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

ANOTHER AR FOR FREDERICK

Talence, France, Sept. 15/16: After failing to make the Olympic team due to a no-height in the high jump, Jane Frederick travelled to the climes of Europe and shortly after the Games promptly proceeded to set a new American Record in the heptathlon at 6611 - 91 points better than Jacki Joyner's record.

Now she has done it again adding another 103 points as she won at Talence with 6714, a mark which puts her Number 5 on the All Time World List.

Her marks were nothing short of sensational. Hurdles 13.27, high jump 6'1%, shot put 50'10, long jump 21'1%, javelin throw 169'9 and 2:13.55 for the 800.

Couple of scheduled XC Invitations have been called off this year, among them the Vanderbilt Invitational set for October 13.... Richard Hymans is a well known track and field expert in the world and a writer from Great Britain. Here are some of his comments about the LA Olympics: "The perspective gained in watching an Olympics in a supine position from 6000 miles away from a stadium is different, though not necessarily better than being there.

"The BBC broadcasts hold two distinct ad-"The BBC broadcasts hold two distinct advantages over American network coverage. No advertising, and better commentating. Certainly there's a concentration on athletes from one's own country, but it tends not to reach the manic level of Chauvinism that was reported in the world's press of the US networks.

"The events themselves were a mixture of fascinating and banal. While the British commetators generally steered clear of the 'If the Eastern bloc athletes had been here' type of statement, it was glaringly obvious that in every womens event the result would have been different if the boycott had not entered the scene. The sense that every womens' champion could have been some other athlete was only dented by Evelyn Ashford's most eloquent run in Zurich.

"The sheer pleasure of winning seemed to be lacking amongst many of the champions, so in the ranks of the women, the wins by Nawal El Moutawakil and Valerie Brisco were particularly enjoyable to watch".

Sad to report the death of good and old friend Stan Eales. Stan was one of the first statisticians to give equal rights to the female runners. He was announcer for many of the top meets in California - UCLA/Pepsi, Mt. SAC, all the indoor meets. He'll be missed.....Track & Field Writers of America choice for athlete of the month for September was Jane Frederick for her second new AR in the heptathlon.....This has nothing to do with our sport, but it certainly will get your attention. NAWAL EL MOUTAWAKIL - THE MOROCCAN TRAIL BLAZER

The absence of East German, Soviet, Bulgarian and Polish athletes profoundly affected results in the women's events at the Los Angeles Olympics, but one positive repercussion of the boycott was that it provided opportunity for some third world athletes to make their mark on the international stage. For example, Ruth Waith-era became Kenya's first female Olympic finalist - an event of considerable significance and hopefully a pointer to the future. But it was the 400m hurdles which produced the greatest sociological breakthrough. An Indian, P.T. Usha, failed by just 1/100th of a second to take An Indian, P.T. a medal as she reduced her Commonwealth record to sparkling 55.42.... and victory, by considerable margin, went to Morocco's Nawal El Moutawakil.

Nawal, at 5'3 and 108 probably the second smallest ever Olympic athletics champion (aft-er Joan Benoit), made all sorts of history. She became the first Moroccan to win an Olympic athletics title (beating Said Aouita to that dis-tinction by three days) ... the first Arab woman to make an indelible mark on athletics history ... the first African woman, other than three South Africans of European descent, to win an Olympic medal.

This was no hollow victory by the 22-year old Iowa State University student. Hers was a run of true world class as she reduced her personal best from 55.37 to 54.61 in the final, defeating US record holder Judi Brown by some five meters, with European champion Ann-LOuis Skoglund back in fifth place. A-mong non-East Europeans, only Skoglund has ever run faster.

Born in Casablanca on April 15, 1962, Na-wal El Moutawakil joined the local athletics Club in 1977. Hers was an athletic family: brothers Fouad and Said are huurdlers, sister Wafak a shot putter. Although she began at cross country, Nawal swiftly displayed her class as a sprinter, setting an African Junior 100m re-cord of 11,89 in 1979. She was credited with 11.6 in 1980 and next season, in Rome, she took part in that notable World Cup 100 in which Evelyn Ashford (11.02) and Kathy Cook (UK record of 11.10) defeated Marlies Gohr (11.13). Who could have fortold that the 19-year old representing Africa who placed eighth of nine in 11.92 would be crowned an Olympic champion three years later? Her best times in 1981 were 11.86/11.6 for 100, 24.23 for 200,

55.0 for 400, 14.4 for 100H and 60.1 for the 400H.

The hurdles developed into her most sucthe Aurice's developed into her most suc-cessful event the following year, when she won the African titles in 13.8 and 58.42, as well as picking up a silver in the 100 (11.7). Her best times in 1982: 11.5, 24.0 (23.3w), 55.8, 12.7 are 59.42. 13.7 and 58.42.

By 1983 she was on the fringes of world class as a 400 hurdler. At Bordeaux in July she set an African record of 56.23 when winning the French title as a guest, and the following month - at the World Championships in Helsinki - she won her heat in 56.52 before being eliminated in sixth place (57.10) in the semis. The season ended on a successful note in her native Casablanca when she took the Mediterranean Games title in 56.59. Her other times that year were: 11.4, 23.84, 54.9, 2:10. 02 (800) and 13.4.

a multi-talented performer Such clearly be a good catch for some American un-iversity, and in the autumn of 1983 she enrolled as a physical education student at lowa State. Being transplanted into a totally differ-ent culture and geographic region (the severe winters of Iowa are a far cry from sweltering North Africa) could have created considerable problems, but Nawal soon settled happily into her new environment, and her athletics career flourished.

Indoors in 1984 she ran 54.15 for 440y (equivalent to 53.84 for 400m), and outdoors she built up steadily. Beginning with a modest hurdles time of 59.5 in March, she progressed to 56.57 on April 6th, and American collegiate and African records of 55.67 on April 21st and 55.37 on April 27th - both times under very windy conditions. She lowered her flat marks to 11.46 for 100 and 51.84 for 400 and climaxed her American season with victory in the NCAA Championships on June 1 in 55.84. At this time her Olympic hopes revolved aaround making the final, nothing more ambitious than that.

Nawal returned home to Casablanca shortly afterwards for the Moslem fast of Ramadan, hardly the ideal preparation - physically speak ing - for an Olympic athlete, although she did welcome the enforced rest after a strenuous American campaign. Flollowing a week's training in France with her former coach, Jean—francois Coquand, she recommenced racing in Stockholm on July 2nd, clocking 55.71 behind Poland's Genowefa Blaszak (54.78). She followed up with victories in the African Championships in Rabat (July 12-15), in the 200 (23.93) and 400H (56.01).

Nawal ranked third on paper among those entered for the Olympics with her 55.37, be-hind the American pair of Judi Brown (54.93) and Angie Wright (55.33). At the Games she won her heat in 54.69 and took third in the semis in 55.65 behind Skoglund's Olympic record of 55.17 and 55.24 by Romania's Cristina Cojocaru. The final, on August 8th, saw the Moroccan leading throughout. Drawn In lane three, she strode 17s until the seventh hurdle. Debbie Flintoff of Australia and Skoglund challenged around the final turn but Nawal never weakened and ran out the winner, easing up with arms raised in triumph, in the African record time of 54.61. Brown was second in 55.20, Cojocaru third in 55.41.

Within minutes of her emotional victory and Within minutes of her emotional victory and lap of honour, King Hassan II of Morocco (her benefactor) telephoned his congratulations, expressing the pride of all Arab countries in her achievement. She herself declared that the victory was particularly important to Arab women who, until that moment, had never accomplished anything of great significance in international sport. Nawal dedicated her win to the memory of

Nawal dedicated her win to the memory of her beloved father, who was killed by a car in February. "I wish he was here", she said. "He would be very proud. I had a lot of encouragement from my father. He wanted me to be the best in everything".


As for the future, Nawal told Yves Pinaud of 'Jeux d'Afrique' (the African sports month-ly) that her ambition now is "to improve my times. Why not the world record? I am cap-able of it. People are always telling me: you are small, the others are big. Nevertheless, it's me who's the Olympic champion, not the oth-ers!".
