

We'll sure give the Cubans an 'A' for effort. This is a tough language!



"My longest races before today were 10000 meters. I knew I had the race won with five miles to go, but the last two miles were definitely the hardest for me."

THE TOAST OF CZECHOSLOVAKIA

By Jan Popper (from 'Athletics Weekly')

Following her successes in the World Championships, Jarmila Kratochvilova is now the most popular person in the whole of Czechoslovakia, and shortly after her second victory she received a congratulatory cable from Czech president, Gustav Husak - a very rare honour.

Jarmila feels the hardest part of her double was the 35-minute combination of 400 semi and 800 final. In fact, the recovery interval after her 51.08 effort was 241/4 minutes - from the time she left the track until her return for the 800 final. That day she slept well to 8:30am, had a first series of massages at 10:30. , she travelled in a private car to the stadium at 3 pm. She combined her warmup with another massage, and reported for both races at 5:05. She finished her 400 semi at 5:38 and spent the above mentioned 24% minutes away from the arena "as lazily as possible", in which time the Czech team masseur was again allowed to enter the call-room beneath the stand and help Jarmila remove the strain of her muscles as quickly as possible. The 800 final started at 6:11.

"I am delighted, of course, winning two golds in two days. That's something I never dreamed about two months ago. At 800 I am still learning and I know how many meters I ran in lane 2 or 3, which is strictly against the texbook. But it was more important for me not to risk any collision in a possible bunch during the race. Originally I planned only a 100m finishing burst, but I felt fresh enough to try at 200 - and it worked! For the 400 final I really intended to be satisfied with a certain win and was afraid to feel the stress of the previous day in the finishing straight, but it was not so terrible".

"Marita Koch's 48.16 world record in Athens was maybe the biggest motivation for me during the hard work of basic training from October to February and then from March to May. I was not in fact thinking in terms of 48 flat, but promised myself to come as near to 48.16 as possible. Up to the end of June, I was concentrating also primarily on another direct clash with Marita, who has been the best 400m runner for many years. Actually, my first heroine was Irena Szewinska; I learned from her example that being 25 or 30 does not

mean being over the hill in terms of athletic ability. After the USA/GDR match in Los Angeles I learned that Marita would be concentrating more on the 200 and 4x100 titles at Helsinki and this made my switch to 800 after the Munich world record easier. Nevertheless, I still think that Marita will be able to run as fast as i did if she concentrates on 400 next year. We are a big motivation for each other".

Kratochvilova's targets for next year? "If I remain healthy, 1984 will probably be my final season. The Los Angeles programme makes the 400-800 combination as stressful as it was in Helsinki, and I am not willing just now to repeat it. Which distance will I choose? It depends on the quality of my next year's preparation. It could be the 800, but if Marita comes back I will never let go the possibility of another direct clash. In terms of really big competitions from 1980, I am still losing 1-2 to her".

EUROPEAN CUP TEAM HEPTATHLON TO DDR

Sofia, Bulgaria, Sept. 10/11: To hardly anyone's surprise, East Germany, with World Champion and world record-holder Ramona Neubert leading the way, won the European Cup Team Heptathlon title over the USSR squad, 19242 to 18698.

Neubert, however, was the only DDR competitor who took part in the World Championships at Helsinki. The other three team members were Karin Nitzsche Sybille Thiele and Heike Geissler.

Neubert improved over her Helsinki performance with a winning mark of 6722, third-best ever. Neubert, of course, also has the top two performances. Six of her marks here were similar to her Helsinki performances, but she cut almost five seconds off her 800 time running 2:06.70 to her 2:11.34 at the meet.

Biggest improvement came from runner-up Yekaterina Smirnova, 6th at Helsinki with 6321. The Russian lass ran three seconds slower in her 800, but cut two-tenths off her Helsinki hurdle mark, added nearly five feet to her shot mark and almost two feet to her long jump performance to score 6486.

Shown here are the Number 1, number 10 and number 20 marks by the DDR and the USA for 1983. The Germans have the best Number one marks in 10 of the 14 events. We are tops in the 100,

1500, 3000 and high jump. We're only three-hundredths behind in the 800 and we're close in the 400.

BUT, when we move to the Number ten position, each nation is best in 7 events.

AND when we move to Number 20, the USA superiority is overwhelming as we have the best numero 20 in 12 of the 14 events with the East Germans whipping us only in the shot and javelin.

One wonders who will replace their retirees after the 1984 Games? For sure there will be retirements of some of the "old guard" - Koch, Gohr, Slupianek, etc. Our job, as always, is to keep our athletes interested in the sport and remaining in the sport until they reach their prime.
