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LARRIEU & FALCONS XC CHAMPIONS BOTH WIN FIRST TITLES

SPECIAL - JAN POPPER REPORTS

(Ed. note:-This is the first in a series of articles by Czechoslovakian Jan Popper on the field events in the Olympics at Munich. In this issue, he reports on the two jumps. Coming up will be his coverage of the weights and the pentathlon. Popper's thorough reporting is the reason he is regarded by other reporters and athletes as the tops in women's track and field in the world. Watch for his future articles as well as his Annual World Ranking lists in the 1973 WTFW magazine.) Long Beach, California, November 25:-After four years of trying, Francie Larrieu of the San Jose Cindergals, finally won her first National Cross Country title here today as she defeated defending champion Doris Brown over the 2½ mile course by 50 yards, clocking 13:27 to the Washingtonian's 13:34. Larrieu was fourth in last year's championships, 8th in 1970 and 6th in 1969.

The Women's race brought together nearly all of the USA's top distance runners and such well known leather lungers as Eileen Claugus, Debbie Heald and Brenda Webb found themselves chasing quite a few across the finish line. Judy Ikenberry, Sports United of Rialto, apparently enjoying rejuvination, placed 30th. She was 44th 'way back in 1968 after many years of toiling for the old Laura Scudder Chippettes back in the dark ages of women's track.

The Falcons, under the able direction of Ken Foreman, have been the tough luck club of distance running for many, many years, always turning up at the Nationals with one or more of their fine stable of runners sick, injured, attending weddings or funerals. This time they were not to be denied as they poured it on the rest of the nation with Brown in second spot, Kathy McIntyre third, former National champion Vicki Foltz in fifth, Beth Bonner 9th and Laurel Miller tenth for a total of 29 points to 75 for runner-up San Jose.

29 points to 75 for runner-up San Jose. Rialto's Debbie Johnson took the 14/17 race in 11:20 over another Washingtonian, Debbie Quartier of the Rainbow Runners who was some eight second to the rear. This Division also saw some mighty fine runners trailing as Olympian Wendy Koenig, admittedly not a cross country devotee, finishing 9th. The Rialto squad won the team title over Albuquerque Olympettes 71-114.

Two hundred and thirty five runners finished the 12/13 race as Robin Campbell of Sports Internation, Washington DC, won by eight seconds over Chriselle Speller. It was good to see Becky Wolfinbarger, Southern California Cheetahs, back in action after suffering multiple injuries and hospitalization last year from walking (running) through a glass door. Becky finished 11th.

The Duke City Dashers and another Campbell won again in the 10/11 Division. The DCD squad scored a close win over the Southern California Cheetahs and the Sports United Road Runners of Rialto with 65 points to 78 and 81 respectively. Robin Campbell's little sister, Donna, took the individual title as she waltzed home some six seconds ahead of Mari Gibbs, one of the few LATC runners below age 20!

Closest finish of the day saw Sandra Beach of the Albuquerque TC win the 9/Under race in 5:48, just two seconds ahead of the Blue Angels Carol Lantry while the Sports United group of teeny ones won the team title easily with 67 points.

Certainly one of the largest fields ever assembled, this National Championship will go down in history as one to aim at in the future for 830 runners FINISHED the five races and nearly 80 clubs took part. The womme's division was the smallest group as only 111 finished - but the first six place winners will be rewarded with a trip to Belgium for the International XC Championships soon. The 9/Under division had 129 finishers, 152 crossed the line in the 14/17 race, 203 confused the judges in the 10/11 division and 235 scored in the 12/13 contest.

Hosts Long Beach Comets staged a wonderful competition and provided a fine atmosphere for the competition. Although some rukus came up concerning the awards ceremony, certainly no one

REEL TALK

Voting is now under way by WTFW correspondents for the athletes of the year and more than 30 ballots have been returned to date. It will be interesting to see just how the results come out for the past year, the finest in history for the females.

We will keep going as long as we possibly can, but remember King Henry.

In the interest of cutting costs, we will be trimming some of the complimentary receivers from our mailing list. So we hereby notify those who have been on our lists as "Club Secretaries" that this will be their last free copy and if they wish to continue receiving the magazine, a subscription must be sent. Nearly 100 clubs took advantage of our offer for s free subscription for their Secretary who in turn was to send us results, club news and receive a 20% cut for all subscriptions sold. Unfortunately only four or five secretaries furnished us with news and/or results and less than that number came through with any subscriptions. So the free ride is now finished.

We are engaged in a "running battle" with Bob Hyten of the Ozark TC concerning his Club's records. We refuse to accept marks made by Judy Vernon after she departed from the United States for England and represented Great Britain in the 1972 Olympic Games. This is unfair, claims Hyten. This is fair, says WTFW. Our contention is that Judy does not live in the USA, does not train in the USA, does not represent a USA Club in competition and now is not eligible to represent the USA in international competition. What about the foreign athletes whose names are listed as club record holders? Our contention is they do live in the USA, they compete in the USA and they represent a USA club. Although they have not represented the USA in international competition, some are eligible to do so if they desired. We would welcome opinions of other coaches and clubs on this subject.

We are preparing the 1972 USA Lists for publication in the January Annual Edition and need information and assistance from those coaches and athletes who had performances worthy of being included. Because of our absence during June, July and August, we may have missed some list-worthy marks and ask you to send these performances to us before the end of December. If your marks are better than the following, they will be in the 1972 USA List: 10.9, 24.8, 57.0, 2:17.0, 5:15.0, 4:50 (1500), 10:59 (3000), 11:20 (2M), 18:45 (3M), 19:30 (5000), 14.9, 29.5, 5'3, 18'6, 38'0 (4k), 125'0(DT), 130'0 (JT), Relays 48.9, 1:45(4x220), 4:03.0, 1:48.0 (Med), 13:10 (DistMed), 3200 pts (Pentathlon - new scale). We must have the date, site of the meet as well as your performance and your place in the competition. For the sprints, hurdles and long jump, the wind reading must be included also.

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DORIS BROWN, CANADA PAN AM CHAMPIONS

Victoria, Canada, December 2:-The first ever Pan American cross country championships were a success as Doris Brown of the USA won the individual title and the Canadians, through the courtesy of Ken Foreman's inaccurate evaluation of the talent of Ona Dobratz, won the team title.

The cold, cold temperature and the freexing wind failed to keep Doris Brown from crushing the new Canadian sensation of 1972, Gelnda Reiser by eleven seconds. But the real surprise came as Dobratz, entered as a member of the USA "B" team, also edged ahead of Reiser by some six yards. Brown, running once again with an injury - this time a broken bone in her foot from a recent auto accident, will go after her sixth world cross country title in Belgium on March 17.

Only the USA and Canada took part in this initial Pan Am competition, but it is hoped other member nations will enter in the future. The course was 2.2 miles.

WHAT IS AN OFFICIAL? (From `Ontario Track Monthly')

Between the exuberance of the winner and the disappointment of the loser, we find a creature called a Track and Field Official. They come in all shapes and sizes, but are usually dressed in similar uniforms and hats. All have the same creed, that is to watch every athlete in every event and to call decisions to the best of their ability.

Officials are found everywhere - on the field, in stands, at the finish line, at the starting line, behind the discus circle, beside the pits, and at the snack bar, looking, it seems, for some invraction.

Fellow officials rib them, athletes tolerate them, spectators boo them, coaches criticize them, wives adore them, sons and daughters idolize them and mothers worry about them.

An Official is Courage, Spirit and Wisdom with a watch. They receive no pay for their work, but have a devotion to duty above and beyond the normal expectations.

When a race is close, officials are incompetent, indecisive and stupid. When it is one-sided, they are merciless, careless and dictatorial.

A Track and Field Official is a composite. He looks like a gentleman, acts like a cop, is as fussy as an old grandmother with her sewing basket, as immaculate as a debutant, and as fluid with judgements as an alcoholic after a binge.

To himself, he has never timed incorrectly, missed a call as an umpire, judged incorrectly, entered an incorrect distance on the scoresheet, allowed an athlete to get a false start or missed a foul jump. He has the eye of an eagle, the mind of an Einstein, the reaction of a computer, the judgement of Solomon and the speed and grace of Valeriy Borzov.

To his co-workers, he is generally out of position, blind as a bat, stupid as a ule, is quite incapable of making decisions, and has no right calling himself an official.

A Track and Field Official likes expense-paid trips, exemption from clinics, upgrading to top meets, well-coached relay teams, polite athletes, timing first place, an invitation to officiate at the Olympic Trials and six weeks notification of his next job responsibility.

He dislikes protests, indignant fans, being questioned, timing 8th place, shortage of judges, coaches, waiting for reimbursement of expenses, close finishes and athletes warming up on the infield.

An Official is truly a strange creature. You can critisize him but he won't be intimidated. You can question his judgement but he is thoroughly honest. He is unpopular with the athletes, coaches, fans, but he is a symbol of fair play, integrity and sportsmanship. He is hardworking, alert, and determined and is making a valuable controbution to track and field through his willingness to offer his services on numerous occasions throughout the four seasons of Track - Indoor, corss country, spring and summer.

An Official is truly a remarkable creature.



The athletes in my club here have been looking forward to finding out what is going on in women's athletics throughout the world and now they'll have some answers."

JAN POPPER REPORTS ON THE OLYMPIC FIELD EVENTS

Long Jump: The long jump opened the women's part of Olympic track and field. The qualifying round was the first event staged on the sunny morning of August 31, and the final was the first medal decision of the Games on the same afternoon. Remember, this was the fifth day of the XXth Olympiad, and the whole Bundersrepublik was still waiting for its first Olympic gold. With Heide Rosendahl, the PE lecturer at well known Cologne University, who was donated a fund of DM750 each month to cover the expenses of her coach, masseur, travel and equipment, able to do her best event before her other commitments, (which was one reason for putting the long jump in the schedule at such an early time - a legitimate use of the domestic privilege by the organizers - this event was of key interest. And the stands were almost full although this was merely the morning qualifying tests.

Two groups of 17 jumpers each assembled shortly before 10 o'clock in the morning at the two parallel runways in front of the main stands. The runways used the usual direction, that being the same as the facing of the 100m sprint. At 10:05 Jarmila Nygrynova, the 1970 European Junior Champion, started the hard trials with a 6.31/20'8½ jump against a 3.7 wind. A few minutes later, another jumper would use a 4.5 following wind, indivating how the whole affair was complicated by quick wind changes in all directions. Certainly, the stylized tent with its many holes and bends made the wind question a very tricky one.

Whistles sounded through the stadium after the first attempt of the reigning European champion Ingrid Mickler. She landed well behind the 6.30 standard, but a red flag declared it a foul, and many German fans demonstrated an anti-Mickler attitude in view of her nomination for the Games in the mixup with the well-prepared European indoor champ Roesen. The first sensation of the Games was the 6.69/21'11½ leap of Angelika Liebsch, the GDR champion, who added three inches to her fresh personal best which she set at the final tryouts in her home town of Dresden. Immediately followed another topper, for Rosendahl, out of bed at 4:30 that morning, jumped 6.62/21'8% - very, very easy. After the first round 10 finalists were already known, among them the Rumanian pentathlonist Vintila who exactly hit the required 6.30/20'8 mark.

In round two, only a few advanced to the final. Heidi Schueller, who recited the Olympic oath only six days before and who had received even more publicity that Heide Number One, was a qualifier along with Willye White, who in fact was taking part without a wind-less mark of qualifying quality, and the GDR record holder Margrit Olfert who leaped a mighty 6.52 /21'44. So with the last round coming up, at least eleven jumpers who had personal bests over 6.40/21'0 had not made the qualifying mark and were still hoping. Irena Szewinska participated only symbolically -she entered merely to get acquainted with the severely guarded infield just prior to the 100m trials and didn't jump at all. Another "visitor" was hurdler Bufanu who quit after a foul in the first round.

Mickler never recovered from her first foul. She ran thru in her second attempt, earning more whistles. And two strides before takeoff in round three, she froze, lost her confidence - and ran through again. The European Champ was out. Other aces followed: Ruth Martin-Jones, seemingly injured; her team mate, pretty Maureen Chitty, four years ago as Miss Barton a proud 12th at Mexico City; the most consistent GDR jumper of the year - up to now - Kristina Albertus, eliminated with a 6.01/19'8% jump; Soviet Champ Ilyina; the best long jumper from Asia, Japan's Yamashita; the sympathetic, tall Swiss vet of Austrian origin, Ammann; the very highly touted Aussie talent, Lynnette Tillett; the surprise of Cali, Brenda Eisler; Dick Attlesey's daughter, Kim, unable to get beyond 5.80/ 19'0% in her first overseas experience; even so much more so, the US champ Martha Watson. And so the 1972 Olympic competition once again proves the prime regulation: If you are not top fit at the right moment, you will loose! The only smiles of round three we5e exhibited by Ilona Bruzsenyak who became finalist number 14 with a wind-aided 6.37/20'10%, and by 18 year old Aussie Erica Nixon, whose legal pb 6.27/20'7 made her the best loser, in both senses of the word. At 11:32 the prelims closed.

The first surprise of the final was the site. Very few people were informed in advance that the final stage of the LJ would be held on the opposite side of the field. Even Gerd Ossenberg, Rosendahl's coach, realized it after the noon hour, too late for any person to get positioned in a good spot in the stands. This, by the way, seems to be the best way of eliminating the so-called coaching, all the tricky systems of hand waving and optical signals used frequently for the athlete-coach communication at these big meets. In fact, most athletes could not find out where their helpers were sitting in the overcrowded stands.

Weeks ago, Rosendahl decided to try her maximum in round one; Beamon's example was the motivation. And so, very soon after the start of the competition, shortly after Bruzsenyak did a personal best of 6.39/20'll½ and Olfert an expected 6.42/21'0¼, at 15:47 Heide came to the pit at top speed, had, a perfect takeoff and landed, with the roar of 70000 spectators in her ears, at 6.78/22'3, the best jump in the world for 1972 and the sixth best single performance of all time. Measured on pre-Olympic standards, it could be a destroying factor to the opposition. And the remainder of the jumps in the initial round seemed to prove it.

Eva Suranova's jump of 6.51/21'44 was some 27 cms. less than Rosendahl's leap and no other jumper, even including the world leader prior to the Games, Yorgova, was able to jump even that far. Both Liebsch, jumping against a 1.3 mps wind, and Antenen fouled. The wind, while not steady, was more predisctable than under the 'roof', but all the jumpers had to worry about its constant shifting.

In round two, Heide's result was again important. Her jump was a good 6.76/22'2% in spite of the fact her takeoff foot touched only 8 centimeters of the board. On the very next jump, Suranova, the third fastest sprinter in the field with a recent 11.6, bettered her Czechoslovakian record by two centimeters and increased her hold on second place. Liebsch, very nervous, managed only 6.23/20'54, nothing compared with her morning leap. Nothing happened for a while until Marcia Garbey, an experienced jumper with a good competitive record but no legal jumps over 6.50/21'4, exploded with 6.52/21'4% aided by a 2.1mps wind and putting her into a surprising third place. Defending champ Viscopoleanu improved her seasonal best to 6.48/21'34 and the heroine of Helsinki, Antenen, who was heavily bandaged on her recently injured left knee, achieved 6.49/21'31/2, and Yorgova slipped to an anonymous 6.12/ 20'1.

With eight girls already over 6.40/21'0, round three was an "all or nothing" affair for some highly rated athletes. Only one of them was successful: Heidi Schueller, the home crowd "liebling", who equalled her pb with 6.51/21'44 and ran joyously out of the pit to tell everyone her luck. White, Bruzsenyak, Liebsch (with a poor 6.07/19'11), Nygrynova and Vintila failed to make the final cut and even the gallant fighter Sherwood, edged out by Schueller tried without success and her effort of 6.40/21'0 was too short. Rosendahl had a 6.69/21'11½ effort, Viscopoleanu, still the Olympic record holder, managed another 6.48/21'34 - and in the final jump of the preliminary rounds, Yorgova got her rhythm and used a 2.2 breeze to get a long 6.62/21'8% jump. Still no threat for Heide - or was there....?

Although there were many fine jumps in the first three rounds, no single position changed. But there was pleanty of action. In the fourth round, Rosendahl dropped down to 6.52/21'44, the poorest of her ten competitive jumps in Munich. Suranova, whose 2 year old daughter eagerly watched the event at home-town Bratislava, bettered her Czechoslovakian record once again, this time with 6.67/21'10% and enjoyed the silver medal spot for only five minutes until the Sofia journalist Deana Yorgova answered in her own way. Looking very small (1.63/5'4%) in comparison with both leaders, the mother of two used her improved strength most efficiently and flew with her left hand high over her head and performing a perfect 'hang' to 6.77/22'21/2. The judges checked the new Bulgarian record carefully, then the news flashed over the scoreboards and at once, abruptly, Rosendahl was threatened as her lead had been diminished to the smallest possible of margins.

Olfert, Schueller, Garbey and even Suranova faded in the last two rounds. Viscopoleanu, very consistent with five jumps in the 6.40-6.50 range (21'0-21'4), but could not get the 'big one'. Antenen fouled a very long effort in round six. But the real story was told by the two leaders. Rosendahl added a jump of 6.73/22'l and Yorgova did 6.53/21'5 in their fifth jumps and the pressure on both was increasing -~4 each girl had only one jump remaining. At 17:20, Rosendahl jumped for the last time and scored 6.71/22'04 to give her the best-ever 6-jump-average in history, 6.698/21'll 7/8. She walked slowly to her resting place and grabbed her head in her arms. "I was not able to look at any of the remaining jumps", she confessed]later.

POPPER'S REPORT (Continued)

It took another 10 minutes before Yorgova was called to try her final jump and the last jump of the competition. Yorgova's coach, Stoyan Slavkov was many times Balkan decathlon champion and had been able to teach his protegee something about endurance and 'last jumps'. Yorgova tried very hard. Close witnesses reported later she landed somewhere between 6.75 and 6.80 (22'1¾-22'3¾), leaving the whole stadium in uncertainty. The officials showed Yorgova the take-off board for the jump was a hair-line foul - and it was all over. The entire nation of West Germany enjoyed its first gold medal.

"I tried my best, and I achieved it," smiled the Bulgarian LJ surprise of the year. "At the Balkan Games in Izmir, I finally got the confidence of being able to fight for medals. My life-long fear about injuries vanished, I felt fit. Rosendahl was my favorite too, so I was not too much impressed with her initial effort for I was expecting a world record jump. In fact, I have heard rumors about a 7.06/23'2 jump in training recently. Surely, I have lost to a better athlete, but I am not sad. Surely is this not the way to finish a 15 year-long love affair with track?"

Both the other medalists intend to continue with the sport. Suranova, now 26, aims for fast sprint and hurdle times, a serious pentathlon try and some "longer jumps" in the seasons before Montreal. Rosendahl will be there at least through the 1973 season. She mastered the uneasy situation of being everyone's dream that night with her charming smile, her well formulated press and TV interviews and was careful enough to withdraw from all the things surrounding her "hour of glory" and maintain her energy for other efforts on the track which would be starting in 40 hours time.

The long jump results were announced at 17:35 and only 20 minutes later did the authorities in Heide's home, Radevormwald, assemble to decide how to prepare the festivities for the Olympic champion after her return from the Games....

In general, even if not matching the standard overall of last year's European Championships final at Helsinki, the LJ final in Munich was better than expected after the pre-Olympic action in an event which has seemingly stagnated. The big question now is - is seven: meters or twenty three feet really that far away?

THE HIGH JUMP

A year ago, one of the IAAF's technical experts convinced me at Helsinki, that "they will not hesitate to alter Munich's qualification height even up to 1.80/5'10% in order to do away with the unhappy situation we had here". The 'unhappy situation' was to allow 27 jumpers to take part in the finals of the European Championships due to the low qualification requirement of 1.73/5'8. Now, at a time when heights of 1.80have become almost commonplace for more than 30 of the 43 nominated high jumpers for Munich, it seems to be the right moment for the IAAF to act. But nothing happened and the much too easy qualification standard of 1.76/5'9%, (set up after Helsinki), remained unchanged and the cream of the high jump world was again forced into the unfavorable situation of a long, long final battle.

For two hours, from 10:00 until 12:00 in the morning of September 3, the qualification round was contested at Munich. Two groups took part with 23 jumpers in Group A and 18 jumpers in Group B. Missing were last minute withdrawal of the Soviet giant Filatova and Hungarian pentathlonist Paap as well as Peruvian sprinter Vilca, Malaysian pentathlonist Chai and Norway's 1.80 performer Kari Karlsen. In the field of 41, 38 had mastered the required 1.76 height at least once during the 1972 season. The remaining three went out very early: Taiwan's Wu and Nigerian Njoku failing three times at their initial - and personal best - height of 1.60/5'3, Iceland's 17 year old Lara Sveinsdottir out after a good jump over the 1.60 mark. So the question was now, how many of the remaining field will fail to live up to their previous achievements?

The answer was a bit surprising, for an unexpected number of 14 found the 1.76 mark beyond their reach on this morning and were eliminated from the final. The first in trouble was another 17 year old, the new US find Sandi Goldsberry who went out at 1.65/5'5. Her team-mate, the wonder girl of the competition, Cindy Gilbert, 1.86/6'1¼ tall at 14 years, (she was the youngest track and field competitor of the Games), followed half an hour later after being successful at 1.70/5'7 on her third effort. The same height was also the last word for the third US youngster Deanne Wilson. In the meantime, much more seasoned experts such as Rumania's Vulescu (1.78/5'10) and Inaoka (1.76), Swiss second string Bisang (1.76) and GB newcomer Dimmeck reached their limit at either 1.65 or 1.70. At the latter height, even world-ranked Inkpen, Karbanova, Hrepevnik, Babosek and Rodriguez were in trouble, while defending champ Huebnerova had a rare miss at the low height of 1.65/5'5. Hrepevnik and Canadian flopper Hanna were over 1.73/5'8 on their third attempt and so 29 jumpers were still in the competition as the bar was raised to the qualifying height of 1.76/5'94 with Group A starting at 11:20 and Group B at 11:40. In the first 15 minutes of the Group A section, a full dozen were over the bar fast and clearly, and these were followed by three others, Karbanova, Inkpen and Huebnerova, who were over on their second attempts. Meanwhile over in Group B Ejstrup and Brill were over 1.76 on their first try and with the third round of trials still to come 22 athletes had already qualified. Among the seven remaining, only Hungary's pretty Komka was successful. All others, including such renownks as Antonina Lazaryeva, the 19 year old Cuban flopper Rodriguez, Switzerland's unpredictable Rechner and Yugoslavia's injured Babosek, all of whom had been over six feet during the 1972 campaign, had to leave the stadium as non qualifiers. The general impression in the talking of the athletes before the final was that the Rekortan take-off surface is more soft and flexible than the Tartan ones and many Tartan trained girls had their troubles despite fine training facilities available on the practice fields here.

It was a splendid field that assembled on the following day just before 1430 for the final contest. Of the 23 jumpers who had qualified, only ONE, (Jamaican Andrea Bruce) had a personal best under 1.80/5'10%, and at least 13 of them had mastered 1.85/6'0% at least once during the past three years. The straddle experts outnumbered the floppers 15 to 8 although flop forms varied from Rudolf's orthodox Fosbury/Major-like style to Brill's 'bend' variation. The vital statisticas also varied widely. Seven jumpers towered over the 1.80/5'11 height with Holland's youngster Ahlers being the tallest at 1.86/6'1%. Five others were between 1.76/5'9% and 1.78/5'10. another seven between 1.74/5'8% to 1.75 with Komka (1.70/5'7), Reid (1.71/5'7%), Rudolf (1.72/5'7%) and of course the "golden miniature" of Mexico, Huebnerova (1.69/5'6%) closing the field in this respect. The weight factor saw more unification with 13 girls between 60-65k, 132-143 pounds), six more between 66-70 (146-154) and only Hrepevnik (161) and Langkilde (159), Witschas (130) and incredible Rudolf (112) being on the extreme poles. Long considered a youthful event, the high jump was this time contested by no less than 12 'veterans' of 22 or older with Blagoyeva, Gildemeister and Gusenbauer the seniors at age 25. Three finalists were 20, three 19, two 18, two 17 and the youngest of all was a certain Ulrike Meyfarth, born May 4, 1956. More important, however, was the fact that only three of the finalists had never before taken part in some championship competition (Ahlers, Mundinger and Witschas); and that at least 14 of them won or were highly placed in some sort of title meet, indoor or outdoor, during the four years from Mexico to Munich. Never before had such a quantity of talent with experience and quality assembled on a high jump apron for one event.

The fireworks began at 14:32 and only uncertain Universiade champion Hrepevnik made an attempt at 1.60/5'3 as all others passed. At the next height, 1.66/5'5%, eight others took their first attempts - no one missed. At 14:43, Proskova took the first jump at 1.71/5'7% and became the first jumper to register a miss as she caught her toe on the bar and missed badly. Only one jumper, the tall Dane Lankgilde, passed at that height and most favorites went over quickly, but Proskova was joined in the miss department by teammate Karbanova and - hear, hear - Gusenbauer too. The trio all went over on the second trial of course, and at 15:12 the bar was raised to 1.76/5'9%. Seventeen athletes were over on their first try, but Gusenbauer worsened her total jumps sum with another failure before clearing on second effort. Also over on their second jumps were Langkilde, Reid and Huebnerova while the Number one Czech during the early season, Karbanova, took three jumps to clear. One jumper was eliminated, the Budapest technologist Magdolna Komka.

The bar went up to 1.79/5'10%, a deciding height at Helsinki, but nothing more than a quarter-final here. From 15:47 to 16:10, sixteen jumpers cleared and six failed in round 1. Among the successful ones was also a personal best by Andrea Bruce, the 17 year old Jamaican, an unknown quality for European observers, and most impressive here in view of her talent. Gusenbauer's attempt was a close one, and the bar quivered a while before staying on. Round two at this height was just a 10 minute affair with Reid and West Germany's 17 year old flopper Mundinger over, Karbanova failing unhappily when the bar fell off after a long vibration, and European runner-up Corneilia Popescu missing badly for yet another time. Round three was a negative one. Yugoslavia's 1970 top ranked Hrepevnik, plagued by injuries for a long time, Denmark's pioneer of modern jumping Solveig Langkilde, Czech Milada Karbanova, five time over 1.83/6'0 during June, July, and finally even Popescu, whose sore knee required medical treatment right up to the Games, all went out for places 19 to 22.

The next barrier - 1.82/5'11%. At this stage at Helsinki, which was the greatest high jump competition of all time at that date, only six jumpers were still in the competition. Now there were 18! 1.82 was the winning height at Mexico just four years ago. Round one took 20 minutes, from 16:27 to 16:47. Ten competitors went over with Mundinger being lucky to see the vibrating bar finally stay on giving her a personal best. At this point, there was a first place four way tie among Blagoyeva, Brill, Schmidt and ... Mayfarth, all of whom had no misses and all of whom began jumping at 1.71/5'7%. Another improvement was registered by Bruce who was now tied for 5th position. Round two lasted until 17:00, was interupted by a victory ceremony and brought success to three more jumpers. The Italian contingent cheered flopper Sara Simeoni for a new national record; then Gildemeister went over and finally the Danish student Grith Ejstrup proved her recent marks were not fly-by-night with a fine clearance. That put 13 jumpers over 1.82 - and the third round was still to come!

In the following seven minutes, the number of jumpers remaining in the competition improved to an unbelievable 15 as defending champion Milena Huebnerova, surprisingly short of condition as soon as two-and-half hours after beginning the event, made a desperate attempt and mastered the height of her Mexico glory; and finally Renate Gaertner, the only straddle jumper among the West German trio, did it also. So only three contestants were eliminated at a height which was the winning height at Mexico: Czech Alena Proskova, who had proven her ability in more than 20 competitions with 1.80 plus results; Holland's champion Ria Ahlers who was unable to match her personal best here but still one of the best newcomers of the season; and the thin Magyar prospect for years to come, Erika Rudolf.

Well, 15 competitiors remained at a height of 1.85/6'0% and compared with Helsinki's then widely healded number of five was perhaps the best example of the hard sort of 1972 competitiveness. An equivalent of a semifinal race, the first tries started at 17:08 and it took almost 25 minutes to see the first decisions coming on. Only three jumpers were successful on the first attempt. which looked for a few minutes like a medal decision: very surprising Yordanka Blagoyeva and two floppers, seemingly catching their favorable rkythm - Meyfarth who equalled her own GFR record, and Barbara Inkpen, matching her GB best of Helsinki fame.

But the rest of the field was far from beaten yet. At 17: 37, Simeoni, another flopper, was over on her second attempt, raising again the Italian record to unexpected heights in the biggest competition of her short career. With "Sara, Sara" choruses still sounding all over the stands, Rita Schmidt, approaching slower than any other jumper, went over, touching the bar, but only very softly, and after some vibrating, the bar stayed where it belonged and the referees white flag okeyed that jump. Gusenbauer tried her approach twice, and then failed on her attempt and the unanimous choice of all pre-season predictions was in serious trouble.

From 17:48 to 18:04, with the competition now in its fourth hour, the last round at 1.85 solved at least the question of the most popular top places. Bruce and Reid missed, being nevertheless very satisfied by placing in the top dozen and enjoying the best high jump big competition results for athletes of their race ever. Also Debbie Brill finally went out; her eighth place was surely a bit under her expectations in view of her 1971 brilliant record, but if you consider that she met this type of opposition for the first time and was out for some time in early season because of injuries, the overall meaning of her position was good. Then, at 17:53, Milena Huebnerova was forced out by missing badly on her third effort. Her conditioning lessened by a foot injury in April, the diminutive height-over-head record holder, (with 18cms/7" difference), lost too much energy in pre-jump warming-ups and could not use her technical abilities as in previous title meets. The failures of Gildemeister, Gartner and Ejstrup went according to their August results prior to

the Games. But mixed with all the failures were two excellent jumps: one by Rosemarie Witschas, the youngest of the GDR trio who equalled her personal best made just two weeks earlier as she performed what may be the best straddle for seen at Munich; and one by Ilona Gusenbauer, fully concentrated on her last all-or-nothing trial, not disturbed by another victory ceremony immediately before her turn, and going over with a clearance which seems to #nnounce bigger things will still come today.

The bar went up to 1.88/6'2, a height mastered by only five jumpers in history including Iolanda Balas, (who was again an interested spectator in the stands), and Antonina Lazaryeva plus Gusenbauer, Schmidt and Blagoyeva. 1.88 would be a personal record for four of the jumpers. Immediately after the first round began, at 18:07 and 18:08, Blagoyeva, whose form was described by Balas' husband Ion Soeter as "the best women's equivalent to Brumel", and joyous Meyfarth went over. The crowd greeted the new West German record by tremendous cheers and the two girls were now tied for first at this stage. All others failed with Inkpen looking the worst. The intervals between jumps lengthened now, and the twominute clocks, whose signals had rarely affected any jumper, were started with more pauses, and so not until 18:24 did the picture change. At this moment, Gusenbauer, clenching her fists intensively before starting her approach, performed the biggest - and last - position change in the final, moving from 7th to 3rd with a superb jump. Until 18:32 all others failed for the third time. Witschas trying gallently, Simeoni now losing her fluency, Schmidt clearing very closely, with the bar quivering on both her second and third efforts for many seconds before coming down, and Inkpen finally out with less impressive attempts than at 1.85. Incidentally, the score between the straddle and the flop at 1.88 was 4-3 in favor of the older form.

Two proven 1.90/6'2% jumpers and one unknown potential now jumped at 1.90, a mark equal to the Olympic record which belonged to Iolanda Balas made at her peak in Tokyo. The fight for medals was wide open though many observers believed that 1.88 was the decisive height, (which could mean a tie-deciding jump-off between Blagoyeva and Meyfarth). We were now in the fifth hour of competition, and anything was possible. For comparison, Helsinki's drama was decided after 3:52 hours of combat, so Munich became THE marathon of women's high jump history. Between 18:35 and 18:38, Blagoyeva and Meyfarth missed for the first time and Guesnbauer had another bad try. Pessimists in the press stand started to prepare their charts for the tie-breaker jump-off.

Again Blagoyeva, looking a bit tired now, missed in round two. Then, suddenly, at 18:42, a miracle came down to the then almost empty field (not the stands) of the Olympiastadion. Ulrike Meyfarth, a high schooler from Rhein, went over with - really - some light between the bar and her back. She touched the bar softly with one foot, but a storm of joy came from the stands, Ulrike ran wild out of the pit, waving and cheering happily, officials stopped the vibrations of the bar soon, and the sensation was perfect. An unknown teenager led the competition at such a crucial point!

Gusenbauer tried seriously, but looked a bit tight in her second attempt. And then, at 18:45, another wave of cheers came through the stadium. Yordanka Blagoyeva, coming back after matrimony in a fantastic style this year, used all her famous strength, went over, touching the bar almost microscopically, came out of the pit as joyously as Ulrike some minutes ago, ran to her things, started to pull on her training suit - and suddenly the ovations stopped. The yellow bar, vibrating far less intensively than during any other "toucher" of the evening, and observed by officials long, long seconds, fell down.... A storm of whistles, documenting both the sympathy of the crowd for the unhappy Bulgarian and the critical approach of the officials for waiting so long, went through the stadium. But any sort of protest was unjustified: the high jump regulations are very clear in this respect. At least one expert measured the time during which the bar was on the move as seven seconds; during windy sessions, (which was not the case at Munich), there could be factors beyond the jumper, which could cause the bar to fall in such a long period, so perhaps a new rule could be made after this example. But for now, Blagoyeva lost her fight, and managed to settle her obvious hot temper after that failure to a gentle, self-reserved mood later.

Now it was Ilona's turn, and the hope of Austria tried magnificently, jumping high, but touching the bar too hard with

her feet. A miss. Applause for the WR holder from the people in the stands - and the final decision as far as medals was concerned, had been made: Meyfarth the gold, Blagoyeva second and Gusenbauer third. Not one serious predictor could imagine it even an hour before the competition began!

But the spectacle went on. At 18:52, exactly four hours and twenty minutes after the very first jump, Ulrike Meyfarth exhibited her most perfect jump of all her nine efforts of the competition, leaving the bar this time comppletely untouched and equalling Balas' and Gusenbauer's WR at 1.92/ 6'3%. "Maedchen ohne nerven" - "A girl without nerves", whispered a veteran Olympic observer some seats behind me; for Ulrike did it in spite of being constantly bothered by photographers, tv cameras and even congratulating officials for the last half hour, talking in almost childish joy to everyone, preparing for her most important jumps with only short wind sprints and some loosening up exercises. "No one knows what any young flopper could do if she were able to stay on par with us up to the big heights", said Ilona Gusenbauer some weeks ago. She was right. No one could measure exactly the psychical reserves which are not spent by the hours-long careful self-observations of a straddle jumper, and which enabled even the most unexperienced greenhorn among Ulrike did even more for the future of the backward form than Dick Fosbury.

To remain at the competition, it must be registered that the youngest Olympic champion of track and field of all time continued on and tried a WR height of 1.94/6'44 intensively and had two gallant efforts at that height. At 19:03 it was all over and the hour of glory for the shyly smiling teenager began.

For many, this was the last chapter of sheer joy of the 1972 Olympics. Ten hours later, the first victim of termor fell with deadly wounds to the floor of the house number 31 at the Village's Connolly-Street.....

IAAF RULE CHANGES from 'Athletics Weekly'

A number of important technical rule changes were approved by the Munich Congress of the International Amateur Athletic Federation and will come into force from May 1, 1973. These rules apply only to international competition but the IAAF recommends National Associations adopt the rules for the conduct of their own athletic meetings.

Among the changes are: 800m/880y in lanes for the first two turns; new formula for breaking ties in the high jump, but it applies to first place only where there is a tie for any other place, it remains a tie and points are split where first place is concerned the competitor with the lowest number of jumps at the height at which the tie occurs shall be awarded the higher place, (this is the present rule) but if the tie still remains, the competitors involved will in the future have one more jump at the height at which they failed ... if no decision is reached by that method, the bar will be lowered or raised to the previously announced heights and the athletes will have one jump at each height until the tie is broken; In the pentathlon, wind assistance above 4/mps-8.95/mph in the appropriate events will invalidate a record; The sector for putting the shot will be reduced from 65° to 45°; It is emphasised that practice throws in the shot and discus should take place from the circles.

The Committee also noted the recommendation of the Women's Committee to increase the 200m in the pentathlon to 400m and suggested that this might even be extended to 800m...consideration should also be given to adding an additional event for example, the javelin.

The "rocker type" hurdle does not conform to the IAAF specifications and its use should be discontinued.

400m hurdles:-The Committee felt strongly that it was still too early to introduce this event in place of the 200m hurdles. It should be noted that the report of the IAAF Women's Committee stated: "The Committee would like to see the 200mH replaced within the next two years by the 400mH race. For this event, the distance between hurdles should be the same as that for the men's race, with the hurdle height set at 2'6. It was hoped that Member Federations would introduce this new hurdle distance for women and that it would be possible by 1974 to have at the Committee's disposal reports concerning the trials held. The final stage would be complete adoption in 1976."

Had the meet been scored in the regular 10-8-6 4-2-1 scale, the LATC would have won an overwhelming victory with 67 points to 22 for runner-up LA Mercurettes, all scored by Barbara Ferrell. Mayor Daley was third with 20 points followed by Mickey's Missiles and Columbus Community TC 14 and TSU with 13.

Scoring by States was absolutely no contest with California tallying 180 points, more than the other 49 States combined who managed only 158 points. Illinois was the second place State behind California's 180 with 20 points followed by Ohio with 18, Washington and New York with 17.

LETTER FROM T. LLOYD, Tampa
