

AFTER THREE YE/

Few Peninsula highschool football coaches have had as much success selling their product to players and fans as have a highly touted trio of mentors Bob Jones, Bud Presley, and Jerry Hathaway. Presley came to Cubberley after the first chapter of Cougar grid history had been written in 1956. He had coached at Sequoiatwo years and Hollister three before coming here. This fall he will shift over to C & D Basketball. Jones, Cubberley athletic director, knew pretty much the first year what material he would have to work with. He had been transfered to Cubberley afterthree years at Wilbur Junior High School. With jumbo Ted Tollner calling the signals at QB and speedy Dave Kilbourne, Ernie Stevenson, and Yas Tana right along side of Ted inthe backfield, Jones scared over J-V competition and compiled an 8-1 record(2-1 in the informal Little-Big Four Conforence).

Palo Alto had been the class of the SPAL up to 1957 but Cubberley had racked up an impressive mark prior to entering the big time. Carlmont, with 4 fleet-footed backs upset Palo Alto on opening day of the '57 melee, 21-13 on the Vikes home field. In their opener, Cubberleymassacred Miramonte in a practice tilt, 48-0. The Cougars defeated Sequoia and Lincoln but then came Carlmont and under the lights of Sequoia's Terremere Field, their backs dazzled again. Cubberley fell behind 25-13 at the half on the strange Sequoia field. All-league tackle Jim Bishop led a second-half defensive charge that stymied the Carlmont runners and the Cougars salvaged this game 34-25 mainly on the passing of Ted Tollner to ends Mike Nichols and Jeff Gardiner. This important victory told the tale as the Cougs had to settle for a 20-20 tie with Palo Alto.

The bread and butter game that really cinched things once and for all for Cubberley was the finaleagainst Menlo-Atherton. Lineman Rishop again took charge in the second half and Cubberley's offensive unit ground out two winning touchdowns.

The Cougars faced a tougher slate in 1958. The game of the year was a never to be forgottenupset over North State powerhouse Sequoia. Bill Cady, slim Cubberley half-cont. next page

back broke away on a 4th quarter end run to turn the Sequoia game in Cubberley's favor. His 58 yard TD aided by two key blocks by Mike Nichols was punctuated by Shibun Tana's conversion and Cubberley won, 14-12. Finale time came again and with it, Menlo-Atherton, Cubberley's traditional closing game. The Bears bested Cubberley 7-6 and Sequoia bested Palo Alto on Thanksgiving Day to throw the standings into a Sequoia and Cubberley(3-1).

Early season games saw Cubberley lose to St. Francis 19-13 in an early season upset. Another North Statedynamo, Castlement of Oakland played on less than even terms with Cubberley in the first quarter and then work up and humiliated the Cougars, 34-6. Peak games were played against rival Palo Alto(7-0 victory) and a heartbraking loss to the Richmond Oilers, 12-9 in the last six seconds.

With less experience than a Cubberley team has ever possessed, Coach Jones, holder of a three year 23-5-1 record is well aware that this may be a rebuilding year for two time champion Cubberley.

1959 PLAYER PERSONNEL

ENDS: Senior Jim McWilliam is strong, well seasoned, and has good hands. Hard nosed—good on defense. Senior Bob Lucas is a hard charger and good blocker. Senior Jim Kennon has good speed, receives well, and has a year of varsity play to his credit. Juniors who will bid for starting roles are Bruce Bellandi, All-league Soph end in 1958 has the speed and fine hands—Tom Hall is fleet and big—

Others to watch-Odis Hamilton and Pete Habley.

TACKLES: Big, fast, and experienced Jim Gould, a two year letterman leads the candidates for a starting tackle spot. Transfer Dennis Martin, quick and rugged, and starter from last year's Woodside High School team will strengthen this position. Other experienced Seniors to watch are one year varsity vets, Dave Wilson and Dick Hughes.

GUARDS: Steve Wolf Unnevehr, a 2 year letterman and small but aggressive Chuck Stanton lead the list of hopefuls while Al Culver, another upperclassmen with experience lends depth. Dark horse candidate is rugged John Caruso who missed last season but can be a starter this year. Juniors in the race are Norm Schlosser-First-String Soph in 1958 and Neil Christiansen, Second-Team Soph Alleaguer at this spot last fall.

CENTERS: Ralph Wenzel. "The Rock" is tough and aggressive and could be the best anchor man in the league. He may play guard or tackle if Bud Mitchell, All-League : Soph center in 1958 comes through and can hold down a varsity job.

QUARTERBACKS: Chinin Tana, experienced Senior back leads all comers at this spot. Don Castle, junior, is big and he can pass but he lacks experience and is untried in (Continued next pg.)

varsity competition. Don was accorded All-League honors in the Soph league last season. Kent Weber, a junior is a good leader and also a hard nosed competitor with experience at this position and as a halfback. Bruce Bellandi, junior end candidate, may try out at QB. Dean Gambino, junior, saw little action as a soph last season is the dark horse candidate. Bill Fletsch, outstanding soph, up from last year's Wilbur Junior High School varsity is an excellent short passer.

HALFBACKS: Rugged and experienced Jay Warfel, a good driver up the middle is the top candidate for a halfback spot. Warfel gained 96 yards for a 2.6 average last year. Chinin Tana may run here if Don Castle, Kent Weber, or Bruce Bellandi fill the bill at QB. Tana racked up 102 yards for a 2.8 average last season and he is the top defensive back and most versatile of all the backs. George Prime, a 10.2 sprinter in the 100 yard dash last spring, as a junior is another contender. Others to watch are Seniors Bill Grey and Juniors Gil Moore, Bob Ballard, and Henry Brown.

FULLBACKS: Jim Carter leads the race here. He's an experienced senior who performed at this spot in 1958, racking up a 1.7 average gain per carry. Carter carries. 180 well distributed lbs., standing 5-11. Senior Jeff Breen saw limited action on the -/!s last year. Dick Hayden is a rugged soph who could fit into the picture here after a good season last year at Wilbur Junior High School.

COUGAR OVERALL OUTLOOK: Small, lacking mainly speed and experience. This could be a building year. The team must put forth a tremendous amount of spirit if it hopes to repeat as a championship team.

The Cougs may open up their offense and go to the air more and bring back memories of the fine 1957 aerial year. Only 10 lettermen are returning. Team must develop fast.
