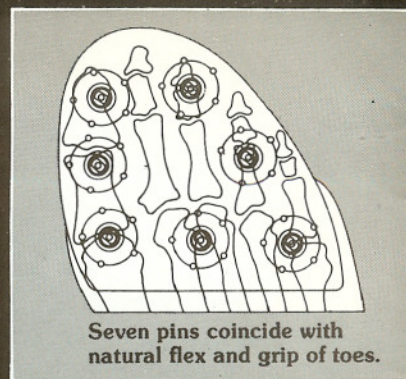

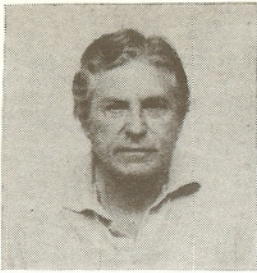

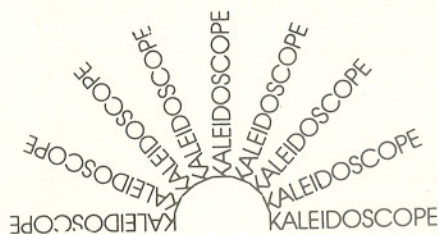

US WINS WORLD CROSS COUNTRY TITLE

Gateshead, England, March 20: Led by Jan Merrill's inspirational run, the USA team captured the World Cross Country title in a huge upset as the favored Russians surprisingly faded and faded and even dropped out over the final phase of the race. The Soviets were off like Gangbusters, but the USA crew gradually moved closer and closer and at the end, the opening fast pace took its toll of the Russians and the stars and stripes flew once again at the top of the mast.

As if to prove that last year's third place in Rome was "just one of those things", Grete Waitz showed that she is almost back to her supreme 1981 form, as she ran away from a talented field to secure her fifth World Cross Country Title and equal Doris Brown's (USA) record established between 1967 and 1971.

In what, for Grete, must have amounted to little more than a fast piece of fartlek work - the course measuring a mere 4072 meters - she waited, for once, until the last kilometer before upping the tempo and cruising to victory.

The opening of the race, which these days are run at breakneck speed, were similar to those of recent years in that a bevy of Soviet vests showed in front straight away. First up the hill was Tatyana Pozdnyakova followed closely by Alla Yushina, Svetlana Ulmasova and All Libutina completed the red sea, with Grete and Fita Lovin (USSR) close at hand.

Circulating the bowl for the first time, Pozdnyakova, Ulmasova and Waitz started to get away, and as they reached half way point they looked comfortably clear of Libutina, Alison Wiley (Can), Yushina, Lovin and Francine Peeters (Bel), with the American quartette - Joan Benoit, Jan Merrill, Margaret Groos and Betty Springs - caught up in the chasing bunch with Chris Benning (Eng), Lynn Kanuka (Can), Chris Boxer (Eng) and a fifth Soviet girl, Yelena Sipatova.

Around the bottom of the course, the leading trio interchanged positions, and by the time they had cleared the hill for the second, final, time they had a 30m buffer. Waitz and Ulmasova were slightly ahead, and the only real challenge to the three looked like coming from Alison Wiley, who had chased them hard and taken 80m out of the rest, now headed by Lovin, Benoit, Yushina, Peeters, Springs, Aurora Cunha (Por) - who had made up ground on the hill - Groos, Libutina, Merrill and Nancy Rooks (Eng).

With the finish now in sight, albeit some 800m away, Waitz changed a gear and the race was over. World 3000m record holder Ulmasova started to slow down, and with the sight of a red vest getting increasingly closer, Wiley also found some untapped energy and started chasing a medal. She said after the race that when she held fourth she was well satisfied, "but then, when the third girl (Ulmasova) died, I heard my coach shout 'go for it!'. And go for

it she most certainly did, and not only for third; for with a storming last furlong she just pipped Pozdnyakova at the line.

Behind them, Benoit and Springs also picked off the fading Ulmasova, and set up an unlikely USA team win, aided some by Libutina pulling out in the final kilometer; and with Anne-Marie Malone and Lynn Kanuka backing up the effort of Alison Wiley and Nancy Rooks, it was Canada that secured third place, taking their first-ever women's team medal.

After the race, Grete Waitz, who has had a knee injury recently, said "I expected it to be much harder; I had no idea of my shape. The start was very fast...it took me 700-800m to come up to the Russian girls in front. The race was different from the others for in those I led from the start and was running on my own all the way. It was easier to run with the other athletes, and the two Russians were making the pace. With 600-700m to go I felt

strong, and that was when I decided to make my bid". Grete hopes to go for the marathon in Helsinki.

Alison Wiley (19), born in Toronto of an Irish father (from Cork) and an English mother (from Leicester), paid - along with her teammates - \$400 towards travel, accommodation and food costs for the privilege of competing. A first-year student of human biology at Stanford University, California, Alison has a best 3000 time of 9:06 indoors. An injury last summer dashed hopes of making the Canadian team for the Commonwealth Games.

HISTORY OF WORLD CROSS COUNTRY CHAMPIONSHIPS

(from "Athletics Weekly")

An International women's race was staged at Douai in France in 1931, with Gladys Lunn leading England to victory, but it wasn't until 1967 that a women's championship was established on a regular basis.

Doris Brown (USA), who was ahead of her time in training up to 100 miles a week, was the dominant figure in the early years, winning the title five times running. It should be noted, though, that in 1979 (the year of Doris' fourth success) there were two so-called Women's International Championships on the same weekend. While Mrs. Brown was winning in Frederick, Maryland, (a race supported by the British home countries), another race (won by Italy's Paola Pigni-Cacchi) was being held in conjunction with the men's event at Vichy. From 1971 onwards the race has always been staged together with the senior and junior men's races and from 1973 has been designated as the IAAF's World Championships.

The star name in recent years has been Norway's Grete Waitz - winner four years on the trot from 1978 to 1981 and again in 1983 - and by colossal margins (as much as 40 seconds in 1980!).

Ashland's other All-American performer, Gresens, turned out strong efforts that few thought she could attain on the college level. Gallagher admits he too had doubts about her obtaining such milestones.

"No one was recruiting her," Gallagher expressed. "I knew she had the ability and good speed in short distances. I think she just needed to get in a good program."

Gresens, a graduate of Clarence Central High School in New York, functioned as the Eagles' third runner during the regular season but closed out the year as the 16th place finisher at the nationals. Her third-place position at regionals gained important points in the team's championships finish.

"I thought she might be our fifth or sixth runner," said Gallagher. "I feel a lot of her success was helped by the

Coach Gallagher and his sophomores-to-be are already setting sights on next fall's running adventures.

"We realize that what we did this year was the unexpected," commented Keefer. "I think what we've accomplished and our experience will be important in the coming year. We now look to the future - we'll see how we do!"

PENN STATE WINS EASTERN AIAW

Cambridge, Massachusetts, March 5: 28 college and university teams gathered at hallowed Harvard but the scoring race came down once again to those two old favorites Penn State and Villanova. This time around it was Penn State that triumphed with 92 points to 65 for the Wildcats. Good marks were the rule. Best of all was the 53.29 440 turned in by Rutgers' Lori McCauley. This converts to 53.14 for 400m and is the second fastest ever by an American, just short of Sharon Dabney's 53.11. Harvard's Jenny Stricker toured the two miles in 9:43.33 to earn the #6 spot on the US All-Time List and Penn State's Tami Hart recorded 1:20.34 over 600y and now claims the #7 spot in that event.

There was good competition in the pentathlon. West Virginia's Sharon Pfister won it with 3722, but only 15 points separated second from fourth.

Another good result came in the 4x880 where Yale's 9:06.06 was only good for fifth place as both Villanova and Rutgers broke nine minutes.

NEW BIG-10 CHAMP

Madison, Wisconsin, March 4/5: For weeks, Wisconsin coach Pete Tegen has been saying, "It won't be easy". Meaning for Wisconsin to win its sixth consecutive Big-10 indoor championship. No other team had ever won this title. Pete was correct, of course. Michigan is the 1983 Big-10 indoor champion. But, as Pete Tegen says, "It wasn't easy"!

Seven of the teams were aiming at the gonfalon. Four of them were in the battle all the way - Michigan, Wisconsin, Indiana and Michigan State. The Wolverines tallied 82 points by virtue of winning three individual events plus the 4x880. Wisconsin was next with 71, Indiana third with 65 and Michigan State, which also won three individual events and a relay, was fourth with 60. Every team in the League, with the exception of Northwestern (which didn't score a point), and Minnesota, had at least one Big-10 champion.

Wins in the jumps gave Michigan the boost it needed for the title. Indiana lost its chances when Tina Parrott, one of the favorites to win the 600, failed to qualify for the final. Ohio State wasn't helped when Kim Willis, the favorite to win the hurdles, finished last after an argument with a barrier. This was the first time in Big-10 history that Wisconsin failed to score more than 120 points. The quality was very high for 1983. It was tough to make a final. For example, not one finalist in the 60y dash ran as fast as

she had in either the trials or semis. Only one of the hurdle finalists ran faster than in the trials, only two of the 300 finalists improved over her heat time, seven of the milers and half milers ran faster in the trials - and on and on.

The 4x880 was probably the best race from a competitive point of view. Michigan and Wisconsin staged a ding-dong battle with Michigan winning it 8:49.64 to 8:51.72 and sixth place was a swift 9:05.63. The first seven teams ran season bests. The 4x440 was almost as classy as the 4x880 with the first six teams running season bests.

Pentathlon winner Kathy Gillespie (Iowa) was best in only one event, the shot, and even then she was tied with Wisconsin's Helen Stoffel - who also won the long jump. Indiana's Annette Bohach, chagrined at having lost earlier in the year to Wisconsin's Karen Nitsch, got even with a new PR and Big-10 record in the shot as she lofted the sphere 51'0 1/4.

There was only one double winner - Judi Brown of Michigan State captured the hurdles and the 440. Ohio State's Diane Dixon came close with a win in the 300 and a close second in the 60. Her time of 33.83 in her 300 heat was a new American record. She ran a hundredth slower in the final. Another who came close was Purdue's Becky Cotta. Cotta won the three mile, was second in the two mile and added third place in the mile. Another busy Boilermaker was Jeanie Molohon who was 7th in the 880, 10th in the three mile, 5th in the mile and anchored the fourth place 4x880 team. Plus heats in the mile and 880.

Every event provided good, close competition and fine marks. A fitting way to wind up the Big-10 indoor season.

NJCAA CHAMPIONSHIPS

Champaign, Illinois, March 4/5: Led by Tina Walls, Santa Fe City College of Gainesville, Florida, captured the National Junior College Indoor Championship by just three points over Macomb of Warren, Michigan. Each school had a double winner and Macomb added the 4x880 in their win column, but it wasn't quite enough to catch the Saints. Down to the last event, Macomb still had a chance to win it all as Santa Fe did not have a 4x440 team. But the Monarchs fell one place short as they finished fourth, less than a second back of third place Barton CC.

THREE WORLD RECORDS AT EUROPEAN CHAMPIONSHIPS

Budapest, Hungary, March 5/6: Europeans set three world indoor records as they staged their annual Championships on the boards. East Germany and the Soviet Union dominated the competition along with yet another Eastern European country, Czechoslovakia. Using the 5-3-2-1 scoring formula, the DDR outscored the other two with 32 points to 24 and 22.

Records were set in the 200, long jump and 60m hurdles. Marita Koch turned on the afterburners in the 200 to break her own WR with a super fast 22.39, nearly a full second in front of the runner-up. Russia's Tamara Bykova upped the high jump mark to 6'8, better even than the outdoor mark. The hurdle mark fell to East Germany's Bettine Jahn who zipped the distance in 7.75.

Sprinter Marlies Gohr came close to the record with her 7.09 clocking for the 60 meters and 32-year-old Jarmila Kratchovilkova of Czechoslovakia, spun the 400 in 49.69 to win by more than two seconds.

NCAA TITLE TO NEBRASKA

Detroit, Michigan, March 11/12: Nebraska captured the First NCAA Indoor Championship for women by three points over Tennessee - and they did it the hard way. First of all, it was a middle-distance team's meet with the 600, 880, 1000 and mile plus the 4x440 and 4x880 relays Nebraska and the other sprint-oriented teams had only the 60 and 440 - and no sprint relays. Watching souls began to feel sorry for the Huskers when Nicole Ali was disqualified in the 600 semi-final, Marjan Goedhart failed to make it to the long jump final, Jennie Gorham was eliminated in the 440, Rhonda Blanford was relegated to sixth in the hurdles and Tennessee's Delisa Walton trounced Marcia Tate in the 600 final. CANADIAN COLLEGIATE CHAMPIONSHIPS

Toronto, Canada, March 11/12: The level of competition in Canadian University Track and Field continues to improve. This was proven as the athletes gathered for the Third Annual CIAU Indoor Championships.

University of Saskatchewan sophomore Gwen Wall turned in perhaps the best of several fine marks in the women's competition as she front ran to a 1:30.43 for 600 meters. Passing 400m in 57.4, Wall held form very well and powered the straight on her way to what seemed sure to be a sub 1:29.0 clocking. A line on the track some five meters before the true finish line confused her causing her to stop early. She had slowed to a walk by the time she reached the real finish line. Wall's time is better than the listed Canadian record, but four athletes, including Wall herself, have better marks pending.

The female performer of the meet award went to Canadian Indoor 200m champion Tanya Brothers of the University of Manitoba for her 7.49 win in the 60 meters, 39.0 flat runaway win in the 300m and a strong lead-off leg on the 4x200 relay.

Christine Slythe of the University of Sherbrooke completed a fine double. She easily front ran to a 4:26.73 victory in the 1500m. In the 1000m she held off Mary Burzminski of the University of Alberta and recorded a fine 2:46.45 clocking to move to third on the Canadian All-Time List. Burzminski's 2:47.46 is the fifth best time ever recorded by a Canadian.

Burzminski contributed a fine 2:08.0 third leg on Alberta's 4x800 team. She was joined by Sue Kallal, Maureen Cush and Birgit Otto as the team lowered the Canadian record from 8:59.11 to 8.48.17.

My editor has only two rules to which he requests - note that he hasn't demanded - that I adhere. The first of these requirements is that the content should relate to women's road racing. The second mandate is that the material reach his hands at a time which will permit its inclusion in the forthcoming edition. In other words, literary aside, he doesn't ask much. (And that's what he gets - Ed.)

A couple of months ago Mr. Reel moved and forgot (or so he claims) to notify me of his address change. Last month, the victim of sloth, inertia and lethargy, not to mention lassitude, I failed to submit a column. I was vacationing in a retirement community in Florida and found myself with less energy than those long-toothed elderly by whom I was surrounded. When this month's deadline rolled around, I awoke in a quasi-honeymoon weekend retreat,

Such rambling may violate Vince Reel's second requirement, but I am struck by the similarities between writing and racing/training. Both require energy, self-discipline, desire and maturity. I feel infinitely better when I do both as well as I can. I promise to start now, but I'll concentrate on writing first of all. My knees hardly ever ache when I write.

Wendy Smith Sly's knees probably seem a little tender at times, but she felt no pain after winning the Gasparilla 15k (Tampa, Florida, Feb.5) with a time of 48:18. The time is superlative of course, but perhaps no more noteworthy was the name of the second place finisher - Grete Waitz. Sly pulled away from Mrs. Waitz with 300m remaining to win by 12 seconds. This was the first time Grete had lost an event in the USA that she has finished. Said Sly, "I feel like a child at Christmas. Grete is an idol of mine and I respect her very much, but it feels good to finally beat her."

Eleanor Simonsick finds herself #3 on the All-Time US List after placing 3rd here in 50:08. Following were Betty Springs (50:20), her North Carolina State teammate Kerry Robinson (50:35), Kellie Cathey (51:02), Anne Hird (51:05) and Marjorie Kaput (51:14). So deep was the field that Kaput's time makes her the 8th fastest American ever.

Positions 10 through 20 included a group of outstanding performers so well known that most any other event would have been ecstatic to host the "also-rans". Ellen Hart was 11th in 51:36, trailed by Sue King (51:46), Kathy Schilly (52:09), Mary Shea (52:24), Jacqueline Gareau (52:39), Cosgrove (52:40), Marita Rintous and 20th, but not least, Sande Cullinane at 53:27. Your basic embarrassment of riches.

Mrs. Sly may have become somewhat wealthier by winning the prestigious Continental Homes 10k (Phoenix, Arizona, March 5) with a 32:05. 58 seconds back was Betty Springs whose time here earned her the last position on the top 10 list among US performers. Norway's Ingrid Kristiansen finished 3rd at 33:07 ahead of Ellen Hart (33:19). Only Margaret Groos tried to stay with Sly as the latter sped through an initial 4:55 mile. Groos learned something about discretion being the better part of valor as she faded to 8th (33:52).

This month's candidate for most-winnable marathon was the Philippides of Oregon held in Salem on March 27th. Only Mary Russell could best 3:20 and she did it with but a single second to spare.

Cincinnati's Julie Ispording won an Avon 15k in Washington, DC (March 5) in 52:31. This is the fastest mark for an American in a women's-only race, making the time a record of some sort. Lisanne Bussiers of Montreal was the

runnerup in 52:47 with Suzanne Girard next at 53 flat.

The Philadelphia Federation of Teachers Health and Welfare Fund 10k (really!) had one entrant with an international reputation. West Germany's Charlotte Teske put on quite an exhibition, winning by more than 3 1/2 minutes. Teske's 33:02 confirmed what everyone knew before the gun sounded. Lena Hallman, second in 36:40, was probably glad to see Charlotte leave town. There is no truth to the rumor that Ms. Hallman drove Teske to the airport.

Anne Hird set a course record at the Brooklyn Half Marathon (New York, March 13) with a winning time of 1:14:41. Laura DeWald captured the 3rd Annual Phoenix Marathon (Arizona, February 20) in 2:41:09. Jane Wipf posted a second place finish at 2:42:46.

Running in warm, humid conditions which led to sub-par times, Linda McLennan won the Hyatt 10k (Hilton Head Island, SC - in this late report - Dec.4) in 35:02. Eileen Claugus got an easy win at the Mercury News Race (San Jose, California, March 20) with a time of 34:02. The Mercer Island Half-Marathon (Seattle, Washington, February 13) went to Gail Volk, a veteran competitor in her early twenties.

Volk's 1:16:50 was 23 seconds too quick for Linda Edgar, a neophyte (or is that "tyro"?) in her thirties. I don't really think your knees care how old you are, but how you are old!

I somehow managed to lose the date of the 18th Mardi Gras Marathon (New Orleans, La). If you really care, you can look it up yourself. Whenever it happened, defending champion Angela Piskchys was the first one done. Her time was 2:41:38.

Charlotte Teske continued her hot streak appropriately enough in Florida at the Jacksonville River Run (March 12). Teske's 50:17 earned her \$2500 - 2 grand for the win and 500 more for breaking 51 minutes. A sub-50 would have been worth an additional \$1000. While Teske was looking for a shortcut or slow clock, hardcharging Eleanor Simonsick (50:48) outkicked Ingrid Kristiansen (50:51) and Jacqueline Gareau (51:04). Linda McLennan took 5th at 51:46.

A 29-year-old woman should have more sense but said Burke Konselik after winning the Empire State Building Run Up (New York City, Feb.17): "Athletes like to prove they can do things. I wanted to win." Normally admirable sentiments, but here we are reporting a race up 86 stories, as in 1575 steps, won in 13:40. We should petition to have this event added to the Olympics! Wouldn't that get some East Europeans out of the marathon!

To ensure that Vince Reel publishes this tardy submission, I will do what no other man has ever done before. I hereby predict the winners of the 1983 Boston Marathon will be Greg Meyer and Eleanor Sionsick. I don't know if either athlete is even entered in the race, but then again I don't imagine that information would have much impact on my prognostication.

Eugene, Oregon, March 12: The Oregon Open/Invitational (depending on which side of the program you read) provided moments of good competition, and a few very satisfying early season marks. Competitors came from as far away as Simon Fraser University of Vancouver B.C., Canada, Colorado State, Washington and Idaho; also from the University of Portland, Portland State, Oregon State, the Titan TC of Lane CC, the Mt. Hood TC, the Milbrae Lions TC, the Clark-Hatch TC and Athletics West.

It has rained in Oregon and, as of this writing, continues to rain every day since the 6th of February. So it was with some good fortune that the meet at Hayward Field in Eugene was spared - all but for about five minutes of a very light shower - throughout the afternoon. The temperature ranged from the high 50s to low 60s, there was a slight headwind for the sprinters, and the one brief shower was just annoying enough to slicken the approach to the high jump pit, resulting in a couple of nasty spills.

Javelin thrower Karen Martin (Oregon), whose previous best in competition was 143'0, threw 163'1 first time up, instantly achieving her 1983 goal of NCAA qualification. Other NCAA qualifiers were Julie Benzel (Colorado State) in the 10000 (35:29.74), and Kathy Hayes (Oregon) in the 1500m (4:19.07).

Julie Hansen made the trip down from Seattle to not only defend, but improve upon her meet record in the discus. Hansen's toss of 171'9 beaters by 10 inches her old mark set in 1980.

Quenna Beasley (Oregon) put the shot 51'1 1/2, bettering a meet record of 50'6 set by Caryl Van Pelt (Washington) in 1980, and also improved on her own school record of 50'1 1/2 set earlier this year.

BIG THREE MEET

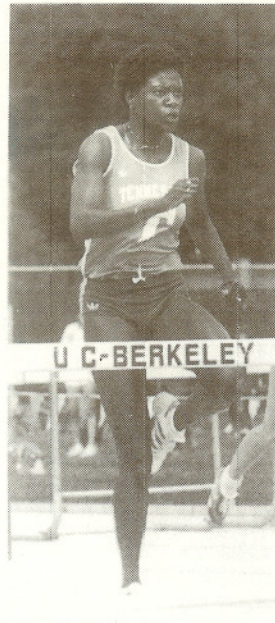

Many believed it would come down to the mile relay, due to the absence of some key Oregon performers either injured or sidelined for disciplinary reasons, and the presence of outstanding sprinters from Washington, and their splendid distance corps led by Regina Joyce, whose only effort of the day turned out to be a mediocre third (9:18.9) in the 3000m.

Washington coach Al Bonney said, "With all their injuries, we should have won going away. Instead, we let them off the hook."

Oregon's 72-55 victory marked the sixth win in a row over the Huskies in dual meet competition.

A good part of Oregon's success was due to the gutsy performances by Lexie Miller Beck, who could be counted in 15 of the Duck's points, including wins in an exhausting back-to-back 100 hurdles/400m parlay...plus a 58.1 anchor lap in the mile relay. More unexpected Oregon points came when Karen Drake took second in the 1500m

between Washington's talented Gregg sisters, Sandra and Susan. A win in the javelin by Lynda Hughes didn't hurt Oregon's chances. The nation's leading thrower to date, Deanna Carr of Washington with a mark of 181'2, could do no better than third, more than 20 feet back of her 1983 best.

Two of Washington's five first places were recorded by widely recruited Donna Dennis in the 100 and 200, although the times were very slow.

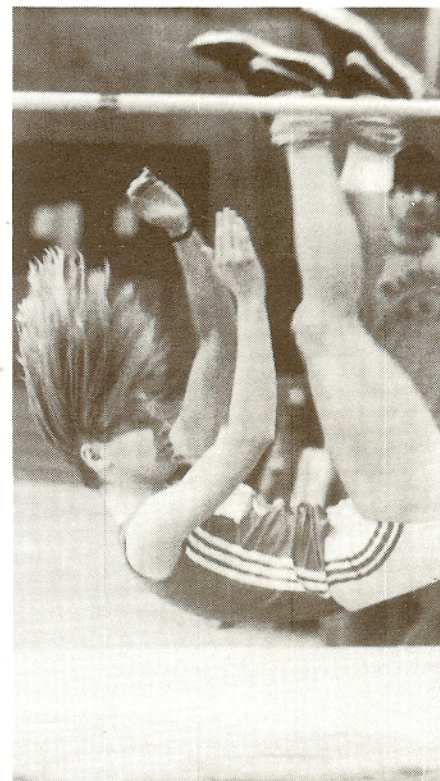
SUN ANGEL CLASSIC

DEBIE THOMETZ

What does a five time All-American, national champion and four time runner-up, collegiate woman track and cross country runner do for an encore? Run a marathon, Debbie Thometz said.

Thometz, who led the College of St. Thomas' (St. Paul, Minnesota) women's cross country team to two consecutive national titles, plans to run the Grandma's marathon in Duluth next June. This is her last major goal in competitive running.

"I want to try a marathon, that's my big goal," Thometz, smiling eagerly, said. "I'd like to run it once just to see how it goes."

Joe Sweeney, who's coached Thometz for three years said she may turn heads of the top female runners at Grandma's.

"The longer she runs, the better she does," Sweeney said. "If she's trained well, I think she can surprise a lot of people - even in her first marathon."

After the marathon, Thometz said she will probably retire from competition. But Thometz, a 1979 graduate of St. Cloud Tech High School, will continue to run because she wants to stay in shape and finds running to be a release from pressure.

"Running is really relaxing for me," a softspoken Thometz said. "It gives me a chance to run off my frustrations. During final exams I put in more miles than any other time of the year."

Thometz started running at age nine in summer programs and continued throughout high school where she placed fifth in the state in the two mile run. Thometz wasn't sure if she was going to compete in college because she wanted to concentrate on her studies. But Thometz did compete, and said she did poorly her freshman year - fifth best runner on the team and 64th in the nationals - because she didn't take running seriously. The next year St. Thomas hired Sweeney as coach and Thometz's times and attitude changed.

"He (Sweeney) really expected things out of us," Thometz said thoughtfully. "And I think when somebody really expects you to do something, you're going to try a lot harder."

Sweeney developed the women's cross country program at St. Thomas by introducing a summer running schedule and new training techniques. That year, St. Thomas made its first trip to nationals and placed fourth, while Thometz took second place and became St. Thomas' first female All-American.

"She was someone who was just waiting for something big to happen, no matter who came along to coach her," Sweeney said. "Debbie went from 64th in the nation to Number Two in one year. The greatest thing about it was that it's been an inspiration to everyone else."

As a junior, Thometz won state, regional and the AIAW Division III national championships, and broke three course records in the process. Sweeney said Thometz's low resting pulse, fast recovery rate, and mental toughness are her biggest assets.

"There's nothing spectacular about

her form, she's short for a runner which is never an advantage," Sweeney said. "The biggest thing she has going for her is that she has a very low metabolism."

Thometz leadership abilities also helped St. Thomas win its first national women's cross country title.

"She's not super outgoing, even a bit shy, but she leads by example," Sweeney said. "She's quiet, but around us she has a very good sense of humor and personality."



"She's got what we call on the team, 'Quiet confidence'. I don't like to see a lot of singing, jumping up and down and rah-rah-rah. Debbie's in control, she knows what she has to do, and she does it."

Last fall, St. Thomas moved to the NCAA Division II after the AIAW folded. Sweeney pitted his team against Division I and II runners because he wanted to better prepare them for national competition. As a returning national champion, and with tougher competition, Thometz began to feel the pressure.

"Some people don't really understand and they just look at how you did last year," Thometz said, and added with a laugh, "so if you go up against Division I and II schools, the competition is a lot better, and if you weren't coming out on top they were wondering what's wrong."

Thometz was the national runner-up this fall, but wasn't disappointed. She was happy to participate again in what she called a great experience.

"She keeps everything in perspective," Sweeney said. "She's got her studies, a social life, ...she's got a little bit of everything, and that's the way it should be in a school like this."

Thometz, who was the national runner-up in the 5000 and 10000 meter runs, is now into the track season. She missed track season last year because she was studying in London. Sweeney has high hopes for his team this spring.

"Debbie's fast recovery rate allows us to use her in more than one race in a short period of time," Sweeney said. "In the state finals two years ago Debbie ran the 10000m on Friday, the 3000 and 5000 within an hour of each other on Saturday, and won all three."

Next fall, Thometz plans to go to graduate school in psychology. She'd like to enroll in an industrial-psych program at the University of Minnesota and someday work in corporate relations. Sweeney said he and the team will miss her, but her contributions to the program would be remembered for a long time.

"Debbie's very cooperative, she always trusts my judgement," Sweeney said. "I've never had anyone so cooperative and coachable."

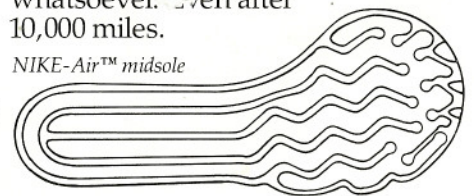
