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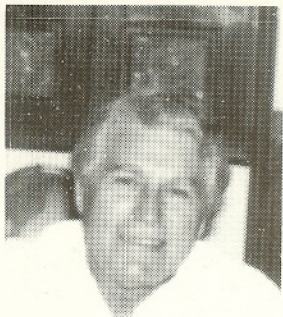

Our battle with the American starters has gone on for more than two decades. Starting in America has been a guessing game for so long that the starters have the sprinters brain washed. Runners and most coaches in the USA do not know the proper way to start a race. Certainly the starters don't know - or are scared of and intimidated by the speedsters and the spectators. In last month's magazine I told of the TV tape secured from a Frankfurt, Germany, TV station which showed the runners time from movement at the 'on your marks' position until the firing of the gun was 3.2 seconds. At the AIAW Indoor Championships, I conducted an informal survey of coaches and athletes. All were asked the same question: "Do you think the starter holds the runners too long? Too short? Or about right?"

Response from the athletes: 1 vote for too long, 3 votes for too short and 6 votes for about right. From the coaches: 2 votes for too long, 2 votes for too short, 7 votes for just about right, and 1 vote for too inconsistent.

We clocked the starters during the two days in the sprints and hurdles. Don't know how that 'inconsistent' got a vote for 95% of the time the gun was fired at 0.9. Once, only once the runners had 1.0 to get set before the gun was fired and once it was fired in 0.6 - but that was after there were 3 false starts in the race. These starters were so consistent you could tell when the gun was coming.

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We attended the Redlands Invitational, an all day and evening affair with many trial heats, and the runner's were NEVER given more than 0.8 seconds, usually 0.6.

What value is there in learning the correct 'set' position in the USA? The runner never gets to use it. Why work to assume a powerful position in which skill determines just how well you get away from the blocks? Here the wise runners wait until the starter says "set", wait a few tenths and roll right out. Little wonder most of our sprinters don't run as fast in international competition as they do at home.

The AIAW made a horrible scheduling error when they put the Indoor Championships in Iowa the second week in May. That is the weekend of the State of Iowa Girl's High School Basketball Championships. The girl's semi-final and final games are televised and most of the State closes down. During the three days we were in Cedar Falls, not one single word ever appeared in the local paper about the National Collegiate Championships.

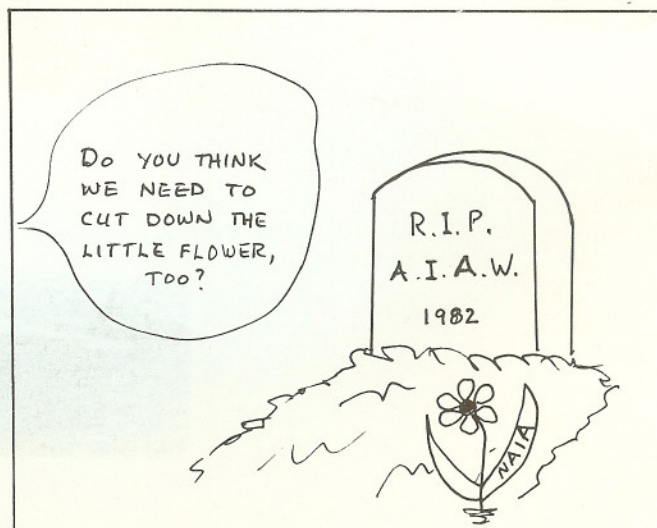
We watched the girl's basketball games as played in Iowa. Six persons per team, three forwards and three guards. Players can not cross the center line. Makes for a great spectator game for there is continuous action where ever the ball happens to be. Of course while all that action is going on around the ball, the other six players stand around in their end of the court and catch their breath so they can go hell bent for election when the pelota gets into their half of the court. It's great to watch but of course it isn't basketball.

While on the subject of Naismith's invention, we once again viewed the NCAA Collegiate basketball championships on TV and just like last year, we kept waiting for the teams to take off their warmup jackets - ah, but no, those long sleeved, long waisted things they were wearing were their GAME uniforms. Must report I like the styles found out here in the west, pah-dnah, a wee bit better to look at. And we must congratulate the teams in the final for being able to manouver in those weighted vests they were wearing.

WHAT WE NEED among other things, is more coverage for Division II and Division III schools. 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AIAW - CHAMPIONSHIPS

Cedar Falls, Iowa, March 12/13:--You can't get to Cedar Falls without passing through Waterloo and one might say no one escaped Waterloo except Nebraska. Coach Gary Pepin's charges were awesome, rolling up 84 points, 20 more than runner-up Tennessee. Virginia, last year's champions, scored nine more points than they did winning it all in '81 and ended up 4th.

Nebraska's strength, of course, lies in the short runs and the relays. The Cornhuskers were 1-2-3-5 in the 60y dash for 26 points. They added 18 more digits in the 300 with 1-3-5 and picked up a third in the 60y hurdles. With Jennie Gorham running on all three relay teams, Nebraska added 18 more in the 4x220 (1st), 4x440 (3rd) and 4x880 (5th). Nancy Kindig was second in the pentathlon and Tami Essington picked up the other two points with a fifth in the 1000.

There were some raised eyebrows after the declarations were in and they were raised with a look at Tennessee. The Vols scratched all their relay teams which caused some people to wonder why Coach Crawford brought the team all the way to Cedar Falls. But with all of their personnel performing up to par, Tennessee grabbed the runner-up spot winning three events (shot, hurdles and 600), picking up 6 points in the mile, 2 in the 440 and getting two super runs from Kathy Bryant in the two and three mile runs for 16 more points.

Two world indoor bests were recorded. For the eighth time since 1980, Merlene Ottey broke the 300y mark and Tennessee's Delisa Walton, who seemed to be more proud of a silly old diamond than her new record, got the world best for 600 yards.

Foreign students won exactly half of the individual events and the best remark of the two days came from Missouri sprinter Ramona Riley who greeted me with her name and then "but I don't look Irish".

The facility was extra special. An eight lane tartan surface was ideal for these championships. Officiating was satisfactory. My only complaints would be aimed at the announcer who gave results backward by announcing the mark, then the school then the place and finally the name. By the time the spectators found the name in their program, they had forgotten the performance. One other, a perennial complaint of mine. One runs in the FINAL of the 60 yard dash, not the FINALS.

Good meet! At first it seemed the entry list was very small, but a deeper look showed the top athletes were on hand and that's the way a national championship should be.

60 YARDS

Nebraska scored 26 points in the final of the 60 placing 1-2-3-5. All four Nebraska finalists ran their season best in the final. Surely nothing more could be asked of these fine athletes.

The heats eliminated a couple of name runners in Randy Givens of Florida State and Beatrice Reese of UTEP plus a few lesser-lights, but the form ran rather true.

SUNY's Tracy Armstead false started once in the final and Ottey pulled away from the field at about 30 yards. The real contest was for 4th through 7th as the runners were closely bunched. In addition to the Nebraska quartette, Felicia Moore also had her season best and everyone in the final with the exception of 7th and 8th places ran faster than they had in the heats.

300 YARDS

In 1980, Merlene Ottey cracked the world indoor mark for this distance by running 34.13. In Cedar Falls, Merlene Ottey cracked the world indoor mark for this distance for the eighth time, covering the distance in 32.63. Ottey's stablemates from Nebraska added 18 points to their team total as

Janet Burke finished third and Alicia McQueen placed fifth. McQueen was battling for third until the last 50 yards when she apparently ran out of gas and almost jogged across the finish line.

The world and US lists were rewritten at this distance in Cedar Falls. Ottey, of course, remains World #1. Florida State's Randy Givens equalled the American record with her 34.07 clocking in winning her trial heat and also became the equal #3 on the World list. Benita Fitzgerald was timed in 34.86 in her heat and that puts her #7 on the All-Time US list. In spite of her slowdown, McQueen's 34.94 in the final makes her #10 on the US list. Six of the eight finalists had their season bests either in the heats or the final.

440 YARDS

A mild upset in the 440 final as Lori McCauley of Rutgers, who had seen only the back of Temple's Edna Brown during most of the season, came through down the home straight to win the 440 title by a clear margin in spite of running the final in a slower time than her heat. McCauley's time of 53.99 in winning her heat on Friday, moved her to the #3 position on the All-Time US list.

Everyone in the race with the exception of Edna Brown ran their season best in either the trials or final. Only Stephanie Vega of Brooklyn was a mystery as she ran last in her heat at a time she can almost ramble the 440 hurdles in.

600 YARDS

Possibly the toughest and most competitive field of any event in the Championships was this 600 yard run. Many a coach was heard muttering, "I should have entered her in the 380" - but it was too late. It took just a shade over 1:22 to make it to the final and the final was a good one. Delisa Walton took command by the half-way mark and held on to win with a new world best in 1:17.38 breaking the old mark of 1:18.4 set by Canada's Yvonne Saunders back in 1974. The rest of the field wasn't slow either with the first three under 1:20.

Walton, of course, assumes the #1 spot on the US and World lists and Coleman moves up to #3 on the US list and #4 on the world list. Ovrill Brown's time of 1:20.72 in her heat puts her on the US list in 7th spot and makes her #11 on the world list. Tammie Hart, who was disqualified in the final, had a fast 1:20.89 in her heat. Walton, Coleman, Brown, McIntosh and Hart all had season bests.

880 YARDS

Some good runners got caught in the second heat and watched the final from the stands. Qualifying was for the first two in each heat and then by time and Janet Wood of Florida State, who was just a step behind winners Stormo and Lambelet (who tied), found herself out as did all others in that second heat as six of the seven runners in heat one advanced to the final.

Penn State's Terry Pioli led the first heat through the furlong in 29 and the quarter in 62. Then Walton took over and passed the 660 in 1:37 and held her lead to the end. The second heat was a tactical fight all the way with Villanova's Jennifer Whitfield in front of a tight pack at the 220 in 30.2. At the 440 Doriane Lambelet and Janette Wood were right together in 65, a full three seconds slower than the first heat. At the 660 mark it was Lambelet and Stormo together in 1:38.2 and the two of them hit the tape together. Wood was disqualified to set up the mass entry in the final from heat one.

Walton developed some muscle twinges and scratched from the final. Villanova's Pat Bradley went to the front and led at the 220 mark in a slow 32.5. Doriane Lambelet (McClive) sensed the slow pace and took the lead, passing the 440 in 61.2 and picking up the pace to lead at the 660 in 1:33.1. Lambelet not only held her lead, but increased her margin over the final 220 and won in a season best of 2:05.34. In addition to Lambelet, Iowa's Kay Stormo had her season best as did Jynette Bonner (Purdue) and Terry Pioli (Penn State).

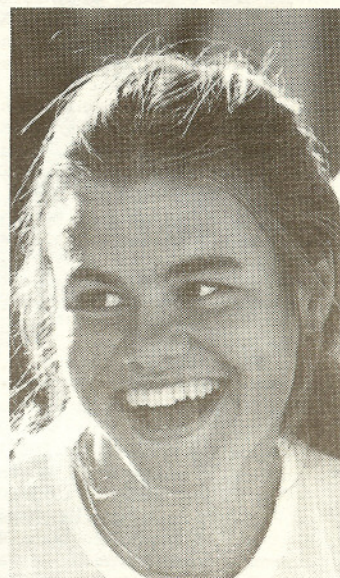

1000 YARDS

The versatile Joetta Clark followed Jo White through the 220 (32) and 440 (65.2) and took the lead just before the 660, passing in 1:37.4, only a tenth ahead of the Richmond runner. Clark went by the half mile mark in 2:09 and cruised to an easy win. White, who ran such a great mile in the distance medley the day before, faded at the end but held on for second spot. Only White (2nd), Frederick (6th) and Schaffer (9th) failed to run a season best and Clark moved to the #7 position on the All-Time US list and #8 on the world list.

TWO MILES

One should really read the report on the three mile run before reading this report on the two mile for impossible as it may seem, Tennessee's Kathy Bryant lost the three mile on Friday and the two mile on Saturday in exactly the same way - but she made no mistakes. The two mile was run in two sections and the first eight places all came from the second flight. Renzi of Penn State won the first flight, but the wheels were in flight two.

Kentucky's Bernadette Madigan went to the front in the fast flight and led the closely packed field through quarter splits of 74.5-2:31-3:45-5:00.7s. Virginia's Martha White was right beside Madigan as they passed the mile mark and took command with a 75 lap and continued in the lead as the group slowed to 77. With six laps to go, White led followed by Kathy Bry-

ant, Aileen O'Connor and Madigan. O'Connor assumed the lead with only four laps to go, a half mile, and she was closely followed by Bryant, Madigan and White. O'Connor turned the quarter in 75 and kept the lead coming into the last lap. At that point Bryant went to the front with O'Connor and Madigan only a step behind. White was now five yards back of Madigan and working hard. Bryant held the lead into the final turn when Madigan made her move and finally passed the Tennessee runner with about 15 yards remaining and won by 0.78. Bryant lost the three mile the night before by 0.36!

Bryant's time was #11 on the US All-Time list. Out of the first eight finishers, only Weaver and Doak failed to run their season best.

THREE MILES

There can be no doubt about this being the race of the meet. Two fine runners, both using correct tactics and both giving everything they possessed in their attempt to win made this race a classic. I was sitting with a group of sprinters who stretched out in their seats and mumbled "Wake us up when this boring race is over". Before the runners had gone half a mile, the sprinters were up and cheering the entire 2½ remaining miles. It was that kind of a race.

At the gun, Oklahoma's Kellie Cathey went to the front and from all appearances tried to steal the race. Cathey covered the first 440 two seconds faster than the two milers ran that distance and continued on to clock 2:29.5 at the half mile mark, still two second faster than the two milers. She slowed during the third 440 but by that time she was 20 yards in front. Nan Doak was running second, but by the end of the first mile, Cathey was still 15 yards in front with a 5:03.5 time. Her splits for her first mile were 72.5-77-76-78.

Cathey picked up the pace over the next quarter with a 76 and covered the next 440 in another 76 for 7:39 at a mile and a half. Meanwhile, Bryant had slowly moved up and at the half-way mark was only four seconds back. Cathey ran a 79 and Bryant moved to within one second. Then a 78 and Bryant was right on Cathey's shoulder as they went by two miles in 10:14 and 10:14.2.

A 76 and 78 by Cathey failed to dislodge Bryant and the two stayed together with only an 880 remaining. As they began the final half mile, Bryant made a move and went ahead of Cathey by a half step, but the Oklahoma lass turned on a little power and once again assumed her one step lead. But it appeared that Cathey was running out of gas. Bryant moved well heading into the bell lap and with just a 220 to go had a 10 yard lead. She increased this lead around the turn and with just 110 yards remaining, Bryant led by 15 yards.

Suddenly, here comes Gangbusters as Cathey began to cut down the margin. Her momentum enabled her to catch Bryant with a mere 25 yards remaining and she went on to win by about three yards - 0.36 seconds. A fantastic confrontation!

Florida State's Carolyn Faison trounced Benita Fitzgerald in their trial heat, but it was no contest in the final as a determined and confident Fitzgerald scored a clear cut win over UTEP's Kim Turner in a good 7.54 clocking. Faison ended up in sixth place running more than two-tenths slower than in her heat.

The hurdlers gave the starters some tense moments. In the second heat there were false starts by Turner, Nancy Roeller and Tonya Brown before they were off on the fourth try. In the final, there were false starts by Brown again, by Clara Hairston and by Faison. This time we were clocking the time (see "Reel Off"). The first three starts saw the gun fired in 0.9 seconds - all the same. After three false starts, the gun was fired in 0.6 seconds. Is there something to learn from that?

All finalists except Fitzgerald and Turner had their season best either in the final itself or in the trial heats.

The Cornhuskers won it easily even without their super sprinters. And Nebraska had a season best while Florida State did not.

Nebraska scored 54 points with their sprinters in the 60, 300 and 4x220, almost enough to win the title by themselves.

LONG JUMP

AIAW long jump titles have been the exclusive property of Wisconsin's Pat Johnson. In 1980 and 1981, Johnson showed her competitive nature by winning the title on not only her last jump but also the last jump of the competition. And so to 1982. Johnson and AIAW outdoor champion Donna Thomas of North Texas State battled toe to toe. Thomas, jumping first, took the lead in the first round with a mark of 20'0½ to 19'2¼ for Johnson. Second round jumps were identical, 19'11¼ for both athletes. Thomas improved to 20'2¼ on her third try and Johnson upped that by a quarter of an inch to become the leader at 20'2½. Down to 19'4¼ went Thomas on her fourth attempt and Johnson apparently locked it up as she moved out to 20'6¼. But Thomas is a determined individual and on her fifth jump, she equalled Johnson's 20'6¼. Johnson, still in the lead by virtue of a better second jump added to that margin with a hop of 20'4¼. On her last effort, Thomas stormed down the tartan to take command with 20'8½, the #8 jumper on the USA All-Time list.

And so it was that history repeated once again as Johnson readied herself for her final jump and the final jump of the competition. Twice before Johnson had been in this same situation and so the experience was there. She came down the runway with confidence and jumped - 18'11¼. Missed the board badly and so Donna Thomas is the 1982 indoor champion.

Illinois Becky Kaiser who has been having not much in the good things department over the past year and a half, got herself together and leaped 20'2¼ for the bronze.

Sweden's Annette Tannander continued to improve and was over 20 feet for fourth. More important to her as a European, however, was the clearance of the magical "six meters", a target for all European jumpers. The 1st, 3rd, 4th, 5th, 6th and 7th place finishers all had their season best.

AR FOR HIGHTOWER IN ITALY

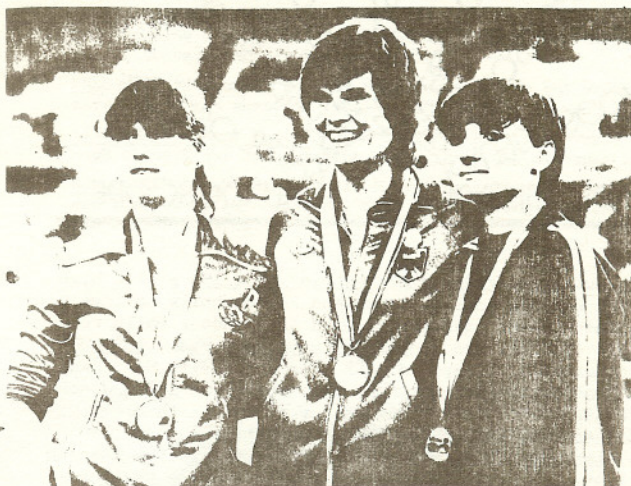
Milan, Italy, March 10:-Stephanie Hightower had the best performance for the small troop of Americans taking part in the Golden Gala Meet in Milan as she lowered her own American Record for the 60m hurdles by a hundredth with a time of 8.04 as she placed second behind East Germany's Bettine Gartz who covered the distance in 8.01. Candy Young sped 8.31 in her heat but did not make the final. Only other "American" was Brazil's (Florida State) Esmeralda Garcia who nabbed second in the 60m dash behind Russian speedster Lyudmila Kondratyeva. Good high jump field saw only one miss from the field until 6'2½ and three jumpers clearing 6'¾.

Best on the track was the mile in which the first five placewinners moved onto the All-Time World List in positions 3-4-5-6-10. Russia's Nadyezhda Rallugina won it in 4:28.46 and only 1.08 seconds later, East Germany's Beate Liebich was only fourth in 4:29.54.

Sprint sensation and world record holder from Czechoslovakia, Jarmila Kratochvilova took the 200 in 23.00 only a couple of ticks faster than she covered the first 200 during her European Championship 400 just a week earlier.

Milan, Italy, March 6/7:-East Germany provided the speed merchants, Italy the distance duo and West Germany the jumpers as Czechoslovakia provided the only world record breaker and the annual European Indoor Championships became history.

Seemingly ageless Jarmila Kratochvilova lowered the world mark as she defended her 400m title in 49.59, but the high jump gave the best overall performance with 6'2 good enough for only 10th place, three jumpers over 6'6¼ and every entry (all 16 of them) clearing at least 6'0¼.

The East German speedsters were Marlies Gohr who easily won the 60m sprint, (a race in which only she ran faster than in the heats or semis), the new world record holder for 200m, Gesine Walther in her specialty, and hurdler Kerstin Knabe with a good 7.98 time in the hurdles. By European standards it wasn't a spectacular meet, but until something better comes along, it must be ranked as the best of the 1982 indoor meets.

Interested in Kratochvilova's size? She's 5'7/141....Only half of the athletes who made the US team for the World Cross Country Championships made it to Italy for the actual race. Missing were Julie Brown, Betty Springs and Mary Decker....Avon expects approval from the IAAF to award \$65,000 prize money for the first 15 finishers in their marathon on June 6 in San Francisco....Here's the latest on the "Ashford Incident" at the Jack-In-The-Box Meet in San Diego: Bob Hersh, US records chairman, viewed freeze-frame exposures of the start and determined Ashford was moving before any smoke emitted from the starter's gun. HOWEVER, Ashford was the THIRD person to move. Alice Brown broke first and Diane Williams was next - then Ashford. Actually, Ashford was the fourth person to move for Bolden went with Williams but her blocks slipped. For any ONE of these four happenings, the starter should have recalled the race, but in spite of four infractions, he declared the race to be "legal". Ah, those nice American starters!

University of Virginia went to Cedar Falls to defend their National Indoor title and scored nine points more than they did in 1981 - and finished third....Indiana shot putter Annette Bohach had a PR at the AIAW Indoor nationals and was dissatisfied. 'Tain't right....Wisconsin sprinter Judy Winski turned in a 'believe it or not' at the Big 10 Championships. She ran her heat, her semi-final and her final in the 60y dash all in 7.10s. She won her heat and semi and was second in the final....Mountain West Athletic Conference has added Idaho State to its list of members. Group now contains Boise State, Eastern Washington, Idaho, Montana, Montana State,

Portland State and Weber State....Big shocker from benevolent-type Lyle Knudson, major domo of Utah State track for lo these many moons. He has resigned and will next appear at the University of Florida

GOODBYE MR. CALLAHAN

Don Callahan died in his sleep on April 2. Who was Don Callahan you ask? A fine athlete in his younger days, he stood somewhere between 6'6 and 6'8 - he wasn't quite sure. Sometime after daughter Sharon was born, he contacted polio and spent the rest of his life in a wheel chair and respirator. Daughter Sharon became interested in track, ran cross country as an age grouper, suddenly grew to the six foot mark and became a high jumper. Papa Callahan began to learn high jump technique. He became one of the best technicians I have ever known. His teacher was John Dobroth and Callahan went on from there. In 1968, Olympic year, the qualifying height to get into the Games was 5'7", (remember this was B.F. - Before Flop.) Came the Olympic Trials and the USA had only two athletes who had cleared the qualifying height. And Sharon was not one of them. So who won the US Olympic Trials? Sharon Callahan with a winning jump of 5'7" and it was on to the Olympics. Perhaps I have seen a more proud and happier father in my lifetime, but it is doubtful.

Don Callahan continued to study the high jump and produced some outstanding performers. While coaching at Claremont-Mudd College, I had a lanky 6'7" high jumper clearing 5'6 and so I asked Don Callahan to come work with him. He agreed and then made the only mistake of his life. He brought daughter Sharon along to our field for a workout. You know what happened. My high jumper and Sharon were (and are) married.

Don Callahan always answered anyone's request for help. He came to the University of Redlands and worked with our jumpers. He was always present at every big outdoor meet and every indoor meet in the southern California area. He was a regular contributor to "Letters to the Editor" at WTFW. How we wish the world was filled with Don Callahans!

Goodbye Mr. Callahan, wherever you are.

The Coach Says...

DORSEY REIRDON (Oklahoma State): "This is without a doubt the best team I have had at OSU. That is, we have the potential to be the best group. JESSICA DRAGICIVIC (Illinois): "We are stronger in the field events this year due to the depth of performers we have competing. In the running events we lack depth, but we have some really top performers."

AL BONNEY (Washington): "We have an excellent group of middle distance runners. Overall, we'll have one or two people in just about every event who are very good competitors. Our strength won't be in big numbers, but in quality of performance."

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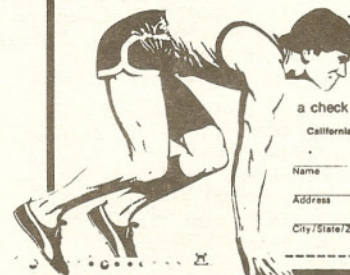

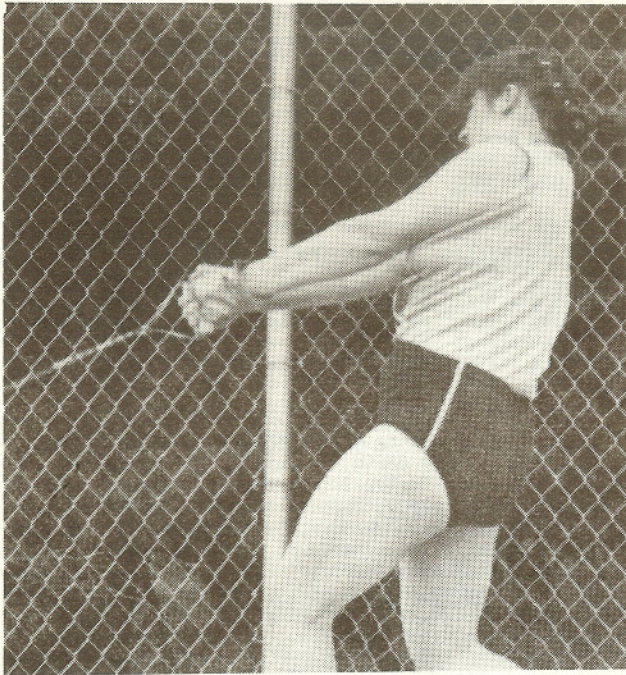
WILDCAT INVITATIONAL

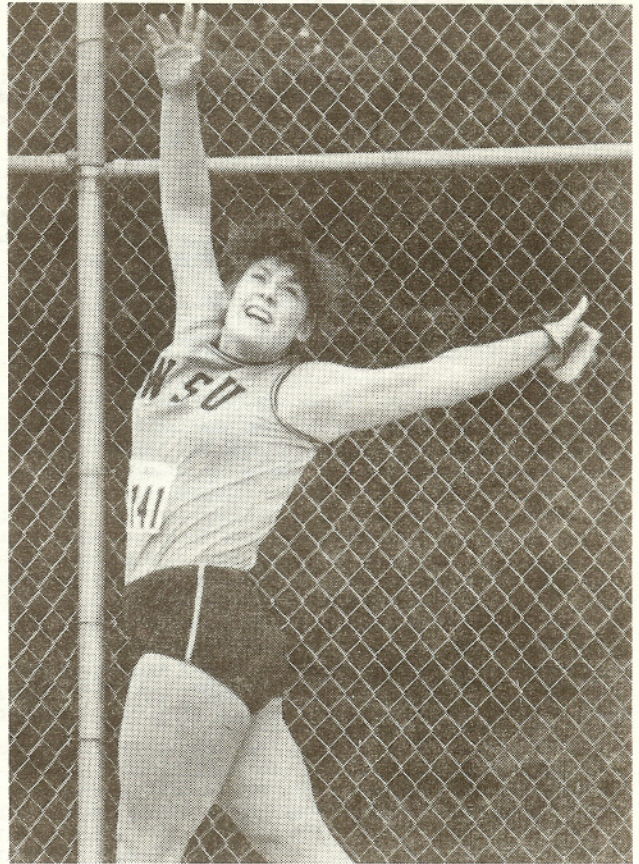

The University of Redlands has an enrollment of about 1700. Redlands does not give athletic scholarships. But starting in 1976, Redlands staged an Invitational Meet and through the years the meet records have been set by a group of athletes who read like Who's Who in US track and field. Take a look:

The 100m dash record is 11.2 set by Andrea Lynch from CS Long Beach. Lynch was a British Olympian. The 100m hurdles record is held by UNLV's Cecelia Branch, a Canadian internationalist. Joan Hansen of Arizona, the world indoor record holder for two miles, holds the 1500m mark. One of the nation's top 400m hurdlers in 1981, Tammy Etienne of the University of Texas is the record holder for the 400m barriers. Pam Spencer, the American record holder in the high jump has the meet record in her pet event. American record holder in the discus, Lorna Griffin has the meet mark in the platter. The javelin meet record is held by Karin Smith, USA's all-time #2 spear thrower. Sherron Walker, 1976 Olympian, has the LJ mark which is shared with USC's Sandy Crabtree. USC holds two relay meet records, Texas and UNLV each have one relay record. The shot mark is held by Emily Dole, recently seen in "Personal Best". The two events held by relatively unknowns are the 800 and 3000 but even here the two lap mark is held by Donna Fromme, a member of the LATC's championship 4x800 team and the 3000 is by another Texas, Julia Campbell.

Over the years, the Redland's Invitational has drawn teams from all over the western and southern part of the States. In this year's meet, teams from Colorado and the Air Force took part. The calibre of performance has dropped off over the past couple of years and no meet records have been set since 1979, but the meet continues to draw many teams and this time had entries from 21 colleges. Truly a grassroots meet that can boast a set of record holders second to none.

ERICKA HARRIS

Ericka Harris has been undefeated on Washington soil over the last six years and ran the fastest American time in the 400 meters last year, 51.45.

This feat, at the TAC/USA Junior Olympics at Lincoln, Nebraska, last summer, coupled with her several state records in the 400 and other sprints, made her an easy selection as the Tacoma News Tribune's Female Athlete of the Year. She was ranked fourth in the nation in the 400.

All this has come well before she has approached the age at which such times might reasonably be expected. Her talent and potential seem "awesome," in the words of knowledgeable observers.

She appears to be the perfect marriage of the physical and the mental. At 5'11 and 150 pounds, she has excellent proportions, though she'd like to drop about 10 pounds. "I'd be quicker and faster," she reasons, "so I'm trying to lose weight for a definite purpose, not just for its own sake."

Her mental attitude is also impressive. Despite her accomplishments, Harris is a thoroughly realistic, down-to-earth girl. "I don't see any point in being big-headed," she says. "Friends should be friends, not someone to climb the social ladder with. If I'm not big-headed, then I can be a true friend to someone."

This realism also extends to competition. Asked if she has ever competed against Denean Howard of Los Angeles, the #1 US 400m runner, who is the same age, Harris replied, "I don't think I'm capable of staying with her. She has a coach of her own and works out with college runners, while I have a team coach who has a lot of other athletes to deal with."

Still, she realizes that at some point she will have to run against Howard, and eventually the European women, but she is realistic enough not to want everything at once.

"My freshman year in college, I want to go to Senior Nationals," she says, "and then run 50 or 49 my sophomore year," also an Olympic year. "I'd at least like to try out for the Olympic team," she adds, "but I think that 1988 and maybe even 1992 are my main years for the Olympics."

At the moment, unhappily for local track fans, Harris has narrowed her choice of colleges down to five: Arizona State, Arizona, California, Stanford and UCLA.

Harris feels that "although I've lived here all my life and it'll be pretty tough adjusting to my first year away, because we have a very close-knit family," the combination of athletics and academics, as well as the opportunity to run year-round, have inclined her away from pursuing her higher education here.

She will leave behind a legacy that may never be approached. She began running in the fourth grade. "It looked like fun," Harris relates, and she was on her way.

By the time she entered Goodman Middle School in Gig Harbor, she had embarked on her string of wins. In the 8th grade her marks stood at 12.9 for the 100y dash, 26.2 for the 220, and 58.2 for the 440.

The following year, her first at Gig Harbor HS, she set state records in both the 220 (24.9) and 400 (55.4). Her only loss all year came in the Junior Olympics Nationals when she lost to an 18-year old despite running 54.4 for the 400.

As a sophomore, she took three titles at State, the 100 in 12.2, the 200 in 25.0 and a 55.8 400. And last year, she established state standards at the same three events with 11.8, a "disappointing" 24.3 ("I'd hoped for something in the 23's) and 54.6.

That superlative State Meet was followed by a 52.8 in the Junior Olympic tryouts in Tacoma, and then the marvelous 51.45 in the Nationals. She also ran a 23.77 in the 200 in the same meet for another blue ribbon.

Why the sudden drop in her 400 time? She attributes it to a combination of harder workouts and the beginning of weight training. Also, she credits her coach, Joel Wingard, who has told her, "if you're mentally in shape, you can do a lot." "And I definitely felt that I was in shape at that time," she says.

Another benefit is that she has never had a major injury. "I've had two charley horses last year and one this year, but they're very minor," she says.

"I don't jog on hard surfaces," she continues, "and I bathe in hot epsom salts, my mom rubs me down, and I eat the right foods. I don't do a lot of stretching, just enough to keep from muscle pulls, which is about 20 minutes worth before meets."

The big difference, though, is the weight program she began her junior year. "I do weights for everything," she says, "my stomach, back, arms, legs, Achilles."

Three times a week, especially during winter, she works out for an hour and a half with a partner on weights. "We do 3 sets of 10 of every exercise," she continues. "We constantly trade off, so we're really working hard."

"I just run to compete and do well," she says, "not necessarily to win all the time. Enjoyment is my major motivation; I guess I just like the competition."

This year she hopes to run even faster 400's by using two relatively complementary strategies. One is to run the 800 a couple of times in competition to give herself more strength and stamina.

She also wants to do enough speed work to run the first 200 of her races faster. In the 51.45 last summer, she trailed through the first 200, then came on strongly at the finish. But she realizes that in competing against top runners, she must go out faster.

If the past is any indication, she should succeed in these goals. And it is certainly in the realm of possibility that she may some day have Olympic gold.

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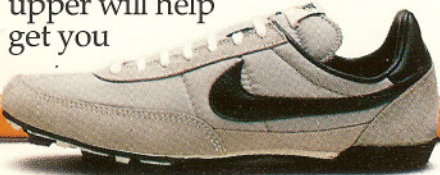
That's about the only way these specialty track and field shoes can get the recognition they deserve. Better make that—the sales they deserve.

Because we consider an American record in the triple jump, or a world record for the discus, and a world best at sea level in the long jump... little things like that... to be recognition enough.

If we didn't, we wouldn't invest so much time and technology in a bunch of off-beat shoes. We certainly wouldn't waste money advertising them.

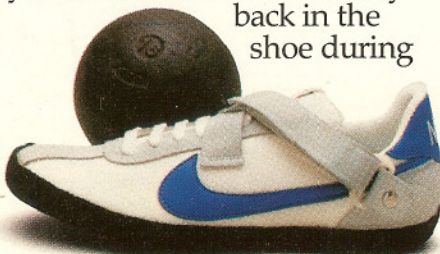
We do. And that's enough of that. Now, for the infamous Nike Seven:

1. PV 19. The whole point of this shoe is to give pole vaulters a stable jumping platform. And do it with a minimum of weight. The two-color jumping/running spike plate and reinforced nylon upper will help get you



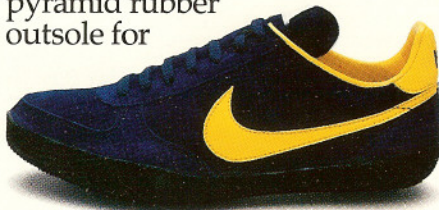
up there. Getting down is your problem.

2. SD 73. Never was fit so critical. When you're throwing the shot, or the discus, you want the foot held firmly back in the shoe during



the powerful turning and lifting phases. That's why the criss-cross straps. You also want a non-stretch nylon upper for lightness and durability. A wrapped, textured outsole for excellent traction. And wear. On any ring surface.

3. HJ 8. Floppers and straddlers have one thing in common. Namely, the need for superior spring and lift. Here it is, with a full length, one-piece spike plate, good for either style. Plus pyramid rubber outsole for



better traction. And a nice snug fit. The HJ 8 also comes with matching non-jumping shoe.

4. TJ 60. It's three shoes in one, actually. With both midsole and



outsole wrapped-up at the heel, so triple jumpers can take advantage of its unique "rocker" effect. Reinforced with suede side panels. Metal eyelets for longer shoe life. Impressive, three times over.

5. LJ 29. True, you don't have to be a world-class long jumper to feel the extra



traction and lift that come from this six hole spike plate. But it helps. Built for extended flight,

the LJ 29 not only has suede side panels for stability and strength, but an extra nylon panel to protect the toe area during take-off.

6. J 300. The serious javelin thrower wants that foot to stick securely in the boot.



Thus the lateral support strap. You also want it to stick in the ground. So the J 300 comes with six spike holes in the forefoot, four in the rear. About the only thing that won't stick is the toe, thanks to a hefty wrap-around guard.

7. El Viento. Built for one of the true minority groups, the El Viento gives race walkers a unique midsole and wedge arrangement to cushion and stabilize the foot. A beveled heel allows for smoother



heel strike. Plus longer wear to the Anatomical Outsole.™

You have to wear these shoes to appreciate them. That's easier said than done, however. While they may be the most sophisticated models on the market, most places don't want anything to do with them. Which is nice. Because when it comes time for you to buy shoes, it always helps to know who your friends are.
