Brite to take the 440y relay in 52.1. The unattached athletes gave way to the ream representatives in the field events as Yates of Ballard took the high jump with a leap of 5'0, Karen Breivogel (Haubstadt) took the long jump (16'2) over Delores Radford (Trigg Co.) at 16'1½, with Fhyllis Adams (Calloway Co.) third at 15'10.

Also in the southeast, the Tennessee State University Development Meet on April 7 in Nashville provided some good results. Gwen Newborn (North) clocked two legal 11.5 marks. North's Teresa Baugh won the 100 in 11.1 with Josephine Wright (Glencliff) second in 11.5. The mile was virtually a two girl race with Valerie Waters (Clarksville) winning over Cathy Cocke (Brentwood Academy) 5:17.5 to 5:24.4. The 440, run with heats and a final, was won by Margaret Cross (Harpeth Hall) in 59.9 (61.7h) with Minnie Coleman (TPS) second in 62.2 and Amy Wadlington (<u>Brentwood Academy</u>) third in 63.3. Gross also won the 880 in 2:21.7 to complete a busy day while Waters doubled down from the mile to finish second in 2:25.2. Third placer Marydith Weakley (<u>Clarksville</u>) ran a good 2:31.0. <u>North</u> ran away with the 440 relay in 51.9. Some fine junior high school times were turned in at the meet also as Deborah Brewer (<u>Providence</u>) clocked two legal 12.2's to hold off Debbie Brown (<u>McMurray</u>) in 12.3.

Moving west, the first Houston City Championship meet was held April 5, and Jones walked off with team honors with four individual winners and a 1:46.8 880y relay win. Darlene Brown took the 220 (26.5), Michelle James the 440 (58.9) and the high jump (5'2), and Dora Tolds the long jump (17'5/2). <u>Washington HS</u> won the 440 relay (50.9) with Jones second in 51.2 and Worthing third (51.6). Worthing turned it around in the mile relay with a 4:14.8. Washington was well-represented as Lena Gibbs won the 80y hurdles in 11.1, Venee Gage took a second in the shot (32'3/4) and Joyce Johnson clocked 26.7 in the 220. Vivian White (Furr) was a double winner in the shot (32'10%) and discus (93'7%), and Arletta Mimms (Lincoln) had an excellent 17'1 to place second in the long jump. Rose Stout of Worthing took the 100 in 11.7.

In San Marcos, Texas, at the SouthWest Invitational (April 7), <u>Pflugerville</u> edged <u>Canyon</u> for the team title as the sprinters paced the win. Mary Harne captured the 220 (26.3), Terri Pfluger the 100 (11.8) and the two teamed with Debbie Tracy and Stacey Seale to win the mile relay in 4:19.7. With Nancy Priem in place of Tracey, Pflugerville also took the 880 relay in 1:49.0. In the triple jump, Brenda Warren (<u>Shiner</u>) edged Candy Pawelek (<u>Karnes</u>) 34'9 to 33'3%. The shot was just as close with Judy Anderson (<u>Canyon</u>) winning at 34'9 over Cindy Hungley (<u>Devine</u>) 34'5 and Debra Carpenter (<u>TSD</u>) 34'1%. Vicki Clarke (<u>Houston Sterling</u>) ran a fine 5:16.2 mile. Pawelek won the 440, after her shot placing, in 63.1 over Jane Weatherford (<u>San Marcos</u>) in 63.2. Carol Sheffield (<u>New Braunfels</u>) won the 880 in a fine 2:23.3, and Mary Peterson (<u>San Marcos</u>) ran 26.4 for second in the 220.

Lois Wolf of Whitefish Bay sends a listing for Wisconsin's indoor season, some marks of which sound like they rival outdoor accomplishments. Mary O'Connell (Madison Memorial) continues to dominate the 80y hurdles outdoors with her 11.0 clocking ahead of Dieringer (Fort Washington) with 11.4 and Gerri Cornell (Kenosho Tramper) with 11.5. Cornell also leads the 100 listings outdoors with 11.5 along with Jane Dwyer (Madison West) who leads the 220 (26.3/27.7 indoors). O'Connell completes the circle by holding down second in the 220 at 27.7. Liz Berry (Whitefish Bay) holds the state 880 record (2:21.2 outdoors) is shooting for the mile record this year but Lynn Morin (Nathan Hale) is making things interesting. The two met once indoors with Berry edging Morrin 5:13.5 to 5:13. 7 but Morrin then later ran 5:13.4 and leads the state indoors. In the long sprint, Sue Tallard (Madison Memorial) holds a 62.4 indoor time. June Hickethier (Portage) leads the 880 with an excellent 2:28.3 ahead of Sue Smirl (Waukesha) at 2:29.0 and Berry's 2:29.3. Gerg (Sparta) also has run under 2:30 with 2:29.9. <u>Madison Memorial leads</u> the state 880 med-ley clockings with 1:58.3 while <u>Madison East</u> leads the 440y relay with 53.9. In the field, Cornell leads the long jumpers (17'4%) over Walczak (South Milwaukee) 17'1, Holbrook (Plymouth) 16'10% and at least seven others over 16 feet. In shot, Kathy Neuenfeldt (Manitowoc Lincoln) has a great 41'1 with Okonek (Stevens Point) second at 39'9. Tenth spot on the list is 34'll making Wisconsin possibly the strongest state in the nation in this event. Manitowoc Lincoln also sports two high jumpers over the listed state record with 5'2%. Both Barb Coons and Valentine have cleared that height. Julie Pierce (Menomonee Falls North) leads the discus with a throw of 111'7 ahead of Tith of Kenosha Tremper) with 98'8%. Barbara Lawson, women's coach at the University of Wisconsin-Parkside reports a 42'8% indoor shot mark by Terri Simonsen, a senior at Racine Case HS and two time state champion.

In Iowa, where the 4k shot is the implement used, Kathy Kabele (Spirit Lake) has a mark of 39'll and there are four other girls over 38 feet. At the Drake Relays, several high school girls' marks were impressive. Debbie Carroll (Collins) finished fourth in the open 220 with 25.0 into a 7mph wind. In the mile, Charlyn White (Spirit Lake)placed sixth in 5:15. 6 with Barb Brown (Adel) 8th in 5:17.4. Sue Parks of Ypsilanti, Michigan, running for her girl's high school team, eclipsed both local runners, however, with a fine 5:03.4s. A team of Iowa high school girls ran a 1:47.0 in the 880y medley relay at Drake, due mainly to Debbie Esser's (Woodbine) sub-56 second anchor leg. Carroll ran the 220 and Nancy Warren of Wayne and Sue Heller (Irwin) the 110's. In strictly high school competition, Woodbine copped the 440y relay in 50.2 with Esser anchoring. <u>Indianola</u> was second in 51.0 and <u>Ackley-Geneva</u> ran 51.1. Debbie Carroll won the Iowa HS 100 in 11.2 - for the fourth successive year! And her sister won it the year before that! Sue Haynes (Webster City) was second in 11.4 with Faye Perkins (Crestwood) third, Sue Heller 4th and Nancy Warren 5th, all in 11.7s. Five hundred girls competed in the 100y dash and 440y relay prelims with 8 teams and 8 girls picked to run in the Relays finals.

South Dakota results from Karlis Zvejnieks established the fact that the state is improving its program. Bachman (Faith) leads all sprinters with an 11.4 while Lisa McDowell (Sioux Falls)O'Gormon) leads the large schools with 11.5 as well as the long jump (16'5). Birrewkott of Lammon claims a 26.8 time in the 220 with Susan Bailey (Bonestrel) at 27.4. Wall HS claims a batch of Class B (small school) bests. Tammy Johnson (61.5), Twila Kjerstad (38'0% shot/107 ' discus), and three of four relays (53.8/1:50.8/4:22.9) belong to the school. Jane Wipf (Freeman) claims the 880/mile bests (2:34.3/5:35.4 which is the state record), Terri Seymour (Northwestern) leads the "B" 110y hurdles (16.0), Kay Oswald (Gary) leads the high jumpers with 5'4, Suggs (W. Cinot) the long jump (16'6) and Springfield the 880 medley (1:58.9). In the large schools, Aberdeen Central claims the most leaders with Angie Doerr (5:52.8 mile), and the 440 and mile relays (52.2/4:17.6). Kim McKeon (Sioux Falls Lincoln) claims an impressive 2:24.2 880. Hart (Lead) has run a 62.4 440. Lavone Opitz (Redfield) maintains her lead in the hurdles (15.9). Pam Porter (Sioux Falls Washington) has put 40'81/2 in the shot while Miller claims the state best in the medley in 1:58.2.

Dual meets provide most of the information from California. In the Bakersfield area, the Bakersfield-East Bakersfield meet provided some fireworks as Bakersfield took the 440 relay in 52.0 and East the medley (1:59.9). East also claimed the best of 34'3 (Phillips) in the shot, 103'0 (Sellers) in the discus, and 62.9 (Morgan) in the 440. But all to no avail as Bakersfield won the meet with wins by McCaleb in both sprints (11.7/27.3) a big factor. Also in the same area, Foothill HS claimed a 52.3 relay, 5'2 high jump by Cimental, 16'3 long jump by Lewis, 11.8 100 by Hughes, 27.5 220 by Mc-Culloch to edge North HS whose Secrist put the shot 31'11/2. South High's Bell claims a 27.7 220. In the Sea-Winds League of Ventura County, <u>Royal</u> clipped Ventura. K. Moore (Royal) ran 2:25.7 and sister Barbara 62.4 for wins. Barbara also won the long jump (16'7), 100 (11.4) and anchored the 52.0 relay. Kim Boatner of <u>Ventura</u> ran 63.4 in second in the 440, and Shelly Lewis won the mile in 5:38.8. Julie Lendl of Royal joined the 5 foot club with a 5'2 leap. Ventura has reportedly run 4:05 in the mile relay with Royal second in 4:15.

One of the more prestigious meets in California is the Arcadia Invitational which was held this year on April 20. The quality of competition is indicated by the depth of the fields. The worst of the 15 shot putters entered claimed a 33'4 mark while the best was Valencia's Kay Ilertson at 39' 81/2. Number 15 in the long jump was 16'3 with Pam Curran of LaReina (which does not have a girl's team) and Jenny Stary (Claremont) leading at 17'3% and 17'3%. Ilertson upped her best of the year to 40'3 to win the shot over Heidi Kauti (LaCanada)at 38'10%. The long jump went off form as Curran placed 5th (16'21/2) and Stary was out of the money as defending champ Cheryl Czorny (University) won with a leap of 17'0. The high jump featured eight girls with over 5' marks with Pam Farrall of host Arcadia winning at 5'2. Bayle Butler (Duarte) was a double winner as she copped the 100 (11.3) and 440 (57. 8). Muir HS claimed the 440 relay over Costa Mesa both timed in 50.4, and the Muir pair of Regina Jardon and Sabrina Stauter were 2-3 in the 100 in 11.4s. Barbara Moore of Royal was runner-up in the 440 (58.1) and anchored her 880 medley to victory in 1:51.5 with her sub-58 second lap. The mile was a battle as Jennifer Adams (Agoura) led most of the way by a large margin, only to lose at the wire to Debbie Porter (Simi Valley) 5:30.2 to 5:31.3. Erin Gallagher (Costa Mesa))was 3rd in 5:35.3 with Barbara Sprogue (<u>Arcadia</u>) fourth in 5:37.2 and Kathy Beaty (<u>Coachella Valley</u>) fifth in 5:40.3.

Moving out of the United States, the Jamaican Schoolgirl Championships were held on March 14/15. Regina Montague won the under-19 100m in 12.1 as Dorothy Scott took the under-17 race in 12.1 (12.0sf). Montague also won the 200m (24.9/24.8 sf) with Maureen Robinson second (25.8h). Maureen Gottshalk, who came 4th in the under-17 100 after a 12.2sf, won the 200 in 24.5 pressed by Scott in 24.6. Gottshalk also claimed the 400 in 56.1 with Carletta McNab second in 56.8, Elaine Ramsay third in 57.6. McNab doubled back to win the 800 in 2:18.8 ahead of Carmen Watson (2:19.2). In the 100m hurdles, Y. Henry won in 17.7 with Hamilton second at 17.8. The high jump found two girls at 5'3 as J. Watson won the under-19 and J. Angus the under-17 events. Gallimore won the long jump at 17'9/5.41m with Montague second at 17'64. In the under-17, Scott unleashed a leap of 18'61/2 to beat McNab (17'10%), Mc-Kenzie (17'7) Hector (17'6) and Howard (17'0). Boyd scored a double win in the shot (31'11) and discus (97'5), and Excelsior won the 400m relay in 50.2 (49.7sf). Vere Technical school won the under-17 relay in 48.4.


NEWS OF MAJOR MEETS: South Dakota's State meet will be May 18 in Watertown. Wisconsin will hold its state meet June 1. Massachusetts will hold its 6th Championship meet at the University of Massachusetts in conjunction with the boy's meet on June 1. Prelims will be held by districts on May 18 and 25 with the first four in each event to qualify. According to John Carroll of Falmouth, defending champ Brookline does not seem likely to repeat "since Massachusetts has a 1-1-1 rule for State meets", which opens the door for Brockton and Falmouth to fight it out. (Ed. note: Will someone please explain a 1-1-1 rule to me? I'm in the complete dark!) There will be no All-American meet in Des Moines this year, however, the International Prep in Chicago will include a girl's 220 and 880 for the first time. California's CIF-CCS meet will be May 16/24 at San Jose City College, (meet director Janis Nay at Leland HS). CIF-SS qualifying standards are as foll-ows: 100-11.9; 220-27.8, 440-65.0, 880-2:40.0, mile-6:15, 80y H-12.5, 44_yR-63.2, 880yMedR-2:00, SP-32', HJ-4'8, LJ-15'10. The prelims will include a kind of repechage as an experiment. CIF-SS is also recommending adding a mile relay to next year's championships. Louisiana held regional qualifying meets on May 4th with the top two to the state meet on May 11th.

The restrictions placed on high school athletes preventing them from competing on outside teams is coming into question in several areas. A judge in Washington (State) has apparently ruled that the school (and state high school athletic bodies) can NOT regulate a student's out-of-school activities. and correlatively the outside activities should have no bearing on the student's in-school participation. John Carroll of Massachusetts has bemoaned the fact that his mile relay team cannot find sufficient competition in strictly high school meets to qualify for national competition, (with a 4:03.6, that's not hard to believe). Earl Hackett, whose 15 year old daughter Susan, a 5'10 high jumper, has had only one high school meet thus far this season, is looking for legal precedents to force the Louisiana HS Athletic Association to allow both high school and AAU competition. Anyone with information can contact him at 10125 Suzanne Dr, Harahan, La, 70-123. My own team (Claremont) features two 125' javelin throwers who will have to make a choice between the javelin in AAU or track in high school next year since the javelin is not allowed in the California HS program and they will not be allowed to compete in both.

Some outstanding performances have just reached us, all of which occured on April 29. Pam Spencer, Great Falls HS, Montana, who was sixth in last year's Nationals, high jumped 5'10 with three close efforts at 6'0 in a meet in Great Falls. Pam is only 16 and a junior at Great Falls. In the same meet, MerriAnne Furlong, (who should be a sprinter with that name), threw the javelin 130'10. Furlong is a senior.

One the same afternoon across the country, Dottie Richardson, a 17 year old senior at Fitch HS, Hartford, Connecicutt, threw the spear 147'6. She had thrown 134'3 and 136'5 in her last two meets.

She will be 16 this month.....Poland's "Athlete of the Year" voting result: 1-Irena Szewinska, 2-Elzbieta Katolik. 3-Grazyna Rabsztyn, 4-Danuta Piecyk, 5-Daniela Jaworska, 6-Ludwika Chewinska....

In England, the Sports Council announced a million-pound grant toward the building of the Sports Centre in BirminghamLucy Vaamonde, Venzuelan athlete, is pushing Janet Brown for title of Vagabond Athlete of the Decade. Lucy, as is Janet, is now at Texas Women's University.....Speaking of England, did you ever run there? Timing is quite different and you'll earn every record you get. For example, Bob Sparks was in Moscow for the USA-USSR indoor meeting and clocked the 60m at 7.3 - official time was 7.1; clocked the 60mH in 8.5, official time 8.3; clocked the 60mH (Pentathlon) in 8.6, official time was 8.3....West Germany's 2:01.9 800m runner, Gisela Ellenberger is now Gisela Klein....

Some say it is too easy to switch clubs in the USA. From the viewpoint of writing for this magazine, I know it is difficult to keep up with the changes.
